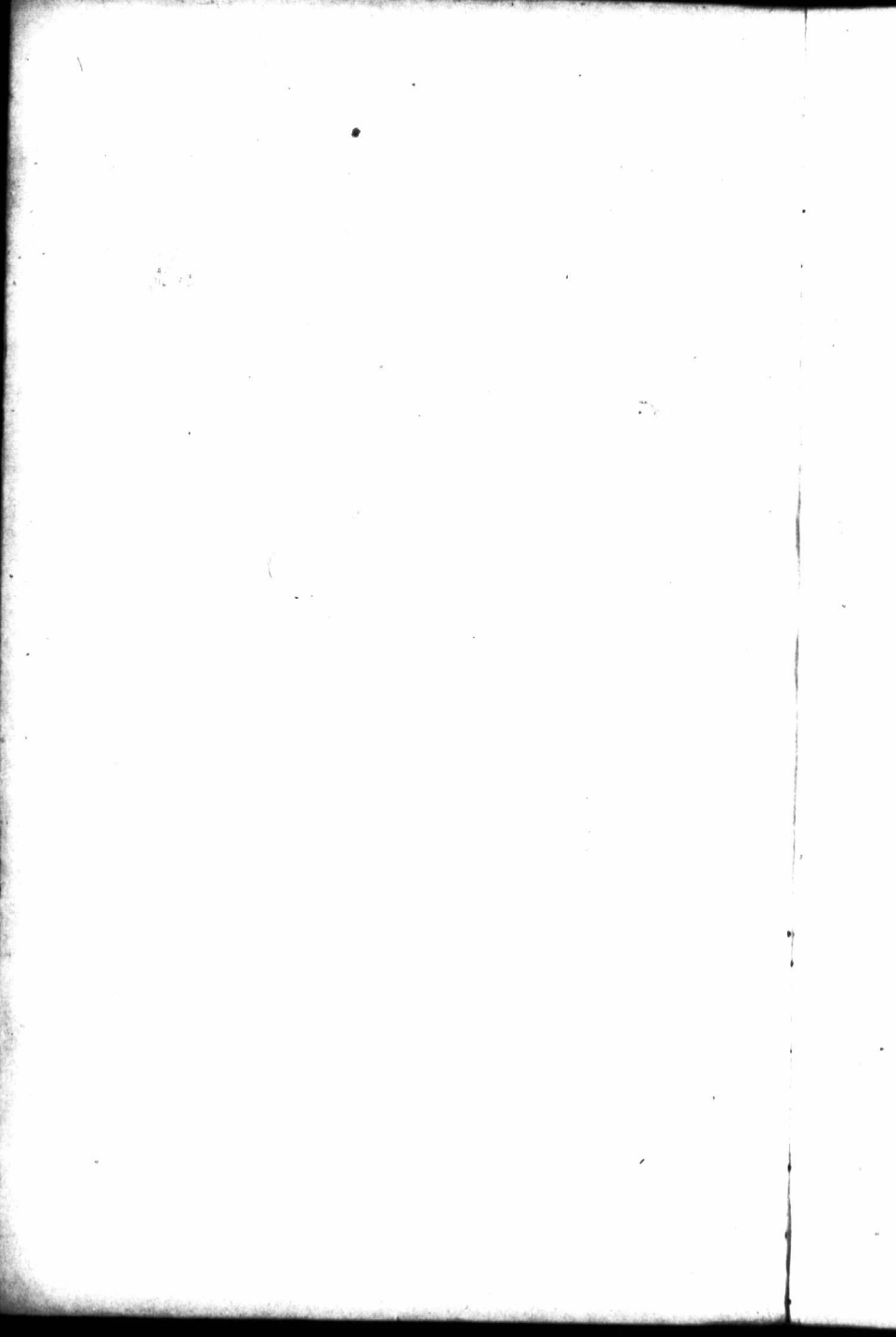


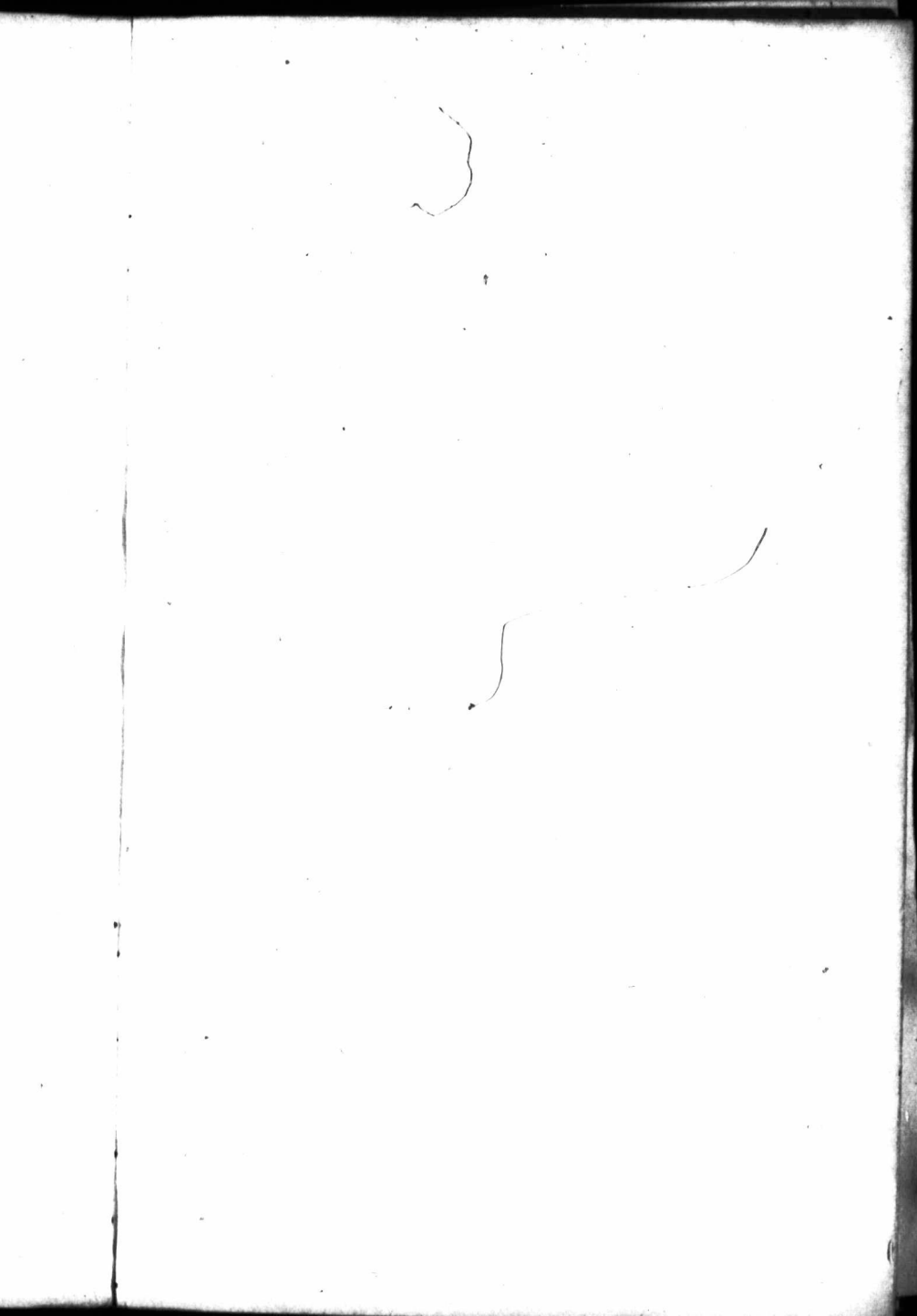

