## THE TARIFF AND COMMON SENSE

**PREMIER MEIGHEN SAYS:**  
"We should produce the necessaries of life at home and thereby provide the maximum amount of work for our own people. A reasonable protective tariff such as Canada has had for upwards of 43 years is necessary to this end."

## DELEGATES TO N.B. HOCKEY LEAGUE

Bathurst, Nov. 17—Next Tuesday evening, November 22, the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Hockey League will be held in the Board of Trade rooms, and considerable significance attaches to the gathering for it is more than likely that the fate of the league will hinge upon the deliberations of the delegates.

In the light of known events the outlook is very promising for a successful hockey season, with an extended league of teams operating under the provincial charter, and with the divergent views and interests that marked last season blending into a more harmonious ensemble.

The meeting is being called by H. O. Schryer, secretary of the league, the object of the same can best be described in the opening words of the communication which he has sent to the league representatives in the various towns interested, as follows: "A meeting of the Maritime Provinces branch of the N. B. Hockey League will be held in the Board of Trade rooms, Bathurst, on November 22, at 7 p. m., for the purpose of drawing up a schedule and making plans for the season 1921-2."

The towns communicated with by Mr. Schryer in this regard are as follows: Campbellton, Chatham, Fredericton, Sussex, Marysville, Sackville Moncton and St. John.

Including Bathurst the list comprises nine prospective teams, and Mr. Schryer feels that there is every justification for believing in the possibility of transforming that prospective league into an actual fact. And needless to say, in his belief, and in his efforts to bring about its consummation, he has the support of every local hockey player, and, so far as can be ascertained, the great body of outside hockey opinion as well. In the meantime, or rather last year, only five teams were in the league, as follows: Campbellton, Bathurst, Chatham, Fredericton and Marysville.

Mr. Schryer has also communicated with A. V. Covey, president of the Maritime Provinces branch of the A. A. U. of Canada, informing him of the meeting, and its purpose, and urging him to be in attendance if possible to swing the league movement along.

Tonight the Bathurst Hockey Club held its annual meeting, at which delegates to the league were appointed.

CHATHAM EXHIBITION The Gazette says the 1921 Chatham Exhibition accounts are now about all in and the indications are that the fair will show the worst loss in the history of the association. A deficit of about \$3000 is anticipated by some of the directors, though the exact figures are not yet known. A heavy prize list, particularly in cattle, contributed to the deficit. The Exhibition was favored with a week of extraordinarily good weather, a most fortunate circumstance for the management, or still more money would have been lost.

Chatham is not alone on the list of Exhibition deficits. The St. John exhibition Association are out some \$11,000, and Woodstock was close on \$8,000 behind. There are others, not yet reported, who may join company.

HOME MADE BEER Legal authorities at the Ontario Parliament Building confirm an announcement made by the collector of inland revenue, that it is legal for a citizen, upon notifying the department, to brew beer upon his own premises. It was stated there is nothing in the Inland Revenue Act, the Ontario Temperance Act, or the Scott Act to prohibit the manufacture of beer for home consumption only.

According to explanations advanced; the Inland Revenue Act is a law solely to protect the revenue resources of the Government.

### RAILWAY AFFAIRS



PAUGAN FALLS, IN THE GATINEAU DISTRICT recognized—lack. She is beginning to realize that an amazing increase in motor traffic necessitates the providing of some objective for tourist travel, and that the more attractive the objective, the greater the number of tourists. Tourists represent revenue, and a very satisfactory type of revenue, for in enjoying and benefiting by a sojourn in one of our playgrounds, they leave the scenery undiminished in grandeur, and they take away nothing that impoverishes the country. So keenly are many cities competing for this tourist traffic, that they provide camps for motorists and vie with one another in offering attractions that may induce a brief sojourn, at least, within the municipality. The Gatineau is like a hen waiting to lay golden eggs and needing only a little bit of corn in front of her to set the machinery in operation. The corn in this case, stands for adequate accommodation. The absence of hotels has been for the lovers of the Gatineau one of its principal charms. There has been no danger from invading hordes capable of desecrating its vast solitudes with lax hand and ukelele, and building picture houses to shut out the glory of the sky. Chelsea, Kingsmere, Farm Point, and Blue Sea Lake (where the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire elected to spend their summers), are almost as a closed Paradise to any save those who have cottages. Yet, although all of these places are undeniably beautiful and desirable by reason of their very exclusiveness, they do not comprise even half of the Gatineau. The vicinity of Paugan Falls can scarcely be equalled as a hotel site. Paugan is an Indian word meaning "pipe" and is descriptive of the shape of the Falls. While these may not be mentioned in the same breath with Niagara or similar glories, yet they have their own peculiar charm; the approach, the setting, the colouring of the surrounding hills, the indescribable atmosphere of romance that pervades the district. Over the Paugan, a rainbow arch spans the two shores on sunny days and when clouds threaten Old Sol with death, the prismatic colours fade into a shimmering mist. Below the Paugan Falls the Gatineau river grows calm and forms not only a safe lake for boating, but an ideal swimming pool, bordered as it is for a half a mile with a stretch of amber sand.—M.M.



