THE EXPENSIVE MILITARY TOY.
An expert Swiss mechanic, who has
been employed in the Zeppelin works
at Friedrichshafen for the last ten
months and has just arrived back at
Geneva, Switzerland, has been furnishing
the newspaper correspondents
with some interesting information
concerning the expensive "military
toy," disclosing information calcu-
lated to make poor Count Zeppelin turn
in his grave. It appears from his
story that fifty-ones "Zepps," destroyed
since 1914 in England and France

A Soldier's Remarkable Career.

The Paris Journal describes the remarkable career of a private French soldier named Bertrand. The narrative is vouched for to that newspaper by Bertrand's Lieutenant:
Bertrand wears the French Legion of Honor, Military Medal, Military Cross with seven palms and five stars, British Military Cross, Belgian Military Cross, French Colonial and Morocco Medal, the Life-Saving Medal, and also a ribbon for wounds, as he has lost one arm and one leg, and has received some thirty bayonet wounds. He is 26. He enlisted at 18, and fought in Morocco, where he saved two officers and won the Military Medal. At the outbreak of the war he went through the Charleroi and Marne battles. At the latter he captured two German field kitchens, having killed the cooks and brought the kitchens with food ready to eat into the French lines. On the Yser and the Somme, fighting with the British troops he made ten German prisoners with his own hands, and won the British Military Cross. He was five times taken prisoner and five times escaped. After that he volunteered for the Near East, and at Monastir, with one or two comrades he kept four machine guns firing and held an enemy battalion at bay, with the result that 200 prisoners were made. After that at Monastir he saved his captain and a nurse. In this affair he lost an arm, and was otherwise mutilated. He was sent back to France, and forty-eight hours after sailing his boat was torpedoed, and the explosion blew off his leg. He amputated the remainder of the limb himself with his own knife. He fell into the sea, and managed with his one arm to hang on to a floating spar. Then he caught sight of the ship's skipper, who had both his arms blown off. He managed to pick him up, and both men remained on the raft for three days and three nights. For this Bertrand was awarded the Life-Saving Medal, the only medal left to him to win.
This astounding career has been accompanied by the extraordinary tragedies of his family. His father enlisted at 53 at the beginning of the war, and was killed on Sept. 2, 1914. His four brothers have all died for their country; the last surviving one had lost both arms and both legs and was blinded, and mercifully died a few months ago. Bertrand's old mother has just died also, overcome by the succession of tragedies, and Bertrand remains alone of the family with his sister aged 9, of whom he is the sole support.—Current History.

CANDOUR ON THE FRONT BENCH.

Here are three recent samples of Ministerial answers which were much enjoyed by the House of Commons. Number one may be described as the answer which denotes the Minister willing to oblige. Mr. Macpherson is responsible for it. "I don't know if a statement can be made, but if one can be made I will make it as soon as possible." Number two, given by Sir A. Griffith Boscawen, was clearly designed to afford as much information as possible. "A childless wife is regarded as unaccustomed to work if she has not been accustomed to work in the past." Last, but not least, is the all-embracing answer whose object it is to let nobody go away without at least a scrap of comfort. The author is Bonar Law. "I gave my answer in such a way as to allow everyone to draw his own inferences. The inference of my honorable friend seems to me to be very reasonable."

THAT INFLUENZA.

Now that the alleged influenza outbreak or epidemic is showing signs of abating it becomes pretty clear that medical views in this country, and probably in others as well, were strongly divided over the origin and nature of the outbreak. The suddenness of so many of the deaths and the general weakness and debility which is remaining behind in a tremendous large number of cases, together with the phenomenon of septic pneumonia frequently associated with the outbreak, indicate a difference from old clearly influenza epidemics. The most weird explanations of the outbreak have been given by the laity and these have varied from the alleged germ-carrying propensities of our now larger paper currency to the disturbance of a valuable balance in the atmosphere owing to the tremendous development of the atmospheric nitrogen industry in Germany and other Continental countries.

German Cruelty.

Harwich, England, November 24.—Lieutenant Fulcher one of the two captured American officers brought here by the submarine cruiser Deutschland, the U-153, when she surrendered today gave a graphic account of his adventures since the sinking in mid-Atlantic on September 30 of the American cargo ship Ticonderoga, on which he served.
"The first few shots from the U-boat," he said, "badly wounded the Captain of the Ticonderoga, killed the gun crew, and set the ship afire. The decks were quickly littered with dead. A British cruiser opened fire, whereupon the U-boat submerged. We managed to get the fire extinguished and to lower the boats, but in the excitement and confusion most of the poor fellows aboard were drowned. "The U-boat again attacked us, and we kept up fire until we realized that the ship was sinking and it was useless to continue. We then decided to surrender."
Although Lieutenant Fulcher was wounded and his thigh bone was exposed, he took a pillow slip and waved it in the place of a white flag. The U-boat came alongside and he was taken aboard with another officer.
The commander of the submarine, holding a revolver in his hand, asked the Lieutenant where his chief gunner was.
"I told him all the gunners were killed," added Lieutenant Fulcher. "A

