NEWFOUNDLAND TRADE land show that, last year, the United States got the better of Canada in exports to Newfoundland. The tug of war here pictured shows the position at this time.

As there was a decrease of \$331,098 in coin and bullion, this may indicate that the falling and burnon, this may indicate that the farms off in Canadian exports was mainly because of the decreased trade of the Island generally. Not only did Newfoundland's imports decrease \$113,-774, but her exports also fell off \$966,856. The exports to Canada alone fell off \$321,694, which would naturally have the effect of lessening the amount Canada would sell to Newfoundland. The fact remains, however, that, in spite of the failing off in Newfoundland trade, the United States exports to the Island colony increased as here pictured. Canada's two greatest losses, besides the one just named, were meats, de-crease \$32,359, and oats, decrease \$69,572. The gains made by the United States appear to have been mainly in machinery and other manufactured goods.
