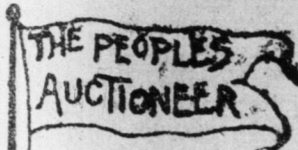

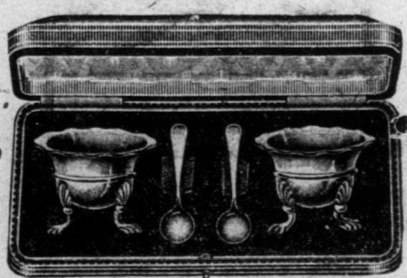

Hunting a Man-Eater.

Graphic Account of a Successful Stalk in India.

A correspondent of the Englishman gives a graphic account of the successful stalking of a big man-eating tiger in Monrabharj (India), the beast had appeared in a village and partly eaten one of the inhabitants. News of the raid was brought to the writer, who thus describes what followed: "I was further told that the tiger had taken shelter in a plain garden attached to the house of a raiyat in the village. I hastened to the village on foot, as no conveyance was available at the time of the day. On my arrival I could not, however, find Master Stripes in the adjacent garden. Many people of the village had climbed up the trees in the vicinity and had been watching the movements of the tiger. They said that a little before my arrival it had run to an adjoining bush, which, though small, was very thick. All my attempts to have a glimpse of the animal failed, and at last I was obliged to dislodge him from the bush by pelting it with stones. The monster gave two stunning roars and with the speed of lightning covered a distance of about a quarter of a mile through the compounds of several houses of the village. The people who had accompanied me fled in all directions. I attempted to follow the brute, but lost him.

"Presently conflicting news regarding the whereabouts of the animal was brought to me, and I made a search in the bushes situated in the outskirts of the village. At about four p. m. a man came running to me and said that he had seen the tiger take shelter under a bamboo clump not very far off. I ran towards the clump, and sure there was the brute, seated on his hind legs with his abdomen exposed to my rifle. I took the chance and fired from a distance of nearly 50 yards. The thud of the bullet was distinctly heard, and the tiger gave a roar as if a spring, but was caught by the bamboo overhead and dropped on the ground. He then dragged himself with great difficulty into an adjoining bush, and expired in another quarter of an hour. The animal was a magnificent full-grown male tiger. The carcase measured 9ft. 6in. long from the tip of the nose to the tip of the tail, and 4ft. 2in. high at the shoulders. There were great demonstrations in my honour, and I came back to my camp with the trophy at about nine p. m.

Local Loans.

In discussing the Resolution to raise a loan of \$250,000 for Lighthouses and Telephones, Mr. Cliff on March 28th last made a strong point which is to be found in the official report of his speech published in the Daily News to-day. The argument he advanced was not met at all either by the Prime Minister or the Minister of Finance in speeches they made subsequently. He said, in part:

"I would like to draw the attention of the Committee to the fact that although there has not been any difference of opinion in this debate as far as I can see as to the desirability of extending our lighthouse system, or as to the desirability of extending our telephone system, yet we come in here and sit down and vote for the raising of a loan of \$250,000 without asking ourselves any questions as to the possibility of getting that money within the immediate future."

"We come in and vote authority to raise loans without asking ourselves whether we are justified as legislators in increasing, even for necessary services of lighthouses and telephones our obligations in the way of loans. Now at the present time there is an authority for a loan of \$520,000 which was passed in the session of 1911. Of that loan only \$295,000 has been taken up, and there is a balance remaining to be taken up of \$225,000. The loan has been advertised for some time and there still remains that balance to be subscribed. Of that \$295,000 taken up, \$200,000 was taken up by the fund set aside for old age pensions. That would leave \$95,000 taken up by the public."

"The Minister advertised \$520,000 in 1910 and only \$95,000 has been subscribed by the public; and now we are going into the local market asking for \$250,000. I think we ought to pause and consider this matter before we place more loans on the market. As a matter of fact there is a 1911 loan of \$400,000 that still appears on the Statute Book. There is a 1911 loan of \$520,000. I presume it was intended when passing that loan bill in 1911 to repeal the previous authority, but I do not think the 1911 act repeals it. It is all well enough for us to talk about expending money for aids to navigation and in other necessary work; but we should first of all make sure that we know where that money is to come from, and should make sure that we are in a position to pay the interest."

SPEECH TO AUDIENCE THAT HE COULD NOT SEE.

"Day by day, week by week, my sight has been falling me, until now I have to talk to immense audiences, as I do to-night, without being able to see the countenances of any one of my hearers." Standing bravely erect, General Booth in calm, even tones which contained no note of complaint, made this pathetic confession of affliction to 10,000 of his people gathered in the Albert Hall, London, last night to celebrate his 83 birthday.

