SIDE TALKS.

IN YOUR NEIGHBOR'S PEACH ORCHID.
"Do not straighten your hat when you pass through your neighbor's peach orchard or stoop to tie your shoe when you are passing his melon patch."

The above is an old Chinese proverb and, as you have already realized, is the Chinaman's more picturesque method of saying "Avoid the appearance of evil."

She Sees Nothing To Praise.
I oftentimes find myself thinking of that proverb. For instance, I have recently met a woman whose husband writes short stories. They are good short stories but not any better than many other men and women are writing. Knowing that she is interested in things literary, I sometimes talk about magazines with her. I have never heard that woman speak a good word for any writer who writes for any of the magazines in which his stories appear. According to her, there is something wrong with all of them. One is too flippant, another too obvious, another doesn't have enough plot, another is so tiresome. Once in a while she gives a guarded word of praise to some author, but it is always some one who writes a totally different style of story from her husband and could never be considered a competitor of his.

If She Knew How It Sounded.
Now, it is possible, of course, that that woman really does not care for any of the other authors who write stories similar to those her husband writes and, in the opinion of the average person, write them quite so well. And then again it is quite possible that she is prejudiced against his competitors by personal feeling. I wouldn't dare to say. But this I will say, that if that woman realizing how it appears to the casual beholder, she wouldn't stoop to tie her shoe in her neighbor's melon patch or reach up to straighten her hat in his peach orchard. She would probably make an effort to say an occasional nice thing about some other writer even if she had to strain the truth.

The jealousy that makes people say ungracious things about a competitor is a boomerang that almost always does more injury to the listener's esteem to the one who slams than to the one who gets slammed.

The Fire in the North.

Once more many lives have been lost and many homes have been destroyed by a terrible fire which swept over a large area in Northern Ontario. At least forty-two persons perished and it is estimated that over eight thousand people are homeless in Temiskaming County, while over ten million dollars' worth of property has been destroyed. Halleybury, the county seat, is wiped out, and Heaslip Charlton, North Cobalt and other places are also in ashes, while New Liskam and Englehart have been partly burned and a wide stretch of country has been laid waste.

The people of the North have been tried by fire in a very literal sense of the term. Many of them have been burned out more than once. The awful fire of 1916, in which a hundred lives were lost is still fresh in their memory. The life of the pioneer is no pleasure trip. The ordinary hardships which new settlers have to endure in Northern Ontario would seem to be enough for them to contend with. The periodical invasion of the devastating flame would almost daunt the dauntless. It is hard to see a home vanish in a few minutes which it took years to build, not to speak of the death of loved ones. But the people have no notion of giving up. They will begin all over again and already plans are being made for rebuilding, while food, clothing and funds are being supplied by generous-hearted citizens in other parts of the Province to relieve the distress and suffering of men, women and children.—The Sentinel.

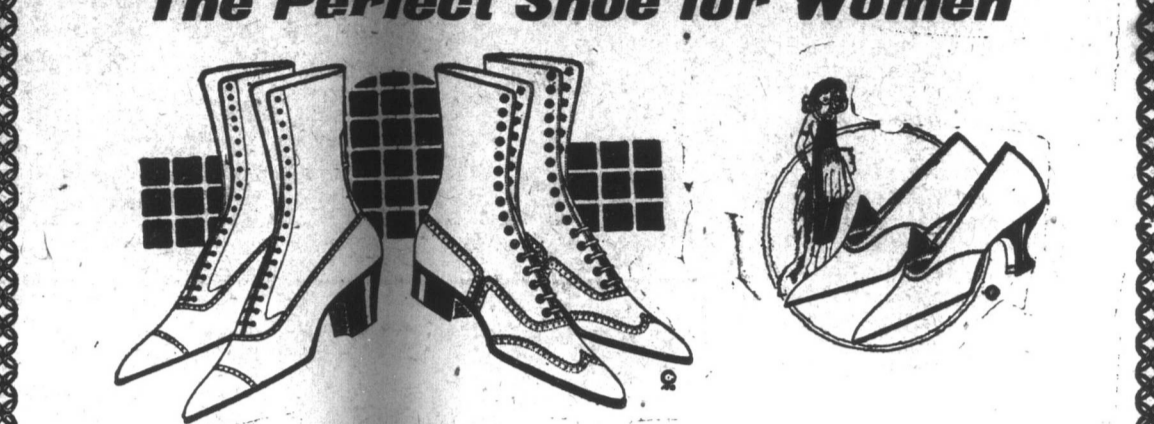

NEW RIVAL TO WHIST IN LONDON.