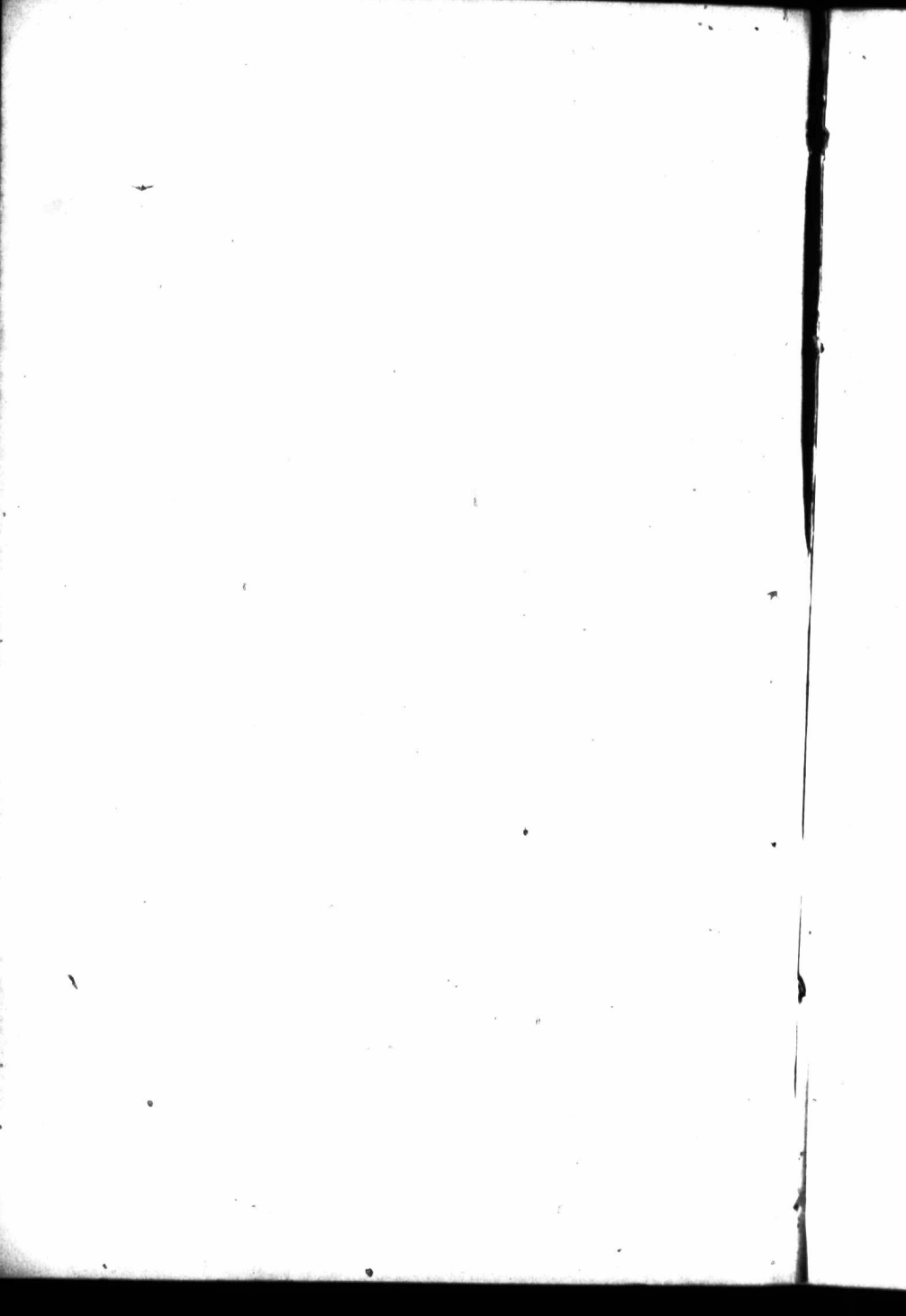

P R E F A C E .

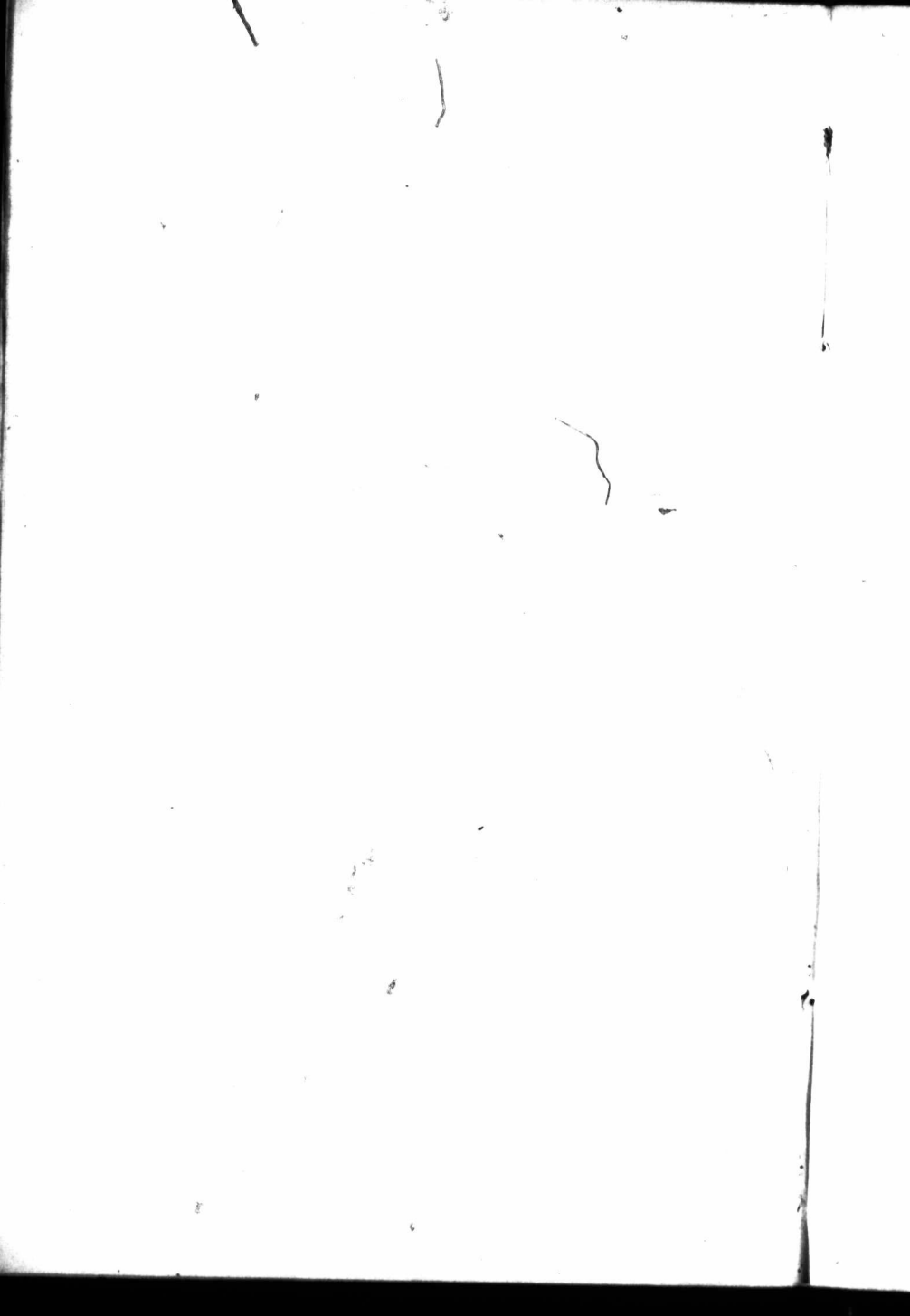

PROVINCE OF CANADA.

