 ers, flying by far quicker even than our "Lightning Express train," which we know will tear along our inon roads in the dead of night, bearing its freight of joyful, and, it may be, sorrowing and anxious hearts. F'riends! will you let it pass without breathing an earnest petition for God to save and bless the travellers and our Railway-men? They are "on duty," though you may be peaceful and still; they have dear ones, too, perhaps. Many an anxious heart is in their homes, watching and waiting for them; many a littlo one has breathed its evening prayer-
"And bring futher saie home,
By morning light, for Jesus' sake." Amen.
Father! remember your child is praying for you. God hears that prayer; how will God answer it? Will the "safe home" be to the loved little home on earth, or will he call you from your work to the home "over there," in the presence of the King, calling you from the brake-van, or engine, or signalbox, from the platform or the office. If He calls can you say, "It is well with my soul, it will be safe, quite safe home."
"If it is not well" (oh, what sad words!) let me say a few words to you on "The Turn-Table." What lessons does it suggest to you? One of God's own warnings, and also $a$ very solemn question has been in my mind for some days past.

The Warning is-"Turn ye."
The Question is-" Why will ye die." (Ezek. Xxxiii. 11.)

But you say, there are many roads reaching to the turn-table.
Undoubledly there are. As we look down from the high signal-box at a large and busy station, I have counted twenty, thirty, or perbaps torty lines reaching to it but not on to the rurntable. "Only one road. There's only one way in which you can get to your desired end, to turn your engine."

By an unseen "pivot" the table slowly but surely curns to the line where you may cross, a handle is turned and this way is "opened." How soon then is your way turned to the "right road," which also is "the narrow way."
"The pivot" or main-spring which works such a change is unseen, it is beneath the surface, "deep down." Is it not a type of the working of the Holy Spirit in the heart once darkened by sin and unbelief. It is the Holy Spirit which whispers to you, "Believe on the Lord Jesus christ and thou shalt be saved." Do you hear its echo again to day, while Jesus whispers to you, "Come, sinner, come."
"The crank' opened" may represent the "oft-repeated Gospel call." The call of Jesus, "Come unto me ye weary and heavy laden one. Turn ye unto Me," why will ye die?
"Come, for all things are now ready."
Delay in Railway work may be fatal.

HE above cut is a representation of the medal known to "collectors of coins" as the Trevithick Medal. The inscriptions on the medal explain the object for which it was prepared. The dies were prepared by Messrs. Wyon \& Co., of London, England, during the time Mr. F. H. Trevithick held the office of Loco. Supt of the G. T. R. The portrait is that of Richard Trevithick, the celebrated English engineer. We are not certain whether the medal is now awarded; but if not, we think it might well be bestowed, unless, the fact that there are so many efficient and thoroughly well conducted men on the road, might make the matter rather expensive to the company.