"Koon can" has come into rivalry with whist by being judiciously argued to be a card game of skill, says the London Daily Chronicle.

It has been mentioned recently at the police court, but no one explained that its name originated in the phrase that, because of its simplicity, "any koon can play it." Incidentally that also indicates its American origin.

Christmas parties took to it in its early years because of the rollicking round-table fun it afforded; but its popularity soon waned at other seasons. It is in the same category as "Slippery Ann," also credited with a birthplace in the United States, for with each a gaudy group of players is essential to diversion.

Two packs of cards shuffled together are used in "Koon can," and the aim is to be first to get rid of a hand of 10 cards, thrown down in sequence, and the like, during opportunities of discarding and reviving. Synod Decides on "Open Pulpit."

CLERGYMEN OF OTHER DENOMINATIONS IN FAVOR OF CHRISTIAN UNION WILL BE ADMITTED.

At a late hour last night the Anglican Provincial Synod adjourned until this morning, after a heavy day's work. The sessions during the day were featured with more or less strenuous debate on such subjects as the "open pulpit," and the approval of the revised Canadian Prayer Book. The first matter was finally settled in joint meeting of both Houses by leaving the "open pulpit" with the Bishop of the diocese, to admit clergymen to the pulpits of his churches, who are of such denominations as favor Christian union.

At a joint meeting of both Houses last night there was an approval for the second time of the revised Canadian Prayer Book.

Dean Shreve of Quebec submitted the report of his committee on the Archbishop's address, which proved to be of very great interest. It passed unanimously and the committee was appointed to carry out its recommendations and suggestions. With regard to that part of the address which dealt specially with education a committee was appointed to deal with the matter of religious teaching in the schools of the Maritime Provinces. In Quebec there is religious instruction in the schools.

With regard to the important matter of Church Union, a resolution was adopted accepting the resolutions of the Lambeth Conference as the basis, that conference having laid down certain principles and suggestions for Christian union.

It is likely that the Synod will prorogue to-day--Morning Chronicle, Oct. 20.

Have You a "Lit Pig"?

Although nearly all the materials used in the making of clothes are coloured with coal-tar dyes, yet some of the wools and woollen cloths which come from the Hebrides and other Scottish islands are still tinted with purely vegetable colours.

These vegetable dyes are made from various barks, roots, and lichens, and the secrets of making them have been handed down from mother to daughter for many centuries.

In the old days every Scotch woman had her "lit-pig" or dye-crocks, and each season she collected great stores of material for colouring purposes.

A rich purple came from a lichen scraped from rocks or stone walls. This lichen is called "stone-raw" while the tree lichen is known as "wood-raw." Another lichen which produces a deep yellow is called "philamort."

Other lichens are known as "cork-rot" and "cudbear," terms so old that their origin is unknown.

For a true black, the bark of the alder-tree is used, for blue, elder treated with alum. The iris root gives grey, and bracken spores a fine yellow. Another yellow comes from the bog myrtle. A well-known dye, a rich yellow, is made from heather twigs, which are boiled in a copper.

How extensive was the knowledge of dye smug, the Highlanders is proved by the extraordinary variety of colours which, from very early times, they used in the tartans which distinguished the different clans.

Diamond Ring Found Among Waste Paper.

"He told me to wait a minute and fetched a constable, who pinched me," replied Jackson.

Dr. Grenfell's Work.

WHAT HE IS DOING FOR THE HARDY FISHERMEN OF HOSPITABLE LABRADOR.

The following letter taken from the New York Times, under the above caption, is republished for the information of all those who have knowledge of the work of the Grenfell Mission, as well as for the benefit of others who are not so well informed on this subject. It will be noted, however, that Mr. Grenfell is careful and accurate in his statements, and obviously gave much thought to the preparation of the letter before sending it to the journal from which it is now reprinted.

On Aug. 17 THE NEW YORK TIMES published an editorial entitled, "Familiar News From the Labrador." The writer commends Dr. Grenfell's work and supports his plea for immediate assistance and relief in the form of both food and clothing for the needy fishermen and their families in the North. This same editorial concludes, however, with the following statement: "It does seem that the experiment of settlement in a region so inhospitable to civilized men has been unduly prolonged. The dwellers there serve no purpose of any appreciable importance to themselves or anybody else. Almost continuous hardship is all that they can expect, and too often what they get is death by cold and starvation combined. They are so few in number that if the money spent in rescuing them from the rigors of their land and climate had been used in establishing them where nature is kinder, we should have been deprived of Dr. Grenfell's admirable books and he of an enviable record."