That portion of the Continent of America which is now called Canada, was discovered seven years after the discovery of America, by John & Sebastian Cabot. It subsequently came into the possession of the French, who governed the country by Commanders, Governors, and Presidents, till the year 1759. In that year, under Mr. Pitt's administration, the French territories in America were attacked, and the attempt to conquer Canada was at last successful. It was in this struggle that General Wolfe lost his life, and gained to the British the American Gibraltar—Quebec—which has ever since remained in their possession. On the 8th of September, 1760, the capitulation which transferred Canada from the Gulf of St. Lawrence to the unknown West was signed—the treaty of Paris, by which Canada was formally ceded to the British Crown, was signed on the 10th of Feb., 1763. From the overthrow of the French dominion in Canada to the division of the Province into Upper and Lower sections, the colonist experienced many vicissitudes—many petty quarrels arose between the old French colonists and the new settlers of British origin. In 1774 a new order of things was instituted by the British Government, having for its object the tranquilization of the French and the encouragement of British emigration. In the same year an act was passed by which the limits of the Province were greatly extended, and made to include a large portion of what is now the United States, as far as the Mississippi. All this was lost during the revolutionary war between Britain and her thirteen colonies. During this struggle Canada refused to co-operate with the insurgents. Consequent upon this refusal the revolutionists determined upon a double invasion of Canada, by way of Lake Champlain and the Kennebec river. In 1776 the Province was evacuated, and no further attempt was conceived against Canada. The war between Britain and her colonies was brought to a close in Feb. 20th, 1783, at which time the treaty of Versailles was signed, recognizing the Independence of that nation. From that time Canada began to prosper, retarded only by the difference of British and French habits, customs, and notions of government, which at last became so serious as to lead to the passing of the "Constitutional act of 1791;" by which act the Province of Quebec was divided into Upper and Lower Canada.

Canada now found herself in possession of the fourth form of government within the short space of thirty-two years. From 1760 to 1763 she was ruled by martial law; from 1773 to 1764 a tyrannical military government prevailed; from 1774 to 1791 a civil government of the most despotic cast was established; and in 1792 a new constitution was introduced, establishing freedom of election and responsibility to the people.

On the 17th of December, 1792, the first Upper Canadian Parliament was convened at Niagara. By an act of this Parliament, (1792) the names of the four Upper Canada Districts were changed into Eastern, Midland, Home, and

Western. An act was also passed for the building of a Gaol and Court House in each of these Districts. The County of Kent, as will be seen in another part of this work, was in the Western District. During the administration of Col. John Graves Simcoe, the first Governor of Upper Canada, an act was passed dividing the Province into nineteen Counties, viz.: Addington, Dundas, Durham, Essex, Frontenac, Glengary, Grenville, Hastings, Kent, Leeds, Lennox, Lincoln, Norfolk, Northumberland, Ontario, Prince Edward, Stormount, Suffolk, and York. Simcoe gave the Thames its name.

The first Upper Canadian Newspaper was established about the year, 1793. From 1792 till the breaking out of the war of 1812, the following Governors, Lieutenant Governors, and Presidents, administered the affairs of the Province.

The second session of the Upper Canadian Parliament was held by the Hon. P. Russell, at York, at that time inhabited by only twelve families. During the administration of Lieut. Governor F. Gore, a bill was passed determining the boundaries of the different Townships, and, also, an act to establish public schools in every district of the Province, (1807.) Four years after this the first census of Upper Canada was taken, when the population amounted to 77,000. In the war of 1812, Major General Brock was killed, and Gen. Roger Sheaffe succeeded to the civil and military command. Canada was evacuated by the Americans on the 5th of November, 1814, and the treaty of Ghent was signed on the 24th of December following; thus, after two years fighting, the war between England and the United States, in which both Upper and Lower Canada gave effectual proofs of their loyalty to their other country, came to an end, without any advantage being gained by either of the contending parties. From 1814 to 1829, the country was agitated by disputes between the Family Compact and the Reformers; it was at this time (1825) that the office of the "Colonial Advocate," owned by W. L. McKenzie, was destroyed by a mob, to whom his conduct had become distasteful. The struggle between the Tories and Reformers at last resulted in the unfortunate rebellion of 1837. On the 23rd of July, 1840, the Union Bill, passed by both Houses the January previous, received the sanction of the Queen, and came into operation on the 10th of February, 1841. The history of Canada, from the re-union of the Provinces to the present time, is marked by many improvements and events that are fresh in the memory of all—and need not be here repeated. The following tribute to Canada, by a Canadian M. P. P., who wrote in 1824, is worthy of perusal.

"We have only to cast our eyes transiently over the map of North America to be immediately assured of the singularly advantageous situation of the settled parts of Upper Canada. Seated like a gem in the bosom of a country that is

neither scorched by the sultry summer of the South, nor blasted by the tardy, bitter, biting winters of the North; surrounded by the most magnificent lakes, and possessing the most extensive internal navigation in the known world, it would be difficult, perhaps impossible, to find in any other region of the globe, a tract of country of the same magnitude with so many natural advantages, as that part of Upper Canada which lies between the Lakes, Ontario, Erie and Huron, and the Ottawas or Grand River, nine-tenths of the whole extent which are calculated for almost every description of agricultural labor, with such a prospect of success as, perhaps, no other part of this continent could realize. A part of this tract of country, commencing in the neighborhood of Kingston, and running westward nearly five hundred miles, to the Sandwich frontier, by a depth northward of from forty to one hundred miles, is alone capable of supplying all Europe with grain of every description; besides being rich in cattle.

Much has been said at a distance, against the climate of this fine country. Those, however, who have removed to it from Great Britain, are agreeably disappointed in finding it most pleasant. It might be said with no great propriety that the present inhabitants of Canada have but two seasons, summer and winter; for winter has no sooner disappeared, which generally happens by the middle of April, than the whole animal and vegetable creation starts into renewed life with a rapidity and vigor that leaves the season of spring with such doubtful limits as to be scarcely perceptible, or deserving a specific character; again, in the fall of the year, the months of September and October are generally so fine and summer-like, and these being succeeded by what is so aptly termed the Indian summer, in November, (that men) that we should have great difficulty, were it not for an artificial calendar, in saying when it was autumn."

With a view to show the increase in the population of Upper Canada, from the beginning of the present century, we submit the following calculations:—1800, 57,738; 1810, 73,492; 1820, 119,645; 1825, 158,027; 1830, 221,567; 1835, 346,165; 1840, 437,441; 1842, 486,055; 1848, 723,332; 1850, 791,420; 1852, 950,330; 1861, 1,396,091. The estimated population in 1864, assuming the same rate of increase as between 1852 and 1861, would be 1,596,150.

It will thus be seen that the natural advantages possessed by Canada, have a steadily increasing population to develop them. Having an area of 121,260 square miles, with thousands of acres of valuable lands yet unsurveyed on its Northern and Western boundaries with Municipal, Political, and Educational Institutions, second to those of no other country in the world; we may certainly predict a bright future for our country.

With a view to exhibit the progress made by Upper Canada, we give the following statistics: Upper Canada had, in 1851, 99,906 occupiers of land. They numbered, in 1861, 131,983. It produced, in 1851, 12,682,550 bushels of wheat; 11,391,867 of oats; 9,982,186 of potatoes; 3,110,118 of turnips; of flax or hemp, 59,680 lbs.; 3,669,874 lbs. of maple sugar. Its produce of these articles was, in 1861—wheat, 24,260,425 bushels; oats, 21,220,874;

potatoes, 15,325,920; turnips, 18,206,959; flax or hemp, 1,225,934 lbs.; maple sugar, 6,370,605 lbs. The value of the live stock in Upper Canada was, in 1861, as much as \$53,227,486; its agricultural implements, \$11,280,347; its farms, \$295,162,315.