Dear Mrs. Hopkins,—It is with the deepest feelings of sympathy I write you these few lines, as your son "Hoppy," as he was known amongst us had been in my section during the past three years, and since I was promoted from the ranks to be Lieutenant he was my sniping Corporal, and I don't expect to find a better or more conscientious soldier to take his place.
He was killed by a German sniper while on duty at his post, and did not live very long after being taken to the dressing station but was conscious all through.
If all our men were as good soldiers and had the courage and grit he did we would indeed have a splendid lot. It may be some comfort to you to know that his pals were with him to the last and did everything possible to help him. The rest of his section wish me to say how much they sympathize with you in your great loss.
He was held in the highest esteem by the officers and all men in the Battalion. If there is anything that I or any of the section can do for you, I shall be done willingly in the way of giving you any further details.

NAVAL ESCORT FOR WILSON

Ultimatum Presented to Germany.

Marine Disaster on Lake Ontario --- Haig Issues a General Order to Army of Occupation.

PARIS, Dec. 3. President and that he did not believe the American people would tolerate any meddling in that which so eminently concerns them.

MAY GET HIM YET. French citizens are lodging complaints with Attorney General Leconsouer, regarding crimes committed by the German Army under William Hohenzollern. The decision regarding the Emperor will be reported within a few days. If it is decided that a French tribunal is competent to open proceedings, judges will be appointed, and one of the first acts of the tribunal will be to ask for the extradition of William Hohenzollern.

A DENIAL. The Danish Legation here has officially denied that Denmark agreed to furnish large shipments of food to Germany, as reported by a Copenhagen paper.

WILL VISIT POPE. President Wilson will pay a visit to Pope Benedict, it is announced by newspapers here.

DELAY REFUSED. LONDON, Dec. 3. A Reuter despatch from Berlin today confirms the delivery of the ultimatum, the time limit of which is 24 hours. It says, Matthias Erzberger of the German Armistice Commission offered to deliver all the locomotives as soon as they were repaired. The German newspapers, adds the despatch, point out that there is no hope of prolonging the armistice, and that it is likely the Allies will occupy Germany.

MONEY SAVED. Cancellations of war contracts, since the armistice was signed, were estimated by Secy. of Baker today to aggregate \$2,600,000,000.

U. S. FUEL CONTROLLER RESIGNS. WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. Fuel administrator Garfield has resigned, and President Wilson has accepted his resignation. This was announced to-night at the White House.

NOON. COMPARE WITH GERMAN METHODS. WITH THE BRITISH ARMY OF OCCUPATION, Tuesday. (By the A. P.)—The British Army is rendering great assistance to devastated and impoverished Northern France and Flanders. During November the British Army furnished to the American Commission for Relief in Belgium, twenty million rations which were being needed for quick distribution among the hungry people. This aid came at a time when the Commission was unable to get provisions through, speedily enough. Holland and British officers and soldiers are also giving largely from their own stores, and the British Army is providing great quantities of kerosene and candles for the homes and shops, otherwise darkness would prevail in most of the cities. Success of different sources, but equally valuable, is being afforded by transportation of the refugees.

TOO MANY OFFICERS. OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 3. Cable advices have been received by the Militia Department to the effect that arrangements are being made to send back to Canada a large number of officers whose services can be dispensed with.

WERE DULY WARNED. NEW YORK, N.Y., Dec. 4. The New York Sun, this morning prints the following: "The Germans themselves fixed the limit of the seven years boycott that British seamen have voted to impose, according to Captain Edward Tupper, Executive Counselor of the National Sailors and Firemen's Union of Great Britain and Ireland, who came to the United States on Monday, for the purpose of urging the laboring millions of America to join the boycott on German commerce. The original boycott was for two years, beginning September 1917, but the proviso placed an additional penalty of a month's extension of the ban, for each crime committed on the high seas thereafter, against international law. German soldiers of the sea continued the slaughter of helpless fishermen, escaping from trawlers, firing on men in lifeboats, and piled up five years of additional punishment before the armistice checked it."

WAS IT INSPIRED? LONDON, Dec. 3. Women munition workers, who had been receiving high pay and who have been discharged, marched to see Premier Lloyd George. The Premier sent word that he was too busy to see them. The marchers, who numbered between 500 and 600, then proceeded to the Ministry of Munitions Office, met a detachment of the women, and arranged for further conference, at which the employers also will be present. The women, in many instances, wore expensive clothes, and they were all from one firm, whose Government contracts expire shortly. The women demanded, and in occasional instances, were given, and their attitude, it was said at the Ministry of Munitions, was uncompromising.

