## The Evening Chit-Chat

If you had ten thousand dollars given you when you were born would you begin to waste it and miss it without getting half the possible return from it, as soon as you were old enough to do so? I'll answer for you: No, of course not.

Now would you sell your eyes for ten thousand dollars? I'll answer again. No, most emphatically, of course not.

Why then do you foolishly waste and misuse and spend without getting half the possible return, these little organs which you acknowledge to be a heritage worth far more to you than ten thousand dollars?

I wonder if I have a single reader who does not in some way or other abuse his eyes occasionally.

I doubt it.

For there are so many ways of carelessly misreating these extremely delicate organs.

Reading or working in the twilight of these all too short winter afternoons is probably the most common at this time of year.

A close second at any time of year is the habit of reading at a lamp so improperly shaded as to let the light fall on the eyes as well as on the book or work.

In buying a lamp for the family reading table one should be most careful about this detail. Many expensive lamps have shades that do not come down nearly far enough.

I know a girl who bought a lamp of this description for her room at college and lost six months of her college career and nearly ruined her eyes from the trouble that set in before she realized her mistake.

In buying a reading lamp it is well

too, to remember that green is much the most restful color for the shade.

If children were only trained as carefully as they should be to always sit at work or reading with the light falling over the shoulder and never coming toward them we should have another bad source of eye-strain removed.

Reading when lying down is apt to be bad for the eyes, but it can be done without injury if the reader is careful never to place the book so that he will have to look up. Let him turn on his side so that he can look down, and if the light is good and he does not read too long at a stretch, there should be no trouble.

Eye glasses which are allowed to get bent and out of focus are another foolish waste of eye energy. No matter how good your glasses they will not do you good if they do not rest on the nose just right, and it is the easiest thing in the world for them to get out of place.

To get the full eye rest from glasses one should go to an optician at least once in three months and have glasses adjusted. Your regular optician will doubtless do this free of charge.

One more eye hint that I have found almost invaluable. And that is the habit of bathing the eyes in hot water when they are tired or strained. Nothing—except sleep, perhaps—refreshes and rests the eyes like five minutes of bathing with cloths saturated in water as hot as one can stand.

A prominent physician says that if we only realized how many headaches, how many baffling nervous disorders and stomach ailments, how much pessimism, melancholia and general "crankiness"—so-called—were traceable to some trouble with the eyes we would be more careful of these wonderful little organs.

I wish, then, there were some way we could be made to realize it.

## Household Notes.

When baking an apple pie, put a teaspoonful or two of strong cold tea in the filling; also try the same in your apple sauce or baked apples and notice the improved flavor.

Mint sandwiches are tasty for supper or afternoon tea. Mince the leaves from one or two bunches, season with oil, vinegar, salt and paprika, and spread between slices of bread and butter.

In baking biscuits have the oven quite hot at first, but lower the temperature just a little before the biscuits are ready to take out. This will add materially in making the biscuits light.

Tie a narrow ribbon bow above the handle of your umbrella. Leave a loop long enough to slip over your arm when you go shopping. This is a good way to avoid losing your favorite umbrella.

If a picture be crushed in the mail, dampen the creases, press with a warm iron and then place under a press or weight for a short time, having first protected the picture side by covering with white paper.

Fish scales may easily be removed by pouring hot water on them slowly until the scales curl, then scraping quickly. Wash in several waters, having the last cold and well salted, and no slime will be left.

Housekeepers who have tried both ways say that it is far better to trim

the selvage from material before making it into pillow cases. The cases will be much smoother and will not wrinkle along the seam.

The objectionable sputtering and frying of hot fat when eggs, hominy, apples and the like things are dropped into it to fry may be prevented if a little flour be sifted into the fat just before they are added.

The cold macaroni au gratin may be made into delicious croquettes by mixing it with a very little stiff white sauce and then letting it get very cold, forming into croquette shapes and rolling in egg and bread crumbs and frying.

When buttons are taken from an old dress they should be loosely strung on a thread before being put into a button box. This is a time-saver and keeps the buttons from getting lost or several of the set from being lost.

A delicious salad for cold fish is made of ordinary white sauce to which a couple of tablespoons of cream have been used with the milk and a herring boned and meshed fine added with a little lemon juice. This is especially tasty with a rather coarse white-meat fish.