In 1808, the value of the entire trade of Canada was about \$8,400,000. The value reached, in 1852—exports, \$14,055,973; imports, \$20,286,493; total, \$34,342,466. In 1861, its imports amounted to \$36,614,195; exports, \$43,046,823; total, \$79,661,013. The value of the trade with the United States alone was, in the last of these years, \$35,455,815; the imports from that country reaching \$21,069,388, and the imports to it \$14,386,427.

In 1861, the net revenue yielded by the customs was \$2,808,831; in 1861, \$4,411,160. The value of books imported was, in 1850, \$243,580; in 1861, \$5,056,943.

On roads, navigation, and railroads, the Province has expended as much as \$60,000,000, over and above the interest in the latter of parties out of the country. There are in use at this moment between 1,800 and 1,900 miles of railway; besides 3,422 of electric telegraph, belonging to the Montreal Telegraph Company, which had, in 1861, a capital stock of \$400,000 (to whom it had advanced from \$60,000, in 1747,) employed 400 persons (35 in 1847,) and conveyed 300,000 messages; the number conveyed in 1847 having been 33,000.

Our post offices have multiplied from 3, in 1766, to 69, in 1824; 601, in 1850, and 1,698 in 1860. The number of miles of established post roads was, in the first of these years, 170; in the second, 1992; in the third, 7,595; and in the last, 14,202. The miles travelled were, in 1824, 369; in 1766, 616; in 1851, 2,287,000; in 1860, 5,712,000. In 1852, 3,700,000 letters were transmitted; in 1860, 9,000,000. The expenditure of the Post Office was, in the former of these years, \$276,191, and its revenue \$230,629; in the latter, its expenditure was \$534,681, and its revenue \$658,451. One hundred and ten thousand dollars additional is paid per annum, by way of subsidy, to railroads; and four hundred and sixteen thousand to steamships.

The population of United Canada numbered in the year 1800, 240,000. It was in 1825, 581,920; by 1851 it had reached 1,842,265. In 1861, it amounted to 2,506,755. The advance in Upper Canada between 1825 and 1861 has been from 581,027 to 1,396,091—not much less than 800 per cent. in 36 years.

In 1831, the number of cultivated acres in the whole of Canada, Upper and Lower, was 2,884,345. It came up, in 1844, to 4,968,408; and in 1851, to 7,300,837.

COUNTY OF KENT,
PROVINCE OF CANADA.

This County is bounded on the north by Lambton; on the east by Elgin; on the South by Lake Erie, and on the West by Essex and Lake St. Clair. It contains eleven Municipalities, viz.: the Town of Chatham, and the Townships of Camden, Chatham, Dover, East and West, Harwich, Howard, Orford, Raleigh, Romney, Tilbury East, and Zone; the Townships of Dover, East, Chatham, Camden, and Zone border upon the County of Lambton; Orford borders upon Elgin; Orford, Howard, Harwich, Raleigh, and Romney are on Lake Erie; Romney and East Tilbury join Essex to the West, and East Dover borders upon Lake St. Clair. There are no interior Townships.

The County of Kent along with Lambton and Essex, formed what was once called the Western District, which was thus described in 1796 by Surveyor-General Smith: "It is bounded southerly by Lake Erie, easterly by a meridian passing through the extremity of Long Point, and comprehends all the lands north westerly of these boundaries not included within the bounds of the Hudson Bay Company or the territory of the United States." The other Districts were the Home, Midland and Eastern. By the British act 31, Gen. 3, chap. 31, (1791) it was provided that the Governor General of Upper Canada might divide the province into as many Counties or districts as he liked. Col. Jno. Graves Simcoe, (the first Governor of Upper Canada,) in 1792, in accordance with such authority, issued his proclamation dividing Canada into nineteen counties, viz.:—Addington, Dundas, Durham, Essex, Frontenac, Glengary, Grenville, Hastings, Kent, Leeds, Lennox, Lincoln, Norfolk, Northumberland, Ontario, Prince Edward, Stormont, Suffolk and York. Districts having, in 1849, by Art. 12 V. cap. 78 (which came in force on the first of January 1850) been abolished, and counties erected in their stead, certain counties to remain united till the junior county should attain a population of not less than fifteen thousand souls, in which case it became entitled to a separate establishment

of courts and county institutions. Kent and Lambton were so united, Lambton being the junior county, but from its geographical position it was deemed expedient to make provision for its separation before it attained the population required by law to entitle to sever it the judicial union between it and the county of Kent. Accordingly in the year 1851, an act was passed authorizing such a separation, and establishing separate courts, &c. This part of Canada commenced settling about the year 1784. The date of the settlement of the several Townships that then formed the County of Kent are as follows, viz. : Raleigh, 1792; Dover, Chatham, Camden West, Harwich, Howard, and Orford, 1794.

The principal river in the County is the Thames, or "La Tranche," which enters at the South East corner of the Township of Zone; it then runs along between Zone and Orford, Camden West and Howard, Chatham and Harwich, and enters Lake St. Clair, between Dover on the North, and Raleigh and Tilbury, on the South. It is navigable.

The Thames receives a number of smaller streams in its course, at Chatham it is joined by McGregor's creek. It passes through some of the finest farming lands in the County. The land adjoining it in the County of Kent is mostly level, rich, and noted for its superior growth of wheat. Many of the farms have been settled for over seventy years, and are in the highest state of cultivation. The surface of the County is rolling or gently undulating, and irrigated by numerous creeks and streams, whose fertilizing influence adapt the soil to the cultivation of crops of every description. The County was heavily timbered, but during the long time that has elapsed since its settlement, the most valuable portion of the maple, black walnut, elm, oak, and beech has been cut; exported or manufactured. A description of the soil, streams, &c., will appear over each Township, as also some interesting statistics that exhibit the general progress made by the County.

Below we give the number of acres of land taken up, and under cultivation, with the population, and the value of rateable property in 1846, which, compared with 1861, is sufficient to show that the County of Kent has made such progress as must be at once gratifying to its early settlers and brave pioneers, and encouraging to those who may purpose making it their future home.

As this work is chiefly designed as a record of statistical and general information, we deem it superfluous to enter at any length into a history of Kent, although many interesting events have transpired within its limits. Here, on the 5th of October, 1813, was fought the battle between the British and Indian forces under General Proctor, and the celebrated Indian Chief, Tecumseth, and the American army under General Harrison. Its early settlement, and the efforts made to civilize and christianize the Indians who settled in this section, as early as 1729; also the perseverance and energy of its first settlers, along with the march of improvement, affords ample material to render an historic sketch, both interesting and instructive. An impetus was given to the progress of the County on the completion of the Great Western Railway, which, along with the roads that intersect the County in every direction, opened communication with the County town, and afforded a cheap and expeditious means of transporting the industrial and agricultural productions of the County, and enhanced the value of property to a great extent. At the commencement of the settlement of the County, Lots of 200 acres, situated on the Banks of the Thames, were sold for \$100; in 1804, they sold for \$500. Since that time, the price of property has been rapidly increasing. The development of the rich agricultural resources of the County was the means of starting many now thriving villages, which contains their share of manufacturers, merchants, mechanics, &c. A description of the Town of Chatham and the Villages of the County will be found in other parts of this work.

EDUCATIONAL.