For upwards of forty minutes the general addressed the vast gathering. "I regret," he said, "that while my friends can see me I have not the privilege of seeing them. The inspiration that would have been derived from looking into their faces is denied me." Then was evinced the splendid optimism of the man. "However," he exclaimed in a voice of triumphant conviction, "I am thankful I have been able to keep to the fight, and in a few days, as is pretty well known, I am to undergo an operation which is to restore my vision and make me a young man once more." (Cheers.)

Never once did he allow the shadow of his ailment to cast a gloom over his speech. Confidence breathed in every syllable he uttered. He told of the great progress made by the Salvation Army; how the army was now operating in 61 countries and preaching the Gospel in 40 different languages; and how every week 1,000,000 homes were visited and 270,000 hungry men, women, and children fed.

Then in a voice still strong, still calm and hopeful, the aged general concluded his address with the words, "I am going into dock for repairs."

The Socialist Movement.

BY ANDANTINO.

XI.—FACTS AND FIGURES.

We have to face the fact that in England about eight million persons exist always on the borders of starvation; about twenty million are poor. While among the upper class 18 per cent of the children die before they reach five years of age we find that fifty-five per cent or more than half of the children of the working class die before the same period. Out of forty million only one and a half million earn as much as fifteen dollars a week. In London over a third of the population get less than five dollars per week per family, and one out of every four will die in some public institution. There are in Scotland 560,000 persons who do not know the decency of even a two-roomed home. In the British Islands no less than 4,280 workmen are killed and 20,000 permanently or partially disabled every year, which is as high as the average casualties in the Boer War. In the States the New York Commissioner of Labour shows that even in prosperous times a population of four and a half million are permanently in want owing to unemployment. Half the adults earn less than \$500.00 a year and nine-tenths earn less than \$800.00, so that in wealthy U. S. A. there is but one-tenth of the adults earning more than \$300.00 per year. Can you imagine what a struggle is continually going on among these nine-tenths in order to keep their heads above water? Even here do we not feel that the struggle for bare existence takes all our time and energy. We cannot live by bread alone, and how much honour, credit, pleasure, rest or love fall to the lot of the wives and children of the poor. What sort of a life must they live in the great cities—is it any wonder that when a spare hour comes it is spent in cheap pleasure and exaggerated forms of enjoyment—anything that will take their minds from thoughts of existence and how the rent is to be paid next day. Rising when he has work, at six in the morning and returning, many of them, not till six at night, seeing so little of his children that they hardly know him, and all this the product of our glorious (?) civilization! And when one thinks of the few who hold millions upon millions of the filthy lucre, it is difficult to write calmly. There can be nothing but condemnation for them. How they can pile up untold wealth beside such suffering and need, and how the Church can passively uphold them are questions which puzzle the ordinary mind. The only consolation of the common individual is that the Great Judge of all will level things. Just imagine, the dividends that flow from the wealth of South America into the pockets of British investors in one month exceed in amount the total expenditure on evangelical missions in that continent in a hundred years! F. D. Smith of the Men and Forward Religious Movement says it is suicide if we do not get the limit this time in social betterment and the industrial situation; if the churches do not prove their sincerity and fearlessness on industrial wrongs this time, the door will never again be open to them. J. P. Morgan's message is "Competition is Suicide," and he forewarns us, everything he can lay his hands on, and thus prepares for State control! Which is the better master? The Democratic State or a combine of millionaires? Don't you think it time that something was done? and don't be satisfied to call the bare means of physical existence, necessities. Sanitary dwellings, schools, books, art and religious communion are as much necessities as wholesome food and pure water. Socialists doctrines are in evidence all over the world. Our factory laws, our co-operations, the activities of our municipalities and our wage clauses in public contracts are Socialist doctrines without our knowing it. Lloyd George's National Insurance Bill and also that of Germany are great steps; profit sharing in many industries in England are in vogue,

and the profits of Municipal trading for the last two years show a mean trading profit of nearly five per cent on capital. The City Council of Glasgow supply the people with water, gas, electric light, electric cars, telephons, they control parks, bath and wash houses, fruit and vegetable markets, cattle, cheese, old clothes, four slaughter houses. They own some 3,000 municipal houses, several hundred shops, warehouses and work-shops, a dozen halls, two churches, two hotels, a theatre, a studio, laundry and bake house. They farm a thousand acres of land producing hay for their horses as well as other crops and in many other ways does Glasgow benefit its people by co-operation.

