latest make of steel nen. Between the two in the long history of the pen came the reed, then the quill. Steel pens are almost in universal use now and are made by the ton and in increasing volume

The improvement of making the point detachable followed quickly, and to keep the point slit, as they are to-day. Steep pens in the early days costs 25 cents each sometimes double that

The Famous Structure is in Danger of Collapsing.

Unless remedial measures are taken, it is possible that the famous leaning tower of Pisa may ultimately collapse as did the Campanile at Venice a few years ago. Measurements taken by the English engineer in 1829 showed the tower to be 1516 feet out of the perpendicular. Measurements taken recently show that the divergence has increased to 1614 feet It should be within the resources of modern engineering to excavate below the tower, bring it gradually back to the verical and place beneath it an absolutely secure foundation.