### CHATHAM HAS MAGNIFICENT CATHEDRAL

On Sunday the 13th, the R. C. Congregation of the neighboring town, moved upstairs for worship. Services for many years had been held in the basement, but now, in the Cathedral proper, they can worship, as the 'Latham World' says in the beautiful edifice that stands as a monument to the labor and zeal of the late Bishop Barry, and we would add, to all who liberally assisted him in his worthy work.

The cathedral has a seating capacity of about 2000, is beautifully finished interiorly and is perhaps not surpassed in this respect by any cathedral east of Quebec city. There are several large pillars of imitation marble of variegated coloring, the pulpit is of the same material, the sanctuary rail is marble, the pews and wainscoting are of oak, the ceiling and walls are in ornamental designs, the floor is of polished hardwood and has an incline so as to permit of a free view of the altar from the rear. There are no visible electric light fixtures to mar the beauty or disfigure the walls, the light being reflected from above through corrugated glass windows at either side. The building is steam heated.

### SOME COY ISLANDS.

They Do Not Like to Be Seen by Mankind.

A French Antarctic explorer, Maj. Charcot, has just succeeded in landing upon the "lost" island of Rokail, 300 miles west of the Hebrides—a feat it is claimed which has been achieved by no other man.

There is in the world something peculiarly exclusive about islands. Jan Meyen, for instance, 300 miles east of Greenland, screens its beauty in a veil of fog so successfully that in 1910, it was seen for the first time for fifty years. The "floating island" in Lake Derwentwater, after being visible for six or seven weeks, disappears altogether. Nushima, off Japan, is sometimes there, sometimes not.

Islands are always being thrown up or sunk. One appeared in the Serpent's Mouth Strait off Mexico recently. You never know where to look for them. The balance, however, is kept even, for in 1908, three island off Mexico suddenly disappeared altogether.

Islands cater for all tastes. In Macquarie Island there are 80,000,000 penguins and no men. Pitcairn Island is reserved solely for Seventh Day Adventists, while Bardsey, off the coast of Cardigan, boasts 29,000 saints, all buried, so as not to jostle the tourists. At St. Kilda you escape from doctors altogether. "We just die a natural death," explained an inhabitant, while the Tories of Tory Island have to pay \$10 to a doctor to come over to them at all. But they charge him \$20 to take him away again.

You could buy "the Isle of Dreams," off Lemon Bay, ten miles from Arcadia, for \$7,750 a little time ago, and the total wealth of the inhabitants of Pitcairn Island is reputed to amount to \$50, so it also would probably be going quite cheap.

There was an island, too, offered recently for one shilling, and the bidding for North Uist, in the Hebrides, was so slow that the only likely buyer was given a big lunch to induce him to take it.

If you want loneliness you might do worse than purchase Puka-Puka, an island in the Pacific, which is passed, not visited, by six ships in fifty years.

Learning English.

More than 100 students from all parts of the world—including Iceland, China, Austria and Lithuania—meet at University College, Gower street, W.C., London, Eng., for a course of English, according to the speech sounds. The first thing they have to be taught is how to open their mouths and work their tongues.

Mr. Lloyd James, assistant in phonetics at University College, who has organized the course, explained some of the mysteries of the matter. "To teach them," he said, "to say 'r' as in 'ready'—half of them cannot pronounce the letter at all—we make them curve their index finger, put it between the teeth and press it hard. Then they have to say 'r' as in 'pleasure,' and then their mouth and tongue is in the correct position to say 'r'.

"The Frenchman cannot say 'this.' He says 'zee.' Learning to say 'th,' he holds a mirror in front of his face. He opens his mouth and puts his tongue through; then he can say 'th.' All the students have mirrors which they use extensively, as it helps them to remember the positions."

\$200,000,000 for Religious Work.

