Frank Altamount Wins \$4,000 in the New Placer Camp.

Some good clean-ups have been made in the Quartz creek camp, on Dalton trail, which was only discovered during the past season. On November 10, Frank Altamount and several of his men carried \$4,000 worth of dust and nuggets, all the product of quartz, to Porcupine City. The wealth was the result of four days' sluicing.

Altamount says the creek is a long and wide one, and that the diggings are shallow, bedrock being reached at from three to five feet, and that the gravel pays from the top down.

RATE WAR. Coast Steamers on the Sound Are Likely to Fight.

Seattle, Nov. 26.—(Special)—There is strong probability of a rate war between the steamship lines operating between this city and San Francisco unless they get together and make some agreement soon. The Kruse line has been cutting rates for some time; the Pollard-Dodge line, operating the steamer Rainier, and others of her class, is also cutting rates, though the Pacific Coast Steamship company has not yet been drawn into it. 