In the very important matter of education, great progress has been effected in the County of Kent, and she has now the advantages of a liberal and permanent provision for the general and thorough education of her rising population, fully enjoying the privileges and benefits conferred by the excellent School Act for Upper Canada (13th and 14th Vic. cap. 48, 1850). The reports of the Local Superintendents of Schools for the County, in general indicate a growing interest in the subject of education, and a steady progress in the different Sections and Townships, that is highly satisfactory. Each Township is divided into School Sections of a suitable extent for one School; and in each of these Sections three Trustees are elected to manage its School affairs. Each School and Municipal Corporation, desirous of establishing Free Public Libraries, is aided by the Educational Department granting 100 per cent. on local appropriations, and supplying books from the Depository in connexion with the Department.

GRAMMAR SCHOOLS.—Each of these Schools (which form the intermediate link between the Common Schools and the Universities) is managed by a Board of Trustees appointed by the County Council. There is one Grammar School in each County Town, which receives at least \$400 per annum from the government, and where the funds will admit of it, others may be established in different parts of the County.

There is a good Grammar School in Chatham, with an average attendance of 71 pupils. Altogether, an excellent and well-organized system of Schools and Churches has been planted amongst the settlers, and such as had been the blessing of their earlier days, and the pride of their fathers. The following is a report of the School Statistics of the County.

COMMON SCHOOLS—I. TABLE A. RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURE OF COMMON SCHOOL MONEYS FOR THE YEAR 1862.

RECEIPTS.

1. The amount appropriated and paid by the Department of Public Instruction from the Legislative Grant, for salaries of teachers was, in the County, \$3089.75; in the town of Chatham, \$518.

2. The amount apportioned and paid for the purchase of maps, apparatus, prizes and libraries, being in proportion and equal to the amount expended from local sources was, for the County, \$85.00; in the town of Chatham, \$40.

3. The law requires that each municipality shall provide a sum by assessment at least equal to the Legislative Grant, but each municipality can provide as large an additional sum as it may think proper for school purposes. The amount provided by municipal assessment was, for the County, \$2999.00; in the town of Chatham, \$2500.00.

4. As the council in the municipality, so the trustees in a school section, have authority to provide money for the support of their school or schools, by assessment, and also by fees on pupils, unless the rate-payers decide in favor of a free school. The amount of assessment levied by trustees in addition to the levy by the municipal councils was \$16,989.00 for the County; for the town of Chatham, \$333.30.

5. Rate-bill fees on pupils are only imposed where the schools are not free. The amount of rate-bills imposed was \$725.19 for the County; for the town of Chatham, \$32.50.

6. The amount received by trustees from the Clergy Reserve Fund and other sources, and appropriated for the County was \$2,156.52; for the town of Chatham, \$1,237.76.

7. The amount available in 1862, from the balances of 1861 was, for the County, \$2,365.32; for the town of Chatham, \$132.70.

8. The total receipts for common school purposes for the year 1861, in the County were \$2,8216.83; in the town of Chatham, \$5,983.26.

EXPENDITURE.

9. The amount paid for the Salaries of Teachers was, in the County, \$20,236.56; town of Chatham, \$3,484.61.

10. The amount expended in the purchase of maps, apparatus, prize-books, and libraries was, for the County, \$480.87; town of Chatham, \$106.00.

11. The amount expended for school-books, stationery, fuel, and other expenses was, for the County, \$1,730.65; town of Chatham, \$245.57.

12. The amount expended for the purchase of school-sites, and the erection of school-houses was, for the county, \$2704.09.

13. The amount paid for the rents and repairs of school-houses was, for the County, \$792.97; town of Chatham, \$208.41.

14. Unexpended balances of the preceding years were, for the County, \$2465.60; town of Chatham, \$1938.47. These balances are rather apparent than real. Arising from the fact that many of the Municipal Councils and Trustees, do not until after the close of the civil year, collect the sums necessary to pay the expenses of such year.

15. The total expenditure in behalf of the common schools, was, in the County, \$25,945 74; Chatham, \$1,044 59.

II. TABLE B. SCHOOL POPULATION—PUPILS ATTENDING COMMON SCHOOLS.

An act still unrepealed, requires the legal returns of school population to include only school children, between the ages of 5 and 16 years; but the law secures to all persons from 5 to 21 years of age, the right of attending the schools, as long as their conduct conforms to its rules and discipline.

1. The school population (including only the children between 5 and 16 years of age) was, in the County of Kent, 7,554; in the town of Chatham, 1,100.

2. The number of pupils attending the schools, from 5 to 16 years of age was, in the County, 5,851; Chatham, 807. The pupils of other ages, attending the schools, was, in the County, 406; Chatham, 23. The whole number of pupils attending school was, in the County, 6,257; Chatham, 830.

3. The number of boys in the schools, was, in the County, 3,326; Chatham, 45. The number of girls in the schools, was, in the County, 3,011; Chatham, 373. The number returned as indigent children, was, in the County, 15; Chatham, 60.

4. The same table shews the periods of attendance of pupils at schools, and the subjects of their studies, from which it is seen, that the average attendance, was, in the County, 2,069; Chatham, 363. The number of children in the County, whose attendance was not reported is 0, and the number in the County, not attending any school whatever was, 1,689. The different branches of instruction taught, are, reading, arithmetic, grammar, general and Canadian geography, history, writing, book-keeping, mensuration, algebra, geometry, natural philosophy, vocal music, linear drawing, needle-work, and other studies.

III. TABLE C. ROMAN CATHOLIC SCHOOLS.

There are five Separate Schools in the County, viz:—One in each of the Townships of Camden and Harwich, two in the Township of Raleigh, and one in the Town of Chatham.

4. The amount received from local sources, was \$89; from fees, \$214 60; [fees chargeable per term of three months per pupil, \$2; from balances and other sources, \$262 88.
5. Total receipts for all Grammar School purposes, for 1862, \$1336 48.

EXPENDITURES.

6. For Masters' salary, \$782 60; for maps, apparatus and prize-books, \$30 50; for buildings, rent and repairs, \$18; for contingencies and books, &c., \$185 45. Total expenditure during the year, \$1,016 80; balance not collected and paid at the end of the year, \$319 68.
7. PUPILS.—Number of pupils attending the school, 71; number from the town of Chatham, 25; within the County, 43; other Counties, 3.

V. TABLE E. NUMBER OF PUPILS IN THE VARIOUS BRANCHES OF INSTRUCTION.

It appears that there were 70 pupils in the different branches of English; in Latin, 34; in Greek, 8; in French, 24; in mathematics, 49; in history, 62; in geography, 52; in physical science, 20.

The various text books used and read in the school are Lennie's English Grammar, Edinburgh Academy Latin Grammar, with other Latin text books; Arnold's and Anthon's Greek Grammars, and Xenophon Reading Book, French Grammar and Reading book; in arithmetic, Irish national and Sangster's national, with Algebra; Euclid, geography and history, text and reading books.

PUBLIC LIBRARIES IN THE COUNTY OF KENT, 1861.

TOWNSHIP OF ROMNEY.

This Township is bounded on the North by East Tilbury; on the South-East by Lake Erie; and on the West by Mersea. It is a small Township of triangular shape, with its base towards Lake Erie. The soil is a clayey loam—gravelly upon the ridges. It is well watered by the Yellow Creek; in the Western part there are other streams that water the Township in all directions. The timber consists of maple, oak, beech, hickory, elm, black walnut, and a small portion of cedar on the border of the Lake. In 1845 it contained only 257 inhabitants, and there were only 975 acres under cultivation.

TOWNSHIP OF HOWARD.

This Township is bounded on the North by the river Thames; on the South West by the Township of Harwich; on the North-East by the Township of Orford; and on the South by Lake Erie. It is well watered—the principal streams are McGregor's Creek, and Big Creek. The soil of the Township is mostly a fine, light loam, intersected with gravel. Considerable quantities of tobacco were raised in the Township at one time—the number of pounds in 1850, was 24,490. Howard is very well settled, and contains many well cultivated farms. Its population in 1850, was 2,465, and the number of acres occupied—12,569. Below will be seen the return of agricultural produce, &c., of the Township, in 1861.

