-The Japanese budget for the fiscal year 1906-7 was informally submitted to the Lower House of the Diet last week. The extraordinary expenditure for the withdrawal of the troops from Manchuria and or other military arrangements exceeds 450,000, yen (\$225,000,-

-Two offers for grain delivery from Fort William and Port Arthur to Georgian Bay were received by the St. Lawrence and Chicago Navigation Co. The offers were each 21/4 cents for movement immediately on the opening of navigation, but were not accepted three cents per bushel being asked. The offers are coming in unusually early, and would seem to presage a heavy grain movement early in the spring.

-- "The production of beet sugar in Ontario this year from the two factories will keep in the Province nearly one million dollars, which otherwise would have gone out for foreign sugar," said the president of the Wallaceburg Sugar Company recently. The factory, which has completed its season's run, made 12,-250,000 pounds of sugar, to produce which required 53,000 tons of beets. The production of that factory in 1904 was only 7 200,000 pounds.

- —The February dividends in the U.S. will amount to \$36,110,814 of which \$17,508,935 will be paid by railroads.
- —London Clearing House total for week ending Jan. 25, 1906, \$956,314; corresponding week last year \$691,505.
- -Ottawa Clearing House.—Total for week ending Jan. 25, 1906, \$2,265 374.89; corresponding week last year \$2,045,231.75.
- --Half a million acres of land in Alberta are said to have been bought by a London, Eng., syndicate for colonization purposes.
- —A branch of The Metropolitan Bank has been opened at Guelph, Ontario, under the management of Mr. A. G. Fletcher
- —It is understood that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company intend to plant large numbers of trees at various points along its prairie lines so as to be able later on to supply its own ties and fence posts.
- —The Williams Co., Ltd., Galt, manufacturers of shoes, closed their factory at Galt. The firm will move their machinery to Brampton and merge with other business controlled there.
- —Fire destroyed last Sunday night F. Grandy's warehouse; Marson's and Mr. Ross' stores; D. C. Drain's hotel, and Mrs. Paden's store at Blairmore, Man. Marson's loss is \$8,000, with \$3,700 insurance; Mr. Ross loses \$7000, insurance \$1,000; D. Drain's loss is \$9,000, with insurance of \$4,000. The entire town had a narrow escape.

- —A new manufacturing concern for making sand lime bricks will likely be started at Brantford, Ont., shortly. The promoters are Americans, but local capital may be invested.
- —The farmers in the vicinity of Hespeter are kept busy unloading car-loads of pulp, which is being shipped from the Ontario sugar factory, Berlin. They report that this pulp is equal to other roots even after the sugar has been extracted.
- —Fifty mining leases in the Rainy River districts, north and south, and ten in Algoma have been cancelled. The greater number of these were defaulted in 1898, one in 1894, two in 1895 and three in 1897. The most recent default is dated April, 1903.
- —Jas. Hildegrant's pool room at Hague, Sask., was burned Monday last, together with Frisen Bros., general store, Hildegrant and Harder's hardware store, and F. Peter's furniture store and bowling. The loss is between \$15,000 and \$20,000, partly insured.
- —Mr. A. H. B. Mackenzie, attached to the Montreal branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce for the past twelve years, will shortly be promoted to an important management. Mr. C. D. Mackintosh will succeed him as assistant manager at Montreal.
- —The Port Arthur Council completed an agreement last week which will undoubtedly have an important bearing on the future of that town, when they signed the necessary papers with Hedges and Burleigh, two Boston capitalists, who will erect large steel tube works at Port Arthur during the present year.




-The National Lumber Exportants' Association closed its sixth annual convention at Washington last Friday. The association placed itself on record as in favor of reciprocity between the United States and foreign nations, and in favor of the gross cut plan of regulation of freight rates in the United States

-A break in the east bank of the Trent Canal about a mile north of Peterboro, last Friday allowed the water in the Canal between two gates about half a mile apart to escape and flood a large portion of the surrounding nestrict. The water swept out of the canal with great force and flowed into a creek which passes near the canal near where the break occurred and empties into the Otonabee River.

-Mr. Arthur E. Bignell, for many years in the service of the Merchants Bank, latterly as assistant inspector, died on the 25th instant at California, whither he went recently for his health. The deceased grentleman was the fourth son of the late Wm. Bignell, N.P., Quebec, brother of Mr. C. A. Bignell of Montreal, and of Mr. H. B. Bignell of Quebec. The remains are being taken to Quebec for interment.

-Evilyn St. George Banwell, the defaulting Crown Bank teller, who was arrested at Kingston, Jamaica, Jan. 11. after a long chase, was brought up before the court there Monday last. The presiding magistrate granted the application for the prisoner's extradition to Canada. Under the law he is granted 15 days' grace, during which the Governor will sign the warrant for his removal.

—The Board of Railway Commissioners has issued an order authorizing the Grand Trunk Railway Company to build a branch line east of Liberty Street, Hamilton, and crossing Aurora Street. The board has approved of the order of the Exchequer Court for a receiver to be appointed for the Bruce Mines and Algoma Railway Company. The application for the appointment of a receiver was made to the Exchequir Court by Mr. Mayer Wile of Buffalo, who is said to be a bondho'der and creditor of the commpany in question.

—By the upsetting of a lighted oil stove in this city on Sunday last three families were rendered homeless. The tenement was occupied by F. Dixon 89 Church street, J. Johnston and E. L. Larriviere. The fire started in Mr. Dixon's flat, which is situated in the middle. The building was a stone and brick structure, each floor containing a flat. The building was owned by Wm. Reid, and was insured in the Royal for \$5000. The loss will amount to about \$3,000.

—Messis, J. S. Irvin Hugh, Fleming and S. V. Fleming, of Ottawa, and J. S. Cape and C. H. Gore, of Winnipeg, have been incorporated as the Loders Lime Company, with a capital of \$100,000 and headquarters at Kananaskis, Alberta.—Incorporation has been granted to J. J. Warren, of Torono; C. R. Hosmer, W. Strachan and G. F. Benson, of

Montreal, and Joseph Ruddy, of Toronto, as the Canada Starch Company, with a capital of \$2,500,000 and headquarters at Cardinal, Ont.

—One of the heaviest seizures of furs on record is report d from Ottawa, being \$14 000 worth of beaver, other and several other kinds of skin. The otter and beaver, consisting of 128 of the former and 129 of the later, were confiscated and forwarded to the Government arthorities at Toronto. Beaver and other are not to be killed in that province or shipped from any point in it till 1910, and a close watch is being kept for impractions of the law. The shipment had been made from near Kenora. Ontano, and was being sent to the Hudson Bay Company in London, England.