## President Taft and Reciprocity.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 11.

Before an immense audience of the National Corn Exposition, President Taft fired the first big administration gun for Reciprocity with Canada. The speech aimed particularly to quell the fears of the farmers. He declared the greatest reason for adopting the agreement was the fact that it would unite two countries with kindred people lying together across the wide continent in commercial and social union to the great advantage of both. The Reciprocity Treaty with Canada, said President Taft, must do rather with agricultural products than that manufactured. Let the agreement be adopted and go into operation and six months hence farmers on the border who now have fears will rejoice in this great step toward closer business and social relations with our neighbors. The whole country, farmer, manufacturer, railroad company, middleman, householder, all will be gainers. Upon the heels of Taft's speech 300 members of the Ohio Corn Improvement Association adopted resolutions condemning the proposed reduction in the tariff on farm products.

### NO APPEAL.

It may be remembered that Sir Robert Bond on Wednesday said:—

"Under the Award of The Hague Tribunal this dispute as to the use of purse seines, and as to other prohibitions, was to be referred, as I have already stated, to a special Commission of Experts, to consist of an American, a Dutchman and a Britisher. In the event of our representative not agreeing with the other two, there was left to us an appeal to The Hague for a finalization of the dispute. But now, if I understand aright, the Government has deprived the Colony of this right of appeal by entering into a special agreement with the authorities of Washington to substitute another Tribunal in which the decision of the American and Dutchman will be final. This, I think, was a most unfortunate blunder. No doubt it will be said in extension that it was done to avoid the large expense of another appeal to The Hague. My answer is that all the money so far expended will be so much thrown away if we lost this reference, and that our safety lies in appealing to a Court constituted as was The Hague Tribunal. Was this return to The Hague, or to a special Commission, on the subject of regulations, the menace implied in the words of American Counsel to which I have referred? Probably, because he dwelt with more force than justice upon the poverty of our people. He may have reasoned thus in his mind: A further reference to The Hague or to a special Commission means nothing financially speaking to a great and wealthy nation such as the United States, but it will mean much to an insignificant, poverty-stricken country. This I say may have been the thought that found expression in the menace to which Lord Robson took exception."

A copy of the Agreement was tabled

of the Experts is that there is no appeal in Article IV.

The Award as to the findings of the Expert Commission under Article III is in part as follows:—

"If not on the whole unanimous, i.e., on all points which in the opinion of the Tribunal are of essential importance, the Tribunal shall make its Award as to regulations concerned after consideration of the conclusions of the Expert Commissioners and after hearing argument by counsel."

Under Article IV, however, The Hague Tribunal is ousted. This is how Section 7 of the Award on Article IV, reads:—

"The unanimous decision of the two natural Commissioners, or the majority decision of the Empire and one Commissioner shall be final and binding."

# That Guarantee!

Our Points Proved by Evidence of Conduct and Speeches of Sir Edward P. Morris and Hon. Robert Watson.

We are glad to find that the Daily News considers that it is "admittedly desirable" to add words to the guarantee clause of the Cold Storage Agreement to make it clear that the Government will not have to pay more than 5 per cent. a year on cash expended on Cold Storage plants and equipment, and that in any case the sum to be so paid should not exceed \$25,000 in any one year.

It is true that in the 1898 Agreement such words of limitation are not to be found, but they found a place in the 1904 Agreement at a time when Sir Edward Morris was Attorney General.

The debate at the time showed that the Opposition of the day did not consider them unnecessary to render the Government immune from a liability for loss on the business as well as a 5 per cent. dividend.

On the contrary, a well known accountant who occupied a seat on the Opposition benches on those days, and who is now a member of the present Executive and holds the portfolio of Colonial Secretary, the Hon. R. Watson, in spite of the proviso, that payment was not to exceed the sum of \$25,000 in any one year, we repeat—Mr. Watson pointed out that there was a contingency under which the Company could claim to be paid the sum to make up the losses and to furnish a dividend of five per cent. We give a part of this debate dealing with this discussion:—

"Mr. Watson.—The clause in those resolutions which provides for the Government guarantee is the same as that which appeared in the Bill submitted last session. On that occasion he had pointed out to the Minister of Justice (Sir E. P. Morris), who was in charge of the bill, that the clause was not specific enough. It states that the Government shall guarantee the sum by which the profits shall be less than 5 per cent. of the value of the company's buildings, &c., the sum not to exceed \$25,000.

