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

WHILE you are waiting for the Service to begin, use the time in Prayer to God for A Blessing on the Service in which you are about to take part, for your own soul, for him who ministers, for those who worship with you.

REMEMBER that you are coming not merely to be 'hearers'

but 'worshippers.

Join then earnestly with heart and voice, in the prayers that the people say with the minister, in the Amen at the end of all prayers, in the responses, and in the hymns.

KNEEL devoutly at the time of prayer: for this is the

proper attitude of supplication.

If for any reason you cannot kneel it is more reverent to stand than to sit. It has the sanction of the custom of Eastern countries.

We stand when we praise God, "in psalms and hymns

and spiritual songs," or when we confess our Faith.

We sit when we listen to the message being delivered to us whether from God's Word, or by His minister.

A short Prayer that may be said before the service begins.

O LORD, open Thou our lips, that we may bless Thy holy name; cleanse also our hearts from all vain, evil, and wandering thoughts; enlighten our understandings, enkindle our affections, that we may worthily and devoutly offer up our prayers and praise to Thee, and so be meet to be heard in the presence of Thy Divine Majesty; through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen.

A short Prayer that may be said after the service.

A LMIGHTY Father, mercifully accept these our unworthy prayers, which we have offered unto Thy Divine Majesty; look not, we pray Thee, on our faltering lips, but heal our infirmities, and receive our prayers, for Thine own mercies sake, in Christ Jesus our Lord, who liveth and reigheth with Thee, and the Holy Ghost, One God, world without end. Amen.

¶ The following Prayer for a Blessing on our Diocese may also be used before or after the service, as opportunity offers.

ALMIGHTY God. Who through Thy Son Jesus Christ didst command Thy Church diligently to feed Thy people, have mercy upon all those who are scattered abroad as sheep without a shepherd (especially we would pray for those in this Diocese); strengthen them with special outpourings of Thy grace, that they may be enabled to continue stedfast in the Faith, and holy in their lives; Raise up, we beseech Thee, faithful Pastors to go forth to minister to them : Give to all Thy people more abounding love for souls, that they may be ready to help according to their ability those who are in need; and may the Spirit of Wisdom and Power, and true Godliness so abide with those who are engaged in this work, that all may be done to thy honour and glory, and the relief of the necessities of Thy people; through the same Thy Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, Who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, ever One God, world without end. THE ORDER

FOR

Morning or Evening Brayer.

- ¶ The Minister begins the Service by reading one or more sentences of Scripture, and an exhortation declaring the purpose of public worship.
- Then All shall kneel and SAY after the Minister the following

General Confession.

LMIGHTY and most merciful Father; We have erred, and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against thy holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; And we have done those things which we ought not to have done; And there is no health in us. But, thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, miserable offenders. Spare thou them, O God, which confess their faults. thou them that are penitent; According to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesu And grant, O most merciful Father, our Lord. for his sake; That we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, To the glory of thy holy Name. Amen.

The people, STILL KNEELING, the Priest alone, standing, shall pronounce the

Absolution, or Remission of Sins.

LMIGHTY God, the Father of our Lord A Jesus Christ, who desireth not the death of a sinner, but rather that he may turn from his wickedness, and live; and hath given power, and commandment, to his Ministers, to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the Absolution and Remission of their sins: He pardoneth and absolveth all them that truly repent, and unfeignedly believe his holy Gospel. Wherefore let us beseech him to grant us true repentance, and his Holy Spirit, that those things may please him, which we do at this present; and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure, and holy; so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Amen.

The Second Collect at Evening Prayer.

LECTION FIRST.

PSALM I. Beatus vir, qui non abiit &c.

BLESSED is the man that hath not walked in the counsel of the ungodly, nor stood in the way of sinners: and hath not sat in the seat of the scornful.

2. But his delight is in the law of the Lord: and in his law will he exercise himself day and night.

3. And he shall be like a tree planted by the waterside: that will bring forth his fruit in due season.

4. His leaf also shall not wither: and look, whatsoever he doeth, it shall prosper.

5 As for the ungodly, it is not so with them; but they are like the chaff, which the wind scattereth away from the face of the earth.

6 Therefore the ungodly shall not be able to stand in the judgement: neither the sinners in the congregation of the righteous.

7 But the Lord knoweth the way of the righteous: and the way of the ungodly shall perish.

PSALM XIX. Cœli enarrant.

THE heavens declare the glory of God: and the firmament sheweth his handy-work.

