

# PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA.

At the City of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church there, Wednesday, the Tenth day of June, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty-five years, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening:—

Which time and place the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met according to appointment. The Rev. William MacLaren, D.D., Professor of Theology in Knox College, the Moderator of last Assembly, conducted Divine service, and preached a sermon from the Gospel of Matthew, the twenty-eighth chapter, verses eighteenth, nineteenth and twentieth: "And Jesus came and spake unto them saying, A'l power is given unto Me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Traching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

Dr. MacLaren then constituted the General Assembly with prayer.

#### ADDRESS OF RETIRING MODERATOR,

Dr. MacLaren, the retiring Moderator, addressed the Assembly, returning thanks for the honour conferred upon him last year, by his appointment as Moderator, and for the kindness, forbearance and courtesy uniformly extended to him in the discharge of the duties of his office, and stating that the time had now arrived for the appointment of a new Moderator. Dr. MacLaren also stated that the last Assembly had made an important change in the mode of nominating a fit and proper person for appointment as Moderator, constituting the former Moderators of Assembly a college for the selection of the person to be presented to the Assembly, and that as Convener of said College, he had consulted with the former Moderators, and that they had unanimously agreed to recommend for appointment as Moderator of this Assembly, the Rev. Alexander McKnight, Doctor of Divinity, Principal, and Professor of Systematic Theology in the Presbyterian College of Halifax.

#### NOMINATIONS.

Nominations to the Moderatorship made by Presbyteries were called for and read, as follows:—By the Presbyteries of Huron, St. John, Hamilton, Stratford and Maitland in favour of Dr. McKnight.

# ELECTION OF MODERATOR.

It was then moved by Dr. McDonald, of Hamilton, seconded by Principal McVicar.—That the Rev. Principal McKnight be elected Moderator of this General Assembly. The motion was carried by acclamation, and Principal McKnight was conducted to the chair by the mover and seconder of his appointment. Dr. McKnight then addressed the Assembly, thanking them for the honour conferred upon him, claiming the usual consideration and aid accorded to the position in which he was placed, and dwelling at some length on the progress of the Church during the decade since the union of 1875, and on the present satisfactory and hopeful condition of all the enterprises—missionary and other—in which she is engaged.

#### THANKS TO RETIRING MODERATOR.

It was then moved by Dr. Burns, seconded by Mr. John Thompson, and unanimously agreed to,—That cordial thanks be tendered to the retiring Moderator for the efficient manner in which he has discharged the duties of his office, and for the able and appropriate discourse with which he has opened the present session of the Assembly.

#### REPORT-BUSINESS COMMITTEE.

The Committee to prepare business for the first Sederunt handed in a Report, which was read by Dr. Laing, the Clerk of said Committee. The Report was received, and in

accord made,

I. That the hours of business shall ten o'clock in the forenoon till half-past twelve, and from half-past two in the afternoon, till half-past five, and from half-past seven till ten o'clock. That to-morrow the Assembly meet at eleven o'clock, and that the first hour be spent in devotional exercises.

The Assembly then adjourned to meet to-morrow morning at eleven o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

#### SECOND SEDERUNT.

At the City of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church there, Thursday, the eleventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five years, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon:—

The General Assembly met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted by the Moderator with prayer. As agreed upon last night, devotional exercises were continued, prayer being offered in succession by Mr. Thomas Lowry, Dr. Wardrope, Mr. Andrew Wilson and Dr. Burns, with the singing of Psalms and the reading of the Scriptures.

The Minutes of the first Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### LETTER FROM SIR WILLIAM DAWSON.

A letter from Sir William Dawson, Principal of McGill University, was presented and read, extending an invitation to the members of the General Assembly and their friends to visit and make use of the Library and Museum of the University during their stay in the city.

#### LETTER FROM YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

A letter was also read from D. A. Budge, Esq., Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association, offering the members of the Assembly the freedom of their Reading Room and Library, and all the privileges connected with the Association, during the present meeting of the Assembly.

The Clerk was instructed to acknowledge with thanks the letters from Sir William Dawson and Mr. Budge.

#### REPORT ON BILLS.

Mr. Allan Simpson presented and read the first Report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, recommending:—

- I. As the orders of the day for this morning and the afternoon, the appointment of the following Committes:—
  - (a) On applications of Ministers to retire from the active exercise of the Ministry.
- (b) On applications from Presbyteries for leave to receive Ministers and Licentiates from other Churches.
  - (c) On application of Presbyteries with reference to Students.
  - (d) On Returns to Remits.
  - (e) A Committee to nominate a Committee on Standing Committees.
  - (f) A Committee on Loyal Address.
  - II. Consideration of the Report of the Hymnal Committee.
  - III. Consideration of College Reports.
- IV. For the evening Sederunt, the Home Mission Reports together with those on the Augmentation Fund.

Dr. MacLaren submitted a despatch from Lord Melgund, the Governor General's Secretary, acknowledging the receipt of an address of condolence to Her Majesty the Queen, on the death of His Royal Highness, the Duke of Albany, and also an address of congratulation to the Governor-General on the occasion of his appointment to office, and stating that the address to Her Majesty had been duly forwarded to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, with the request that it should be laid at the foot of the Throne; and further, expressing His Excellency's cordial satisfaction with the address to himself, and tendering his warmest thanks for the kind wishes extended to Lady Landsdowne, and himself.

# RESOLUTION-TORONTO METHODIST CONFERENCE.

There was presented also by Dr. MacLaren and read a memorial addressed to the Moderator of the General Assembly from the Women's Christian Temperance Union of the Province of Quebec, asking for recognition, sympathy and aid in the work in which they were engaged. On motion made and duly seconded the memorial was referred to the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet at halfpast two o'clock, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt closed with the Benediction. The with pra The

# APPLICATIONS ON BEHALF OF STUDENTS.

The Assembly took up applications of various kinds, from Presbyteries on behalf of students. The first of these applications, namely, that from the Presbytery of St. John, on behalf of Mr. Fisk and Mr. Cahill, and papers in relation thereto, were read. On motion of Mr. W. Mortimer Clark, duly seconded, it was agreed to remit the above mentioned application and papers, together with all remaining applications on behalf of students, with relative papers, without further reading, to the Committee appointed to consider said applications.

# REPORT OF HYMNAL COMMITTEE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Hymnal Committee. The Report was submitted and read by Dr. Gregg, Joint-Convener, setting forth the work accomplished

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by the Committee during the year, in issuing editions of the "Hymnal," the "Psalter and Hymnal" and the "Children's Hymnal," giving details of the financial condition of the enterprise, and closing with certain recommendations for the adoption of the Assembly. It was moved by Dr. Cochrane, seconded by Dr. Burns, and agreed to, That the Report be received and adopted, the cordial thanks of the Assembly tendered to the members of the Committee, and especially to Drs. Gregg and Jenkins, for their valuable labours in this important work of the Church, and that the Moderator be requested to nominate the Committee for the ensuing year at some future Sederunt.

On motion of Mr. Croil, duly seconded, it was agreed to remit to the consideration of the Hymnal Committee, to be appointed, the expediency of changing the name "The Children's Hymnal" into that of "The Sabbath School Hymnal," or some other more eligible name than that which the book now bears.

#### COLLEGES

The Assembly called for the Reports of the Boards of the several Colleges of the Church.

Halifax.—The Report of the Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, was presented in printed form, by Dr. Burns, the Chairman of the Board, who spoke of the present condition of the College, the number of students in attendance and the desirableness of increased financial support. On motion of Dr. Burns, seconded by Mr. J. A. Murray, the Assembly agreed as follows:—Receive and adopt the report, express satisfaction at the increasing number of students and the prospect of reduction in the outlay for the Arts course. The General Assembly would further impress on all the congregations within the constituency of the College the indispensable necessity of making the annual collection, so that income and expenditure may be equalized.

Montreal.—The Report of the Board of Management of the Presbyterian Collège, Montreal, was presented in printed form, on behalf of the Chairman, Mr. David Morrice, by Principal MacVicar, who spoke of the condition of the College, especially in regard to the large attendance of students and the endowment of the "Edward Mackay" chair. It was moved by Principal MacVicar, seconded by Principal Caven, and agreed to, That the Report be received and adopted, and that the cordial thanks of the Assembly be given to Messrs. Hugh, James and Robert Mackay for their munificence in the payment of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) as endowment of the "Edward Mackay" chair.

QUEEN'S.—The Report of the Trustees of Queen's University and College was presented in printed form by Principal Grant, who briefly adverted to the state of the institution under his direction, and the large number of students in attendance, as well as to its financial condition and prospects, mentioning also the steps taken in reference to the proposed confederation of Universities and Colleges. It was moved by Mr. George M. Milligan, duly seconded, as follows:—Receive and adopt the Report, and express gratification at the large and steadily increasing number of students attending every department of the University. It was moved, in amendment, by Mr. Mortimer Clark, and seconded:—Receive the Report and express satisfaction with the progress of the institution. A vote was taken, when the motion was carried by a large majority, and the Assembly decerned in terms thereof.

KNOX.—Mr. W. Mortimer Clark, Chairman of the Board, presented and read the Report of the Board of Management of Knox College, setting forth the condition of the institution in regard to the attendance of students, the progress of the endowment and the necessity of largely increased contributions for current expenses. On motion of Mr. Clark, duly seconded, the Report was received.

The hour of half-past five o'clock having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again at half-past seven o'clock, which was publicly intimated from the chair, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

# FOURTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening:-

The General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment and was constituted with praise and prayer by the Moderator.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### COMMITTEE ON HYMNAL.

The Moderator now named the members to compose the Hymnal Committee agreed upon at the last Sederunt, as follows:—Dr. John Jenkins and Dr. William Gregg, Joint Conveners; Dr. James, Dr. Macrae, Professor Mowat, Messrs. D. D. McLeod, P. McF. McLeod, D. B. Cameron, D. J. Macdonnell, John Thomson (Ayr), R. Murray, W. B. McMurrich, James Maclellan, Q.C., Archibald MacMurchy, Thomas Kirkland, R. Kilgour.

#### COLLEGE COMMITTEE-TO SIT.

Mr. Maclennan asked and obtained leave for the Committee on College Affairs to sit for business this evening, concurrently with the present session of the Assembly.

# HOME MISSIONS' REPORTS.

The Assembly called for the Reports on Home Missions in both Sections of the Church. The Report on the Home Missions of the Eastern Section of the Church was presented in printed form by Mr. Ephraim Scott, of New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, who dwelt more especially on the encouraging results which had been reached in securing funds for bringing up the salaries of all the ministers in that section to the minimum aimed at by the General Assembly. Mr. Scott read a resolution for the disposal of the report. Mr. George Bruce seconded the motion and spoke more especially of the Home Mission work proper of the Church in the Eastern Section. It was agreed, without a vote, now to receive the Report, and defer, in the meantime, taking action on the motion submitted for its disposal.

#### HOME MISSIONS-WESTERN SECTION.

Dr. Cochrane, the Convener of the Committee for the Western Section of the Church, submitted the Report for that Section in printed form, and spoke at length on the great expansion of the Mission Fields of the Church and of the encouraging progress made in fully occupying those fields, stating the increase in the pecuniary contributions from the congregations in this country, and the very liberal grants to this Church for their Mission Schemes, from the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Free Church and the Established Church in Scotland, and closing with the reading of certain recommendations for the adoption of the Assembly. Dr. Cochrane moved that the Report be received and its recommendations considered seriatim. Mr. D. J. Macdonnell seconded the motion, and spoke at length on the Scheme for Augmentation of Stipend. The motion was adopted and the Assembly proceeded to the consideration of the recommendations one by one, On motions by Dr. Cochrane, duly seconded, the first, second and third recommendations were adopted. On motion of Dr. MacLaren, seconded by Dr. Cochrane, an additional resolution was adopted in reference to the formation of Women's Missionary Societies. And, on motion of Mr. D. J. Macdonnell, duly seconded, a resolution was adopted in reference to certain exceptional cases in the Presbyteries of London and Bruce. The recommendations and resolutions as agreed upon are as follows:-

1. That no grant be made to any congregation for the year beginning on the first of April, 1885, where arrears of salary are reported as due on the 31st December last, until such arrears shall have been paid, and that this be a permanent regulation for working the Scheme from year to year.

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Mr. addre missi land, 2. That in view of exceptional circumstances in certain fields, as, for instance, where there is not full work for a minister, on account of the small number of families in the locality, or on account of the proximity of another congregation, or where there might be a rearrangement of congregations, so as to secure greater economy and efficiency in carrying on the work, the Committee, after correspondence with Presbyteries, shall have discretionary power to withhold aid or to grant less than the full amount required to make the Stipends seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750), and Manse, and Presbyteries are instructed where, in their judgment, the circumstances require it, to make application for a reduced grant.

- 3. That hereafter the Home Mission Committee meet annually in March, instead of semi-annually in October and March, as hitherto, and that the Executive attend to all matters requiring action during the year, the names of a representative each from Barrie Presbytery and from the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West being added to the members comprising the Executive.
- 4. That the Committee be empowered to prepare a Constitution and Rules for the formation of Women's Missionary Societies on behalf of Home Mission Work.
- 5. That in the exceptional cases of the congregations of London East in the Presbytery of London, and Hanover and North Normanby in the Presbytery of Bruce, the Committee be empowered to make grants notwithstanding the inability of said congregations to fulfil the conditions required by the regulations of the Assembly.

#### EASTERN SECTION.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the resolution submitted by Mr. Scott for the disposal of the Reports on Home Missions and Supplements for the Eastern Section of the Church. The resolution was adopted and is as follows:—Receive and adopt the Reports, thank the Committees, record their thankfulness for the steady progress in the Home Mission Field, and in regard to supplementing work, record their high appreciation of the liberality of their people, and their fervent gratitude to God for the signal success which has crowned their efforts; express their strong desire that the position which has been so happily reached may be permanently maintained; sanction the appropriations which have been made for the past year, authorize the payments for which the sanction of this Assembly has been already asked, and again empower the Committee to deal with all applications which may be submitted to them for the current year with the understanding that the regulations of the Assembly shall be carefully observed.

The Assembly further agree that the congregations of Musquodoboit Harbour, New Annan and Tignish be treated as special cases, and that their grants be left to the discretion of the Committee, though as yet unable to fulfil all the conditions of the scheme.

# LETTER-COLONIAL COMMITTEE UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

Dr. Cochrane here read a letter from the Rev. George F. Hutton, Secretary of the Colonial Committee of the United Presbyterian Church in Scotland, stating in substance that, in addition to their grants to Manitoba College, the general work of the Church had been taken up by the Students' Scheme, and that they were likely to raise a considerable sum for the promotion of our missions in this country.

#### ADDRESS OF MR. JAMES ROBERTSON.

On the suggestion of Dr. Burns, of Halifax, and at the request of the Assembly, Mr. James Robertson, Superintendent of Missions for Manitoba and the North-West, addressed the House at length on the conditions of life, and the state and progress of the missions of the Church in that wide and important field in those distant regions of our land, lying open for the occupation of the Church.

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#### ADDRESS OF MR. ALLAN RELL.

Mr. Allan Bell, of Portage la Prairie, also addressed the Assembly briefly, mentioning especially the destruction of their church by fire, and commending the congregation to the sympathy and aid of members of the Assembly, and of the Church at large, in the difficult circumstances in which they were placed by the loss of their house of worship.

#### MOTION BY DR. BURNS.

It was then moved by Dr. Burns, seconded by Dr. King, as follows:—The General. Assembly rejoices in the good news of the progress of our Church in the North-West, and especially in the success of the church-building enterprise. The Assembly would gratefully recognize the signal services rendered by our beloved brethren in connection with the rebellion there, as well as the self-denying labours of all our ministers and missionaries who, amid many difficulties and trials, have made full proof of their ministry and secured for our Church so firm a foot-hold in that great and growing field.

Before action was taken on the foregoing motion the hour of adjournment arrived, and the Assembly adjourned, to meet again to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

# FIFTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church there, Friday, the twelfth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five years, at ten o'clock in the forenoon:—

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, according to adjournment, and was constituted by the Moderator with praise and prayer.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

# REPORT ON BILLS.

Dr. Laing, from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, presented and read a Report, stating the business to be brought before the Assembly and the order in which the same should be proceeded with. The Report, on motion, was received and adopted.

#### HOME MISSIONS.

- 1. Unification of Funds.—The Assembly returned to the consideration of the business of Home Missions, before the House at the adjournment last night, and on motion of Mr. R. Laing, of Halifax, duly seconded, agreed as follows:—That a Committee consisting of the members of the Augmentation Committees—West and East—here present, be a Committee to draft a Scheme for the Unification of the Funds, to be submitted to this Assembly.
- 2. Separation Home Mission and Augmentation Funds, etc.—Mr. R. H. Warden, seconded by Mr. J. G. Forbes, moved as follows:—The General Assembly desires to place on record its gratification at the satisfactory progress made during the past year in connection with the Home Mission and Augmentation Work; commends these Schemes anew to the sympathy and liberality of the congregations of the Church, directing special attention to the resolution of last Assembly separating the two Funds in the Western Section, and tenders cordial thanks to the Scottish and Irish Churches for their generous aid to our Home Mission Work. The Assembly adopted the motion and decerned accordingly.
- 3. Motion of Dr. Burns.—The Assembly then adopted unanimously the resolution submitted by Dr. Burns last night in connection with the mission work of the Church in Manitoba and the North-West, and recorded at the close of the last Sederunt, which see.

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#### COLLEGES.

Knox.—The Assembly resumed consideration of the reports on colleges, and took up the Report on Knox College. Mr. W. Mortimer Clark called the attention of the Assembly to a resolution of the Board of Management at a recent meeting, in substance as follows:—"The Board, after another year's experience in the working of the system of a Common College Fund, and after mature consideration of the whole subject, respectfully request the General Assembly to abolish the Common Fund, and permit congregations to contribute directly to the support of whatever colleges they desire particularly to benefit by their liberality." Mr. Clark moved, duly seconded, that the resolution of the College Board, as above written, be remitted for consideration to the Committee on College Affairs now dealing with other questions relating to the colleges of the Church. The motion was agreed to and the Assembly ordered accordingly.

#### DR. PROUDFOOT'S SALARY.

Principal Caven moved, duly seconded, That the resolution of the Board of Management of Knox College, in regard to the salary of the Lecturer on Homiletics, be referred for consideration to the Committee on Colleges above-mentioned in the motion of Mr. Clark. The motion of Principal Caven was agreed to, and the Assembly ordered said resolution to be referred as requested, in terms following:—"The attention of the Board having been called to the fact that the salary of the Rev. Dr. Proudfoot has not been increased in the same ratio as that of the Professors, they recommend to the Assembly that this should be done."

#### REPORT BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

Dr. Laing, Chairman of the Board of Examiners of Knox College, read the Report of the Examinations at the opening of the College in October, and at the close of the Session in April. The Assembly received the Report.

# COLLEGE COMMITTEE TO MEET FOR BUSINESS.

Mr. Maclennan asked and obtained leave for the Committee on Colleges to sit for business, for some time, during this Session of the Assembly.

#### MORRIN COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Governors of Morrin College. The Report was presented in printed form by Dr. Mathews, of Quebec, who, at the same time, spoke briefly on the important place occupied by the College in the Province of Quebec, and the value to the Church of the work which it performed in the position and circumstances in which it is placed.

The following Deliverance, on motion of Dr. Mathews, seconded by Mr. John Thompson, of Sarnia, was adopted:—The Assembly receive and adopt the Report; record its deep sense of the helpfulness of Morrin College as an arts institution in furthering superior education in the Province of Quebec, and express its gratification with the high standing secured by so many of its students. The Assembly, further, recognize with pleasure the work of its Theological Faculty in furnishing many ministers to the Church, and cordially renew its recommendation to the congregations of the Presbytery of Quebec to aid Morrin College financially by every means in their power.

# MANITOBA COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Board of Management of Manitoba College. The Report was presented in printed form by Principal King, who spoke at length of the high standing taken by former and present students, the improved financial condition of

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the institution, its importance in connection with the work of the Church in Manitoba and the North-West, and the desirability of more general support from the congregations of the Church at large.

It was moved by Principal Caven, seconded by Mr. D. J. Macdonnell, and agreed to as follows:—The General Assembly receives and adopts the Report of the Manitoba College; records its satisfaction with the progress made by the college during the year, and with the more hopeful condition of the college as presented in the report, and tenders its thanks to the Irish and Scottish Churches for generous aid continued to the College. The Assembly expresses regret that a large number of congregations have disregarded the Assembly's appointment of a collection on behalf of the college, and instructs all the congregations of the Church to take up collections during the present year. The General Assembly refers the cases of H. W. Fraser and A. B. Winchester, students, to the Committee on Students, expresses its approval of the step taken to institute examinations for the degree of B.D. by the college, instructing the Senate to make the work, as nearly as possible, equal to that required by the other colleges of the Church, and empowers the Board of the College to make application to the Legislature for such a modification of the Act of Incorporation as will give a Board of twenty-five instead of tifteen, with a corresponding increase of the Senate.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again at half-past two o'clock, which was intimated from the Chair, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

# SIXTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:—
The Assembly met, and was constituted with praise and prayer by the Moderator.
The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

# STATE OF THE COUNTRY, ETC.

It was moved by Mr. W. T. McMullen, seconded by Mr. Stuart Acheson, and agreed to,—That a committee be appointed to draft a resolution, to be presented to the Assembly at a subsequent Sederunt, on the State of the Country in reference to the recent disturbances in the North-West, and the present aspect of affairs. The Committee under the foregoing resolution was appointed as follows:—Mr. W. T. McMullen, Dr. Laing, Dr. Burns, Mr. J. Barclay, Dr. Moore. Dr. Burns, Convener.

# PROPOSED NEW PRESBYTERIES.

The Assembly took up certain applications for the erection of new Presbyteries.

1. There was read an application from certain ministerial members of the Presbytery of Toronto for the erection of a new Presbytery, in part within the bounds of said Presbytery, to be called the Presbytery of Orangeville. A similar application was made for the erection of the same Presbytery, under the same name, by the Presbytery of Saugeen, naming the congregations to be included in said new Presbytery within the bounds of the Presbyteries of Guelph, Saugeen and Barrie. On motion of Dr. Laing, duly seconded, the Assembly agreed to appoint a committee to consider the applications foregoing, and to report to this Assembly.

2. There was taken up and read a memorial from the Presbytery of Brandon, praying for the division of said Presbytery and the erection of a new Presbytery within its bounds. It was agreed, on motion of Dr. Laing, duly seconded, to remit this application to the same committee as the foregoing.

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The ne Ministers' I motion of I of business 3. There was taken up next an application from certain ministers in British Columbia for the erection of a Presbytery in that Province, in connection with this Church, to be called the Presbytery of New Westminster. On motion of Dr. Cochrane it was agreed that this application be remitted to the committee to be appointed to consider the applications foregoing for the erection of new Presbyteries.

#### COMMITTEES APPOINTED.

- 3. A Committee on Loyal Addresses, to draft an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, and also an address to the Governor-General of this Dominion:—Dr. Burns, Convener; Mr. James Barclay, the Hon. Alexander Morris

#### RETIRING MINISTERS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee, to whom was referred the applications of Presbyteries for leave to ministers to retire from the active exercise of the ministry. The Report was presented and read by the Convener of the Committee, Dr. Cochrane. The Report was received, and its several clauses were considered *seriatim*; and the Assembly granted the applications of the Presbyteries following for the ministers named to retire from the active duties of the ministry, with disposals otherwise, as stated below, in regard to two of the applications:—

The General Assembly, on the recommendation of the Committee, declined to entertain the application of the Presbytery of Quebec on behalf of Mr. W. Matheson.

#### MR. EBENEZER ROSS.

The General Assembly took up the application of the Presbytery of Truro on behalf of Mr. Ebenezer Ross. On motion of Mr. Robert Murray, seconded by Mr. W. T. McMullen, it was agreed to refer the whole matter of Mr. Ross's application to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, with power to dispose of the same.

On motion of Dr. Cochrane, duly seconded, the report was adopted as a whole.

# AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

The next order of business was the Report of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund; but, at the request of Mr. Middlemiss, the Convener, it was agreed, on motion of Dr. Laing, that the Report be not now taken up, and that it be the first order of business on Wednesday next.

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#### COMPLAINT OF DR. FLEMING.

The Assembly took up the complaint of Dr. Fleming against the action of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories in reference to his appeal from a deed of the Presbytery of Brandon. An extract Minute of the Synod in the case was read. Dr. Fleming was called, and was not present.

The Assembly agreed to proceed to the next order of business.

# SUPPLY OF MISSION STATIONS AND SUMMER SESSIONS OF COLLEGES,

Overtures were now taken up having reference to the means of furnishing supply to the Mission Stations during the winter months, and representing as a possible method of attaining this object the holding of Summer Sessions in one or more of the Theological Colleges, thus setting a proportion of the students free for winter employment in the mission field.

The Overtures were as follows:-

- (1) From the Presbytery of Barrie.
- (2) From the Presbytery of Guelph, with Dr. Wardrope and Mr. J. K. Smith to support the same.
- (3) From the Presbytery of Ottawa, with Dr. Moore and Mr. Armstrong to support the same.
- (4) From the Presbytery of Brockville. The Overtures, Nos. 3 and 4, were transmitted by the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa.
- (5) From the Presbytery of Paris, transmitted by the Synod of Hamilton and London, with Dr. Cochrane and Mr. J. Thompson, of Sarnia, to support the same.
- (6) From the Presbytery of Owen Sound, transmitted by the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, Messrs. Somerville and Scott to support the same.

Dr. Cochrane was heard in support of the Overture transmitted by the Synod of Hamilton and London, Dr. Wardrope for the Overture from the Presbytery of Guelph, Messrs. Somerville and Scott for the Overture from Owen Sound.

It was stated in regard to the Overfure from the Presbytery of Brockville, that the Commissioners from the Presbytery had been appointed to support the Overture. Dr. Jardine and Mr. Burnfield, the only Commissioners who responded to the call of the House, did not avail themselves of the opportunity of addressing the Assembly.

Dr. MacLaren submitted, verbally, a motion for the disposal of the whole subject brought up by the Overtures.

The hour of adjournment having arrived the Assembly adjourned, to meet again at half-past seven o'clock, which was publicly intimated, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

# SEVENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-1 ast seven o'clock in the evening:

The General Assembly met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with praise, the reading of the Scriptures and prayer by the Moderator.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read, and being amended, were sustained.

#### COMMITTEE ON NEW PRESBYTERIES.

The Moderator now appointed the Committee to consider the applications for the erection of new Presbyteries, as follows:—Mr. J. K. Smith, Convener; Messrs. R. D. Fraser, D. McLeod (Priceville), J. Leishman, James Robertson, A. Bell, C. B. Pitblado, Dr. Cochrane, J. Lillico, C. Davidson, James Watson, J. Croil, W. B. Wood, J. L. Blaikie.

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# FOREIGN MISSIONS' REPORTS.

The Assembly called for the Reports of the Committees on the Foreign Missions of the Church. The Report on the Foreign Missions of the Western Section was presented in printed form by the Convener of the Committee, Dr. Wardrope, who spoke at length on the subjects embraced therein, and on Missions generally. On motion of Dr. Wardrope, seconded by Mr. Charles Davidson, it was agreed now to receive the report, and to consider the recommendations at a subsequent diet of the Assembly.

The Report on Foreign Missions for the Eastern Section of the Church was presented in printed form, for the Convener, Mr. Alexander McLean, of Hopewell, by D. C. Fraser, Esq., of New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, who addressed the Assembly at some length on the state of the Missions under the care of the Eastern Section of the Committee, and on the subject of Missions at large. On motion of Mr. Fraser, seconded by Mr. W. Donald, of Pictou, the Assembly agreed now to receive the Report and to take it up for consideration at a future Sederunt.

The Assembly engaged in praise, singing the Hymn, "Jesus shall reign where'er the sun," etc.

ADDRESS OF MR. ANNAND.

At the request of the Assembly, Mr. Joseph Annand, a Missionary of the Eastern Section of the Church on the Islan.' of Aneiteum, in the New Hebrides group, now on furlough, addressed the House at length on the state of the Missions generally in those remote isles of the sea, and directing especial attention to the field which he himself had occupied for the last thirteen years.

The Assembly engaged in praise, singing two stanzas of the Missionary Hymn, "From Greenland's Icy Mountains," etc.

#### ADDRESS OF MR. ROBERT CAMPUELL MURRAY.

Dr. Wardrope read from the Report on Foreign Missions, Western Section, a paragraph in relation to the acceptance of the offer of service of Mr. Robert Campbell Murray, B.A., as a Missionary to Central India, and an intimation given by the congregation of St. Paul's Church, Montreal, of their readiness to support a missionary in India, and quoted from a letter on the subject from the Rev. James Barelay, pastor of the church, in terms following:-" Of course the appointment and supervision of the missionary would be entirely in the Committee's hands. We would furnish the annual income, and he would be in a special manner our missionary. No guarantee can be given except the Christian liberality and sense of duty of the eongregation, of which I have little fear."

Mr. Murray, the Missionary-elect, then briefly addressed the Assembly, stating especially the steps, by which he had been led to devote himself to the service of Christ in the Foreign Mission field.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly agreed still to continue in session, in order to hear Mr. Fraser Campbell, our Missionary from Mhow, about soon to return to his field of labour. Mr. Campbell then addressed the House at length upon the state of Missions among the teeming millions of the great land in which he had recently exercised his ministry, speaking especially of the urgent need of greater efforts to send forth more labourers, and the duty of the Church in this regard.

# COMMITTEE TO STRIKE STANDING COMMITTEES.

Dr. Cochrane reported from the Committee appointed at the last Sederunt, to submit a list of names of ministers and elders to compose a Committee to nominate the Standing Committees of the Church, presenting the names following:—Messrs. A. McLean Sinclair, J. H. Chase, W. D. Armstrong, R. H. Warden, D. D. McLeed, G. M. Milligan, Dr.

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Cochrane, John Thompson (Sarnia), D. H. Fletcher, James Ross, Dr. Bryce, C. B. Pitblado and Alexander Campbell, ministers; the Hon. David Laird, Messrs. J. G. Forbes, George Hay, R. Kilgour, Warden King, George W. Rutherford and Hamilton Cassels, elders; Dr. Cochrane, Convener. The Committee was duly appointed, and instructed to proceed with their work with all convenient despatch.

The Assembly adjourned, to meet at ten o'clock to-morrow morning, of which public intination was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

# EIGHTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Montreat, and within Crescent Street Church there, Saturday, the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five years, at ten o'clock in the forenoon:—

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, pursuant to adjournment last night, and was constituted by the Moderator with praise and prayer.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### REPORT ON BILLS, ETC.

Dr. Laing reported from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, submitting a printed list of the subjects to come before the Assembly, with additional items in manuscript. Dr. Laing moved, duly seconded, That the list now submitted be adopted as the order of business. The motion was adopted, and the Assembly ordered accordingly. It was then moved by Mr. R. J. Beattie, seconded by Dr. Laing and agreed to, That the Report on Statistics be made the second order of the day for Wednes ay morning next.

# SUPPLY OF MISSION STATIONS AND COLLEGE SESSIONS.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the supply of Mission Stations during the winter months, and with a view to the attainment of this object the proposal to have sessions of the Theological Colleges during the summer, brought up yesterday afternoon by overtures from Presbyteries and Synods, Dr. MacLaren now submitted, in writing, for the disposal of the subject of those Overtures, the motion of which he had stated the substance in words at the close of the Sederunt yesterday afternoon, seconded by Dr. F. R. Beattie, of Brantford. Mr. John Somerville, seconded by Mr. James Robertson, submitted a motion in amendment. After long reasoning, and considering that Dr. MacLaren's motion in an amended form, permitted by the Assembly, differed but very slightly from that of Mr. Somerville, Dr. MacLaren, with the leave of the Assembly, withdrew his motion in favour of the amendment of Mr. Somerville, and as Mr. Somerville's amendment had certain names appended, proposed as members of a Committee to take the whole subject into consideration, the Assembly agreed to adopt the amendment without the sanctioning of the names submitted as members of Committee. The motion of Mr. Somerville as adopted is as follows, viz.:—Receive the Overtures, express sympathy with the Presbyteries in seeking to overtake the Mission work in out-lying districts, and in seeking a solution of the difficulty of obtaining supply of ordinances for our destitute fields, and remit the overtures to a Committee to consider the whole question of the continuous supply of our Mission Fields, with instructions to report at an early Sederunt.

#### COMMITTEE.

The Assembly then agreed to appoint as the Committee under the foregoing resolution, the same Ministers and Elders proposed by Mr. Somerville, with additional names as follows: Dr. Cochrane, Dr. Campbell, Dr. Beattie, Messrs. D. D. McLeod, R. Moodie,

Gill, Dr. MacLaren, Professor Scrimger, Dr. Cook, Dr. Grant, Dr. King, Convener.

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#### SUPPLY-CRESCENT STREET CHURCH.

Professor Scrimger reported from the Committee appointed yesterday evening, charged with making arrangements for preaching before the Assembly, recommending the appointment of Dr. Mathews, of Quebec, to preach in Crescent Street Church to-morrow forenoon, and the Rev. John Pringle, of Kildonan, in the evening. The Assembly received and adopted the Report, and ordered in accordance therewith.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again on Monday, the fifteenth day of this present month, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, of which the Moderator gave public intimation, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

# NINTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church there, Monday, the fifteenth day of June, one thousand eight kundred and eighty-five years, at ten o'clock in the forenoon :-

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, pursuant to adjournment, on Saturday morning, and was constituted by the Moderator with praise and prayer.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### NEW PRESBYTERIES-REPORT ON.

Mr. J. K. Smith, from the Committee appointed on Friday last to take into consideration applications for the erection of new Presbyteries, submitted and read a Report to the following effect; your Committee would report:-

I. Anent the petitions from Orangeville congregation and others to form a new Presbytery that the prayer of the petitions be granted; That the name of the new Presbytery be Orangerille, and consist of the following congregations:

From Toronto Presbytery.—1. Orangeville. 2. Shelburne and Primrose. 3. Charleston and Alton. 4. Mono Mills, Mono East, St. Andrew's, Caledon and Caledon East. Mission Stations: 5. Horning's Mills and Honeywood. 6. Camilia and Mono Centre. 7. Knox Church, Caledon.

Barrie Presbytery.—1. Mulmur and Rosemont. 2. Singhampton and Maple Valley. Saugeen Presbytery.—1. Priceville and Bunessan. 2. McIntyre's, Maxwell and Fever-3. Markdale and Flesherton. 4. Dundalk and Fraser Settlement. 5. South Luther, Little Toronto and Waldemar. Mission Stations: 1. Black's Corners. 2. Gandier Station. 3. St. Andrew's Church, Proton.

Also, Congregations additional in the Presbytery of Toronto.—1. First and Second Chinguacousy. 2. Cheltenham and Mount Pleasant.

In the Presbytery of Guelph.-1. Hillsburgh and Price's Corners. 2. Erin and Ospringe, to be allowed to unite in due form any time during the year with the new Presbytery; and that the first Moderator be the Rev. Alex. McFaul, and that it hold its first meeting in the church in Orangeville on the second Tuesday of September, 1885.

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# Presbytery of New Westminster.

II. That the prayer of the Petition from Messrs, J. S. McKay, M. A., D. Fraser, M. A., Thomas Thompson and John Chisholm, B.A., Ministers of this Church, and John C. Brown, and Alex. McDougall, Elders, in British Columbia, be granted; and that a Presbytery be erected entitled *The Presbytery of New Westminster*, and consist of Messrs. Donald Fraser, M. A., Thomas G. Thompson, John Chisholm, B. A., J. S. McKay, M. A., and representative Elders; that its first Moderator be Mr. J. S. McKay, M. A., and that the first meeting be held at St. Andrew's Church, New Westminster, on the third Wednesday of August, 1885, and that, in the meantime, the Presbytery have Synodical powers.

# Division Brandon Presbytery, etc.

III That the prayer of the petition of Brandon Presbytery, as transmitted through the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, be granted, and a new Presbytery erected; that its extreme eastern boundary be the western Provincial boundary line of the Province of Manitoba, and that it consist of the following congregations and Mission Stations: Alameda, Battleford, Broadview, Calgary, Carlisle, Carrot River, Cathcart, Cut Arm Creek, Dunafries, Edmonton, Fort McLeod, Fort Qu'Appelle, Fort Saskatchewan, Green Valley, Grenfell, Indian Head, Jumping Creek, Long Lake, Medicine Hat, Moosomino Moose Jaw, Pine Creek, Prince Albert, Qu'Appelle Station, Regina, Southworth, Moose Mountain, Touchwood Hills, Whitewood, Wolseley, Yorktown, Broadview Reserve, Crow Stand, Mestawasis Reserve; that the name of the Presbytery be Regina, that the Rev. P. S. Livingstone be the first Moderator, and that it hold its first meeting at Regina, in the Church there, on the 15th day of July, 1885, at eleven o'clock.

On motion made and duly seconded, the Assembly received the Report and proceeded to consider its several clauses seriatim.

# Orangeville Preshylery.

On the recommendation for the erection of a new Presbytery under the name of the Presbytery of Orangeville, it was moved by Mr. R. H. Warden, duly seconded and agreed to, as follows: That this recommendation be remitted to the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, with power to take such action as the Synod deem best in the interests of the Church, with instruction to the Presbyteries affected to consider the matter and report to the Synod at its meeting next May.

#### New Westminster.

On the recommendation to erect a Presbytery in British Columbia, under the name of the Presbytery of New Westminster, it was agreed, on motion of Dr. King, seconded by Mr. John Somerville, That the whole question as to the erection of said Presbytery be remitted for consideration to the Home Mission Committee, Western Section, to report thereon to next General Assembly.

# Preshytery of Regina,

The recommendation for the division of the Presbytery of Brandon and the erection of a new Presbytery was adopted; the new Presbytery to be constituted and defined as to its name, boundaries, congregations, name of first Moderator, and the time and place of its first meeting, as in the report of the Committee.

Moved by Dr. King, duly seconded and agreed to: That the new Presbytery of Regina be authorized to appoint two of its members to represent the Presbytery on the Synodical Committee of Missions.

The Superintendent of Missions, Mr. James Robertson, having requested the Assembly to define his Presbyterial connection under the new arrangement of Presbyteries, the Assembly agreed that his name should continue on the Roll of the Presbytery of Brandon.

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#### COLLEGE FUND.

The Assembly called for the Leport of the Treasurers of the Common Fund for Colleges. The Report was handed in, in printed form, by Mr. R. H. Warden, showing that the total receipts for the year amounted to ten thousand eight hundred and thirty dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$10,830.78), which was appropriated as follows:

The Report also contained a tabulated statement of receipts from the various Presby teries, and from Sabbath Schools and private individuals for the several years since 1880, and annexed to the Report a detailed statement of the contributions for the past year. On motion the Report was received and adopted.

#### CONSOLIDATION OF COLLEGES AND DISTRIBUTION OF COMMON COLLEGE PUND.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Consolidation of Colleges and the Distribution of the Common College Fund. The Report was presented and read by James Maclennan, Esq., Q.C. On motion of Mr. Maclennan, duly seconded, the Report was received, and the Assembly proceeded to consider its clauses scriatim. It was moved by Mr. Maclennan, and duly seconded, That the following finding of the Committee regarding the consolidation of Colleges be adopted, viz.: That the consoli dation of the existing Colleges is at present impracticable, and the further discussion of the question unwise, and fitted to be injurious to the interests of the Church. It was moved in amendment by Mr. John Charlton, M.P., seconded by Mr. W. T. McMullen, That the motion be amended by striking out all after the word. "That" and substituting "In the opinion of the Assembly College consolidation would increase the resources and equipment of our Theological Schools, and greatly promote the thoroughness and efficiency of the work of theological education and the best interests of the Church, and that the effort to secure consolidation should not be abandoned without thorough investigation as to whether the scheme is feasible or attainable; and that, therefore, the matter be remitted to a Special Committee, with instructions to give it their earnest consideration with a view of reporting to the next Assembly whether any satisfactory and mutually acceptable scheme of consolidation can be recommended, the Committee to consist of Hon, G. W. Ross, David Morrice, W. B. McMurrich, Dr. McDonald, James Maclennan, Q.C., Hamilton Cassels, D. C. Fraser, John S. Maclean, George Haddow, Principals Caven, MacVicar, Grant, McKnight and Cook, Messrs. W. T. McMullen, Burnfield, Bain, W. D. Armstrong, W. Donald, D. J. Macdonnell, Dr. Mathews, and the mover.

#### NEXT MEETING OF ASSESSED.

The Assembly now proceeded to the order of the day, to fix the time and place for the meeting of the next Assembly. It was moved by Mr. Robert Laing, seconded by Dr. Burns, That the next Assembly meet in the City of Halifax, and within St. Matthew's Church there, on the second Wednesday of June, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, at half-past seven in the evening. The motion was adopted, and the Assembly ordered accordingly.

#### COLLEGE OF MODERATORS.

There was taken up and read an overture from the Presbytery of Paris, transmitted by the Synod of Hamilton and London, regarding the action of last Assembly in constituting a College of Moderators to nominate a person for appointment as Moderator, with Messrs. McMullen and Fletcher and Dr. McDonald appointed to support the Overture

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before the Assembly, the prayer of the Overture being to the effect that the Assembly restore to Presbyteries the right of nomination to the Moderatorship, as had been the practice since the Union. An Overture of the same purport from the Presbytery of Barrie, transmitted by the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, was taken up and read, Mr. D. D. McLeod to support the same before the Assembly. Mr. McMullen, Dr. McDonald and Mr. Fletcher were heard in support of the Overture from the Synod of Hamilton and London.

The hour of adjournment arrived, but before closing Dr. McDonald gave notice that, at the commencement of the next Sederunt, he would move the reconsideration of the resolution fixing the place of meeting of the next Assembly at the City of Halifax, and the substitution therefor of the City of Hamilton.

The Assembly adjourned, to meet again at half-past two o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

# TENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:-

The Assembly met and was constituted with praise and prayer by the Moderator. The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

# REPORT ON BUSINESS.

Dr. Laing presented and read a report from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, submitting the following items of business and the order in which they should be taken up, namely:—

1. A memorial of Mr. D. A. Watt, with a recommendation that it be referred to a Special Committee to consider and report at a future Sederunt.

2. A letter appointing the Rev. Alexander McDonald a Deputy from the Free Church of Scotland, with a recommendation that he be invited to address, the Assembly at half-past nine o'clock this evening.

3. Recommend that the Memorial of the Presbytery of Barric regarding Mrs. Thirde

be taken up immediately after the Reports on the Widows' Funds.

The Report was, on motion of Dr. Laing, received, and the Assembly proceeded to consider the several clauses thereof. The first and third items in the Report were adopted without discussion. It was agreed that the Rev. Alexander McDonald, from the Free Church of Scotland should be heard by the Assembly at three quarters of an hour after nine o'clock this evening, instead of at half-past nine as recommended in the Report.

Dr. Wardrope here read a telegram from Dr. Mackay, our Missionary in China, as follows:—

#### TIME AND PLACE OF NEXT ASSEMBLY.

Dr. Macdonald now submitted the motion of which he gave notice at the close of last Sederunt for the reconsideration of the resolution agreeing to hold the meeting of next Assembly at Halifax. On motion of Dr. Macdonald, duly seconded, the reconsideration was carried. It was then moved by Dr. Macdonald, seconded by Mr. R. J. Laidlaw:

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Dr. the supp subject o the Over from oth That the next General Assembly meet at the City of Hamilton, and within St. Paul's Church there, on the second Wednesday of June, 1896, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening. The motion was carried, and the Assembly ordered in accordance therewith—the City of Hamilton being substituted for the City of Halifax, as agreed upon in the morning.

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COLLEGE OF MODERATORS.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the subject of the instituting of a College of Moderators for the purpose of selecting a fit and proper person to be presented to the Assembly for appointment as Moderator. Mr. D. D. McLeod was heard in support of the Overture on the subject, from the Presbytery of Barrie. It was then moved by Mr. D. D. McLeod, seconded by Mr. W. T. McMullen, as follows:—That the Overtures from the Presbyteries of Barrie and Paris, and the Synod of Hamilton and London be received, and the question of the mode of electing the Moderators of the General Assembly be sent down to Presbyteries to consider and report to next Assembly, and that, during the current year, the Presbyteries make nominations, as formerly, for the moderatorship of the next General Assembly. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Robert Campbell, seconded by Principal Grant, as follows:—Receive the Overtures and Memorials, but inasmuch as the Overture adopted by the last General Assembly regarding the mode of nominating the Moderator of the Court did not involve any constitutional principle, or interfere with any of the rights of Presbyteries, the Assembly does not deem it necessary to take further action in the premises. It was moved in amendment to the amendment by Dr. King, seconded by Dr. Reid, as follows:—That the motion be amended by substituting after the word "received" the following: And without approving of all the grounds on which the mode of making nominations to the Moderatorship adopted at last Assembly is complained of, the Assembly, in compliance with the prayer of the Overtures agrees to set aside the action of last Assembly anent the matter referred to therein. Votes were taken between the amendment to the amendment and the first amendment, when the amendment of Dr. King was carried by a majority. It was then moved by Dr. Cavon, seconded by Mr. Neil McKay, in amendment of the main motion of Mr. McLeod, and the amendment of Dr. King, that the main motion be amended by striking out the last clause thereof. This motion being put against the amendment of Dr. King was negatived. It was then moved in further amendment by Dr. Grant, seconded by Dr. Laing, as follows:—Receive the Overtures and resolve that the General Assembly, like other Courts of the Church, elect its Moderator on nominations made immediately after the Assembly has been constituted. Votes being taken in due order, the amendment of Dr. Grant was carried over the amendment of Dr. King and over the original motion, and became the judgment of the house.

# LABOURERS FOR MISSION WORK.

Mr. George Bruce presented and read a report from the Committee reappointed last year to consider further the subject of devising some scheme by which competent labourers might be obtained in greater numbers for the Home Mission Work of the Church, without requiring a full course of literary and theological training, and suggesting the means by which this object might be attained. On motion of Principal Caven, duly seconded, the Assembly agreed: That the report be received, and that it be sent to the Special Committee already appointed on the supply of the Home Mission Field, to be considered by them along with the other documents remitted to them.

OVERTURE-PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON, SUPPLY OF MISSION STATIONS.

Dr. King submitted an Overture from the Presbytery of Branden, on the matter of the supply of Mission Stations, of similar purport with others already received on the subject of continuous supply of ordinances in the Mission Stations. The Assembly ordered the Overture to be sent to the Committee already appointed to consider the Overtures from other Presbyteries on the same subject.