—The production of coal in the U.S. for the year 1905, shows that the total output was 367,474 393 tons, as compared with 352 310.427 tons in 1904, an increase of 15 163.966 tons. The probable tonnage capacity of the U.S. at this time is very close to 400.000 000 tons of coal, but, owing to the prolonged car shortage during October and November of last year, the output was materially reduced in practically every State. The four States showing the greatest increase in production during the past year, in the order of their rank, were Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Colorado and Illinois. Many of the older producing States show a slight decrease, due to the interrupt on by the car shortage.

—The annual report for the year 1905 of the U.S. commissioner of patents shows a remarkable increase during the last year. In 1905 there were received 54094 applications for mechanical patents, 781 design patents '56 re-issues of patents, 16,224 applications for registration of trade marks. 1,068 designs and 467 prints. There were 30,270 patents issued, including designs. The total receipts were \$1,806,758. The expenditures \$1,479,633. Nearly all the countries in the world are represented in the list of patents issued, Germany, England, Canada and Austria-Hungary leading. The most important event in the business of the patent office in 1905, according to the report, was the new trade mark law, which reduced the fee for trade marks application from \$25 to \$10.

-Canada's aggregate trade for the six months, ending with December last, shows an increase of \$31516,751 over the returns for the same time in 1904. The aggregate trade was \$273,556,221, compared with \$242019,470. The imports, including dutiable and free goods, were \$133,814 210, a gain of \$10,770,560. The exports were \$140,213 846, an increase of \$21,218,026, compared with the same six months of the previous year. The revenue shows an increase of about one and a half millions. The exports show an increase in all branches of trade. In the fisheries there was an increase of over two millions, in animals and their produce, of about four and a half millions, while there is an increase of about twelve million dollars in agriculture. Manufactures increased by over one million dollars, and the output of the mine and forest wealth remained about the same as in the year previous. For the month of December there was an increas: of about three millions in imports, and over two millions in exports.

BAY OF QUINTE NOTES.

Stoco Lake is one of the few bodies of water in this vicinity likely to yield a crop of ice this season.—Treating iron ore in electric furnaces for the manufacture of steel has

been attempted in the Province recently, and T. M. Gibson, Director of Mines, has been forwarded two samples of the product by J. W. Evans, mining engineer of Deseronto. The steel which is of high quality, was manufactured from titanium ore taken from the Horton and Coe Hill mines, Hastings county, the entire process being completed within fifteen minutes. By this treatment the pig iron stage is eliminated. These ones have not proven commercially valuable thus far, owing to the difficulties experienced in heating them in the ordinary way. The electrical method is also expensive .-Two cars of lumber are being loaded in the Deseronto yards for Haileyboro, Temiskaming district, that region of sawmills, mines and minerals. This is about equal to shipping coals to Newcastle.—Uncollected taxes in Belleville aggregate \$26,360. The first cast at the Descronto Iron Works since the disastrous explosion about a month ago was run off last Thursday. A large gang of mechanics have been busily engaged making the necessary repairs in and around the wrecked engine room, and have just about completed their work .- The first effort of the Napanee Poultry, Pigeon and Pet Stock Association, held in the Napanee Town Hall for three days last week, proved a success in every way, and its officers are to be congratulated.—Mr. John Taylor, Belleville, has sold the old soap works on Robert and Walter Stree's, Napanee, now occupied by the W. A. Rose Co., to Collier Bros., Picton, for about \$2,000. We understand they intend using a portion of the premises for an evaporating plant.



The introduction of new cloths is a feature of the trade. The Mercury wonders whether it is not an inherent vice in the making-up trade to fall into grooves and to stay too long in them. "The clothiers follow their market, and presumably know what is best for it; certainly the gains from this secondary industry are not inferior to those derived from manufacturing cloths. Yet their devotion to cheapness is a characteristic that manufacturers may properly criticize, the typical wholesale clothier being a customer whom it is anything but easy to see or to do business with. Rightly or wrongly, cloth sellers set him down as unreceptive and unappreciative, with eyes for little except cheapness and patterns that follow the accustomed colours and design." The fact remains that the manufacturing clothiers business in the United Kingdom occupies a lower status in American. In Canada and the United States it is possible for men with some heed for their appearance to buy ready-made clothing which will fit with a nicety scarcely known in the old country. In the new world one can buy ready-mades of superior cloths and in a greater diversity of patters than in England. Trere is no need to discuss here, says the Mercury, the relative benefits of tailoring by hand and by machine, or the general utility of treading further on the toes of private tailors. Suffice it to point out that the clothing industry, as known in Great Britain, has not assumed the same developments as elsewhere. The ingrained prejudice of suit-wearers will explain some of this lack, and the policy of clothing factories the rest. It has been assumed, perhaps too reedily, that the field for the sale of factory garments is limited severely to youths and persons of very small income. Those who follow that assumption do so on grounds that have perhaps been we'll testied, and they are not likely to make any immediate change in tactics. Those who are not so convinced of irreducible cheapness being the sole way to fortune, may care to note the omissions of their more conservative rivals. Apart from imperfections of cut and such other technical matters, these omissions are generally held to include an imperviousness to the applications of newcomers with cloths to sell, and an indisposition to lift their trade to a higher plane. The clothing trade have reforts ready to fling at their critics. From small beginnings the clothing business has developed to enormous magniture, and clothiers have given to cloth manufacturers some of the indirect benefits accruing from the invention of the sewing-machine, with its various attachments and improvements, the more modern of which may be ascertained from the Foley and Williams Manufacturing Co. of Chicago. Why the clothiers do not consume better sorts and more sorts of cloth is a problem into which they, as well as manufacturers, may fitly inquire.

It may be news to some English readers that in the large cities of Canada even those who are best able to buy, make every suit serve the purpose of two by the employment of skilled workwomen and men, native and foreign, who reverse suits made from the better class of cloths (which only can bear it) and make them look so well that only the keen eye of the tailor or manufacturer can detect the alteration.

#### CITY REAL ESTATE MOVEMENTS.

The banking house of Henry Clews and Co., New York, in their latest summing up of the situation, refer to real estate speculations as becoming irrational. This, we need hardly point out, is largely due to the pensistent canvassing so rife in all large cities on both sides of the line, and not least in Montreal. The number of persons alert to earn or squeeze a commission out of buyers or sellers is not by any means confined to real estate dealers in Toronto, Montreal and elsewhere, and the seller must be cautious on his side that he is not held liable for commissions to two or more. Loans can be effected, but in many establishments nearly everybody, from the president down to the office-boy, must have a share in the "rake-off," to say nothing of the legal adviser.