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TOWNSHIP OF TILBURY.

This Township is bounded on the North East by the Township of Raleigh; on the North by the river Thames; on the West by Tilbury, (West); and on the South by Romney. The South-East corner of the Township borders upon Lake Erie. It is well watered by Smith's Creek, running in a North-Easterly direction, emptying into the Thames near the first concession and sixth lot. Wilson's Creek, running in a Northerly direction, emptying into the Thames, near its mouth; and McDougall's Creek in the same direction. The soil of the Township is a clayey loam, and well adapted to the raising of fall wheat and Indian corn; the pasturage is excellent. Timber—oak, elm, hickory, ash, and white wood. Population of the Township, in 1844, 540. There is an Agricultural Society in the Township—organized in 1846—meets in the Town Hall.

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TOWNSHIP OF ORFORD.

This Township is bounded on the North East by the Township of Alborough, on the North West by the river Thames, on the South West by Howard, and on the South East by Lake Erie. The soil of the Township is of excellent quality, and well timbered with maple, oak, beech, elm, &c. Considerable quantities of staves and square timber are annually manufactured in Orford. Tobacco was formerly grown in the Township, but its cultivation has been discontinued to some extent, owing to the uncertainty of the crop and the diminution of import duty; which afforded greater facilities for American dealers to send the article into this country. The population of Orford in 1850 was 2,465. The progress made by the Township will be seen by the following extracts from the census report of 1861.

TOWNSHIP OF RALEIGH.

This Township is bounded on the North by the river Thames; on the West by Tilbury, East; on the South by Lake Erie; and on the North-east by the Township of Harwich. It is well watered by the river Thames and its branches, and heavily timbered with oak, white ash, walnut, beech, maple, elm, white wood, and black ash. The soil is very fertile, and consists of a reddish loam—in some places intermixed with gravel. The portions of the township lying along the river Thames and the Talbot Road have been long settled, and now contain well cultivated farms. The land immediately adjoining the river is low, and well suited for grazing. In 1850 the population of the township was 1884; in 1852 it was 2460. Number of acres under cultivation, in 1846, was 5569. The following is an abstract from the census of the township in 1861:

A post village of nine hundred inhabitants, in the Gore of Chatham, situated nine miles from the River St. Clair, at the forks of the River Sydenham—which is navigable to this point for the largest vessels. It is distant from Chatham seventeen miles; from Baby's Point nine miles. The post-office was established in 1835. Hugh McCollum was the first postmaster. The road from Chatham to Sarnia passes through the village. Considerable quantities of timber, staves, lumber, cordwood and grain are exported annually from the port of Wallaceburgh. The total value of exports from this port—from the opening of navigation to the 17th Sept., 1850, was \$26,014—principally staves, square timber, and saw logs—in 1863, it was \$132,838, which is evidence that the village and the country around are rapidly progressing. In 1846, it contained only one store, a tavern, and blacksmith shop, and sixty inhabitants. There are now five general stores, three groceries, two saw-mills, one grist-mill, two saddle and harness shops, one tannery, three shoe shops, four blacksmith shops, two cabinet shops, three churches, two temperance organizations, and Orange Lodge. Mails daily—from Newburg, and tri-weekly, from Sarnia. Daniel Johnson, Postmaster.

MORPETH,

A flourishing village, pleasantly situated in the midst of a beautiful undulating country, on the Talbot Road, in the Township of Howard, and distant from Chatham, twenty-two miles; from Port Stanley, forty-four; from London sixty; from Ridgetown, four; from Thamesville station, 14; and one and a half miles from Lake Erie. The village was laid out by William Sheldon, Esq., and the post-office was established in 1830—Captain Wheatly, first postmaster. The four lots upon which the village is situated, were located in the years 1817 and 1818. The first store or shop was erected in 1830, and was kept by Garrett and Henry Lee. A tannery and shoe shop were opened in the same year, by Robert Wood, and a blacksmith shop, by Joseph Eberle; and in 1833, the first frame building was erected by Edward Lee—it now forms part of the Morpeth Exchange Hotel. In 1841, William Sheldon settled in the place, and built a hotel, and laid out the eastern part of the village. In 1846, Morpeth contained three stores, two hotels, two blacksmith shops, one distillery, one cabinet shop, and one tailor shop. In 1852, it contained a population of 331. In 1855, two surveys were made by Robert Wood and Jas. Coll; and in 1859, the population increased to 500. The village now contains four general stores, three groceries, one saddle and harness shop, five shoe shops, two tailor shops, three hotels, one carriage factory, two cabinet shops, one cooperage, one bakery, three blacksmith shops, two butcher shops, one carding and fulling mill and foundry, a Town Hall, Masonic and Orange lodges, two churches, four physicians, and a good school. There are two mills, within a mile and a half of the village, viz: Campbell's grist-mill, situated on Big Creek, and Simon's grist and saw-mill, (steam and water power). The Second Division Court is held here, and at Ridgetown, alternately—John Duck, clerk of the court. A storehouse and pier is in the course of erection, by William Wilson, at Port Hill's Landing, a mile and a half from the village. Mails daily, at 12.30, from the west, and at 1 p. m., to the east. Despatched at 1 p. m., to the east, and at 2 p. m., to the west—Andrew Heywood, Postmaster. Population, 600.

THAMESVILLE,

A post village and Station on the Great Western Railway, at a point where it intersects the London, Chatham, Morpeth, and Florence roads, and situated in the middle of a rich agricultural district, on the 15th lot, concession B. of the Township of Camden. It is distant from Chatham, fifteen miles; from London, fifty miles; from Windsor, sixty miles; and from Hamilton, one hundred and twenty-four miles. The first Postmaster was Nathan Cornwall, Esq. In 1846, the village contained fifty inhabitant; a grist and saw-mill, and a tavern. A survey of Thamesville was made in 1856, by David Sherman, Esq. It now contains one steam saw-mill; one steam flour and grist-mill; one tannery; one harness shop; two cabinet factories; one stove and tin shop; four general stores; two groceries; one drug store; three shoe shops; two tailor shops; three wagon and carriage shops; three blacksmith shops; two physicians, and one lawyer. A new school-house has been completed this year, at a cost of seven hundred dollars. There are two churches, viz: the Roman Catholic and Episcopal Methodist. The Presbyterians, Wesleyan Methodists, Episcopalians, and Congregationalists, meet for worship in the Episcopal Methodist Church. There are sure indications of the existence of petroleum, salt, and iron ore in the village. Mr. Sherman's Mills and near the Station are the grounds where the minerals named, most likely exist. Mr. S. has liberally offered sufficient land, free, to any person who may be desirous of testing and prosecuting the enterprise. The Sixth Division Court is held here, of which Capt. John Taylor, of Bothwell, is Clerk. Mails daily, from the west, at 1.38 p. m.; from the east, at 6.15 p. m. From Ostrander, Ridgetown, and Morpeth, at 12 a. m. J. C. Collier, Postmaster. Population, 500.

the Post Office block, Rankin House, and largest mercantile houses are located, on King street, which runs parallel with the river; across which, there are two substantial bridges, one on fifth street, and the other on third street. The former built by Government, and the latter by a Joint Stock Company, at a cost of upwards of five thousand dollars.

