

This great archbishop of Milan it was who forbade the entrance to the Emperor Theodosius, after the massacre of Salonics. In the course buildings have grown up around the church, gradually concealing it from view. Now the order has been given to demelish all the buildings that stand between this venerable basilica and the Piazza of St. Ambrose. When this has been accomplished, the facade of the church, which faces the Via San Vittoria, will be visible from quite a distance, and no longer obscured by a crowd of unimportant houses and shops.

The Agricultural and Dairy Commis-sioner, Prof. J. W. Robertson, has ar-ranged for the opening of a dairy school for the Maritime Provinces at Sussex on the 21st of March next. Two courses of instruction in cheese-making and milk-testing will be given. The first one will open on Tuesday, 31st March, and end on Friday. 10th April. The second course begins on the 14th April and closes on the 24th. Students may take either or both terms if there is room for all during the second term. There will be evening lectures, and at least four mublic meetings at which leading dairymen from abroad will deliver ad dresses.