# CONSOLIDATION OF COLLEGES.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the question of the consolidation of Colleges before the House in the morning, in the Report submitted on this subject by Mr. James Maelennan—the motion then made by Mr. Maelennan, and the amendment by Mr. Charlton being before the Assembly. After long reasoning and no conclusion reached, the hour of adjournment arrived.

Before closing Dr. Cochrane asked at what time the Assembly would be prepared to receive the Report of the Committee for the nomination of Standing Committees. The Assembly agreed to receive the Report at half-past ten o'clock to-morrow morning.

The Moderator also appointed now the Special Committee on the Memorial of Mr. D. A. Watt, as agreed upon at the commencement of this Sederunt, as follows:—Mr. James Maclennan, Convener; Hon. Alexander Morris, and Drs. MacLaren, Mathews and Burns.

The Assembly then adjourned to meet again at half-past seven o'clock, which was publicly intimated, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

# ELEVENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening:

The Assembly met in accordance with adjournment, and was constituted with praise and prayer by the Moderator.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### STATE OF RELIGION REPORT.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the State of Religion. The Report was presented and read by Dr. McNish, the Convener of the Committee. The Report was closed with certain recommendations for the adoption of the General Assembly. Dr. Macrae, of St. John, moved that the Report be received and the first recommendation adopted, seconded by Dr. Wardrope, and agreed to. The second, third and fourth recommendations of the Report were read and severally adopted. The recommendations in all are as follows:—

- 1. That Presbyteries be instructed to continue their efforts with a view of obtaining from all the Session's replies to the Questions which may be submitted to them as to the State of Religion.
- 2. That the duty and advantage of paying eareful attention to Family Worship be earnestly impressed on the members of the Church.
- 3. That the plan of appointing deputations to hold congregational conferences on the State of Religion be commended to the Presbyteries of the Church.
- 4. That wherever the Synods of the Church have not instructed their Committees on the State of Religion to prepare Questions on that subject, which are to be submitted to the Sessions within their bounds, Presbyteries be enjoined to prepare such Questions for themselves.

On motion of Mr. Robert Campbell, seconded by Mr. F. McCuaig, the Report was adopted as a whole, and the thanks of the Assembly were tendered to Dr. McNish for the great labour which he has bestowed upon the excellent Report now read before the Assembly.

# DEVOTIONAL EXERCISES.

At the eall of the Moderator, who made reference to the telegram from Tamsui, read at the last Sederunt, as furnishing especial cause of thanksgiving, the Assembly engaged

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in devotional exercises, singing the first and third stanzas of the eightieth Psalm, and the Rev. J. K. Smith, at the Moderator's request, offering prayer.

#### TEMPERANCE.

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The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Temperance. Mr. Peter Wright, the Convener of the Committee, presented and read the Report, closing with certain recommendations for the adoption of the Assembly. Mr. Wright then moved, seconded by Mr. Robert Hamilton, That the Report be received, and that the Assembly proceed to consider its recommendations. Principal Grant moved in amendment, seconded by Dr. Laing, as follows:—Receive the Report and resolve, That this Assembly rejoices at every token of the decrease of intemperance in Canada; and, while expressing no opinion on particular legislative measures, would urge the members of the Church to use all means that may seem to them calculated to secure the further diminution of the great evil referred to. After long reasoning and no conclusion reached, the hour for a special order of the day arrived, and

#### DEPUTY FROM FREE CHURCH, SCOTLAND.

The Assembly, as agreed upon at the afternoon Sederunt, proceed now to receive the delegate from the Free Church of Scotland. There was read from the table a letter to the Moderator of this Assembly under the hand of Dr. James C. Burns, Convener of the Colonial Committee of the Free Church, and the Rev. James S. McIntosh, Secretary, commissioning the Rev. Alexander McDonald, of Ardelach, to wait upon this Assembly, and convey to them the fraternal and Christian salutations of the Free Church. Mr. McDonald was introduced to the House, and spoke at some length, expressing the sentiments of brotherly regard which the Church whose commission he bore cherished toward this Church, and their desire for her extension and prosperity. The Moderator responded in appropriate terms, reciprocating the kindly Christian sentiments conveyed in Mr. McDonald's address.

# TEMPERANCE.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the Temperance Report, and, as the hour of adjournment had arrived, agreed to continue in session for some time, in order to dispose of said Report. After long reasoning, and no decision having been arrived at, a motion for adjournment was made and seconded. The motion for adjournment was negatived, and the discussion was proceeded with. At a later hour another motion for adjournment was negatived. The previous question, "Shall the vote now be taken?" was then moved by Mr. C. B. Pitblado, seconded by Mr. W. Drysdale, and was carried in the affirmative. The Assembly proceeded to take a vote between the motion of Mr. Wright and the amendment of Principal Grant, when the motion was carried by a large majority, and the Assembly resolved to receive the Report and consider its recommendations.

DISSENT.—Dr. Laing craved leave to have his dissent from this decision marked in the Minutes.

It was then moved by Dr. Bryce, seconded by Mr. Stuart Acheson, That the recommendations of the Report, as a whole, be adopted. The motion, on a division, was carried by a large majority, and the Assembly decided in accordance therewith.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

The recommendations are as follows:-

- I. This Assembly reaffirms its deliverance of last year to the following effect:-
- 1. That we regard the traffic in strong drink as one of the greatest hinderances to the progress of the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ.

2. That in view of the evils wrought by this scourge of our race, this Assembly would hail with gladness the utter extermination of the traffic in intoxicating liquors as a beverage, by the power of example, public opinion, and the strong arm of the law.

3. That we rejoice at the wonderful advancement of Temperance and Prohibition sentiment throughout the world, and especially in our own land; and would recommend our people by voice, vote and example, and by all peaceful and righteous means, to work for the abolition of this great evil.

4. That we reassert our approval of the principle of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, and recommend the adoption of said Act as the best available means for the legal suppression of the traffic.

II. This Assembly records its most emphatic protest against the recent action of the Senate of Canada in passing amendments to the Canada Temperance Act calculated to destroy its usefulness, and that in the face of the popular will previously expressed in the manner provided by constitutional government, and hereby expresses the earnest hope that the House of Commons will reject said amendments, and consent to no change in the Act, except in the direction of strengthening its prohibitory character and increasing the means of enforcing it.

III. Believing, as we do, that in this cause permanent success can only be attained by instilling proper principles into the minds of the young, the Assembly again enjoins all parents and Sabbath school teachers to give due prominence, in the training of the rising generation, to the principles of Temperance and Prohibition.

IV. The Assembly again records its thankful recognition of the earnest efforts put forth by the Christian women of our land on behalf of this cause.

The Assembly adjourned, to meet again at ten o'clock to-morrow forenoon, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

# TWELFTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church there, Tuesday, the sixteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five years, at ten o'clock in the forenoon:—

The General Assembly met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with praise and prayer by the Moderator.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

# RECORD, PRESBYTERY OF MANITOBA.

The Minute Book of the late Presbytery of Manitoba was here presented for revision. It was moved by Dr. Reid, and agreed to, That, as the Committee on the Record of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces has had no duties to perform, they be intrusted with the examination of the Record now produced.

# STANDING COMMITTEES.

The Assembly proceeded to the order of the day as agreed upon yesterday, and called for the Report of the Committee to nominate members to compose the Boards and Standing Committees of the Church. The Report was submitted in printed form by the Convener, Dr. Cochrane. The Report was received, and it was agreed to consider the several nominations contained therein scriatim. The Assembly proceeded with the consideration of the Report down to the appointment of the Committee on Home Missions—

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Western Section. After reasoning, especially in regard to the number of members on the Committee from the Synod of Maritoba and the North-West, the Assembly, on motion made and duly seconded, recommitted this portion of the Report to the Nominating Committee to amend the same in the sense of the discussion now had on this subject.

The Assembly then proceeded with the consideration of the Report down to the Committee on the State of Religion. Dr. Reid at this point presented and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Glengarry suggesting the amalgamation of certain Committees named. The Overture was laid on the table. Dr. Jardine moved, duly seconded, That the consideration of the Committees on the State of Religion, Sabbath Schools and Sabbath Observance be deferred until all the Reports on these subjects shall have been submitted to the House, when the Overture from the Presbytery of Glengarry, now on the table, shall be considered therewith. The motion was agreed to.

The Assembly proceeded with the consideration of the Report down to the Committees on Finance, when the hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly agreed to sit until the consideration of the Report should be completed. The Assembly proceeded down to the Committee on Temperance, when it was agreed to delay consideration of this portion of the Report, to be taken up with those above deferred.

The Assembly proceeded to the consideration of the Report to the end. All the Boards and Committees of the Report were then appointed, with the exception of those specially mentioned in the preceding minutes.

#### UNIFICATION-AUGMENTATION AND SUPPLEMENTS.

The following names were ordered to be added to the Committee on the Unification of the Funds for Augmentation and Supplements, West and East, appointed at the Fifth Sederunt, namely, Principal Grant, Principal Forrest, Principal King, D. C. Fraser, R. Murray, A. C. Hutchison, Dr. McDonald.

The Assembly adjourned, to meet again at half-past two o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

# THIRTEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:—
The Assembly met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted by the Moderator

with praise and prayer.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### TEMPLRANCE.

Mr. Peter Wright, at this stage of proceedings, intimated that the Temperanee Committee intended last night to have supplemented the Report by a resolution, which he read, but which the lateness of the hour to which the Session was continued prevented them from submitting. The motion was to the effect, That the Moderator and Clerks of the General Assembly be instructed to petition the House of Commons of this Dominion against the adoption of the amendments to the Canada Temperanee Act of 1878, lately passed by the Senate. The General Assembly adopted the resolution, and ordered accordingly.

# WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN TEMPERANCE UNION.

There was taken up and read from the Women's Christian Temperance Union of the Province of Quebec a Memorial setting forth in substance the objects of their Association,

as arraying the Christian women of the Province against the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, and asking for the recognition and sympathy of this General Assembly in the work in which they were engaged. On motion of Dr. MacLaren, seconded by Mr. Fisher, the Assembly resolved as follows:—That the Clerks of the Assembly be instructed to acknowledge the receipt of the communication of the Quebec Women's Temperance Union, to express cordial sympathy in the general objects of the Society as set forth in their Letter, and to refer them to the action of the Assembly in reference to Temperance as setting forth the attitude of this Court in regard to the class of questions dealt with by that Society.

## FOREIGN MISSIONS-RECOMMENDATIONS.

Dr. Wardrope, from the Committee on Foreign Missions, Western Section, submitted for the adoption of the Assembly a series of recommendations in regard to Foreign Missions, Western Section, as contained in their Report. The recommendations were considered one by one.

The first recommendation was as follows:—That the Assembly authorize the Presbytery of Brandon to license and ordain Mr. Cuthbert McKay for Mission work among the Indians of the North-West, and that his salary be eight hundred dollars (\$800) per annum. Dr. Wardrope moved the adoption of the recommendation. Dr. MacLaren moved in amendment, duly seconded, That on account of the present condition of Mr. McKay's health no action be taken in the meantime. This was agreed to.

The second recommendation was adopted as follows:—The Committee have had under consideration interesting correspondence from brethren in British Columbia in reference to the spiritual condition of the Chinese in that Province, but owing to a variety of circumstances they are not prepared to make any definite recommendation regard to the openings presented in that field for Mission work, but they would respectfully suggest to the Assembly to instruct their successors to give earnest attention to this matter.

The third recommendation was adopted as follows:—The Committee have had under consideration the various advantages that might result from the organization of a Presbytery in Central India, and they would respectfully recommend the General Assembly to authorize their successors in office to make the necessary inquiries, and should they see cause to take the preliminary steps in order to the organization of a Presbytery in that important Mission Field.

## FOREIGN MISSIONS-EASTERN SECTION.

On motion of Mr. E. Scott, of New Glasgow, duly seconded, the following Deliverance was adopted on the Foreign Mission Report for the Eastern Section of the Church: The General Assembly adopts the Report of the Eastern Section, and records gratitude for many cheering facts therein mentioned; for the safe return of Mr. Robertson and family to the South Seas; for the good hope that the fears with regard to the French occupation of the New Hebrides were in great measure groundless; for the safe return of Mr. Grant and family to Trinidad; for the departure of Mr. Gibson to open a new Mission in Demerara; for the comfortable house provided for Mr. Grant in Trinidad. The General Assembly extends a cordial welcome to Mr. and Mrs. Annand, and trusts that their visit home may prove cheering and helpful to themselves, and deepen the interest in the Mission. The General Assembly records its sorrow that Mr. McLeod has been obliged, through illness, to give up his work, its appreciation of his faithfulness and success in the Mission Field, its deep sympathy with him and his family, and its prayer that he may be restored to health and long spared to serve the Master.

## FOREIGN MISSIONS-WESTERN SECTION.

I. In relation to the Report of the Foreign Mission Committee for the Western Section, it was moved by Principal Grant, seconded by Mr. J. K. Smith, That it be an instruction [30]

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to the Foreign Mission Committee, Western Section, to allocate five hundred dollars (\$500) to defray the debt on the house of Mr. K. J. Grant, of Trinidad, the Report of the Eastern Section showing that the appropriation made by last Assembly for this object was insufficient to that amount. The motion was adopted, and the Assembly ordered in accordance therewith.

2. Ou motion of Principal Grant, seconded by Principal Caven, it was agreed further, that, in adopting the Report of the Western Section of the Foreign Mission Committee the General Assembly desires to express devout thankfulness to Almighty God for the manifest tokens of His goodness in connection with the various tields in which our missionaries are labouring; more especially for the safe return to Formosa of the Rev. Dr. McKay, and cheering news received by the General Assembly from him; secondly, for the preservation of our missionaries during the recent rebellion in the North-West, and for the evident influence for good exerted by them on the Indians connected with their fields of labour; and, thirdly, for the safe arrival in Central India of the Rev. Mr. Wilson, Mrs. Wilson and Miss Dr. Beatty, for the designation to the same field of a fifth ordained missionary, and for the increased interest that has been awakened in the Church by the visits to many of our Church Courts and congregations of the Rev. James Fraser Campbell and Mrs. Campbell.

3. The General Assembly commends all the brethren, and the lady missionaries connected with them, who are labouring among the heathen, as representatives of the Church, to the Great Head of the Church, praying that he would shield them in the time of trouble, pestilence and war, and that He would bless them abundantly in their labours.

4. Further, the Assembly commends these brethren to the prayers of the Church, and urges that all poinisters should call the attention of their people to the openings for more extended operations in all our fields, and the duty incumbent upon us to respond to these indications of Divine providence by prayerful, united and liberal action.

5. The Assembly marks with gratification the action taken by St. Paul's Church, Montreal, in offering one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) a year for an additional labourer in Central India, and trusts that other wealthy congregations may be stimulated by this example to largely increase their contributions.

6. Finally, the Assembly prays that the Rev. J. F. Campbell and Mrs. Campbell, and the Rev. R. C. Murray may have a prosperous passage to India, and it assures them that they carry with them the prayers of the Church.

## UNIFICATION OF THE FOREIGN MISSION WORK.

Dr. MacLaren presented in printed form the Report of the Committee appointed last year on the Unification of the Foreign Mission Work—Western and Eastern Sections—in terms following:—

#### PLAN OF UNIFICATION OF FOREIGN WISSION WORK.

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

The Committee appointed to draft a plan whereby the Unitication of the Foreign Mission Work of the Presbyterian Church in Canada may be effected beg leave to recommend the following:—

1. All the Foreign Mission Work of the Church shall be under the direction of a Committee which shall be appointed by the General Assembly, and shall be designated the Foreign Mission Committee of the Presbyterian Church in Canada; said Committee to consist of two divisions, called respectively, the Eastern Division and Western Division of the Foreign Mission Committee.

2. The Eastern Division shall consist of ten members and the Western Division of twenty members.

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3. The Conveners of the Eastern and Western Divisions shall be appointed by the General Assembly and shall be Joint Conveners of the Foreign Mission Committee.

4. The Minutes of the meetings of each Division shall be printed and sent to all the members of both Divisions.

- 5. There shall be one Fund from which all the Foreign Mission Work of the Church shall be sustained.
- 6. In the meantime Dr. Reid shall act as Treasurer, and Dr. MacGregor as Sub-Treasurer.
- 7. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Conveners previous to the meeting of the General Assembly, and at the place in which the Assembly is to meet.
- 8. The Committee shall, at its regular annual meeting, prepare a careful estimate of the amount required to carry on its work during the year in the several fields under its care, and shall submit this estimate to the General Assembly.
- 9. The Committee shall, at its first annual meeting, or at a meeting specially held for the purpose, draw up regulations regarding (a) the extension of mission work and expenditure connected therewith, (b) the salaries and allowances of missionaries and teachers, (c) the outfit, furlough and passages of missionaries, (d) the support of disabled missionaries, (e) the maintenance of the widows and orphans of missionaries, and (f) such other regulations regarding missionary matters as may be deemed necessary.

10. The regulations now in force in the Missions of the Eastern and Western Sections shall remain in force until otherwise ordered by the Foreign Mission Committee.

11. The travelling expenses of members of the Foreign Mission Committee, and other incidental expenses shall be defrayed from the Foreign Mission Fund. So far, however, as the annual meeting which is held at the time of the Assembly is concerned, the expenses of those members who may be delegates to the Assembly shall not be paid.

The Committee beg leave to recommend to the General Assembly to send down the matter of unification together with this Plan to Presbyteries for their opinion.

All which is respectfully submitted.

It was moved by Dr. Burns, seconded by Mr. S. Acheson and agreed to,—That the Report be received and in terms thereof the whole matter of unitication, with the accompanying printed plan be sent down to Presbyteries for consideration.

## NOMINATING COMMITTEE.

The Assembly returned to the consideration of that portion of the Report of the Nominating Committee recommitted at the foreneon Sederunt. The Report was handed in and read by Dr. Cochrane, the Convener, as follows: (1) The Committee is unanimously of opinion that there should not be more than two members of the Synod of Manitoba on the Home Mission Committee. (2) Inasmuch as Mr. Robertson is already a member, by the action of the General Assembly, it is agreed to recommend that Mr. Pitblado be placed on the Committee with Mr. Robertson.

The Report was received, and after various motions and amendments, was adopted as amended, and the Home Mission Committee was constituted as in the printed list of the Nominating Committee.

## CONSOLIDATION OF COLLEGES,

The Assembly returned to the consideration of the question of the Consolidation of Colleges interrupted during the ninth Sederunt, the motion of Mr. James Maclennan and the amendment of Mr. Charlton being before the House. It was moved by Principal Forrest, seconded by Dr. Burns,—That the motion of Mr. Maclennan be amended by

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adding after the last word—"church"—in the motion, the following: "And that the Assembly should not be asked to continue this discussion unless in connection with some distinct scheme of consolidation proposed for consideration."

The hour of adjournment arrived, but before closing the Assembly, upon motion made and duly seconded, agreed to resume consideration of the question of the Consolidation of Colleges as the second order of business to-morrow morning.

The Assembly adjourned to meet again at half-past seven o'clock in the evening which was publicly intimated, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

## FOURTEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening:—
The General Assembly met according to adjournment, and was constituted by the Moderator with praise and prayer.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### LETTER FROM SYNOD-DIOCESE - MONTREAL.

There was presented and read a communication from the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, addressed to the Moderator of the Assembly, bearing the signature of the Rev. "James S. Stone, Chairman of Committee," in terms following:—

"To the Reverend the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada:

"REVEREND AND DEAR SIR, —At the session of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal held this afternoon, it was moved by the Rev. J. S. Stone, B.D., seconded by the Rev. Canon Norman, D.C.L., and resolved unanimously:—

"That this Synod now assembled sends its kindly greetings to the Presbyterian General Assembly now in session in this city, and that it commends their deliberations to the guidance and blessing of Almighty God.

"The Lord Bishop then appointed a Committee consisting of the mover and seconder and Messrs. L. H. Davidson, D.C.L., Church Advocate of the Diocese, and George Macrae, Q.C., to convey to the General Assembly the above resolution.

"By direction of this Committee I have now the honour of transmitting the resolution to you as Moderator of the General Assembly.

"I am, Reverend and Dear Sir, very respectfully yours,

"St. Martin's Rectory, Montreal, June 16th, 1885."

On motion of Dr. Burns, seconded by Mr. A. McLeau Sinclair, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—The General Assembly receive with much satisfaction the communication from the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, and reciprocate the spirit it breathes. The Assembly feels that such mutual fraternal greetings tend to exemplify our belief in the "Communion of Saints," and to bring about the fulfilment of our Saviour's prayer, "That they all may be one." The Assembly further ordered that this resolution be communicated to the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal.

#### FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on French Evangelization. The Report was submitted in printed form by Principal MacVicar, who directed attention

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The following resolution moved by Mr. John Thompson, of Sarnia, seconded by Mr. D. H. Fletcher, of Hamilton, and supported by Mr. Warden, the Secretary of the Evangelization Board, was unanimously adopted:—That this Assembly express their gratitude to God for the evidences of continued success attending the work of French Evangelization and for the encouragement our missionaries and labourers have had during the year, of which we have now heard the very gratifying report. Also, that this Court put on record its sense of the increasing importance of this branch of the Church's work in our land, and the corresponding need of prosecuting it with increased zeal and earnestness. And that in the judgment of this House the time has come when, in order to meet the spiritual necessities of the French population, the Church must enlarge the sphere of her operations and seek to make them still more effective in evangelizing our fellow-countrymen. We also express our entire confidence in the management of the work under the present Board. And further, that we commend this scheme to the sympathy and liberality of our congregations, and renew our appeal to the whole Church that by their prayerful ecoperation and practical support the work may be extended, the destitution of the field provided for, and that the friends of the mission, and those who have the work more directly in charge, may be thereby encouraged and enabled to enter the door which the Lord is surely opening, and may advance with all confidence where He seems to point the way.

At the request of the Assembly Mr. Charles Chiniquy addressed the House at length on the subject of his evangelistic work among his fellow country-men.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet again to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, of which public intimation was given, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

## FIFTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church there, Wednesday, the Seventeenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-tire years, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Which time and place the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with devotional exercises and prayer by the Moderator.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND-WESTERN SECTION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers—Western Section. The Report was presented in printed form by Mr. James Middlemiss, the Convener, who, at the same time, dwelt at length on some of the more prominent features of the Report, and stating, among other things, that after the accounts were closed at the end of the Church year, the liberal donation to the Fund of

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two thousand dollars (\$2,000), had been received from Mr. Donald Mackay, of Toronto. The following resolution, moved by Mr. George M. Milligan, seconded by Mr. Hamilton Cassels and supported by Mr. J. K. Macdonald, was unanimously adopted: -The General Assembly having heard the Report of the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, of the Western Section of the Church, after due consideration receives and adopts the same, and expresses its approval of the action of the Committee in the steps they have seen it needful to take in order to avoid a serious reduction of annuities, and its satisfaction with the response made for a supplementary contribution. At the same time the Assembly regrets that, owing to the insufficiency of the ordinary income, a call for a supplementary contribution has been necessary, and considering that a large addition was made last year to the number of beneficiaries, and that the number is still further considerably increased by the action of the present Assembly, urges on the congregations of the Church the necessity of their contributing much more liberally to the Fund than hitherto, resolves that in the appointment of the annual collections, from this time forward, no other fund shall be associated with the Aged and Intirm Ministers' Fund:—Believing that a largely increased capital is necessary to meet the many claims on the Fund, resolves that a special Committee be now appointed to consider the subject of largely increasing the capital fund of the scheme, with the instruction to meet forthwith, and to report this evening recommendations that may, if possible, be carried out without delay. Resolved, further, that the thanks of the Assembly be given to Mr. Donald Mackay, of Toronto, for his liberal donation of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to this Fund.

#### FORFEITURES CANCELLED.

The Convener of the Committee submitted applications from certain ministers, who had not paid the rates hitherto, to have their forfeiture of claim to full benefit from the Fund cancelled. It was moved by Dr. Wardrope, seconded by Principal Caven,—That the applications of Dr. William Bain and others to have their forfeiture of claim to full benefit of the Aged and Infirm Ministers Fund cancelled, on condition of their immediate payment of arrears of rate, be granted; and that the law respecting forfeiture be suspended till the first day of January next, so that other ministers, who so desire, may have opportunity of having their forfeiture of claim cancelled on the same condition. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Joseph McCoy, seconded by Mr. Charles A. Doudiet,—That the application of the Rev. Dr. Bain and others be remitted to the Committee and the date of forfeiture to full benefits of the Fund be fixed to January the first, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six (January 1, 1886). Votes were taken, when the motion of Dr. Wardrope was carried over the amendment of Mr. McCoy by a large majority, and the Assembly decerned and ordered in terms thereof.

## LAW OF FORFEITURE MODIFIED.

Referring to the last clause of the Report, it was moved by Mr. J. K. Smith, seconded by Principal King, and agreed to,—That the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund be empowered to cancel forfeiture of claim to full benefit from the Fund in the case of any minister who is not more than seven years in arrear in the payment of his rate.

#### MEMORIAL SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON.

There was taken up and read a memorial transmitted by the Synod of Hamilton and London, with Messrs. J. A. Murray, Dr. Macdonald and John Charlton, M.P., appointed to support the same before the General Assembly, setting forth, in substance, the inadequacy of the stipend of the greater proportion of our ministers to enable them to make suitable provisions out of their own resources for their old age, and that it was evident from the experience of the past that our people, when rightly called thereto, were

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ready to respond heartily to appeals for the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, and praying the Assembly to take such action as should, as soon as possible, secure to all our ministers who have spent the years of their active life in the service of the Church, on their obtaining leave to retire, an annuity—without reference to their private means—of at least four hundred dollars (\$400).

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet again at half-past two o'clock, which was publicly intimated, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

## SIXTEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:-

The Assembly met in pursuance of adjournment, and was constituted with praise and prayer by the Moderator.

The Minutes of last Sederunt were read and sustained.

## AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

The Assembly returned to the consideration of the memorial from the Synod of Hacilton and London, on the means suggested for the increase of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers, before the House at the close of the morning Sederunt.

Dr. Macdonald, of Hamilton, was heard in support of the memorial.

On naction made and duly seconded, the Memorial was received, and it was agreed to remit it, with the Report of the Committee and relative papers, to the Committee to be appointed under the general deliverance adopted in the morning.

The Moderator now named the Committee agreed upon under the said deliverance, as follows:—Messrs. Bobert Campbell (Montreal), James Barelay, Principal Grant, J. W. Mitchell, D. J. Macdonnell, G. M. Clark, Hamilton Cassels, D. Morrice, D. McMurchy, Charles Davidson, Dr. Macdonald, David McLennan, J. K. Macdonald, Dr. Macdonald, Convener.

## AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND-EASTERN SECTION.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers for the Eastern Section of the Church. The Report was presented and read by Mr. McLean Sinclair, the Convener of the Committee, stating that the receipts during the year were two thousand seven hundred and sixty-four dollars and fifty cents (\$2,764.50), and the  $e_{X_1}$  enditure two thousand three hundred and thirty-three dollars and fifty-five cents (\$2,333.55), leaving a balance on hand of four hundred and thirty dollars and ninety-five cents (\$430.95); that the present number of annuitants was ten; that a bequest of 150 hundred dollars (\$200) had been received from the estate of the late Edward Smith, Esq., and that collections had been received from one hundred and three congregations, and rates from forty-seven ministers.

The Assembly, on motion of Dr. George Murray, of New Glasgow, seconded by Mr. R. Laing, of Halifax, adopted the following resolution:—That the report be received and adopted and the thanks of the General Assembly given to the Committee, especially to the Convener, for their economical and efficient management of the Fund.

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The A Committee vener of t CONSOLIDATION OF COLLEGES.

The Assembly resumed consideration of the question of the consolidation of colleges, interrupted by the adjournment of the House yesterday afternoon—the motion of Mr. Macleman, the amendment of Mr. Charlton, and the amendment to the amendment by Principal Forrest, being before the House. After long reasoning, the hour of adjournment arrived, when the Assembly agreed to sit for fifteen minutes in order that the discussion might be proceeded with. The time limited for the continuance of the session having expired, and no decision arrived at, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again at half-past seven o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

## SEVENTEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening :-The Assembly met and was constituted by the Moderator with praise and prayer. The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

COMMITTEE ON AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND TO SIT.

Dr. Macdonald asked and obtained leave for the Special Committee appointed in the afternoon, on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, to meet for business during this session of the Assembly.

#### REPORT ON RECORDS.

Dr. Reid here stated that Reports had been given in from the several Committees appointed to revise the Records respectively, of the General Assembly, of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, of the Synod of Hamilton and London, and of the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West Territories, and that all the said Reports were uniformly of the same character, certifying that the Records of the several judicatories above-mentioned were carefully and correctly kept. The Reports were received, and the Assembly ordered the several Records aforesaid to be attested in the usual form.

TELEGRAM FROM DR. M'GREGOR, LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

The Moderator here submitted a telegram from Dr. McGregor, of Halifax, asking the leave of the Assembly for three months' absence, to visit Great Britain, for the sake of his health, and stating, in substance, that provision had been made for the work of his office during his absence. The leave asked by Dr. McGregor was granted, and the Assembly, on motion of Principal Caven, seconded by Dr. Burns, agreed to express earnest sympathy with Dr. McGregor on his impaired health, and its hope that he may derive much benefit from the voyage to Great Britain, and that his health may soon be fully reëstablished.

## TATISTICS.

On motion of Mr. J. K. Smith, duly seconded, it was agreed to take up the Report on Statistics at this Sederunt if there shall be time; if not, that the Report be the first order of the day to-morrow morning.

## SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The Assembly proceeded to the order of the day, and called for the Report of the Committee on Sabbath Schools. The Report was presented in printed form by the Convener of the Committee, Dr. Jardine, who dwelt at length upon some of the prominent

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features of the Report, and upon the work and objects of Sabbath schools at large. Dr. Jardine moved, seconded by Mr. E. Scott, and it was agreed: That the report be received and its recommendations considered. On motion of Dr. Cochrane, seconded by Mr. W. T. McMullen, it was agreed to proceed to consider the recommendations, seriatim. It was moved by Mr. W. D. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. D. McLeod, of Priceville, that the first recommendation, in terms following-". That the Assembly should at once take such steps as would secure the issuing, to the children of our Church, a 'Record,' or other monthly periodical, for the purposes specified in the last section of this Report"-be adopted. It was moved in amendment by Mr. G. M. Milligan, seconded by Mr. Johnston, that the recommendation be not adopted. A vote being taken the amendment was carried, and the Assembly decided that said recommendation be not adopted. On motion of Mr. Milligan, duly seconded, the second recommendation was adopted. On motion of Mr. Joseph White, duly seconded, the third recommendation was adopted. It was moved by Mr. D. D. McLeod, seconded by Mr. Joseph White, that the fourth recommendation in terms following be not adopted, viz. :- "That the Sabbath School Committee be so constituted, and such arrangements be made in reference to it, as that it will be possible for it to meet once or twice during the year for the purpose of carefully considering and supervising the important interests committed to its care. It was moved in amendment by Dr. Jardine, seconded by Mr. S. Houston: That the disposal of the fourth recommendation be deferred till a certain overture having reference to the subject of the constitution of the Sabbath School Committee shall have been submitted. The amendment was agreed to and the consideration of said recommendation deferred.

## SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance. The Report was presented and read by Mr. W. T. McMullen, the Convener of the Committee, and there was read also in connection therewith the Act on Sabbath Observance of the Legislature of Ontario.

On motion of Dr. Moffat, seconded by Dr. Burns, the Assembly agreed, That the Report be received and adopted; that the cordial thanks of the Assembly be given to the Committee, and especially to the Convener, and the recommendations considered scriptim. The recommendations were considered one by one, and were severally adopted, and are as follows:—

- 1. That the office-bearers and members of this Church are recommended to take measures, in concert with members of other Christian bodies, to enforce the laws for the prevention of the violating of the Lord's Day, and also to secure better legislation where such is required.
- 2. That Synods be instructed to report through their Committees to the Assembly's Committee on Sabbath Observance.
- 3. That the Act passed by the Ontario Legislature, and appended to the Report, be printed with said Report, and inserted in the Appendix to the Assembly's Minutes.

On the motion of Mr. W. T. McMullen, duly seconded, the Assembly agreed to adopt the Report as a whole, and to add thereto that the Assembly rejoice in the success of the efforts of the Christian people of Toronto and elsewhere to suppress and prevent the publication of newspapers on the Lord's day.

#### SARBATH SCHOOLS.

The Assembly returned to the consideration of the Report on Sabbath Schools, deferred while its fourth recommendation was before the House. There was taken up, in connection with the fourth recommendation, an Overture from the Presbytery of Glengarry, transmitted by the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, praying that the duties

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of the Committees on Temperance, on the State of Religion, and on Sabbath Schools should be united and given to one Committee. On motion of Mr. George McArthur the Overture was received. It was then moved by Mr. D. J. Macdonnell, seconded by Mr. D. McLeod, of Priceville, That the Overture be received and its prayer granted. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Neil McKinnon, seconded by Mr. George Hay, That the proposals of the Overture be left for consideration by the next General Assembly. It was moved in further amendment by Principal King, and duly seconded, That the Overture from the Presbytery of Glengarry, with the proposal to unite the Committees named therein, be remitted to a Committee to report to next Assembly. The motion of Dr. King was adopted without a vote, and the Assembly decided in terms thereof. The fourth recommendation of the Report on Sabbath Schools was no further considered, and no action taken thereon. The recommendations of the Report as adopted are as follows :---

1. That the Presbyteries be enjoined to aim at the establishment of Sabbath schools, if practicable, at all places within their bounds where the Gospel is preached, to secure reports from every Sabbath school, and to seek, by holding conferences or otherwise, to diffuse an intelligent interest in Sabbath school work.

2. That all Sabbath school superintendents and teachers be urged to seek first the spiritual life and welfare of the children and young people committed to their care, and also to give due and carnest attention to the cultivation of a spirit of systematic Christian liberality.

## REPORT, NOMINATION COMMITTEE.

The Assembly now took up anew the Report of the Committee to nominate Standing Committees, certain parts of which were delayed at the twelfth Sederant on Tuesday morning, and proceeded to complete the appointment of the Committees recommended in said Report. The following Committees were then appointed, namely: On the State of Religion, on Sabbath Schools, on Sabbath Observance, and on Temperance.

It was moved by Dr. Cochrane, duly seconded, and agreed to, That the Report, with amendments made thereon, be adopted as a whole, and the Boards and Committees therein named be appointed as the Standing Boards and Committees of the Assembly for the current year. The Report as amended is as follows:

#### RECORD -MANITOBA PRESBYTERY,

Dr. Reid submitted the Report of the Committee intrusted with the revision of the Record of the late Presbytery of Manitoba, stating that the said Record was carefully and correctly kept. The Assembly ordered the Record to be attested in the usual form.

The hour of adjournment having come, the Assembly adjourned to meet again at half-past nine o'clock to-morrow morning, of which intimation was publicly given, and this Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

## EIGHTEENTH SEDERUNT.

At the City of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church there, Thursday, the eighteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five years, at half-past nine o'clock in the forenoon:—

The Assembly met and var constituted by the Moderator with praise and prayer. The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

## STATISTICS.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Statistics. The Report was presented in printed form by the Convener, Dr. Torrance, who at the same time called

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teria: impo attention to several important and interesting features presented by the Report, and read at the close the tirst of a series of recommendations for the adoption of the Assembly. The Report, on motion made and duly seconded, was received, and it was agreed to consider the recommendations scriatim. The first recommendation was amended by substituting the word "similar" for "identical" in the second line, and was then adopted. The second recommendation was read. It was moved by 5r. George Hay, seconded by Mr. D. Stiles Fraser,—That it be not adopted. It was moved by Dr. Laing and seconded,—That the recommendation be adopted with the amendment of substituting the words "a recommendation" for "an injunction" in the second ane. A vote was taken, when the recommendation thus amended was adopted. The third, fourth and fifth recommendations were adopted without change. The recommendations as amended are as follows:—

- 1. That it be an instruction to the Committee to be appointed, to issue questions for the ensuing year similar to those issued for the year 1875-76, so that there may be an opportunity of ascertaining from comparison the progress of the Church during the intervening ten years.
- 2. That for the purpose of uniformity and to enable the Committee to procure fuller and more satisfactory information, it be a recommendation to Presbyteries to take action to have all the congregations and stations throughout their bounds close their congregational year with the calendar year.
- 3. That Presbyteries be again reminded of their duty to appoint a Committee of their number, at their last meeting before the 31st of December, or their first one after the beginning of the year, charged with the work of collecting and tabulating the Statistical Returns of congregations and stations in their bounds, and that such Committees be required to report to their Presbyteries at as early a meeting as possible, and that Presbyteries forward these reports soon afterwards to the Assembly's Committee.
- 4. That such steps as may commend themselves to your Venerable Court be taken to prevent the injunction that Presbyteries deal at once and faithfully with all congregations in arrears with their stipends to their ministers from remaining a dead letter, as it is to be feared it is in too many cases.
- 5. That instructions be renewed to Presbyteries, and especially to those who have failed to comply with the name of all ministers, professors and others standing on meir roll with the salaries they receive, if any.

On motion of Mr. John Thompson, seconded by Mr. R. H. Warden, resolved as follows:—That the thanks of the General Assembly be given to the Statistical Committee, and especially to the Convener, Dr. Torrance, for their services during the year, and that the customary grant be made in connection with this work.

## SUPPLY OF MISE ON STATIONS,

Dr. King read a Report from the Committee appointed near the close of the ninth Sederunt, on Saturday last, under the resolution of Mr. John Somerville, on the Overtures for the supply of Mission Stations and on Summer Sessions in Colleges; as also upon the Report of Mr. George Bruce as to the supply of missionary labourers, and the Overture of the Presbytery of Brandon on the supply of Mission Stations, submitted at the tenth Sederunt. On motion of Dr. Cochrane, duly seconded, the Assembly received the Report, to be considered at a subsequent stage of the Assembly's proceedings.

## REPORT-DELEGATES TO PRESBYTERIAN ALLIANCE.

Dr. King handed in and read a Report on the Delegates to the Council of the Presbyterian Alliance at Belfast in June last or, setting forth specifically some of the more important portions of the proceedings of the Council in which the delegates from this

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Church took part, and the services rendered by the representatives of the Church in that august Assembly. The Report, on motion, was received and it was ordered to be printed in the Appendix to the Assembly's Minutes.

#### NOTICE OF MOTION-MR. R. MOODIE.

Mr. R. Moodie here gave notice that at next Sederunt he would submit a motion of the rearrangement of the time of the opening and closing of the Colleges, with a view to the more effective working of the Mission Field.

#### COMMITTEE ON UNIFICATION ( \* COMMITTEES.

The Moderator now appointed the Committee on the question before the House last night, in the Overture from the Presbytery of Glengarry, in regard to the union of the Committees on Sabbath Schools, State of Religion, and Temperance, as follows:—Dr. McNish, Convener; Dr. Jardine, Messrs. W. T. McMullen, J. McAdam, G. M. Milligan, P. Wright, W. J. Dey, T. F. Fotheringham, Joseph Hogg, A. McLean Sinclair, James Robertson, John Thompson (Sarnia), Neil McKay, ministers; Messrs. Joseph Henderson, John Robertson, W. N. Hossie, A. Bartlett, Hon. A. Vidal, J. M. Gill, W. D. Russell, elders: the Committee to report to next Assembly.

#### CONSOLIDATION OF COLLEGES,

The Assembly resumed consideration of the subject of the Consolidation of Colleges, interrupted by the adjournment yesterday afternoon, the motion of Mr. Maclennan, the amendment of Mr. Charlton, and the amendment to the amendment of Principal Forrest being before the House. Principal Forrest, with the consent of his seconder and with the permission of the Assembly, withdrew his amendment, the motion of Mr. Maclennan and the amendment of Mr. Charlton now only remaining. Principal King here moved in further amendment, seconded by Dr. Wardrope, as follows:—That, in deference to the strong desire expressed by members of this Assembly for further efforts towards the consolidation of our Colleges, a Committee be appointed to consider the matter, with power to communicate, if deemed necessary, with the Boards of any or all of the Colleges, with the view of bringing the discussion of the question before the Courts of the Church to as early a termination as possible: the Committee to report to next General Assembly. Votes were taken in regular order, when the amendment of Dr. King was carried in succession over the amendment of Mr. Charlton and the main motion; and the Assembly agreed that the main motion, as amended by the motion of Dr. King, be the judgment of the House.

On motion of Mr. W. Drysdale, seconded by Mr. R. J. Laidlaw, it was agreed, That the appointment of the Committee anent the Consolidation of Colleges be left in the hands of the Moderator.

Mr. Maclennan then proceeded to submit the further recommendations of the Report of the Consolidation of Colleges' Committee. The recommendations numbered two, three and four were adopted; that numbered five was read, when it was moved in amentment by Mr. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. W. Drysdale, That the consideration of this recommendation be deferred till after the Committee on the Consolidation of Colleges report to next Assembly. The amendment was lost, and the recommendation was adopted. The sixth recommendation was adopted. The recommendations in all are as follows:—

- 1. Dr. King's motion as recorded above substituted for the original recommendation.
- 2. That the Common Fund for the support of the Colleges be continued, and that the basis of its distribution be the requirements of the several institutions; that the General Assembly annually appoint a Committee to determine the amount required by the respective Colleges; to solicit from the congregations of the Church thi. amount, and

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Drs the min distribute the amount received among the Colleges according to the specified requirements, with the understanding that no additional professor or lecturer be appointed or additional outlay incurred without the sanction of the General Assembly having been first obtained; it being further understood that Knox College shall be entitled to include in its estimates for the current year a sum equal to the salary of an additional professor.

3. The Assembly also accepts the estimate submitted by the Committee as obtained from the several Colleges of the tenor following for the current year, namely:—

making a total sum of \$15,050 for the Common Fund for the current year.

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4. That the salary of Dr. Proudfoot be increased to the sum of \$650 a year, and that the increase relate back to the past year.

5. That the Board of Management and Senate of Knox College be instructed to define the work of the additional professor, and to announce their decision at the opening of the College in October, so that Presbyteries may have time to consider the matter, and make nominations for next General Assembly.

6. That the Standing Committee on the Common Fund for the current year consist of three representatives from each College: from Knox College, Principal Caven, Dr. Reid and Mr. W. M. Clark; from the Presbyterian College, Montreal, Principal MacVicar, Messrs. R. H. Warden and D. Morrice; from Queen's College, Principal Grant, Messrs. G. M. Macdonnell, Q.C., and James Macleman, Q.C.; Mr. Macleman, Convener.

On motion of Mr. John Thompson, duly seconded, the Report as amended was adopted as a whole, and the Assembly decerned and ordered in accordance therewith.

#### COMMON FUND.

It was moved by Mr. J. Maclennan, seconded by Dr. Laing, and agreed to,—That in adopting the Report of the Committee the General Assembly expresses its very strong sense of the necessity, in the present financial position of the Colleges, of having the Common Fund greatly strengthened and heartily sustained. The General Assembly, therefore, earnestly commend the Fund to the liberality of all the congregations in the joint constituencies of the Theological Schools at Montreal, Kingston and Toronto. Further, the Assembly instructs Presbyteries to use their very best endeavours to have the congregations in their respective bounds contribute to the Common Fund, so as, if possible, not to fall beneath the estimates, prepared as they are with excessive economy.

## LABOURERS FOR MISSION FIELDS.

The Committee to whom were remitted the Overtures of the Presbyteries of Guelph, Barrie and Brockville, and the Synod of Hamilton and London anent a summer session in one or more of our Colleges, the Overture of the Presbytery of Owen Sound anent the supply of outlying mission fields, the Report of the Committee of Assembly on the supply of labourers for the Home Mission field, and the Overture from the Presbytery of Brandon on the reception into the full status of the ministry of those who may not have taken a full theological course in any of our colleges, reported resolutions on the whole question for the adoption of the Assembly.

The Report was received, and the Assembly proceeded to consider the resolutions scriat.... The first recommendation regarding a summer session in one or more of the Colleges was adopted. The second recommendation was adopted.

DISSENT.—Mr. W. Robertson eraved that his dissent from this decision be marked in the minutes.

The third recommendation was read as follows:—The General Assembly resolves to require twelve months' labour in the mission field from all students who have completed their attendance on College previous to their ordination to a pastoral charge, and to require also all ministers without charge and licentiates entering the Church from other Churches to labour in the mission field for the same period previous to their induction into a pastoral charge; this resolution to take effect in the case of all ministers applying to be received, and of all students completing their course subsequent to the date of this Assembly. It was moved and seconded that the resolution be adopted. It was moved in amendment by Mr. Warden, duly seconded,—That the General Assembly resolves to require six months' labour in the mission field from all students who have completed their attendance at College previous to their induction into a pastoral charge, except in eases in which a corresponding period of labour has been rendered in the winter half-year during their course of study, and to require also all ministers and licentiates without charge to labour six months in the mission field after their reception, previous to their induction into a pastoral charge; this resolution to take effect in the case of all ministers making application to be received, and of all students completing their course subsequent to the date of this Assembly. A vote being taken, the amendment was carried, and it was agreed to substitute said amendment for the original recommendation.

The fourth and lifth recommendations were adopted. The recommendations as amended are as follows:—

1. The General Assembly, having fully considered the Report of the Committee on Supply of Labourers for the Home Mission field, finds as follows, regarding a Summer Session:—That the holding of a Summer Session in some one of our Colleges instead of a Winter Session would clearly set free a certain number of labourers for winter work, and is desirable, provided it can be done without unduly interfering with the curriculum, or lowering the standard of Theological education. That, as indicated in the Report presented to the Assembly, and from information before the Committee, the institution in which the establishment of a Summer Session would least interfere with existing arrangements, and in which a summer course could be pursued most advantageously, is the Presbyterian College, of Halifax. Therefore the General Assembly remits it to the Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, and to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces to consider the advisability of holding the Session of the College at Halifax in the summer instead of the winter months, with instructions to report to next General Assembly.

2. The General Assembly having fully considered the Report of the Committee on Supply of Labourers for Home Mission work, instructs Presbyteries to use diligence in looking out and employing as catechists such members of the Church as are possessed of suitable gifts, and that are willing to place them at the Church's service, and when such labourers give promise of becoming, by larger experience, fit for the full work of the ministry, but are disqualified either by age or disadvantages of early education for taking the usual course of study prescribed by the Church, to report them to the General Assembly with the view of securing its approval of attendance on such classes at one of the Colleges of the Church, or of such course of study under the Presbytery as may, in conjunction with their work in the mission-field, fit them to exercise with acceptance and profit, all the functions of the Christian ministry. The Assembly contemplates, however, the bestowal of full ministerial status in such cases, only where, after a lengthened trial, Presbyteries are able to give to it assurance of the efficiency and general acceptability of those for whom this status is claimed.

