INTERCOLONIAL TREATIES.

GIVING TRADE PREFERENCES CAN BE MADE.

But Not Treaties by the Colonies in Favor of Great Britain—The Latter Can, However, Give Preferential Treatment to the Colonies—Radicals Want the Lords' Appropriation Cut.

London, Aug. 22.—In the House of Commons today Charles E. H. Vincent asked the Government whether the opinion of the law officers of the Crown had been taken upon the question whether preferential trade relations between Great Britain and her colonies were presented by the terms of the treaties of East of Jersey, the British representative at the recent Intercolonial Conference in Ottawa, had against the Lords' legal opinion would be taken.

Sydney Buxton, Under Colonial Secretary, said that the opinion of the Crown law officers had been taken, and their decision was that the treaties did not confer preferential treatment upon the colonies in favor of Great Britain, nor between the colonies themselves. It was, however, the British representative's duty to give preferential treatment to the colonies in favor of Great Britain.

The Government and the Anti-Lords' Government. James Henry Dalglish, radical, moved that the House should appropriate the power of veto to the Upper House. He was called to order by the Speaker, who admonished him that he was here to be the subject of the appropriation.

After several radicals had spoken in support of the motion, John Morley, Chief Secretary for Ireland, undertook, in Sir William Harcourt's absence, to reply for the Government. The Ministers were fully sensible of the gravity and magnitude of the moment, and they were, he said, that they returned to raise the issue on a proper question of officials and relations.

Thomas Sexton, Anti-Farmette for North Kerry, said that the appropriation had not risen to the emergency, and did not seem disposed to treat earnestly the demands of the people and the representatives for a change in the House of Lords. Mr. Dalziel's motion was rejected by a vote of 78 to 45.

The absence of fire protection forced the people to allow the fire to burn itself out. The total loss is \$35,000, which \$10,000 falls on the Tourville company.