Russia, Germany, Italy, Belgium, Denmark, Australia and New Zealand own their railways. Under private control the Italian railways were started, but on the Government taking them over the revenue was increased by £1,500,000 in the first year. Belgium's fares are about one quarter the average rate; Denmark, finding her railways flourishing in private hands, bought them up, built more, and by cheap rates gave her dairy farmers that pre-eminence which they hold in the markets of Europe. The lines of Australia are able to point to a revenue of £12,000,000 a year, out of which a clear £500,000 goes to the relief of taxation. New Zealand's trains are all excursion trains, double journey for single fare. They carry children free to the nearest school and the Government are able to inform the British Government that "nothing has done so much to develop the Dominion and to make New Zealand prosperous as comparatively cheap railway rates to the people of the whole country. In Germany one can travel for about half the fare charged in England. In Italy just a month ago the State took over the monopoly of all Life Insurance.

So is the Socialist State coming slowly at first, but ever gathering momentum in this fast-moving age. Is it not a movement which you should be interested in?

The vote in Germany represents 25 p.c. of the total electorate, and in addition, the Social Democrats have 194 representatives in the State Legislatures. The U. S. A. also has 23 representatives in 5 Legislatures. This means a vote altogether of about ten million or a family of say forty million. So that Socialism must mean something when you find forty million people upholding it. In Milwaukee recently when the overthrow of Socialism took place—according to the reports—the actual fact is that the Socialists increased their vote of 22,000 two years ago to 39,000 this year. This does not seem much of the backward movement and even their opponents there while dis-

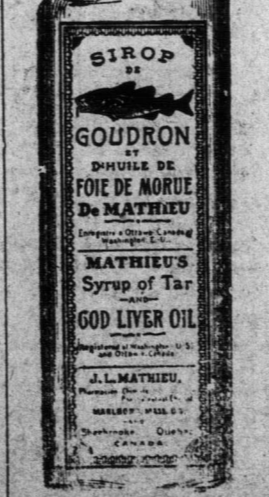

WASHINGTON, To-day. The charge that members of the House were guilty of petty grafting, was made by representative Fitzgerald, chairman of the Appropriations Committee. The allegation precipitated a wordy war, in the course of which Fitzgerald himself was accused of having submitted for payment bills for material, for which there was no provision by law.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Referring to Ismay and the Titanic, the Senate Committee's report will only deal with statements given directly in evidence and while critical it will not be as severe as was at first indicated. For instance, references to statements, such as one that Ismay had ordered Captain Smith to speed, which was specifically denied by Ismay will not be dealt with.

OTTAWA, To-day. The distant northern western wildernesses may be placed almost in immediate communication with Ottawa. The proposal, if carried out, as seems likely, will mean the thorough exploration of the great unorganized territories of Canada, with every step reported to and recorded at the Central Office by means of wireless telegraphy.

LONDON, To-day. The Times issued yesterday a special Empire Day edition. A message from Premier Borden of Canada emphasizing the desire of Canadians to keep in closest touch with the mother land in their loyalty to the Empire was among the most interesting of many messages from the Colonies.

ROSKILDE, To-day. The burial of the late King, Frederick 8th, at the Castle Chapel, where practically all the Danish kings are buried, was an imposing ceremony yesterday. Many members of Royal Families from other nations were present, while the route of the funeral procession was crowded.

LONDON, To-day. The Titanic inquiry in London is adjourned until June 4th on the conclusion of the evidence of the wireless operators, which was practically the same as that given in the American inquiry.

HONOLULU, To-day. The Island of Hawaii was shaken by an earthquake, the severest experienced for years, the wireless reports Mauna Loa smoking.

PARIS, To-day. The idea of assembling a Congress of European Powers in an endeavour to settle the Turko-Italian war is gathering force.

PITTSBURG, To-day. Six deaths from heat are reported for the 24 hours ended at noon yesterday.

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The Jewer Murder.

Boston, May 21.—Mrs. Lillian Jewer, a widow, 30 years old, who is said to have come here recently from Montreal, was found murdered in her apartments in the South End yesterday. Her nostrils were stuffed with string, her mouth choked with a kimono, a towel was tightly tied about her neck and there were bruises on her head. According to Medical Examiner Leary the woman had been dead since Friday.

A suspect was held by the police to-day in connection with the murder of Mrs. Jewer. The police withheld the man's name, but say that he was employed as a waiter. It was alleged that the man being detained caused the woman some trouble a few weeks ago and that she changed her place of residence.

The body of the woman was found by R. A. Basset, a milk man. The police were notified, and the Medical Examiner after a hasty examination stated that death was due to strangulation from a towel knotted about the neck. In their investigations, the police discovered that Miss Pearl Charlotte, also formerly of Montreal, knew the woman, and from her it was learned that Mrs. Jewer came here from the Canadian metropolis. Miss Charlotte also stated that the dead woman had an eight-year-old daughter in Connecticut. The trail soon led to a small eating saloon on Broomfield St. and there Hopping was taken into custody. At noon Hopping was still at police headquarters under examination.