3. The General Assembly resolves to require six months' labour in the Mission-field from all students who have completed their attendance at College previous to their ordination to a pastoral charge, except in cases in which a corresponding period of labour has been rendered in the winter half-year during their course of study, and to require also all

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ministers without charge and licentiates to labour six months in the mission-field after their recept; n, and provious to their induction into a pastoral charge; this resolution to take effect in the case of all ministers making application to be received, and all students completing their course subsequent to the date of this Assembly.

4. The General Assembly takes this opportunity to call the attention of licentiates and ministers without charge to the spiritual necessities of the mission-field of the Church, and urgently invites their proffer of service towards meeting the necessities, assuring these labourers of the cordial sympathy and support of the Church in their self-denying labours, and empowering the Home Mission Committee to give such increased remuneration as the state of the funds and the necessities of the work might suggest.

5. The General Assembly instructs the Home Mission Committees of the Eastern and Western Sections to report to next Assembly the number of fields, with an approximate estimate of the adhering Presbyterian population left without the stated supply of ordinances during the winter months of 1884-5 and 1885-6.

The Report as amended was then adopted as a whole.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet again at half-past two o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

## NINETEENTH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:—
The Assembly met, and was constituted by the Moderator with praise and prayer.
The Minutes of last Sederunt were read, and with amendments were sustained.

#### COLLEGE SESSIONS.

Mr. Robert Moodie here submitted the motion of which he had given notice in the morning, seconded by Mr. John Somerville, to the following effect:—Whereas the work of the missionary students would be more efficient by a rearrangement of the terms of College Sessions, the Assembly agrees to instruct the Senates and Boards of the several Colleges to arrange for holding the Sessions between the thirty-first day of October and the thirtieth day of April, the new arrangement to take effect with the Session of 1886-87. After reasoning a vote was taken, when the Assembly resolved that no change in the meantime be made in the time of holding the Sessions of the Theological Colleges.

## STUDENTS, APPLICATIONS FOR.

Mr. J. K. Smith, from a Committee appointed at a former Sederunt, to take into consideration several applications, of various kinds, from Presbyteries, on behalf of students, presented and read a Report. On motion of Mr. Smith, duly seconded, it was agreed to receive the Report, and proceed to consider its several clauses seriation. The several clauses of the Report were considered one by one, and were, with amendments marked, severally adopted, and are as follows:—

I. That the application of the Presbytery of Kingston on behalf of Mr. John Gerrier be granted, and that the Presbytery have leave to take him on trials for license.

II. That the application of the Presbytery of Kingston on behalf of Mr. S. W. Dyde, M.A., be granted, and that Mr. Dyde be admitted to the status of a third years' student in Theology.

III. That the request of the Presbytery of Quebec on behalf of Mr. James Sutherland be granted, and that he be allowed the status of a student in the second year of his theological course in Morrin College.

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ield rdihas all IV. That the action of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces in granting leave to the Presbytery of St. John to take on trials for license Mr. D. Fiske, B.A., be approved by this Assembly as asked for by the said Synod.

V. That the request of the Presbytery of St. John to take Mr. J. A. Cahill on trials

for license, when he shall have taken one year in Theology, be granted.

VI. That in regard to the application of the Presbytery of Hamilton for leave to superintend the studies of Mr. R. Pyke, with a view to his entering the ministry of the Church without attending College, the Presbytery of Hamilton be instructed to deal with the ease in accordance with the regulations touching such cases adopted at this forenoon's Sederunt.

VII. That the request of the Presbytery of Paris on behalf of Mr. George Dempster be granted, and that Mr. Dempster be certified as a first year's student in Theology, with the understanding that he take Hebrew in connection with his first year in Theology.

VIII. That the request of the Presbytery of Toronto on behalf of Mr. John McInnes, a graduate of Princeton Seminary, be granted, and that the Presbytery have leave to take

Mr. Mclanes on trials for license.

IX. That in regard to the application of the Presbytery of Brandon, on behalf of Mr. John L. Simpson, for leave to take him under the care of the Presbytery as a student for the ministry, and to license and ordain him after a certain suggested course of study, the Presbytery of Brandon be instructed to deal with the case in accordance with the regulations touching such cases adopted at this forencon's Sederunt.

X. That the request of the Presbytery of Pictou, for leave to admit Mr. A. D. McIntosh to the standing of a student in Theology be granted; Mr. McIntosh to be

required to take one year in Arts in Dalhousie College.

XI. That the request of the Presbytery of Winnipeg and the Senate of Manitoba College for the admission to the standing of a theological student of the second year of Mr. A. B. Winchester, a student in Manitoba College, be granted.

XII. That the request of the Presbytery of Winnipeg and the Senate of Manitoba College for the admission to the standing of a theological student of the second year of Mr. Hugh W. Fraser, a student in Manitoba College, be granted.

XIII. That the united request of the Presbyteries of Barrie and Guelph for leave to the Presbytery of Barrie to ordain Mr. Henry Knox, catechist, as a missionary within the bounds of the Presbytery of Barrie, be granted.

XIV. That the Presbytery of Peterborough be granted leave, as craved, to take on trials for license Mr. Robert McKnight, B.A., a graduate in Theology of the Presbyterian College, Montreal.

XV. That the request of the Presbytery of Hamilton for the admission of Mr. W. J. Rae, student at Knox College, to the standing of a first year's student in Theology be granted.

XVI. That the request of the Presbytery of Brandon, through the Synod of Manitcha and the North-West, for leave to license and ordain Mr. Alex. Robson, catechist, as a missionary in the North-West, be granted.

XVII. In regard to the request of the Presbytery of Brandon, through the Synod of Manitoba and the North-West, that the Assembly should pronounce on the validity of the ordination of Mr. Wm. Nichol, it was agreed, on motion of Principal Caven, to remit to the Presbytery of Regina to make full enquiry into all the circumstances of the case, and to report to the next General Assembly.

On motion of Mr. J. K. Smith, duly seconded, the Report, as amended and above written, was adopted as a whole.

## MEMORIAL OF MR. D. A. WATT.

Mr. James Maclennan, from the Committee on the Memorial of Mr. D. A. Watt, on the state of the law for the prevention of crimes and offences against women and girls, present require proceed Assemb as follo further Mr. Jan was con

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presented and read a report, stating that the subject was one of great importance, and required more consideration than it was possible to give it at this advanced stage of the proceedings of the Assembly, and adding a recommendation for the adoption of the Assembly. The Report was received, and the recommendation therein contained adopted as follows:—That the General Assembly authorize the Committee to give the subject further consideration and report to next Assembly. The Committee composed as follows: Mr. James Maclennan, Convener; Hon. A. Morris, Dr. McLaren, Dr. Mathews, Dr. Burns, was continued and instructed accordingly.

## AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.

Dr. McDonald, from the Special Committee on the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers, gave in and read a Report containing recommendations for the adoption of the Assembly. The Report was received, and the first recommendation adopted in terms following:—

1. The Assembly expresses the hope that by appropriate action in the interests of the Fund, on the part of the Standing Committee and the several Presbyteries, the congregational collection may be largely increased and important additions made to the capital; and with a view to both of those results, instructs the Committee to arrange that Presbyteries be at an early date dealt with by deputations, and instructs Presbyteries to use their best endeavours in bringing all the congregations within their bounds up to a due measure of liberality, and in aiding to secure contributions to the capital from members of the Church at whose disposal God has placed abundant means.

The second recommendation was adopted by the Assembly ad interim and sent down, along with the remaining recommendations of the Report, for the consideration of Presbyteries, to report to the next General Assembly, as follows:—

2. And further, in the hope that God may bless the efforts put forth with a good measure of success, the Assembly, having in view the fact that there are great differences among the beneficiaries in respect to their worldly circumstances, some of them being either entirely or almost entirely dependent on the Fund, and recognizing the propriety of discriminating to some extent in favour of such as are in greater need than others, instructs the Committee in giving annuities according to the regulations now in force not to go beyond the maximum amount of the last five years, viz., \$220, unless they can do so without using the interest on the capital for the purpose; and if the state of the Fund at the close of the year shall permit, to set aside the said interest for the purpose of giving supplementary aid, according to the circumstances of beneficiaries—this instruction to be in force from year to year, until superseded by further action of the Assembly.

3. That for the purpose of more fully meeting exceptional cases the present capital of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) be temporarily set aside, and the interest arising from the same be used, in the discretion of the Committee, on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund in supplementing the regular annuity.

4. That a new capital account be formed from such bequests and donations as may be made to the Fund, and the interest accruing from the same and from the ministers' rates, so far as such rates are not required for the payment of current annuities, and from any surplus which may be left from congregational contributions after the payment of current annuities.

5. That the rates from ministers be made a uniform rate of five dollars (85), and not a percentage on the net income as at present.

6. That any minister who is regularly on the fund shall become entitled to his superannuation allowance on attaining the age of seventy years, or in the event of a minister's health failing, he may become entitled to the allowance by the vote of the General Assembly.

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#### ORDERS OF DAY FOR EVENING.

It was agreed that the Report on the Reception of Ministers be the first order of business at the evening Sederunt, to be followed by the Overture anent Investment of Funds in the Eastern Section of the Church.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned to meet again at half-past seven o'clock, of which public intimation was given, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

## TWENTIETH SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening:-

The Assembly met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted by the Moderator with praise and prayer.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

#### CONSOLIDATION OF COLLEGES-COMMITTEE ON.

The Moderator now named the Committee on the question of the Consolidation of Colleges, as under the resolution on this subject adopted at the morning Sederunt to-day, as follows:—Mr. John Charlton, M.P., Couvener; Mr. James Maclennan, Q.C., Dr. Macdonald, Messrs. W. Mortimer Clark, Alex. McPherson (Montreal), D. C. Fraser, John S. McLean, George Haddow, L. W. Johnstone, Rev. Messrs. W. T. McMullen, George Burnfield, G. D. Bayne, W. D. Armstrong, D. J. Macdonnell, R. Beattie, D.Sc., Allan Simpson, Colin Fletcher, J. Crombie, G. M. Milligan, J. K. Smith, M. McGillivray, Dr. Campbell (Renfrew).

#### RECEPTION OF MINISTERS.

Dr. Moore from the Committee to consider the applications—as at the third Sederunt—from Presbyteries for leave to receive ministers of other Churches as ministers of this Church, presented a report, with recommendations as to the several cases laid before the Committee. The Report was received and considered clause by clause, and the Assembly granted leave to the several Presbyteries herein named to receive the ministers and licentiates whose names are annexed to each respectively, and with special disposals as stated below:—

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#### SPECIAL CASES.

In regard to the application of the Presbytery of Halifax on behalf of Mr. Howie, the General Assembly ordered that the Home Mission Committees be allowed to give him such work as he may be able to perform in the interests of the Church.

In the case of the application of the Presbytery of London on behalf of Mr. R. H. Craig, the Committee found that the Presbytery last year applied to receive him as a Catechist, which being within the competency of the Presbytery, the application was referred back. The Committee further reported that they found that Mr. Craig had been so employed by the said Presbytery, and saw no reason to depart from the decision of last year. The Assembly received the report and decided that no further action be taken in the premises.

It was here stated that the application of Andrew Murdoch, LL.D., in the list submitted at the third Sederunt, through the Presbytery of Toronto, had been withdrawn at his own request. The Report was then adopted as a whole.

#### INVESTMENT OF MONEY-EASTERN SECTION.

There was taken up and read an extract minute of proceedings of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, transmitting an Overture of Mr. J. G. Forbes, in regard to the investment of Trust Funds in the Eastern Section of the Church; in Bank Stock, and representing that such securities are not recognized by the laws of the land as Trust Securities, and praying that the incorporated Boards of the Church, in said Eastern Section, be enjoined not to assume the responsibility as Trustees of holding Bank Stock, to the peril of the Funds intrusted to their care.

The Overture was received, and motions for the disposal thereof were submitted by Mr. Forbes, Mr. McLean Sinclair, and Mr. Warden. Before coming to a vote the first and last of these motions were withdrawn, that of Mr. McLean Sinclair, seconded by Mr. W. T. McMullen, alone remaining, and, in terms following:—The Assembly, fully recognizing the importance of the matter referred to in the Overture, directs the Boards and Committees in the Eastern Section of the Church to use all due precaution to have the funds intrusted to their management safely invested. A vote being taken the motion was carried, and the Assembly decerned in terms thereof.

#### HOUR OF ADJOURNMENT.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly agreed to continue the session till eleven o'clock.

## UNIFICATION OF AUGMENTATION SCHEMES, EAST AND WEST.

Mr. D. J. Macdonnell, from the Committee appointed at a former Sederunt to consider the question of the Unification of the Augmentation Schemes, East and West, presented and read a Report, recommending that a Committee be appointed to consider the matter and to draft a scheme for the unification of the work, with instructions to submit said scheme during the year to the Augmentation Committees of the Eastern and Western Sections for their consideration, to report to next General Assembly, and that the Committee be as follows:—Messrs. D. J. Macdonnell and E. A. McCurdy, Joint Conveners; Dr. McGregor, Dr. Laing, Dr. Campbell, Dr. King, Messrs. E. Scott, R. Laing, R. H. Warden, D. C. Fraser, Wm. Mitchell. The Report was received, the Committee therein named appointed, and the Assembly decerned and ordered in terms thereof.

#### SUPPLY OF VACANT PULPITS-OVERTURE ON.

Mr. R. J. Laidlaw here submitted and read an overture or scheme for the supply of vacancies, in terms following, and gave explanations at length of the suitableness of said

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scheme to meet a felt want in the administration of the Church in regard to this matter:-

#### Scheme.

1. There shall be a Committee appointed by the General Assembly to assign licentiates and ordained ministers without charge to Synods for appointments.

2. This Committee shall consist of three ministers and three ruling elders together with the Convener.

3. In each Synod there shall be a Committee on the supply of vacant pulpits.

4. Each Synodical Committee shall consist of a Convener and three lay members appointed by Synod, together with the Home Mission Conveners of the several Presbyteries of the bounds.

5. Arrangements for the supply of all vacancies, other than Mission Stations, within the bounds of each Synod shall be made by the Synod's Committee, but the Committee shall be at liberty to arrange to have vacant congregations choose their own supply for one third of the time.

6. Vacant congregations shall, through the Home Mission Conveners of their respective Presbyteries, notify the Committee of their need of supply, and may also submit the names of ministers preferred.

7. Ministers in charge desiring occasional appointments shall send in their names and Presbyterial connection to the Convener of the Committee of the Synod within whose bounds they wish to be employed, stating the times for which they wish appointments, and naming also the congregations to which they wish to be assigned, when special appointments are sought.

8. Each Synodical Committee shall be at liberty to apply for the occasional services of ministers in charge, who have made no application for appointments, but whose services may be required in vacant congregations.

9. When ministers in charge shall be assigned occasional appointments, they shall apply to the Committe for supply for their pulpits in their absence.

10. With the concurrence of the congregations and the Presbytery of the bounds, a minister without charge may be appointed to a vacancy for a continuous period, not exceeding six months; but during this time the minister so placed may be appointed else where as often as every third Sabbath, a substitute secured either by the congregation or the Committee to fill his place in his absence.

11. In making appointments the Committee shall comply with the special requests both of congregations and ministers seeking appointments, so far as this shall be found practicable and consistent with a due regard to the interests of all concerned.

12. Appointments shall be given only to duly accredited ministers, including licentiates,

13. Should there be doubt at any time as to the propriety of giving appointments, the case shall be referred to the Presbytery to which the applicant may belong.

14. The supply shall be paid for by the vacancies supplied, and in the case of settled charges by the minister (or congregation) whose pulpit is supplied, and at the minimum rate of ten dollars per Sabbath, with board and lodging.

15. When a minister accepts a call he shall give notice to the Convener of the Committee appointing him, but shall be required to fulfil the regointments already made unless relieved either by the Committee or the congregation or co-gregations to which he has been designated.

16. The members of each Synodical Committee shall furnish information from time to time to their respective Presbyteries regarding the position of the Presbytery's vacancies; each committee shall also submit a yearly statement to the several Presbyteries it represents, and shall render an annual Report to the Synod, which Report shall be transm Report

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VII. of the reb transmitted to the Assembly's Committee to be embodied in that Committee's Annual Report to the General Assembly.

On motion of Mr. Laidlaw, seconded by Mr. John Thompson, of Sarnia, the General Assembly decerned and ordered as follows:—Receive the Overture and remit it to Synods and Presbyteries to be reported upon at next Assembly, and instructs the Synods to make conditional arrangements for giving effect to its provisions in as far as they may be approved.

#### INSURRECTION IN NORTH-WEST.

Dr. Burns, from a Committee appointed at a former Sederunt to draft resolutions on the "State of the Country," in regard to the recent disturbances in the North-West. and the "present aspect of affairs," submitted the following :-

I. The General Assembly desires to record its profound sorrow because of the serious outbreak in the North-West Territories, and its thankfulness to Almighty God in the prospect of peace being speedily restored.

II. The Assembly expresses admiration at the ready response given by the volunteers to their country's call, their patient endurance amid the perils and privations of the camp and the field, and their heroism in action. It is truly gratifying to witness the patriotism and provess of our citizen-soldiers, inspiring confidence, as it does, in the ability of the country to maintain law and order within its own bounds, and to do its part, if need be. in upholding the integrity of the Empire.

III. The Assembly, further, tenders its warmest sympathies to those who have been wounded in battle, and invalided in the hospital; also to the relatives and friends of the brave and honoured dead.

IV. The General Assembly conveys cordial thanks to the Presbyterian Chaplains, Messrs, C. B. Pitblado, D. M. Gordon, Jamas Barclay, W. S. Ball, H. S. Rowand, W. P. McKenzie, of Fort McLeod, for the promptness with which they placed themselves at the disposal of the country when called upon to do so, and for the valuable services rendered in this capacity to the troops and to the country at large. The Assembly conveys thanks also to the congregations thus subjected to anxiety and inconvenience, for the Christian public spirit displayed by them in the painful circumstances which deprived them for a time of their pastors; and, further, the Assembly records its pleasure at hearing not only of the bravery and endurance of the volunteers, but also of their reported exemplary behaviour amid the inevitable temptations of camp-life, by which they have shown themselves mindful of the religious principles in which they had been trained, and by which also they have furnished another illustration of the compatibility of true heroism with the fear of God. The Assembly would also gratefully acknowledge the self-sacrificing devotion of the Rev. Hugh McKay, missionary to the Indians, and order that a copy of the resolution affecting them be sent to the chaplains, to congregations, and to the commanding officers of the battalions served by the above-named chaptains.

V. The Assembly records its grateful recognition of the order and loyalty which have been displayed by those tribes in the North-West which have been under the influence of Protestant Christianity, and hopes that this unhappy rebellion may prove a strong incentive to all our Churches to renewed and more vigorous evangelizing efforts among the Indian population of the Dominion.

VI. The Assembly also trusts that the community in service and suffering to which this insurrection has given rise may tend to weld all parts of the Dominion more firmly together, and to bring about such a purifying and ennobling condition of our public life as may in some measure compensate for the serious expenditure of blood and treasure it has occasioned.

VII. The Assembly expresses the hope that, after thorough inquiry into the causes of the rebellion, such measures will be adopted as may rectify any actual grievances, and

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prevent the recurrence of a state of affairs so disastrous to the regions more immediately affected, and to the best interests of the entire Dominion.

VIII. Finally, the General Assembly having respect to the ground of humiliation we have in this very regard as a Church and country, and the reasons for gratitude in view of the anticipated cessation of hostilities, instructs all the ministers and missionaries of our Church to direct the attention of our people to the subject on an early Sabbath, to the end that we may be humbled yet more under "the Mighty Hand of God, and utter the memory of His great goodness."

The Report was received, the deliverance therein contained adopted, and the Assembly decerned and ordered in terms thereof.

#### OVERTURE ON ELDERSHIP.

There was taken and read an Overture from the Synod of Hamilton and London, in terms following:—Whereas it is of the greatest importance to utilize all the gifts and graces of the members of the Church; whereas the present method of electing elders to serve for life fails to secure this end; whereas the term-service system would better develop the latent talent of the Church, therefore the Synod of Hamilton and London respectfully overtures the General Assembly to consider the advisability of establishing a system by means of which elders shall be appointed to serve for a term of not more than five years, those serving said term being eligible for reëlection, and to devise some plan to secure this end, it being understood that any such arrangement shall not affect those now in the eldership.

Mr. S. Lyle was heard in support of the Overture.

It was moved by Professor MacLaren, seconded by Principal MacVicar,—That the consideration of this Overture be deferred till next Assembly. It was moved in amendment by Mr. McLean Sinclair, seconded by Principal Grant, as follows:—The General Assembly receives the Overture, and while not committing itself to the principle of it, agrees to send it down to Prephyteries to consider the subject to which it refers, and report to the next Assembly. The vote was taken, when the motion of Dr. MacLaren was carried, and the Assembly decided accordingly.

## WILL OF JAMES PEARSON-MEMORIAL ON.

There was taken up and read a memorial from Mr. George Grant and Mr. Fergus McMaster, executors of the last will and testament of the late Mr. James Pearson, praying the Assembly to cancel a legal claim to a bequest in the said will to the Home Mission Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, on the ground that Mr. Pearson, subsequent to the writing of the will, requested the said legacy to be cancelled, and that he, Mr. McMaster, had cancelled it by drawing his pen through the clause conveying the bequest, not knowing that such action was void. Mr. McMaster was heard in explanation.

Dr. Reid explained that a similar case had been decided at last General Assembly on a memorial of Mr. Thomas Robertson, of Hatley, in relation to the will of Thomas Smith. Whereupon the Assembly agreed, in accordance with the decision above mentioned, to refer the memorial now before the House to the Committee on the Protection of Church Property to take it into consideration and inquire into the facts of the case, and that the Moderator be authorized, if so advised by the Committee, to execute a deed of renunciation, as asked for in the memorial, and that the Committee be instructed to report their action to the next Assembly.

The Assembly agreed to meet to-morrow morning at nine o'clock. The Assembly then adjourned to meet to-morrow morning as agreed upon, which was publicly intimated, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

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## TWENTY-FIRST SEDERUNT.

At the City of Montreal, and within Crescent Street Church there, Friday, the Nineteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five years, at nine o'clock in the forenoon:—

The General Assembly met, pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with praise and prayer by the Moderator.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read and sustained.

## FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.

There was taken up an Overture from Mr. W. S. Ball, of Vanneck, in relation to the French Evangelization scheme. On motion the Assembly agreed to lay the Overture on the table.

## EVANGELIZATION OF ROMAN CATHOLICS.

There was taken up an Overture from the Presbytery of Toronto, on the Evangelization of Roman Catholics of other nationalities besides the French-speaking people of the Province of Quebec and other Provinces. On motion made and duly seconded, it was agreed to postpone the consideration of this Overture till next Assembly.

#### REPORTS-WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUNDS.

The Assembly called for the Reports of the Committees on the Funds for the Widows and Orphans of Deceased Ministers.

## PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CONNECTION WITH THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

Dr. Reid submitted the Report for the Committee on the Fund for the Widows and Orphans of deceased Ministers of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland, giving at the same time a statement of the financial condition of the Fund and of the number of annuitants. The Report was received and adopted.

#### CANADA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

There was read also the Report of the Committee on the Fund for the Widows and Orphans of Ministers of the late Canada Presbyterian Church, with statements of the financial condition of the Fund, the number of annuitants, and the necessity of contributions to the Fund from congregations and ministers during the year. The Report was received and adopted.

## MARITIME PROVINCES.

Dr. Reid read further the Report of the Committee on the Fund for the Widows and Orphans of Ministers in the Maritime Provinces, giving details of the financial condition of the Fund and a statement of the number of annuitants. The Assembly agreed to receive and adopt the Report.

#### APPEAL OF DR. FLEMING.

The Assembly took up again the appeal of Dr. Fleming, of Brandon, delayed at a former Sederunt. Dr. Fleming being called was not present, and the Assembly, under all the circumstances, dismissed the appeal and confirmed the decision of the Synod of Maniteba and the North-West Territories, complained against.

#### OVERTURE-CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER CHRISTIAN BODIES.

There was taken up and read an Overture from the Presbytery of Brockville anent co-operation of different Christian bodies in thinly settled districts of country, for the

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joint management of weak congregations and stations, by agreement with other Christian denominations. It was moved by Professor Scrimger, seconded by Mr. J. K. Smith, and agreed to,—That the Overture be received, and a small Committee appointed to confer with any similar Committee appointed by any Protestant evangelical denomination in Canada; the Committee to consist of the following: Professor Scrimger, R. Campbell (Montreal), R. H. Warden, Dr. Jardine, F. M. Dewey, James Hastie, F. W. Farries.

## REPORT ON "RECORD,"

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the *Presbyterian Record*. The Report was presented by Mr. R. Campbell, stating particularly that the circulation of the *Record* had now reached thirty-six thousand five hundred copies (36,500), that the receipts were in excess of the expenditure, leaving a large balance of one thousand three hundred and eighty-four dollars and twenty-nine cents (\$1,384.29) on hand, and in general that the enterprise was in a prosperous condition.

#### MR. CROIL'S TENDER OF RESIGNATION.

Mr. Croil here stated that he intended during this year to go to Europe, to be absent for some months, and tendered his resignation of the editorship of the Record.

It was moved by Mr. Campbell, seconded by Dr. Burns, and agreed to, as follows:—Receive the Report, express the gratification of the Assembly at the enlarged circulation and growing usefulness of the *Record*, and their regret at the intimated resignation of the managing editor; decline to accept said resignation, and remit it to the Committee on the *Record* to make arrangements for Mr. Croil's temporary withdrawal from the editorial work, should be find it necessary to be absent for the space of twelve months.

#### RETURNS TO REMITS.

Mr. James A. Murray submitted and read the Report of the Committee on Returns to Remits—First, On the Remit anent the Marriage Question: (1) In regard to the permanent obligation of the Mosaic Law of Incest. On this clause twenty-seven Presbyteries declared approval, six Presbyteries report no opinion, and five Presbyteries make no return. (2) In regard to the opinion of the Committee that the proposition that a man may not marry any of his wife's kindred nearer in blood than of his own is not sufficiently sustained by the Scriptures. On this clause thirteen Presbyteries express approval, nine Presbyteries disapproval, eleven Presbyteries report no opinion, and five make no returns. (3) On the third proposition, that Church discipline shall not be exercised in regard to a wife's sister, wife's aunt and wife's niece, twenty-six Presbyteries declare approval, six disapproval, one Presbytery reports no opinion, and five Presbyteries make no returns.

Second.—On proposed regulations anent Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund: (1) In regard to the third regulation, thirteen Presbyteries approve; tive disapprove; two declare approval to the end of the word "Fund"; one approves in general, with the substitution of \$400 for \$200; one approves in general, with the substitution of \$300 for \$200. (2) In regard to the fourth proposed regulation, as found in the Minutes of last year, thirteen Presbyteries disapprove; twelve approve; two report no opinion; one complains of the frequent changes made in the regulations; twelve make no returns. (3) In regard to the tifth proposed regulation, as found in the Assembly Minutes of last year, twenty-one Presbyteries approve; three disapprove; two report no opinion, and twelve send no returns.

Third.—On Remit anent expense of printing. (1) As to lessening the expense of printing Minutes of Assembly, ten Presbyteries approve simpliciter; sixteen send up no returns; nine declare for no change; one approves, with the suggestion of three copies instead of two; one proposes improvements, which cannot be classified, and are submitted to the Assembly. (2) As to the reduction of the quantity of printed matter, nineteen

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The (Western deeds wi Presbyteries declare no change; six approve of reduction; one declares for purchase rather than gratuitous distribution of Minutes; one recommends that Statistics be printed, say once in four or five years, and three copies sent to each congregation; one reports no opinion; ten have sent up no returns.

. On motion of Mr. Murray, seconded by Dr. Bryce, the Report was received, and the Assembly proceeded to consider *seriatim* the various matters contained therein.

It was moved by Dr. Laing, seconded by Mr. McLean Sinclair,—That whereas it appears from the returns to the Remit of last General Assembly on the Marriage Question that a majority of Presbyteries approve of the recommendation in the Remit as to the action proper to be taken by the Church, viz.: that Church discipline shall not be exercised in regard to marriage with a deceased wife's sister; therefore resolved, that this recommendation be adopted and sent down to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act.

It was moved in amendment by Dr. Bryce, seconded by Mr. S. Houston,—That, on account of acknowledged difficulties in adopting a practical course of action in connection with discipline in the matter of marriage with a deceased wife's sister, until the statement in the Standards of the Church on the subject shall have received attention, the matter be deferred till next Assembly.

A vote being taken, the amendment was carried, and the Assembly decided accordingly.

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND,

The Returns to Remit on the proposed regulations for the management of the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers being considered, it was agreed to refer the whole subject embraced in the Returns to the Committee on this Fund.

#### PRINTING.

Referring to the Returns to the Remit proposing to adopt measures for lessening the expense of printing, the Assembly took up the reply of the Presbytery of Hamilton to said Remit in terms following:—The General Assembly should order—

- 1. That all Reports of Standing Committees be presented at the opening of each Assembly in printed form, and be distributed among the Commissioners—a copy for each Commissioner—stitched together in one volume, not later than the second day of the Assembly.
- 2. That one copy of these Reports be sent to each Kirk Session, in addition to those distributed to the Commissioners.
- 3. That the Minutes of the General Assembly be printed separately, and in a form of the same size, so that they can be bound with the Reports.
- 4. That each Session and Mission Station receive two copies of the Minutes gratuitously.
- 5. That any person sending to the publisher twenty-five cents for each copy may obtain as many copies of the Reports and Minutes stitched together as he may desire.
- 6. That a sufficient number of the Reports and Minutes be printed annually to meet all the above requirements.

On motion of Dr. Laing, duly seconded, the Assembly received the Overture, and agreed to send it down for the consideration of Presbyteries, to report to next Assembly; and that for the current year the printing of Minutes and other papers be done as in the past.

## MISSION PROPERTY-PRINCE ALBERT.

The General Assembly, on the recommendation of the Foreign Mission Committee, (Western Section), adopted the following resolution:—That, as it is necessary to issue deeds without delay to persons who have purchased lots upon the mission property at

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itted eteen Prince Albert, North-West Territories, resolved,—That Mr. James Robertson, Winnipeg; Mr. Hugh McKellar, High Bluff; William MacLaren, D.D., Toronto; and Hon. Alexander Morris, of Toronto, Trustees for the General Assembly, be, as they hereby are, authorized and instructed to grant a power of attorney to Professor George Bryce, Winnipeg, another of the Trustees of the Assembly, to sign all deeds for lots sold upon the Mission property at Prince Albert up to the present date, when he is certified by the agent at Prince Albert that the full price has been paid for the same, and when he is satisfied that the terms of sale have been duly fulfilled.

#### CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING FUND.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on the Church and Manse Building Fund for Manitoba and the North-West. The Report was presented in printed form, containing statements in detail of the condition of the Fund and of the building operations aided during the year. On motion of Mr. R. H. Warden, seconded by Dr. Burns, the following resolution was adopted:—That the Assembly receive the Report of the Committee on the Church and Manse Building Fund for Manitoba and the North-West, and record its appreciation of the valuable aid rendered by this Fund to the work of Church extension in the North-West, and commend the scheme anew to the liberality of the members and adherents of the Church. Further, the General Assembly in this connection recognize and express its appreciation of the services of the Rev. James Robertson, through whom, instrumentally, the Fund has reached its present properous state.

#### APPLICATION ON BEHALF OF REV. W. R. FRAME.

There was read an extract Minute of proceedings of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, setting forth that the Rev. W. R. Frame's resignation of the pastoral charge of Mount Stewart and West St. Peter's had been accepted on the ground of his impaired health, and praying the Assembly's leave to retain his name on the Presbytery's roll. On motion of Mr. Neil McKay, duly seconded, the application on behalf of Mr. Frame was granted, and the Assembly ordered accordingly.

## THOMSON, REV. T. G., ON ROLL OF HURON PRESBYTERY.

There was taken up and read an application from the Presbytery of Huron for leave to retain the name of Mr. T. G. Thomson, lately sent by the Home Mission Committee to British Columbia, on the roll of said Presbytery. On motion of Mr. Joseph McCoy leave was granted as craved.

## MEMORIAL-PRESBYTERY OF BARRIE-MRS. THIRDE.

There was presented and read by Mr. R. Moodie, a memorial from the Presbytery of Barrie on behalf of Mrs. Thirde, the widow of the Rev. Mr. Thirde, who, for only a few weeks, had exercised his ministry at Huntsville, Muskoka, and praying that Mrs. Thirde should be placed on the Widows' Fund. After reasoning, on leave of the Assembly, the memorial was withdrawn.

#### THE BIBLE IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Dr. Laing, from the Committee appointed at last Assembly to coöperate with a Committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, and with Committees appointed by other Christian denominations, with a view of having the Bible used in the Public schools, presented and read a Report setting forth the steps taken by the Committee during the year for the attainment of the object sought, and closing with recommendations for the adoption of the Assembly. Dr. Laing, at the same time, laid on the table a book containing selections from the Holy Scriptures and forms of prayer, compiled under the

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direction of the Minister of Education for the Province of Ontario, and designed for use in the Public and High Schools of that Province; signifying also the Committee's high approval of the book.

On motion of Dr. Burns, seconded by Dr. Bryce, thanks were tendered to the Committee, the Report was received, and the recommendations therein contained were adopted in terms following:-That this Assembly, acknowledging the courtesy of the Hon, the Minister of Education shown to their Committee, records satisfaction with what has been accomplished in the way of giving religious instruction in our schools, and accept the same gratefully; and also, that the Assembly renews its testimony that nothing short of acquaintance with the will of God as revealed in the Bible will suffice to make people God-fearing, virtuous and law-abiding, or afford adequate guidance for life and duty; and declares its readiness to cooperate in any measures which may be proposed by the educational authorities for securing similar privileges for the young in the other Provinces of the Dominion.

On motion of Dr. Mathews, seconded by Mr. W. T. McMullen, it was agreed that the following Committee be apjointed to cooperate with similar Committees from any Protestant denominations with a view to the promotion of religious instruction in the schools of the Province of Quebec, viz.: Professor Scrimger, Convener; Dr. MacVicar, Dr. Mathews, Dr. Weir, Messrs. James Watson, James Croil and John White.

#### BOOK OF FORMS.

Dr. Laing, from the Committee on the Book of Forms, reported that a small edition of the book now in use had been printed during the year; and that the Committee, having been unable to obtain a copy of the Revised Book of Discipline of the American Presbyterian Church, thought desirable at last Assembly, for their guidance, recommend that the Committee be continued, under the instructions already given, and that the Presbyteries and individual members of the Church be invited to send to the Convener any suggestions as to changes or additions which their experience may afford, for the guidance of the Committee in revising the Book of Forms. On motion the Report was received and adopted, and the Committee re-appointed as follows: Dr. Laing, Convener, Drs. Reid, MacVicar, Fraser, Bell, Caven, McGregor, Torrance, and Messrs. R. H. Warden, A. McLean Sinclair, R. Campbell (Montreal), James Maclennan, Q.C., W. B. McMurrich and Dr. Macdonald.

## PUBLISHING HOUSE.

Mr. George Bruce, on behalf on Mr. P. McF. McLeod, Convener of the Committee, presented and read the report of the Committee to whom was referred, at last Assembly, a memorial and Overture on the subject of a Publishing House, the establishment of a Book Room, and the issuing of a denominational organ under the sanction of the Assembly, setting forth in substance that it was not necessary or desirable that the Church should enter upon the business of publishing or printing; that a Presbyterian Book Room is not at present required, inasmuch as there are ample facilities for obtaining Presbyterian literature, and that as the Church possesses an official organ in the Monthly Record, and that there are other periodical publications in the interest of the Church, there is no need now that the Assembly should enter upon the publication of a weekly paper. Attention was further directed to the advisability of the appointment of a Committee to make a selection of books for Sabbath school libraries.

The Report, which closed with a recommendation, was received, and the recommendation adopted, as follows:-That while declining to give any official recognition to any particular denominational journal, the General Assembly cordially commend to our people the various papers and periodicals now published in the interests of Presbyterianism in Canada.

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#### COMMITTEE ON SABBATH SCHOOL LIBRARIES,

On motion of Mr. A. McLean Sinclair, seconded by Mr. W. T. McMullen, the following Committee was appointed to draw up a catalog e of books suitable for the libraries of Sabbath schools and Bible classes: Mr. P. McF. McLeod, Concener, Dr. Jardine, Messrs J. Thompson (Sarnia), J. M. Cameron, George Bruce, R. Campbell, (Montreal), A. McLean Sinclair, E. Scott, R. Laing, C. A. Doudiet, Hamilton Cassels, W. Drysdale and W. D. Russell.

#### REPORT-COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Dr. Reid presented a verbal Report of the Committee for the Protection of Church Property, stating that, in accordance with the instructions of last Assembly, they had made inquiry on the subject of the memorial of Thomas Robertson, of Hatley, in regard to the will of the late Thomas Smith, and that, on their advice a deed of renunciation of the bequest mentioned in the memorial had been signed by the Moderator, as prayed for; and that nothing further requiring the attention of the Committee had arisen during the year. The Report was received, and the action of the Committee in the premises approved.

#### FINANCE.

The Assembly called for the Reports of the Committees on Finance. Dr. Reid presented and read the Reports for the Toronto and Halifax Sections, which, on motion, were received and adopted.

#### PRESBYTERIAN ALLIANCE EXPENSES.

There was taken up and read a communication from Mr. George Junkin, Secretary of the American Section of the Executive Committee of the Alliance of Reformed Churches holding the Presbyterian System, informing the Assembly that the proportion allocated to this Church for the ad interim expenses of 1835-6 is \$255, and so gesting that the same be provided for out of the general treasury of the Church. The communication was received, and on motion of Principal MacVicar, seconded by Dr. Burns, the General Agent of the Church was instructed to pay the amount named out of the Assembly Fund.

#### CHURCH OF COHEMIA

A resolution in terms written below, moved by Dr. Burns, seconded by Mr. R. Campbell (Montreal), was unanimously adopted: That, whereas the Third General Presbyterian Council, at the meeting at Belfast in June, 1884, resolved to aid the struggling Churches of Bohemia, and to enlist in their behalf the sympathy and support of the Churches embraced in the Alliance, the General Assembly would commend the object to all in our congregations who feel an interest in the land of Huss.

#### LETTER FROM REFORMED CHURCH.

Dr. Reid submitted a letter from the General Synod of the Reformed Church in America, conveying the Christian greetings of that Church to the Presbyterian Church in Canada. The letter was handed to the Moderator, with the request that he would embrace an early opportunity of sending a reply thereto.

The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet again at half-past two o'clock, which was intimated from the chair, and the Sederunt was closed with the Benediction.

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## TWENTY-SECOND SEDERUNT.

On the same day, and at the same place, at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon:--

The General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted with praise and prayer by the Moderator.

The Minutes of the last Sederunt were read, in part, and were sustained.

#### LOYAL ADDRESSES.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee appointed to draft an Address to her Majesty the Queen, and also one to his Excellency the Governor-General of this Dominion. Dr. Burns, for the Committee, presented and read the Report. The Report was received and the draft addresses therein contained were adopted, and it was ordered that they be properly engrossed and transmitted through the usual channel.

#### POSTURE IN PUBLIC PRAYER.

There was taken up and read an Overture, transmitted by the Presbytery of Miramichi, in regard to the posture proper to be taken during prayers in *public worship*. After reasoning, the Overture was withdrawn.

#### TRAFALGAR INSTITUTE.

There was taken up and read a communication from the Rev. James Barclay, Chairman of the Trustees of the Trafalgar Institute, intimating that the Institute was to be under the supervision of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and requesting, on behalf of the Trustees, the appointment of a visitor or visitors to the Institute. On motion of Dr. Burns, seconded by Mr. J. K. Smith, the Assembly resolved as follows: Receive the communication, express interest in the educational objects of the Trafalgar Institute, and appoint the Rev. Principal MacVicar, D.D., LL.D., and the Rev. N. McNish, LL.D., as Visitors.

## BRANTFORD LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Brantford Ladies' College. The Report was handed in and read, stating that one hundred and eighteen students had been enrolled; that the College continued to avail itself of the advantages provided by the Toronto University local examinations for women, at which examination last year the six students sent up wissed, obtaining five first-class and four second-class honours; that the College had bee, visited by the Rev. D. D. McLeod and the Rev. John Laing, D.D., members of the Advisory Council, and the Rev. S. Lyle, B.D., Official Visitor, who, in their report to Board of Directors, expressed great satisfaction at the proficiency of the students and directors on the part of the instructors. The Report had also appended to it a list of the shareholders qualified to act as directors.

It was agreed to receive the Report, record satisfaction with the prosperous state of the College, and commend it anew to the confidence of the Church. The Assembly also nominated the first twelve named on the list of Shareholders as eligible for election as Directors, namely: Wm. Watt, Robert Henry, Alexander Robertson, Wm. Nichol, M.D., Thomas McLean, Charles B. Heyd, Rev. W. Cochrane, D.D., Wm. Grant, Robert Russell, Adam Spence, John Sutherland, Alexander Turner. The Assembly also appointed Mr. S. Lyle, B.D., and George M. Milligan, B.A., as Visitors of the College for the ensuing year.

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#### OTTAWA LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Assembly called for the Report of the Board of Managers of the Ottawa Ladies' College, which was presented and read by Dr. Moore, stating that there had been during the year ending June 24, ten teachers fully engaged in the work of the College; that there were one hundred and seventy-six pupils in attendance, of whom fifty-six were boarders; that sixteen are preparing for graduation, the largest number in any one year since the College was opened; that care has been taken to promote the religious interests of the pupils, with a good measure of success; that an effort is to be made to reduce or pay off the debt, which to some extent operates to hinder the usefulness of the College, and that the Visitors appointed by the Assembly had expressed their satisfaction with the teaching and general management of the College.

The following resolution, moved by Dr. Moore, seconded by Mr. J. A. Murray, was adopted:—That the General Assembly having heard the Report, receive the same, express satisfaction with the prosperous condition of the College, approve the efforts to free the institution from debt, and cordially commend it to the continued confidence and support of the Church.

Visitors.—The Assembly appointed as Visitors for the current year, Principal Grant and Mr. F. W. Farries.

#### PETITION-REV. E. ROSS.

There was presented and read, a petition from the Rev. E. Ross, of Truro, in regard to his relation to the Committee on the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund of the Eastern Section of the Church, with a recommendation from the Committee on Bills and Overtures that the petition be referred to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces. On motion, the recommendation was agreed to, and the Assembly decided accordingly.

#### PETITION-CONGREGATION OF LANGSIDE.

A petition was presented and read from the Session and Managers of the congregation of Langside, in the Presbytery of Maitland, setting forth that the congregation is so situated that it cannot receive any additional territory; that English and Gaelic are required in pastoral work; that there is no prospect of uniting with any other congregation; that it numbers sixty-four families, has a church and manse, and that the contributions for the support of ordinances have been advanced one hundred dollars (\$100) during the year, making the promised stipend five hundred and fifty dollars (\$550), with the manse included, being at the rate of eight dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$8.38) per family, and fifteen dollars and eighty-five cents (\$15.85) per communicant; that the Presbytery had repeatedly recommended and urged the claims of the congregation, and latterly had made a special application for putting it on the list of augmented congregation be preserved, by its being placed on the list of augmented congregations.

It was moved by Mr. J. A. Murray, seconded by Mr. R. H. Warden, and agreed to,— That the petition be received and remitted to the Home Mission Committee, with recommendation that it shall receive as favourable consideration as the regulations will permit.

#### PETITION - DR JAMES ROSS.

There was taken up and read a petition from Dr. James Ross, in regard to his relations to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, together with an extract Minute of the Proceedings of said Synod thereanent. It was agreed, on motion of Dr. Laing, seconded by Dr. Grant, to remit the petition of Dr. Ross to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, with power to finally issue the matters contained in said petition.

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#### LEAVE OF ABSENCE -MR. R. R. WARDEN.

Mr. R. H. Warden asked leave of absence for three months, and stated that he had made provision for the work of his office during his absence. The leave asked for was granted.

#### STATED COLLECTIONS.

On motion of Mr. Warden the Assembly resolved that, in congregations in which there are no missionary associations, collections for the schemes of the Church be taken up as follows:—

- I. French Evangelization, on the second Sabbath of July.
- II. Home Missions, on the third Sabbath of August.
- III. College Fund, on the third Sabbath of September.
- IV. Widows' and Orphans' Fund, on the third Sabbath of October.
- V. Augmentation of Stipend, East and West, on the third Sabbath of November.
- VI. Assembly Fund, on the third Sabbath of December.
- VII. Manitoba College, on the third Sabbath of January.
- VIII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, on the third Sabbath of February.
  - IX. Foreign Missions, on the third Sabbath of March.

Or on such other days as may be most convenient for the congregations. Further, that all congregations and Mission Stations be enjoined to contribute to the schemes of the Church.

#### LETTER-A'HOA.

Dr. Wardrope, at this stage of the proceedings read a letter addressed to Mr. Croil from A'Hoa, one of the native pastors in Formosa. Whereupon it was moved by Principal Grant, seconded by Dr. Burns and resolved, as follows: That the General Assembly have listened to A'Hoa's letter with much interest, and request Mr. Croil to convey the expression of the Christian sympathy and the kindest greetings of the Assembly to him and his fellow-labourers, with prayers for their welfare.

#### THANKS.

The subjoined resolution of thanks, on motion of Dr. Bryce, seconded by Dr. Burns, was manimously adopted:—That hearty thanks are due, and are hereby tendered:

- I. To the friends of the Church in Montreal who have so hospitably entertained the members of the Assembly.
- II. To the Minister and Deacon's Court of Crescent Street Church, for the use of the church and its commodious committee rooms, and to Mr. John McLaren, who has led the Psalmody with efficiency at the meetings of Assembly.
- III. To the Committee, and especially to the Rev. Professor Seringer, who have attended to the accommodation and comfort of the Commissioners, and have put forth every effort to render pleasant the visit of the members of Assembly to the City of Montreal.
- IV. To the Chairman and Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, for the agreeable entertainment tendered to the members of Assembly.
  - V. To the Railroad and Steamboat Companies for the reduced fares given members.
- VI. To the publishers of newspapers who have given reports of the meetings of Assembly, and to those who have sent copies of their papers for free distribution.
- VII. To the Bell Telephone Company for the free use of an instrument during the meeting, and to the Telegraph Companies for facilities afforded.