Contributions amounting to more than \$200,000,000 were made by Protestant church members of the United States during the last year, according to a statistical table given out by an interdenominational council. The two general classifications are congregational expenses and missions and it is found that keeping the wheels going at home costs much more than effort outside the congregations or in other lands. The total of \$18,474,049 from the Methodist Episcopal Church (north) for missions and benevolence looks fairly formidable, but the same church spent \$49,911,750 for salaries of pastors and other local expenses.

The per capita gifts show the generosity of some of the smaller denominations. The Evangelical Association members provide \$20.72 each for religious matters at home and the Friends \$19.33, with the larger bodies considerably behind. The Presbyterian Church (south) with \$11.81 per member sets the pace in missionary givings per member.

Sewing Wood.

There has appeared in England recently a special plywood material for aircraft construction.

This new material must not be confused with ordinary plywood, which is glued together. It is claimed to be a super-plywood, and is actually sewn together.

First, the layers are cemented together with waterproof material, and then stitched through in parallel rows about one and a quarter inches apart. This gives a rigidity and resistance not to be attained by any other method.

Weight for weight, it is the strongest material yet invented. It is made in sheets of any size or shape up to eight feet wide by 50 feet long, and from one-eighth inch to five-eighths inch thick, thus doing away with waste in the conversion.

No More Jokers.

An ingenious mechanic in Munich has invented a contrivance which can be fixed to public fire alarms so that whoever rings the alarm is caught by the arm and held until the arrival of the firemen.

Punch.

Punch, it is said, came from the East Indies, and the name is claimed to be derived from the Sanskrit word meaning "five," on account of its five ingredients—rum, tea, sugar, lemon and hot water.



"The Bill will not let in Canadian wheat, but will save to the American farmer the right to raise a bushel of wheat instead of transferring that right to Canada."—Mr. Fordney, in introducing the Fordney Emergency Tariff Bill which has shut millions of dollars worth of Canadian foodstuffs out of the United States market.

"If we are to build up a self-sustaining agriculture here at home, the farmer must be protected from unfair competition from those countries where agriculture is still being exploited."—President Harding. They are also due to a like insistence of United States manufacturers and workers, who have seen their country develop tremendously and grow rich under a Protective Tariff, and who believe that a still further increase in Tariff is the only means of assuring continued prosperity.

**CONTRAST THE ATTITUDE OF THE UNITED STATES LEADERS WITH THAT OF CANADA'S WOULD-BE LEADERS, CRERAR AND KING**

Crerar proposes to allow American goods to enter the Canadian market free of duty.

King proposes that the present reasonable Tariff on the products of the American factory and farm shall be greatly reduced, and that the home market of the Canadian farmer and manufacturer alike shall be thrown open to our Southern neighbour, in the face of the United States Emergency tariff, which practically shuts out Canadian farm products from these markets, and also in the face of the permanent tariff now under consideration at Washington, which gives every promise of being even more drastic than the Emergency Tariff so far as our products are concerned.

In view of the attitude of the United States, what folly it is for Crerar and King to propose throwing open the Canadian market to a flood

of both agricultural and manufactured products of the United States when there is not the slightest possibility of any compensative advantage to Canada.

Does any sane Canadian believe that Crerar or King, hat in hand, could persuade the United States Government to completely reverse its Tariff policies and agree to reciprocal trade in face of American public demand for a high protective Tariff?

The people of the United States conduct their affairs and protect themselves by the principle that "Business is business." Why should Canada do otherwise?

Unlike Crerar or King, MEIGHEN stands firm for a reasonable Tariff to protect all our industries—those of the farm, the sea, the mine, the forest, the factory, and for the building up of a bigger and better Canada through the full development of the home market.

**CANADA NEEDS PROTECTION**

The more the tariff question is studied out, and the tariffs of other countries examined, the more necessary it seems to be, that a National policy of protection, should be placed on guard, as a guarantee of safety and prosperity, for the true development and growth of every phase and department of Canadian business and industry.

And at a time, when every other Country in the world operates their fiscal policy, under a high protective tariff, the opponents of the Government in Canada, are advocating a lowering of our tariff, even to the length of Free Trade, in the face of the fact that the Government of the United States, has raised a tariff wall against us, with the evident intention of shutting out Canadian production to as great an extent as they can. The advocates of a lower tariff as a Canadian policy either cannot or will not see that to do so, in the immediate vicinity of a country with a high tariff against us, is simply to aim a blow against every class of society in our Dominion whatever their business occupation or work. It is a one sided policy, crushing to Canadian interests, and most certainly would be advantageous to the interests of the nation to the South of us.