2 One day telleth another: and one night certifieth another.

3 There is neither speech nor language: but their voices are heard among them.

4 Their sound is gone out into all lands: and their words into the ends of the world.

5 In them hath he set a tabernacle for the sun: which cometh forth as a bridegroom out of his chamber, and rejoiceth as a giant to run his course.

6 It goeth forth from the uttermost port of the heaven, and runneth about unto the end of it again : and there is nothing hid from the heat thereof.

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7 The law of the Lord is an undefiled law, converting the soul: the testimony of the Lord is sure, and giveth wisdom unto the simple.

8 The statutes of the Lord are right, and rejoice the heart: the commandment of the Lord is pure, and giveth light unto the eyes,

9 The fear of the Lord is clean, and endureth for ever: the judgements of the Lord are true, and right-

10 More to be desired are they than gold, yea than much fine gold ; sweeter also than honey, and the

11 Moreover, by them is thy servant taught: and in keeping of them there is great reward.

12 Who can tell how oft he offendeth: O cleanse thou me from my secret faults.

13 Keep thy servant also from presumptuous sins, lest they get the dominion over me : so shall I be undefiled, and innocent from the great offence.

14 Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart: be always acceptable in thy sight.

15 O Lord: my strength, and my redeemer.

PSALM CIII. Benedic, anima mea.

DRAISE the Lord, O my soul: and all that is within me praise his Holy Name.

2 Praise the Lord, O my soul: and forget not all his benefits.

3 Who forgiveth all thy sin: and healeth all thine infirmities.

4 Who saveth thy life from destruction : and crowneth thee with mercy and loving-kindness;

5 Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things: making thee young and lusty as an eagle.

6 The Lord executeth righteous as and judgement: for all them that are oppressed with wrong.

7 He shewed his ways unto Moses: his works unto the children of Israel.

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8 The Lord is full of compassion and mercy: long-suffering, and of great goodness.

9 He will not always be chiding: neither keepeth

he his anger for ever.

10 He hath not dealt with us after our sins : nor re-

warded us according to our wickedness.

11 For look how high the heaven is in comparison of the earth: so great is his mercy toward them that fear him.

12 Look how wide also the east is from the west:

so far hath he set our sins from us.

13 Yea, like as a father pitieth his own children: even so is the Lord merciful unto them that fear him.

14 For he knoweth whereof we are made: he re-

membereth that we are but dust.

15 The days of man are but as grass: for he flourisheth as a flower of the field.

16 For as soon as the wind goeth over it, it is gone :

and the place thereof shall know it no more.

17 But the merciful goodness of the Lord endureth for ever and ever upon them that fear him: and his righteousness upon children's children;

18 Even upon such as keep his covenant : and think

upon his commandments to do them.

19 The Lord hath prepared his seat in heaven: and

his kingdom ruleth over all.

20 O praise the Lord, ye angels of his, ye that excel in strength: ye that fulfil his commandment, and hearken unto the voice of his words.

21 O praise the Lord, all ye his hosts: ye servants

of his that do his pleasure.

22 O speak good of the Lord, all ye works of his, in all places of his dominion: praise thou the Lord, O my soul.

SELECTION SECOND.

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PSALM II. Quare fremuerunt gentes?

WHY do the heathen so furiously rage together: and why do the people imagine a vain thing.

- 2 The kings of the earth stand up, and the rulers take counsel together: against the Lord and against his Anointed.
- 3 Let us break their bonds asunder: and cast away their cords from us.
- 4 He that dwelleth in heaven shall laugh them to scorn: the Lord shall have them in derision.
- 5 Then shall he speak unto them in his wrath: and vex them in his sore displeasure.
- 6 Yet have I set my King: upon my holy hill of Sion.
- 7 I will preach the law, whereof the Lord hath said unto me: Thou art my Son, this day have I begotten thee.
- 8 Desire of me, and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance; and the utmost parts of the earth for thy possession.
- 9 Thou shalt bruise them with a rod of iron: and break them in pieces like a potter's vessel.
- 10 Be wise now therefore, O ye kings: be learned, ye that are judges of the earth.
- 11 Serve the Lord in fear : and rejoice unto him with reverence.
- 12 Kiss the Son, lest he be angry, and so ye perish from the right way: if his wrath be kindled, (yea, but a little,) blessed are all they that put their trust in him.

PSALM XI. In Domino confido.