In the U.S. last year building permits to the value of \$528,000,000 were taken out in twenty-six cities, compared with \$375,000,000 in the year 1904. In Montreal they nearly reached \$6,000,000. The climax to all periods of prosperity has been marked by such movements now experiencing in real estate from the Atlantic to the Pacific, which naturally follows the exhaustion of other avenues of investment. The activity in speculation is probably greater in New York, and, we may add, Montreal, than elsewhere for the simple reason that these cities are growing with rapidity, and the speculative temper focuses where capital is most abundant and most readily obtained for new enterprises, the deeper in the ground the better. Land values in some places have already risen to what seem extortionate prices, and it may become a serious question as to whether many business enterprises will be able to stand the test of reaction when loaded with the heavy rents, in choice localities, which present high prices of real estate, and the cost of buildings necessarily impose. It should be remembered, also that the westward movement in all cities is more active than ever.

changes which result from the opening up of new lines of local travel, the rapid extension of subways, bridges, tunnels and the vast terminals such as those designed by the great railways, create new business and residential centers, promoting speculative activity in those quarters, but at the same time frequently impairing the value of much property by the diversion of traffic.

The shifting, for instance, of business-both wholesale and retail—from downtown to uptown has caused a sharp depreciation in the districts which have necessarily been at least temporarily deserted by the old class of tenants. The same influences have been at years these may recover a portion of their lost values. but during the interval rental values have decreased and losses have been incurred in some quarters-chiefly eastward—a process which may easily be continued and cause more or less general unsettlement. Further than that, some of the projects now under contemplation seem ill-advised, and investors who go blindly into real estate when land values and building are at the highest are likely to incur the risk of more or less emburrassment when business re-action fairly sets in.

#### THE DOMINION BANK.

The statement of the Dominion Bank for last year when presented to the annual meeting held on 31st ult., was received with great satisfaction. This, however, has been the invariable experience of Dominion Bank shareholders at and ever since its first meeting.

The business has gone on expanding and the bank has been continuously growing in public confidence from the day it opened in a modest way in a small office on King Street, Toronto. Its progress is exhibited in the following comparison between the figures for the year ended April, 1900, and those for December 31-t. 1905. The former date is selected as Mr. Brough, the present general manager, had been recently appointed to that office in succession to Mr. R. D. Gamble:—

This record for 5 years is remarkable. Of course, the period covered by the above table has been a time of development in industrial business and of increase in the national income from abundant crops. To these conditions all our banks owe their advance in the extent of business and the earnings which they have enjoyed. Such favorable conditions have been experienced by many banks, which have made nothing like the advance achieved by the Dominion Bank, this institution having acquired a special hold on the favor and confidence of the trading and the saving classes.

The net profits last year were \$490 495, which equals

16 1-3 per cent. of the capital. Out of this sum there were paid 4 dividends of 2½ per cent each, amounting to \$300,000; \$75,629 was written off bank premises account, leaving \$114,866 to be added to the balance at credit of profit and loss, the amount carried forward being \$249,437.

This seems to indicate either a bonus next year or an increase in the reserve fund, which is already \$500 000 more than the capital.

The deposits are now over 11 times the capital, a condition that makes for large profits.

The immediately available assets stand at \$15.026,-076, an amount that shows great strength and cautious management.

The shareholders cannot but be highly gratified at the increase in their dividends, which have been advanced to 12 per cent. per annum payable quarterly.

The Montreal branch, under Mr. Bogert, is progressing satisfactorily and gradually drawing more and more public support.

#### A STARTLING LIFE INSURANCE DECISION.

The legal intellect of our neighbours has naturally been roused by the remarkable series of disclosures elicited by the recent investigations in the commercial metropolis. Scarcely had those chiefly interested on both sides of the international boundary line begun to hope that the storm was subsiding—and field officers to pluck up courage that they should gradually make up for lost time and for the disheartening labour of the closing months of 1905, when an attack from a new quarter was sprung upon them—one which, if followed up, must be far-reaching in its effects.

A stock and policyholder in the Equitable Life, named Mary M. Young, entered suit on behalf of herself "and all persons similarly situated" against the Society and James H. Hyde, late Vice-President, "impleaded with others," alleging that the directors had negligently and improperly performed their duties. The decision in the case handed down by Judge Kellogs of the Supreme Court upholds the right of the policyholder to sue without the co-operation of the Attorney-General, thus overruling the Society's demurrer. The complaints are extended as follows:

That the defendant, ws vice-president, received annually a salary of \$100,000 without services of value performed therefor or other consideration given: that he has improperly employed the funds of the Society for his own personal use, to pay for extensive travel indulged in for his own pleasure; to pay for his maintenance in Paris and elsewhere; to give expensive dinners to Ambassadors and others; to pay for masquerade balls, and to maintain personal employes, secretaries, stenographers and retainers, all for his own personal benefit solely; that he has made large profits by underwriting bond issues and causing such bonds to be sold to the Society, and by renting the Society's buildings at less than their rental value to other corporations in which he was interested, personally profiting thereby.

That the defendant Schiff has sold bonds and securities to the Society, and caused them to be bought by it at large profits to himself; that the defendant Harriman has done the same, and caused the Society's funds to be invested in corporations in which he was largely interested, to his own personal profit; that the defendant Tarbell has improperly so'd pretended renewal rights in policies to the Society at large personal profit to himself; that the defendant Depew (Chauncey M.) has received annually the sum of \$25,000 from the Society without any services rendered therefor; that the defendants McIntyre and Winthrop have received from the Society—the former \$30,000 and the latter \$10,000—without services rendered or value given.

Judgment was demanded that waste had been committed, that the defendants account therefor, and pay into the treasury the amounts for which they are liable. To this complaint the defendant Hyde demurred, on the grounds that the complaint does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action, that causes of action are improperly united therein, and that the plaintiff had not legal capacity to maintain this suit.

Justice Kellogg says: "Shortly after the rendering of this decision the act, which is now section 56 of the Insurance law, was passed. The purpose of the act was 'to firmly establish and effectuate the decision' in the Uhlman case, Greeff vs. the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, 160 N.Y., 19. It reads as follows: 'No order, judgment or decree providing for an accounting or enjoining, retaining or interfering with the prosecution of the business of any domestic insurance corporation or appointing a temporary or permanent receiver thereof shall be made or granted otherwise than upon the application of the Attorney-General, on his own motion or after his approval of a request in writing therefor of the Superintendent of Insurance, except in an action by a judgment creditor or in proceedings supplementary to execution.'

