An Act respecting the Union of certain Methodist Churches therein named.
An Act to Amend an Act respecting the carriage of mail.

LATEST TELEGRAMS.
London, April 16.
The report from Suakin that Khartoum has surrendered to the rebels is not entitled to any credit. The direct advice from General Gordon, though they run only to the fact that he has been killed, is that he could have reached Suakin overland from Khartoum.
London, April 17.
A despatch to the Times from Khartoum dated April 7th, says: 'People are heart sick of hoping for English relief. The town is starving, and the rebels are in a rebel camp. Our Krupp munition is rather short. The situation is critical. The rebels have frustrated an attempt to send a steamer to Suakin. Gen. Graham will probably be driven to retreat by Central Africa. Retreat by Berber is impossible.'