Nor are the people of today, any more likely to accept the Free trade or lowered tariff doctrines of its advocates, than they were a decade ago, to accept the Reciprocity pact, sought then to be foisted upon the Country. It on the face of it, seemed to be a very nice thing, a case of mutual return, and some of the Reciprocity politicians are still, alive, but Canada sternly refused to be led into the web, and frenchantly hurled its advocates from power. Now those same politicians would have us believe that the Tariff question, is not the issue before the country. They dread it, the people know their past record, and if the people of our Dominion, fully realize the fact, that the tariff question, is the most important issue in Canada today, the doom of lower tariff advocates is sealed. They will have no more use for the mixed up fiscal policy of Free Trade, or low tariff advocates, than they had for their former policy of Reciprocity, more especially as there are high tariff walls against us.

Reciprocity was unsuited to Canada, and Canadians acted accordingly. Tariff measures advocated by the opponents of the Meighen Government, are equally unsuited to our circumstances and position, and every sentiment of loyal Canadianism, should give it, its death blow on the 6th of December. Never mind what the people to the south of us, think about it. We know it would rejoice some of them to see Canada take a step which would tend to give them a commercial and industrial power over us. What care they if our manufacturing industries are crippled, or even wiped out. They are not at all concerned as to whether Canadian workmen and laborers, can find employment, within our Country, and it is a matter of indifference to them, whether our farmers, have a home market or any other market, and believe it or not, is the feeling, to which some of them gave utterance when the Reciprocity talk was on the slate. "America should own it all, from the equator to the North Pole." Roused to action, Canada at the polls, sent back the reply—what we have, we will hold, we have nailed our colors to the mast, Canada shall remain Canadian; and Canada has prospered, is prospering and in a better position today, notwithstanding the drawbacks of the great war, and its aftermath of unrest; than any other portion of the Great Empire of which we are part. There is no necessity for us, to lower our standard, Canada is quite capable of managing her own affairs. We can still have the friendliest feeling towards our American neighbors, many of them are our own Kith and Kin. Peace we have, and peace we desire. May frowning guns never be placed along our boundary lines. We will not love the less, but we will love Canada more, and the flag that waves over us; just as Americans love their land, the best, and the star spangled banner, which floats above them.

**CHANGING SCENES—MOVIE POLITICS**

In fact it is the summing up, and examining the evidence as given by some of these Liberal Journals, independent of their Editorial opinions—which compels Government supporters, to the opinion, that in the present crisis, the placing in power of the King—Crerar—Fielding kind of a Liberal party, would be the worst thing which could happen to Canada, on December the 6th. La Minerve a French newspaper of Quebec has become so disgusted with them, that it is led to say "Liberals" have a different policy for each different audience, and a different programme for every contingency and constituency. ## TERRIBLE POISON GAS.

A Dozen Lewisite Bombs Would Destroy Whole.

Since the war all the great powers have been hard at work on the gas problem. For it seems to be fully recognized that in future international conflicts poison gas will be the chief killer.

To the every-day peaceable citizen this idea is particularly interesting, inasmuch as it is expected that cities and towns will be systematically deluged with gas, dropped in bombs from airplanes. Whole populations—men, women and children—will be wiped out by the gas.

Gas operations during the recent war were crude and hardly more than experimental. Next time they will be conducted on a huge scale, scientifically, and with chemicals incomparably more destructive to human life.

Soon after this new and frightful weapon came into use, it was realized that what was really needed was a gas that would be invisible and odorless, so as to give no warning of its presence in the atmosphere. It must, of course, be heavier than air, so as to sink into dugouts and cellars, where refuge might be sought, and there remain, as it were, in pools.

In addition, to be wholly satisfactory, it must poison the human system by mere contact with the skin, so that gas-masks would furnish no protection.

The Allies chemical warfare services were working hard on this problem during the war, and solved it. A gas called "Lewisite" was developed which met all of the above-mentioned requirements, and great quantities of it were being manufactured for use in the expected campaign of 1919, when suddenly the armistice came.

A gas bomb is a mere container; its walls only thick enough to hold the gas in; hence nearly all of its weight is represented by its contents. A single such gravity projectile may carry 500 or 1,000 pounds of the lethal stuff, and if dropped upon a town it cannot miss the target. It is estimated that a dozen Lewisite bombs of large size might, with a favoring breeze, destroy the entire population of a big city.

It is understood that since the armistice the chemical warfare service has produced a gas that is even more effective than Lewisite, inasmuch as its spread is far greater relatively to the quantity of chemical used. A mere capsule of it in a small grenade can generate acres of death.