#### CLOSE.

The business being finished, the Moderator addressed the Assembly. The Assembly joined in praise, singing Psalm one hundred and twenty-second, verses sixth to ninth,

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inclusive. The Moderator then said: In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ the only King and Head of the Church and by authority of this Assembly, I now dissolve this Assembly, and appoint the next General Assembly to meet in the City of Hamilton and within St. Paul's Church there, on the second Wednesday of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six years, at half-past seven o'clock, in the evening.

The Moderator then closed the Session with prayer and the Apostolic Benediction.

REPORT OF THE HOME MISSION COMMITTEE OF THE PRESBY-TERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA, (WESTERN SECTION), 1884-85.

In presenting their annual report to the General Assembly, the Home Mission Committee desire to express their gratitude to the Great King and Head of the Church, for the measure of success that has attended their work during the year. They regret that the Augmentation Fund, so auspiciously inaugurated two years ago, has during the past year come short of the demands made upon it. The Committee, however, in the fullest confidence that the friends of the scheme will more than make up the deficit during the coming year, have paid the grants in full. It is earnestly to be desired, that the standard reached may not only be maintained, but that the Committee may be enabled at no distant date, to advance beyond the present minimum.

The Contributions to Home Missions have been more than sufficient to meet the estimates of the year. It ought, however, to be stated, that but for bequests, and the contributions of the Church of Scotland, the Free Church of Scotland, and the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, received during the year, the receipts both for Augmentation and Home Missions, would have been much less than they are. As this source of revenue is precarious, and not always to be depended upon, it is necessary that the estimates should be based upon the sum that can reasonably be expected from the congregations in Canada.

The Home Mission Committee and the Sub-Committee on Augmentation, have used the utmost diligence to increase the contributions to the funds, so that our Missionaries in distant fields, and our Ministers in weak congregations, who need assistance, may not be disappointed in the aid expected from the Committee.

In the report now submitted, there will be found interesting details of Home Mission work, in the Presbyteries of Ontario and Quebec, in the Lake Superior region, in the Muskoka district, and in Manitoba, the great North-west, and British Columbia. In the report of the sub-Committee on Augmentation, to which th Committee would call the attention of the General Assembly, there will be found ample information as to the workings of the scheme during the past year, and important recommendations as to the future. The appendix contains complete statistics of all the mission stations and supplemented congregations, with the several amounts granted them during the year, and the list of Missionaries and Catechists under the care of the Committee.

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# SUMMARY OF MISSION WORK IN PRESBYTERIES IN ONTARIO AND QUEBEO, IN MANITOBA, AND THE NORTH WEST AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

PRESENTERY OF QUEBEC.—In a Presbytery suck as Quebec, there is not a great deal of progress to note in connection with Home Mission work. At Metis a new church has been erected by the Mission people, and another a few miles distant for the summer visitors. The people also commenced with the last year, to pay about twice as much towards the salary of the Missionary, as in former years. The Rev. Wm. Clarke M. D. of Paris, Ontario, gave excellent service during the last summer. At Valcartier, there is a large increase in the amount given for the support of ordinances, and the congregations are commencing repairs and improvements on the Church property, which are to cost \$500.00, most of which is already subscribed. We look for continued progress there. At Kennebec Road a new church was opened during the past year, and a new manse completed. The congregations of Danville and of Kingsbury and Brompton Gore are also purposing to build manses for their Ministers. The congregation of Richmond and Lower Windsor has become self-supporting. A new mission is to be opened in the vicinity of Sherbrooke but it is not yet settled how many of the needy groups of families will be supplied.

There are many difficulties in the way of Mission work in this Presbytery, chief of which, is the gradual removal of our best Protestant families, and the rapid increase of the French Roman Catholic population. At the same time, there is an increasing desire among those remaining to have ordinances maintained, and if their average contributions are examined, it will be found that they compare favorably with those of the larger and wealthier congregations of our Ohurch.

PRESENTERY OF GLENGARRY—Missionary work in this Presbytery, has been chiefly the supplying of vacant charges by students, during the summer vacation. Two fields were thus supplied for six months of last year, and three vacant pulpits were filled for three Sabbaths during the Christmas holidays. The work done by the students is eminently satisfactory, great assistance being rendered to the Presbytery, in keeping together vacant congregations until they can procure settlements.

The Presbytery a few months ago took up the French Mission Work, and employed a Colporteur to explore the ground within the bounds, to gather together into some kind of organization the French Protestants, and to labor among the others according as he had opportunity. This Mission is largely an experiment. However, the Colporteur has made a good beginning. There are many French Canadians within the Presbytery of Glengarry. May the result of this first step be the multiplication of means for elevating and evangelizing this element of our population.

PRESBYTERY OF OTTAWA—Though much earnest and faithful work has been done in the wide and needy Mission fields of this Presbytery, there is not much of special interest to report. More fully than in the previous year, the fields have been occupied. Into a few more regions where the Protestant population is exceedingly sparse, our Missionaries have gone with the hope of being able to fix upon central points, at which services might be held. It is hoped that during the present

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season, something more may be done in this direction. But as the people are poor and widely separated, it may be some time before we can have any distinct organization in these newer regions. The difficulties which a sterile soil and a sparse population, present to Mission work, still continue to operate against the occupation and extension of our fields. But while all is not done that the necessities of the fields require, we are thankful for what is done, and for the measure of progress which the Lord has been pleased to grant to our work. In one of our fields a neat little church was erected last summer. In others there are evidences of progress, and the cutlook for the present season is hopeful.

PRESENTERY OF LANARK AND RENFREW—During the past year, the Presbytery devoted its energies to extending the work on the line of the Canadian Pacific, beyond Mattawa, and a degree of stability was secured by the erection of churche's at Sturgeon Falls and North Bay—small villages on the shores of Lake Nipissing. The congregations within the bounds, contributed somewhat over \$300 to this object, and by so doing evoked the liberality of the settlers, and greatly encouraged them in going on to build. A practical evidence this of the great importance of a Church and Manse Building Fund for Ontario and Quebec. The Nipissing District has now been transferred to the care of the Barrie Presbytery, and it is expected that under the charge of the Superintendent of Missions, satisfactory progress will be recorded.

At Mattawa our Missionary has been carrying on the work in face of many difficulties, caused by the altered circumstances of the village since the railway employees moved on. During the summer he made an extended tour to the north, and was gladly welcomed by the scattered families whom he thus reached, some of whom were Presbyterians who had not for the many years they had been in this district, seen the face of a Presbyterian Minister.

At Eardly progress has been made and a new church has been arranged for, in this case also assistance being given by neighboring congregations

In other parts of the field there is nothing special to be noted. The great difficulty in every case is the want of regular supply, and unless means can be devised to meet this want, the interests of the church, in districts like that occupied by this Presbytery, must suffer materially. There cannot be progress, where important Missions are left without services during the winter months, and the devising of a remedy is surely worthy of the best attention of the church.

PRESBYTERY OF BROCKVILLE.—There are five Mission fields within the bounds of this Presbytery, all of which are supplied by students for the coming summer months, with the one exception of Merrickville etc, which is occupied by an ordained Missionary, under a temporary arrangement with the people.

- 1 Crysler's:—A small station consisting of thirty families, which is within easy distance of the settled charge of Morewood, and could be profitably annexed by that congregation, has secured the services of a student for the present season. It is hoped and expected that the connection above specified will be effected this year.
- 2 North Williamsburg and Winchester Springs:—Through the removal of a few leading families from this district, the stations have been somewhat financially

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weakened. But for such depreciation they would have been placed, last year, on the list of vacant congregations. A student has been appointed for the summer months.

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- 8 Delta: —The mission station here, is supplied with services during the winter months, from Queen's College Missionary Association, and for this summer is also under the care of a student. The field is wide, but affords ground for encouragement.
- 4 Merrickville, North Augusta and Fairfield:—North Augusta and Fairfield formerly constituted a supplemented charge, under a settled minister, but having through the operation of several causes declined from that position, they have been connected with Merrickville, and for a few years past, have been supplied by students, who have been promptly paid by the people. The Presbytery with the view of further developing this widely scattered field, have recently sent in an Ordained Missionary.
- 5 Farmersville:—This is a new station which we are about to open for the supply of Presbyterian services, to several of our own families in the village and outlying districts.

Our Mission fields received much care and attention at the hands of the Presbytery, and in each of them there are decided evidences of success, and grounds of thankfulness to the Great Head of the Church.

PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON:---Every Mission field has been fully supplied during the past summer, and several of them partially, through the winter.

The reports of work done and progress made, are on the whole, encouraging and hopeful. The Sabbath services, together with Sabbath School efforts, week day visiting, and prayer meetings, have resulted in a cheering increase of Communicants, and a deeper and more general interest in Gospel Ordinances, as manifested in most localities, by increased contributions made to their support.

The extention of the Central Ontario Railroad, into the mining region of North Hastings is already having its effect. A mining village has sprung up, close by the Thanet and Ridge Group, and will be attended to by the student in charge.

New stations in the Matawatchan district on the Kingston and Pembroke Road, are expected to be served during the coming summer, viz., Douglas, Plevna, Ardoch and Ompah.

The North Hastings fields were visited during the winter by three members of the Presbytery in succession, each spen ling three weeks preaching, dispensing ordinances, and visiting the people.

L'Amath and York River &c., lately sent on a request for an ordained Missionary, backing it up with a guarantee of, at least, \$300 per annum towards his support.

Since last report, the Mission field of Rylston has been joined to St. Andrews, Seymour. The Rev. John Robertson, ordained Missionary, has been placed in charge of Millhaven, Ernestown and Bath, where he labors with much acceptance. A building, for use in public worship, has recently been purchased a. Bath, and probably another will, ere long, be secured at Millhaven. The Rev W. H. Hunt was stationed in January last as ordained Missionary, at Carlow and

Mayo, one of our most important fields in North Hastings. He has settled down to his work, with every prospect of a successful ministry.

Consecon and Hillier will probably, for the first time in many years, soon

have the services of a settled minister.

Melrose, Lonsdale and Shannonville, vacant for years, has nevertheless gradually prospered, through the earnest labors of student Missionaries. A new church is being erected at Melrose, and one, formerly used by the M. E. church, has been bought by the people at Lonsdale. The congregation is getting into such a condition, that we hope to see it in the near future, on the list of our settled, and possibly self-sustaining charges.

Our people at Newburgh have recently purchased a good stone edifice, lately

owned by the M. E. church.

Deputations visited and addressed all the congregations in this Presbytery, in the interests of the Augmentation Fund.

On the whole, notwithstanding the difficulties arising from scarcity of men &c., there is cause for gratitude, that solid progress has been made during the past year, and that a fair measure of success has attended the efforts made by the Presbytery, to attend to the spiritual needs of its extensive Mission field.

PRESENTERY OF PETERBORO:—The favorable reports received from Haliburton and Minden, fully confirm the judgment of the Presbytery, that two laborers were necessary to the successful working of these fields. Haliburton will pay during the present year the last instalment of a mortgage on its church, and will thus be able to contribute more liberally to the support of ordinances. It is hoped that at no distant time, it will again become, in connection with Robertson's settlement a pastoral charge.

Minden has a church and manse free from debt. Kinmount and Brown's Settlement are worked in connection with it as the central and most important station

Harvey has suffered through the removal of some of its best families, but there has been no diminution of interest in the services of the Missionary. The great obstacle to success there, as well as elsewhere, is the want of winter service. All the expenses of the mission during last summer, were paid by the field.

Havelock and Story Lake. Regular services were maintained during the summer at Havelock, a station on the Ontario and Quebec Railway, and the large attendance on public worship, and the liberal contributions of the people, seem to indicate that this will become one of the most important of our stations. It was connected with Stony Lake—a station small in numbers, but abundant in works.

Chandos and Burleigh. By the separation of this field from Monmouth and Cardiff, regular weekly services were secured to Apsley and Clydesdale, its two stations. A Catechist was placed in the Monmouth and Cardiff section. Owing to its wide extent, and sparse settlement, no great success can be hoped for. In the meantime services are given to a considerable number of Presbyterian families.

Augmentation. During the past year, two of our congregations, which fell below the minimum salary, have become self-sustaining, under the stimulus given by the augmentation scheme. Another congregation, which last year received \$223 only asks for \$83, for the present year, showing an increase in its contributions of \$140

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Un the whole there is ground for thankfulness and encouragement, in view of last year's work.

PRESENTERY OF LINESAY:—During the past year little change has taken place in the condition of the Mission field within the Presbytery of Lindsay. The Coboconk field consists of four preaching stations, where service is held every two weeks during the summer months. The members of Presbytery and student Missionaries have given occasional supply during the past winter. This summer the field is being wrought by two students, thereby giving weekly service to all the stations. The field is about fifteen miles wide and over thirty in length, and is most needy. The settlers have in the past, been largely dependent upon the lumbering interests, but as the timber is nearly exhausted, their prospects are by no means bright. Could an ordained Missionary be secured for the field, the advantage would be great. It is hoped the Assembly may devise some plan for proper winter supply, which is the great defect in our otherwise excellent system.

A new station has been opened in the village of Oakwood, and is supplied by the student from Cambray. The attendance at the new station is very large, and the prospects are good.

Some months ago Bolsover, Kirkfield, and Victoria Road, were happily united, to form one pastoral charge—They are supplied this summer and will be in a good position to call a minister, with the aid of a supplement, in the fall. There is little change in the augmented congregations, if we except Zephyr, a part of the Leaskdale charge. Service was first held there in connection with our church, about five years ago. The year following the congregation was organized with a membership of about twenty, since then it has more than doubled. The congregation have a very comfortable church, capable of seating two hundred and fifty persons—a basement and good sheds for horses, the whole being already entirely free from debt. The spirit shown by the people there, is most praiseworthy.

PRESBYTERY OF TORONTO:—Deer Park. The Rev. Mr. Freeman has done excellent work since his settlement last July. The prospect is, that this will soon become a self-supporting congregation.

Stouffville. This field has also obtained a settled pastor during this year, viz. the Rev Thos. Nixon. So far, substantial progress has been made.

Ballantrae. This field was worked by itself for the first time this year. The result has been encouraging. We still look for better things with more faithful labor.

York Station. This is a field, opened for the first time as a Mission Station, last September. So far it gives signs of progress, but the place is only recently established in connection with the Grand Trunk Works, and all depends on the increase in these works. This station is about three miles east of the city.

West Junction. This field has been opened during this year, supply having been given by the ministers of the city on the afternoon of Sabbath, for about three months. Now it is worked in connection with Dixie. The prospect at the Junction is good. Ground has been secured and a church is to be built at once.

In Hornby, Omagh, Camilla, Mono Centre, Caledon East, and Queensville, good work has been done, and we trust that the present year will be marked by increasing progress.

PRESENTERY OF BARRIE.—In the Muskoka and Parry Sound Mission Fields the work was prosecuted last summer by a large staff of labourers. A number of members of Presbytery visited the Stations, enquired into their condition and administered ordinances. The Rev. Messrs. J. A. Carmichael, of Columbus, and D. Duff, of North Brant, assisted in this duty. Perhaps the best evidence of progress is that in several places, such as Stisted, Sterling Falls, Uffington and Spence, new churches were erected, and in others, preparations were made for building.

Parry Sound Village. The Rev. A. Hudson, who laboured here with great acceptance for about eighteen months, was called to become pastor, and was induc-

ted to the charge on 18th Oct.

Huntsville, Allansville and Port Sidney. The sev. J. Sieveright. M. A., was appointed ordained Missionary to this group. Middle of on the chase in August last. His well-known building energy was soon apparent. The charch lot was cleared of unseemly stumps and stones. The church itself, loving leen renovated and embellished is now a very comfortable and neat edifice. A stone manse is in course of erection. At Port Sidney sheds are being put in the church grounds, and at Allansville and Brunel, a township adjoining Mr. Sieveright's charge, church buildings are in progress.

Supervision of the Mission Field. The Home Mission Committee were at length induced in October last by the representations of this Presbytery to appoint a minister to "Labour and supervise the Mission work in Muskoka and Parry Sound." The Rev. A. Findlay was appointed, and it may be expected that much advantage to the work of the church will result, considering his former experience, his faculty for organizing, his habit of attention to details, his knowledge of the district and his devotion to its interests. As he has sent in a copious report, further reference to the field is here unnecessary.

Byng Inlet. As reported last year the Rev. A. K. Caswell was placed in charge here. His labor extended to seven months only, in consequence of changes among the population of the place. The Student's Missionary Society of Knox

College occupy it this year.

Stations Organized. The Rev. James Carswell, of Bondhead, by appointment of Presbytery visited and organized Waubaushene and Fesserton in August last. In the same month, the Convener of the Presbytery's Home Mission Committee organized Longford and Black River, which were transferred from Lindsay Presbytery by the Synod. A handsome church has been erected at Longford, by the family of the late John Thomson, of that place, in memory of him, and deeded to the Presbyterian Church.

The Rev. D. James, at the expiration of his leave of absence, reported last year, returned to his charge as ordained Missionary at Midland. He accepted a call, which, soon after his return, was given him, and was inducted as pastor of the charge on the 26th August. The congregation is accordingly transferred from the list of aided stations to that of pastoral charges.

Vacant Congregations. The number has happily been reduced. Barrie, Angus &c., Knox and Guthrie Churches, are again enjoying the services of their several pastors. Bracebridge has become vacant by the appointment of Rev. Mr Findlay to the supervision of the Mission Field.

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Augmentation. One congregation, Hillsdale and Elmvale having risen to the minimum stiper d, has been removed from the list of Augmented Congregations. Parry Sound and Midland are removed from the aid receiving list of stations, and placed on the list of Augmented Congregations. Knox and Guthrie churches, one charge, make their first application for supplement, in consequence of the settlement of Rev. Mr. Morrison.

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No Winter Supply. Not only winter cold, but winter silence reigns throughout a great part of this large Mission Field. The supply of missionary services is interrupted for the winter season by reason of lack of labourers. The irritation of the Stations on this account seems to be increasing. The question is an urgent one for the General Assembly to consider—how are regular services throughout the year to be secured.

PRESENTERY OF OWEN SOUND.—During the summer, our work progressed most favorably. In every station the reports showed increase, both of interest and membership. It was found impossible, however, to get men for all the fields in the winter. An attempt was made to have a monthly supply from the college, but the expense and distance were too great, to make it general. This difficulty of getting supply during the winter, is making itself felt most injuriously, in the more remote and destitute fields of our Presbytery. Our Presbytery is anxiously looking to the Assembly, to make some provisions of men, to meet the crying world.

Deputations were appointed to visit the congregations in the interests of the Augmentation Scheme, but their efforts did not meet the success of last year.

PRESENTERY OF SAUGEEN.—All the Mission fields in this Presbytery are self-supporting. Four of the congregations are on the Augmented list. Two of the congregations give less than the minimum (\$750), but the pastors in these fields, knowing that their charges are able to pay at least the minimum, refuse to allow the Presbytery to apply for a grant to the Home Mission Committee. Although the Presbytery has not made large contributions to the Home Mission, or Augmentation Funds, it has succeeded during the last three years, in making the Mission fields self-sustaining, and in increasing the contributions of the people in many cases by \$50 and in some by \$100, and in bringing several up to the minimum.

PRESENTERY OF GUELPH.—A congregation has been formed, with a communion roll of sixteen members, at Linwood, through the labors of the Rev. Alex Russell, and placed under his charge in connection with St. Andrews Church, Hawkesville. A new stone church has been erected with sitting room for one hundred and fifty. The congregation seems enthusiastic; they promise in the meantime \$160 towards the pastor's salary, that being all they feel able to do after the efforts they have made, in providing a house of worship.

A station has been organized at Drayton, in connection with Moorefield and Rothsay, under the pastoral care of Mr. Edmison. He has been preaching here for some time, and the people have contributed \$100 towards his salary, to show their appreciation of his services.

A station has been opened in West Garafraxa, in connection with the second church, Garafraxa, both receiving student supply. No definite arrangements have

up to this date been made, as to the proportion which shall be paid by the recently formed station for supply of preaching.

PRESENTERY OF HAMILTON.—We have very little to report from the fields in the Hamilton Presbytery either new or particularly encouraging. The Fort Erie group continues to be supplied by the Rev. J. S. Stewart, who has done faithful work for nearly two years, in a very discouraging field. His engagement expires with May. The future of the field is still an open question.

Port Colborne, reduced to a Mission station since last report, is making satisfactory progress under Mr R. Pyke, a Catechist.

Louth continues to be supplied with Merritton. A change is spoken of in this field, which may be reported at the close of the current half year.

Wellandport has had very little supply during the winter. The Rev. Thos. Alexander who was sent in, was not able to do the work. A student takes charge for the summer months. This is one of our most difficult fields, on account of both its position and composition. We are trying to do our best with it.

It was expected that Ancaster East would pass from the list of stations supplied through the Home Mission, by forming a self-sustaining congregation in union with a neighboring station. This hope for the present has been disappointed.

Barton is being supplied by the Presbytery. Prospective changes make the outlook for some of our Mission stations brighter than in the past, but we will not prophesy, as hopes are often doomed to disappointment.

PRESENTERV OF PARIS:—The Mission field of this Presbytery is limited. During the year, in addition to East Oxford which has been regularly supplied, and Balfour Street Mission West Brantford, supported by Zion Church, Brantford, a new preaching station has been opened in Onondaga, seven miles from Brantford. The membership of this promising station, is largely composed of former members of Dr Cochrane's church in Brantford, and the Presbyterian churches in Caledonia and neighborhood.

PRESENTERY OF LONDON:—There are at present only two Mission fields worked by this Presbytery, Springfield and North Street. The latter is a new station, opened in April last, and situated six miles north of St. Thomas. The prospects both there and at Springfield, are encouraging, if continuous supply can be secured. One pastoral charge which was, last year, on the list of aid-receiving congregations, that of Ailsa Craig, and Carlisle, has become self-supporting.

PRESENTERY OF CHATHAM:—The Mission stations in this Presbytery are fairly prosperons. Essex Centre raised this year to the status of a regularly organized congregation, has recently given a call which has been accepted. The congregation will require to be put at first on the Augmentation Fund, but in a little while, it will, in all probability, be self-supporting.

The ground gained last year in Maidstone Mission field, has been more than held, and our people there have now, after twenty years working and waiting, a prospect of having before long, a settled pastor.

The church edifices, which were being erected at the date of last report, at Tilbury Centre and Windfall, were opened last summer, the latter entirely free from debt.

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During last winter, while the students were at College, several Elders and other godly men, did good service in Mission fields of the Presbytery.

PRESETTERY OF SARNIA.—Mission work was prosecuted in the Presbytery of Sarnia, during the past year, more satisfactory than during any other year since the formation of the Presbytery. For the first time, the fields were supplied nearly the whole of the winter. The number added to the church was large, two beautiful and commodious churches were opened, and a third is now ready for being opened. These buildings are either out of debt, or else provision is made for paying the debt. There are four fields within the bounds of the Presbytery, Petrolia, Oil City, and Oil Springs, Sombra Village and Duthil Church, Black Creek and Wabuno. Two of these fields have probably arrived at the stage, when it would be more advantageous to have settled pastors over them. These fields are Oil City and Oil Springs, and Black Creek and Wabuno. The last mentioned field is now no burden on the funds of the Home Mission Committee. It is but right to state, that much of the winter, supply was given by an arrangement of Presbytery, by which each minister within the bounds, was to give two Sabbath days during the winter-

Preserver of Huron.—There have been no new stations opened during the year, nor has there been any change in the Augmented congregations. Goderich Gaelic is the only Mission station within the bounds of the Presbytery. The congregation is composed chiefly of fishermen, who spend the greater part of the summer on the Lakes. The people are not in good circumstances, and have had only partial supply during the year.

Bayfield and Bethany have had regular supply during the year. The Bethany people had their church burned a few months ago, but they intend building again, and have considerable subscribed for that purpose. These congregations are thinking of calling a minister who has been laboring amongst them during the past six months.

Things are going on very well at Grand Bend, and also at Exeter, but no change has taken place during the year financially. Both are aided as formerly by the Augmentation Fund. It is sufficient to say, that the cause of Christ has prospered during the past year. There have been large additions to the membership, in nearly all the congregations.

PRESEYTERY OF BRUCE.—The Mission Field within the bounds of this Presbycery comprises fifty-one regular stations, and several other stations, to which occasional preaching is given Twenty-five of these regular stations are on the Great Manitoulin Island—said to be the largest island in fresh water in the world. It is about one hundred and ten miles in length, and from thirty to forty miles in width, and contains about ten thousand white inhabitants and several bands of Indians. Six of these stations are on St. Joseph's Island. Three on Coburn Island, and the rest on the North Shore stretching from the eastern end of La Cloche Island to westward of Sault Ste Marie.

Manitowaning Group has enjoyed for the last eighteen months the much valued services of the Rev. E. B. Rodgers, an ordained missionary. He has given notice that he intends to leave this spring. Besides attending chiefly to the spiritual wants of this group, he has repeatedly visited other parts of the Island and dispensed the ordinances of the church.

St. Joseph's Island, Township of Tarbutt, has had for the same length of time the equally valued services of the Rev. Jas. Fergusson, another of our ordained missionaries.

Little Current, Gore Bay, Providence Bay, Thesalon, Coburn Island, and Bruce Mines groups, were occupied last summer by the students sent out by the Missionary Society of Knox College. These Students have been very largely the pioneers of our church throughout the whole of this region. Our Presbytery and the church at large cannot over-estimate the good they have done in this field.

Sault Ste. Marie enjoyed the services of the Rev. Mr. Morrison till about the end of last November, when he left the field. Since then, all these fields, with the exception of Manitowaning &c., St. Joseph &c., have been without any representative of our Church.

The Home Mission Committee of the Assembly is not to blame for this state of affairs. At the October meeting of 1883, five ministers of the church were appointed to these fields. Two only of the five accepted, the other three declined. In October 1884 three more were appointed to these fields, and not one consented to go.

During last winter the Convener of the Assembly's Committee, and the Mission representative of the Presbytery, have been unremitting in their efforts to induce some of the brethren to go, but utterly failed to secure one laborer for this destitute field. The question may reasonably be asked, who is to blame for such a state of affairs?

May not some of our Probationers answer it? May not some of our restless pastors answer it? If there be a desirable vacancy within our bounds, we are thoded with applications for a hearing. Might not some of these ask for a hearing in vacant mission fields? We hold ourselves open to receive applications from ordained ministers, or from probationers, or graduates ready to take ordination for the following groups—Manitowaning, Gore Bay, Bruce Mines (Gaelie) and if sore pressed with application, we might easily make room at Providence Bay for one, and at Thesalon, where the people have signified their wish to have a pastor settled over them. The Home Mission Committee of the Assembly, has in the past promised financially, every encouragement, and we have full confidence will continue the encouragement for the future. Surely there are some ministers of our that check who might very profitably serve in such destitute localities?

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Our people have built very comtortable churches for themselves in the following places;—Manitowaning, Gore Bay, (here there is also a glebe secured). Thesalon and the Sault St. Marie. They are also preparing to build churches at Little Current, Hilton and Richards Landing. In all these places help is required. The churches in these places would have been built ere this but for the inability of the people.

How shall we best attend to the wants of this destitute portion of our land? By sending a sufficient number of ordained men to form a Presbytery, who shall come into contact with its wants, and use the means which the Church may provide to the very best advantage, seems the only hope of these outlying districts.

# THE MUSKOKA FIELD

As already referred to in the report from the Fresbytery of Barrie, the Home Mission Committee at its meeting in October last, appointed the Rev. Allan Findlay of Bracebridge, as an ordained missionary to labor in, and supervise the Muskoka and other distant mission fields. The minute of the Committee's action is as follows:

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"Supervision of Muskoka field,—An extract minute of the Presbytery of Barrie was read, asking the appointment for Muskoka of a superintendent of missions, whose whole time and services would be given to the work, and recommending that the Rev. A. Findlay receive the appointment. Rev. R. N. Grant was heard in support of the application.

After lengthened consideration, the following reso'utions were adopted:-

That an ordained missionary be appointed to labor in and supervise the mission fields in Algoma, Muskoka and Parry Sound districts, and along the line of the "Canadian Pacific Railway" to North Bay. He shall discharge his duties under the direction of the executive of this committee, being subject to the jurisdiction respectively of the Presbyteries of Bruce and Barrie while within their bounds.

That the salary of said missionary be at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, together with travelling expenses when beyond the bounds of the Presbytery where he resides."

Mr Findlay having accepted the appointment, entered upon the discharge of his duties in November. The following in substance is his report, as laid before the last meeting of the Home Mission Committee:—

I beg leave to report that I entered upon the discharge of the duties assigned me by the Home Mission Committee about the middle of November. My intention at first was to visit the stations along the Nipissing road, and then at the request of the Convener of the Home Mission Committee to go on to the C. P. R. and spending a coup'e of months at least among the stations on the line which had recently been assigned to the Presbytery of Barrie, and which unfortunately were without supply. This plan I carried out so far as visiting the stations south of Lake Nipissing is concerned, but at Nipissing village I received a telegram calling me home on account of sickness in my family. For this reason I was unable to leave home for any length of time during the months of December and January.

and so confined my attention during these months to the stations within convenient distance.

. During the winter I have visited twenty seven of our mission stations have spent every Sabbath except three among the stations, and have travelled over 2,100 miles. My object in visiting these stations has been threefold. 1st to hold a missionary meeting in each and thus interest them more directly in the work of our church, but especially in our Home Mission work. 2nd. To see that they were properly organized as to the management of their financial affairs—getting a committee of management appointed where none existed, which I found to be the case in many instances. 3rd. If possible to secure a larger contribution from the people for supply and thus lessen the grant given by the Home Mission Committee. The first group visited was that lying along the Nipissing road and forming part of the fields occupied by Messrs Knox and Garioch respectively. At Spence and Maganatewan, under the care of Mr Knox, we had good meetings. The former station were hurrying on their new church that they might get the use of it as soon as possible, the school house in which hith rto they have been worshiping being too small for the congregation and otherwise uncomfortable. That Mr Knox might get the benefit of the special grant made to eaterhists, these stations promise an increase, Spence to pay \$100 and Maganatewan \$150 per annum. Mr Knox seems to have a thorough hold upon the sympathies of the people, and much good may be expected to result from his labors among them. Commanda and Nipissing came next in order. These stations for a series of years have been under the care of the Students Missionary Association of Knox College. However as they desired more continuous supply than the Society could give them, the Presbytery practically took them in charge, when Mr Garioch was appointed in September last for six months, and now that they have asked a continuation of his services for the year, we cannot do less than comply with their request. As there is much land however yet to be possessed, we will have no difficulty in giving the Society other fields in return. At the close of missionary meetings at both stations, a Committee of Management was appointed and resolutions passed unanimously that Mr Garioch's services be continued and that they do all in their power to raise the amount necessary to secure the increased grant.

From the 5th to 9th January I held missionary meetings in the Couchiching groups of stations at which I enjoyed the valuable assistance of the Rev. R. Hume M. A. On the 12th and 13th similar meetings were held at Penetangushene and Wyebridge, at which like services were rendered by the Rev. D. James of Midland. Thanks are due to both of these brethren for the services so heartily rendered. On the preceeding Sabbath's I had given service to these stations. On the 16th of January I went north to Stisted where I held service morning and evening on Sabbath the 18th. On the following Monday we held our Missionary meeting which was well attended considering the cold stormy night. A difficulty which had existed for some time at this station, and which was working injuriously to the interests of the cause was amicably arranged, and it is to be hoped that a better state of feeling will henceforth exist among our members here. An effort was made by the rearrangement of the stations composing this group to secure service in each of them every Sabbath. Whether this can be carried out remains to be

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South Falls and Uffington, were also visited at this time and an arrangemade associating at their own request, the former with the latter. This will greatly strengthen the Utfington field and will render possible that which is so earnestly desired by the fields here, the enjoyment of service during the entire year. At Uffington I found that a very neat and commodious church had been erected since my last visit, which indicates their enterprise and desire to promote the Master's glory. Returning to Barrie for our Presbytery meeting on the 27th Jan. I proceeded from there to Toronto on the 28th. and met with the Committee of the Students Missionary Association of Knox College, with whom I made arrangements as to the fields to be occupied within the bounds of the Barrie Presbytery during the coming snmmer. The following arrangement was made viz., that the fields known as the Nipissing, Commanda and Stony, be given over to the care of the Presbytery, and that they assume charge of the fields Morrison, Bethune and Mc-Conkey, should the necessary information regarding these fields be forthcoming. It was also agreed that they send a missionary to Port Carling for four and a half months, and continue in charge of Baysville. I am happy to report that missionaries have been appointed by the society to all these fields.

On the 29th I turned northward again to visit the stations lying north of The field occupied by Mr. W. M. Robertson first claimed attention. Some of our meetings were but thinly attended, owing no doubt to the intense cold alternatively with storms, which characterized the weather. On Sabbath February 1st I preached at Knox Church Chaffy, and at Emsdale. Meetings were held on Monday and Tuesday at these two points. On Wednesday and Thursday I crossed over into Mr. Knox's field and visited Beggboro and Doe Lake. On Friday I returned to Mr. Robertson's charge at Katrine, and on Saturday I held meetings at Burkes Falls. I found in some of these stations much need for a word of counsel as to their financial affairs. While some were displaying zeal in them, others appeared content to let matters take care of themselves, no annual meetings being held and a lack af interest generally in the progress of the station. In all these stations, meetings were appointed to be held at an early date, to appoint Committees of management who should at once canvass the stations for subscriptions for the coming year, and report to me as soon as possible. At date of writing this, very few such reports have come to hand. On the 8th I supplied the stations at Berriedale, Burkes Falls, and Katrine and held a meeting at the former place on Monday. Though the night was stormy we had a good attendance. The question of the re-arrangement of these two fields, that occupied by Mr. Knox and Mr. Robertson respectively, was considered at these meetings. The proposition was to place Maganatewan, Spence, Berricdale and Burkes Falls, one group, and Katrine, Emsdale. Knox Church, Chaffy, Beggboro and Doe Lake, in another. Maganatewan and Spence had already decided in favor of the change. Knox, Chaffy was indifferent, Emsdale would accept the change if thought to be for the best, but would rather remain in present connection. Beggboro and Doe Lake were opposed to it generally, Katrine decidedly, while the sentiment of the friends at Burkes Falls and Berriedale, found expression in a motion unanimously agreed to

a joint meeting of these stations, to the effect that "the field be left as it is in

Just north of this group of stations lies the Town hips of Strong to which reference has already been made. Here we have four stations which have grown from year to year under the fostering care of the Studen's Missionary Association of Knox College, reciving only summer supply. In spite of their adverse circumstances they have not only increased in numbers from year to year, but also have become consolidated. Cultivating a spirit of independence which is highly praiseworthy, they now for the first time come under the care of the Presbytery. Asking no grant from the Home Mission Committee, they resolved to meet expense of students supply for this summer themselves, asking very earnestly, that they be not left alone for the winter months any more. In the centre of this group is the village of Sundridge, beautifully located at head of Stony Lake, enjoying also railway communication, the Gravenhurst and Callander Junction, passing through it. This promises to be a place of some note, in the near future, as a summer resort, and also being surrounded by exceptionally fine land, it will become a considerable business centre. Here we have a few earnest men who are doing their utmost for our cause and who look forward hopefully to the time when they shall have their own pastor among them. Eagle Lake and Strong stations in this group, already possess comfortable church buildings, while at Sundridge the frame already up will be hurried on to completion this spring. Members of our church wishing to change their location for business purposes, might do worse that visit Sundridge before deciding the question.

From this point I pursued my way toward the Pole through some thirty miles of wilderness along the line of railway under construction, by a road cut out by the contractors for convenience in getting in their supplies. This being the most direct road to my next appointment at Powassan, and being anxious to see the country along "the right of way", I took passage on a cadger's sleigh in preference to the more comfortable stage route via Nipissing. I reached my destination at Powassan next day about roon, spending the intervening night in one of the contractor's camps, being hospitably entertained, receiving the best that was going, even to the warmest spot on the floor for bed, having a cook on either side of me to keep off the side draughts. While passing over this route I was very much impressed with the fact that here, had we a suitable missionary, we have a most interesting field of labor among the men who are now, and will be in increasing numbers, employed on this work during the coming summer. In addition to many who speak English, there are many foreigners, Italians, Finlanders, Swedes and not a few Greeks engaged in the work. Could a suitable man be found who had a knowledge of any or all these languages, especially the Italian, most important results might be accomplished by his passing up and down the line, supplying them with religious literature in their native languages, and above all speaking to them the word of life. Fully eighty miles at the north end of the line will be a busy scene during the next seven or eight months, and surely it is not too much while they give us the highway through the rocks and over the ravines of this rough country, that we point out to them, many of them strangers in a strange land, that better way, even the way of life.

At Powassan I found every thing in excellent order. Our missionary meeting was beld at the house of Mr. John Clark, as no church building has been erect-

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ed yet. They are fully organized with an energetic Managing Committee, who were at the time of my visit circulating their subscription list for the year, which I have since learned amounts to \$128. This station is under the care of Mr. Garioch whose services they desire to retain for the year.

My next point was South East Bay on Take Nipissing, or Callander P. G. We have here I am satisfied the materials out of which may be formed a flourishing station, but they are as yet ungathered. The best I could do here was to hold an informal meeting with a few of our people to talk over plans for the future working of the field. It was suggested that by uniting this point with North Bay on the C P. R. some ten miles distant, and by including Thorncliffe, another station on the C. P. R. some four miles distant, a strong group would be secured in which service could be given to each station every Sabbath. The first want at present here, is a place in which to hold meetings. Being quite new not even a school exists. A church is absolutely necessary. This will be an important point of the G. & C. I. R.R. both as a lumbering centre and also as a summer resort. I recommended that on the arrival of their missionary for the summer, a meeting of the congregation be held for the purpose of appointing a Committee of Management, also that steps be taken for the immediate erection of a place of worship. This is one of those cases which appeal very strongly to the liberality of friends who may desire to advance our work in this new country.

On Saturday 22nd February after a walk of ten miles I found myself at North Bay, an important point on the C. P. R. I held service on Sabbath morning and evening to a congregation of from 75 to 80. On Monday evening we had our missionary meeting, and after it a business meeting of the congregation. The history of this station is interesting and augurs well for the future. Supply was given for the first time last summer by Mr. McLeod, a missionary from the Montreat College Students Association. Though receiving only some four or five months supply altogether I found a congregation pretty fully equipped, with a Committee of Management, a church nearly completed with only a small debt upon it and the people anxiously waiting for a missionary. They have received no supply since last September till i arrived among them. They also strongly expressed the hope that they be not left without supply for the coming winter. This point being the end of a division on the C. P. R. a considerable number of railway employees make this their headquarters. And although the population is somewhat fluctuating so far as individuals are concerned, yet the numbers are pretty well kept up. It is an important point also as it is likely to become the county town for the district of Nipissing. I next proceeded to Sunbury, the junction of the Algoma branch with the C. P. R. This was a point of some importance during the construction of the railway, but as the construction pushed west-ward the population to a great extent went with it. I found from information received that there were only six protestant families in the place, the remainder being French Canadian Roman Catholics. I did not go further west on this line as I was informed that the work on the eastern extension was about being closed, the men returning from the west at the rate of about 100 per day. I returned east-ward to Sturgeon Falls for the following Sabbath. Matters here were in much the same position as at North Bay, no supply had been given since last fall. A church has been erected here also, but not so nearly completed as at North Bay. On Monday evening I held our missionary meeting which was pretty well attended, and considerable interest manifested in our church work. Having received a proposition from the Montreal Students Association to take up work along the line for the summer, I assigned them that portion of the line from this point west-ward, making Sturgeon Falls, headquarters. Here as at North Bay the preceding week, I held service on the Wednesday evening. From this point I returned to North Bay for service on Sabbath the 8th inst, and found that in the meantime considerable progress had been made in collecting money for the Home Mission Fund. On Monday I turned my face homeward, arriving on Wednesday, thankful for the preserving care enjoyed during those weeks, and humbly hoping that good to our work and glory to the Master may result from these visits to our stations.

I have not dispensed the ordinance of the Supper in any of the stations, as this had been attended to in them all, only a few months previously. I deemed it of importance to get the stations placed as fully as possible on a healthy financial basis. I found in many instances great need for directions and encouragement to this, and I trust that the hints given will result in many instances in lessening the grants to these fields. In nearly every station visited, I got them to do something directly for the Home Mission Fund, the returns are not all in yet, but in so far as received the prospect is, that their contributions will be a considerable drop in the bucket. A list of these contributions so far as received up to latest date is appended. I may also state that all monies received as collections at Sabbath services and at missionary meetings, are credited to the stations as contributions to the Home Mission Funds.

# MANITOBA AND THE NORTH WEST TERRITORIES.

The following is the report of the Synod of Manitoba, of the work accomplished during the past year.

From various causes the expansion of this work was not so marked as in the preceding year. It can be said, however, that during no previous year was the satisfaction expressed so general, or the work done more enduring.

The resolution of the General Assembly erecting the Synod, gave it a territory considerably larger than that occupied by the late Presbytery. The Synod comprises the whole of the provinces of Manitoba, Assimiboia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Athabusia, and part of Cutario, besides the territories of Keewatin and the North-west. It extends from take Superior on the east to the Rocky Mountains on the west, and from the 49th parallel on the south to within the centre Circle on the north. Following the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which traverses the country from east to west, the Synod is 1,300 miles in length, and from the southern boundary to the accountry limit (habitable by Europeans) it is at least 600 miles wide. The settlement of such a country imposes weighty responsibilities on the State. To provide the insording settlers with the means of grace, and so

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lay deep and strong the foundations of national virtue, imposes at least equal responsibilities on the Church. If the material and intellectual belong to the State, the moral and religious should be the care of the Church.

Historical Sketch—A short sketch of the step; by which the work has reached its present proportions may not be uninteresting. The Presbyterian Church in Canada began work in the North-west in 1851 by the appointment of the late Rev. Dr. Black as missionary to the Highland Colonists, under Lord Selkirk, settled on the Red River, in what is now the parish of Kildonan. Eleven years later Mr. Black was joined by Rev. James Nisbet, who ministered to settlers at Little Britain and Headingly. In 1866 Mr. Nisbet was appointed missionary to the Oree Indians on the Saskatchewan, and his work there resulted in laying the foundation of what has since become the flourishing settlement and town of Prince Albert. In 1869 the Presbytery of Manitoba was organized with four ministers, viz., Messrs Black, Nisbet, Fletcher and MacNabb. At the same time, Mr. D. B. Whimster, sent out by the Foreign Mission Committee took charge of the Kildonan school, and for nearly two years, assisted by Dr Black, labored assiduously in furthering the interests of higher education in connection with Presbyterianism in this country. While thus employed Mr. Whimster assisted the Exethren above named in preaching the Gospel in regions adjacent. Services were continued in 1870 at Kildonan, Litt'e Britain, Headingly, Poplar Point, High Buff, Portage la Prairie and Prince Albert. Up to this time, the growth was slow. The North-west was unknown. It was not yet a part of the Dominion, and its adaptability for settlement had not been fully proved. The cession of the country to Canada marks a new era in its history. The crowding populations and pent up energies of the eastern provinces found here ample scope, and speedily effected a change. The material growth since has been simply marvellous. Nor has the Church been a laggard. The Assembly of 1884 erected the Synod of Manitoba and North-west Territories. It comprises the Fresbyteries of Winnipeg, Rock Lake and Brandon. Its roll contained the names of 58 ordained ministers, 18 of whom belonged to the Presbytery of Winnipeg, 11 to that of Rock Lake, and 38 to that of Brandon. In addition to these, there were 36 probationers, students catechists and teachers, in the employment of the Church. The congregations and mission fields numbered 81, and connected with them were 251 points at which Services were held.

Meeting of the Synod—According to the Appointment of the General Assembly, the Synod met in Knox Churci. Hall, and was constituted and organized by the appointment of Dr. Bryce, as Moderator, and Mr. Whimster, as Clerk. The Synod appointed Mr. Alex. Matheson, Mr. H. J. Borthwick and Mr. A. McKellar to be respectively the first Moderators of the Presbyteries of Winnipeg, Rock Lake and Brandon. The business pertaining to each Presbytery territorially was handed over by the Synod, and the Presbyteries were instructed to attend to the same. Each Presbytery was instructed to nominate three of its members to form with the Superintendent of Missions, the Synod's H. M. Committee. Those thus nominated, together with the Superintendent, were appointed such Committee, and the Committee organized by appointing the Superintendent, Convener, and Mr. D. B., Whimster, Secretary-Treasurer. The Synod defined the duties of the Committee

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and its relation to the several prest teries. The Committee held two meetings during the year, and, through an executive, attended to any business emerging in the interval.

Immigration—The volume of immigration to the North west was much smaller last year than during the preceding year—only about 8,000 having settled in the country according to official returns. The disturbances at present on the Saskatchewan, although in isolated settlements, and far removed from those in Manitoba and Assiniboia, are sure to act injuriously on immigration this year. Following on the heels of a depression consequent upon a partial failure of crops and low prices, the situation is much aggravated. This check, however, can only be temporary.

Resume of Work Dong—Work has been vigorously prosecuted in all the fields occupied in 1883, with the exception of Dumfries, South West Moose Mountain and Mendow Lea. Sickness among missionaries and lack of funds checked our progress slightly. This contraction, however, was more than offset by the occupation, for the first time, of Fort McLeod, Touchwood Hills, Yorkton, Riverside, Pancake Lake, Catheart. Shell River, and Carlyle and the re occupation of Battleford. In connection with Edmonton, Oak River, Elkhorn and some other fields, new stations were organized. There was thus a gain of nine fields and twenty-three stations. Owing to the assistance rendered by ministers visiting us from Ontario, a good deal of exploration was done, and occasional services given to families too widely scattered to be organized regularly as mission fields. Although the number of fields occupied during winter was considerably larger than ever before, yet about 1,500 families of the Church were for six months without the means of grace. This must tell injuriously on the spiritual tone of congregations and families thus situated.

Supply—There were eighty-one missionaries and ministers engaged in the Home Mission field, and as pastors of augmented congregations during 1884-85. Of them, fifty- one were ordained ministers, eighteen students, and eleven catechists.

