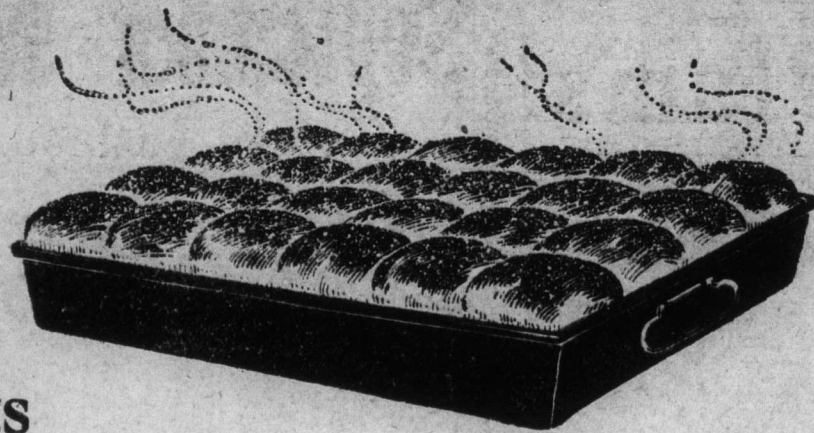

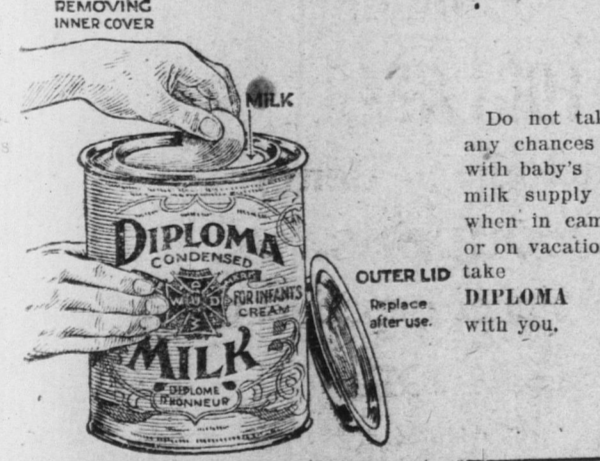

We all know that the habit of doing things at once—not in a few minutes, or to-morrow, or some day—is one of the most valuable habits any one can possibly have.

And yet I wonder, are we doing enough to cultivate in our children and ourselves the do-it-now spirit?

The little boy next door has the hen fever, a disease common to normal boys between eight and sixteen.

"Why, where are you going, son?" asked the mother, "I thought you were going to write for those bulletins?"

"So I am," he answered impatiently, "but I don't have to do it, it's mine, do it?"

"Yes, you do, son," she insisted, "that's the only way. You are interested now and now is the time to

net. Do it now and you'll do it: do it tomorrow and you won't do it. You promised me when I saw you on the morning to fix up that coat that you were going to make a success of this, and you know I told you that you'd never make a success of this or anything else until you learn to do things now, not 'pretty soon' or 'to-morrow'.

The prospect of quick results tickled the boy's enthusiasm and he disappeared into the house. "I suppose it was a little thing to make so much of," his mother apologized, "but it isn't the bulletins I care about. What I want is to help him to learn to do things at once."

It certainly didn't seem to me "a little thing to make so much of." I wish there were more mothers like her. If there were, there would be more efficient citizens in the world.

To my mind, the two most valuable habits from the point of view of efficiency are the habit of concentration and the habit of doing-it-now. Give a man with great talent and without these habits, and a man of less ability but possessed of them, and I think the latter would win out very time.

Any man or woman who has the do-it-now habit will make twice as much of himself or herself as without it, and the best thing is that it's never too late to acquire it and never too early to help your children acquire it.

MANCHESTER, Sept. 4. Delegates, representing Canada and the United States, took a preliminary part in to-day's Trades Union Congress, in which the British delegates represent 2,500,000 workmen. Foreign delegates were given the first opportunity of addressing the assembly.

ROME, Sept. 4. The general condition of Pope Pius is good, according to his doctors. They think that though he is troubled by an occasional cough he will be able easily to overcome the affection and will be assisted by the favorable climatic conditions now prevailing.

BREIG, Germany, Sept. 4. Two officers of the German Army flying corps were killed here in an aeroplane accident to-day.