"The action brought by this plaintiff is not an action by a policyholder to recover upon her policy, as was the case in the Swan and Greeff actions, but a suit to compel the directors of an insurance corporation to pay into the corporate treasury the amount of waste of corporate funds created by them. In this respect the action is totally different from the action in the two cases mentioned, and those cases are not authorities upon the question whether section 56 of the Insurance law prohibits the bringing of this action.

"It will be noticed that this ill-worded startute does not in terms bar the institution of any suit by a policyholder. What is barred is an order, judgment or decree of a particular kind. It might well have been held that a complaint otherwise good, no matter what the relief prayed for might be, would stand, and that the granting of the relief only would be denied if precedent thereto demand therefor was not made by the Attorney-General. Yet, on the other hand, a complaint is generally had if the judgment prayed for will not of necessity follow from the facts alleged, granted their truth. This was the view in the Swan case.

"The only relief there demanded was a decree for an accounting by the corporation. Such a decree, the

Attorney-General's consent not appearing, the complaint did not make a case, and was therefore a bad complaint. It would seem, however, that this construction should properly be limited to those cases where the relief demanded is precisely the relief which is barred. If it appears that a complaint does not ask such relief, if upon the facts stated, a recovery may perhaps be had without a resort to orders and decrees of the prohibited kind, then plainly the one and only time to refuse such relief is when it is subsequently applied for. Because the order or decree prohibited is a possibility as the case develops is no reason for holding a complaint bad, when of necessity such relief may never follow or be demanded and a case is stated for relief which is wholly different.

"As to the first class, I take it that the accounting intended is an accounting by the corporation. In the Swan case the accounting demanded was of that character. Did it mean an accounting by diretors, then the corporation itself might not pursue a delinquent director without the approval of the Attorney-General.

"As to the third class, it does not of necessity follow from this complaint that any order or decree interfiring with the business of the society will ever result from the maintenance of this action. No intermediate relief is prayed for by this complaint. It does not now appear that such relief will ever be demanded. If an order, such as an order to examine the society's books, be hereafter applied for, then may arise the occasion for its refusal on the ground of the statutory prohibition. Nor do I see what manner of decree or judgment interfering with the prosecution of the society's business will so certainly prove the goal of this action, that the complaint itself is now bad.

"To my way of thinking, therefore, the statute in question in no wise prohibits the bringing of this action, and this complaint is not demurrable because of it.

"The nature of a policyholders' interest in a mutual company is very similar to that of an ordinary stockholder. He elects the directors of the corporation, he names the persons who shall manage the corporate property; upon the proper management thereof depends his ultimate profit. Since he names the managers he surely has an interest in the corporate funds, and a right to compel proper management, and the collection of assets diverted precisely as an ordinary stockholder has that right.

"It may be said that the conclusions arrived at confliet with public policy. I do not understand that publie policy is necessarily law. It is a topic which generally should affect statesmen, not judges. The public policy of to-day is not the public policy of to-morrow. If followed in judicial decisions, either that which may become bad policy through a change of conditions becomes in law a fixed rule, or the law is judiciously changed to meet the changing policy, either result being bad. Here is only a legal question. The plaintiff's corporation has a cause of action which it does not enforce. The plaintiff is a shareholder. As such she has a right to compel its enforcement. The fact that the corporation's business is insurance, not manufacturing, is no valid distinction differentiating the

plaintiff's case from that of an ordinary stockholder.

"For all the reasons given, therefore, the defendant's demurrer is overruled with costs."

#### THE METROPOLITAN BANK.

The first few years of a new bank are hardly to be considered any criterion as to its condition and prospects. The work of organization, though it may be nominally complete when the business commences, is really extended over a number of years, when connections, are being made, officers tested as to their capacity and efforts being made to establish the institution in the confidence of the public.

The Metropolitan Bank is one of the latest to aspire to public favour. It has met with several drawbacks from wholly unavoidable events, but the report for last year gives promise of the business growing and being profitable. As the paid-up capital is a million dollars, the circulation reached the practical limit in October last when the note issues were \$951.860.

The deposits at the close of the year were \$2,740.109, which shows an increase of about one million in the past year, or nearly 40 per cent., which ought to be regarded as satisfactory.

The current loans and discounts were \$3,661.745 against \$2.452,700 a year ago, the increase being 50 per cent. If the rate of increase is kept up for a few years the Metropolitan will have an excellent business, so far as bulk is concerned, and Mr. W. D. Ress, general manager, will do his utmost to ensure the quality being satisfactory. The profits last year were \$120,085, which paid 4 quarterly dividends of 2 per cent. each, provided \$10,000 to reduce bank premises account and left \$133,133 to be carried forward. "Make-haste slowly" is a good motto for a new bank; we commend it to the Metropolitan, and trust as its business expands so also will its strength develop by judicious management.

#### LIFE INSURANCE AFFAIRS.

The next statements issued by the various U.S. Insurance Commissioners will probably show a few changes in the investment lists. In some instances they may prove awkward, and nursing advisable. - The Provident Mutual has advertised its carrying 100 million dollars worth of business . —A correspondent naturally asks what good has resulted from the State investigation beyond the reduction of salaries in a few cases. Another asks, "What do some of the new managers know about life insurance?" The New York State Legislature has authorized the issue of 5,000 volumes containing the detailed testimony taken at the investigation into the methods of the life insurance companies to which frequent allusion has been made in these columns. The cost is not to exceed \$5 a volume. The expense of making the investigation itself is not given.

Tennessee has published the replies of life insurance companies transacting business in that States, to a circular letter recently issued asking for information regarding contributions for political campaign purposes, and for influencing legislation. The Commissioner has announced that where replies indicate contributions for the purpose named, he has notified the companies that restitution must be made. Companies refusing to make restitution may possibly not be allowed to renew their licenses in Tennessee. Among those admitting as having made contributions are:—Aetna Life, Home Life, Pennsylvania Mutual, Provident Savings Life, and the Prudential Life.

The degree of turpitude being revealed not only in New York, but in other States of the Union in connection with Lfe insurance operations is a striking commentary upon the ethics of the most progres-ive people of the age.

#### THE NORTH AMERICAN LIFE ASSURANCE CO-

This company as a Canadian institution is one of which the country may be proud, as its entire record speaks of excellent management, in an actuarial sense and from the standpoint of business.

It has been singularly free from legal disputes respecting claims, which have been paid with commendable promptness. Its securities have annually passed the ordeal of an examination by the Government Insurance Department without any conflict arising as to their nature or their valuation.

Last year the cash received for premiums amounted to \$1.354,607 covering new insurance issued for \$6,-354.962. In addition to these receipts there was \$309,-247 added to the income from interest, etc., on investments which made the total income \$1,663.354.