MAY MEAN ANYTHING. AMSTERDAM, Holland, Dec. 3. The former German Emperor has apparently almost recovered from his recent indisposition, and is occasionally seen with the former German Emperor, walking in the grounds of the Castle here. The ex-Emperor, according to good authority contributed largely to the decision of her husband to sign his act of abdication. Her confidential informants gave an unrosy account of the internal situation in Germany, relative to the throne.

SAFE CONDUCT GRANTED. COPENHAGEN, Dec. 3. The Entente Powers, according to a Wolff Bureau despatch from Spa, Belgium, have granted a safe conduct to the German troops in Finland to return home. Under the terms of the German armistice, freedom of access to the Baltic Sea was given to the Allies, and associated powers. The blockade conditions, set up by those powers, were to remain unchanged, and all German ships found at sea were to remain liable to capture.

THE ALLIES, IN THIS CASE. COPENHAGEN, Dec. 3. Addressing a great meeting of returned German soldiers at Ems, in Hesse, Assau, Herr Barth, Secretary for Social Policy in the new German People's Government, said that the general situation in Germany was serious according to a Berlin despatch to the Berlingske Tidende. Herr Barth praised the self-discipline of the German troops retreating on the Western Front, but asserted that the situation of the army in the east was distressing. He added that he could not see how the great mass of troops could be evacuated, in view of the coming winter, and the hostility of the population. Secretary Barth hoped that the army would not suffer the fate of Napoleon's troops, but declared "Germany is ready to meet the coming dispensation of Providence."

A Good Samaritan.

An amusing scene was witnessed last night by the habitués of New Gower Street. A drunk, filled up on some kind of dope, for a rather deep bass, started in singing "For he's a jolly good fellow," but seeing an open carriage being driven up, thought it would be better to sing from a carriage dais. Accordingly as the vehicle was driven past, the drunk made a standing jump and landed fairly in the carriage. It happened that the driver was a comrade, so he allowed the singer to stay. Soon the intoxicated one felt a desire to drive and struggled for the reins, but the driver with a blow that would have cheered the heart of Mr. Matt Hinkie, the sporting referee, reported as intending to visit Newfoundland, knocked the drunk hors-de-combat. No further trouble was caused and in a short time the drunk was deposited in safety at his home.

NOT CORRECT.

PARIS, Dec. 4. The Royal Montenegro Government has issued a statement denying the report that King Nicholas has been deposed.

DEMANDING THE HUN.

ON BOARD THE BRITISH DESTROYER, TILBURY, Sebastopol, To-day.—(By the A. P.)—The Allied fleet of British, French, Italian and Greek war vessels, has taken from the Germans ten warships, including smaller craft in the harbor here.

MORE TROUBLE DUE.

LONDON, To-day. The Russian Government has refused to admit to the immediate Russian soldiers, who have been prisoners in Germany, and have returned them back to the frontier, according to a Berlin despatch to the Express under date of Monday. It is reported that the Russian prisoners have seized four ships at Danzig, West Prussia, which the British Red Cross had obtained from the Germans for the purpose of housing Russian prisoners.

TO FORM NEW MINISTRY.

MADRID, To-day. (By the A. P.)—Count Romanones, Foreign Minister in the Spanish Cabinet, which resigned over a disagreement of self-government for Catalonia, has been entrusted with the task of forming a new ministry.

SOME CHECK.

BERNE, Dec. 3. (By the A. P.)—Dr. Widmer, of Woltergen, introduced a resolution in Parliament to-day inviting the Swiss Government to immediately approach other neutrals for the purpose of jointly establishing the claims and rights of neutral nations at the Peace Conference, particularly relative to a future League of Nations.

WILSON'S ADVISERS.

NEW YORK, N.Y., To-day. Twenty-three members of an advisory commission of experts, who have made a year's study of political and economic conditions in Europe, and Asia, will sail with President Wilson and his fellow delegates on the George Washington, it was announced to-night. With them will go several tons of documents and maps, which together with other records of their investigations, already in Paris, or on the way, comprise a collection of international data said to be without parallel in history.

Borrowed Motor Car.

One of our motor car owners came very near losing his machine last night, and certainly, you have but for a freak of chance. He was in a house, and the car was outside with the engine running, and he had come along, and seeing the car and nobody being in sight, took a deep liking to it, and jumping in began to operate various brakes and levers. Suddenly the car shot forward like an arrow. The young lad became a little scared at this, and frantically pulled this lever and that until, by a lucky chance, he moved the correct one, and the car came to a stop. Meanwhile the washer, who came to the street as the car had started, ran up, and the boy will have occasion all his life to regret the time he attempted to borrow a car.

Billy Sunday Coming.

We are informed that Billy Sunday, the famous American Evangelist, will conduct a campaign here next summer, and that local people are soon making arrangements to see his event. This will give citizens an opportunity to get a glimpse of the fire-brand preacher and to study the methods of one who took America by storm.