Dyspepsia



Dyspepsia is a periodical upsetting of the digestive apparatus which is succeeded by a lively sense of remorse and a determination to pluck everything out of the menu, from oysters to ice cream. It is caused by the food running to a sharp pain and calling loudly for the habit of tipping up the soup bowl.

The two things which give the medical profession more trouble than anything else are dyspepsia and bad bills. Very few doctors are able to recognize dyspepsia at the first glance, but are just as liable as not to prescribe for dislocation of the hip.

When a man who is entertaining a sad-eyed attack of dyspepsia gets to his family physician and is treated a few times for water on the knee cap without securing any practical results except a statement made out on four sheets of foolscap paper, he will lose faith in medicine and allow the osteopath to play a few lively tunes on his spine.

Dyspepsia is generally preceded by a premonition that something is about to occur that cannot be relieved by anything except slow starvation. A man will go along for years eating mayonnaise salads, prime ribs of beef au jus, hot biscuits and superimposed sandwiches, in a trifling, care-free manner, when all of a sudden he will pause in the middle of an apple dumpling and exchange words with a new kind of pain. This is the first stage of dyspepsia, and is always succeeded by a milk and egg diet or the genial influences of the mud bath.

Whenever a physician forecasts a case of dyspepsia he advocates a change of climate and advises the patient to eat nothing that tastes like food. Dyspepsia has a very enervating effect upon the appetite, and will reduce it to the point where it can flirt with anything but the malted milk tablet. It is a disheartening sight to see a tall, broad-shouldered captain of industry leading his appetite up to a cupboard of bouillon and two soda crackers, just prior to going out and applying the screws to the ultimate consumer, but this is a form of retribution which nobody should complain about.

Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram. BERLIN, Sept. 4. General Felix Diaz, who arrived here to-day from London, says that all reports received by him concerning the prospects of his election to the Presidency of Mexico are favorable. He believed the chances of his election were good. He says that he expects Huerta will be neutral and expresses the utmost confidence in his own ability to restore order in Mexico, in case he should be elected. He declares any strong President can do so. He refrained from expressing any opinion concerning President Wilson's policy, saying he was with information on the subject. He refrained, that he had no political mission in Berlin.

MONTAUBAN, Sept. 4. Small flocks of military aeroplanes, steered by French visitors, are now on the wing from every point of France to this centre, where they will gather in great numbers to take part in the autumn manoeuvres, which start on Sept. 9th. Upwards of 100 flying machines of various kinds are to be attached to the arms, the greater part of which, comprising 100,000 men, of all arms, are concentrated along a parallelogram running from Montauban to Ager on the north and from Ager to Toulouse on the south. President Poincaré with a brilliant staff will attend, British and other military attaches will be present.

SIGMARINGEN, Germany, September 4. Manuel, former King of Portugal, was married here to-day to Princess Augustine Victoria, daughter of Prince William Hohenzollern. The religious rites began at 11.30 am. The road to the Roman Catholic Parish Church, over which the bridal party passed from the palace, was covered with flowers. On both sides soldiers and school children were drawn up.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4. Wood pulp and paper, destined for the United States but transhipped at some intermediary point, will be admitted from all European countries having favored nation treaties with the United States. Assistant Attorney General Denison, passing upon the question raised by Norway and Sweden, to-day advised Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo that such shipment was legal.

"Breaking the Banks."

McGrath's Socialism -- Coaker the Greatest Enemy Socialism Could Have.

McGrath is going from bad to worse. A day or two ago he outraged the commercial men of the country by the publication of a private business transaction of Mr. Herder which had not the remotest connection with politics. His own supporters in the business world were incensed and protested vigorously. Naturally enough they asked, where is this going to end? They argued very properly McGrath's conduct is an incentive to the Liberal Party to publish like transactions of theirs, and if such attacks and reprisals are to be the order of the day, then indeed the down of Water Street will be sound. McGrath is growing desperate at the thought of the certainty that Morris's Day is Done, and the days of his hoodlumism are drawing to a close. It would be a bad thing for Water Street business men if such hoodlum conduct is to continue, but for the Banks. That is another story. These are not the days of the Commercial Bank. The banks these days are well able to take care of themselves and they will continue to take care of themselves. McGrath is starting further to bring enough influence to bear to put an end to the panic that McGrath in his desperation is starting. This outrage shows more palpably than anything else has yet done the fear McGrath has that Morris will lose the Government, or he would never risk any reference to the Bank Crash of 1894, seeing that Morrison himself was the Attorney General of the Government of the day of the Bank Crash, and least of all should he dare to refer to the Savings Bank. McGrath was editor of the Grabbal newspaper of that day. Has he forgotten the exposures made by the late Sir William Whiteaway of the doings of his Government in reference to the Savings Bank? The people have not. Has he forgotten that Sir William produced a record of the Savings Bank, three months before the date of the Bank Crash to the effect that the Cashier informed the Directors that the Government had requested him to make deposits in the Commercial Bank until they reached the amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars; that he had already placed \$1,652,28, the Di-