The death claims paid were \$259,476, which were provided for by interest on investments with \$49.771 to spare. The expenses and commissions were large, no doubt, but unfortunately this is the universal experience of life assurance companies owing to the competition being so keen as to necessitate liberal outlays in securing and holding business. Life companies have no monopoly of heavy expenses caused by competition, as, all along the line of trade, especially that conducted by storekeepers, the expenses of management have increased materially in recent years.

The company had a surplus of income over disbursement last year to extent of \$720,718, which is shown by an addition to the assets, the total of which is \$6,-968,013. The liabilities include \$6,247.767, the amount of the Assurance and Annuity Reserve Fund, and other items which raise the total liabilities to \$6,398,-003, thus leaving a net surplus of assets over all liabilities to amount of \$570,010. Last year there were dividends on policies declared and unpaid for \$13,090. The assets include \$1,043,046 of first mortgages on real estate and \$4,279,638 of stocks, bonds and debentures, which have a market value of \$4,387,699. This is a different condition to that of some companies who hold large blocks of industrial securities which have only a speculative value, and that is below what they cost the companies in question.

Mr. Johnson, who was six years in Parliament and is now aged 40, cheerfully informed an interviewer that he was certain the return to manual labor would prove beneficial to him physically. Besides, he was as poor now as when he entered Parliament, and has been obliged to return to his trade to support his wife and family."—Rara avis in terris.

#### LARGE CONTRACT SECURED.

The Canadian White Company, Limited of Montreal, (announcement on another page) are advised by their New York correspondents Messrs. J. G. J. G. White and Company, incorporated, have further contracts with the Government for the building of harbor works at Cebu and Lloilo, and the naval station mar Manila. They have also recently built and equipted complete the railway system of the city of Manila. All the above contracts amount to about sixteen million dollars.

Both hail from a land where wit is not by any means exotic.

#### THE LATE GEORGE M. KINGHORN.

Om the 23th ult. there passed away from among us Mr. George M. Kinghorn, in the 82nd year of his age, after a long and prosperous business career, during which he endeared himself to all who knew him. A native of Campsie, Scotland, he came to Montreal in 1840, engaging early in the forwarding business in Montreal and Kingston, and subsequently in Montreal as Sec. of the Transportation Co. since formation. The departed gentleman leaves five children, Mrs. Geo. McDougall, Dr. Wim. Kinghorn of Saranac Lake, and Messrs David, Richard S., and James R. Kinghorn of Montreal. The funeral on Saturday was attended by a large concourse of citizens.

#### THE LATE JAMES SMART OF BROCKVILLE

Brockville mourns the loss of one of her oldest and most exemplary pioneers in the death of ex-sheriff James Shart, best known perhaps as the founder of the great enterprise that bears his name. The deceased gentleman was born in Scotland in 1819, and has resided in Brockville upwards of half a century. He leaves a family of four—Hon. James Smart ex-M nister of Public Works for Manitoba and ex-Deputy Minister of the Interior for Canada: Geo. B. Smart of the Canadian Immigration Department, and two daughters. Some ten years ago Mr. Smart suffered a painful injury by falling on the street, and had since been confined to his house.

-According to the advices received at the Department of Interior, immigration from the United States this year promises to be larger than ever, enquiries being general from all over the Union. The New England States are becoming greatly interested in the poss bilities of the Canadan North-West, and these States promise to give a large quota during the coming season. Many Pennsylvania Dutch are preparing to transfer their allegance to the British flag. The State of Illinois so far has requisitioned ninety cars for the carriage of settlers' effects as compared with thirty cars for the orresponding period last year. Even the State of Oklahoma will contribute its share of Canadan immigrants. Last year there was quite an influx into Canada from Washington, Idaho and Oregon. The settlers from these States are so well pleased with the cond tions which they find in the North-West that they have written many 1 tters to their friends at home urging them to take up ther resdence in Canada. The officials of the imm grat on branch are greatly pleased at the success of the efforts of the departmen ad ag nts in the United States.

—The "British American Hat and Cap Company," Montreal, carried on by H. Poplin, upon whom a demand of assignment was made a few days ago, consented to go into liquidation. According to the statement filed at the Super or Court, the liabilities are about \$9,000 while the assets, the value of which is not specified, consist of stock of fixtures and book debts. The principal creditors are: Yorkshire Importing Co., Montreal, \$556; H. H. -According to advices received from Seton Lake, Lillcoet, the work of the hatchery, which was to have stocked the Fraser River with 40,000,000 young salmon and ensured another big run in 1909, has been almost a total failure. Of the 45,-000,000 eggs which were fertilized, not more than 6,000,000 can now possibly be counted. About 15,000 000 eggs had to be thrown out before the process of hatching was complete. The product of the others was transferred to the nursery, a pool formed in the creek. Here, however, they died in millions, and the bottom is covered with the bodies of the tiny fish. At the end of the pool is a wire screen to prevent the escape of the young sockeyes. Against this they are carried by the current and killed by thousands. The hatchery is under the care of Inspector Babcock and Superintendent Ledgerwood, who are employed by the British Columbia Government as experts. It is said that they are totally unable to account for the failure of their operations. Three years ago 5,000,000 young fish were successfully started down the river as the product of 7.000,000 eggs, and the tremendous losses of this season are therefore the more inexplicable.

—Considerably over 62,000,000 bushels of grain of this year's crop is already marketed, and of this amount 46 163,000 bushels were received at C.P.R. points, and yet so excellent has been the transportation facilities that in spite of the great increase in marketing no semblance of a blocade exists at the lake-front. Indeed only 4,600,000 bushels are in store there, where there is capacity for 18,000,000 including both C.P.R. and C.N.R. elevators. This heavy marketing would have paralyzed the railways in any previous year, and severely taxed the elevator capacity. However, the increase in storage and transportation facilities has saved the country.

—The C.P.R. steamer Empress of Ireland was successfully launched on January 27, at Fairfield yards. The Empress of Ireland is a twin screw steamer of 14,500 tons and 18 000 horse power, her engines are erected to develop a speed of eighteen knots with a reserve of two knots, equally twenty knots. The maiden voyage of the Empress of Ireland will be made in June, to Quebec and Montreal.

—As example of how widely valuators may differ in case of fire losses is shown by the estimate made by a department-al store proprietor, and a city commission agent in a recent case; the one was \$15,000, and the other \$80,000. The articles destroyed were of superior class.

