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

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

Hunting a Man-Eater.

Graphic Account of a Successi ful Stalk in India.

A correspondent of the English. man gives a graphic account of the successful stalking of a big maneating tiger in Monrbharj (India), the beast had appeared in a village and partly eaten one of the inhabit. ans. News of the raid was brought to the writer, who thus describes what followed: 'I was further told that the tiger-had taken shelter in a plantain garden attached to the house of a raiyut in the village. I hastened to the village on foot; as no conveyance was available at the time of the day, On my arrival I could not, however, find Master Stripes in the aforesaid garden. Many people of the village had climbed up the t ees in the vicinity and had been watching the movements of the tiger. They said that a little before my arrival it bad removed to an adjoining bush, which, though small, was very thick. All my attempts to have a glimpse of the animal failed, and at last I was obliged to aislodge him from the bush by pelting it with stones. The monster gave two stunning roars and with the speed of lightning covered a distance of about a quarter of a mile through the compounds of several houses of the village. Among associated mechanical uses seagumite is well adapted for motor gear, switchboard panels, switch handles, steam and gas packings, especially for high pressures. The product is also well suited to replace leather in belting and all the other varied uses of







Local Loans.

In discussing the Resolution to raise a loan of \$250,000 for Lighthouses and Telephones, Mr. Clift or March 28th last made a strong poin which is to be found in the official report of his speech published in the Daily News to-day. The argument he advanced was not met at all either by the Prime Minister or the Minister o Finance in speeches they made subse

nently. He said, in part:
"I would like to draw the attention of the Committee to the fact that al though there has not been any differ ence of opinion in this debate as fa as I can see as to the desirability o extending our lighthouse system, or as to the desirability of extending our telephone system, yet we come in here and sit down and vote for the raising of a loan of \$250,000 without asking ourselves any questions as to the pos sibility of getting that money within the immediate future."
"We come in and vote authority t

raise loans without asking ourselve whether we are justified as legislators in increasing, even for necessary ser vices of lighthouses and telephones our obligations in the way of loans Now at the present time there is an authority for a loan of \$520,000 which was passed in the session of 1911. O that loan only \$295,000 has been taken up, and there is a balance remain ing to be taken up of \$225,000. That loan has been advertised for some time and there still remains that bal ance to be subscribed. Of that \$295, 000 taken up, \$200,000 was taken up by the fund set aside for old age pensions. That results leave \$25.00 techniques to the still sions. That would leave \$95,000 tak-

en up by the public."
"The Minister advertised \$520,000 in 1910 and only \$95,000 has been subscribed by the public; and now we are going into the local market askpause and consider this matter before we place more loans on the market As a matter of fact there is a 1910 loan of \$400,000 that still appears on the Statute Book. There is a 1911 loan of \$520,000. I presume it was intended when passing that loan bill in 1911 to repeal the previous authority, but I do not think the 1911 act repeals it. It is all well enough for us to talk about expending money for aids to navigation and in other ne-cessary work; but we should first of all make sure that we know where that money is to come from, and

General Booth at 83 years

SPEECH TO AUDIENCE THAT HE Sponge Fingers

"Day by day, week by week, my sight has been failing me, until now have to talk to immense audiences as I do to-night, without being able to see the countenances of any one of my hearers." Standing bravely erect, General Booth in calm, even tones which contained no note of complaint,

made this pathetic confession of affliction to 10,000 of his people gathered in the Albert Hall, London, last night to celebrate his 83 birthday. For upwards of forty minutes the general addressed the vast gathering.

"I regret," he said, "that while my friends can see me I have not the privilege of seeing them. The inspiration that would have been derived State in succession to the late Senator from looking into their faces is denied me." Then was evinced the splendid optimism of the man. "However, he exclaimed in a voice of triumphant conviction, "I am thankful I have been able to keep to the fight, and in few days, as is pretty well known, am to undergo an operation which is to restore my vision and make me young man once more." (Cheers.)

Never once did he allow the shadow of his ailment to cast a gloom over is speech. Confidence breathed in every syllable he uttered. 





The Cabmen's Position.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,-There cannot be any oubt whatever that in the framing

of the Cabmen's tariff by the Council a gross injustice was done them, and it only needs but a very cursory examination of the schedule of fares to to demonstrate the truthfulness of the above statement. For instances as was pointed out by the Hon. Mr. Gibbs, K.C., when he addressed the Council on behalf of the Union, that twenty years ago if a cabman drove a fare to Logy Bay, Outer Cove, Middle ove and Torbay and thence to the city he was paid \$4.00, under the tariff framed by the Council he will get but \$2.70. For the past twenty or thirty years a cabman for going to Donovan's received \$3.00, under the Council's tariff he would be compelled to accept \$1.50. If this is not rank injustice to a class of men who are earning a bare living only, and some even not that, then I do not know the meaning of the word "injustice." To still further demonstrate the unfairness of the Council's atti tude to the Union:

Twenty years ago a carriage was provided for \$200.00 Two horses 200.00 Two sets of harness for

a total of \$460.00. This covered the cost of a Cabman's outfit at that time. To-day in order for a Cabman to engage in the business he has to incur the following expenses:-

Victoria Carriage \$420.00 Two Horses Two Sets of Harness 140.00 without taking into account other ingidentals, or a difference of \$600 greater than it was twenty or thirty ears ago, with the cost of feed for herses even greater still. Then ; for any sane body of men to sit down and frame a tariff which forces men tolay to work for less remuneration han they did twenty years ago car-

Does the Mayor construct buildings for the same price or does he pay his masons and laborers the same wages as he did twenty years ago? He does not, and he could not get men to work if he tried for the wages paid last year, then why should he force qually deserving citizens to work for ess remuneration than they did twenty years. Does Councillor Mullaly sell coal to-day for the same price as he sold it for last year? Certainly he does not, then why should he force Cabmen to go to Donovan's or \$1.50, a distance of fourteer niles. The question which is upper nost in the minds of thousands is Are the majority of the members o the Board competent for the worl which they have undertaken to do! The Cabmen's tariff is a sample of the ich order of intelligence which ani mates their decisions and deliberations. The cabmen do not want favors, they only ask justice, and justice the cabmen are going to have.

As citizens and taxpayers we have a right to be heard, we demand tha right, and we are not going to b valved aside by any act of the Mayo r any other Councillor of the Board Ve know that there are some Coun illors of the Board who are anxiou see justice done, we want to se hom give effect to their desires Come. Councillors Martin, Ryan hanning and Coaker, we believe you are animated to do justice to all citizens, and we now ask you to do us justice. This matter of cabmen's fares cannot be postponed, it mus not be postponed, the Cabmen ar anxious to conform to the law, bu they are not going to be driven to it with a whip of injustice hanging over them. As this matter is of vital importance to cabmen, I intend with your permission, Mr. Editor, to keep this question going in the press until