Inductions—Mr. A. Urquhart was inducted into the pastoral charge of Regina, Mr. A. B. Baird, of Edmonton, Mr. W. McWilliam, of Prince Albert, Mr. James Todd, of Burnside, Mr. W. A. McKenzie, of Carberry, Mr. J. Lawrence, of Stonewall, and Mr. A. H. McLaren, of Springfield. Several other congregations are putting forth commendable efforts to call ministers, but they are prevented by the fewness of men and the difficulty of hearing candidates. Three demissions took place during the year.

Church Building—Churches were built at Port Arthur, Wolseley, Melwyn, Clanwilliam, Medicine Hat, Sturgeon River, Ellisboro, Moffatville, Manitou, Greenridge, Souris and Battleford; and manses at Springfield, Burnside and Minnedosa. Work was begun on the church at Regina, and it will be finished early this season. The cost of these buildings is estimated at over \$30,000.

C. & M. B. Fund—The Church and Manse Building Fund materially aided this work. During the brief time the Superintendent of missions was in Ontario during the winter, subscriptions to the amount of about \$7,000 were obtained for the Fund and several congregations visited, undertook to canvass members and

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Green congregational and population adherents in aid of the work. The Board in charge of the Fund is prepared to advance church and manse erection as an aid to the extension of the Kingdom of Christ in the country.

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Finances—Financia'ly, the strain has been severe. Many Congregations were not able to implement their engagements to their ministers, and loss has fallen upon many who could ill afford it. As compared with other Synods, the average per family and per communicant, as shown by the Assembly's report, is higher than that of any Synod of the Church. In augmented congregations for the current year, the average per family is \$14.77, and per communicant, \$14.62, while the averages for the western section, last year were \$9.94 and \$6.10 respectively. The financial outlook is not much brighter for this year. The present disturbance has put some money into circulation. Seeding in some places has, however, been neglected, and the gain is only apparent. One good crop would give an immense relief.

# PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG.

#### AUGMENTED CONGREGATIONS.

Emerson—Mr. McGuire resigned in December. Population was diminishing and congregation falling into arrears. All arrears of salary are now paid off, and floating debt wiped out. Since spring opened, the town is reviving and the congregation is in better heart, and anxious to call a minister.

Little Britain—Mr. Matheson is leaving to go to Avonmore. Growth here is slow like all the river congregations; a financial advance in Selkirk, but a decline in Little Britain.

Springfield—Called Mr. A. McLaren. The district is flourishing, and congregation is growing. This charge should require no aid after this year. A neat and commodious manse is nearly completed.

Stonewall—Mr. J. Lawrence was inducted in December. Growth has been slow, but steady. Should be self sustaining in a short time.

# SUPPLEMENTED MISSION CONGREGATIONS.

Clearsprings —Somewhat discouraging to missionary. Settlement scattered; travelling difficult; families leaving: faithful service, but little growth.

Dominion City, &c.—Has called Mr. P. F. Langill. Improvement in congregation. Greenridge built a neat church, and has but little debt: Mr. Munro (Queen's) rendered acceptable service.

Fort Francis and Rainy River—Country settled by Ontario people. Missionary to be sent this summer. Stations promised \$450 per annum toward support. An energetic, ordained minister required for this field.

Fort William and Oniver—Organized partially, and promises \$459 towards support of missionary: Distant from Port Arthur 6 or 7 miles. Town plot and Township of Oliver (20 miles distant) to receive supply with Fort William.

Greenwood, &c.—Shows some progress. Were the field more compact, the congregation would call, and soon become self supporting. Mr. McFarlane faithful and popular.

Headingly, &c.—Ohurch renovated. Renewed interest this spring, and promises of more financial aid. Not much spiritual progress—lukewarm.

Meadow Lea and Poplar Point—Stationary. Missionary sent this year, and out'ook brighter. During summer, Posen, a new field somewhat neglected hitherto, some 30 miles distant from this field, will receive fortnightly supply.

Morris, &c.—Almost at a standstill; slight improvement. Country stations growing. Large areas near the town not cultivated.

Port Arthur—Became self-sustaining last autumn. Mr. Herald has done a good work. Town growing rapidly. Handsome and commodions church built. No debt. Congregation anxious to call.

Rat Portage—Self-sustaining. Wish to call a minister. People spirited and liberal: Satisfactory.

White mouth—60 miles west of Selkirk on the C. P. R., and Niverville, 20 miles south of Winnipeg, are unvisited by other denominations. About 45 Protestant in all resident. Proposed to send them occasional supply, and as frequently as possible.

# PRESBYTERY OF ROCK LAKE.

#### AUGMENTED CONGREGATIONS.

Carman —Advancing steadily, both spiritually and materially. Mr. Ross is beginning to see the fruits of his hard work. Congregation at Carman is building a church.

Manitou—The present terminus of the Canada Pacific South Western Railway; growing, and promises to be a good town. Congregation is increasing in membership, and financial ability. About becoming self-sustaining.

Nelson—The C. P. S. W. Ry. is built 8 miles south, and the Manitoba S. W. Ry. has refused to run into town. This has seriously clouded its prosperity. Most of the business has moved to Morden, the railway station south of Nelson. When Mr. D. G. Cameron resigned, the Presbytery grouped Nelson and Mountain City. With Morden as the centre of the group, a strong charge may be built up.

Rock Lake--A large and laborious field. Want of railway facilities seriously checked its growth. Mr. Farquharson is highly esteemed.

#### SUPPLEMENTED MISSION CONGREGATIONS.

Cartwright—A new field—was occupied for the first time. Formarly Mr. Farquharson gave occasional service, but a wide country to the south and west lay unoccupied. Three new stations were opened up with about 45 families, making the number for the whole field about 60. Cartwright lies south of Rock Lake, and between Clearwater and Wakopa. Mr. Fraser, of Manitoba College, rendered acceptable service.

Darlingford—Constituted a group, and Mr. H. J. Borthwick placed in charge. South of the Pembina River sattlers are increasing, and the prospect of the field is cheering.

A railway would inspire the people with hope, and raise several of our congregations to the self-sustaining point in a year or two.

Lintrathen—During the winter Mr. D. Lantrow, formerly minister of the Welsh Calvinistic Methodist Church, was in charge, and rendered good service. Four stations constitute the group. Good progress is being made.

Morrison—Owing to ill-health of the missionary appointed, and lack of funds, this field was not occupied last season. A missionary has been appointed this season.

Marringhurst has made substantial progress under Mr. Cairna, and is now desirous of calling him.

Riverside lies north of Wakopa, or East Turtle Mountain field, and west of Pelican Lake. Mr. John McArthur, of Manitoba College, rendered good service here last summer. There are about 40 families of our church.

Swan Lake received supply last summer through the Missionary Society of Montreal College, but only occasional supply during the winter. This field is promising, if a suitable missionary could be secured permanently.

Wakopa, or East Turtle Mountain, has advanced very little, if any. People far removed from railways. It does not pay to team grain at present prices. From 100 to 150 miles of the best wheat raising country in the North-west has been seriously retarded by the lack of railway facilities. Wheat in some places has been standing in the stack two years unthrashed. Work in such fields is discouraging.

### PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

#### AUGMENTED CONGREGATIONS

Burnside—Lies west of Portage la Prairie. Mr. James Todd was called. Under him the congregation is growing. Manse built.

Edmonton—Mr. A. B. Baird was inducted last autumn. During the three years he has labored in the field, five stations were organized and two churches built. The financial record of the congregation is very high. Mr. J. L. Campbell, of Knox College, assisted Mr Baird last summer. The present disturbances may inflict loss on the settlers, but, it is hoped, no permanent injury may be sustained. Twelve united with the Church last year on profession of faith, Edmonton is 200 miles north of Calgarry, on the Saskatchewan.

Gladstone—About 40 miles northwest of Portage la Prairie, shows no great gain. Mr. D. Stalker, has a wide laborious field, and occupies it with universal acceptance.

High Bluff—Has been stationary as to families, but has made a slight advance financially. Good work is being done.

Minnedosa—Is the present terminus of the M. & N. W. Railway. The town did not grow as rapidly as was expected. Nor did the congregation. The people gave liberally for the support of ordinances, but they are not sufficiently numerous. It is proposed to strengthen the congregation by attaching Cadurcis. Ill health, it is feared, will compel the present popular pastor to resign.

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ge. eld Prince Albert—With great unanimity called Mr. McWilliam, and he was inducted last autumn. The district suffered severely through want of rain. Crops a failure. For a time the town has been almost in a state of siege, and the end is not yet. Reports not received since the half-breed uprising, but work done prior to that is most encouraging.

Regina—Is the capital of Assiniboia. Congregation called Mr. A. Urquhart, and he was inducted last summer. There has been satisfactory progress. A neat and commodious brick church is in course of erection. Mr. Urquhart rendered valuable service in the mission field lying north of the city.

### SUPPLEMENTED MISSION FIELDS (OLD.)

Along the line of the C. P. R. are the following:—(the figures indicate the distance west of Winnipeg.)

McGreger (80)—Has increased in size and importance. Mr. T. McRae, is missionary, and gives general satisfaction.

Chater (130)—Large and influential field, but in financial matters behind. The field is growing, and souls are being gathered in. Congregation should call and be self sustaining.

Cak Lake (166)—Advanced considerably under Mr. Haig, of Knox College, and Mr. James Paterson, catechist. At Oak Lake and Griswold stations, churches are being erected. Congregation wishes to call a minister.

Virden (180)—Flourishing. Church-manse too small to accommodate audience. Church to be built. Mr. J. M. Sutherland popular. Congregation ready to call. Financial record good.

Moosomin (210) has received considerable accessions. Melwyn station built a neat church; Moosomin just wiping out debt on its church. Steady advance.

Whitewood (250)—Advanced considerably. Efforts made to build a church this year. The field is large and families scattered. Important.

Broadview (264)--Barely held its own financially. Last season not favorable to farmers in neighborhood. District not strongly Presbyterian. Large Indian reserve north of the town.

Greenfell (280)—Mr. J. Fotheringham did good service. Delicate state of health forbade continuing in work. Some spiritual gain. Finances unsatisfactory,

Wolseley (294) made commendable progress. Churches erected at Wolseley, Ellesboro, and Mollatville, and all clear of debt; Mr. Robson proving an efficient missionary in matters spiritual, as well as material.

Indian Head (312) has a good financial record, but there has been little growth. In the south a new station is opened up this year. Indian Head is separated from Qu'Appelle station—four stations constituting the group.

Qu'Appelle Station (325)—Point of departure from the railway for Touch wood Hills and Prince Albert districts. Good work done and congregation growing. Field opening up to the west, north-west and south-west, and three new stations organized. Congregation promises soon to become self-sustaining.

Moose Jaw (400)—Faithful service rendered, but town declining and congregation suffering. People sympathetic and spirited, but not able to do what they wish. Mr. S. J. Taylor universally liked.

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Medicine Hat (660)—At crossing of the South Saskatchewan. Church built and people contributed liberally for its erection. Record of last year in every way gratifying.

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Calgary (840)—At foot of Rocky mountains. Distributing point for the settlements to the north on the Red Deer and Saskatchewan Rivers, and for Fort McLeod district to the south. Town growing and congregation steadily advancing. Congregation ready to call.

#### FIFLDS NORTH OF THE C. P. MAIN LINE.

Neepawa—On the M. & N. W. R. R. about 65 miles N. W. of Portage la Prairie. The town is an important business centre, in the middle of a pure wheat growing country. Good progress made. Congregation ready to call. Church being built at Glendale station. Neepawa preparing to build manse this season.

Auburn—Lies south of Neepawa, and is fast becoming a good strong congregation. Mr. T. Collins Court is rendering faithful service.

Cadurcis and Clanwilliam—Worked together. District suffered much through settlers leaving to take up second homesteads, and through early frosts. Clanwilliam built comfortable church and with aid from the C. and M. B. Fund, it is clear of debt.

Rapid City—20 miles north of Brandon. Town going back and congregation suffering in consequence. Mr. A. McPherson doing good work.

Newdale—20 miles north of Rapid City Cause prospered under Mr. McAl lister. River View station re-opened. The construction of the M. and N. W. R. R. will greatly help our work.

Strathclair = 30 miles N. W. of Minnedosa. Field wide and settlers suffering by reason of distance from market. The building of the railway, it is hoped, will help congregation and minister.


Birtle—35 miles north of Moosomin. Far removed from railway, and congregation has not grown. Difficulties of settlers aggravated by sale of large blocks of land to speculators. Settlement thin and churches and schools difficult to maintain. Settlers beginning to occupy land to east and south east. Beulah and Arron River settlements are attached to Birtle.


Rossburn—25 miles north of Birtle. Erected into a separate field and two new stations opened up in connection with it. Mr. James Patterson, Catechist, is in charge.

Binscarth—Efficiently supplied by Mr. J. Hogg. Material growth prevented by distance from market and consequent low price of grain. When Miniska station found itself unable to implement its engagement to the minister, a deputation waited on him, and sorrowfully informed him that they wished him to cease his ministrations until they could pay him. Of course he continued his services.


Oak River—20 miles west of Rapid City. Almost at a stand still. Settlement not prosperous last season.

Fort Qu'Appelle—20 miles north of Qu'Appelle station. Considerable progress. Congregation ready to call. Manse being built. Mr. A. Matheson rendered good service last winter.






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Carrot River—Has declined. Failure of crops, distance from market, and half-breed uprising has proved disastrous. Mr. Sinclair to be removed to a more encouraging field.

FIELDS SOUTH OF THE C. P. R. MAIN LINE.

Cypress River.—Retarded in growth by distance from market. Field should be divided, but financial considerations forbid. Missionary hard working, but field discouraging.

Millford - Steadily growing. Financial record not startling Room for improvement. Mr. Mowat a conscientious, laborious missionary.

Rosiland—Advanced considerably. Brandon Hills station building a church. Congregation ready to call. Mr. Geo. A. Laird proved himself a good missionary.

Souris—Built a comfortable church, and subscriptions when paid, will wipe out debt. Town congregation spirited and liberal, but country stations cannot be so commended. Some spiritual good done.

Carlyle—Under Queens College Missionary Society. Good work done. Church to be built this summer. District requires permanent missionary.

Alameda—Supplied by Queens College Society. Sent no missionary during winter. Missionary sent in this year.

Dumfries-Was neglected last summer. Missionary appointed this season.

South-west Moose Mountain Country—Left without supply last year, but work resumed this summer.

# SUPPLEMENTED MISSION FIELDS (NEW.)

Battleford - 600 miles west of Winnipeg on the North Saskatchewan. Mr. J. H. Cameron went there in the beginning of summer, and did a good work in the interests of temperance and religion. Church built and paid for. 8 families and 14 young men contributed \$500 for the support of ordinances.

Touchwood Hills.—55 miles north of Fort Qu'Appelle. About 90 families, half of whom are Presbyterians. Knox College Missionary Society, supplied field last summer. No supply in winter.

Fort McLeod—Occupied by Mr. W. P. Mackenzie, Knox College. Three points, Fort McLeod, Pincher Creek and Lethbridge supplied. District a ranching country. Missionary popular, and sends interesting incidents of spiritual good done among men who were apt to forget early training. Church being built and nearly completed. But few families — Many young men.

Catheart—South-west of Moosomin. Crofter colony. People yet unable to do anything to support ordinances, but thankful for missionary sent. and attend on the means of grace. Church to be built this season. Church and Manse Board have it on hand—About 50 families.

Elkhorn—Supplied by Queen's College Missionary Society last summer, and by Mr. A. Smith during winter. Much was done to gather the people together. Four stations, and between 45 and 50 families. Not occupied by others.

Shell River—North of Binscarth. Five stations received some supply last summer. Vacant during winter. Over 40 families. Promises \$300 to support ordinances. Missionary sent this year.

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To m are added. 4,457, ave 4,633.

Yorkton—Under care of Knox Collego Missionary Society last summer. Mr. W. S. Moore supplied during the winter. A good congregation organized, but settlement quite new.

Tarbolton, north of Griswold-45 families.

Pipestone, south-west of Oak Lake-40 families.

Cut Arm Creek, north-west of Fort Qu'Appelle -60 families.

Green Valley, south-west of Moosomin-50 families.

Longlakton, north of Regina-50 60 families.

Tiger Hills, south of Milford-35 families.

Pine Creek, south of Calgary-50 families.

Jumping Creek, north-east of Fort Qu'Apelle-55 families.

All are new fields, to be occupied for the first time this year.

Leaving out the returns from fields supplied this spring for the first time, the following summary of the work may be given. There were sixty mission fields occupied, having 262 mission stations, an average Sabbath attendance of 10,690° (It would seem as if the average attendance at each station was given in some cases, although service was not weekly but fortnightly). Connected with these stations are 2,905 families and 2,223 communicants. The Sabbath Schools reported 72, with an average attendance of 1,856. The returns in many cases do not show how much was paid on stipend occount. The sum of \$15,263 was contributed for church and manse erection, and \$687 for the schemes of the church. The contributions for all purposes amounted to \$34,816. The contributions for salary promised for the current year amounts to \$-5,187, and the number of stations to be supplied are 298.

There are 15 augmented congregations connected with the Synod, four of which belong to the Presbytery of Winnipeg, four to the Rock Lake Presbytery, and seven to the Brandon Presbytery. These augmented congregations have 46 stations, 683 families, 809 communicants, and an average Sabbath attendance of 1126. Contributions for church erection amounted to \$2,780, for schemes \$665, all purposes \$13,861. In these stations are 19 churches and 9 manses.

Combining these, as both constitute the Home Mission operations of the Church, the reports show that there are 59 churches and 14 manses, and that services were held at 308 points during the year. Connected with these stations are 3,488 families and 3,132 communicants. The average Sal bath attendance is estimated at 13,885. There are 96 Sabbath Schools with an average attendance of 2,982. For church and manse building \$17,993 were contributed, for schemes \$1,352 and for all purposes \$48,677. The stations to be occupied this year number 354, and the salary promised for the current year by the people alone, amounts to \$34,781.

To make the statement complete, the figures of self sustaining congregations are added. Churches 63, manses 18, stations 318, families 4,350, communicants 4,457, average attendance 20,335, Sabbath Schools 105, average S. S. attendance 4,633.

The reports show that a large per centage of the additions to the communion rolls were on profession of faith. At some points there has been a spiritual awakening, and a number of the young people became savingly changed.

Prayer meetings are being more generally held, but the attendance in country districts is small. Pastoral visitation is systematically and extensively carried on, and in districts visited during the day, prayer meetings are held in the evening. It is feared that family worship is not general.

Arrangements were made last autumn for dispensing the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in all stations, and with the happiest results. The sacrament of baptism is dispensed at intervals in fields occupied by catechists or students, by ordained ministers in neighboring fields.

Considerable attention was paid last year to the organization of Sabbath Schools. The want of accommodation, scarcity of teachers, and in some cases inability to secure the necessary appliances, prevented schools from being started. Union schools are organized at points where the number of children belonging to any one denomination would preclude the organization of a denominational school. The number of schools reported last year was 47, with an attendance of 1648; the number this year is 96, with an average attendance of 2,982. Including those belonging to self-sustaining congregations the number would be 105, with an average attendance of 4,633. Much assistance has been given in Sunday School work by donations of books and papers from schools in Ontario. It is hoped this aid will increase.

A Sunday school was organized at one point. There was no communicant connected with the station. Two young men were induced to act as teachers, although they were not Christians. They faithfully studied the lessons, and soon came to the conclusion that they were unsaved. They were gradually led to repentance and the exercise of faith in Christ Jesus, and are now active Christian workers.

The church at large can scarcely realize the good work her missionaries in the North-west are doing. The fields are wide, the settlers scattered, and the labor arduous. The check received by the reverses of the last two years has rendered

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their position all the more trying. The Committee would bear testimony to the faithfulness and efficiency of the missionaries as a class, and to the valuable service rendered by them to the cause of religion and morals by their zeal and self-denial.

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The service rendered by the Missionary Societies of Knox, Queen's, Montreal and Manitoba Colleges deserves more than mere mention. But for the missionaries sent by these Societies many of the fields occupied last summer would have been vacant. Eleven missionaries have been sent by these Societies into the field this summer, two of whom are from Manitoba College.

A few observations must close the report. The country is of vast extent and possesses great and varied resourses. The climate is in winter, somewhat severe, but it is salubrious. Compared with Scandinavia and other countries of Northern Europe, the advantages are decidedly in favor of the North-west. Such a country may receive checks, still it must grow.

At present the population is rapidly increasing. A large number of young men are immigrating here to engage in agricultural pursuits. They have little capital, except their brains and muscles, their enterprise and energy. They are generally speaking moral and law-abiding. A large percentage of them are Presbyterians. The importance of christian work among them now, can scarcely be ever estimated. Give the people the gospel now and in widening circles its influence will be felt. Let them settle down in indifference, and if there is any truth in the law of heredity, we shall have at no distant date, to re-claim an irreligious, if not an infidel population, and the most incorrigible heathen are those in white faces—those who have lapsed from christianity to godlessness.

Few realize how rapidly men lapse, and how low they sink, if left to themselves. The Church began christian work last season in a settlement that had been neglected. The people were English speaking, a considerable portion being of Scotch or Scotch-Irish parentage or extraction. Not one per cent of a population of 400 ever professed faith in Christ, and six per cent could not be induced to attend church. A missionary in another field writes that the people are kind and liberal, but that only four in a settlement of considerable size, know anything of experimental religion, and that he could not get anybody to stand by him in his attempts to put down open and glaring sins. Drunkeness and licentiousness are destroying the people, and yet the population have become so accustomed to vice, that their degradation fails to shock them. These people fell because the Church failed to follow them. The power of the gospel is as strikingly seen in the way men sink without it, as in the way they are upheld and raised by its influence. Prompt action now will save unavailing regrets in the future.

Of the young men coming to us from the older provinces, not 15 per cent. are communicants. Many of the non-communicants are not far from the kingdom of God. Let them be left uncared for, and instead of coming nearer and becoming subjects of the Kingdom, they will in many cases stray off forever.

The large numbers of letters received, the deputations that come to meetings of Presbyteries, and wait on the Superintendent of Missions, and the welcome accorded to missionaries and deputations in visiting fields, testify to the desire for Gospel ordinances.

And according to their ability, and in many cases beyond their ability, the people are ready to contribute to support their missionaries and to erect places of worship. Per communicant and per family, the Synod of Manitoba and the Northwest Territories led the Church last year in liberality. Considerations of this kind press the claims of this work powerfully. If neglected, no other church can take it up. It is a work for the present and future—a work for the church and country—a work to save men and extend the kingdom of Christ.

To earry on this work, more missionaries are urgently needed. There room is and scope here for men of piety and push—men loving Christ and their fellow men. Summer supply will not answer. Continuous occupation of fields is necessary to any true progress. The young men graduating from our colleges are prevented from volunteering for this work from misapprehension and groundless fears. There is work here, but there is also a reward. Roman Catholic priests and nuns are not deterred by the severity of an Arctic winter or the filth of a Mackenzie River wigwam, and why should it be difficult for Canadian and European settlers, in a country with a climate only a little colder than that of Ontario, to gain the ear of Presbyterian missionaries to help their truly Macedonian cry.

It is to be hoped that the church will bestir herself to provide shelter for her missionaries and their families. There are 85 augmented congregations and mission fields and 14 manses. It is almost impossible in some fields to get a habitable house. Congregations cannot build, but will assist according to their ability. Why should a missionary in China, or India, be provided with a house, and a missionary in Manitoba be left to the tender mercies of 40 ° below zero? The Church and Manse Building Board are doing great service, but the funds at their disposal do not warrant them in attempting what is required Pastors in comfortable charges could greatly aid their brethren engaged in the work of Church extension. The Church and Manse Building Board are erecting a large number of manses this season. Never before were material and labor so low. An average of \$500 or \$600 loan, will enable a congregation to build a manse. Could not a score or two of congregations undertake each to raise the needed sum? Let pastors lead, and the congregations will follow. The hearty thanks of the Synod are tendered to the men and women who cheerfully and generously helped in the past. We are only on the threshold of the work however. Let others help now. The erection of churches is helping our cause materially. Congregations provided with churches, increase in numbers and financial ability. Soon after churches were built, Brandon, Carbury, Rat Portage, Port Arthur, and other congregations became self-sustaining. The contributions of Edmonton went up from \$300 to \$700; Virden from \$300 to \$650; Calgarry from \$520 to \$826 &c., Church building pays even financially.

The missionary operations of the Church will be little interfered with by these insurrectionary disturbances. Not one of the Indian tribes among which we labor has taken any part in this movement. They are all loyal. Except at two or three points, the Home Mission work will not be affected at all. The financial effect cannot now be forecast. With gratitude to God for his favor in the past, let us turn our eyes in faith to the future, and in Divine strength go forward.

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for the for the donnel eign m In order to bring the Presbyteries in Manitoba and the North west Provinces more fully into accord with the rules applying to Presbyteries in Ontario and Quebec, the following recommendations have been adopted:

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- 1. That the Synod of Manitoba, through its Home Mission Committee, be requested to submit to this Committee at its semi-annual meetings in March and October, a financial statement for the six months then ending; and accompanying this a report, on the schedules prepared by this Committee, of the work done during the half year in the respective mission fields, with the names of the missionaries, the amounts contributed by the people, and the appropriations made by the Synod's committee to the several fields.
- 2 That the Synod, through its Home Mission Committee, be instructed to submit to this committee, on or before the 25th of April annually, an audited financial statement of the receipts and expenditure for the year ending 31st march, together with an annual report of the several fields, on the schedules furnished by this committee.
- 3. That the receipts and expenditures in connection with the congregations on the augmentation list be kept distinct from those of mission fields.
- 4. That after the close of the current ecclesiastical year the grants to congregations on the augmentation list in the Synod of Manitoba and the North-west be paid by this Committee semi-annually, as is done in the Presbyteries of Ontario and Quebec.

Manitoba Synod—It was agreed, on account of unexpected expenditure consequent on the formation of the Synod, to grant an additional sum of \$500 to the Synod for the year ending March 31st, 1885.

Grant for next year—It was agreed to grant the Synod of Manitoba the sum of \$18,500, for the year beginning the 1st of April, 1885—this sum to cover the entire expenditure from the funds of the committee, excepting grants to supplemented congregations and the salary and travel ing expenses of the Superintendent of missions; the grant to be payable in four instalments, viz.: \$8,000 on 30th June, \$4,500 on the 30th September, \$5,000 on the 31st December, and \$3,000 on the 31st march next. It was further agreed that no money be paid to the Synod of mantoba from the Augmentation Fund for the year beginning 1st April, 1885, over and above the supplements to the congregations on the augmented list at this date, with the exception of the amount of the difference in salary between that paid to ordained missionaries and to settled pastors in those fields now on the Home mission list, but which may be transferred to the Augmentation list and have duly inducted pastors settled over them, during the ensuing year.

Prince Albert—The Presbytery of Brandon having requested that a teacher for the Prince Albert High School be appointed, whose service swould be available for the supply of the mission stations in the vicinity, Dr. Cochrane, Messrs. Macdonnell and Warden have been appointed a sub-committee to confer with the Foreign mission Committee, with a view to secure the services of a suitable person.

# REPORT OF THE CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING COMMITTEE— MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST.

Church and manse building has not been so extensively carried on during the past year as during the year 1883-84. The stringency in money matters has increased rather than diminished, and in several cases people have had to choose between having a minister and building a church. When the choice lay between bread and a plate on which to have it served, the people choose the bread.

The Board considers its functions to be to stimu'ate rather than stifle local effort. Presbyterians are the best judges as to the requirements of localities, and the Board confines itself largely to the considerations of two points, viz., whether the people are doing their part, and secondly what aid in justice to all interests should be given.

Money has been advanced to complete buildings previously erected, but which the congregations unaided could not finish, to erect churches and to erect manses. As in previous years, the aid accorded assumed the form of grant or loan, according to the character of the structure, and the circumstances of the people. Two congregations received aid to complete buildings, two to erect manses, and twelve to build churches. The manses are comfortable frame buildings, one of them being lined with brick. Of the churches, one is brick, four log, and six frame buildings. By several congregations, a beginning was made in church erection as at Shanks, Brandon Hills etc., but the work was suspended till the present season, owing to financial inability to proceed.

To enable the Church to understand the advance made in the erection of church edifices during the year, note is taken of all structures, whether these received aid from the Funder not. For convenience sake the buildings are grouped under the names of the publication of the substitution of the congregations belong.

#### 1. THE PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG.

- 1. Port Arthur—The Lake Port of the North-west. Town of at least 5,000 inhabitants, and growing rapidly. A substantial and tasteful brick church, seating capacity 350 with provision for galleries. Cost \$10,000. Debt \$1,500. No aid.
- 2. Greenridge—8 miles east of Dominion City. An important agricultural district. Frame church and sheds. Cost \$1,200. Loan \$450.
- 3. Springfie'd—7 miles east of Winnipeg. Flourishing settlement. Manse Cost \$1,200. Negotiated for loan, terms did not suit. Took umbrage and undertook payment themselves.
- 4. Headingly—15 miles west of Winnipeg. Old River settlement. Church renovated and reseated. Cost \$200. No aid.
- 5. Winnipeg, Knox Church—Church, brick, seating capacity 1,100. Cost \$50,000. No advance asked.
- 6. Winnipeg, St. Andrews Church—manse enlarged. Cost \$1,300. No advance asked.

#### THE PRESBYTERY OF ROCK LAKE.

7. Manitou—Terminus of the C. P. R. South Western. Growing town, surrounded by a good country. Frame church built. Cost \$2,000. Loan \$800.

8. Carman—A promising village, in the midst of a fertile district on the Boyne, 6 miles beyond the present terminus of the Manitoba S. W. Ry. Church. frame, seating capacity 250. Cost \$1,250, loan \$500.

#### THE PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

9. Burnside—7 miles west of Portage la Prairie. Choice farming district. Frame manse built, cost \$1,150; loan \$400.

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10. Minnedosa—Present terminus of the Manitoba and N. W. Ry. A growing town. Manse frame, lined with brick. Cost \$1,800; loan \$500.

11. Souris—25 miles South west of Brandon. A spirited village in the midst of a tavored agricultural district. Church Frame. Cost \$1,200: loan \$500.

12. Clanwilliam—10 miles north of Minnedosa, a good farming district. Log church, seating capacity 130 Cost \$600: grant \$100.

18. Broadview—263 miles west of Winnipeg. End of C. P. R. Division.

Church manse tinished. Loan \$350.

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14. Grenfell—279 miles west of Winnipeg. Active village surrounded by a good country. \$100 advanced. Loan to finish church.

15 Carlyle (Western District)—South-west of Moosomin; good agricultural country. Log church, cost \$450; grant \$100. Seating capacity about 100.

16. Carlyle (Eastern District)—Log church, cost \$450; grant \$100. Seating capacity about 100.

17. Motfatville - 8 miles south of Wolseley. Good farming district. Church

frame; seats 125. Cost \$600; grant \$100.

18. Wolseley—294 miles west of Winnipeg. Trading centre of a wide area.

Enough and \$1000; grant \$150.

Frame church, cost \$1,000; grant \$150.

19. Ellesboro—8 miles north of Wolseley Log church, cost \$500; seating capacity 120. No grant asked.

20. Regina—Capital of Assiniboia. Educational, legislative and judicial

centre. Church brick, cost \$4,000; loan \$2,000.

21. Medicine Hat—Railway crossing of South Saskatchewan. Active town. Coal mines in neighborhood. Frame church, cost \$700; loan \$250.

22. Sturgeon River—15 miles north of Edmonton. Log church, cost about \$500; loan \$100. Settlement new, but very promising.

23. Welwyn-16 miles north of Moosomin. Thriving settlement. Frame church, cost \$800. No aid asked.

24. Battleford -600 miles north west of Winnipeg on the North Saskatche-

wan. Log church, seating 125, cost \$500. No aid asked.

The total cost of buildings erected in the mission field has been about \$31,250 and the aid advanced is \$6,200. The total cost of buildings erected in the Synod, amounted to over \$80,000.

As will be seen by the Treasurer's statement, several of the congregations aided in previous years have paid instalments on loans. The financial depression prevailing has prevented other congregations from implementing their engagements. Till an improvement takes place in the business outlook of the country, the Board does not deem it prudent to press payment unduly. Security is taken in every case for loans by mortgage on the property, or notes of trustees, or both.

The North-west Land Company has continued to grant suitable sites for the churches free of cost in villages, towns and cities, where they own land.

The C. P. R. Company has kindly conveyed all lumber for churches and manses to be built on their line at half the rates usually charged by them.

The delay in constructing branch lines of railway through the country has seriously interfered with the erection of church edifices. The congregations at Birtle, Pilot Mound, Swan Lake, Marney, Newdale and other points have been anxious to build, and were afraid of making a beginning till lines were located and the sites of stations determined on.

During the coming summer there promises to be considerable activity in building. At Oak Lake, Griswold. Whitewood, Fort MacLeod, Cathcart and other points preparations are in progress for erecting churches. At Calgary, Medicine Hat, Fort Qu'Appelle, Qu'Appelle, Neepawa, and other points the people are moving to erect manses for their pastors. This latter work is most urgent. If missionaries are to be encouraged in their work, they and their families must be comfortably housed. At some points it is impossible to rent a house. Missionaries cannot

built houses themselves, owing to expense, and hence they are obliged to live sometimes in hovels, where health is impaired. Cases of actual suffering have been brought before the Board by the Superintendent of Missions, and an effort is to be made this season to prosecute this work as extensively as funds will allow. In this connection, it might be mentioned that a gentleman in Clinton, Ontario, on learning of the hardships of our missionaries, on account of insufficient shelter, authorized the Board to draw on him to the amount of \$500 to build a manse. This is an example worth being followed up. The Church provides houses for her missionaries in India and China, and rightly so. Surely missionaries in the more trying climate of the North-west deserve equal consideration. Never before was material for building so cheap as this year. Lumber can be purchased at about half the price charged two years ago. Labor also can be procured at a reasonable figure. Now is the time to build.

During his visit to Ontario last winter, the Superintendent of Missions obtained subscriptions to the amount of about \$7,000. These added to the amounts previously obtained would give a total subscribed of over \$100,000. A large per centage of this amount, however, was subscribed in Winnipeg, and in consequence of the changed circumstances of many of the subscribers, it is feared much of the amount will not be collectable, while in the case of almost all North-west subsribers the Board must exercise patience.

The Board gratefully acknowledgeg the great interest taken by congregations in Ontario in the work, and the liberal aid given. A legacy of \$100 was left to the Superintendent for mission work in the North-west by Neil Currie Esq. and \$50 of the amount was given to the Board and the other \$50 applied to Home Missions. Mention should be made of the action of a friend in Newfoundland, although his name cannot be given. He sent the Board \$1,000 to begin the Fund. Receiving a letter giving an account of the work done in past years, he read it to his friends. They expressed a willingness to aid in the work, and a draft for \$1,000 was purchased and forwarded. A prominent member of the church in Toronto visited this country this spring. He has been aiding the Board from year to year. Seeing the work done through the country, he expressed himself as "more than pleased" and offered to increase his subscriptions. "When a prominent Episcopalian was speaking to me," said he "about the energy of our Church, and her success, I felt proud of being a Presbyterian." Another from the same city of churches, volunteered to be a life member of the Fund, because of what he had seen of the work.

We are yet on the threshold only. There are 46 stations in connection with the supplemented congregations and but 19 churches. There are 15 congregations and but 9 manses. In the mission field proper there are 298 mission stations and but 40 churches-there are 70 mission fields and but 5 manses. Services are frequently held in log huts where a tall man finds it difficult to stand erect. Congregations in such places form slowly. Judicious and timely aid to congregations in church erection will give visibility, promis, and permanence to the work- In the newer settlements a missionary to carry on his work, must be furnished with a manse. The manses already erected have increased the effectiveness of our missionaries. The balance at credit may seem large. It is to be borne in mind, however, that during the winter building operations are suspended, and that monies are paid in more freely. The Chairman and Secretary of the Board moreover are "at the front," and appropriations can not be made till their return from this season's work. The applications already forwarded by Presbyteries, it may be added, will well-nigh exhaust the balance. Among the settlements to be aided is the Cathcart colony. The Board is erecting a church for these settlers. They are proving themselves industrious and God-fearing people. They have this season 1,600 acres under crop, and in two or three years must acquire the means of comfort. Now they are poor and must be helped. For them aid should come from their native land.

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It was feared that the present uprising might interfere with mission operations. This was not the case. Not a church or manse was destroyed nor has work been perceptibly retarded. With thankfulness to God for what he has enabled us to do, let us in His name endeavor more adequately to overtake the claimant wants of our growing field.

### BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Since last Assembly the following appointments have been made to British Columbia: The Rev. J. S. McKay, M. A., to New Westminster, Rev. D. Fraser, M. A., to Pandora Street Church, Victoria; Rev. T. G. Thomson, to Vancouver City (Burrard In'et), and Rev. J. Chisholm, to the Nicola Varley. Messrs. McKay and Fraser entered upon their labors last summer, Mr. Thomson in April and Mr. Chisholm in May of the present year. Mr. McKay has in addition to his charge in New Westminster, preached occasionally at different points in the neighborhood, and made himself acquainted with the necessities of the district. The church under his care has during the year largely increased in membership and contributions for the maintenance of ordinances, and the schemes of the church. The financial statement for the year shows receipts amounting to \$3,200. The regular ministrations of the Sabbath, as also the prayer meeting, Sabbath school, and Bible classes are well attended. Six additional pews (32 sittings) were put into the church within the last month to meet the demand for increased accommodation.

In his last communication to the Convener, of date May IIth, he says: "It is just one year ago to-day since I was asked to take charge of St. Andrew's church, New Westminster. Arriving in August, I received a cordial welcome from the people. I entered upon my work under very favorable auspices, and found a small band of earnest workers, who have lent me every assistance and encouragement in my work. The congregation now includes seventy-two families, and over fifty single persons. The sacrament has been celebrated three times. Twentyeight new names have been added to the rol-eight on profession of faith and twenty by certificate. There is a membership of ninety-four, but as six of these are in Mr. Thomson's charge, our roll is really eighty-eight. The Bible class numbers thirty, and the attendance is very regular. The Sabbath School has nine teachers, and a hundred scholars, and a library of three hundred volumes. The teachers meet weekly for the study of the lesson. The attendance on the prayer meeting is encouraging. A young men's prayer meeting was started a few weeks ago, and promises to result in much good. The ladies Missionary Society continue their work The church is fully occupied, and we have many reasons to thank God and take courage. Under the preaching of the gospel, souls have manifested anxiety about eternal things and many opportunities have been given of speaking a word for the Master. He also adds in reference to our minister at Burrard Inlet-"Mr. and Mrs. Thomson are capturing the hearts of the people. They are all delighted with their minister."

Mr. Fraser reports that the work in Paudora Street Church, Victoria is going on steadily. The Sabbath attendance is incresing, and the prospects for a large Presbyterian addition at an early date, exceedingly encouraging. The membership is now I40. Of this number 31 have been added since Mr. Fraser's settlement. There are 184 names on the roll of the Sabbath School with an attendance of from 125 to 150.

The church in New Westminster is assisted by the Committee to the extent of \$400 per annum. Pandora Street Church was assisted during the year at the rate of \$800 (\$200 for the past eight months of Mr. Fraser's pastorate.) It is now

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self-sustaining. Mr. Thomson and Mr. Chisholm have been appointed at stipends of \$1,200 each, but of this amount the fields are expected to raise a con-

siderable portion.

Beyond fraternal intercourse and exchange of pulpits with the brethren of the Church of Scotland, nothing officially has been done during the year as regards union. That a Presbytery of our own church must, however, soon be formed, is inevitable, if our work is to be carried on efficiently.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE KNOX COLLEGE STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETY FOR 1884-'85.

This Society, which was established about forty years ago for the purpose of evangelizing the French Canadian Roman Catholics, has long since abandoned its original purpose, and now devotes itself to the two-fold object of sending the Gospel to the more recently settled parts of the country and to other places not otherwise provided for by the Church, and also of creating and fostering a missionary spirit among its members. This Society regards as members all who are pursuing their studies in Toronto with a view to entering the ministry of the Presbyterian Church.

To occomplish this two-fold object, meetings are held semi-monthly. One meeting each month is devoted to the hearing of the reports of mission-aries and deliberating on the best means of carrying on the work of the Society; while at the alternate meeting papers are read and addresses are

delivered on missionary work throughout the world.

The third annual public meeting of the Society was held on January 30th ot this year. The object of having public meetings is that those who attend them may receive some insight into the practical workings of the Society. At the last meeting two missionary reports were read; a paper on a missionary topic was also read and addresses were delivered by Rev. H. M. Parsons and Rev. Chas. Tanner. During the summer months student missionaries are sent out to the various fields, where they preach the Gospel and establish stations in the most promising situations; when these fields become strong enough to take their places among the regular mission stations of the Church they pass from under the care of the Society, which then turns its attention to new fields.

The expenses of the Society are met largely by contributions from the various fields; but, as this work is chiefly of the pioneer kind, the Society has to depend for aid upon contributions of friends outside the fields. In the past the expenditure has been kept within the income, and the Society trusts that, through the hearty co-oporation of its members and the liberality of its

friends, this state of affairs shall continue in the future.

The following particulars regarding the work done during the year which has just closed are worthy of notice:

### MANITOBA AND N. W. TERRITORIES.

Mountain City—W. Farquharson, B. A.—This field is situated about eighty-five miles south-west of Winnipeg on the C. P. R., S. W. At first the group consisted of Mountain City, Morden, Glen Cross and Lorne. At Mountain City there is a Presbyterian church in which service was held weekly. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed on the 10th of August, when nineteen partook of the ordinance, six of whom united by certificate and one by profession of faith.

Morden is situated on the railway and has prospects of becoming a station of some importance. There being no church, service was held in a

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tant the Services encoura workshop, at first three times a month, and latterly, every Sabbath. Services were held fortnightly at Glen Cr. amonthly at Lorne.

As the whole field was too weak to support a missionary, it was joined to

the congregation of Nelson.

As Glen Cross is only four miles from Mountain City, and has but one Presbyterian family, it was dropped.

Lorne was joined to the Darlingford group.

The new field consisted of Nelson, Clegg, Mountain City and Morden. For the remainder of the time service was held weekly at Nelson and Morden, and fortnightly at Clegg and Mountain City This field now passes into

the hands of the Rock Lake Fresbytery.

Oak Lake—A. McD. Haig. B. A.—Oak Lake is situated forty miles west of Brandon on the C. P. R. This field extends nearly forty miles in length and varies in width from six to sixteen miles. Seven stations were taken up. At Oak Lake, Griswold, Sutherland's, Pipestone, Lang's and Maicolm's, services were held fortnightly, at Maskawata, occasionally. Pipestone, the largest station in the group, has the strongest Presbyterian element. This year it is to be separated from Oak Lake and with stations to the west, formed into a new field.

Although settled but three years, Oak Lake has now become of such importance that an ordained missionary is soon to be appointed to take it in

charge. Work at nearly all the stations was encouraging.

Arrangements are being made for the erection of churches at Oak Lake

and Griswold.

Rev. Mr Sutherland, of Virden, visited the field in September and dispensed the sacraments at Oak Lake and Pipestone. Notwithstanding the depression which exists in the North-west this field during the past year was self-sustaining.

York Colony—A. Patterson.—York Colony consisting of eight townships is situated about three hundred miles west of Winnipeg and eighty miles north of the main line of the C. P. R. It lies in the midst of a very fertile section of the country. The majority of the settlers are from York County

Ont., hence the name—York Colony.

Fortnightly services were held at four stations. York City, which is the capital of the colony, was the chief mission station. The services here were conducted in the Land Office.

Wallace Town, fifteen miles north of York City, was a very encouraging station.

Armstrong Lake, ten miles south of York City, is the headquarters of Mr. Armstrong, the manager of the York Farmers' Colonization Company.

The Last station is Boakeview, fifteen miles south of Armstrong Lake.

The services at all the stations were well attended; many of the people driving from four to eight miles with waggons and oxen.

Less than three years ago there was not a house in the colony. Now it boasts three hundred settlers, with stores and a post-office at each of the above stations.

Although in straightened circumstances, the settlers contributed liberally to the support of a missionary.

Deloraine—A. McNab.—Before passing ir to the hands of the Society this field had tor a year and a half been under the care of an ordained missionary.

The soil is good, but as the nearest railway station is seventy miles distant the people are not making much headway at Deloraine, the chief station. Services were held in the station-house, and were well attended. Here a very encouraging Bible class was conducted.

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ing a l in a Dougall's was an interesting station six miles east of Deloraine. The people here, as indeed at all the stations but one, were very regular in attendance. and entered heartily into the services.

St. Panl's, twelve miles west of Deloraine, has a neat church, built by the aid of the "Church and Manse Building Fund." Here the attendance

was somewhat fitful.

McKay's, six miles north of the last named, was perhaps the most encouraging of all the stations. The missionary was always warmly welcomed, and a greater interest in the services manifested here than elsewhere.

At Waskada and Findley's, services were held during the week. Considing this fact the attendance was good. At Mr. Robson's an interesting Bible class was held. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed by Rev. Jas. Farquharson. The sacrament of Baptism was administered by Rev's. Messrs. Farquharson and Cameron.

There are seventy-five members on the field. Although the people gave liberally, yet the field is not quite self-sustaining.

Services were also held by the Methodist Church and Church of Eng-

land.

Round Plain—W. M. Kay.—This field lies about eighty miles north of Qu'Appelle on the C. P. R., in the vicinity of the Touchwood Hills. The plain has an area of about one hundred and fitty square miles, and contains seventeen families and thirty-five young men with claims. Two stations were worked by the missionary, at each of which weekly services were held, with an average attendance of twenty-four at the eastern station and twelve at the west.

During September, Rev. A McTavish, of Indian Head, visited the field and dispensed the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

The soil is rich, and there is a good supply of wood and water. During the last two seasons the settlement suffered much from summer frosts, so that the financial condition of the field is not favorable.

### PARRY SOUND AND MUSKOKA.

These large districts, lying east of Georgian Bay, were taken up by the Society fourteen years ago, when a missionary was sent to Parry Sound. Since that time the work has progressed until nearly the whole of that part with the country has been visited by the missionaries. Last summer four fields were occupied.

Strong—D. Perrie.—During the past summer this field made rapid protestal to comprises six stations, viz., Eagle Lake, Strong, Sundridge, Harted, Ely, and Stirling Falls. The last two were taken up last season for the first time—At Eagle Lake, Strong, Stirling Falls, and Sundridge neat and comfortable churches were erected last summer. Fortnightly services were held at all the stations. During a part of the summer a Bible-class and prayer-meeting were conducted at Strong, which were well attended, and great interest in these services was manifested by all. At each of the places, except Ely, a union Sabbath school was conducted. Throughout the entire field the work prospered, the people assisting the missionary, and contributing liberally not only to their own building funds, and to those of our Society but also to the other schemes of the Church. The ordinances of Baptism and the Lord's Supper were dispensed by Rev. Mr. Leishman of Angus.