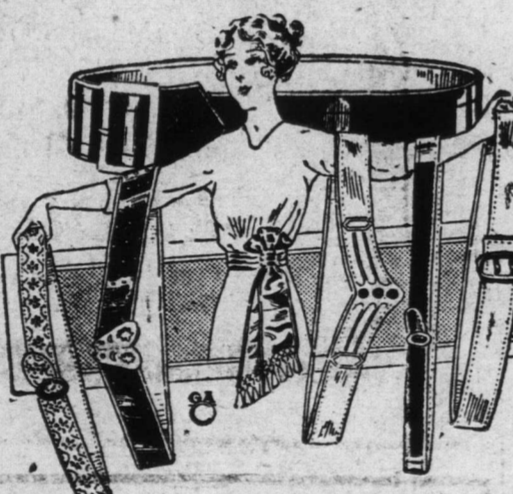

The Public Expects THE AUDITOR GENERAL TO DO HIS DUTY.
 We have pointed out the necessity for increased vigilance on the part of the Auditor General in order to prevent those improper and unlawful means employed under the present Government's abuse of power by which a fictitious surplus by withholding accounts from one year to another also to protect the public from the Government's abuse of power by secretly voting money for purposes not provided for by Legislature last Session. The people have enough to bear in the way of taxation. Payments now made for salaries, pensions or services not voted for by the House of Assembly are illegal. It is a matter of common knowledge that officials in the Civil Service have obtained considerable increases in their salaries by threatening the Premier or other members of the Government to expose before the public certain transactions in the Departments to which they are attached if they did not obtain the increase demanded. The increase was granted and the information withheld from the public. This is a most disgraceful condition of affairs. If the information was upon matters honestly coming within the scope of the Department and the Government acted in the public interests only both self respect and public duty should have dictated one and only one course in relation to those officials. To submit to the threat and grant the demand could only have been dictated by one motive, namely, fear lest the public be informed of transactions wrong in themselves and disgraceful alike to the Department and to the Government. It means that those officials are bribed by the public money to withhold from the public information to which the public is honestly entitled. If the Premier and other Ministers submit to such dictation by a subordinate official and pay him money from the public treasury to hold his tongue, it shows that

 SYDNEY, To-day. David Batchford, Low Point, was killed and six others seriously injured by the falling of a rock in Dominion No. 1 colliery.
 QUEBEC, To-day. Right Hon. Herbert Samuel, Postmaster General of Britain, arrived here yesterday and was received by Hon. Mr. Pelletier, Postmaster General of Canada, whose guest he will be during his stay in Canada. He was presented with an address by the citizens of Quebec and responded in English and French.
 SHERBROOKE, To-day. Harry K. Thaw was not railroaded across the border by immigration authorities yesterday, as "Connaught" had predicted. The special Board of Inquiry sat on his case from 10 a.m. until 5.30 in the afternoon when it adjourned until this morning. Thaw was on the stand the most of the day and made a good witness. His lawyers were denied a writ of prohibition by the Superior Court. Thaw was in Sherbrooke and failed to establish before the Board the contention that he had entered Canada as a tourist and like Jack Johnson should be allowed to continue to his destination. He could produce no ticket to any point outside Canada. He was in his possession a ticket to Detroit, but unfortunately for Thaw it had been purchased at Costwick.

