

THE PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS

The Liberal Government Returned With a Large Majority

July 27th, resulted in the return of the Murray Government at Halifax with a majority of seventeen over all other parties including Farmers, Labor and Conservatives.

Quite a large crowd witnessed the returns from Annapolis County which were promptly displayed on the MONITOR's bulletin board.

This up to date service which appeared to be greatly appreciated by the public, was only made possible by the installation of a special phone by order of the efficient district superintendent of the Maritime Telegraph & Telephone Co., who is also Middleton's popular Mayor, and the excellent assistance rendered by Miss Flossie N. Troop, the local exchange agent and her obliging staff.

The first returns were from District No 15, Morse Road, at 5:15 p. m. the next Clarence, then Hampton, Annapolis Royal, Port George, Thorne's Cove, Bear River, etc. The whole returns were complete at 6:45 with the exception of Mattland which arrived 15 minutes later.

It was difficult to get the exact results in such a short time. When we went to press, however, an error occurred in copying Mr. Elliott's Bridgetown returns from the Bulletin Board. It should have read Bridgetown 227, instead of 127, but like the Hon. O. T. Dunlop's majority the figures were so large, that perhaps a hundred was not very noticeable.

The following is the returns from the entire province:

The new house will have 29 Liberals, 6 Farmers, 5 Labor and 2 Conservatives. Hon. E. H. Armstrong, W. L. Hall, opposition leader, and Col. J. D. Ralston were among the defeated.

Journalists Visit Nova Scotia

Distinguished British Press Men Delighted With Evangeline Country

The weather Thursday was ideal for the visit of the Imperial Press Delegation. The party arrived at Kentville during the forenoon in two splendid trains furnished by the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways. On their arrival they were met by cars from Kentville and Wolfville and driven through the Cornwallis and Gasperet Valleys and Wolfville to Grand Pre. At Grand Pre a short address was given by Dr. Cutten, of Acadia University, and a bronze statue executed by the French Acadian sculptor, Henri Hebert, representing Evangeline looking back with tears upon the country she must leave, was unveiled by Lady Barnham, a member of the visiting party. A short address was also given by Sir Gilbert Parker, who was also with the party. After viewing the points of interest at Grand Pre the party was motored to Wolfville, where they again took train and proceeded to Truro en route to St. John, N. B.

There were about 125 persons in the party and they came from all parts of the Empire. They were all loud in their praises of the beauties of our country, and considered the drive they had Thursday the best they had had since landing in Nova Scotia. They are to spend six weeks in Canada and in that time will cover over eight thousand miles.

The Registration this Year Larger Than Ever. Miss Elizabeth F. Elderkin, of Bridgetown, has registered for special courses at the Summer Session at Boston University. Teachers from all over New England and the Middle West have registered for the courses in education and public school management.

A MOTHER'S TRIMS

Care of Home and Children Often Causes a Breakdown.

The woman at home, deep in household duties and the cares of motherhood, needs occasional help to keep her in good health. The demands upon a mother's health are many and severe. 


Agriculture is the Dominion's premier industry. Back of Canada's progress stands the farmer, and the country's advancement in agriculture is reflected in every phase of the Dominion's activity. The settlement of lands, better farming and every progressive move of agriculture is the concern of every resident in Canada no matter what his profession; the railways, the governments, industries and manufactures, and the consuming public are alike interested. The Federal and Provincial Governments and the railways, with a keen realization of this, have ceaselessly worked for the progress and development of this industry through the establishment of experimental farms, the circulation of literature, and other propaganda matter and many other methods. They have never ceased to advocate better farming, the scientific study of soils, crops and systems, land conservation, and all that tends for greater and healthier production, enrichment of land, and improvement in living and social conditions in rural settlements.

No better systems of education and aid to more successful farming has been devised than the "better farming train," or as it has come to be popularly termed "the University on Wheels," which journeys through the Prairie Provinces of the West under the auspices of the Provincial Departments of Agriculture and Education and the Canadian Pacific Railway. It is in truth a travelling university of agriculture bringing an agricultural course to the farmer's home with its intensive classes and demonstrations of the highest educational value. The train has two large machinery

well as those of an educational value. Two coaches are fitted up as lecture cars for men and another for women. A nursery car is provided which contains sandpiles, slides and cribs, in charge of capable nurses, where mothers may leave their children whilst attending lectures. The train and entire equipment is furnished free by the Canadian Pacific Railway, which has spared no pains to make the better farming train of the greatest possible service and assistance to Canada's agriculturists.