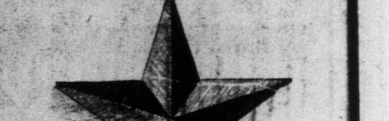

The Cabmen's Position.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir:—There cannot be any doubt whatever that in the framing of the Cabmen's tariff by the Council a gross injustice was done them, and it only needs but a very cursory examination of the schedule of fares to demonstrate the truthfulness of the above statement. For instance as was pointed out by the Hon. Mr. Gibbs, K.C., when he addressed the Council on behalf of the Union, that twenty years ago if a cabman drove a fare to Logy Bay, Outer Cove, Middle Cove and Torbay and thence to the city he was paid \$4.00, under the tariff framed by the Council he will get but \$2.70. For the past twenty or thirty years a cabman for going to Donovan's received \$3.00; under the Council's tariff he would be compelled to accept \$1.50. If this is not rank injustice to a class of men who are earning a bare living only, and some even not that, then I do not know the meaning of the word "injustice." To still further demonstrate the unfairness of the Council's attitude to the Union:

Twenty years ago a carriage was provided for \$200.00
Two horses 200.00
Two sets of harness for 60.00
a total of \$460.00. This covered the cost of a Cabman's outfit at that time.

To-day in order for a Cabman to engage in the business he has to incur the following expenses:—
Victoria Carriage \$420.00
Two Horses 500.00
Two Sets of Harness 140.00
without taking into account other incidentals, or a difference of \$600 greater than it was twenty or thirty years ago, with the cost of feed for horses even greater still. Then, for any sane body of men to sit down and frame a tariff which forces men to-day to work for less remuneration than they did twenty years ago carries its own condemnation upon the face of it.

Does the Mayor construct buildings for the same price or does he pay his masons and laborers the same wages as he did twenty years ago? He does not, and he could not get men to work if he tried for the wages paid last year, then why should he force equally deserving citizens to work for less remuneration than they did twenty years ago. Does Councillor Mulhally sell coal to-day for the same price as he sold it for last year? Certainly he does not, then why should he force Cabmen to go to Donovan's for \$1.50, a distance of fourteen miles. The question which is uppermost in the minds of thousands is: Are the majority of the members of the Board competent for the work which they have undertaken to do? The Cabmen's tariff is a sample of the high order of intelligence which animates their decisions and deliberations. The cabmen do not want favors, they only ask justice, and justice the cabmen are going to have.

As citizens and taxpayers we have a right to be heard, we demand the right, and we are not going to be talked aside by any act of the Mayor or any other Councillor of the Board. We know that there are some Councillors of the Board who are anxious to see justice done, we want to see them give effect to their desires. Come, Councillors Martin, Ryan, Chauncy and Coaker, we believe you are animated to do justice to all citizens, and we now ask you to do justice. This matter of cabmen's fares cannot be postponed, it must not be postponed, the Cabmen are anxious to conform to the law, but they are not going to be driven to it with a whip of injustice hanging over them. As this matter is of vital importance to cabmen, I intend with your permission, Mr. Editor, to keep this question going in the press until justice be done.

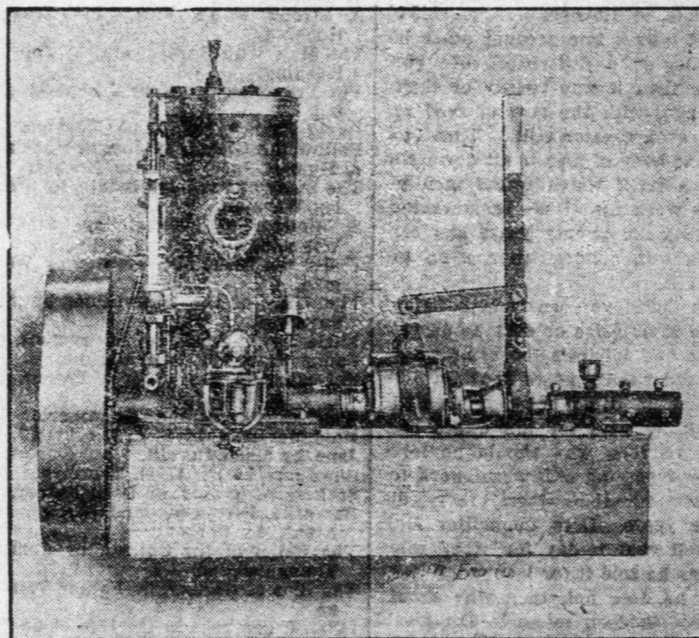

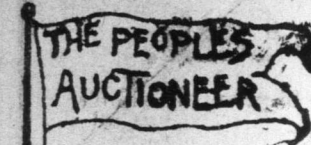