—The Rainy River Navigation Company's new hotel, the Couchiching built and furnished for tourists, and which commands the finest view on Rainy River, overlooking the big water power and its development, was sold on Monday last to Thos. Wilson of Fort Frances for \$25,000.

-Premier Deakin, in a speech at Melbourne, said the Australian Farliament next session would deal with the immigration question generally. The Government will ask the House to subsidize a line of steamers to bring immigrants from the Mother Country at cheap fares.

—The stock of Nash, Carson and Naylor, Limited, Winnipeg, was sold by auction Monday last to Hamilton Bros., Limited, for sixty-six cents on the dollar. It is valued at slightly over sixty thousand.

—Montreal Clearing House total for week ending February 1, 1906, \$26,261,731; corresponding week last year \$21,657 301; and corresponding week, 1904, \$17,687,272.

—Ther Merchan's Bank of Canada has opened branches at Vancouver, B.C., Fort William, Ont., Stettler, Alta. and Alix, Alta.

-The Union Bank of Canada have opened a branch at Thornton, Ont.

The President, in moving the adoption of the report, spoke as follows:

Before referring to the condition of the Bank, as shown by the statement now presented, I desire to voice the feeling of personal loss which all the Directors experienced at the death of our late President, Dr. Warden. He was so highly respected, both for his character and ability, by his colleagues that his death came to each as a personal bereavement. He was elected Vice-President of the Bank at its organization, and when the first vacancy occurred in the Presidency he assumed the duties of that office, at a personal sacrifice. He had unbounded faith in the future of the Bank, and showed his confidence by becoming a large shareholder and by increasing his holdings in the stock of the Bank on more than one occasion.

The Directors feel that they were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. James Ryrie to fill the vacancy on the Board. He is widely known as a man of the highest integrity, and as one who has been eminently successful.

The statement which has been placed in your hands shows that our profits for the past year were \$120,085.55 in comparison with \$84,815.48 for the year before. These represent earnings of 12 per cent. upon the capital stock for 1905, whereas in 1904 such earnings were about 8½ per cent. This

should be as satisfactory to the shareholders as it is gratifying to the Directors. These profits are realized after providing for interest due depositors, rebate on unmatured bills, and all doubtful as well as bad debts. Our supplies of Bank notes and stationery are also paid for and charged off.

Our Deposits have increased during the year from \$2,075,618.29 to \$2,740 108.92, an increase of \$664,490.63.

In the totals of the previous year the deposits by the Provincial Government were \$261,000 greater than at 30th December last, so that our ordinary deposits have increased \$925,490.63 in the year. These deposits are well distributed, and may be considered reasonably permanent.

Our Loans and Discounts are \$3,601,745.21, showing an increase of \$827,392.61 for the year. The amounts are well distributed, no unduly large advances are granted, and all accounts are carefully considered.

Our Investments are scattered, and chosen after careful consideration. The market value excels the amount shown in our return to shareholders.

The Bank Premises Safes and Office Furniture are shown as \$153,617.28. This amount is arrived at after writing off most Fiberally for depreciation before striking our profits for the year. The \$10,000 reserved out of profits is an extra reduction made to improve this particular asset.

Our Total Assets are 157 per cent. of our deposits and circulation combined, and you will observe that of these assets \$2,124 481.34 are immediately available, being an amount equal to 56 per cent of our total liabilities. In this respect we show exceptional strength.

NEW BRANCHES.—We have opened four new offices during the year, making a total of 17 Branches outside of our Head Office. We are also in possession of premises at Guelph, where a Branch will be established about 1st February. You will observe that our policy in this regard is one of moderation. A new Bank has not in itself the trained and tried men necessary for the responsible positions of Bank mangers when such positions are created too rapidly. If they wish, therefore to adopt a policy of rapid extension in branch opening, they are thrown for the most part on the necessity of taking men which other institutions are willing to let go or they must repose confidence in young and inexperienced men. In either case they run a risk which we do not think would be justified in assuming.

SHARES.—It may be disappointing to our Shareho'ders that the shares of the Bank have not a greater market value than reported, but this is a matter which your Directors do not control, and about which they do not think that they should be concerned. Our efforts are put forth to show intrinsic values, and the real worth of the shares to-day, as shown by our Balance Sheet, is 213. The least we can assure the Shareholders in this respect is that our statement is not inflated, and that the value, as shown therein, is even more than fully represented in the assets of the Bank.

In view of the recent rumours regarding the absorption of the Bank we take this opportunity of stating that the report is incorrect, and to inform the Shareholders that we have made no approaches, directly or indirectly, to any Bank, or institution with a view to amalgamation or absorption.

Our policy has been one of prudence and conservation, and whatever others may do, to this policy we will absolutely adhere. Month by month we are showing progress, and are growing with a steadiness and certainty that are bound to bring good results.

We again ask for the earnest support of our Shareholders, depostors and friends in the extension of our business.

I have pleasure in moving the adoption of the report.

The motion was seconded by the Vice-President and unanimously adopted.

#### THE BLACK DIAMOND FILE WORKS.

Messrs. G. and H. Barnett Co., proprietors of the "Black Diamond File Works" Philadelphia, Pa., because of the unprecedented demand at home and abroad for their product, the Black Diamond Files and Rasps, have found it impossible to keep pace with trade requirements without very largely increasing their already extensive plant.

Some months ago the management purchased considerable additional real estate adjoining their works, enabling them to erect a number of buildings in which to accommodate more machinery, and to build large additions to present buildings in order to give them the desired increased capacity. These improvements and enlargements, which have been going on throughout the past year, and have now been completed, resulting in a vastly larger daily production, which it is hoped will enable them to more promptly fill all orders that may be placed with them.

The wisdom of this move has been fully vindicated from the fact that, even with the aid of their increased capacity, they are at the present time finding it extremely difficult to keep up with the demand of the trade for Black Diamond Files, and we are informed that they are now several weeks behind on their orders. Present indications seem to insure that the enlarged capacity of their factory will be strained to its utmost to take satisfactory care of the spring trade.

#### MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

Montreal, Thursday. Feb. 1st, 1906.

There have been few changes or importance in business conditions. Owing to the mildness of the weather, out-door work on buildings, etc., has been carried on briskly, but on the other hand shop keepers have been discouraged by the slow movement of winter fabrics which have remained on their shelves to a greater extent than is desirable instead of going into buyers' hands. The demand for spring and summer goods is quite active, and both manufacturers and wholesale distributors speak well of the outlook. Coal dealers report the demand from manufacturers as large as usual, but householders' wants have been reduced to such an extent that both mine owners and traders are complaining. In the United States, the iron and steel plants keep busy, and no serious interruptions have arisen from labor troubles, only a few minor disputes reported. Railway earnings for January show an increase of 13 per cent., as compared with last year. Sweetstuffs are again lower in price. Refined sugar has been reduced 10c, and the molasses market is easier in sympathy with lower cable advices. European reports on beet sugar favor the buying interest. Hides have declined im consequence of the inferior state of the offerings at this season. The mildness of the season threatens the ice crop, a deficiency in which will be a serious loss to meat dealers, packers and others. The delay in the formation of the ice bridge over the river has been a serious drawback to trade with the southern parishes, as the farmers have been unable to reach the city with their usual loads of produce.