To this paragraph I wish to take exception from the standpoint of an eye-witness. It has been my privilege to travel extensively up and down the coasts of Newfoundland and Labrador. I have served—in a volunteer capacity—as private secretary to Dr. Grenfell for two seasons, visiting with him all the fishing villages of Northern Newfoundland proper, cruising on the little hospital ship Strathcona, and only this week after twenty long years of hard service. Let me remind the writer that life in Labrador is not as recent and unsuccessful an experiment as he would have us believe. Cabot discovered Newfoundland and claimed it for the British Crown in 1497. Captain George Cartwright opened a post of the Hudson's Bay Company, perhaps the oldest established

business on the North American Continent, in 1670, at Cartwright, Labrador. White men have been living in this small corner of the earth, and making the best of it, for more than three hundred years. The field of Dr. Grenfell's work includes the northern peninsula of Newfoundland, comprising the districts of Green Bay and St. Barbe, with a resident population of some 47,000 people, consisting mainly of the descendants of English, Scotch and French pioneers, who went there for the fishing; also the Canadian Labrador, comprising a stretch of nearly 800 miles of coast line from Natashquan to Blanc Sablon, in the Straits of Belle Isle, with a resident population of over 2,000 white people of the same extraction, and from the Straits of Belle Isle northward on Labrador itself (controlled by the Newfoundland Government) to Cape Chidley, where there is a population of some 3,000 more, made up of the descendants of English and Scotch fishermen, together with some Eskimos and Indians. During the Summer months the population of the Labrador is increased by thousands of fishermen and their families, who live on their schooners during the fishing season. These last are Newfoundlanders, Canadians, French and Americans.

When Dr. Grenfell first came to this coast in 1882 he found an honest, simple people, totally lacking medical and surgical skill, largely un-

educated, and with but few schools, earning by diligence a precarious living through fishing, furring and sealing, and carrying on their trade largely by a system of barter. The question whether this population, resident and transient, is worthy of the money expended upon it is one which Dr. Grenfell, his associates and the Directors of the International Grenfell Association have often asked themselves. But the answer seems to be that this is a sturdy, self-reliant people, who are unhappy when taken away from the coast, and who contribute out of all proportion to the numbers

to the wealth of the world in food and furs. The estimated value of the fisheries of this coast in the year 1920—the latest figures I possess—amounted to \$16,000,000, or over 2,000,000 quintals of cod and salmon, certainly a substantial contribution to the essential food contribution of the world. Attempts have been made to place part of this population en masse in other localities, but they have invariably failed. It is to be noted also that the 200 young men and women who have left the Labrador and Newfoundland Coasts to be educated in the United States, Canada and England with the assistance of the Grenfell Mission, with a single exception, all returned to work among their own people.

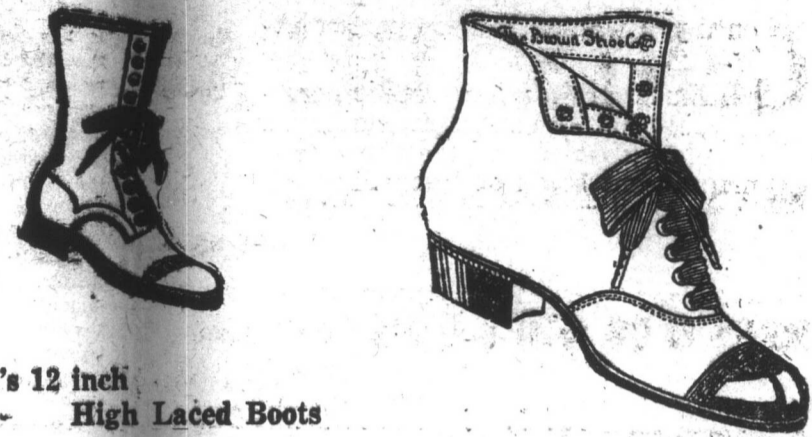
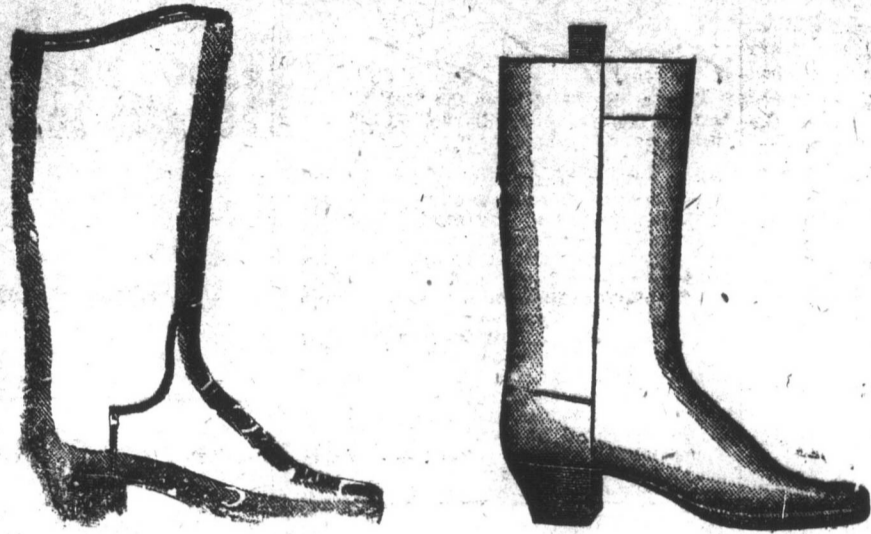