Facts such as these cannot be made too widely known or impressed too fully upon people's minds in order that fear and horror of war may become so great that nations will no longer undertake that criminal method of settling their quarrels.

## Japan Covets Siberia.

Everybody seems to imagine that Japan wants to gobble China. Not so, writes Chase S. Osborn, Jr., in the Fresno Republican. Siberia is the objective. While the world is encouraged to believe that Shantung is just the beginning of an effort to seize the major portion of China, Japan is turning elsewhere. True or not, it would seem good strategy. In search of minerals and food, thus to provide opportunity for industrial expansion, Nippon eyes Siberia, says Mr. Osborn, going on to say:

"While Japan has gone as far as she can in a territorial way in China, Siberia, alone and unprotected, and so far without being claimed by any foreign power, offers an attractive plum that makes the Japanese eye shine with an eager desire.

"Siberia, with its untold wealth, iron, coal, timber, tin, gold, fisheries, agriculture—everything and anything in quantities that have defied the science of man to measure—Siberia, a vast storehouse, untouched and unclaimed except by natives, defenceless but for a defiant will—

"Siberia, that is but a few hours away from Tokio—and Osaka—Siberia, the land that offers a solution for a vexing problem—that is the great prize. Japan is striving to get it with all of her tremendous energy and cunning."

Manna Harvested in Desert. Manna is found now in the regions of upper Mesopotamia and Kurdistan and along the Persian frontier. It falls, says an official in Jerusalem, in the form of dew during September, October, and November, and lodges upon the leaves of oak trees. It immediately hardens and assumes the form of a grain. Early in the morning before the heat of the day it is gathered by spreading sheets beneath the trees, which are shaken, and the manna is then collected and stored for winter to be used as a food or shipped to Bagdad for sale in the bazaar. The manna falls on other vegetation, including grass, but all of it is lost except that which is gathered from the oak leaves. The manna is sweet and is eaten by the natives as a substitute for sugar or honey.

Love In Mid-Air. The first recorded marriage proposal in mid-air was announced recently. Marriages in the clouds have become as common as those in a lion's cage, and there was a recent case in Calcutta where a wedding party of twelve went up in a Handley-Page machine and had the ceremony conducted at a height of 6,000 feet.

While flying in an airplane at half this height, George Hauser, head of the production department of the Curtiss airplane plant, found courage to propose to Miss Mildred Armstrong, a school teacher. He was accepted.

King and Crerar calmly propose to meet this action by admitting, duty free, into Canada, All U. S. Farm Products.

We did import in 1920 \$110,000,000 worth of Farm Products from the U.S. What would be the figure if the Tariff Bars were down, say, in 1922?

### VALUABLE ACCIDENTS.

How Some Important Discoveries Were Made.

Accident rather than necessity seems most often to be the mother of invention.

The X-ray is one of the most remarkable of modern discoveries; yet mere chance revealed it to Roentgen while he was working with a Crookes tube.

How should we get along without pneumatic tires? That wonderful idea sprang from nothing more remarkable than a piece of garden hose which a man in England tied around the wheel of his wheelbarrow.

A Frenchman named Montgolfier, airing one of his wife's frocks, noticed that it tended to rise when inflated with warm air. When his wife came home she found him sending up paper balloons--the first balloons ever made.

A careless workman in a paper mill forgot to add "size" to a batch of pulp and the paper made from it had to be thrown away. Somebody used a scrap of it to write on, and discovered its absorbent quality. Hence our blotting paper.

In 1825, the wife of a blacksmith at Troy, washing her husband's shirts, was annoyed to observe the collars got dirty before the garments were much soiled otherwise. She made separate collars, the first ever known, and sold them to her neighbors. A few years later several collar factories in Troy were doing a profitable business, and to-day that city is the collar-making center of the United States.

George Westinghouse accidentally picked up on a train a magazine which contained a description of a compressed-air drill used in boring the Mont Cenis tunnel. It gave him the idea for his pneumatic brake, which revolutionized railroading.

A glass cutter at Nuremberg dropped some aquafortis on his spectacles. Very provoking, for it spoiled them. But the accident gave rise to the art of etching on glass.

A railway switchman in England, in 1846, had two station signals, some distance apart, to mind. He fastened the two levers together with a long wire, using a broken iron chair for a counterweight, and ran the wire on into his hut, where he sat nightly by the stove comfortably, working the signals without setting foot outside. The management of the road learned of the trick, reprimanded him for laziness, promoted and rewarded him for his ingenuity and adopted his invention.