APPLES.—The shipments from Atlantic parts to Europe last week were 57,174 brls., a decrease of 30,000 brls., compared with the same week last year. The total shipments totalled 1,708,144 brls., or 150 000 brls. more than a year ago.

ASHES.—Dull. Firsts are quoted at \$5.15 to \$5.20, and seconds at \$4.60 to \$4.70. First pearl ash is wanted at \$6.50 to \$6.75.

BACON.—The market was quiet all week in London. No. 1 is quoted at 56s, 59s and 62s; No. 2 at 55s, 57s and 61s; No. 3 at 55s, 56s and 60s.

BUTTER.—There was not much life to the market, and dealers do not look for much activity for several weeks to come. Winter made creamery of excellent quality is quotable at 22c to 22½c; October make 22½c to 22¾c: Dairy 20c to 20½c.

CHEESE.—The trade appear to be waiting for something to turn up, and there is practically nothing new to report. The range for finest is 13c to 131/4c.

COAL OIL.—Prime White Acme 15½ a gallon; Acme water white 17c: Pratt's Astral, 20c; bbls. included.

DRESSED POULTRY.—The market has been quiet and steady. The following prices are quoted: (horce fresh killed turkeys 12 to 13c, frozen 10 to 111/2c; ducks 11c geese are wanted and scarce at 10c to 11c; chickens 9 to 10c; and fowl at 7c to 8c.

DRY GOODS.—It has been a quiet and uneventful week, the continued mild weather acting as a damper on the sale of seasonable heavy fabrics. Prices are he'd fairly steady, and manufacturers and wholesalers seem content with the way in which advanced orders are coming forward. In the New York cotton market the professional sentiment has been bearish in spite of a continued good demand for spot cotton in the English market. Rumours were abroad that the South was beginning to let go its ho'dings of spot cotton.

EGGS.—A large business has been done at a lower range. Supplies have exceeded expectations. Selects have been selling recently at 21 to 22c, and best cold storage and pickled

at 17c to 18c. Fresh laid in single cases 25c.

FISH.—Business has been disappointing for most kinds of fish, including even bulk oysters, but dealers look for a change before long. There is a good upply of froce: fi it oa hand, and the market is easy. Haddies, bloaters and kippers are plentiful and good. Green cod is scarce and higher. Salt herring scarce and firm. Salt and pickled fish: No. 1 Labrador herring, \$5.50 to \$6 bbl.; half bbl., \$3; per pail 80c; Labrador salmon, tierces \$18; bb's. \$13; half btl. \$7.50; B.C. salmon, bbls., \$12.50; half bbls., \$7; Labrador sea trout, bb's., \$10; lake trout, per keg, \$4.50; No. 1 salt mackerel, per pail, \$2; large green cod, per lb., 41/2c; medium 4c lb. small 31/4c; No. 1 salt pollock, \$6.50 per 200 lbs.; No. 1 salt haddock, \$7 per 200 lbs.—Oysters: Standard bulk oysters, imperial gallon, \$1.40; selects, \$1.60; oyster pails or carriers, pints, per 100, \$1; qts. \$1.25; live lobsters, per lb., lcc; new boiled lobstens, 17c per lb.—Prepared fish: Beneless fish, im 2-lb. bricks, per lb., 51/2c; boneless cod, (c; boleess fish, loose, in 25-lb. boxes, per lb., 5c; skinless cod, 100 lb. boxes.

FURS.—Large supplies of new furs are reaching Edmonton and some other points in the north. Rabbits have been plentiful and on these many of the fur bearing animals feed. The most valuable single furs reported are a silver and a black fox, \$750 being given for the pair in the west. The mild weather has given trappers a chance to make a large catch. According to James Corristine and Co.'s advices, red fox is steady in London: wild and house cat and badger show no change, as compared with last March. Australian empossuim is 5 per cent. lower than last October, wambat 20 per cent. lower than in October, wallaby 25 per cent. lower, and kangaroo the same as last October. Salted fur seal is lower.

GRAIN.—The market was somewhat firmer for oats, although business has been done at 38½c store for No. 4. No. 3 is quoted at 39½c and No. 2 at 40½c. Sales are mentioned at ½c to ½c advance on these prices. Wheat in Winnipeg sold at 76½c Jan. and at 79½ for May. In Chicago, May wheat advanced to 85%c. Man'toba wheat is selling c.i.f. Buffalo at ½c under Chicago May. Early in the season it sold at 12c under. It has advanced, while American wheat has declined the past five months. Red Russian, Dregon and white club wheat, which sold in Chicago a





This is shown 24120 in Austria-Hungary, 22,634 in in a report on "The Transportation Routes and Systems of the world," issued by the U.S. Bureau of Statistics of the Department of Commerce and Labor. It points out that of the total railway mileage of the world, aggregating in 1904. 543,000 miles, there were 211 074 miles in the United States, 35,323 miles in European Russia, 32,967 miles in Germany, 28,102 in France, 26,950 in India,

the United Kingdom, 19,611 in Canada, 15.560 in Africa, 14,113 in Australia, 11/-559 in Argentina, 10,356 in Mexico, 9961 in Italy 9.368 in Brazil, 7,697 in Sweden 7,322 in Siberia, Manchuria, and the other former Asiatic possessions of Russia, 4,495 in Japan, and 1,186 in China.

The growth of the railways in the Unlited States has been very rapid. Beginning in 1835 with 1,000 miles, the

number steadily grew, and in the decade 1865-1875 it doubled and then rapidly came up to the present number, which represents an outlay of eleven and twothirds billions of dollars out of an aggregate cost of thirty-seven billions for the entire world.

The total tonnage of vessels flying the American flag increased from 5,212,001 tons in 1855 to 6,456,543 tons in 1905. This increase is due to the increase in



the tonnage of vessels engaged in the coastwise trade. The tonnage of vesse's engaged in the foreign trade fell from 2,348,358 in 1855 to 943,750 tons in 1905.

Freight rates on both land and sea have decreased. The rate per bushel of wheat from New York to Liverpool was about 10 cents in 1873, and about one cent in 1905.