WASHINGTON, To-day. The democratic leaders in the Senate will begin a supreme effort to put the Tariff Bill through before the adjournment "on Saturday" night. Eleven European nations have filed formal protests against a provision in the Bill granting five per cent reduction of duty on merchandise imported into this country in American vessels. The list includes Britain, Germany, France, Italy, Austria, Belgium and the Netherlands. President Wilson sent the list to the Senate in answer to a resolution asking for information on the subject. Most of the protests were filed several months ago with the State Department and sent to the Senate Finance Committee, but not made public. The nations protesting allege that five per cent reduction violates existing treaties. John B. Moore, Counselor of the State Department, in a letter to the President, which accompanies the message, interpreted the treaties in question to mean that neither contracting party shall charge lower rates on merchandise imported in vessels of other contracting parties. Secretary Bryan, in another letter said that beyond the filing of formal protests the nations interested had not pursued their contentions. France, however, announced that if provision was adopted she would adopt one, and like action is expected from others.

 'Tis amusing to listen to the Tories who hold up their hands in horror at the alliance between Sir Robert Boad and Mr. Coaker. Ex-Consul and His Wife Burnt to Death.

New York August 30.—Thousands of curious followers in many lands, and stacked high in the apartments of Hippolyte Uriearte for fifty years a Spanish consul, fed a fire kindling in lighting a cigar early to-day, and blocked the way of the aged diplomat and his wife to safety.

Uriearte was found dead, leaning across a window sill. His wife, Mary Louise, mistook a window leading to an air shaft for one opening onto a fire escape, and plunged four stories to her death.

Uriearte was 82 years old. For many years he was Spanish Consul-General in New York. His last service was in Canada.

During his travels for his Government he had accumulated souvenirs and mementoes of every country in which he had lived. They crowded every nook and corner of his apartments and in the smoke and confusion resulting from the fire, effectually cut him off from escape.

The fire was kindled, it is believed, when Uriearte lit a cigar, which he intended to smoke before going to bed. The aged couple had been up until a late hour celebrating the home coming of their son, Louis, an accountant in Cuba.

(Mrs. Uriearte was a daughter of J. C. Toussant, and sister-in-law of the late Mr. R. J. Parsons, barrister. Mr. Uriearte was Spanish Consul here for many years and left here some forty years ago.—Ed.)

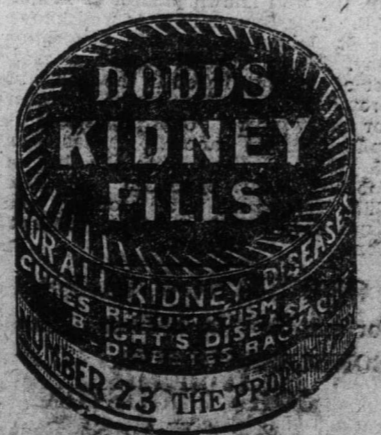

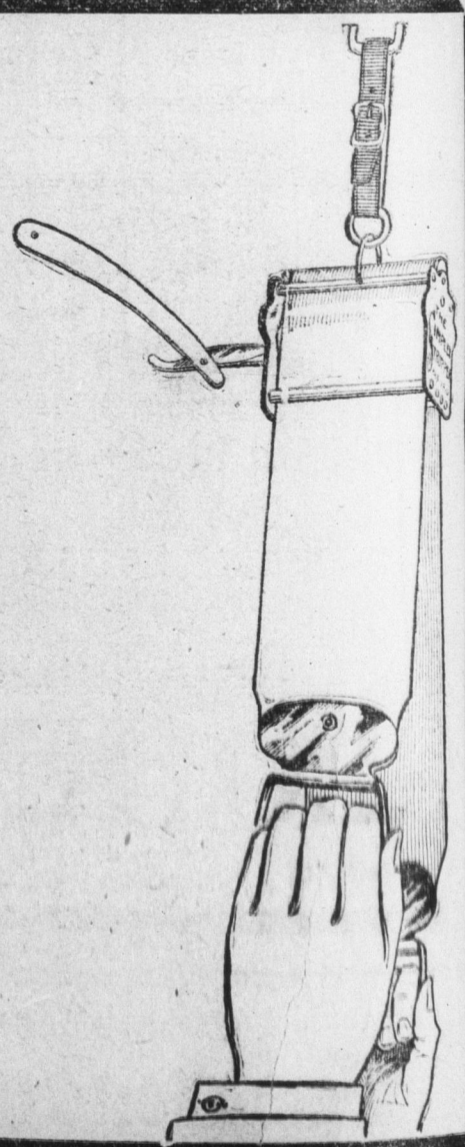
