

THE WORK OF THE STORM

NEW ENGLAND'S COASTS STREWN WITH WRECKS. Crew of the Edward Norton—"On the Reef of Norman's Woe"—Wires Down and Communication Inferrapted.

Boston, Nov. 26.-The schooner Martie E. Eaton, hence for Port Spain, is ashore on Nantusket beach full of water. The schooner Avelon, St. John for New York, dragged ashore on Spectacle Island yesterday. She will probably float when the weather moder-She experienced terrific weather in the Sne bay. Three of the crew were washed overboard and lost. Their names were Charles Blackford, John Doucelle and James Todd, all of Tiverton, N.S. The schooner Cox and Green from Philadelphia is ashore here and reported to have bilged. The schooner Bertha F. Walker from Philadelphia is ashore at Hull. Captain Westgate and the first mate

were lost. The schooner Gertrude Abbott of Philadelphia is also ashore here.

At Newport, Rhode Island, the storm was very severe. The wind blow a perfect gale, with snow in the morning and rain later. Considerable damage was done.

At Plymouth, Mass., the schooner Amazon of Provincetown biged and sank on White's Flat. The crew came advoce unharmed.

At Danvers, Mass., the storm is the worst ever experienced at this time of year. The wind olew a hurricane and the show drifted to the height of three and four feet. Horse cars were abandoned all along the line and religious services at the churches were not held last night.

At Portemouth, N. H., the schooner Oliver Dyer of Saco went ashore at Joy's Point, Newcastle, this morning. The crew took to the rigging and were rescued by the life aving crew with the exception of the cook, who was drowned. The vessel will be a total loss. The schooner James H. Deputy of Barh is ashore at Newcastle, but will be gotten off. An unknown schooner is ashore on Clark's Island high apd dry.

There May Be Worse News To Come.

New York, Nov. 26.—This city and the surrounding neighborhood are still suffering nder the storm which raged over almost the entire country yesterday and more especially blowing in New York and going about was most disagreeable. The force of the storm was shown this morning by the number of broken telegraph and telephone wires seen everywhere and by the damage reported along the river front. Telegraph and telephone communication with a great number of places was entirely cut off this morning and telegrams were only received subject to indefinite delay. But according to Sergeant Dunn, the officer in charge of the signal service bureau in this city, the worst effects of the storm may not yet have been reported. He said this morning:

"The storm is a very destructive and extensive one. It is now clearing off, the storm centre having passed us in a northeasterly direction, following the course of the steamer line. Steamers coming from Europe—those which left the latter part of last week—will encounter it in its full strength. The steamers leaving later were warned by this bureau from Washington via Paris and London of the storm and its direction and were therefore prepared in time to change their course. The area of the trouble has been a very extensive one, covering the entire coast from Florida to Varies." was shown this morning by the number of