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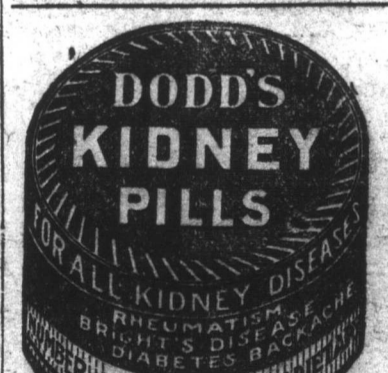

The Humber Proposition and The Railway Situation.

An Unprejudiced and Fair Review.

PART III. THE 1922 HUMBER PROPOSITION.

Dear Sir—In part II of these notes we discussed the 1921 Humber Proposition, Messrs. Armstrong-Whitworth and the pros and cons of guarantee. We now touch upon the new Humber proposition, except from the press and rumour, but sufficient data has appeared, to enable the formation of opinion.

Last January the 1921 Proposition was shelved, apparently, for two reasons. (1) Because the Reid group already involved in the railway tangle, sought the guarantee, and (2) Because the contingent liability of \$20,000,000 with interest thereon, was considered beyond the Colony's capacity. It appears, however, that Messrs. Armstrong-Whitworth were so impressed with the project, that they were prepared to go a long way in bringing about its development.

It would seem that renewed negotiations between the parties concerned, led up to the arrival of a representative from London in June, in the person of Major Jennings. In July Major Jennings returned to London, and forthwith Messrs. H. D. Reid, Powell and Conroy representing the Reid group, and the Prime Minister and Minister of Justice representing the Government, departed, presumably to continue and, if possible, finalize negotiations in London.

Just what progress has been made nobody seems to know definitely, and at the moment we can only conjecture, on the terms of the new 1922 Humber Proposition, which in the main seem to be as follows:—

- (1) The Armstrong-Whitworth group undertake to purchase from the Reid group, the control of the Humber properties, and become responsible owners and operators as well as contractors. We do not know what the consideration is, but rumour states that it is a very considerable amount, and that the Reid group are putting up their own money.
- (2) The Armstrong-Whitworth group have interested the British Trade Facilities Board who have, apparently, examined and reported sound, the Humber Proposition, and offer to participate in the guarantee on a fifty-fifty basis.
- (3) In consideration of the assistance offered, the British Trade Facilities Board requires that the plant and machinery be manufactured in Great Britain, and that the project be controlled by British interests.

THE PRESENT RAILWAY SITUATION.

In May last Messrs. Reid refused to continue operation of the Railway, and several truces were arranged to find a way out of the deadlock. Finally a pro-tem arrangement for operation until the autumn was effected under the management of Mr. R. C. Morgan and Mr. R. G. Reid. It was understood then, that Messrs. Reid pressed for a settlement of the Railway dispute, and were willing to relinquish operation to the Government, and settle all claims on payment of two and a half million dollars, for their private railway property (Rolling Stock, Repair Shop, St. John's Station, Repair Equipment, Stock in Trade, Steamers, etc., etc.) which property probably cost them twice or thrice as much, to accumulate. Of course, their continued right to this property, in the event of default is a moot point, but there is no question as to its existence and value, and that it represents many years of liberal outlay for the private purses of Messrs. Reid.

