Boston, Jan. 21.—John L. Sullivan arrived home from New York at 3 p.m. yesterday, and stated that he would fight at any time in any place for any amount, from one cent up. He said the receipts of the Boston Monday night were \$53,000. He charged the reporters with being down on him and misrepresenting Monday night's encounter. Said he: "I will fight McCahey and Ryan in any ring, or I will fight McCahey and then Ryan two hours afterward." He thought Ryan was no better as a fighter than when he met him at Mississippi City, and that he rushed on him purposely Monday night so as to cause the match to be stopped.

He said that a party of young rich men have offered to subscribe a purse of \$1000 for Mitchell and McCahey to fight to a finish. Mitchell, it is averred, will bet from \$1000 to \$5000 out of his own pocket on the result.

SHORT THE AFTERNOON.

Why the Attack Was Made on Capt. Phelan.

"I see that Capt. Phelan still threatens to blow on Jerry O'Donovan, Rosa, Kearney, and the whole party, and says in his documents in his possession which will make things very lively." Said a prominent Irish nationalist to a Kansas City Times reporter. "Now, I think Phelan can make some startling disclosures. He will, Phelan knows just what he is doing, although he has not said so yet and I can explain the direct cause of Rosa's attack on Phelan. When Capt. Phelan was sent to Ireland in May, 1883, as one of the men who were to find and kill Carey, he was also intrusted with another mission. He had a private commission from P. J. Sheridan. But the nationalists, who respect great confidence in Phelan, gave him \$10,000, and with this he was to blow up the Prince Albert memorial monument with dynamite. Short was then in Ireland, and Carey killed a few days later and met Capt. Phelan over there. Jim McDermott, the traitor and informer, found that Capt. Phelan was going to England and resolved to follow him. He managed, before he left, to have his friend in Brooklyn give him a banquet, to which O'Donovan, Rosa and others looked on. Rosa did not attend, but sent McDermott a note, which read as follows: 'O'Donovan, Rosa, and Carey will be with you to give you a send off. Give my regards to all the boys.' When McDermott met Phelan on the other side, which he made it his business to do, he showed Phelan this note. Phelan thought it was a private commission from Rosa and received him as a friend. McDermott then proposed, 'Let's go and find Short.' 'Where is Short?' asked Phelan. 'He is in Cork,' answered McDermott. 'Capt. Phelan went to Cork and found Short's sister and on account of her he communicated with Short by means of a cipher furnished by O'Donovan. Short read the cipher letter to Rosa, and she was angry. She said that he was all right by showing papers from Rosa and by his knowledge of the cipher. They then began to talk over their plans. Phelan introduced McDermott to Short. McDermott again showed Rosa's note and was reluctantly accepted by Short. Short looked on as one of Rosa's men. From what McDermott learned through his acquaintance with Short, he gave away Featherston, Dwyer, O'Hanry, and others, and Short barely escaped with his head. 'Capt. Phelan,' continued the nationalist, 'did not blow on Carey, but sent all his money and returned to New York. He lived high, gave money to Kearney and others, and kept up his expenses while he was away in Europe for nine months, and it is easy enough to spend a good many thousands of dollars under such conditions. He was tried by a secret committee of Irish nationalists, but proved that he reposed confidence in McDermott and that he was not a traitor. He was which Rosa had sent him, but which he never thought would be put to such a use. Capt. Phelan explained the reason of his heavy expenses by saying that he was compelled to keep up the appearance of an American gentleman of means to avoid suspicion while in England. He had no doubts but just such dealings with Kearney as he has already described in the interview with him first published. In the light of the facts of the interview, it is very naturally scarce Kearney, Rosa and the rest, and around Short a pitch of frenzy, and their suspicions are not only confirmed, but supported by the fact that Short barely escaped with his head. 'Who is Short?' was asked. 'Short is a butcher by trade, and has been deeply interested in the doings of the nationalists. He is supposed by many to be one of the men who murdered Lord Cavendish and Under Secretary Burke, whose wife was used with such terrible effect in the attack on Carey. Short is the use of his favorite weapon and will be able to do it. He is an assassin at heart, and his dead confession, if he ever makes one, is probably the only thing which will ever reveal the whole mystery of his life.' 'Local News Paragraphs.' James Goldring, aged 70, died in the county jail yesterday morning. He had been in the institution since May last, and was suffering from cancer of the throat. Coroner Duncan held the usual inquest.

CAMPBELL, THE MAIL ROBBER.

A Serious Defeat in the Extradition Fight.

From the Chicago Post, Jan. 20. Capt. Dawey, an inspector of the Canadian postal department, waited fruitlessly in Mail Inspector Hart's room at the government building, yesterday for the appearance of A. B. Campbell, who made a confession implicating himself in three robberies of mail pouches on the Canadian Pacific road between Emerson and Winnipeg. Campbell was last seen in Chicago on Friday, on which day he left his boarding house on Wabash avenue. Capt. Dawey regretted that the treaty did not permit Campbell's extradition, and thought that Campbell, being aware of his immunity from arrest in the United States, would never cross the border. Capt. Dawey said he was satisfied that Campbell was in Chicago in connection with the three robberies, and a portion of that amount was in cancelled bills of the bank of Montreal. The presence of Campbell in Chicago was ascertained by letters sent to him by Canadian friends, which were directed to different hotels in this city.

A despatch received from Ottawa, Canada, last night says: The postoffice authorities here state that A. B. Campbell, the mail robber, is in Chicago in connection with the recent mail robberies at Winnipeg, and that he is in possession of a large sum of money, which he has been using to buy a big ticket, in which case he will be given his liberty.