Now, when the company puts up buildings, &c., to the value of \$500,000, the guarantee is clearly defined at not more than 5 per cent. \$25,000. But he, Mr. W., submitted that when the company's plant was of less value than \$500,000, we might have to pay more than 5 per cent. For instance, suppose the value of the buildings, &c., &c., during the first year is \$250,000, our guarantee should not then exceed \$12,500. But the bill places the limit of the guarantee at \$25,000. His contention was, that if the company met a loss that year of \$12,500, the Government, having to make up the sum, by which profit shall be short of 5 per cent., WILL

HAVE FIRST TO CONTRIBUTE \$12,500. THE AMOUNT OF THE LOSS, AND THEN ANOTHER \$12,500 FOR THE PROFIT GUARANTEED WHICH IN THE CASE MENTIONED WOULD MEAN AN ACTUAL GUARANTEE OF 10 PER CENT. He did not think that was intended by this Committee.

Sir R. Bond.—The intention is that the guarantee shall not exceed 5 per cent. in any year.

Mr. Watson.—That being so, he submitted that the clause referring to the guarantee should be more clearly defined, in order that there may be no doubt whatever on the matter. It should be definitely stated that the Government guarantee shall in no year exceed 5 per cent. in the value of the company's buildings and machinery at that time."

Mr. Watson's suggestion was followed, for we find in the published agreement the proviso: "Such payment not to exceed a sum equal to five per cent. on such value," as well as the original proviso, "and in no case to exceed the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars in any one year."

All this was done with Mr. E. P. Morris as Attorney General and Mr. Morris, K.C., as leader of the Opposition.

It is somewhat singular that both provisos should be dropped now. The \$25,000 limit was Hon. E. P. Morris's child. He had the proviso of a maximum annual payment of \$25,000 in his 1903 bill and in that year explained to the Assembly the meaning of the guarantee, viz., "the guarantee was solely to make up a deficit in the earnings of the company, if it did not make a profit of 5 per cent. on its plant." But Sir Edward Morris limited the payment to a maximum of \$25,000 in any one year.

The other proviso was Mr. Watson's, which excluded in any case the making up of losses and limited the payment to a 5 per cent. on plant capital.

It should be remembered that the Hon. R. Watson signed the agreement on behalf of the Colony and that Sir Edward Morris is in charge of the measure.

Why have Sir Edward Morris and Mr. Watson abandoned these precautions in the agreement tabled on Friday? These provisos of old were their own. Why have they now abandoned these means of protecting the Colony against heavy losses?

We call upon both of these gentlemen not only to stand by their own and to insert precautions, admittedly desirable, but which their conduct and words have shown to be absolutely necessary to protect the Colony.

### Obscene Pictures and Mail Service Stopped.

The mail service to Bell Island has been stopped since last Saturday. The s.s. Euphrates left Portugal Cove Saturday to go to the Island with mails and passengers and had to come back without landing either mails or passengers. She started again and got jammed three quarters of a mile out from the Cove. Cape St. Francis reports to-day that the whole shore is covered with ice. The s.s. Mary is held up here at St. John's waiting to get round the Cape since last Wednesday.

Rev. Father O'Callaghan started the congregation at the R. C. Cathedral yesterday when he preached at 11 o'clock Mass. He said that it had come to his notice and to the cognizance of other priests in the parish that obscene and beastly and immoral pictures and books were being circulated in the families of the Cathedral parish and were being treasured secretly and read by the young people. The pictures were too abominable and the books too fiendish to even refer to, and there was no doubt on his mind that they were destroying the purity and innocence of hundreds of souls. He quoted one particular case where "the mother of the family read one of these soul destroying books to her children." It was almost inconceivable, nevertheless it was a fact. Father O'Callaghan appeal to the congregation to make a dead set against these pictures and books, and to recognize it was a duty on their part to expose the people who trafficked in them.

CUT HIS FOOT.—Mr. Kenneth Butler, while in cutting wood near Manuels last Thursday, allowed the axe to slip and cut his foot very severely. He was assisted home by his fellow workmen after the wound had been temporarily bound. Dr. Chisholm was called and put seven stitches in the wound.