IN the Lord put I my trust: how say ye then to my soul, that she should flee as a bird unto the hill?

2 For lo, the ungodly bend their bow, and make ready their arrows within the quiver: that they may privily shoot at them which are true of heart.

3 For the foundations will be cast down: and what hath the righteous done?

4 The Lord is in his holy temple: the Lord's seat

is in heaven.

5 His eyes consider the poor : and his eye-lids try the children of men.

6 The Lord alloweth the righteous: but the ungodly, and him that delighteth in wickedness doth his soul abhor.

7 Upon the ungodly he shall rain snares, fire and brimstone, storm and tempest: this shall be their portion to drink.

8 For the righteous Lord loveth righteousness: his countenance will behold the thing that is just.

PSALM XXXIV. Benedicam Domino.

WILL always give thanks unto the Lord : his praise shall ever be in my mouth.

2 My soul shall make her boast in the Lord: the humble shall hear thereof, and be glad.

3 O praise the Lord with me: and let us magnify his Name together.

4 I sought the Lord, and he heard me : yea, he delivered me out of all my fear.

5 They had an eye unto him, and were lightened: and their faces were not ashamed.

6 Lo, the poor crieth, and the Lord heareth him: yea, and saveth him out of all his troubles.

7 The angel of the Lord tarrieth round about them that fear him: and delivereth them.

8 O taste, and see, how gracious the Lord is: blessed is the man that trusteth in him.

9 O fear the Lord, ye that are his saints: for they that fear him lack nothing.

10 The lions do lack, and suffer hunger: but they who seek the Lord shall want no manner of thing that is good.

11 Come, ye children, and hearken unto me: I will teach you the fear of the Lord.

12 What man is he that lusteth to live: and would fain see good days?

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14 Eschew evil, and do good ; seek peace, and ensue it.

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15 The eyes of the Lord are over the righteous: and his ears are open unto their prayers.

16 The countenance of the Lord is against them that do evil: to root out the remembrance of them from the earth.

17 The righteous cry, and the Lord heareth them : and delivereth them out of all their troubles.

18 The Lord is nigh unto them that are of a contrite heart: and will save such as be of an humble spirit.

19 Great are the troubles of the righteous: but the Lord delivereth him out of all.

20 He keepeth all his bones : so that not one of them is broken.

21 But misfortune shall slay the ungodly: and they that hate the righteous shall be desolate.

22 The Lord delivereth the souls of his servants: and all they that put their trust in him shall not be destitute.

SELECTION THIRD.

PSALM VIII. Domine, Dominus noster.

O LORD our Governor, how excellent is thy Name in all the world: thou that hast set thy glory above the heavens!

2 Out of the mouth of very babes and sucklings hast thou ordained strength, because of thine enemies: that thou mightest still the enemy, and the avenger.

3 For I will consider thy heavens, even the works of of thy fingers: the moon and the stars, which thou hast ordained.

4 What is man, that thou art mindful of him: and the son of the man that thou visitest him?

5 Thou madest him lower than the angels: to crown him with glory and worship.

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6 Thou makest him to have dominion of the works of thy hands; and thou hast put all things in subjection under his feet;

7 All sheep and oxen : yea, and the beasts of the

field;

8 The fowls of the air, and the fishes of the sea: and whatsoever walketh through the paths of the seas.

9 O Lord our Governor: how excellent is thy Name

in all the world!

PSALM XXIV. Domini est terra.

THE earth is the Lord's, and all that therein is: the compass of the world, and they that dwell therein.

- 2 For he hath founded it upon the seas : and pre-

pared it upon the floods.

3 Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord : or who shall rise up in his holy place?

4 Even he that hath clean hands, and a pure heart: and that hath not lift up his mind unto vanity, nor sworn to deceive his neighbour.

5 He shall receive the blessing from the Lord: and righteousness from the God of his salvation.

6 This is the generation of them that seek him: even of them that seek thy face, O Jacob.

7 Lift up your heads, O ye gates, and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors: and the King of glory shall come in.

10 Who is the King of glory: even the Lord of hosts, he is the King of glory.

PSALM CXLV. Exaltabo te, Deus.

WILL magnify thee, O God, my King: and I will praise thy Name for ever and ever.