In the field there are about one hundred and sixty families. Amongst these there are fitty-four communicants. The Home Mission now takes this field under its charge.

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Litt a very p be comp Commanda—J. J. Eliott.—The Society continued its work in this field last summer. Services were held weekly at Commanda and fortnightly at Commanda Lake and Rye. Three visits were paid to McConkey, an excellent settlement but situated at a distance of thirty miles from the other stations.

The work on the whole was encouraging. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed at Rye and Commanda by Rev. D. Duff. The field now passes from the care of the Society to that of the Home Mission.

Nipissing - C. A. Webster.—The Society resumed its work in this portion of its territory during the past summer. The Nipissing field as now constituted comprises three regular preaching stations, viz, Callander. Nipissing and Powassan. All these stations have now become important.

Callendar situated on Sonth East Bay, is yet but a small village, but is

expected to be a place of prominence before many years.

The other two places are centres of farming districts. Services were held at each of these places fortnightly, the attendance being very good.

Marked progress is being made in the mission cause in all three stations. Rev. D. Duff, of Bruce Presbytery, visited the field in August and dis-

pensed the sacraments at Powassan and Nipissing.

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Baysville—W. N. McFarlane.—In this field four stations were occupied by the Society, viz., Baysville, Hamilton, Menomonee and Ridout. Ridout, which has formerly been worked in connection with this field, was again taken up. Much interest was manifested in the work at all the stations. Services were held weekly at Baysville, while the other stations received fortinghtly supply. As the meeting-place at Hamilton became too small for the accommodation of all who assembled, arrangements were made for the erection of a church. This, it is expected, will be completed this summer and will bear the name of "Knox Church."

At all the stations, Union Sabbath schools were carried on with varying success, many interesting features being met with in the Menomonee school. During the summer Rev. A. Findlay visited the field and dispensed the sacraments at Baysville and Hamilton.

### ALGOMA DISTRICT.

Providence Bay (Manitoulin)—D. McKenzie.—This field is situated on the south side of the Island, at a distance of some thirty two railes from Manitowaning. Its history is well known to the Missionary Society as it has had missionaries there from its earliest settlement; and there is reason for gratitude to God for the manifestations which exist, that their labour has not been in vain.

The field contains six stations, viz., Providence Bay, Campbell, McColeman's, Kinarven, Mindemoya and Big Lake. During the past summer Sabbath services were held fortuightly at each of these stations with the exception of Providence Bay where a fortnightly prayer-meeting was held.

A pleasing feature of Christian work throughout the field is the energy that characterizes Sabbath school work. Though deprived of the spur which members gives—for in some cases the numbers are small—yet willing workers are found to continue the work from year to year. In some instances teachers who began to teach their classes the alphabet, have now the pleasure of seeing these same pupils in possession of a moderate amount of intellectual and spiritual knowledge chiefly through their labours.

Little Current (Manitoulin)—A. J McLeod —The Little Current field is a very promising one. The Presbyterian church in this village will probably be completed and paid for during the coming summer.

One of the most pleasing features of the work is the weekly Sabbath school which continues both summer and winter.

During the summer months a small Wednesday evening prayer-meeting

proved very profitable and enjoyable.

Interesting services were held at Green Bush and Sheguiandiah, but the number of Presbyterian families at these stations is comparatively small. Work at Rockvale and Bidwell was not undertaken till halt the summer had passed away; nevertheless the attendance and interest were very encouraging. Towards the close of the summer Rev. Mr. Rodgers, of Manitowaning, visited Little Current and dispensed the sacrament of the Lord's supper to thirty-five communicants.

Bruce Mines-Albert E. Doherty.—This field, lying on the north shore of Lake Huron, comprises a stretch of territory which may be roughly described as an equilateral triangle, one side of which is twenty miles long. In this area are seven

stations.

The village of Bruce Mines contains about four hundred inhabitants. The Presbyterian element here is small, only nine families belonging to our Church. The fortnightly service was well attended, however, and considerable interest was shown in the Wednesday evening Bible-class.

Ottertail is the centre of another settlement. Work increased in interest every week here. In the past summer this place was sadly neglected in the mat-

ter of house-to-house visitations.

Rock Lake, four miles farther north, has a congregation of about sixty. The

people are nearly all Highland Scotch.

Murray's Corners, reached by crossing Rock Lake, contains about forty families. Great interest was taken in the work at this point. A Sabbath school is held weekly by two elders.

Dunn's Valley, containing about seventy-five souls, was visited twice. No service had been held there for two years. The people are very anxious for service.

Mount Pleasant was also visited twice, when about seventy-five assembled and

listened gladly to the word.

Still another settlement was found having twenty families, all but two of which are Presbyterians. No minister of our Church has ever been among them.

The field is to be divided this season and two missionaries sent.

Cockburn Island—John Robertson.—This island, although somewhat small in area, forms not an unimportant part of that group which is sometimes spoken of by the name of Manitoulin. It lies directly west of Manitoulin proper, from which it is separated by a channel about four miles wide, through which almost all the Lake Huron and Georgian Bay boats pass on their way to Lake Superior. The island, lying thus directly in the course of such a large number of vessels, is naturally well situated for the best water communication. At present the want of a convenient dock prevents many of the vessels from calling; but this want will soon be supplied as the Government is making arrangements to provide a landing place for such vessels as require to call.

The inhabitants, who are about three hundred in number, are chiefly engaged in lumbering during the winter months and in agriculture in the summer.

During the summer months it is also the centre of a large fishing trade.

With respect to mission work the island is divided into two parts, Talsmieville and Scotch Block, which are about four miles apart. At the former there is a Union Sabbath school which is carried on throughout the whole year.

Almost every denomination finds at least nominal adherents in the field, but wisely forgetting the slighter differences in creed all welcome the missionary who is ready to preach the Gospel of Christ.

Services were held weekly at each station with a good attendance.

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Blind River and Mississagua Valley—J. Gilchrist:—Fortnightly services were held at four stations in this field with encouraging attendance.

Blind River is a lumbering depot situated on the north shore of Georgian Bay eight miles from Algoma Mills. Thirteen families compose the population, of which but a small number are Presbyterians. However, all denominations overlooked minor differences and joined heartily in the work. Both Sabbath service and prayer meeting were well attended. A Sabbath school is carried on through the whole year.

Gladstone and Avonmore are stations situated on the Mississagua River. They have but five Presbyterian families. At Gladstone a Sabbath school is maintained all the year.

At Serpent River, a lumbering depot owned by Cook Brothers, service was held in connection with Blind River.

Victoria Township was visited by the missionary once a month. At Spanish River, a lumber depot, services were held twice during the summer.

Woodford and Caven—M. N. Bethune,—Woodford is a small village one hundred and twenty miles north-west of Toronto, in the County of Grey, equi-distant from Meaford and Owen Sound.

During the past year mission work was carried on here for the first time by our Church. From the first the attendance was good, both at Sabbath service and at the weekly prayer-meeting. A most successful Sabbath school was also conducted, in which the missionary received hearty support.

There are sixteen families here connected with our Church. The sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper were dispensed by Rev. J. B. Fraser, of Leith, when seventeen united with the Church by profession of faith. At Caven there are but five Presbyterian families. Accordingly, the missionary held service there only once a fortnight, and on the alternate Sabbath twice at Woodford.

At Caven, also, the work was encouraging, and, though few in numbers, the people subscribed liberally to the funds of the Society.

• Waubaushene—A. H. Drumm.—This field formerly included Sturgeon Bay, Waubaushene, and Port Severn. Previous to 1883 it was under the charge of the Society. In the spring of 1883, the Presbytery of Barrie had charge of it, but after working it for two summers, handed it back to the Society. Last summer Port Severn was dropped and Fesserton taken up instead. Services were held weekly at Sturgeon Bay and Fesserton, and fortnightly at Waubaushene. At all stations the attendance was encouraging. Sabbath school work was carried on at each station, and a Bible class at Waubaushene on a week evening.

During the winter the field was supplied fortnightly by students sent by the Student's Missionary Society.

Tobermory—Jos Elliott—There are five stations in this field, viz.: Tobermory Harbour, Tobermory Sett'ement, McVicar's Mill, Dyer's Bay (North), and Dyer's Bay (South.)

The Presbyterian element on the field is very small. Fortnightly services were held at each station for the first part of the season, but, as the distance was so great between the mair divisions of the field, during the latter part of the summer, service was held for two successive Sabbaths at each group.

'This year the field is to be re-adjusted, when Dyer's Bay will be dropped. The working of the fields will thus be greatly facilitated.

During the Christmas vacation missionaries were sent to Waubaushene and Coboconk. Fortnightly service has also been supplied by the Society to these fields throughout the session.

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As in former years assistance has been given during the session to the mission work carried on in the Toronto Gaol and Central Prison. In addition, the Society this year gave assistance to the Italian Misson and to the work in the Hospital for Sick Children.

The reports of the various Superintendents are given :-

Work in Central Prison-J. McP. Scott.—As in former years assistance has been rendered by the students in the Sabbath school work carried on at the Central Prison, Toronto. During the Michaelmas term there was an average supply of eighe teachers from the College, and during the Easter Term there has been an averagt supply of eleven.

In addition to the Sabbath school in the mornings, some of our number visit the prisoners in their cells on Sabbath afternoons and distribute religious tracts. This year there have been distributed by our teachers, to the members of their own classes, and in the afternoon visits to the cells, upwards of twelve hundred tracts.

Our complement of teachers, together with those who teach in the gaol, meet every Saturday evening for the study of the lesson, and prayer for a blessing and direction in our work of the following day. On the whole, we are happy to testify to our pleasure in the work, and to the encouragement we get in dealing with this class of men.

Work in Toronto Gaol-J. Goforth-Each Sabbath morning during the session, students have gone to teach and speak to the prisoners in the gaol. Here we found on an average about one hundred and eighty-five males and forty females, ranging in age from twelve to seventy years. The work has been encouraging. The Master has been with us. We trust that our labour has been blessed.

Italian Mission—G. Needham.—This mission was brought before the notice of the Society at its first meeting this session, and since then an average of six of its members have assisted the friends of this mission. The class meets every Sabbath afternoon in Shaftesbury Hall. The Italians are furnished with the New Testament in Italian, and the Gospel of St. Matthew in Italian and English. This is the principal text-book, so that in addition to learning to read in our language, they are also learning the truths of the Gospel, and it is hoped that the seed sown in this way will be owned and blessed by the Master, and in due time an abundant harvest may be the result,

Report of work at Hospital for Sick Children (corner College and Elizabeth Streets.)—J. McGillivray, B. A.—Every third Sabbath this place came under the care of the Society. A short service was held, when some twenty of the little inmates listened to simple Bible truths, while the others who were unable to leave their rooms' heard the singing and the words spoken. After the service a few minutes were spent in visiting the wards. Every student who assisted in this The matron and work expressed himself as delighted with and profited by it. nurses seem heart and soul in their work of love.

Summary—Fields, 17; missionaries, 17; stations, 80; revenue from the Society's fields, \$1,969 74; revenue from other sources, \$578.16; amount received last spring too late for the report of 1883-4, \$199.13; total revenue, \$2,747.03.

The number of missionaries for 1885 is twenty.

In concluding this report, we would desire to express our gratitude to God for His goodness to our missionaries and to the Society at large, and our prayer is that He will more abundantly bless our efforts in the future than in the past, in winning souls to Christ, and in the upholding of His kingdom.

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# ANNUAL REPORT OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION FOR 1884-'85,

Perhaps in no past session did so many places need and receive supply, as during the term now closed. There were on the average seven appointments filled every Sabbath. These appointments extended as far east as West Winchester in Brockville Presbytery, and as far north as Poland on the K. & P. R. R. Of these some were only occasional supplies and other were regular. The remuneration for these services, except that given to four fields, was met by the congregations themselves. These four fields were Morton, in Brockville Presbytery, for which two dollars were received from the Home Mission Committee, and Sharbott Lake, Mississippi and Poland, for each of which three dollars were given for every Sabbath service.

At the regular meetings of the Association, besides the routine business, were discussed questions relating to students work in the mission field.

With respect to the work of the present summer, the Association has taken up five fields in Ontario, and three in the North-west. The fields in Ontario are Demorsetville, Sharbot Lake and Hichinbrook, Mississippi, Poland and Matawatchan. For these the Association is alone responsible. The fields in the North-west are Dumfries, Tarbolton and Elkhorn. To defray in part the expenses connected with the supply of the fields, these Association has received a grant of £50 from the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland.

# PRESBYTERÏAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL, STUDENTS' MISSIONARY SOCIETY, ANNUAL REPORT 1884-'85.

The following are the Missionaries appointed by the Society, and their respective fields of labor for the coming summer:—

This Society has now been in operation for fifteen years. During that time in seeking to attain its two fold object of fostering a missionary spirit among the students, and of accomplishing work which Presbyteries found it impossible to undertake, it has furnished supplies of the means of grace to more than forty distinct fields. It has already handed over several flourishing fields to the Presbyteries within whose bounds they lay, and hopes soon to do the same with other fields now under its charge.

Besides endeavoring to undertake mission work in and around the city, and to use the funds subscribed by friends in carrying of the gospel to destitute fields, the students as a body have during the past session undertaken the support of two native helpers in the New Hebrides Islands.

During the snumer of 1884, six fields were supplied by the Society.

MISSIONARY WORK-SUMMER, 1884.

Eardley Mission Field was supplied by Mr. J. A. McFarlane.

In this field, which lies within the bounds of the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew, services were conducted three times each Sabbath at Centre Eardley, Upper Eardley, and at Steele's Settlemet. The attendance at the first station averaged about sixty five, at the other two about thirty-five. Services were also conducted at times at Quyon.

Our missionary in this field had the hearty support of the people in all his work.

It is hoped that the stations will very soon feel able to support a regular minister, and that thus the Society may see the fruits of its labors.

The Mission Field of East Templeton was supplied during the Summer by Mr.

D. L. Dewar.

Services were conducted every Sobbath at East Templeton, and during the week prayer meetings were held in three different parts of the field. In these meetings several of the people took an active part.

Our missionary, besides attending to the public part of his work, spent much

time in visiting the different families.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed by the Rev. Mr. Clark, of New Edinburgh, eighteen persons sitting down at the table.

Lake Megantic, Agnes—In this field Mr M. McKenzie labored under the Society during the summer.

The population of the field is not large, and is very mixed. Services were conducted in the morning every Lord's Day in the Gaelic and English languages alternately, and every Sabbath evening in the English language. A large Sabbath school also met every Sabbath morning, and a Gaelic service was held on Thursday afternoon of each week. The attendance at Sabbath services averaged about thirty-eight, at the Thursday meeting about thirteen. The work among the young in the Sabbath School was especially encouraging. Temperance meetings were frequently held during the season, and an agitation in favor of the adoption of the Scott Act was vigorously carried on.

At Dunmore, four miles distant from Agnes, services were conducted in the English language once a fortnight. This station is rapidly becoming entirely French owing to the removal of English speaking families.

 $\operatorname{Mr.}$  J. J. McLeod was the Society's Missionary at North Bay and Sturgeon Falls.

This field is very extensive, embracing the territory along the line of the C. P. R. for a distance of one hundred and fifteen miles. Services were conducted on alternate Sabbaths at North Bay and Sturgeon Falls, and occasionally at Wisawasa, South East Bay, Lavase and Amable du Fond.

During the summer, owing to the energy of our missionary, and the assistance of Rev. Dr. Campbe l, of Renfrew, and Rev. Mr. Ballantyne, of Pembroke, the people of Sturgeon Falls and North Bay were each induced to erect a place of worship. At the opening of the churches the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed by the Rev. Mr. Ballantyne, of Pembroke. As this country is becoming rapidly settled, it forms one of the most hopeful fields which the Society has had under its charge.

The field of Swan Lake, in Manitoba, was supplied during the summer by Mr. J. L. Hargrave.

This field, which covers an area of three hundred miles, lies one hundred and twenty miles south-west of Winnipeg. It comprises five stations, which were regularly supplied during the summer; Kingsley, Swans Lake, Norquay, Beaconsfield and Somerset. Besides the regular Sabbath services, a prayer meeting was held every week at Swan Lake, and once a fortnight at Norquay. A Sabbath school was also established in each of these places during the summer. The mission is very weak in Norquay and Somerset; the other stations, however, are in a prosperous condition.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed in the field by Rev. J. A. Townsend on the 17th of August.

Another field further west than Swan Lake was supplied by Mr. W. Russell

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I vi To as last y accompli frequent Services were conducted at three different stations: Sharon, Boyne and Miami. Sabbath Schools were also established, at Sharon and Miami, at which as well as at the public service, the attendance was very encouraging.

The important work of missionary visitation was not neglected, but almost all the families in the vicinity, of whatever denomination, were called upon by our missionary during the summer.

Total cost of the fields to the Society, \$566.78.

The Society with gratitude again thanks its many friends for their willing support, and in doing so would ask a continuance, and even an increase, of their kind liberality. Owing to the lack of funds the Society is able this year to send out only four missionaries, instead of six as formerly.

There are several places in the Province of Quebec, now entirely destitute of means of grace, and which have been so for years, which could be supplied with services during the summer months, if the funds for the support of a missionary were forthcoming. These fields are entirely beyond the reach of Presbyteries, and to all appearances must remain as they now are, surrounded by all the dangers of a church untiring in its efforts for the advancement of its cause, unless they are reached by some such means as our Society.

We would earnestly commend to congregations and individuals the pressing claims of such fields, and the equally pressing claims of a Society whose object and wish it is to carry the Word of Life to such as are thus shut out from the privileges which we enjoy. May we ask that this year our funds may be so increased that as a Society we may further than ever heretofore extend our labors, and so fulfil the command of our Master, whose knowledge shall yet cover the earth.

### LUMBERMEN'S MISSION, 1884-'85.

The following is the substance of the report of the above mission, as presented to the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, at its recent meeting.

The committee on the Synod's Mission to the lumbermen, beg to report that three missionaries, the Rev. D. L. McKechine, Mattawa, Rev. Wm. Shearer, Aylwin, and the Rev. P. S. Vernier, were in the service of the mission for periods ranging from three weeks to three months, and the several colporters. James Duncan, of Masham, Eneas Toshock, of Ramsay, and others carried on our work jointly with them, and work for the Bible Society.

They all speak in the same terms of the pleasure with which our mission is welcomed by the men in the shanties, and of the hopeful indications of good accomplished through the divine blessing on their labors.

Mr. Vernier reports that he visited sixty-three families and four shancies on the Blanch and the Lieon Rivers in districts contiguous to his ordinary field of labor and was in nearly every instance kindly received. He believes that the mission to the lumbermen is a very valuable auxilliary to his work.

Mr. McKechine reports as follows:—1 began this year the work of visiting shanties on the 15th January, and centinued with some interruptions until the 22ud of March.

My visits were principally on the Quebec side, from the Magnisippi River 20 miles below Mattawa to the shanties farthest north, nearly 100 miles above Mattawa.

I visited 36 shanties, 25 lumbering depots, 24 families and stopping places. To accomplish this I drove about 860 miles. Though I spent as much time as last year, and endured greater hardships, I did not travel as great a distance nor accomplish as much work. This was owing to the great depth of snow, the frequent storms, and as a consequence the bad state of the roads.

The glare ice, which almost invariably comes in March, and which was eagerly looked for, did not come at all. I had thus to abandon the idea of visiting one small corner of my district, which I hoped to reach when the ice became good for

driving.

In my visits I met about 1,550 people, of whom 860 were French and 690 English speaking. Of the latter a considerable number were Catholic. I delivered about 45 addresses or expositions of Scripture. Though unable to give an address in French, I read on several occasions interesting selections from the French New Testament, and was told by several that I read well, and that they understood every word. But an increasing number of the French both understand and speak English.

The supply of literature was excellent, and so abundant as to tax the capacity of my small cutter. Indeed, I had to return home once or twice for a fresh supply. I usually gave to each man a large paper, besides a couple of small tracts. The larger books I distributed as I thought best. The handsome cards with texts were much prized. Some that I gave away at stopping places, I saw afterwards neatly framed and hung up. Nowhere will books and papers be more thoroughly read than those that are distributed by your missionaries.

An old man at a stopping place told me he had some copies of the British Workman in his trunk. He got them three years ago in one of the shanties. He said the pictures were worth framing.

Copies of the British Workman and other papers that I had left 1 distributed to the Toronto volunteers when they were passing Mattawa. They were received with great eagerness.

I was generally well received. There are in shantics, as everywhere else, some who do not care if they never saw face of missionary or inside of church; but generally the visit of the missionary is welcome, and in many instances his reception is very cordial.

There is certainly great need of mission work among the men engaged in lumbering. Most of them are away many months of each year from home and from Gospel privileges. Nowhere is there more Godliness, profanity, Sabbath desecration and "foolish talking."

Of course, very great results need not be expected from the visit of the missionary. Yet in most cases his visits will not be without good fruits. I have never spoken with greater pleasure than I have in shanties where the majority of the men were English speaking and Protestant, nor have ever seen the Gospel more eagerly listened to. "The men ought to be good after this," said a foreman to me one evening after I had addressed them, distributed papers and sold them a few Bibles. And truly it was a cheering sight to see them before the blazing fire looking over their papers, reading their Bib'es and chatting pleasantly with each other. One night at a depot, when about twenty sat down for supper round a long table, I asked a blessing, and the cook remarked, "It would be well if we had a blessing every day of our lives." One sabbath I visited at a shanty where I had been the two previous winters. The foreman—a Catholic—shook me warmly by the hand, saying, "You are welcome." After a pleasant visit of two hours, as I was going away, the foreman came out with me and thanked me for my visit. I "Do you notice any good effects follow the visit of priest or asked him, msssionary?" (The great majority of his men were Catholic.) "It makes a big difference," said he. He gave me to understand that when men were several months in the woods they grew very careless, and that a religious service in the woods made more of an impression upon the men than a similar service would below where they had so many of them.

The presence in the same shanty of men of different nationalities and different religious persuasions makes the missionary's work a difficult one. No one

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The treasurer's report is satisfactory. We began the year with a balance on hand of \$252.56.

Contributions for the year have been received from fourt en congregations and three friends of the mission to the amount of \$290, making in all \$542.56.

The total expenditure to date for books, tracts and papers in English and French, together with cost of transport to and from the points of distribution has been \$230.46. To this, there has to be added the conveners expenses for stationary and postage, \$7.20, making the total outlay to date, \$237.66.

There is still the sum of one hundred dollars to be paid to the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew. When this has been paid there will be a balance on hand of \$204.90, which may be increased somewhat by contributions in the hand of the Rev. Dr Campbell, but not yet reported.

The thanks of the Synod are due to the Religious Tract Society of London, and to Mr Vasseur, the Director of the Tract Society of Paris, for the very large and valuable donations and free grants made to us by their respective societies. These grants were so liberal as to give us a stock nearly double the amount of our orders. The favor has been received from the Religious Tract Society for many year past, and is a proof of their unfailing interest in the work of the mission. The grant from the Paris Society was accompanied by a very kind letter from Mr. Vasseur, in which he expresses a warm desire to participate in the work of evangelizing the French Canadians.

Mr. Andrew Drummond, who has been the treasurer of the mission since it was commenced, having retired from his position in the bank, wishes to be relieved from the duties of the treasurership. A cordial vote of thanks is due to Mr. Drummond for his valuable services to the mission.

### RULES FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF MISSIONARIES.

The committee, on the recommendation of a sub-committee, appointed to formulate definite regulations for the appointment of missionaries, have adopted the following:

- 1. The Home Mission Committee has the right of appointment, through the respective Presbyteries, in the following cases:
  - (a) To all mission districts and mission stations, whether these be self-sustaining or requiring aid.
    - (b) To any vacant charge seeking continuous supply such as is provided by the committee.

Note—Presbyteries shall forward to the secretary, one week before each meeting, a full list of their fields, and indicate those in which supply is required.

2. The list of missionaries is made up for the regular meetings of the committee, and at the March meeting the list is printed and distributed to the members of committee.

The list is made up as follows:

- (a) The names of all students desiring work and whose names are forwarded by some Presbytery of the Church.
- (b) The names of all catechists recommended by Presbyteries.
- (c) The names of ministers and licentiates in good standing in the Church aud seeking work under the committee.

Note: The printed list shall indicate the names of students or others willing to labor in the mission field for a term of one year or more.

3. In allocating missionaries the committee has the following procedure:

(a) Appointments are made to Presbyteries, first for fields requiring ordained missionaries for a terms of years, and then for the field at large.

(b) The Presbyteries have a choice in rotation, beginning at the east and west

in alternate years.

(c) The Presbytery first choosing any laborer has a claim upon him which shall stand, unless in the judgment of the committee the said laborer should be allocated to another Presbytery.

(d) Each Presbytery requiring ten missionaries or over has an extra choice after both first and second rounds, and each Presbytery requiring six

missionaries or over has an extra choice after the first round.

4. If any missionary refuses to go to the Presbytery to which he has been allocated, he shall not be employed in any field under the care of this committee until next half-yearly meeting, unless with the consent of the Presbytery first choosing him.

5 It is distinctly understood that the practice of making private arrangements shall not be countenanced, except in the case of a settled minister who desires to secure a student to assist him in his own congregation, in which case the name of the missionary shall be reported to this committee to be placed upon the list.

### GRANTS FROM BRITISH CHURCHES.

There has been received during the year from the British Churches, in aid of Home Mission work, the following sums: From the Free Church of Scotland, £200; from the Church of Scotland, £50; and from the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, £200. The Divinity students of the United Presbyterian Church of Scotland have also agreed to raise a handsome sum next year for Home Mission work in Manitoba and the North-west.

Women's Missionary Societies—The executive were instructed to prepare and submit to the general Assembly a scheme for enlisting the sympathy and active co-operation of the women of the Church on behalf of the work of the Committee.

Annual meetings of the Committee—It was agreed to recommend to the Assembly that hereafter the Home Committee meet annually in March, instead of semi-annually in October and March, and that the Executive attend to all matters requiring action during the year—the names of a representative each from Barrie Presbytery and from the Synod of Manitoba and the Northwest being added to those at present comprising the Executive.

### REPORT OF THE SUBCOMMITTEE ON AUGMENTATION.

The number of cid requiring congregations reported a year ago was 170. During the past year 31 of the congregations have been removed from the list, while 30 new ones have been added, so that the number requiring aid for the year beginning 1st April 1885, is 169, of which 135 are settled and 34 vacant. (In the annual statistical reports of Presbyteries 183 congregations appear on the list. Some of these, however, were added only in April, 1885, and others are now self-sustaining). The number actually assisted from 1st April, 1884, to 31st March, 1885, was 159, as compared with 145 during the preceding year.

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Among the congregations added to the list during the past year, are Prince Albert, Edmonton, Regina, and several other charges in the Synod of Manitoba, which make in the meantime heavy demands on the fund. It is to be expected as the result of the vigorous prosecution of Home Mission work in the North-west that settlements will be rapidly effected, and that, in many cases aid will be required for a time.

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The amount asked from the Church to meet the expenditure of the year, was \$30,000. The committee apportioned this amount amongst the presbyteries of the wester section, requesting each Presbytery to aim at securing a certain sum from the congregations within its bounds. The response from some of the Presbyteries has been very satisfactory; in two instances the amount asked has been exceeded; but in several Presbyteries the returns shew that only about one-third of the amount asked has been secured. The total amount received from Presbyteries (including donations) is \$20,912, of which almost one-half is from the Presbyteries of Montreal and Toronto.

The actual outlay for the year has been \$31,090 66. In order to pay each aid-receiving congregation the full amount require to make up \$750 and manse, it has been necessary to borrow \$4,000 from the Reserve Fund. Had it not been for the unusually large amount received in the form of legacies (\$3,846), the deficiency would have been very much greater. This state of matters is far from satisfactory, and, were there no explanation to be given, it might be inferred that the Church is not prepared to carry out the scheme inaugurated two years age. When it is taken into account, however, that the contributions for Home Mission work have greatly exceeded the amount asked for that object, and that there is a large surplus after providing for the expenditure of the past year, the conclusion seems justified that in many cases sessions and congregations have not fully understood the separation of the two funds as ordered by last General Assembly, and have made contributions to the Home Mission fund on the supposition that a portion of the money would be applied to augmentation. The Committee are confirmed in this opinion by the fact that a communication was received from one Presbytery, suggesting that, on the ground just stated, the overplus of the Home Mission fund should be applied to make up the deficiency in the Augmentation fund. The committee did not feel at liberty, however, to disturb the appropriation, which congregations had made of their contributions. It is earnestly hoped that it will be clearly understood hereafter that the two funds are entirely distinct, and that it rests with sessions and congregations to indicate how much is to be applied to each.

The following additional regulations for the working of the scheme are submitted for the approval of the General Assembly:—

- 1. That no grant be made to any congregation for the year beginning 1st April, 1885, where arrears of salary are reported as due on the 31st December last until such arrears shall have been paid; and that this action be reported to the General Assembly, with the recommendation that it be adopted as a permanent regulation for the working of the scheme from year to year.
- 2. In view of exceptional circumstances in certain fields, as for instance, where there is not full work for a minister on account of the small number of families in the locality, or on account of the proximity of another congregation, or where there might be a re-arrangement of congregations so as to secure greater economy and efficiency in carrying on the work; the committee, after correspondence with Presbyteries, shall have discretionary power to withhold aid, or to grant less than the full amount required to make the stipend \$750 and manse; and Presbyteries are instructed where, in their judgment, the circumstances require it, to make application for a reduced grant

The following eases are reported as exceptional, and it is recommended, that grants be made to the congregations named, notwithstanding their inability to fulfil the conditions required by the regulations of the Assembly:—

London East in the Presbytery of London.

Hanover and North Normanby in the Presbytery of Bruce.

The desirability of union between the Eastern and Western section of the Church in the prosecution of the Augmentation scheme, having been affirmed by last Assembly, the Convener and the Secretary of the Sub-committee were deputed to confer with the Eastern Committee on Supplements, there arent. They accordingly met the Committee in October last at Pictou, when the matter was very fully discussed. The opportunity was also given them of addressing the Synod of the Maritime Provinces on the subject. The following resolution with reference to unification was adopted by the Synod:—

"That while the Synod anticipates with pleasure the prospect of unification of the augmentation movement, yet we are of opinion that such union should be postponed for one year, until the scheme is more fully developed in the Maritime Provinces, so as at least to approximate to the desired minimum of \$750 and manse."

The scheme has been very vigorously prosecuted in the East during the past year, and your committee hope that the unification desired may soon be accomplished.

The year upon which we have entered will fairly test the interest of the Church in this movement. The amount required for earrying on of the work will be about the some as last year, say \$31,000; and in addition, the sum borrowed from the Reserve Fund (\$4,000) ought to be returned. The committee must rely largely on the ministers of the church—especially those of the stronger city, town and country congregations—to explain the working of the scheme, to remove groundless objections, and to plead the ease of the weak and struggling. They would also appeal to Presbyterics to use their utmost endeavors (1) to prevent the undue burdening of the fund with charges whose claim to aid is not thoroughly just; (2) to secure the rising, within their respective bounds, of a fair proportion to the whole amount required for the successful prosecution of the work.

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### REPORT OF BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

### MARITIME PROVINCES.

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In the Home Mission work of the Maritime Provinces, fifteen preachers, including or lained ministers and licentiates, were employed during the summer season. Before the end of October, eight of these were pastors of congregations. A few who were birds of passage retired, and during the winter season the number of labourers was limited to four or five under the disction of the Committee, and three other ordained brethren, who gave excellent service, during summer and winter, as openings presented. As nearly as can be estimated, the work done was the equivalent of fourteen to twelve preachers employed during the whole year. By far the larger part of the support of these comes directly from the congregations supplied, and is in good measure additional to the work paid of from the funds of the Home Mission Committee.

Two ordained missionaries are employed in New Brunswick in the Presbytery of St. John, one exported entirely by the Woman's Home Mission Society at St. John, aided to some extent by their sistent in a few other towns. Mr. Shore, their missionary, has been systematic, indefatigable and most successful in his labours; so that the mission field of that Presbytery is each year becoming sore interesting and encouraging. The missionary having accepted a call to the congregation of

St. Stephen's, a successor is now wanted. The second labours in the New Kincardine and Tobique districts, the Board guaranteeing \$500 per annum, and the people about \$500. During part of the year past, owing to the call and settlement in St. James' Parish of Mr. Sutherland, the ordained missionary of the last few years, the supply was furnished otherwise; but the services of the Rev. D. McKae having been secured, the former arrangement is again in force. Faithful work has been done in this large and advancing district, and the Lord's blessing has not been withheld.

Three other congregations, too weak to claim a place among the augmented charges, receive a fixed proportion of their means for supporting a pastor from the Home Mission Fund; Linden in Cumberland County, Bedford and Waverly in Halifax County, and Riversdale with contiguous sations in Lunenburg County, up to the LaHave River. These aggregate, as the accounts will show, \$30s.33 per annum; and though no special reports of the labours of the respective pastors are in the hards of the Committee, yet the Presbyteries in which they are located have expressed satisfaction by asking for the continuance of the grants. The congregation last named, Riversdale, has made visible progress, the attendance, the prayer meeting and Sabbath schools, the communion roll and the people's contributions to the Schemes of the Church having all increased. Besides they have, out of their scanty means, with some assistance, completed the inside finishing of their church without contracting any debt worthy of the name.

The strictly missionary work of which this Board has had the superintendence, has without question been done chiefly by the theological students, including some earnest workers from the arts course, and catechists, all having Pre-byterial sanction and approval. The subjoined statistical and financial reports will show that thirty-six of the agents have been employed for the summer; but three have been employed for the whole year, though for the sake of uniformity in tabular statement, the report is, in most cases, limited within the half year.

Two at least have been employed during winter, of whose work there is no notice taken in the tabular statement presently to be referred to, but their work was valuable. One of these, Mr. F. 4. Burgess, reports to the Presbytery of Miramichi: "On January 1st 1 went to Flatlands where I preached and visited for four weeks. Though some of the men were away to the woods, and the weather sometimes stormy, the attendance was good. I preached at Flatlands, Metapedia, and Ipsalquetch, holding weekly prayer-meetings at the two first-mentioned places. I spent February in the Miramichi lumber camps and adjoining settlements. The lumbermen were very glad to see me. Good work could be done if one were specially employed among these men. They spoke as if they thought they were neglected." The remainder of this missionary's time was employed in other places of which no special mention is required.

Mr. John Matheson Elder was also employed for thirteen weeks in winter, supplying North-East Margaree and associated stations, on the northern part of Cape Breton, so that the people attached to our Church there might not be left unprovided for during the whole winter; and did his work to the satisfaction of the Presbytery by whom he was sent. By other Presbyteries, but more especially by the Presbytery of St. John, systematic arrangements were made and carried out for providing by members of Presbytery, and by qualified elders, periodical services at all preaching stations during the winter months. Such arrangements have proved most cheering to the mission stations and salutary in results, and the Board are of opinion that Presbyteries by heartily adopting such a policy, and placing each mission field under the care of the nearest Presbytery, would give an impetus and a stability to our Home Mission work, the want of which has been the greatest hinderance

For the ordinary work of the students and catechists the Board presents the statistical and mancial returns embodied in the table marked Appendix III.—showing 819 Sabbaths, an attendance of 9.389; communicants, 2,170; families, 2,947; families visited, 2,581; Sabbath school attendance, 1.574; contributed by people for supply, 86,349; paid from Church funds, 81,227, thus showing that the Church fund does not provide one-fourth of the whole amount.

As such tables are generally laid aside without being read, it seems desirable to present some of the accompanying reports condensed giving body and life to these skeleton forms.

UNIACKE MINES, ETTER'S SETTLEMENT AND BRAVER BANK. - BY FRANK S. COFFIN.

To the Presbutery of Hatifax:

These stations were worked as one charge last summer for the first time. All the denomination-These stations were worked as one charge last summer for the first time. All the denomination of which they are composed united in supporting the catechist and in carrying on evangelical work. I found the people anxious for services, but without religious meetings of any kind during the week evenings. I immediately started a Sabbath school at each place. One has been conducted at the Mines. They are all union schools. And a weekly prayer-meeting and Bible class at Uniack-Mines. The schools need the International lesson paper and were conducted by twelve teachers. Two of the schools purchased libraries besides a sufficient number of Cook's papers. Six persons are found to lead in prayer in the weekly prayer-meeting. This latter, with two of the Sabbath schools, will be continued through the winter. Preaching service was held at each of the three places every work during the first of the summer: during the last half, fortnightly at Etter's Settlement and Beaver Bank. Besides our service a Church of England minister visited the Mines monthly, and a Baptisteer with the other there our were the only services. persons on profession of faith into the fellowship of the Church. The people paid nearly the whole bill, salary and board, amounting to \$193.

DIGBY AND BAY VIEW, -BY G. B. HALLOCK.

To the Preshutery of Halifax

The field is in a promising condition. A permanent postor is greatly needed. The little church at Bay View is in a very prosperous condition. I trust the Presbytery will see to it that these stations are either provided for permanently, or, at least, have stated services, once every two, or once every three weeks. If properly cared for, I have not the least doubt that this field would become selfsupporting in a few years. Presbyterianism is in great favour in the community.

WATERVILLE AND LAKEVILLE. -- BY BEV. WILLARD M'DONALD.

To the Presbytery of Halifax:

I commenced mission work on Sabbath, May 11th, and closed October 26th. The services were well attended. On Sabbath evenings I taught a Bible class in Waterville which seemed appreciated, the average attendance being about 150. The Communion was dispensed by Rev. Mr. Dawson in Lakeville, July 12th, and in Waterville, October 26th. A collection amounting to \$4.50 was taken for the Foreign Mission Scheme. The people paid \$120. On the last Sabbath of June I exchanged with Mr. Coffin at Bridgetown.

EASTERN SHORE, -BY HUGH J. FURNEAUX.

To the Presbytery of Halifax .

Mr. Hugh J. Furneaux supplied the Eastern Shore, covering the eastern part of Sheet Harbour congregation and stations still further east. He has furnished no notes beyond the usual statistical information. Places supplied, Moser River, Quoddy, Dufferin Mine, Beaver Harbour. Families visited, 123, of whom 60 were Presbyterians; Sabbath school attendance in the different places, 110; two weekly prayer meetings, attendance, 70 and 30; contributed by the people for 24 weeks' services. 8141.16.

AT NORTH-WEST ARM AND GOODWOOD, -BY FRANCIS EDWARD SMILEY.

To the Presbytery of Halifax:

The work on the station during the summer has been greatly blessed by the Lord in the salvation of souls, and in the increase of interest among the congregation in church work. Eighteen have come forward to confess their faith in Christ, eight of whom are heads of families. The congregation at the Arm, in addition to raising \$250 for the missionary in charge, have improved the interior of their church to the value of \$25. The congregation at Goodwood have furnished the onveyance for the missionary, and are making an effort to increase their yearly subscription. The situation is not yet able to support a pastor. It should, however, be carefully fostered until it can.

ISAAC'S HABBOUR, COUNTRY HARBOUR, AND WINE HARBOUR, - BY R. C. MURRAY.

To the Presbytery of Picton:

Our attendance at Isaac's Harbour increased to upwards of 200. As the Presbytery gave me no positive instructions when I should go to Wine Harbour, or how much time should be given to the different places, I felt it would not be right to leave so many people for any length of time without preaching of any kind. I therefore remained at Isaac's Harbour and Country Harbour for ten weeks. The work done during the week in the way of Bible classes, etc., was not what I would like, due partially to the scattered and widely separated population, and also being uncertain how long I

would remain in one part of the field.

This leads me humbly, but earnestly and sympathetically, to direct the attention of Presbytery to the requirements of this field. It is well known by my worthy predecessors that one missionary cannot do the work with any degree of efficiency, required in this group. Could Pietou Presbytery not afford to send two men to this people for the summer.

I cannot refrain from expressing myself somewhat strongly on the great need of these our are people. They are dying at our door. They are longing for light and life. There are families who have not seen a minister of any kind for years. They are willing to do a little to help themselves, and soon would learn to do more. I do therefore trust that the Presbytery may be able to send two student missionaries to this group this summer, and if possible furnish some supply for Country and Isaac's Harbour during part of the winter.

### HARMONY AND STEWIACKE ROAD, -BY THOMAS STEWART,

To the Presbytery of Truro .

I preached twice on Sabbath, as a rule, and immediately before the afternoon service super-intended a Sabbath school and taught a Bible class. On Tuesday nights I held prayer meeting in the school-house at Harmony, and on Thursday nights at Stewiacke Road. The attendance at church and prayer meetings was good. The Communion was dispensed by Rev. Dr. McCulloch on Sabbath, August 24th, on which occasion three were added to the roll on profession of faith, and one by certificate. I supplied the station from May 11th to September 21st, inclusive. The people of Harmony and Stewiacke Road, with few exceptions, regularly attend on the means of grace, and manifest an earnest appreciation of the labours of the missionaries who have been stationed among them. Though, in the report, no mention is made of collections for the schemes of the Church, I may say that on Thanksgiving Day it is the custom of the people to contribute for the Foreign may say that on Thanksgiving Day it is the custom of the people to contribute for the Foreign Missions. As this always takes place after the missionary's departure, it never appears in the report. I received from the people \$123.

MACCAN AND ADJACENT STATIONS. BY G. N. MAKELY,

To the Presbytery of Truro ;

If a pastor were settled immediately I think the field would number at least ninety communicants within two years and be self-supporting. If there is delay much of the best building material will go to other denominations. If they cannot have a settled poster, the people desire occasional preaching during the coming winter, and a catechist for the whole of next year.

FLATLANDS, METAPEDIA AND UPSALQUITCH. -BY H. C. HINES.

To the Presbutery of Miramichi:

Attendance at these places respectively, 80, 76, 11; communicants, 47, 7, 10; families, 45, 39, 17; families visited, 73; contribution to Church Schemes \$16.11; payment of services, \$135. (Flatlands has put up the frame of a new church. Nine added to communion roll in Flatlands. Services during winter urgently required if field is not to retrograde.

BURNT CHURCH AND TABUSINTAC, "BY B. G. VANCLEVE,

To the Presbytery of Miramichi:

I arrived on the field and began work on May 18th. Remained nineteen Sabbaths, or till September 21st. Burnt Church and Tabusintac, with their outposts, are all well organized churches. They should have a pastor all the time. The field is in need of being worked. The climate is healthful, the people kind, amiable, and morally inclined. During my labours I have ason to thank God for the interest manifested, yet there is much rubbish to be cleared away so that the wall may go up. The carnest builder should come full of the Holy Spirit, work hard, and God will give him success.

ESCUMINAC, -- BY J. F. SMITH.

To the Presbytery of Miramichi:

The field is scattered and surrounded by French Roman Catholics. There had formerly been disputes with the Methodists which caused considerable ill-feeling which even yet survives. Of late displits with the Methodists which causer considerable instructing which even yet survives. An are years the moral tone of the community has very much improved, owing to religious influences and the absence of liquor. There is not much wealth in the place, but the people contribute very liberally, and pay all their own bills; building a new church has taxed them considerably. Want of service in the winter season is a serious drawback, and materially lessons the good done in the summer. If the bounds of the congregation were extended to include a district now comprised in Campbellton congregation, a regular minister could be sustained without detriment to Campbellton congregation. There is need of elders being appointed. Prospects for the future are encouraging.

CARAQUET, SHIPPIGAN, ETC. BY E. M. LANDIS.

To the Presbytery of Miramichi:

I found this a promising field. Caraquet has only a few Protestant families; being surrounded by Roman Catholies, the Protestants are exposed to special temptations and have all the more need of careful guardianship and instruction. As the Tracadie station was wisely consigned to the catechist at Tabusintac, I could make my principal stay at the Little Shippigan Harbour, and give two-thirds of my time to the station situated at it. Work promises great results among the highly appreciating people. They fall in most heartily with all Christian efforts. Most of the people engage somewhat in fishing and work at the lobster factories and do a little farming. Most of the many lobster factories employ some Protestants from a distance who attend and support the meetings, and would feel themselves not at home without religious services. One of the factories, close to the places of meeting, which employed some twenty-five or more Protestants from Nova Scotia that attended other years, has not been running this season but expects to be in operation again next summer. Another encouragement in the future working of their field is the building of the Caraquet and Shippigan Railroad, which will no doubt bring more Protestants into this hitherto out-of-the-way place.

KOUCHIBOUGUAC, --- BY WM, MACRAE,

To the Presbytery of Miramichi:

In addition to the enclosed statistical report, I beg leave to say a few words. The mission station of Kouchibouguac is a very extensive and interesting one, and deserves watchful care on the part of the Presbytery. There are altogether about sixty-five families in connection with the congregation, all of whom are willing to contribute their mites to the support of the Gospel.

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Although more than half the number are unable to contribute very much, yet some few families have contributed as high as \$8 and \$10 during the summer. Besides expending over \$300 towards completing the new church, the people have cheerfully paid all my expenses. They are also anxious for supply during the winter. If probationer or catechist could be had for six or eight weeks during winter, I am sure such services would be productive of much good. The Sacrament of the Lord'-Supper was dispensed on Sabbath, October 12th, by Rev. J. C. Herdman, of Campbellton. Nine new members were added to the roll, one by certificate of membership, eight on confession of faith. Also five infants were baptized by Mr. Herdman, and three adults by Mr. McKenzie, of Kingston, As the new church is now completed and free from debt, the prospects of Kouchibonguac in a short time becoming a settled congregation are good.

The preceding notes are by missionaries in the Presbyteries of Halifax and Miramichi, with two specimens from the Presbytery of Truro, and one from that of Picton. The following are from the summer labourers in different districts in the Presbytery of St. John, N.B.:

By W. C. CALDER, in Pisarinco, a district on the shore, about fifteen miles from the town of Carleton, opposite the city of St. John.

The people of this place are the descendants of emigrants from the North of Ireland; fishermen by occupation, honest and industrious, willing to pay for the support of the Gospel in their midst. The families that belong to the Methodists and Church of England have regularly attended our services and helped materially in the support of the field. This people are worthy the interest of the Church, there being a possibility of organizing them into a self-supporting congregation.

By JOHN VALENTINE, who laboured in the New Kincardine and Tobique districts.

