### BIG ENTERPRISE

Seattle Company Will Grow Stock on Alutian Islands

Seattle, June 20 - A gigantic stock faising enterprise in connection with Alaska is being undertaken by the Frye-Bruhn Company. "It involves the transportation to the Aleutian slands for stock-breeding purposes of no less than 25,000 sheep. The firs consignment, 8,200 head, will be hipped north on the steamer Melville Dollar, which arrived in port yester day morning from San Francisco. The vessel was specially chartered for this service, and will carry only sheep and the forage necessary for their sustenance while en voyage. Between now and fall the vessel will take north two more consignments each of about that number of stock Frve-Bruhn & Co. have already monstrated by actual experiment that sheep can survive the winters of Alaska on the Aleutiah islands.