2 Every day will I give thanks unto thee: and praise thy Name for ever and ever.

3 Great is the Lord, and marvellous, worthy to be praised: there is no end of his greatness.

4 One generation shall praise thy works unto another: and declare thy power.

5 As for me, I will be talking of thy worship: thy glory, thy praise, and wondrous works;

6 So that men shall speak of the might of thy marvellous acts: and I will also tell of thy greatness.

7 The memorial of thine abundant kindness shall be shewed; and men shall sing of thy righteousness.

8 The Lord is gracious, and merciful : long-suffering, and of great goodness.

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9 The Lord is loving unto every man: and his mercy is over all his works.

10 All thy works praise thee, O Lord : and thy saints give thanks unto thee.

11 They shew the glory of thy kingdom: and talk of thy power;

12 That thy power, thy glory, and mightiness of thy kingdom: might be known unto men.

13 Thy kingdom is an everlasting kingdom and thy dominion endureth throughout all ages.

14 The Lord upholdeth all such as fall: and lifteth up all those that are down.

15 The eyes of all wait upon thee, O Lord: and thou givest them their meat in due season.

16 Thou openest thine hand: and fillest all things living with plenteousness.

17 The Lord is righteous in all his ways: and holy in all his works.

18 The Lord is nigh unto all them that call upon him : yea, all such as call upon him faithfully.

19 He will fulfil the desire of them that fear him: he also will hear their cry, and will help them.

20 The Lord preserveth all them that love him: but scattereth abroad all the ungodly.

21 My mouth shall speak the praise of the Lord: and let all flesh give thanks unto his holy Name for ever and ever.

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SELECTION FOURTH,

PSALM XXV. Ad te, Domine, levavi.

I NTO thee, O Lord, will I lift up my soul; my God, confounded, neither let mine enemies triumph over me.

2 For all they that hope in thee shall not be ashamed: but such as transgress without a cause shall be put to confusion.

3 Shew me thy ways, O Lord and teach me thy

4 Lead me forth in thy truth, and learn me; for thou art the God of my salvation; in thee hath been my hope all the day long.

5 Call to remembrance, O Lord, thy tender mercies: and thy loving-kindness, which have been ever of old.

6 O remember not the sins and offences of my youth: but according to thy mercy think theu upon me, O Lord, for thy goodness.

7 Gracious and righteous is the Lord: therefore will he teach sinners in the way.

8 Them that are meek shall he guide in judgement: and such as are gentle, them shall he learn his way.

9 All the paths of the Lord are mercy and truth: unto such as keep his covenant, and his testimonies.

10 For thy Name's cake, O Lord: be merciful unto my sin, for it is great.

11 What man is he, that feareth the Lord: him shall he teach in the way that he shall choose.

12 His soul shall dwell at ease: and his seed shall inherit the land.

13 The secret of the Lord is among them that fear him; and he will shew them his covenant.

14 Mine eyes are ever looking unto the Lord : for he shall pluck my feet out of the net.

15 Turn thee unto me, and have mercy upon me; for I am desolate and in misery.

16 The sorrows of my heart are enlarged : O bring thou me out of my troubles.

17 Look upon my adversity and misery . and for-

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18 Consider mine enemies, how many they are: and they bear a tyrannous hate against me.

19 O keep my soul, and deliver: let me not be confounded, for I have put my trust in thee.

20 Let perfectness and righteous dealing wait upon me: for my hope hath been in thee.

21 Deliver Israel, O God : out of all his troubles.

PSALM LXVII. Deus misereatur.

OD be merciful unto us, and bless us: and shew unto us; and his countenance, and be merciful

2 That thy way may be known upon earth: thy saving health among all nations.

3 Let the people praise thee, O God: yea, let all the people praise thee.

4 O let the nations rejoice and be glad: for thou shalt judge the folk righteously, and govern the nations upon earth.

5 Let the people praise thee, O God: Let all the people praise thee.

6 Then shall the earth bring forth her increase: and God, even our own God, shall give us his blessing.

7 God shall bless us : and all the ends of the world shall fear him.

PSALM XCI. Qui habitat.

WHOSO dwelleth under the defence of the most mighty.

2 I will say unto the Lord, Thou art my hope and my strong hold: my God, in him will I trust.

3 For he shall deliver thee from the snare of the hunter, and from the noisome pestilence.

4 He shall defend thee under his wings, and thou shalt be safe under his feathers: his faithfulness and truth shall be thy shield and buckler.