From May to September inclusive we held in all eighty-nine meetings. Had two marriages, six baptisms and four deaths, with an admission of fen persons, on profession of faith, to full communion. The field is an interesting one, and ma few years, when the people have built themselves houses, will be self-sustaining. The Kincardine and Tobique districts might be again united with advantage to each, and could be thus wrought by a constant resident. If wrought by students there is field enough for two, Tobique district itself being sixty miles long. The two field-unitedly at present would contribute over \$300 per year. Kincardine might be wrought in two or three stations and the Tobique in four, extending about sixty miles. In Kincardine the settlers do not go into the lumber woods in winter, and desire services. During the absence of the catechist the elders and deacons endeavour to conduct services on Sunday and keep up the prayer meetings.

### DORCHESTER, ROCKLAND AND SACKVILLE, -BY S. C. MURRAY,

The field here is important. People not wealthy but willing to do what they can. In Rockland there is little chance for growth. The prospect in Dorchester is fair. Sackville, formerly in connection with the R. P. Church, now asks for supplies. The opportunities for growth here are greater than in either of the other places. These fields should very soon make a united effort to secure a pastor. They can be conveniently supplied by one man. Mr. Shore visited Dorchester and Rockland and conducted Communion services. Eleven names were added to communion rolls. Mr. Shore succeeded in arousing the Dorchester people to make an effort to build a church. Effort proved a success. Foundation of a church 28 x 40 feet now completed; it will be finished on the outside this full, and be ready for use early next summer. Mr. Shore is very highly esteemed by the people of Dorchester and Rockland. If these stations are continued under the care of Home Mission Board, let a man of some experience, if possible, be sent from one of the Canadian Colleges, as their vacation is longer. Field will be fully self-supporting now as a mission, and they want a live man.

### ST. GEORGE, -BY J. A. CAHILL,

If a minister could be kept constantly would build up a church. At present other denominations reap fruit of our summer work. Principal industry, granite polishing, and as supply is inexhaustible, there may come Scotch families to settle, and that future is hopeful. Preached one hundred and twenty times in six months, visited every family at least three times with prayer. The new church at Penntield will be completed in November.

NEREPIS, WELSFORD, CLARENDON, JERUSALEM AND ARMSTRONG'S CORNER. -- BY JAMES ROSS,

I began work on the first Sabbath of May, and ended the first Sabbath of October, twenty-three Cabbaths in all. The Communion was dispensed by Rev. T. F. Fotheringham in both Nerepis and Charendon. Two were admitted to membership of the Church on profession of their faith in Christ Welsford has been made a regular preaching station. Armstrong's Corner might be worked with advantage next summer. Jerusalem is not in a position to do much in the way of paying for the labours of a catechist. Clarendon contributed \$25 and repaired school-house for service. Nerepis expended \$64 in church repairs. Total raised, \$161. Presbyterians few but willing to support. Twenty-five or thirty dollars more might be obtained by opening a station at Armstrong's Corner.

### BAILLIE AND TOWER HILL, -BY J. M'P. SCOTT.

It is a cause for gratification to know that Presbyterianism is stronger to-day in Tower Hill than ever previous, and to notice the steady regaining of ground and the general upbuilding of the Church in Baillie and outstanding stations. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed in Tower Hill and Baillie on 21st September, Rev. Mr. Love, of St. Stephen, officiating, when eight were received into fellowship with the Church; one in Tower Hill on profession of faith and seven in

Baillie and out persons were September 21st being adults, the whole field, paid by the exshould for the soverworked as:

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Hill than z of the ensed in en eight seven in Baillie and outstanding stations, four upon confession of faith and three by certificate, and three persons were elected to the office of elder, who were ordained to that office by Rev. Mr. Love on September 21st. During the summer Rev. Mr. Love baptized forty persons, four of this number being adults. The Baillie section of the congregation, ever aspiring to having a settled pastor over the whole field, purchased for a manse glebe fifty acres of land at a cost of \$200, which was really paid by the exertions of the iadies. It is highly desirable that the field, as worked at present, should for the summer months be divided. The field is too large—not so much that the missionary is overworked as that the people are not reached.

### HAMMOND RIVER AND HAMPTON VILLAGE, -- BY C. A. STONELAKE.

At Hammond River we possess a neat and convenient church edifice. The congregation has been long in existence, and during the summer just passed the attendance upon service has been regular and very encouraging. At the Communion service held at the termination of the season, in which the Hampton people participated, sixteen united by letter or upon profession of faith. The work at Hampton was begun last year and is a decidedly important one. We have the use of the Baptist church, and have been met by our Baptist brethren in a truly Christian spirit. It would, however, be decidedly to our advantage, and is much to be desired, that we have an edifice of our own; until we have, the work must go forward under some disadvantage. These two stations together have our especial need. They want a settled pastor, and I think, could they obtain one, they would, under his guidance grow in prosperity and usefulness.

### RIVERSIDE, N.B., AND STATIONS, -BY G. S. CARSON.

This is the second summer that this field has been supplied by a catechist since separation for the larger field, which Rev. Mr. Bryden was pastor. There are not many families of Presbyterians, but they are deeply in earnest in the work and have shown their zeal by their liberality. During the five months of my service they raised for all purposes nearly three hundred dollars. About two months ago a subscription list was started to raise funds for building a church. The people responded to this with astonishing liberality, and in a few weeks about two thousand dollars were subsc. ed. Work was immediately begun, and on the 22nd day of September the foundation-stone was laid. Revs. Dr. Macrae and Mr. Shore were present and conducted the services. The frame will be erected and enclosed this fall, and the work will, it is hoped, be completed early next summer. The people also manifested a lively interest in the religious services. Three were added to the Church on profession of their faith and several others expressed an interest in Christ, but did not see their way clear to unite with the Church at present.

### GRAND FALLS AND VAN BUREN. -BY E. F. SEYLAZ.

The station first named is in New Brunswick, the second in Maine. The number of families mentioned in the return do not all belong to our Church, but they all attend divine service regularly. I think these fields, especially Grand Falls, afford promise for the future, but unless well looked after the cause will suffer. This enumeration will close with reports of work in Cape Breton and in Newfoundland.

### LEITCH'S CREEK AND BALL'S CREEK IN SYDNEY PRESBYTERY, -BY J. W. M'LENNAN,

Leitch's Creek.—There are two sections, Leitch's Creek and Ball's Creek, the people of both meeting in one central church, and maintaining besides their respective prayer-meetings, etc. The great body of the people are in the rear lands, and though their number, as the above statistics show, is somewhat large, their circumstances are such as to make many of them almost a cypher in the financial estimates of the congregation. This station, once a settled charge, has received Home Mission supply for the past seven years. They are doubtless suffering from the effects of a vacancy so long continued—the work done in summer losing greatly on its lasting effects by their being left without the means of grace in winter. This has been unged upon them with a view to their moving in this matter, and the new Augmentation Scheme has made them more hopeful in their efforts to secure a settled pastor. Half of Mr. McLennan's time was occupied as temporary assistant to Rev. Dr. McLeod, the father of the Presbytery, and probably of the Church in the Maritime Provinces; and Mr. McLennan's statistics were included and totalized in the table before the fact was noticed that an old and self-sustaining congregation was thus placed among the mission stations. Mr. McLennan's report of work in this field will be read with interest.

Mora.—This congregation is well-known as the charge of the venerable Dr. McLeod. There is here also—in perhaps the prettiest spot in picturesque Cape Breton—one large central church. Services have also been held in twelve different settlements in the congregation, the large attendance at which made it necessary at times to meet outside. In his visitations also your nessionary was received with true Highland hospitality, and better still, with encouraging tokens for good. This is a hopeful field, a field in which the Word, preached with such carnestness and power for many year, will yet, it is believed, result, as it has in a great measure done already, in a rich ingathering of souls.

In conclusion, if suggestions be in order, each of the above stations requires the attention of a missionary at least all summer. The stations were found to be too far apart and, especially Mira, too wide, to be overtaken satisfactorily in half-time, and the hope is indulged that two Gaelic-speaking men will be secured for 1885.

### BAY OF ISLANDS, NEWFOUNDLAND, -BY J. D. MERARLANE.

For eleven months I taught during the week and conducted service on the Lord's Day. I taught at Corner Brook, where there are six Presbyterian families, besides some young men from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick engaged in lumbering. Generally I conducted service in the school-house

at Corner Brook, at 11 a.m., on alternate Sabbaths, the attendance being from thirty to forty. Sabbath school in the afternoon with four teachers and from twenty-five to thirty scholars. Bible class

in the evening by all. Prayer-meeting weekly.

Pleasant Coce,—Here are church and manse, both erected when the late lamented Rev. D. F. Greelman was pastor, where I conducted fortnightly services. Now there are only four Pre-byterian families. There are about eighteen Pre-byterian families scattered round the bay, but many so distant that church attendance was impossible. I visited these families and sent them religious reading. The people appreciated the efforts to provide for them; contributed as far as they could, seeing that the fishery proved a failure, and the demand for lumber was slack; and hoped that another catechist will be sent in the spring. I was much pleased with the kindness of the people, they should not be forcotten.

It may here be stated that a young man of zeal and energy volunteered to go, and is by this time

ministering to the wants of that secluded band of faithful Presbyterians.

The Committee would make grateful mention of the receipt of a gift of £150 sterling from the Colonial Committee of the Free Church of Scotland, a contribution given without any restriction, and which has enabled the Committee to provide liberally for districts unable to pay in full, and which otherwise would have had a very partial supply of religious ordinances. Besides, they have in response to our application, furnished two preachers and paid their passages, thus rendering probable the settlement of two of our Gaelic congregations within the year. The Committee has also to acknowledge bequests of \$200 each from the late James Thompson and Edward Smith, both of St. Andrew's Church, Halifax.

Our funds have been sensibly affected by the special effort made for Augmentation. Some congregations did not give one-fourth, or even one-sixth, for the one that they gave to the other, but, as a fair proportion gave as formerly, the Committee had the gratification of making a gain on the year

J above \$200

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During the year past the Committee have the conviction that the Lord has greatly blessed the work of their missionaries, and they anticipate during this season even better results. The number of catechists is greater. Four students and two Gaelie probationers have sailed, and some of them have arrived, from Scotland to take part in the work. The stations, with a few exceptions, are contributing liberally, the Presbyteries are taking closer oversight of the stations and of the catechistic work, and the churches are showing a more lively interest in the evangelization of the whole land. The Augmentation movement runs in the same line with Home Missions, and as both tend to develop unity of feeling and of effort in bringing the Gospel within reach of all, they are equally entitled to sympatby, prayer and hearty support.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUPPLEMENTS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA.

(EASTERN SECTION.)

Your Committee on Supplements, when submitting their report to the General Assembly last year, indicated the steps which had been taken at that time, with a view of introducing the operation of the General Assembly's Supplementing Scheme in the Eastern Section of the Church. They stated that Presbyteries had been requested to unite in a hearty effort to carry out the Scheme of the General Assembly to raise \$750, with a manse, for every settled pastor. The hope was expressed that if such an effort were universally mode it would result in the attainment for the first year of minimum of \$600 and a manse, with something at least additional from the Surplus Fund, and it was reported that in response to this request the Presbyteries had manifested a willingness to make early efforts so as to approximate, if not to reach the point at which the General Assembly was aiming.

These guarded statements show that your Committee at that date were not sanguine of complete success. In view of the facts with which they found themselves confronted, the General Assembly will not be surprised at their caution.

A careful examination of the statistics had revealed that, of the 180 congregations within the bounds of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, only about 60 or one third of the whole number were at or above the minimum of 8750 with a manse; that of 95 others for which statistics were available about 35 were contributing between 8750 and 8600; 28 between 8600 and 8500; 11 between 8500 and 8100; and no fewer than 21 8100 and under; and that the average contribution for ministerial support of the 95 congregations just specified was less than 8540 per annum. It was discovered further, that besides the half-dozen organized congregations which were receiving grants from the Homo Mission. Fund there were eight or ten which had not fulfilled the first condition imposed by the Assembly in order to entitle them to a place upon the list of Supplemented Congregations, by the payment from their own resources of \$400 and a manse; and that 42 congregations did not fulfil the second condition requiring an average contribution of \$1.50 per communicant. On the other hand your Committee found that there were no fewer than 34 of these congregations which, by fulfilling all the required handitions, would be raised to \$750 and a manse by their own efforts, at a clear gain from this source alone, and without drawing anything from the General Fund. of from \$3.000 to 84,000.

Further they estimated that on the assumptions that all the congregations would qualify for receiving aid by the fulfilment of the conditions of the Asseroldy's Scheme, that none of the congregations which had already more than fulfilled these conditions would full back, and that some of them would make a moderate advance, they would require about \$5,000 to level up all salaries to \$600 with a manse, and nearly \$7,000 more to make them \$750 and a manse; in other words that the congregations in the Eastern Section of the Church would require te raise \$12,000, or about three times as much for supplementing purposes as they had been doing, and that as nearly as could be judged by a comparison of the figures available, the task of the Eastern Section of the Church was relatively nearly twice as difficult as that of the Western Section.

But your Coromittee are glad to be able to report that difficult as it seemed, the work was undertaken with a determination, if possible, to succeed, and that so far the most gratifying success has been attained. A few statements will indicate what has been accomplished. No fewer than twenty-six congregations have advanced to the minimum with a permanent increase in the amount of their contributions to ministerial support of \$2,354; nine more, which do not receive anything from the Supplementing Fund, have approached the minimum byan increase in their contributions of powards of \$500; and twenty-nine congregations, which are now, or are likely soon to be on the Supplemented List, have increased their contributions by \$2,625; making a total of sixty-four charges belonging to the class which was below the minimum at the commencement of the movement, which have advanced in their contributions to ministerial support, and which have realized an aggregate increase of about \$5,515. As this amount may be looked upon as a permanent increase, the advance in this direction will be regarded as peculiarly gratifying.

But your Committee have been equally successful in realizing the sums necessary to be raised for the past year for the General Fand. This aspect of the supplementing business was carefully considered by the Synod of the Maritime Provinces at its meeting in October, and vigorous action was taken to strengthen the hands of the Committee. As the congregations likely to require supplement had by that time increased their contributions from local support by about \$2,000, thus putting matters in a position that would require about \$10,000 for the General Fund, in order to cover the estimated outlay for the year; and as it was very desirable to secure a moderate working balance. the Synod unanimously agreed to ask the congregations within its bounds for \$12,000, and that amount was apportioned to the various Presbyteries with the request that they would endeavour to raise the sums allotted to them as soon as possible. The action taken by the Presbyteries was for the most part prompt, vigorous, and well-directed; and the response of the congregations has been very generous, hearty, and well nigh universal.

The following summary, in a tabulated form, will indicate at a glance what has been both attempted and accomplished:—

That all the Presbyteries, with a single exception, undertook to endeavour to raise the amounts for which they had been asked by the Synod; that most of them came within measurable distance of realizing their allotments; that three of the Presbyteries actually exceeded their allocations; that of the 181 congregations within their bounds 28 exceeded their allotments, 102 more realized them Jully, 36 more contributed as they felt themselves able to give, and that only 15 convegations, of which 10 were vacant charges, have failed to send in a contribution, is a state of matters extremely sati-factory, and one for which your Committee, and no doubt the Assembly also, feel profoundly

But the Committee would hasten to report to the Assembly the way in which the funds placed at their disposal have been administered. Last year your Committee were authorized to give grants up a the terms prescribed by the regulations of the Assembly's Scheme.

The Supplemented List was prepared with a view to indicate the amount of the grants for a whole year, but as applications from Presbyteries were not at all fully before the Committee till Joseph out as appareamons from 1 resoyvenes were not at all fully before the Committee till their meeting in October, it was agreed that the operation of the new Scheme should begin with July I, 1884, and accordingly grants have been paid for the nine months ending March 31, 1885, at rates proportional to those specified in the list, and to the amounts specified in the table in the appendix. The only exceptions are two congregations in the Presbytery of Miramichi, in which the payment of the grant from the gran payment of the grant from the surplus fund has been suspended, pending certain action on the part of the Presbytery itself, which has not yet been taken. The Committee ask authority for the payment of these amounts, as well as the sanction of the Assembly for the payment of the sums which have been already paid.

As the time for the semi-annual payments in the Maritime Provinces has hitherto been the 1st of January and July, and as the regulations of the General Assembly have fixed April and October as the dates of payment for the future, the required change has been made. This change has, however, necessitated the payment of supplements for fifteen months within the past year, viz.. six months at old rates and nine months at new Augmentation rates. The sums paid out, therefore,

In addition to the above there has been experited for administration, \$267.02; proportion of Agent's salary, \$325; making a total outlay of \$8,876.23. As the receipts from all sources during the year have been \$11,262.76, there is a balance in favour of the Fund on the operations of the year of \$2,386,53, which, added to the balance on hand at the beginning of the year of \$2,159.66, makes a

total balance on hand at the present time of \$4,546.19.
Your Committee had the pleasure of welcoming a deputation consisting of Messrs. R. H. Warden and D. J. McDonnell from the Home Mission Board, Western Section, at a meeting held in October last. Conference was held on the best methods of promoting the Augmentation work of the Church, and upon the desirability of its unification. In accordance with the intimation made to the Assembly last year, the question of the propriety of unification was laid before the Synod in October last, when the following resolution was adopted:—

"That while the Synod anticipates with pleasure the prospect of unification in the Augmentation movement, yet we are of opinion that such union should be postponed for one year, until the Scheme is more fully developed in the Maritime Provinces, so as at least to approximate to the dividend of \$750 and a manse."

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(East Section).

SUPPLEMENTED CONGREGATIONS.

As the object aimed at by the Synod has now been reached, your Committee have simply to report the fact and to leave the matter with the General Assembly to be dealt with as in it-wisdom may seem best.

Your Committee regret that they are not in a position to submit for the current year a list of the supplemented congregations with the grants required by them, for the approval of the Assembly. They are so deeply convinced of the importance of constantly increasing efforts on the part of the supplemented congregations themselves, and of the necessity of a steady diminution in the amount asked for, for the General Fund, at least for a few years, that they felt that some further time ouzle to be allowed to Presbyteries for the visitation of their congregations with the view of securing alarge a reduction as possible in the amounts asked for as supplements, and accordingly the Committee have requested Presbyteries to have all applications placed in their hands early in September Your Committee have, therefore, agreed again to ask the General Assembly for leave to deal with and to decide on all such applications, with the understanding that the regulations of the Assembly shall be carefully observed.

With reference to the question which may probably be raised respecting the likelihood of maintaining the position which has been gained in the Eastern Section of the Church, the Committee submit that in their judgment it would be impossible, or at all events extremely difficult to obtain annual contributions on the same scale as during the past year.

They think, however, that if supplemented congregations exert themselves so as to make a regular and moderate annual increase in their contributions for pastoral support, if Presbyteries exercise due caution in the erection of mission stations into congregations, and in the division of existing congregations, if they take order that even congregations, which have fulfilled the conditions be not recommended to a place on the Supplemented List, without the most satisfactory evidence that they are contributing as largely as they might be fairly expected to contribute; and if the Supplementing Committee were clothed with such powers as would enable them to secure the fulfilment of these conditions, it is believed that it would be quite possible to realize an amount from year to year which would secure the continuance of the minimum to all our pastors. Your Committee at this early stage in the history of the Augmentation movement would, however, desire to speak the prospects of permanent success with caution. They would commit the cause which they have at heart to Him who has so freely spread abroad the spirit of liberality during the past year, and they would pray: "The Lord keep this thing for ever in the imaginations of the thoughts of the heart of His people, and prepare their heart unto Himself."

All of which is respectfully submitted.

### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

### (EASTERN COMMITTEE.)

The Committee in submitting their Annual Report, desire to present first a statement of matters of interest and of business, drawn chiefly from their own minutes, and secondly to review the work done by the missionaries as shown in their reports.

### MR. GRANT'S VISIT.

At their first meeting on July 22nd, they enjoyed the high gratification of meeting and welcoming their esteemed missionary Rev. K. J. Grant, who, with his wife and family, had returned to spend a few months among their friends for rest and change, and to further as far as possible, the objects of the Mission. In reviewing before the Committee the work of the year in frinidad, M. Grant asked and readily obtained permission to raise a balance due on the new Church building at Oropouche, amounting to \$600, an object which had the sanction and recommendation of the Mission Council. In furtherance of this aim, after receipt of a good collection from the people of New Glasgow, he visited the two congregations in Newfoundland, and so liberal was the response, that the object will wellingh accomplished; what was lacking, being furnished by the willing hearted people of Maitland, Milford and Gray's Riiver. Before the middle of October Mr. Grant was at New York, on his return, having limited his furlough to six months.

### MR. CAMPBELL'S VISIT.

Rev. J. Fraser Campbell also spent a portion of the summer in the Maritime Provinces, visiting most of the congregations in Cape Breton, early in the season and towards the close of summer, accomplished a tour of visitation, chiefly in Picton County, holding joint meetings of congregations, within and without the Union, with excellent effect, and extending his visits from Truro, along the Intercolonial to St. John west, and to Campbellton north; being everywhere received with the greatest cordiality, and heard with satisfaction and profit.

### MR. ROBERTSON'S WORK AND DEPARTURE.

Mr. Robertson having accomplished the printing of the New Testament in Erromanga, and having returned from his Western engagements, placed himself at the disposal of t. e Committee for a season to visit congregations. A programme was drawn out for about two menths, embracing a series of visits in Lunenburg County, and other portions of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, which he accomplished with great enthusiasm and success. On November 26th, the Board, at a meeting at which he was present, passed resolutions expressing their sense of the value of his work, their gratitude at the welfare of himself and family, and with prayer, followed by a large and enthusiastic missionary prayer-meeting held in James' Church, New Glasgow, bade him an affectionate farewell.

His departure, however, was hindered by illness in his family, his children becoming shortly after this prostrated by measles, so that his departure had to be postponed till the end of the year. The recovery of the children, however, followed, brought about by the protracted labours and vigils of the mother, so that between physical exhaustion and mental strain, she, though reaching Montreal, was unable to travel farther, and for weeks remained so ill as to awaken grave fears of her full recovery. But the Lord's goodness was abundantly shown in bringing her to a bone of tenderness and love in Montreal, and in blessing the affectionate sympathy and ministry of the kind friends who watched over her there to bring about a recovery, sufficiently pronounced to warrant resuming the iourney. And so, by the good hand of God upon them, Mr. Robertson and family reached San Francisco safely, and when last heard from, wrote from Honolulu, and was able to write that Mrs. Robertson was daily gaining in strength; and it is probable that by this time they are on, or near, their loved Erromanga and receiving an enthusiastic welcome.

### MISSION OF REV. J. GIBSON.

While the last General Assembly was in session the Committee had offer of service for the Demerara Mission of Mr. John Gibson, a graduate of Knox College. In July he was unanimously chosen as a suitable missionary, and it was agreed that he should if possible accompany Mr. Grant to Trinidad to study the huguage, and observe and take part in mission work there just so long as desired by the Mission Council of Demerara. It was agreed that the Presbytery of Toronto be requested to designate and ordain him as soon as possible, and the 'Vestern Committee asked to pay the first half year's salary in advance, and the Demerara Mission Council the second; alt of which arrangements were fully and promptly carried into effect. Mr. Gibson has made good progress in the study of the language, and owing to the weakness of Rev. Mr. McLeod, has in large measure of late been doing the work of his district. The Demerara Committee's

correspondence being with Mr. Gibson direct, this Committee are not informed respecting the probable time of Mr. Gibson's commencement of work on the main.

### ADDITIONAL TEACHERS FOR TRINIDAD.

Later in the season, two lady teachers chosen by the Committee, sailed for Trinidad; Miscopeland to occupy in San Fernando the post of head teacher in the school, from which Micorsbie had, through ill health, retired; an I Miss Hilton to teach a school in Mr. Morton's district These arrived in good time to commence their work with the new year, and having been both successful Church workers in Nova Scotia the Committee has strong expectations of their suitability and usefulness.

### MR. GRANT'S HOUSE.

it being understood that Rev. Mr. Grant on his return, could not with safety to the health of himself and family, re-occupy the San Fernando Mission House, and an estimate being prepared of the cost necessary for the construction of a new one, the last General Assembly authorized the immediate erection of the building, and directed that \$2,500, the estimated cost, be furnished by the Western portion of the Church, and the money was paid over in good time. The Committee have to report in the General Assembly that after very careful consideration, the Mission Council found that it would be better, in every way, and more economical in the end, to build of solid concrete at \$2,000, than of wood at \$2,500, and assumed the responsibility of making the change. The difference \$500 remains thus far, a debt upon the building. There have been other changes rendered necessary, which it is expected will be provided from local sources, but the removal of the debt of \$500 is greatly to be desired. It is gratifying to know that the contract was faithfully executed, that the house has proved in every way satisfactory, and that it has added greatly to the comfort of the faithful missionary and family by whom it is occupied.

### RETURN OF MR. AND MIS, ANNAND.

The Committee have also had the pleasure of welcoming Rev. Joseph Annand and wife, after an absence of nearly thirteen years, of which three years were spent in missionary work at Tririke on the Island of Fate, and eight and a-half years at Anelgauhat, in Aneiteum, where Dr. Geddihad his years of labours and anxieties, but finally of success and joy. Mr. Annand arrived in Halifax on the 28th of April, and met with the Committee on the 28th of May, when a resolution of thanksgiving and of joyful welcome was entered on the minutes, and some time devoted to conference and prayer. The main matter of conference turned upon the propriety of having the whole population of Aneiteum, now reduced to tess than 1,000 persons, placed under charge of one man, thus releasing a missionary to labour on some other island. It was agreed that correspondence should be opened with the Foreign Mission Committee of the Free Church of Scotland looking to the accomplishment of this object in a way satisfactory to all parties interested.

### FEARS OF A FRENCH PROTECTORATE IN THE NEW HEBRIDES,

Rumours of steps having been taken by the French Government, and tacitly acquiesced in by the British ministry, or at least by the Foreign Secretary to assume a protectorate over the New Hebrides, having become very prevalent, the Committee at its January meeting gave earnest attention to this matter. The Committee approved of the correspondence already initiated by their officials, through Dr. Inglis formerly of Anciteum, with the Foreign Mission Committee of the Free Church of Scotland, respecting the best course of action in the circumstances. It appeared on inquiry almost certain, not only that the British Government had given no countenance to any such movement, but that no proposition from the French Government to that effect had been submitted for their consideration.

The following resolution was however passed: "The Board having heard with some degree of anxiety, rumours that the French Government intended to annex the New Hebrides, and that the British Government had consented to some such measure, agree that while satisfied from the latest telegrams that these rumours are not well founded, and gratified that the British Government still maintain their position, in reference to any scheme of French occupancy of these islands; yet from the past proceedings of French companies and individuals, feel it to be their duty to watch carefully over events in that quarter; and therefore agree to monoralize the British Government, stating the rumours with regard to the possibility of French occupation, shewing the work which missionaries from the Dominion of Canada had accomplished in New Hebrides, and arging the desirableness of having these islands preserved from French control and influence."

A Committee was immediately appointed to prepare a suitable memorial, which, through the Lieutenant-Governor and Governor-General, was forwarded to the Earl of Derby, from whom a reply has been received, containing the assurance that Her Majesty's Government will not fail to bear in mind the considerations presented, and referring to the views of Her Majesty's Government on the subject as expressed by the Under Secretary of the State for the Colonies, in a special delivered in the House of Commons on the 12th day of March, a report of which appeared in the Times of the following day.

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UNION OF FUNDS AND MANAGEMENT.

Respecting the wisdom of an immediate movement in this direction, this Committee has come to no definite conclusion. There is some difference of opinion, as there is also in the Muritime Synod, which has expressed its desire for delay, so that the subject may have further con--ideration, and so that action, if taken, may be cordial. As the Report of the Joint Committees, appointed by the last General Assembly will bring under review a definite plan, this Committee simply awaits the directions of the General Assembly on the whole matter.

The second part of this Report will present a review of the M ssion Stations and work on the

two fields under the Committee's charge.

There is nothing of a very striking character in be reported of this Mission during the past

year. Mr. Annand writes:
"We thankfully report that the work of evangelizing, educating and civilizing these natives is
"We thankfully report that the work of evangelizing, educating and civilizing these natives is steadily going on. The health of your missionaries has been good during the past year. Looking at the mission as a whole there is much cause for gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the success given. The central part of the group is now yielding the most fruit. Efate and Nguna are giving rich returns for the labours expended. At Havannah Harbour, Mr. Macdonald reports more than a hundred attending his candidates' class. Nguna gives nearly as encouraging a statement. While all along the line from Anelgauhat to Ambrim the cause is advancing. A church has been formed on Tongoa of eleven adult members, thus carrying the symbols of our Saviour's dying love, thirty miles further into the enemy's kingdom. It is nevertheless true that every foot of ground gained is vigorously contended for. In some places, for a time, the victory may seem uncertain, but in the end our side comes off conqueror.

### REV. J. W. MIKENZIE-EFATE.

Mr. McKenzie's estimate of the situation may be given in his own language:

"We feel much encouraged in our work. During the past year about seventy have renounced heathenism. About half of them belong to a mountain away inland, and have moved down near the shore, expressly for the Gospel. They have built a neat grass church, and have a teacher living with them. Some half dozen of them now attend the candidates class. The Fila people have also built a church and about a dozen of them attend the above class. Fifteen church members were admitted, two of them from Fila.

"I have much satisfaction with my class of young men. They render valuable assistance in many ways, such as teaching in the children's school, holding service on Sabbath at the nearer villages, itinerating with me, etc. When we went to the annual meeting I sent four of them to stry with teachers and assist them at their out stations. But although we are gaining ground from the enemy in so many directions, some strongholds still offer determined resistance. Nothing ago two teachers went to Meli, a small island in Pango Bay, about six miles distant. They intended remaining till the next day, which was Sabbath, in order to hold service, but they were told they would be cut to pieces if they remained, and they were shown the tomahawks with which they would be murdered."

Messrs, McKenzie and McDonald have decided, notwithstanding some dialectic differences among the people on the different sides of the island to make one translation of the Holy Scriptures, and Mr. McKenzie is engaged in preparing for the press the Gospel of St. John, they hope by united efforts to give the Efstese the New Testament in a few years. ### ANEITEUM -- ANELGAUHAT DISTRICT.

Mr. Annand's presence is sufficient reason for avoiding many details. About ten monthago he wrote that, though he had received 32 new members into Church fellowship in thirteen months, the Communion roll was diminishing, the cause being that the death rate far out numbered the birth rate, being as 99 to 17, and when to this is added the fact that about 40 young men had within the same time been drawn away to Queensland and Sandwich Islands, it will be evident enough that the upbuilding of that Church is a work of great difficulty. Still the Lord has been blessing his own work. Services are well attended, both on Sabbath and week days, while 13 attended Candidates' class. The people cheerfully wrought to finish the church with substantial settees, made from the native wood, and contributed of 1,000 pounds of arrow-root raised by themselves, to the support of the Gospel, worth about £50 sterling. Thirty ton-of Copra were made on the island and sold to traders, some Bache de mer was prepared for market, and four whale boats were manned by Anciteumese, efforts which indicate tendencies in direction of progress and civilization. Mr. Annand had the joy just before he sailed of receiving 17 new members into Church fellowship, and of ordaining 6 deacons, who it is hoped will prove a blessing to the Church

### ERROMANGA.

The whole Church has heard during the past eighteen months either from the lips of Mr Robertson or from his reported speeches the main facts about the Lord's work on Erromanga During the absence of Mr. Robertson his stations have been visited and the missionaries report that nearly all the schools have been kept open, and that the premises and things in general are in good order. During the two years of Mr. Robertson's absence, from 18 to 20 casks of arrow root have been raised, the proceeds of which will doubtless be devoted to evangelistic purposes, and probably in part at least to meet the expense of publishing the New Testament. For further information the Church must wait till Mr. Robertson reaches his station and reports himself

### THE "DAYSPRING,"

The mission vessel has as usual done her work, though the annual report has not yet been received. She has made her semi annual voyages to Sydney, and visited with the usual regularity all the mission stations repeatedly and some of the heathen islands. The Sabbath Schools, east and west, which regularly and cheerfully contribute to pay her crew, to provision her, and to keep her in good running order, may feel assured that the missionaries highly value the visits and work of the Doyspring and appreciate the gifts and efforts of the boys and girls who own and support her.

In this connection, some information will be expected respecting the proposed steamer; and the Committee think it proper that the simple facts should be stated. In 1883 at the annual meeting, the Mission Synod expressed the wish for a steamer if practicable, and proceeded to ascertain cost of construction and maintenance. In 1881 they had estimates for construction or purchase, but none for maintenance; whereupon they took measures for obtaining these, and referring them to the practical men at Sydney, who had charge of the Dayspring. So far the Mission Synod has made no appeal for funds to the respective Churches, and consequently no step has been taken in that direction by this Committee, nor so far as known, by any of the Churches now supporting the Dayspring. So soon as the Committee are in a position regularly to consider the matter, they will give it their best attention, and give due notice to the General Assembly and the whole Church

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### THE TRINIDAD MISSION

In their general report, the Mission Council say that "progress is noticeable in every part of the field and department of the work. During the year, some converts have passed away in confidence of a better world made theirs by faith in our Divine Redeemer; others have proved themselves worthy, amid the toil and temptations of earth. One hundred and fifty-two have been admitted to the Christian Church by baptum, twenty-seven couples have been united in Christian marriage, and forty-two sectools have been in operation during the year, with an average daily attendance of 1,307, and 1,362 on the roll at the end of the year."

They add, two new Churches have lean built, one at Oropouche and the other at Princestown. The cost of the former is included in the subjoined table of expenditure. The latter cost \$2.300, of which \$2,535 have been raised by a three-years' effort, partly in Trinidad and partly in Canada, leaving a debt of only \$215. The other points presented as cases for thanksgiving have already been noticed.

### IN MA, MORTON'S DISTRICT TUNAPUNA.

Sabbath services were held regularly at Tunapuna, Tacarigua and Arouca, and by teachers and native helpers at barracks, hospitals and outlying hamlets; and Sabbath schools conducted at the places named, and at Orange Grove, in which efforts Mr. Morton has had valuable assistants, Week-day services have also been conducted with diligence, and classes for workingmen kept up at all the schools, and over 40 have, in this way, been taught in reading and writing, besides gaining a considerable amount of religious knowledge. Mr. Morton bears testimony to the excelent work done by Miss Semple in Tunapuna School, and also at St. John Village near be Buildings erected. new school houses at Arouca and Tacarigua, and the dwelling at Tunapuna finished. Married, four couples; baptized, seven adults, nine children; Communicants in gool standing, thirteen at the end of the year; removed, two; died, two; suspended, one.

Mr. Morton considers that there has been marked progress in the spread of religious thought, and notes that through the labours of his female workers this advance is particularly marked among the women, whose attendance, in proportion to their numbers, has come to equal that of the more.

### MR. GRANT'S DISTRICT SAN FERNANDO,

Returning home in safety and resuming work, Mr. Grant notices with gratitude the completion of his fourteen years of mission service, the good work done during his absence by his brethren of the Mission Council, by Mr. Wilson, of San Fernando, and by his tried assistant. Lal Behar and other workers, and makes special mention of the attention of the Mission Council in so promptly and successfully carrying out the will of the General Assembly in providing him with an excellent dwelling. During the year there have been haptized, adulta, thirty-three; children, forty four. Several now under instruction seek admission to the Church, and many are seriously inquiring about Divine truth. The agencies to secure these results are summed up by Mr. Grant as follows: "Eighteen schools with a roll of 920 pupils and average attendance of 626; religious instruction given daily outside the schools. Several Indon trachers give instruction to adultation, who do a certain amount of school work daily, but whose principal power is in Hindi, not

in English, are teaching and exhorting from door to door, under this gallery or that tree, wherever a group or even an individual can be induced to listen to the wonderful words of life." By these galuable helpers set or stations are maintained and estate hospitals visited.

In this district, in common with the others, valuable aid comes from the circulation of Christian books and other forms of improving reading brought from India at a cheap rate, and diligently circulated. The missionaries have thus excellent religious truth translated, printed, and brought to their hands. Mr. Grant has also tried, and with some success, the experiment of teaching the scholars plantation work, by employing them one or two hours daily in the field, the object being to interest them in and prepare them for the work which jt is for the interest of the proprietors, of themselves, and of the country, that they should do

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The work of this most extensive district, including religious services on Sabbath and weekdays, Sabbath Schools and day schools, evangelical, educational and industrial. It very great, and most tax to the utmost the strength and endurance of Mr. Grant and his faithful assistant Rev. Lal Behan.

### PRINCESTOWN-BEY, J. W. M'LEGO

Though Mr. McLeod has been really for the year past, an invalid, as will subsequently appear, yet he carried on the work of his district successfully. Annayee did excellent service in supplying the different stations, assisted by Juraman, Soudeen Goban and Mahabir. Miss Black-adder, with the aid of Messrs. Brown, father and son, took chief charge of the Princestown Sabbath School. Estate services and schools were also kept up. The Princestown day school has again proved a success, as shown by result of fees received, and an honourable position has also been taken by the Mt. Stewart School. In Jour schools sewing is taught.

Mr. McLeod has his teachers under weekly training, and reports on their part excellent, cogress, and such being the case, advancement in the schools is what might be expected. The particulars are given in the tables.

Mr. McLeod, however, considered his great work was the superintendance, finishi—and opening, almost without debt, of the new Chirch at Princestown, known as St. Andrew's at a considering the basement and Sabbath school room, of \$2,500. The opening services were arranged with wisdom and carried out with success. The brethren from other districts gave present and and, and the effect on all classes was impressive and salutary in a high degree.

### COUVA REV. J. R. WRIGHT.

Mr. Wright gives thanks at the close of his first years services for health, hearty and ethcient service from helpers, and for progress. Regular service has been held in hospital and barracks, besides the Sabbath services, which have been well attended.

Members have increased, a teacher's house has been built at Milton, and school work prosecuted vigorously. Two schools, Esperanza and Calcutta, have been accepted on the Government list of accepted schools, and a new school, a branch of that at Esperanza opened new schools are called for at Spring and Perseverance, and a Canadian teacher for Exchange Village.

Mr Wright reports, baptisms, eighteen adults and eight children; marriages, five. The most clamant want of the district is a house for the missionary, the demand for which seems almost as urgent as that in San Fernando a year ago. The Mission Council, after careful examination of the premises, and of the whole situation, have agreed that a house should be built to cost \$2,500, that the Foreign Mission Board be asked to provide \$1,500 and to obtain a loan of \$1,000; which it is believed will be repaid with what will be obtained from the sale of the old house, and the land around it—the interest to be met by the letting of the old premises until a sale can be effected.

The Committee had great hesitation in accepting the recommendation of the Mission Council, not that they doubted its wisdom, but because there was an incumbrance of \$500 on Mr. Grant's house to be met. But as the correspondence showed that the health of Mr. Wright and his family was involved in their decision, they concluded finally that the only course really open to them was to accept the financial responsibility. The Committee hoped to be able to accomplish the object without any large draft on the ordinary fund, and when it is done, then all the four missionaries will occupy comparatively new and comfortable houses, and so far be rid of home hinderances in prosecuting their work.

### MR. M'ERGG'S HANKERS.

Reference has been made to the fact that for some time Mr. McLeod has been in delicate neath. During the past year it was known to the Board that his zeal was pressing him on to work beyond his strength. But at their meeting on the 21st of January, the real stuation came before them fully and officially in a communication from the Mission Conneil, telling of loss of strength, and giving medical testimony to show that he could not, with safety, continue to discharge all the duties devolving upon him as missionary at Couva. It appeared that the Council had requested Mr. Otheon to aid him for the time; and farther, "taking into consideration the state of Mr. McLeod's health, and the general needs of the island, and the special need of the systematic training of teachers, the Council agreed to ask the appointment of another missionary,"

It was then, after full consideration agreed "to express our deep sympathy with Mr. McLeod in the indisposition which necessitated the lessening of his missionary labours, our gratification

that for a time he will be relieved by Mr. Gibson's co-operation, and our profound regret that in present circumstances we do not feel warranted to take steps for the appointment of another missionary." The circumstances referred to were not merely that we had no money in fund, but no prospect of increase, and that we had no warrant to make engagements which the Church was not likely to discharge.

Mr. McLeod, on receipt of this reply, considered it to be his duty to tender his resignation, which, through the Mission Council and Presbytery of Trinidad, reached the Committee at its last meeting. Along with the resignation, the Presbytery of Trinidad advised, 1st. "That if the Foreign Mission Committee can possibly make arrangements to send a fifth missionary, Mr. McLeod's resignation should be accepted, only so far as his work at Princestown is concerned, and that he be appointed to train native agents," 2nd. "That that if a fifth missionary cannot be appointed, Mr. McLeod's resignation should be accepted to take effect from the date of the appointment of his successor, conceding to him the privilege of remaining and working for a few months longer, if the season of the year should prove unsuitable for his removal."

It was with deep regret that the Committee found themselves that up to the adoption of the second alternative, which leaves the native workers without the training which the missionaries desired for them, and Mr. McLeed without that kind of employment which possibly he might be able to follow out with advantage to the mission. The Committee would have greatly preferred the other alternative presented, but the state of their accounts at closing was not such as to warrant them taking the steps recommended. The situation may be thus stated:

For several years our expenditure has exceeded our income, and this process has enhininated in a debt of nearly \$2,000. One year ago extra expenditure was reported, involving a loss on the year of \$613.52 which, added to the previous debt of \$932.21, made a load to carry through the year of \$1,575.73. Four hundred and ten have been added within the year, though our income was \$17,707.55, a sum never equalled from ordinary receipts in the Maritime Provinces, and greater than the receipts of Ontario and Quebec for several years subsequent to the Union. Salary for a year and a-half has been paid to Mr. Robertson, amounting to \$1,557.34, and return expenses \$1,226 10, which, with specials, turn \$3,000. This expenditure is exclusive of large sums, about other three thousand, given by congregations east and west for special objects in New Hebrides and Erromanga, and from a few congregations east, to the Oropouche Church in Trinidad, which do not pass through the Treasurer's books.

By the kindness of a warm friend of Nissions, the Committee have the use of \$925,83 free of interest, so that they will pay interest only on half of the above balance, but that is a half too much, and the Committee asks to be relieved of the burthen as speedily as possible. They have in these statements, made clear their reasons for declining to appoint a fifth missionary to Trinidad to enable Mr. McLeod to devote the strength which the Lord has continued to him to the congenial and most important work of teaching and training natives for active missionary work in the schools

The Committee has noticed with pleasure the progress and interesting usefulness of woman's societies in the Lower Provinces, and gratefully acknowledges their co-operation and help. They would also make grateful mention of the aid of Miss Machar and other kind friends, Sabbath Schools and congregations in the west who have sent contributions for the Dayspring, and especially for Mission Schools in Trinidad. The work enlarges and He whose work it is, is saying to His people and Church in Canada, "Be ye also enlarged."

Since your Committee presented the last Annual Report there has been a great change in the aspect of the Mission field. Then all was peaceful, and there was a fair prospect of our being able to prosecute our work without any bindraness other than those which may always be counted upon in the introduction of the Gospel among those whose training, habits, and feelings are all antagonistic to its truth. But now there is war exerting its disastrons influence in almost every part of our field of labour. From the older provinces of our Dominion hundreds have gone to aid in quelling the Rebellion in the North-West, and zoo many of these have fallen in defence of their country. In Formosa there has been widespread fevastation, of the extent of which we are not fully aware. Some chapels we know have been de droyed, and upon some converts great cruelties have been inflicted. And even in India, as Mr. Wilson writes, there is deep uncasiness as to what may be the result of the Anglo-Russian complications. But the Lord reigneth, and He knows how to bring light out of darkness and order out of confusion.

### I .- MISSION TO THE INDIANS OF THE NORTH-WO T.

Your Committee, in reporting to the Assembly on this Mission last year felt themselves warranted in saying: "The work among the Indians is, in many respects, more hopeful than it ever was before. And the Committee are confident that they will be sustained by the Church in every effort to prosecute it more vigorously. Let these poor aborigines see that it is their happiness and welfare that we seek, in telling them the way of salvation through Jesus Christ." There are many things now which might lead us to a different conclusion. The prairies of the North-West, the homes of the settlers from the older provinces and the reserves of the Indians, are involved in the calamities of anarchy and rebellion. Where peace so recently prevailed, there has been the sound of the trumpet, the alarm of war. But, even amid the strife and the bloodshed, it may be seen that the Gospel of peace has prevented what might have been even more wide-spread disaffection, for the Indians who have been under the care of our own Missionaries, or of those of other Churches, have proved themselves loyal and law-abiding, notwithstanding many temptations to fall in with the insurgents. And your Committee believe that, in the sad events which we now deplore, the Lord is calling us to greater diligence and greater fidelity in imparting to those poor benighted tribes the knowledge which alone can lead them in the way of peace and eventasting life.

Among the Indians on Mis-ta-was-sis' Reserve there has been a good deal of distress, owing to the failure of their crops last year. Yet they are not murmuring. "Their chief, Mis-ta-was-sis," says Mr. MacKellar, of High Bluff, "is a noble Christian man. He takes a sensible view of all questions affecting his tribe. He and his people are loyal to the Government. He is a member of the church under the eare of our missionary, the Rev. John Mackay, who ministers to between 30 and 40 Presbyterian families, besides doing what he can in the way of instructing others who may be within his reach. Public worship is well attended, and Mr. Mackay says there are signs of spiritual growth among the hearers of the Word. There is a school taught by Miss Mackay with about 40 on the roll, and an average attend neer of 30. Mr. Mackay has had an unusual number of claims upon his charity, and he found to necessary, in consequence of these and other inevitable expenses, to ask an increase of salary. Your Committee did not see their way clear to the granting of this, but they thought it right to afford some measure of relief by making a grant of two hundred dollars to Miss Mackay, who had been teaching school without any remuneration.

Mr. Flett occupies Okanase, supplying six Stations. He has been a good deal away from home during the pust year, visiting or preaching to the Indians of other Reserves. It is a great advantage to him to be able to speak in English, in French, and in Cree. The removal of Mr. Flett from Okanase has for some time been in contemplation. It is felt that he could be placed with great advantage in a more extended field, and that some one could be found who might act both as teacher and preacher, or catechist, at Okanase. Good service was rendered during Mr. Flett's absence by Donald McVicar, to whose future usefulness his countrymen there look forward with much hope. Nothing has yet been done about the ordination of Mr. C. G. Mackay. He enjoys the full confidence of the brothren in the North-West. His health, however, has been very poor during a considerable part of the year, but Mr. Hugh Mackay believes that there is now a fair prospect of his restoration.

