LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

SEVENTEEN persons were killed and thirty seven injured in the collision last Sunday evening on the Orleans Railway at Javisy, France.

The town of Carrabelle, Florida, was almost completely destroyed by a wind storm on Thursday last. Several people were killed, so says the report.

His Grace Archbishop O'Brien and Very Rev. Mgr. Murphy of Halifax arrived here on Saturday evening last, on a visit. This week they are at the Sea Side, Rustico.

Mr. Aaron's naturalization as a British subject is the cause of a great fuss in the United States. Some of the Republican patriots of New York had him burned in effigy.

We regret to learn that Mr. Fredk McEwen, Greenwick, fell from his barn loft to the floor, a distance of 18 or 20 feet while pitching hay. His spine was some what severely injured.

The enormous majorities by which Australian federation has been approved in Victoria and Tasmania indicate that whatever doubts existed about the idea has disappeared for good and all.

In the Cape Town Assembly on Friday last, Cecil Rhodes said the Transvaal difficulty would be overcome in a few months without a shot being fired, owing to the mutual moderation displayed.

The schooner "Our Hope," last week reported grounded on the bar at St. Peter's Harbor, but has since floated and brought to St. Peter's, where the damage will be examined and repaired.

A MAN named Herman Haaser, Treasurer of the Herald Theatre, N. Y. jumped from the Brooklyn Bridge on Thursday night last. He was rescued and taken to a hospital. Craze from drink is given as the cause of his rash act.

New Jersey was visited by a tornado on Wednesday last causing great damage to buildings and property. Several churches were blown down, two theatres and scores of dwellings were unroofed. The damage is estimated at a quarter of a million.

A TROLLEYCAR filled with passengers, running between Shelton and Bridgeport, was on the tracks at Orange Bridge, a short distance from Stratford Conn. and fell fifty feet on Saturday. Thirty people were killed and many were injured.

THERE are said to be, so far, sixteen applicants for the Senatorship made vacant by the death of Senator Leavelle. Many of these gentlemen are members of the House of Commons who are anxious to "get in out of the rain" before the next election.

A LONDON despatch of the 4th says: The South of England has had a heavy rain, and it is heavy. The weather is splendid, and the acreage above the usual. Fruit was never better; cherries are exceptionally fine, and apples and black and red currants are splendid.

WHILE a crowd of excursionists were on their way to see the shipwreck at Beaufort Harbor Maine on Sunday a gangway from the dock to the boat at the Mount Desert Ferry broke, precipitating more than one hundred into the water. Twenty bodies have been recovered, and it is estimated that the dead will number thirty or more.

A BAZAR in aid of the Convent de Notre Dame, Rustico, will be held by the ladies of the Convent on Tuesday next the 15th inst. Preparations are now in course for the success of the affair and a most agreeable time will surely be spent by all who visit the bazaar. It should be largely patronized.

The Pope is reported to have expressed himself as follows, in a recent interview: "Yes, I am going on very well. I feel that I shall live for several years. I shall be content if I see the first few years of the twentieth century, an age which will be very brilliant, more so than any preceding age, and particularly so, I hope, for the Catholic faith."

It appears that the French Minister of War, General the Marquis de Gallifet, has absconded with military witnesses at the court martial of Captain Dreyfus at Rennes from professional secrecy, with the exception that he has requested them not to divulge the names of the French agents abroad or disclose anything which would complicate the foreign relations of France.

AN explosion in a quarry at Clouy, Province of Vanure, Belgium six men were killed and five others injured Sunday on the Seaview Electric Railway running between Wickford and Narragansett Pier, which resulted in the death of Merritt Lyman Abbey, aged 50 years motorman of the Southbound trolley, who was crushed between the two cars. There were forty passengers on the two cars, only one of whom was injured.

AMONG the shipments to London by the Furness liner Halifax City, which sailed from Halifax on Friday last, was a carload of frozen salmon. They were loaded at Chatham, N. P., in cold storage car 8021, and were received at the ship's gangway in splendid condition. The interior of the car presented quite a frigid appearance, the walls and floor being decorated with hoar frost. The contents of the car were transferred to the steamer's cold storage apartment in good shape, and with a prospect of arriving in London in prime condition. Some of the railway men who inspected the cold storage facilities on board the steamer say that the temperature was like the Klondike in midwinter.

It is pointed out by Mr. Devin that whatever Mr. Sifton may be himself, he certainly has an extraordinary collection of friends. One of his closest is W. T. Preston of "Hug the Machine" fame. To Preston he is so much attached that he says nothing can deprive the campaigner of his \$5,000 job, with expenses thrown in. Preston's job which was given to him just after the West High Bill, is a long through Europe at the public expense with an interpreter and a valet. While on his trip he is supposed to be inspecting emigration agencies; but of course he is having a right good time, for which the producers of Canada are paying. Preston is evidently weary after his campaign in West Haron, South Ontario, and elsewhere for Mr. Hardy; and the Federal Government turned in to give him a holiday at the expense of the people.