The steamboat "Heather Bell" plies regularly between Chatham and Detroit during the summer, arriving at Chatham every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at 7 a.m., and leaving at 6 p.m.—fare, both ways, \$1, U.S. John Stewart, owner, and C. Ralph, master. There are also stages running to different parts in the County. The roads leading into Chatham are kept in a good state of repair, and afford excellent facilities for the farmer to bring his grain to market at any season—besides which, it is connected by rail and water, with the western, and by rail alone with the eastern market, which has given an impetus to business, and manufacture of every description. Large quantities of staves and square timber, besides wheat and other grain, are annually exported. In 1846, it had a population of 1,500, from which it increased to 4,466, in 1861, and at present contains not fewer than 5,000. The following is a statement of the number of steamers and sailing vessels that called at and cleared the Port of Chatham; also, the value of exports and imports for the year 1862: Number of British steamers, 100; sailing vessels, 114; number of American steamers, 155; sailing vessels, 100. The total value of staves exported was, \$345,96; cordwood, \$12,773; horses, \$60,908; butter, \$8,056; furs, \$13,492; wool, \$35,844; barley and rye, \$33,246; beans, \$30,218; oats, \$16,262; wheat, \$119,354. Total, \$300,640. In the above statement large quantities of the wheat and timber shipped to Quebec are not reckoned. The total value of imports was, \$89,419. The amount of duties was, \$7,055.

There are two Newspapers published here, the "Chatham Planet," and "Western Reformer." The former is one of the oldest Newspapers published in the Western District, and is now in its fourteenth volume. It is published tri-weekly and weekly, by Rufus Stevenson, editor and proprietor. The latter is in its third volume, and is also published tri-weekly and weekly, by Cameron Bro. R. G. Cameron, editor.

The educational advantages possessed by Chatham are ample. There is a good Grammar School, with an average attendance of forty pupils; the Central School, Ursuline Academy, Separate Schools, for the colored children, and Private Schools, located in different parts of the town, giving all an opportunity of acquiring a liberal education. Information regarding the Schools will be found in another part.

Manufactures of various kinds, and general commerce—particularly the buying and selling and forwarding of lumber and wheat, in which there is an immense capital employed, which has been a source of great prosperity to Chatham and the County. The logs are floated down the Thames and

CHATHAM.

The County Town and Judicial seat of the County of Kent; is pleasantly and advantageously situated in the midst of a fine agricultural country, on the line of the Great Western Railway, of which it is one of the principal Stations, and on the river Thames (which is navigable for vessels of the largest class,) at a point where it is joined by McGregor's creek, from the South-east. The Town is partly in the Townships of H. rwick, Raleigh, Chatham, and Dover East. It was originally laid out by Governor Simcoe, who reserved six hundred acres for a Town plot; in view of the natural advantages of the situation and the prospect of it becoming a Town of some importance. It is distant from Windsor, forty-six miles; from London, sixty-four miles; from Toronto, one hundred and seventy-six miles. The original survey consisted of that part of the Town lying between the river Thames and McGregor's creek, and a portion on the South side of the Thames. Chatham North, or the part that lies North of the Thames, was laid out by the late James Woods, Esq., of Sandwich, County of Essex, and R. S. Woods, Esq., of Chatham. In 1855, lot twenty-four, in the Township of Dover East, lots one and two, second con. of the Township of Chatham; also, lot twenty-three, first con., and lot twenty-four, in the second concession of the Township of Raleigh, were added to the area of the Town. Lots twenty-three and twenty-four in Raleigh are the property of Arthur John Robertson, Esq, of Inches. Chatham was a Garrison during the Rebellion of 1837, and contains barracks, which, however, are not at present occupied by troops; they are under the charge of Sergeant-Major Richard Charles Browne, Drill Instructor of the Chatham Volunteer Infantry Companies, who meet weekly there for drill. Chatham contains a number of elegant private residences, with tastefully and richly ornamented grounds, evincing wealth and refined taste among its professional men, merchants, and wealthy mechanics, whose success in business is a sure indication of the superior position of Chatham as a Town, and the richness and fertility of the adjoining agricultural country; which is unsurpassed in Canada for the excellent quality of the soil, and the improved tillage that is bestowed upon it, which exhibits itself in the abundant crops of every description that are annually produced in the vicinity. The public buildings, among which are the different churches, located in various parts of the Town, and described in another part of this work,—the market building, erected in 1856, at a cost of \$6,000, and the county buildings, erected at a cost of about \$36,000—all present a fine appearance, and do credit to a place of its size. The principal portion of the Town is on the South side of the river. The finest blocks, the principal of which is Ebert's, which is four stories high, and cost eight thousand dollars,

SENIOR COUNTY GRAMMAR SCHOOL.—Pleasantly situated in the North-east corner of the town, in the vicinity of the county buildings. It is a large and commodious brick structure, with a dwelling-house and garden attached. It was erected in the year 1863, at a cost of \$5,800. The school is open to both males and females. The average attendance is about forty—males and females being in about equal numbers. The standard of admission

McGregor's Creek to the different mills, where they are manufactured and shipped to the United States and England. The general business comprises numerous stores, wholesale and retail, and workshops of the various branches of mechanical industry. Especial mention may be made of the "Chatham Machine Works," situated on William street, owned and carried on by Hyslop & Ronalds, where reaping and mowing machines of excellent quality, and the latest improvements, which have obtained prizes, both at Local and Provincial Exhibitions, are sold readily, not only in the county, but in different parts of the province. Also steam engines, and all kinds of machinery are manufactured. They employ about forty hands. The "Kent Foundry," situated on the corner of Fourth and Welling streets, of which John Davis is proprietor, (who has also a store and tin shop, on King street, in the Phoenix Block.) He manufactures mill-gearing and castings of every description, and Patent Hydraulic Bellows, for blacksmiths and forgers, which is constructed in the form of a cylinder, and has been tested, and invariably given the best satisfaction wherever used. There is also an old established carriage factory, situated on King street, owned by Sheriff & Co. This firm do a large business, and manufacture superior articles. There are several cabinet-factories, the principal of which is R. Smith & Co's., they manufacture melodeons and cabinet-organs, considered equal in finish and tone, to imported instruments. Also, Albert Jahake, who employs a number of hands, and turns out annually a large quantity of furniture of every description. There are two sash and blind factories, carried on respectively by Messrs. S. Hadley and A. N. Hoag, on Thames street, opposite the North American Hotel. There is an extensive tannery, owned by John Smith, (who has also a saddle and harness shop, on King street). There are also two more saddle and harness shops, carried on by Samuel Cowan, and H. Hooper. There are two brewers, and two distilleries, all doing a large business. Besides the foregoing, there are manufactures established in various parts of the town where the different branches of industry are successfully prosecuted.

The Chatham Salt or Oil Association has, for some time, been sinking a well, near McGregor's creek, at the West end of King street, and after getting down 422 feet, oil was struck, but the yield was not in sufficient quantities to pay. The well is, at the time we write, 700 feet deep, and there is a flow of salt and sulphur. The work of boring is still going on, under the superintendence of Mr. Mason, the Contractor. The leading members of the Company are Messrs. Archibald McKellar, William Douglas, Joseph Northwood, John E. Brook, and David Walker.

The geographical position of Chatham; the advantages it possesses for commerce, having the river Thames and Great Western Railway, affording facilities for importing and exporting fully equal to any town in the province; the boundless wealth of the surrounding country; the indications of mineral wealth lately tested along with the enterprise of the inhabitants all go to point out a prosperous future.

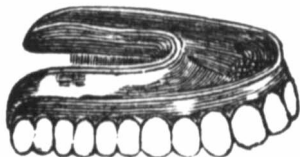

COUNTY AND GENERAL INFORMATION.

JUDICIARY OF THE COUNTY OF KENT.

COUNTY COURT.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant, or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties, or signature of the defendant to £100; and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These Courts also possess equity powers, to the amount of £50, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. Officers of Court. Judge, Wm. Benjamin Wells, Clerk, Thos. A. Ireland.