Such was the railway situation during the recent Humber negotiations. It is now understood that Messrs. Reid in London, demanded settlement of the Railway dispute, before they could sell their control of the Humber property. It is said further that they offered to throw in the Dry Dock with their other Private Railway Assets, and accept two million dollars or less in bonds for the lot.

At the last meeting of the Legislature application was made by the St. John's Light and Power Company, (a subsidiary of the R.N.F. Co.) for some change in their charter so that they might place the proposition on the Montreal and local market as a Utility Investment, and raise sufficient on a Bond issue to carry out Deferred Maintenance. The Legislature for some reason shelved this application. It has been known for many years that the Petty Hr. Hydro Plant has returned handsome profits, but as the owners (Reid N.F. Co.) needed the money to meet Railway deficits, necessary expenditures of maintenance of the Hydro Plant were postponed, so much so, that it has now run into figures of magnitude, probably several hundred thousand dollars. The people (the City of St. John's in this instance) are again the innocent victims of this Reid Government Controversy.

Nothing has been heard about the St. John's Light and Power in the Humber-Railway-rumours, but it seems hardly necessary to remind our Legislators, that any Money Paid Messrs. Reid in Settlement of the Railway Dispute Should be Used in Part to Carry out Repairs and Extensions of the Petty Harbor Plant, which is of such serious consequence to the people and business of St. John's.

ENGINEERING AND INDUSTRIAL FEATURES.

We have already stated that the value of the Humber Development, its success or failure, depends primarily on one thing, viz: Very Cheap Power. In other respects it has no unusual advantage over similar developments in this or any other country. This Very Cheap Power is made possible by cheap development, (\$77.00 and \$44.00 per H.P.) provided by Nature: (a) In the ideal storage features of Grand Lake; (b) In a cheaply excavated material from the route; (c) In an earth-fill dam built of excavated material from the Canal; (d) In the diversion of the Upper Humber in to the Grand Lake Watershed; and (e) in the concentration at one point, of the total Head (265 feet between Grand and Deer Lakes), and the whole high-level drainage area of the Humber River.

Of course there are outstanding features, such as cheap Transport and Assembly of pulp wood (\$6.00 per cord (estimated) provided on a seven mile canal, and cheap Delivery of Newsprint at Atlantic tide-water; but the feature that counts above all others is Cheap Power.

The available and useful Power is described as follows:—

Pulp and Paper Mill	25,000
Electric Boilers	60,000
Surplus (Grand Lake watershed)	65,000
Surplus (Upper Humber watershed)	60,000
Total	210,000

The initial Hydro-electric Development capable of supplying 85,000 H.P. for the Pulp and Paper Mill, at \$77.00 per H.P., will cost in round figures \$5,000,000, and make an available surplus of 65,000 H.P. at \$44.00 per H.P., which can generate power for distribution at $\frac{1}{2}$ of a cent or less per K.W. hour.

Losses on Lloyd's.

SCUTTLERS AND THEIR SCHEMES—AND A FEW THAT WENT AMISS.
 Scuttled ships lie in far greater numbers than sunken warships on the ocean beds of the world, for scuttling, if well done, is one of the most profitable means of fraud.
 Contrary to the general belief, the scuttler has not gone out with the highwayman, the pirate, and the smuggler, but exists to-day perhaps in greater numbers than ever before.
 Since peace was signed the number of ships with grossly over-insured cargoes that have been deliberately sunk can be counted in scores, if not hundreds, and affect Lloyd's to the extent of millions of pounds.
 "The acute depreciation in shipping values, and the heavy losses entailed, have been a temptation that the unscrupulous have been unable to resist," said an official of Lloyd's. "Since the war claims amounting to millions of pounds have been made on Lloyd's, and Lloyd's agents abroad, relating to ships that sink for no apparent reason, at the most convenient hour of the day and at a chosen part of a coast, in deep water and without any loss of life."
 When Lunch Was Late.
 "Our black list of scuttlers is unusually large, and includes very few Britabers, but many people in the Near East.
 "Beside the small company that falls back on this means of fraud because of trade losses, there is the professional scuttler who buys ships simply to sink them, and usually favours the use of having an honest financial partner who knows nothing of his ulterior schemes.
 "Their coolness is amazing. One scuttler is known to have put off the hour arranged for the sinking of half an hour because lunch was late."
 Often the scuttlers' deeply-laid schemes go amiss, as the following instances which have occurred in recent years show:

In a certain Mediterranean port some months back a large steamer, not British, was lying with steam up, preparing to leave. She was supposed to have a large cargo of valuable war stores aboard that had been insured for a very high figure.