The amount of passengers and freight transported has increased considerably. During the last year the railways transported 719,654 951 passengers and 1,300,-000,000 tons of freight. In 1885 the number of passengers carried was 351,-427,688, and freight 437,000,000.

The influence the improvement of means of transportation on land and water has on the trade of the world is Under "the newly-created discussed. transportation systems of the last century, which have developed the interior of continents and made merchantable many commodities which formerly would not bear the cost of transportation," the

report says, "the international commerce of the world is to-day about 15 times as much as at the beginning of the last century, while the world's population is but two and one half times as much as at that time, the commerce of the world's population, as a whole, having thus grown from less than \$2.50 per capita in 1800 to nearly \$14 per capita at the present time."

#### THE YUKON BALANCE SHEET

No product of a country tends more towards attracting settlers than rich auriferous deposits. Examples of this are found the world over. Our own Yukon, although situated in a region not far from Arctic-though not nearly as severe as believed to be when gold mining was begun there a few years agohas proved a remarkable example, although not as yet as profitable to all persons concerned as might have been expected.

To the end of last June the Yukon distret had contributed to the revenue of Canada from the time of the first exploration there for gold, \$11,571.23. The total Canadian public expediture in that period on current acco at was \$11,-9(3.251.

These figures do not include the cost of land surveys, telegraph lines, etc. charged to capital, which increase the outlay by \$1,996,346. The total charge of the country against the Yukon is placed by the public accounts at \$2 388,-

Much of this debt has been recently incurred. From 1895 to 1899 the government took \$2887,765 out of the Yukon and expended there only \$2,430,663. Nearly the whole of this outlay, or \$1,-939,000 was under the head of mounted police and militia.

In the fiscal year ending 1900, \$578-000 was expended by the department of

public works on capital account, but the total expenditure was only \$100,000 above the revenue.

The year 1901 was a good one for the federal treasury. Gold mines paid \$1,-126 500 in royalties and other charges, and \$313,000 was collected by the custon house. The total current account charges were \$\\\\254,000 and the expenditure of all kinds \$1,671,000. That year the Yukon paid for the Yukon and gave \$322,000 more.

The next year saw a drop of nearly \$400 000 in the interior department revenues, with nearly \$100,000 decrease in customs duties. There was an increase of over half a million in regular expenditure, and of \$360,000 in capital. More than a million had to be taken from the federal treasury to pay for the Yukon. That was the year in which the Yukon railway claim of Mackenzie and Mann was settled.

Scarcely better was the showing for 1903, with a further decrease in revenue, and a large increase in current outlay. Charges to capital were, however, near-ty brought to an end. The total expenditure exceeded the revenue by \$820,-000.

In 1904 the revenue fell off \$167.000 more, leaving it \$1,181,445. The expenditure was cut down \$690,000, and the deficit was not much over \$350,000.

Last year saw a further drop of revenue to \$879,000, and an increase of \$100,000 in the expenditure.. The deficit was over three-quarters of a million.

contribution to the revenue. Some \$90 per head of the Yukon population is the sum of the present debt of the dominion attributable to that region. Last year the interior department collected in royalties and other revenues \$408,473 and expended \$476,227. The post office collected \$26,301 and expended \$128,248. Customs revenue was \$296,204 and expenditure \$43,769. The revenue for public works, including tele-

graphs. was \$115,662 and the expenditure \$325,738. Mounted police in the Yukon cost \$599,367, or far more than the proceeds of gold licenses and royalties. Justice cost \$97,586.

Yet probably most people in the Yukon think that the reduction of go'd royalties has not gone far enough. It is not likely that they are satisfied with the extent of the services rendered. When the telegraph line was devised it

was estimated that the country would make a considerable net income from the service. The result of several years' operation is that the regular telegraph expenditure is more than fifty per cent. larger than the revenue. The Yukon telegraph deficit of 1904 was \$70,000. No one will claim that the capital charge on this enterprise represents a valuable asset.

#### ONTARIO MINING.

By the report of the Ontario Bureau of Mines for 1905 it is seen that the production of minerals increased in the province by two and a quarter millions of dollars in the last five years, giving a total for 1905 of \$11,572,647. Owing to the more recent discoveries of ore, some 54 companies were incorporated and 12 licensed in 1904, with a united capital of \$42,510,000. The boom in these organizations had been far more considerable than in the development of mineral territory. The production for the year is divided into metallic and non-metallic. To the first is credited \$5,156,677, of which the leading items were as follows:



It will be noticed that the cement industry is showing rapid growth. From \$700,000 in 1900 it has risen to a production of \$1,239,971. These figures are chiefly influenced by Ontario, where the forest destruction is bringing the most need of building substitutes. The nonmetallic list, as given in the report, now includes several minerals that were industrially unmarked ten years ago, such as actinolite, arsenic, carbide or calcium, corundum, feldspar, graphite, iron pyrites and talc. The report is altogether a compendium of matters of interest to both miner and geologist.

gely contributed, but the principal sources of increase have undoubtedly been the development of the mail order business and the influx of foreigners who send more or less of their earnings abroad. It is, of course, impossible in the returns to trace the amount of the business done due to mail orders, but the foreign business can be easily ascertained. In 1887 the total amount of the money orders issued in Canada and paid abroad was \$2,306,395, a sum about balanced by the amount of the money orders issued abroad and paid in Canada, The following tables show the development of the business in so far as the principal countries are concerned:

The total amount of the money orders issued in Canada in 1905 and payable abroad was \$8938,991, about twice as large as in 1897. The amount payable in the United States was about double the entire amount of the foreign orders issued in 1897, showing that country has more than kept pace with the general advance. Of the other increases those to Italy, Austria-Hungary and Japan are most noticeable, and all were due to money sent home by natives of these countries who have settled in Canada. The increase in the value of the orders issued abroad and payable in Canada has not been proportionately as great. In 1897 the foreign orders payable in Canada amounted to \$2,245 467 and in 1905 to \$5,602,256. The amounts in the case of the principal countries

It will be noticed that in the case of the United States, a small favourable balance has been changed into a small one against us. This change and a large portion of the increase in our business with the United States was undoubtedly due to mail order business. These two tables show that in the case of all the other countries, Canada is contributing several millions a year, though it must not be forgotten that quite a considerable proportion of this money continually finds its way back to Canada through the immigration it will induce. A country rich enough to enable those who have emigrated to it to send home substantial savings, is a good country to go to when in search of a home. No little share in the growth of the United States was due to the advertisement it received from money sent abroad and earned within its boundaries by the foreign born.