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—For the trial of issues of fact, and the assessment of damages, on the second Tuesday in March, June, September and December, in each year. W. B. Wells, Chairman.

SURROGATE COURT.—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada, and all matters arising out of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts. George Williams, Registrar.

LAW CLERKS.—The Courts of the western Circuits are held in St. Thomas, Sandwich, Sarnia, Chatham, London and Goderich. Clerk of Assizes, Deputy Clerk of the Crown, ex-officio.

DIVISION COURTS.—For the summary disposal of cases by the Judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract amounting to £25; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to £10; but actions for gambling debts, liquors drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, etc., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction, or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P., for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of Quarter Sessions. William B. Wells, Judge.

### LETTER RATES.

Letters posted in Canada addressed to any place within the Province pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per ½ oz., but if posted unpaid such letters are charged 7 cents per half ounce.

On letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island, the rate is five cents per half ounce, with optional prepayment. The rate on letters to the United Kingdom is, by Canadian Packet,

Not exceeding ¼ ounce, . . . . . 12½ cts.  
 Exceeding " and not exceeding 1 oz. . . . . 25 cts.  
 Exceeding " 1 oz. and not " 2 oz. . . . . 50 cts.  
 and so on, increasing two rates of postage for each additional ounce.

And by Cunard Packet 17 cents per half oz. Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d. sterling on delivery.

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions beyond sea, and foreign countries, via England, must be prepaid.

The rate on letters for the U. States, (except California & Oregon,) 10c. ½ oz. " for California and Oregon . . . . . 15c. ½ oz. " for Cuba . . . . . 20c. ½ oz.

The postage rate to British Columbia is, Letters, . . . . . 25 cents per ½ oz. Newspapers, . . . . . 2 cents each.

### MAILS FOR CANADA FROM ENGLAND.

Two Ocean Steamers carrying mails for Canada leave Liverpool each week, viz:—a Canadian packet on every Thursday, via Derry on Friday, sailing to Quebec in summer, and Portland in winter, by which the postage rate is 6d. sterling per ½ oz.; and a Cunard packet every Saturday, via Cork on Sunday, bringing mails for Canada, alternately to Boston and N.

York, by which the postage rate to Canada is 81. sig. per oz.

The British post office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction—"By Canadian Packet," or "By British Packet"—and in that case they are kept over for the packet designated. "By Canadian Mail" is not a distinctive subscription, for any mail for Canada is a "Canadian Mail," by whatever packet forwarded.

#### REGISTRATION OF LETTERS.

Persons posting letters containing value should be careful to require them to be registered, and to obtain from the postmaster a certificate of receipt for registration.

The charge for registration, in addition to the postage, is as follows, viz:

On letters to any other place in Canada, or British North America, ..... 2 cts.  
On letters for the United States, ..... 5 cts.  
On letters for the United Kingdom, ..... 12½ cts.  
On letters for British Colonies or Possessions, sent via England, ..... 25 cts.  
On letters for France and other Foreign Countries, via England, an amount equal to the postage rate.

Both the postage charge and registration fee must in all cases be prepaid.

Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the misappropriation or loss of a letter; but a registered letter can be traced when an unregistered letter cannot, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proved. A registered letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the receiver, or other error, may affect an unregistered letter.

#### MISCELLANEOUS CHARGES.

The charge on parcels by the parcel post, which is limited to parcels within the Province, is 25 cents per pound (with 3 cents additional if registered.)

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on printed circulars, [printed circulars, if sent in envelopes, whether sealed or unsealed, are liable to letter postage.] prices current, hand bills, and other printed matter of a like character, and on books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian post-office addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the U.S. States.

The postage upon printed circulars and prices current addressed to the United Kingdom is two cents each, which must be prepaid by post stamps, or they will be sent to the dead letter office to be returned to the senders.

The charge on goods, &c., by book post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding 4 ounces in weight, 12½ cents on ½ lb. packets, and 12½ cents additional for every additional ¼ pound. These charges must be prepaid. Photographs, provided they are not upon glass or in cases containing glass, may be forwarded to England at the book rate of postage.

And so on, increasing 17 cents for each additional half ounce.

The Book Post regulations between Canada and England apply to matter between Canada and France.

#### NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, if paid quarterly in advance by either the publisher at the post-office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the delivering post-office.

For a paper pub'd 6 times a week, 40c. per qr.  
" " 3 " " " 20c. "  
" " 2 " " " 14c. "  
" " 1 " " " 6½c. "

When the above rates are paid in advance by either publisher or subscriber, such papers are charged 1 cent each on delivery.

#### TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS.

Transient Newspapers—that is to say, Canadian newspapers posted there from the office of publication, and American and British papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid 1 cent each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded—except only British Newspapers distributed to regular subscribers, by Canadian bookellers or news agents—such papers pass free as they would do if received in the Canadian packet mails.

#### NEWSPAPERS BY MAIL FROM ENGLAND OR UNITED STATES.

Newspapers received from England by the Canadian packet mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard packet mails are charged 2 cents each on delivery. [This is the American transit charge.]

United States newspapers, brought by mail into Canada, are charged 1 cent each on delivery.

#### PERIODICAL PUBLICATIONS.

The rate on periodical publications is, if not exceeding 3 oz. in weight, 1 cent; over 3 oz. 4 cents.

If prepaid by postage stamps from the office of publication, periodicals published in Canada weighing over 3 oz., may pass for 2 cents each.

Periodicals, printed in this Province, other than newspapers, when specially devoted to the education of youth [both religious and general.] to agriculture, to temperance, or to any branch of science, and addressed directly from the office of publication, to be transmitted to any post-office in this Province, are exempt from charge. Transient Periodicals—including Canadian periodicals not prepaid the commuted rate from the office of publication—nor exempted by the preceding clause, and all other Periodical publications posted in this Province, must be prepaid by Stamp the full rate, at the time of posting.

Periodicals received in mails from the United States are charged with the rates named in the first clause of this section.

#### MONEY ORDERS.

Money orders payable in the Province may be obtained at any Money order office in the annexed list, at the following rates of commission:

On orders up to \$10 ..... 5 cts.  
Over \$10 and up to " 20 ..... 10 cts.  
Over " 20 and up to " 40 ..... 20 cts.  
Over " 40 and up to " 60 ..... 30 cts.  
Over " 60 and up to " 80 ..... 40 cts.  
Over " 80 and up to " 100 ..... 50 cts.

You may be satisfied James Rice will not be undersold.

N. B. — No half cts. to be introduced in the orders. No single order can be issued for more than \$100. Money Orders, payable at any Money Order Office in Great Britain and Ireland, can be obtained at any Canadian Money Order Office. The orders are drawn in Sterling, the commission chargeable being — for \$2 and under, 25 c.; over £2 and up to £5 50c.; over £5 and up to £7 75c.; over £7 and up to £10, 81. No order can be drawn for more than £10, but any number of orders of £10 each may be procured.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Postage Stamps are provided for sale of the respective values of 1 cent for Newspapers; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial Letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12½ cents for Canadian packet; and 17 cents for Cunard packet.

Letter Envelopes are provided, impressed with medallion stamps, and equivalent to the prepayment of postage to the amount of 6 cents and 10 cents respectively.

The 5 cent envelopes will be sold to the public at the rate of \$5.00 per hundred, or 65 cent per dozen. The price of a single envelope is 6 cts.

The 10 cent envelopes will be sold at the rate of \$10.50 per hundred, or \$1.26 per dozen. Single envelopes eleven cents.

PENAL CLAUSES.

The Act contains the following penal clause:

To inclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel Post, shall be a misdemeanor.

To inclose a letter or any writing, or to make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to inclose any other thing in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers, (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspaper sent by them to their subscribers), shall be a misdemeanor.