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5 Thou shalt not be afraid for any terror by night; nor for the arrow that flieth by day;

6 For the pestilence that walketh in darkness : nor for the sickness that destroyeth in the noon-day.

7 A thousand shall fall beside thee, and ten thousand at thy right hand : but it shall not come nigh thee.

8 Yes, with thine eyes shalt thou behold ; and see the reward of the ungodly.

9 For thou, Lord, art my hope : thou hast set thine house of defence very high.

10 There shall no evil happen unto thee; neither shall any plague come nigh thy dwelling.

11 For he shall give his angels charge over thee : to

keep thee in all thy ways. 12 They shall bear thee in their hands : that thou

hurt not thy foot against a stone.

13 Thou shalt go upon the lion and adder ; the young lion and the dragon shalt thou tread under thy feet.

14 Because he hath set his love upon me, therefore will I deliver him: I will set him up, because he hath known my Name.

15 He shall call upon me, and I will hear him : yea, I am with him in trouble; I will deliver him, and

bring him to honour. 16 With long life will I satisfy him : and shew him

my salvation.

SELECTION FIFTH.

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PSALM XXIII. Dominus regit me.

THE Lord is my shepherd : therefore can I lack no-

2 He shall feed me in a green pasture : and lead me forth beside the waters of comfort.

3 He shall convert my soul : and bring me forth in the paths of righteousness, for his Name's sake.

4 Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me: thy rod and thy staff comfort me.

5 Thou shalt prepare a table before me against them that trouble me: thou hast anointed my head with

oil, and my cup shall be full.

6 But thy loving kindness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life : and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

PSALM XXXII. Beati, quorum.

DLESSED is he whose unrighteousness is forgiven: and whose sin is covered.

2 Blessed is the man unto whom the Lord imputeth no sin : and in whose spirit there is no guile.

3 For while I held my tongue: my bones consumed away through my daily complaining.

4 For thy hand is heavy upon me day and night: and my moisture is like the drought in summer.

5 I will acknowledge my sin unto thee : and mine unrighteousness have I not hid.

6 I said, I will confess my sins unto the Lord; and so thou forgavest the wickedness of my sin:

7 For this shall every one that is godly make his prayer to thee, in a time when thou mayest be found : but in the great water-floods they shall not come nigh him.

8 Thou art a place to hide me in, thou shalt preserve me from trouble : thou shalt compass me about with songs of deliverance.

9 I will inform thee, and teach thee in the way where thou shalt go: and I will guide thee with mine eye.

10 Be ye not like to the horse and mule, which have no understanding : whose mouths must be held with

bit and bridle, lest they fall upon thee.

11 Great plagues remain for the ungodly : but whoso putteth his trust in the Lord, mercy embraceth him on every side.

12 Be glad, O ye righteous, and rejoice in the Lord:

and be joyful all ye that are true of heart.

PSALM LI. Miserere mei Deus.

TAVE mercy upon me, O God, after thy great goodness : according to the multitude of thy mercies do away mine offences.

2 Wash me throughly from my wickedness : and

cleanse me from my sin.

3 For I acknowledge my faults: and my sin is ever before me.

4 Against thee only have I sinned, and done this evil in thy sight: that thou mightest be justified in thy saying, and clear when thou art judged.

5 Behold, I was shapen in wickedness: and in sin

hath my mother conceived me.

6 But lo, thou requirest truth in the inward parts: and shalt make me to understand wisdom secretly.

7 Thou shalt purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean: thou shalt wash me, and I shall be whiter than anow.

8 Thou shalt make me hear of joy and gladness: that the bones which thou hast broken may rejoice.

9 Turn thy face from my sins : and put out all my misdeeds.

10 Make me a clean heart, O God and renew: a right spirit within me.

11 Cast me not away from thy presence : and take

not thy holy Spirit from me. 12 O give me the comfort of thy help again; and stablish me with thy free Spirit.

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13 Then shall I teach thy ways unto the wicked: and sinners shall be converted unto thee.

14 Deliver me from blood-guiltiness, O God, thou that art the God of my health : and my tongue shall sing of thy righteonsness.

15 Thou shalt open my lips, O Lord; and my

mouth shall shew thy praise.

16 For thou desirest no sacrifice, else would I give it thee : but thou delightest not in burnt-offerings.

17 The sacrifice of God is a troubled spirit: a broken and contrite heart, O God, shalt thou not despise.

18 0 be favourable and gracious unto Sion: build thou the walls of Jerusalem.

19 Then shalt thou be pleased with the sacrifice of righteousness, with the burnt-offerings and oblations: then shall they offer young bullocks upon thine altar.


