Frau Navoczny lives in a threeroomed apartment in the east end of Berlin, with no fewer than twenty-one children. Frau Navoczny, who is of Polish origin, is a young-looking woman of thirty-eight. "I think being always surrounded by children keeps one young," she said. "My family comprises three sets of triplets and four of twins. Then I have four others alive, but I have unfortunately lost six. Otherwise my family would number twenty-seven. 





In a case a short time ago, for example. Mr. Mitchell showed that a will which was dated and had the appearance of being written in 1898 had actually been written ten years later, and from that very fact alone was proved to be a forgery!

The Clue of the Red Ink.

Dozens of cases of forgery for old age pensions have been proved by Mr. Mitchell. Evidence of age in many cases had been accepted from entries in the family Bible, and the ink expert showed that many of these entries, though dated seventy years before, had actually been written a few months before the pension was claim-

One of the most remarkable trials in which the whole case turned on the question of ink was that of Humphreys in Edinburg. Humphreys claimed to be the Earl of Stirling, and in support of his claim he produced a n ber of documents supposed to date back to the seventeenth century and early eighteenth century. One of these documents was dated 1639, and had comments on it in red ink by the supposed Chancellor of that day. Red ink wasn't invented till 1780, a hundred and forty years after the document

was supposed to have been written! Brinkley, the Croydon poisoner, was brought to the scaffold largely on the evidence of the ink expert, who showed that the will of Brinkley's intended victim was signed with no fewer than three different inks, showing that it had been signed and witnessed at three different times instead of all together, as the law demands.

Old Ink is Best.

Nearly all modern inks are made from a mixture of galls and coppers, which combine to form a kind of iron. It is this combination which gives the black appearance to ink. This mixture in the first place is almost colwriting has been exposed to the air for some time. To make it appear at making the famous blue-black inks now used everywhere. can be detected by the expert. In the old days ink used to be boiled steadily for a long time to make it black, but in those days ink was made by the housewife as part of her ordinary duties, and many quaint ink recipes can be found in old cookery

The best inks in the world are the oldest. They were chiefly made of lampblack, like the present Indian and Chinese inks. Many ancient Roman documents which are preserved in museums, though two thousand years old, have the writing on them as black as the day when it was written .-Pearson's Weekly.



> The first ship of this novel type is now being constructed on the Pucific coast and is destined for Australia. Its voyage across the boisterous Pacific will be watched with great interest. If it proves a success other craft will follow, in which event the process of shipping lumber offshore will be revolutionizel. The fact that Lloyd's has decided to take a risk and the craft seems to augur well for its success.

> Mr. Arbuthnot designed the ship in order to overcome the shortage of tonnage and also the high freight rates, which are the bugbear of the lumber industry at the present time.



Can we say that we have made the most of the opportunities offered us by the C.R.C. and the public generally? Here is a case in point. After a great deal of trouble and with some pressure, 45 berths for the seal-fishery were obtained for returned men. On the 10th of March, that is the day of sailing-20 of these 45 men failed to put in an appearance and civilians had to be obtained at the last moment. Is that playing the game? Do you think that actions such as that I have just mentioned will tend to give us the sympathy of the Government or in plain language tend to damn the lot

On Wednesday, March 23, 1743, made in the Monthly Labor Review. Handel's oratorio, the "Messiah," was just issued by the United States Barfor the first time produced in England, at Covent Garden Theatre. Born at Halle, in Saxony, on February 23, 1685, Handel lived in Italy from 1706, but in 1710 came to England, where he found his work more welcomed; dying in London on April 14, 1759, he was buried in Westminster Abbey. George Frederick Haydn took twentythree days to compose this oratorio in the autumn of 1742, and it was first performed at Dublin, where the receipts were given to the churches of that city. A pension was granted to Handel in England, which was later on doubled. Some time previous to his death he became afflicted by total blindness, but this had little effect upon his spirits, and he continued not only to perform in public but even to compose till within a week of his death. He composed several great oratorios, "Israel in Egypt," "Saul," strength, and strength well applied Samson," "Judas Maccabaeus," "Josnua," "Solomon," and "Jephthah" -but the most celebrated is the "Messiah." His first com vas held in Westminster Abbey on May 26, 1784, when King George the Third, with Queen Charlotte and about three thousand persons were present. Evidently armed onflict is at present on the increase masses of the East. Given a modern gun and taught to use it in the war, the Oriental is making it a powerful argument for what he deems his own

This mood of rebellion against Europe is no small thing. To-day Asia appears to be aflame with militant naonalism. The war cracked the crusts that held it down. In defence of "self tamia, there is fighting of a more moletermination" it will fight.

This is the big factor in the present Near Eastern situation. Decisions by the Supreme Council at Paris are futile if the nationalities concerned vill not accept them.

The case is gravely complicated by he fact that none of the European owers claiming protectorates or pos ons of these aroused and now ellicose Orientals can afford either he money or the men necessary to eep them in a reasonable degree subjugation and order. French and British soldiers are displaying an alarming fastidiousness as to when and where and whom they will fight. ARMED ACTIVITY.

There are at present four major entres of armed activity in the Near East, with half a dozen other scenes of recurring outbreaks. Each of the later would have been deemed serious in pre-war times and fully written up in the press. Now a busy censorship does its best to keep the disturbing tidings from the people back home. These four fighting areas do not in-

clude revoluntionized Russia, nor yet the bellicose Balkans or the cantankerous Caucasus. 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
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
