WHAT "BONE DRY" VERDICT
MEANS

An order-in-Council is to be passed by the Dominion Government fixing a date after which importation of liquor into the ober will be prohibited. Under an amendment to the Canada Temperance Act, for cold weather in the autumn of 1918. passed last year, it is provided that after the prohibition of importation is declared to be in force,

(1) No person shall import, send, take or transport into the province concerned

any intoxicating liquor.

(2) No person shall, either directly or indirectly, manufacture or sell, or contract or agree to manufacture or sell, any in toxicating liquor to be unlawfully imported, sent, taken or transported into

(3) The carriage or transportation of intoxicating liquor through the province shall only be by means of a common carrier by water or by railway, and not otherwise, and during the time any intoxicating liquor is being so transported or carried no. liquor is being so transported or carried no CAPT. TIRE TROUBLES

Experiments Show More Damage Is Done by Under-Inflation Than by Effect of Heat

Does the air pressure in a tire increase sufficiently in hot weather to cause blowouts? That question has been asked of tire dealers thousands of times. Some will

that dealers thousands of times. Some will answer "YES" and others will declare that it is impossible.


Two five inch tires were used in the test, one properly inflated and other underinflated. The tests were made on dif-ferent days, one of which was extremely hot, the other of normal temperature.

In the case of the normally inflated tire, the temperature within the tire in-creased 30 degrees, while the pressure was increased between 7 and 10 per cent., an increase insufficient to cause a blow-out under ordinary conditions. The pres-sure in the underinflated tire, however, Boston and Yarmouth Steamship Co., Limited increased 14 per cent, while the temper-ature rose 48 degrees.

This substantiates the assertion that

underinflation causes more wear to be done by the tire and indicates a destructive effect upon it. The experiments show, also, that the increase in air pressure under normal conditions, with proper inflation, will have no destructive effect upon the tire, regardless of the heat of the