Three unassuming men who stepped aboard attracted very little attention at first, but within five minutes their quietly-spoken commands resulted in the vessel's sailing being cancelled. The Lloyd's agents—for such the men were—superintended a thorough examination of the cargo.

Loat His Nerve.
 Their search revealed that the cargo consisted wholly of old boxes and boots, and other valueless stores, worth less than one-tenth the sum for which the cargo had been insured, the highness of which had aroused the suspicion of Lloyd's.

Another recent case was that of a Greek steamer, which had been insured for £200,000 an alleged cargo of mohair it was bringing from Smyrna to London. Such suspicions were aroused before it sailed that unusually high prices were paid to re-insure; but nevertheless the ship was allowed to sail.

—She arrived at London, and, without discharging her cargo or even opening her hatches, she turned and made back to Greece. Here it was found that her cargo was worthless rubbish, and the captain was thrown into prison.

It transpired that it had been intended to run her ashore on certain rocks in the Mediterranean, but arriving at the spot the captain thought the weather was so unpleasantly stormy that he sailed on. Too stupid to concoct another plan, he blundered on to his journey's end, and then back again to Greece—and imprisonment!

A third case was that of a ship lost on a voyage from the West Indies with a cargo of sugar. The loss had been settled by the underwriters, when an unusually inquisitive member of Lloyd's discovered that the quantity alleged was much too large for the size of the vessel.

On and Off Again!
 Fuller investigation showed that the ship could not possibly have carried half the quantity of sugar the underwriters had paid for!

The shipping documents were in order. It was a long and difficult inquiry that followed, darkened by the fact that one of the detectives engaged on the case was foully murdered. Slowly the whole scheme came to light.

The method had been to load bags of sugar during the day, remove them back to the warehouse again at night, load again the next day, and so on until the amounts stated in the loading lists were reached.

But the thieves had been too greedy, and had to suffer the penalty of their crime. Even in a field so prolific in fraud—the insurance world—there are many who overreach themselves in their attempts to rob companies or underwriters. Lloyd's has always found it so.—Answers.

Girl Deep Sea Diver

SEEKS SPANISH TREASURE.

LONDON.—The profession of deep sea diving, which anyone would classify as a calling particularly for men, has been successfully invaded by a woman, Margaret Naylor, an English girl, is acclaimed as one of the most efficient and daring wearers of the helmet in British waters. She has gained a wide reputation during the last two years, and more recently for her efforts in the recovery of treasure from the sunken Spanish galleon lying in ten fathoms of water near the shore of Mull, an island of Scotland. There, in the cozy little harbor of Tobermory, and less than a hundred yards from the beach lies one of the greatest treasure ships of the Spanish Armada. The boat was one of the many vessels launched by the ambitious Phillip, in 1588, for his attempted conquest of England. So certain was this monarch that he would add the British Isles to his already large domains, that he actually sent his jewelled regalia in advance. It is believed today that the richly bejewelled crown is lying somewhere in the sixty feet of water among the wreckage of the Admiral de Florencia, which Miss Naylor has succeeded in negotiating. Although the task presents many problems which would cause anxiety to divers of the stronger sex, Miss Naylor shows no fear. She had had one or two narrow escapes from death in the course of her experience, without being in any way deterred from tackling the risky business again. Miss Naylor recently made a trip to the Southern Coast of England and obtained some excellent specimens of under-sea plant life. She nearly lost her life when her feet became entangled in a ladder which she was using, and only her presence of mind enabled her to free herself and be hauled safely to the top.

Early Ways of Film-Making.

Even in the early days of film-making, ingenious substitutes were employed to enact scenes which would otherwise have been most difficult to reproduce.

Mr. J. Stuart Blackton gives some examples of this in an article, entitled "From Peep-show to Super-cinema," in the current number of the "London Magazine."

When a cinematograph film of the Spanish-American War was attempted, the "Battle of Santiago Bay" was taken in a little office under a sky-light.

Photographs of the battleships Indiana and Iowa, and other vessels of the American fleet, with pictures of the Spanish warships, were cut out and fastened on to blocks of wood, and in this way a realistic sea battle was reproduced.

The coast of Cuba was painted on a small canvas about six-feet square, and Santiago Bay was an alioth tank. Friends were pressed into service to puff cigarette smoke in on either side, whilst tiny explosions of gunpowder were set off from behind the picture battleships.

It was all quite exciting—and so the public thought then—realistic; for the film had a great run throughout America, and was also shown in several European countries.