The Rev. Solomon Tunkansuiciye is still in charge of the little congregation in the Siona Reserve. The church there is believed to be growing in knowledge and in earnestness. It is said that family worship is maintained in almost every house. In the schools and other communities the liveliest gratitude is expressed for the gifts of clothing sent to them by the Ladies' Societies in various parts of Ontario.

Your Committee feel that the sad events of this spring, instead of deterring them from work among the Indians, should make them more assiduous in the prosecution of it. He in whose work we are engaged can bring good out of evil, and make even the wrath of man to praise Him.

There has been much disturbance and anxiety in the new territory occupied by Mr. Hugh Mackay. But notwithstanding all, Mr. Mackay has till very recently continued in his work, teaching, sometimes in the school, and when it was too cold for the children to come to school, from house to house. He has already acquired considerable mastery of the language.

Writing from Round Lake (Broadview) on the 13th of April, Mr. Mackay says: "On the last of March, I had to close my school a week earlier than I had intended. The parents were so much excited and so much afraid of trouble that they wished to have their children at home. I think they expected to see the rebellion extend to this quarter, and to see bloodshed on the right hand and on the left. On the following Tuesday, this message was sent to me by the Indians of these reserves: "We regard you as our friend; and for that reason we advise you to leave your home for some time, as we would not like to see anything happen to you." I thought over this message much. The Indians apprehend that they may be compelled by the insurgents to aid them in driving off or exterminating the white people. Over night I was alone. My interpreter's time was up; and he left that he should go home to his family who were afraid. The night was dark, and I was twenty miles from the nearest white settler. Looking up the valley, I saw a signal fire about ten miles away. I thought of taking my tent, and going up among the hills, and encamping for the night, lest a band should come to kill and plunder. I asked the guidance of Him who ruleth over all. Thisword was impressed upon my heart, 'The angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear Him, and delivereth them.' Then I felt with David, when he said, 'I laid me down and slept, for the Lord sustained me,' The morning dawned fair and hright, and all was well. The path of duty was clear. It seemed to me as if I could hear the direction, 'Stay: There are scattered along the line of railway many unprotected homes of the white man. What could these families do, if the Indians near them should rise in rebellion? They would only be an easy prey to the scalping knife of the savage. These Indians are ignorant, they have little idea of what is right, and they have no one to advise them but those who are their greatest enemies. Stay, and exert the little influence you have in persuading them to

"On Wednesday, I went to Broadview, and found the people much excited, and not a few of them anxions about me. They strongly advised me not to return; but at sunset I went into the wigwam of Ke-wis-ta-pa, a chief-twenty miles from Broadview, and had tea with him. After conversation he promised to remain loyal if possible. On Friday, I went to another village, and met an Indian coming to see me. He had bad news, he said they must go to war. I went with him to the village, and found the women and children gathered together; the women crying aloud, and saying that they would never again see those about to leave them; and the men preparing their gons, knives and dirks: great excitement among them all. I said to them, 'Don't go,' They said, 'The soldiers are coming, and will take us prisoners; and we would rather fight and die on the battle-field.' I said, 'If you put away your guns, and remain at home, there is no danger from the soldiers: if they take you they will take me, and I will go with you.' I was not a little astonished to see them take my advice and remain at home."

Last year your Committee had under consideration a memorial from Prince Albert anent the establishment by the Church of a High School there, and the appropriation of a portion of the Mission property there to its support, and came to this conclusion: "Intat such a school efficiently conducted is fitted to promote the interests of religion, to strengthen the cause of Presbyterianism in an important section of the North-West Territories, and to prove a very special benefit to the people of Prince Albert. 2. That the Mission property at Prince Albert was acquired, in 1806, for work among the Indians; that large sums have since been expended upon it by the Foreign Mission Committee; and that it cannot be legitimately used for a High School for the general population, unless the school can be made subsidiary to the promotion of mission work among the Indians. 3. That a school conducted under the auspices of the Church, and pervaded by thoroughly Christian influences, would not only prove a great benefit to the general population but also to the Indian Mission in training Indian youths and persons of mixed blood, who may be employed in the service of the Mission, or prepared for other walks of usefulness."

In this view the Committee were fully sustained by the General Assembly, which sanctioned the opening of a school in Prince Albert, in which, along with ordinary High School instruction to the children of the white population, adequate provision should be made for the education of Indian children free of charge for school fees. In accordance with the instructions of the Committee, such preparations as were in their power were made by the friends in Prince Albert. Messrs. McWillian and Sinclair, both experienced teachers, generously offered to give a portion of their time daily to the work of instruction until some more permanent arrangement could be made. The school was actually opened, but three weeks thereafter the unhappy rebellion in the North-West broke out. Mr. McWilliam in a hasty letter, of date May 5th, says: "The school-house and the cliniches of the town have been crowded with police and settlers flocking in. We have, of course, been compelled to discontinue all school-work; but we shall resume as soon as circumstances will permit. We have had no mail out or in for seven weeks. A sudden opportunity presents itself of sending you a line.

But I have little time to write, and situated as we are I cannot write with much comfort.

It is much to the credit of John Mackay's Mission that his people proved doyal and came in to Prince Albert.

The Missions of the various churches have shown the worth of the work done among them."

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### 11. -MISSION TO FORMOSA.

In consequence of the interruption to the work in Formesa, occasioned by the war, your Committee have not received the usual reports from the Mission there. In a letter from Hong-Kong, 22nd of October, 1841, Mr. Jamieson writes: "One morning recently Dr. Mackay and I were walking and conversing about the affairs of the Mission, when one of the converts came running up to inform as that several French men-of-war were approaching the fort. Next morning at 6.35 cannomading commenced. Firing lasted pretty steadily until about 11 a.m., when the forts were silenced. Fortunately no Europeans were hurt, nor any connected with our Mission. An order was issued by the British Consul that all women and children should leave the fort, it being considered unsafe for them to remain longer. Mrs. Mackay and their children, Mrs. Jamieson and myself, accompanied by two English ladies, left for Hong-Kong on the 12th of October." Dr. Mackay decided to remain for a time at least to look after the interests of the Mission. But he had, before that time, been prostrated by fever. His friends in Canada knew that he had been suffering, but none of them had any idea that he had been brought so low. He had recruited in some degree before Mr. Jamieson and his party left, but some time after their departure the fever increased and the symptoms became more alarming. He himself says, "After the bombardment of Tamsui, sleep, very little of which I had got for weeks, forsook me altogether; and for some days I lay unconscious." Mr. Jamieson says, "Our friends in Canada would not be surprised to hear of the illness of our devoted missionary, could they but understand the severe strain which has been upon his mind during these pact weeks; days of labour and nights of watching; hearing of the dangers to which the poor converts in the country were daily exposed, and trying every possible means of helping them, till his appetite failed, and sleep refused to come." Since Dr. Mackay's return from Canada to Formosa, he has apprintended, from the foundati

In the Hong-Kong Daily Press, March 25th, Dr. Mackay gave the following statement for the information of friends in that part of the world: "The work was never in such a prosperous condition as in 1884, before the French bombardment of Kelung. There were thirty-live chapels, with as many trained native preachers; twenty-six students in the college, and thirty-seven girls in the school at Tamsui. Upwards of one thousand had been baptized; and on the whole the people were never more friendly and well disposed. The arrival of the French changed the whole aspect of affairs. At once converts became objects of suspicion and hatred. Headmen who had concealed hatred came to the front and stirred up the masses. Villains living on the borderland near the savages combined to plunder; and almost with the first outbreak levelled seven chapels to the ground, looted the houses of converts, and beat many of them. All this took place in one district, being the one in which Tamsui and Kelung lay. According to latest accounts, the other two districts were still quiet. At Kelung, where there was a large congregation, there is desolation all around. Converts are scattered and hounded from place to place."

How eareful Dr. Mackay had been in giving instruction to the converts before setting out in his voyage, we learn from this: "From the very first symptoms of uneasiness," says he, "I had the conviction that there would be trouble with the French. I acted Jecordingly. Literally day and night I was engaged sending messengers at all hours, with instructions and to get information. Twenty times I sent my instructions in envelopes partly burnt, to show the urgency of the case, according to the Chinese custom." And how cheering to find that he can say, writing from Hong-Kong, "A-Hôa received my instructions in every particular. He asks for more." Letters from Dr. Mackay, Hong-Kong, March 12th and April 6th, give details as fully as in the circumstances they could be given: "March 12th Tl. day before yesterday I got a letter from A-Hôa, my first convert, at Tamsui . . . State of affair in North Formosa. I. No more destruction of chapels or interference with converts. 2. The few foreigners that are there are treated kindly by the Chinese. 3. About 8,000 French at Kelung, and nearly twice the number of Chinese harassing them. 4. Otherwise all quiet; but no mission work could be done at present. If I were in Formosa now, and beginning to go among the soldiers at Tamsui and Kelung it would occasion excitement and raise suspicions that would seriously interfere with the future of our work. Many of the people are up in arms. The wisest, best, and most prudent attitude for the converts is to keep quiet and be careful; just what they are doing. . . 5. Great changes will take place before this reaches you. Still, as there will be no change in the Lord of Hosts, I ask every soul in dear Canada who loves the Lord Jesus to pray for poor oppressed Formosa: I mean prayer with the heart, not mere words, but fervent believing prayer. . . Let there not be in Canada a single word about discouragement, not one word of fear or of sentimental pity. Rather let there be a healthy, robust, and vigorous faith in Him who leads us under the bloo

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am ready again by God's grace and help for counting bricks, for weighing lime, for erecting chapels, for travelling over mountain and valley, for preaching and teaching, as in the past. . . . Let us stand true as the everlasting hills in trying times. Never let it be said that we work and toil and give only or war, but only for an opportunity of returning to beloved Formosa. Mr. and Mrs. Jamieson are busy studying the language, which they can do better here than they could at Tamsui in existing circumstances. . . . I am drilling two students here every day, and am strong again. It is trying to be away from the dear converts; but God reigns."

Since these communications were received, a telegram from Dr. Mackay lets us know that he has had the desire of his heart granted him in being enabled to return to Formosa: "Tamsui, April 21. Got back. Converts faithful. Don't send missionary."

At every one of these places a native preacher or teacher has been labouring; and your Committee cherish the hope that, when full intelligence is received, it will be found that, in the most of them, the work has been going on even during the war.

### III. - CENTRAL INDIA,

Rey, J. Fraser Campbell, Mhow, who has been in charge of the Mission at Mhow for seven years, is still in Canada on furlough. He and Mrs. Campbell have, since their return to Canada, visited many churches in all parts of the Dominion; and, from the attention with which their addresses have been heard in congregations, W. F. M. Societies, and Sabbath schools, it is confidently hoped that the interest in Foreign Missions may be extended and deepened throughout our land. The Mission staff at Mhow is as follows:

It is probable that ere this time Mr. Builder has removed to Indore to take part in the work there, leaving Mr. Wilson in charge of the mission at Mhow. "In reviewing the work of the past yea," says Mr. Builder, "for the purpose of estimating its progress, there is a feeling of disappointment at the actual results, though this is greatly relieved by the many hopeful signs that have been observed. Some slight opposition on two occasions has been experienced from Brahmin ellicials, but this has been by no means the usual reception accorded to the preaching of the Word in the villages round about. Wherever the workers have gone they have been, as a rule, kindly received, and in many cases have been invited to come again and explain further the things concerning Christ. Several have come as earnest inquirers; some seeking the loaves and lishes; others for the purpose of disputation, usually asking the question, 'What is religion, and what is not religion?' and still others, more or less sincere, who shrink, principally on account of family ties, from the open confession of Christ. Concerning this latter class, Mr. Middleton, preacher, says: 'There are in Mhow many Hindoos and Mohammedans who are willing to be secretly haptized.' He even ventures to say that the area of says that the secret of says that the secret of says the says the secret of says the secret of says the secret of sa that there are a hundred such persons. However this may be, such willingness on the part of some, though unsatisfactory, is an indication of struggling towards the light, and we can only hope that their groping may issue in their finding Him who is not far from every one of us.

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"In connection with school work also the outlook is hopeful, but we are very much in need of off lient teachers. In two villages the Patels or head men give houses free of rent for school purposes, and other places are ready to receive us as kindly. Had we only a sufficient number of competent Christian teachers, we could very largely control the education of the youth in the villages at least. Public opinion is also growing in favour of female education. A short time ago the people in a village about one mile from Mhow asked that a girls' school might be opened, and we hope to comply with their request this month.

There are at Mhow 23 communicants (including European members of the staff); baptized adherents, 22; unbaptized adherents, 1; scholars, boys, 75; girls, 23. The contributions by native Christians have amounted, during the year, to 25 rupees; those of other friends to 550 rupees.

Though, as in former years, our missionaries have had to contend with difficulties placed in their way, both in the cantonment and in the city, they have in faith and hope been prosecuting their work. They say, with gratitude to God, that several changes have taken place in various ways, which have materially helped them, and made their position in the city better than ever before. Street preaching is not yet attempted, but all other kinds of work go on with comparatively little hindrance. Preaching, as will be seen from extracts from reports of the workers hereinafter iven, has been carried on in the camp, moballas of the city, station, and villages far and near; and, at all the regular services in the church, there have always been some outsiders present.

Non-Committee think it not out of place here to give a brief paragraph showing how fully Mr. Wilkie's time is occupied, and how great is the necessity for relief being given to him. It is from a peivate letter to the Convener, not intended by the writer for publication; but these few lines are extracted. "Let me give you an idea of the way in which I usually spend my time, not by way of parade, but simply to enable you to better understand the position. In the morning by eight o'clock, my patients gather, often to the number of twenty-live or thirty, to whom I must give medicine, often hardly getting through till alpant eleven o'clock my gather. After hastily taking my breakfast, etc., I go down to the school, where I work from three to live hours. Then follows the oversight of the press and workers, with arrangements about property, letter-writing, etc. On Thursday evening, prayer-meeting; on Sabbath, two services and meeting with inquirers. Denot think that I am, or have been, complaining of the work as too much. . . . . What I wish to show is that it is work which might be indefinitely extended . . . ."

In view of this the following extract from the minutes of the Mission Council will be readily understood: "Mr. Builder reported that, after time consideration of possible fields of labour, he chose hadore; and the sanction of the Council was given to his going there to begin work." This section of the Council has been sustained by your Committee; and Mr. Builder's field of labour will secondingly be Indore. In reference to this, Mr. Wilkie says: "The arrangement made by Mr. Builder and me is that he shall take the Educational work and I the Evangelistic, with press, melecal, and district work. This aducational work will include our High School and, if possible, a Norm dand a Theological School, both very much needed. As I may be needed and find time, I shall bely him in his work, and ho will bely me in mine."

In the Report of the Mission in Central India, the Trigh School at Indore is thus referred to: "We have been again and again urged to two our school into a college . . . and we have been promised twenty students to begin with. Until we have uore definite arrangements for the accommodation of the school, such an idea cannot be entertained; but, inasmuch as there is no college near us, and an increasing number of students every year pass the matriculation examination, it would be well to consider the propriety of occupying the ground. . . In the end of September we had terminal written examinations, and were able, through the liberality of a number of Hindon gentlemen and others, to give prizes to the successful competitors. We intend to have another examination in the second week of April, and hope again to be able to give prizes. The teaching is exceedingly interesting work, the boys being always greedy for knowledge, and most attentive and well-behaved. Though it is not such direct missionary work as preaching, yet we are just as surely letting in the light of knowledge, which ever tends to dispet the darkness of supersition." These studies are all conducted under Christian supervision and on a Christian basis. The school is opened and closed with religious exercises, including the reading and explanation of some portion of the Bible and prayer. The attendance is about one hundred.

Of communicants at Indore and Oojain there are (including European members of the staft) 42; under suspension 1; baptized adherents 19; unhaptized adherents 10; total Christian community 71. Of these there were added during the past year; Children baptized 2; baptized on profession of faith 3; from other churches 7; total 12. Lost by removal during the year 6; beaving the whole number as above, 71. "I have," says Mr Wilkie, "only three converts to report, two being Pajpoots, and the third; a Mahomedan, all full-grown men. Two of these belong to Oojain, and one to Indore; and they continue to live and work among their own people as before." But the progress of the Gospel cannot be measured by the mere number actually received into full communion. For there are many at the various preaching stations who are inquiring after the truth as it is in Jesus. So these in the actual membership do not by any means "represent all who seem to be very near the Kingdou, if not really within it; but it has been deemed better, by the exercise of care, to guart against the reception of those about whom there might be any doubt, than hastily to admit any who might afterwards feel that they had been deceived by us, when deceiving themselves in being baptized, and so being cut off from their own people without having any secure position among the Christians.

Our missionaries are at times gladdened by finding not only individuals, but whole familia-brought under the power of divine truth. "At Cojain there is one very interesting family, consisting of about twenty persons in all, of different generations, who are all except the wife willing to be received, and who have given great joy by their outspoken and faithful testimony for Christ. The father, being a Patel or headman of his caste, will in coming out evert a good influence over these under his authority." But on the other hand there are great trials, on account of which the heat: of our Christian workers there are often cast down within them. "Three of those," say they, " who were with us a year ago have sadly fallen; and at the present time two, viz., Yeshwant Rao and Mahabub Masih, are away from us. Mahabub professed ere going to his own home, sincere repentance, and begged to be again received; and Yeshwant has again and again, in the midst of many inconsistencies, professed his love for Jesus and his trust in Him as his Saviour; but concerning

both of these erring brethren we can at present only hope and pray."

To adapt their instructions to the circumstances and capacities of those among whom they live and labour, the missionaries, or those working under their direction have recourse at times to node-differing from those that are followed in the ordinary exercises of public worship. Some idea of one of these is given in the following extract: "Several have been received by certificate during theyenr. Gyanoba and his wife and blind Bartimeus were sent to us as workers by the Rev. Narayan Sheshadri. They (Gyanoba and blind Bartimeus) along with Govind Rao, form a native band, and exercise a wonderful influence for good wherever they go. Their singing and playing may not be very artistic, it is however very hearty, and, according to Hindoo taste, just perfection. One with his fingers plays at the same time two drums, one in his lap and the other on the ground; the second plays a one-stringed instrument somewhat like a violin, but having a bamboo for a handle, a goord for a body, a piece of tile for a bridge, and a brass wire for a string; while the third plays a small pair of native cymbals. Blind Bartimens is the leader, and from his experience as a Hindoo Sadhu before becoming a Christian, is well qualified for the position. They sit on the ground with the people scated around them, and then sing and speak alternately as long as their voices hold out. It is peculiarly native in every part, but just to that extent pleasing to the people. We also use the same in our Salbath services at times with the same beneficial effects; and we hope, as the and instruments can be obtained, to pay even more attention to this feature in the work."

It is pleasing to observe that the native Christian Church at Indore has during the past year met all the expenses of the congregation; paid for one copy of a Sabbath school paper in Marath, and for one copy of another paper; and supported the mission at Oojain. Their missionaries are Narayan and Chanoo, who report to the congregation every month. Their contributions amounted to upwards of 232 rupees. When the circumstances of the people are taken into account, and when it is remembered that the wages of a working-man may average a few cents per day, it will be seen that this is no inconsiderable sum. There were also received for the general work of the mission 75 rupees from W. C. Darling, Esq., and 160 rupees from Union Chapel, Simla, per Rev. J. Fordyes-For school (prize fund) 97 rupees were contributed by the teachers and by friends in the city. The Church has also in contemplation the calling and supporting of a native pastor; but they have not yet found any one whom they could invite to the pastorate.

As last year, the Christian workers have, as regularly as possible, come together every month for reports, examinations, exhortation, etc.; and every three months the sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been observed in this interesting assembly: thirty-three sitting down at the Lord's table the last time.

We should greatly misunderstand and underestimate the brock at this mission, if we supposed it to be confined to the work at Indore. At Oojain much is being done. Chanoo and Narayan, who have already been mentioned as missionaries of the native church, are teaching there. Narayan has a large school among boys of the higher castes. Chanoo has been teaching among the Mangs and Bhungis, and has been especially successful among the former. "Each time I have visited Oojain," says Mr. Wilkie, "I have been specially pleased with the results of their work. In all their schools the acquaintance with the facts of Christianity, and more particularly their knowledge of the nature and necessity of the atonement, surprised me: especially as these had been taught in such a way as to gain the affections of the people.

I was always met at the station by a troop of happy children that ran along with me to their school.

On entering the school, I was generally perfumed and garlanded.

Then followed the examination on subjects secular and sacred, with necessary remarks; and finally their very hearty salaams, the parents often forming as interested a portion of the group as the schoolars. On going from school to school, I have again and again been stopped by Hindoos and Mohammedans who were friendly, and invited to sit and talk with them for a short time, some of them always accompanying me to the station. When it is remembered that this is one of the most sacred, and therefore one of the most bigoted, of Hindoo cities, it will be understood what these two simple carnest men have done for the cause of Christ."

Vour Committee have much pleasure in calling attention to some extracts from the reports of the native Christian workers, given in at their last conference. From report of Narayan: "In the morning I go to my school at 7.30 and remain till 1.30 p.m. In the school Christianity is taught, and the scholars can now sing with me our aymns, repeat portions of the Old and New Testaments, and engage with me in prayer at the opening and closing of the school. . . . We have many opportunities of preaching the Gospel, and, after school is over, I do so regularly from shop-fronts, when invited, in the Bazaar, in private houses, and by the river side. During the year I preached 188 times, had 150 conversations, and taught Sabbath school thirty times. As Jesus helped me, I tried te tell others of His love. At first, when we began to sing hymns and teach Christianity, many of the people were very angry, but Jesus made their hearts soft." From report of Chanoo: "In the school among the Mangs the success has been uninterrupted, hoys and girls coming freely from the first, and making steady progress both in secular and sacred knowledge, the average daily attendance being sixteen. In a new school just opened the attendance is small, ten being the average as yet, but there is a fair prospect of increase. I teach the scholars hymns, Eible history, and above all the life and work of Jesus Christ. I believe some of the scholars have a saving knowledge of Jesus. In the evenings, sometimes alone and sometimes with Narayan, I go to different parts of the city, and, as opportunities present themselves, preach, or by quiet conversation seek to tell of the Saviour's love. On an average twenty-three people have heard me daily during the vern."

When the native Christians at Indore resolved to send Narayan and Chanoo to Oojain, the two schools which they had been teaching in Indore were thrown into on, and placed under the charge With a Hindoo assistant, Apaji, he has continued regularly to teach, with an average of Balaram. attendance of twenty-five boys. He thus refers to his work. Report of Balaram: "The school is opened with a hymn and prayer, and before closing I teach, on alternate days, the Catechism, Old Testament, and New Testament. As God gives me strength, I seek to tell about Jesus Christ. Many profess to believe what is thus told them, but from fear of their companions they do not follow has a leading a good land of their companions they do not follow desits. Balaram has also done a good deal of evangelistic work around Indore, going out to different villages, some of them six miles from the city. "I begin," says he, "by singing a hymn, and then villages, some of them six miles from the city. "I begin, says he, "by signing a hymn, and then make such explanations as seem necessary. The village people have always heard me gladly. Some few have said, 'Your teaching is true,' and have largely left off poojah and the worship of stones; while others, though listening with apparent attention, do not head the message. In one village near Indore the people, Nicodemus-like, asked me to teach them at night, as they wished to know more about our religion, which seemed to them to be true; and they continue to manifest much interest in what they hear." From report of Govind Rao: "I have throughout this year, till the menth of January, morning and evening, gone out regularly to preach in different places in the camp, in the mohallas, in the city, and in the villages round about. On an average thirty-seven men heard me each day. I have met with but little interference, except when I attempted to preach on the street or from our house in the city. I have always taken with me books and tracts for sale," From report of Gyanoba and Bartimeus: "We joined the Canadian Mission in January of this year, and since then, by singing and preaching, we have tried, so far as we could, to tell the story of We, along with Govind Rao, spent two months in the district work, visiting in all eightyeight villages, and preaching to 3,779 people. Everywhere we were kindly received. . man decidedly came out as a follower of Jesus in one of the villages where he still lives and works; and in several villages are those who profess to believe in Christ, though not as vet openly. We hope again in the month of May to revisit those who seemed to be awakened to a sense of their sins and their need of a Saviour." These reports of the native workers were given at the conference in the vernacular. They have been translated by Mr. Wilkie freely, but not so as to embellish in any way the simple narratives.

The Christian women who have gone out from among ourselves are prosecuting their work with self-denying zeal. He "whose they are and whom they serve" is sustaining them by His grace, and crowing their efforts with a success for which they praise His mane. Miss Rodger in her report says: "During the year the work has been carried on very much in the same way as in previous years; and there have been evident tokens of God's favour. The school of which I have charge has more than fulf fled my expectations, and has grown to twice its original size. . The number on the roll is over eighty, with an average attendance of between thirty and forty. . The work among the women has also become encouraging, and their prejudices are breaking down. Between forty and fifty families are accessible, but not more than half that number can be regularly visited, especially as those families that have been visited for years expect me as often as twice a week, and some of them are not satisfied unless some portion of the Gospel is read to them.

Two native Christian women assist in the school, and one of them has also visited several Zenanas. The message of God's love has been repeatedly told to these women in their dark homes, and the entrance of His word giveth light. Besides we have the assurance, 'My word shall not return unto Me void,'" "The pupils in my school," says Miss Ross, "are steadily improving. The parents are

anxious that their sons should be educated; but they think it a great mistake to educate their daughters; and consequently it is not an easy matter to induce them to allow their daughters to come to school. . . . 'What benefit is there in teaching them to read?' is a question often asked. The last time it was put, I thought it best to appeal to themselves, and enquired if they thought there was any benefit. 'I can now count the pice when I go to market,' replied one. 'I can read about Jests, said another. And third, with great expression in her face, said, 'Jesus answers my prayer.' This is a woman of over thirty, who began coming to school some months ago, and is now reading in the second book. She is the only one who has been glad of her opportunity from the beginning, . . . I have taught Sabbath school in the same naming and the same varieties and the same varieties to be well attended. . . . Twenty family women's meeting has also been begun, which promises to be well attended. . . . The statement is often lies have been visited with more or less regularity during the year. . . . The statement is often made, 'Our religion brings us no pleasure; we are glad to hear about the true God; but if we become Christians, our friends will cast us off.' There are many, very many, in India, who are be nd with cords of fear. May there be an outpouring of the Spirit upon them, and then they will be enabled to east themselves on Jesus Christ alone for salvation.' Mrs. Builder, in writing about the purely of the Spirit upon them. the work at Indore, says: ''... Miss McGregor has thus far been allowed to carry on her several schools in the city without much interference; she en ploys native teachers and visits each school to give religious instruction. In addition she has a kind of normal class for training teachers and Bible women. I happened to be visiting at her bungalow one day while she was teaching it. Their attention and earnestness were pleasing to witness; they sang the hymns apparently with much heart.

It will be remembered that Miss E. M. Beatty, a graduate of the Women's Medical College, of Kingston, was sent out last year as medical missionary to Central India. It gives your Committee much satisfaction to know that her services are already highly appreciated by those among whom she is labouring. In her report she says: "I have not much to tell, because I have not done much my time having been mostly devoted to the study of Hindi. Just now my medical work takes a good deal of time, because the greater number of my patients have to be visited in their houses. have treated about forty patients; the greater number of these are subjects of chronic disease, and can be reported only as relieved. One death has occurred. All the other acute cases have either been cured or are progressing fayourably at the present time. My patients are of all classes, from the paper to the princess, and from sweepers to Brahmins. I have been very kindly received wherever I have gone. In some places the people express deep gratitude to God for having sent me among them. The native doctors whom I have met have treated me with the utmost kindness and courtesy. I was called to see a woman in a Brahmin family. I found her very dangerously ill, anfound it necessary to visit her twice a day. So much attention seemed to rouse suspicion as to any motives, and I was rather coldly received. I asked for a consultation. Two days after they call I in Dr. Ganpat Sing. In the meantime the patient had been steady improving. This fact, with Dr. Ganpat Sing's very decided approbation of the treatment I had adopted and some strong advice. them, and are moreover rather active in finding more patients.

The Foreign work may be summarized thus: Three Schools for our own Indians in the North-West; One Girls' School in Formosa; Six Schools under the care of our Ladies in Central India: Six Native Teachers assisting in these Schools; Two Bible Women; General Missionary work in Hospital, Villages, and Zenanas; Three Lady Missionary Teachers; One Medical Missionary; One Lady really for the work; One Lady in Canada receiving medical education; Donation for Trinidad

There has been a large outlay during the year for buildings already erected, or being erected now, in Indore. But the Mission Council was strongly and unanimously of opinion that the expenditure was absolutely necessary. The sum of fifteen thousand rupees (or 86,000), together with seven thousand rupees (or 82,800), which the Council had been previously authorized to expensary for the erection of three bangalows, two for lady missionaries, and one for Mr. Building and a dispensary for Miss Beatty. It was represented by the Council that, for twenty-two thousand rupees, buildings could be erected which, a year hence, would probably cost twenty-five thousand "Another reason," says Mr. Builder, "for rushing on this work now is, that Mr. Fraser Camplewill soon be in Mhow again ready to take up his work, setting me free; Ir. Wilson also will be ready for some work; and no possibility of any of us going to Indore, where help is most needed, and the field the largest. The money must be granted, or at least two missionaries will be comparated by ille in a few months, say by November. An answer by cable was urgently requested, so the buildings might be in a proper state of advancement before the setting in of the rainy seaso. In the distance of the case, and in reliance on continued efficient aid from the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society which granted the first seven thousand rupees above referred to, the Committee have thought it right to sanction the outlay. This is an item of expenditure like to which none may be reckoned upon for several years to come.

# MISCELLANEOUS.

The Congregation of St. Paul's Church, Montreal, have intimated their readiness to support a missionary in Central India. The Rev. James Barelay, paster of the church, writes: "Of contact the appointment and supervision of the missionary would be entirely in the Committee's hands. We would furnish the annual income, and he would be in a special sense our missionary. No guarantee can be given except the Christian liberality and sense of duty of the congregation of which I have little bear." What is specially note outly in connection with this liberal offer is, Mr. Barelay's expectation that the ordinary contributions of the church, including even those to the Foreign Mission Fund, will not be affected by it. # REPORT OF THE

# BOARD OF FRENCH EVANGELIZATION

OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA.

In reporting to the General Assembly the work of the Board for the past year, it is deemed proper at the outset to direct special attention to the legal status of the Church of Rome in the Province of Quebec. The injurious spiritual and moral influence of its teachings are well mown, but the facts regarding its establishment and growing power in this country are less charly understood. It may be said, in a word, that Romanism, which is coming more and more to mean ultramontanism, has in this Province all the strength and stability which can be derived from civil law, a powerful priesthood, enormous wealth, a vast array of thoroughly equipped ecclesiastical institutions, and the ready services and support of the Local Legislature. It is impossible to state precisely, or even approximately, the revenues of the Roman Catholic Church, which are drawn from the people to an oppressive extent by the exercise of legal and spiritual power. In proof of this, reterence is made to the following points:

### LAW OF TITHES,

Tithes were first established in France by an ordinance of Charlemagne about the year set, and continued to be exacted until 1779, when they were abolished under the Republic by a decree which provided that the Roman Catholic clergy should be support all by a salary granted by the state. In the Province of Quebec, by the edict of May, 1679, the tithe was fixed at the twenty-sixth part of the yearly produce of the land, and of the increase of the stock fed from the land. Subsequently, by Decree of the Council of Tate, July 12th, 1707, the tithe or edime—was fixed definitely at one twenty-sixth of grains only, to be harvested, threshed, winnowed and delivered at the priest's parsonage. On the conquest of the Province by Great Editain, in 1763, it was provided by the 27th Arta le of the Instrument of Cession that Roman catholics should be obliged by the English Government to pay their priests the tithes and all the taxes they were used to pay under the Government of Tate.

Accordingly by Act. of the British Parliament, C14 Geo., 3 ch. #3), passed in 1774, this provision was ratified, and the clergy of the Roman Catholic Church were authorized to a hold, receive and enjoy their accustomed dues and rights, with respect to such persons only as should profess the said religion."

Thus the matter stands to this day, so that a Priest has a direct action at law against members of his parish for the collection of tithes and church dues, and the people have no option in this respect.

Among other sources of Ecclesiastical revenue, additional to the tithes, may be mentioned income from personal property, rents of improved real estate, ground rents, charges for prayers offened for souls in purentory, and for church ceremonies at baptisms, marriages, and burials. A special tax is often levied in cities and towns, and sometimes in country places when the tithes are small and regarded as insufficient. There is no law to enforce whitax, but it is competent for the priest to refuse to say mass or perform some religious enough until it is paid. But the largest and most oppressive assessments are usually made in connection with the

### CONSTRUCTION OF CHURCHES, RECARS, &c.

The legal power conferred upon the Romish Hierarchy for these purposes is practically unlimited. In the Consolidated Statutes of Lower Canada, Chap, 18, it is provided that on a patition being presented to the Bishop of the Diocese, by a majority of freeholders in any Parish, for the construction of a Church, Chapel, or Parsonage-house, he shall proceed to a final decree in the matter according to the ecclesia-tical Law and the practice of the Where church extension is desired by the priesthood, no difficulty is usually expesenced in procuring from the pare bronce the new ary petition. Something more than catle pressure can be brought to bear upon them through the Confessional, and a threat of withholding the Steraments, which is equivalent to cutting off the only means of salvation and involving them in eternal ruin. The Bishop determines the style and cost of the building t be creefed. To meet this, a tax is levied upon the property of the faithful and collected, I need be, by legal process. The Statute in this behalf has been repeatedly amended giving calaized powers to Fabriques to expropriate land for Cemetery and other Church purposes. It is by the practical working of the provisions of this law that the spectacle is furnished in every part of the country of magnificent churches, parsonages, we, surrounded by the cheap ad shabby dwellings of an impoverished people.

### CHARGES FOR BAPTISMS, FLYERARS, MASSES, &c.

Each Bishop determines these for his own Diocese and therefore prices vary. The fees

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for funerals are made a matter of agreement between the parties concerned and the Church authorities, and they are so arranged, expecially in case of extra masses, the use of large bells, decorations, &c., as to yield the elegy immense revenues.

Some idea may be formed of the annual income from this source in the Parish of Montreal from the following scale of charges: - For ringing the bell - at haptism, when performed in the

Church, \$28, that is \$20 for the great bell and \$8 for the three smaller ones.

For funeral ceremonies in the Church of Notre Dame, the prices range from \$350 to \$15. there being nine classes, graded according to their monetary value. Three kundred dollarcommand an elaborate service, embracing ringing of the great bell, and the ten smaller one high mass, with a full display of the sacred silver, vases, we gold embroidered ornaments for seven altars, a choir, one hundred and eight silver-plated candlesticks, with candles, 36 choir boys, headle and priests. The charges for funcial ceremonies in the Church of Notre Dame tor a child under seven years of age are, first-class \$3% second-class \$20, third-class \$19 fourth-class \$5. We must add enormous amounts drawn for mane said for the repose of souls of deceased relatives, which are repeated year by year, as long as funds at a forthcoming to pay for them. And so great is the demand for masses in the Province of Quebec that the priests, a large and ever increasing army, as it well known, are unable to find time to say them all, and therefore employ as their assistants priests residing in France, who draw an income from Canada for performing this work. I mally, the Board of Trustices collect, many of the edues and accounts for them to the parish priest, but frequently the priest collects them himself, giving an account to the trustees; and just now there is a struggle going on, which is in harmony with the spirit of the whole system, to take the management of the Church tempomilities enturely out of the hands of laymen. Recently, as the outcome of the celebrated Guibord case, the Parliament of Quebec passed an Act Asi Vic. chap. 19) to prevent all conflict between the civil and ecclesiastical authorities, respecting burials and Boman Catholic cemeteries, which is done by simply giving the church absolute control in these matters.

### HOLIDAYS, EXEMPTIONS, EDUCATION, &C.

Over and above the direct monetary assessments referred to, there are other burdens laid upon the people which are to be taken into account. The second article of the Queber Codo of Civil Procedure provides for the observance of about two weeks, annually, of pecial religious holidays, which is a serious inroad upon the earnings of working men, and an obstruction to the general course of business.

It is well known that the church owns properly, amounting in value to untold millions of dollars, all of which is exempt from faxation. She is constantly adding to her wealth, drawing revenues, as has been shown, from many sources, freely using the power of civil law to promote her own ends, controlling not only the Parliament of Quebec, but even the legislation of the Dominion by holding the Lalance of political power through her submissive votaries, and yet contributing nothing to the maintenance of the machinery of government.

So far is the education of Romanists in the Province of Quebec is concerned it may be said to be wholly in the lands of ecclesiastics. It is thoroughly permeated, from the most elementary to the highest departments, by the sperit and principles of ultramontanism. And the spacious Numerics, which receive so many of the daughters of Protestants, and in which thousands of pupils, in the hands of shifful nums, are being moulded by the same power, are subject, as a rule, to no public inspection.

But why preface the record of our year's missionary work with these details? Because it is believed the information is needed by very many persons in Canada, and because in spite of all our efforts and their undeniable success the system which carries with it all the cyll-hinted at, and many others even more deplorable, is spreading and strengthening itself in

every part of Quebec and beyond its limits.

As an instance of this, it may be mentioned that last month public meetings of the Protestants of the County of Megantic were held in Leeds, Inverness, Kinnear's Mills, and South Ireland, to take steps for the formation of a Colony near Calgary, in the North West Territory. Resolutions were passed declaring, among other things, that many English-speaking people had already left the County, that resident farmers were about to leave as soon as they could dispose of their property, and that this was due to the fact of the rapid increase of French Canadians within the last few years, rendering educational advantages and control unsatisfactory. A similar influx of this people is taking place in Eastern Ontarro, in the Counties of Prescott and Glengarry. They are aided in this movement for displacing Protestants by the Church, which directs the work of colonization, whether carried on in name of special Societies by means of lotteries, &c., or by the Government of Quebec.

This is a matter of the gravest significance to our whole Dominion in many ways and particularly from a religious point of view. It touches municipal and educational interests, and is destined to affect most deeply the spiritual life of our people, for as stated in last years report, there is an unmistakable growth of infidelity among certain classes of the French (cople. The old fanaticism while not as wide-spread is as deep and intense as ever. Roman-

ism does not change. Ultramontanists cherish the dream that the French nations ity is to remain wholly Roman Catholic and to rule this Dominion. They do not hesitate to say, in unguarded moments, that even the disches Prote tants are only tolerated in the meantime in this part of the British Empire; and it they find mean through educational hardships, local persecutions and such like to drive out determined well taught thights-speaking Presbyterians is it surpling that they should be successful in doing the same to recent converts from among them elves.

It it be asked how are the crushing disabilities which have so long rested on this people to be removed? The miswer is, by teaching them, educating young and old, giving them the gospel of Jesu. Christ, that they may include the sparit of true freedom and rest themselves and cast off the yoke, demanding from Parliament the abolition of tithes and compulsory exactions of all sorts, and when all such laws are swell from our statute Book and the Church is thoroughly disestablished, and the people are set free, our whole Dominion shall have gained a boon of priceless value. Such a retormation is to be the outcome of the spirit of true patriotism and of true Christian beroism—that which animates the supporters of this mission and the colporteus, teachers and missionaries of the Board of French Lyangelization.


As in previous years, the work of the Board has been prosecuted by means of three agencies, viz., Colportage, Mission Schools, and Preaching Stations.


### COLPORTAGE.

Eight Colporteurs were employed by the Board during the past year, a number somewhat less than formerly. This was owing to the lact of funds, the Board being compelled to decline offers of service from several men with experience in the work. This, however is the E-s to be regretted because of the fact that the Montreal Auxiliary Bible. Society is now prosecuting the department of missionary Libour more vigorously than ever. The Society employed last summer seven French. Colporteurs, and this summer about the same number. By arrangement with the Board, they energed three of our Colporteurs and cent them into districts, to which, had they been in our - rvice, they would probably have been appointed. The Board are most anxious to increase their statt of Colporteus, because the planting of new mission fields largely depend; and a God, upon the faithful services of this ell-denying class of workers. It is encouraging to report that one gentleman. Mr. G. D. Fergusson, of Fergus, Ont -agreed to meet in tull the salary of a French Colpectour from the beginning of this year, and it is hoped that his past eworthy example will be followed by others, so that the Board may be enabled to accept the otters of service, from several suitable men anxious to be employed permanently in the work. One of our Colporteurs has for some time been labouring in the bounds of the Presbyt my of Glengarry, where the French - peaking population has increased reventy-five per cent, in the last ten years, and that Presbytery at a recent meeting resolved, not only to supervise his work, but also to make a special effort to taise sulficient money to meet his salary. Another of our Colporteur, is at pre-ent in the County of Essex, Ontario, labouring under the supervition of the Presbytery of Chatham, and the Board are about to appoint another to labour in the Maritime Provinces, with a view to the thorough visitation of all the scattered settlements of French-speaking people there Juning the year there were distributed by the Colporteurs and other Mi sionanes of the Board 2021 Billies, Testaments, and Gospels, 959 Pamphlets, and about 23,000 French Tracts, and other religious publications.




# IMAGE EVALUATION TEST TARGET (MT-3)



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# MISSION SCHOOLS.

From the following table it will be seen that there features in connection with the work of the Bward. Of the 707 pupils, 223 are the children of Roman Catholic parents, and fully four-hiths of the remainder are now 21 Schools, with 26 teachers and 707 scholars, or an increase of fully twenty-five per cent during the year. This is one of the most encounaging Last year there were reported 17 Mission Schools, with 22 teachers and 537 pupils. are the children of recent converts from Remanism:

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### POINTE-AL Y-TREMBLES SCHOOLS

The Central Mission Schools at Pointesaux-Trembles have had pechaps the most suca sful session in their history of upwards of forty years. There were in ally three hundred applications for admission. Of these it was resolved to admit a little over one hundred the rommittee in charge of the schools fearing to undestake the additional financial responsibility of a larger number. So urgent however were many of the applicants that it was eventually resolved to receive one hundred and twenty-two sas large a number as the buildings can accommodate with due regard to health. This number was in attendance throughout the ses-100. The pipels ranged in age from 13 to 2° years. Fifty of them were from Roman Catholic homes, sixty nine from the homes of converts from Roman Catholicism and three from other Protestant families. Satisfactory process was made by the pupils in their studies, and, above all, God very signally honoured the teachers in their citorts to lead the young people to the Saviour. The ordinance of the Lord's Supper was administered twice during the session in January, when eleven of the pupils professed faith in Christ, and in March, when other twenty-one publicly came out on the Lord's side. A weekly Prayer meeting conducted entirely by the pupils, was well maintained during the session and a manif -t work of grace was experienced.

At the March communion sixty sat at the Lord's table. At the close of the session a few weeks ago, nearly the whole of these returned to their homes in different parts of the country. Who can estimate their inflience for zood upon the members of their families and others with whom they may associate! The Church is fortunate in having the services of so taithful and self-carrifering a band of Christian teachers as those in these mission training whools. The Schools are worthy of the confidence and syr pathy and liberality of the friends of Christian fraction with the work during the last forty years. Two of the toll and means expended in connection with the work during the last forty years. Two of the torner pupils, who distinguished themselves as gold medalists during their course in McGill College, have just completed their theological studies in the Presidence and three of them are this summer engaged in Mission work. Others are being trained for Teachers.

The large addition to the number of pupils last session entailed a very considerable inser ase in the expenditure of the Schools but it is cheering to report that the full amount required has been obtained, and a balance of \$275.11 remains on hand at the close of the year.

### THE PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT.

This scholastic year has surpassed all those of the past both by the large attendance of scholars and the gratifying results of the work, which has been accomplished.

The increasing need of education among the French Canadians of Lower Canada and their desire to acquire it was shown to us last. Fail by the large number of applications for admission which we received. Nearly 20 hoys and girls desired to be admitted to our schools. There were accepted 122, though our buildings can hardly accommodate more than 10. Of these, 50 were children of Roman Catholic parents, and the others of converts, with the exception of three who were Protestants.

We would certainly have been able to fill up our Schools with Roman Catholic scholars, but experience has taught us that it is important to have a large Protestant element in our institution in order to exercise a strong influence over those who do not cherish our faith.

What would have been the joy and astoni-hment of the old missionaries who opened this hell about 50 years ago, and who foiled so many years without seeing the fruits of their hard labours, if they had seen our schools crowded with so many intelligent young people, many of them coming from districts where the mission work seemed to have entirely failed, and listening attentively to the teaching of the Gospel. The brave pioneers would cartainly have recalled with gratitude the commandment and promise of the Lord, "Cast thy bread upon the waters for thou shall find it after many days.

It is certainly surprising to see so many Roman Catholic families ready to send their children to Protestant Schools, and especially to Mr-suon Schools where their children are constantly under the influence of religious teachings opposed to their creed. Does not this last show how effective has been the work of the missionair among the people of this Province, and to what extent prejudices have been removed?

Many of those who have not enough faith, courage or light to abandon Romanism are, however, convinced that their children have nothing to lose by being placed under our religious teaching. The progress of the work has been such that, in this Province of Qseber when the population is almost entirely Roman Catholic, we can fill upour schools with Roman Catholic children when a other Provinces, the great majority of whose inhabitants are Protestants, we could leadly find a Roman Catholic in Protestant Schools or Churches.

Some poor families, though sincerely and firmly attached to Romanism, venture to send

us their children, in order to give them the advantage of a good education, which they would not receive in their own schools, to which only those who have means have access. As far as the poorer and lower classes are concerned, the priests pretend to give them an education. Quite a number of primary schools are open to them, but these schools are wholly under the control of the clergy, who are careful to see that the catechism, the resary and bits of Latin prayers are taught before anything else, and sometimes to the exclusion of everything else.

In their desire to get education more and more under their control, the clergy have lately made great efforts to induce the Government to close the Normal Schools. If this were done, all the children would be placed under the management of friars and nuns, and thus both superior and primary education would be under the immediate supervision of the Romish priesthood.

We certainly do not believe that it is right to give a free education to those who have the means to pay for it; hence, in our Mission Schools, all pupils are expected to pay according to their ability, and in this way they are taught to value the education which they receive They pay for their books and School requisites, and nothing is given to them in regard to clothing. While we note this progress over the past, we are glad to say that the amount received from less has never been so large as this year.

We never had a class of pupils more eager to learn, more studious and diligent. Their progress has surpassed our expectation. We are glad to see that emulation is increasing in our school, which, to a great extent, is due to the monthly examinations conducted by members of the Board. At the same time a laudable ambition pushes ahead our young people; and during the past, few years, it is surprising to see what; large number of them, through the greatest dimenties, have completed their studies in various colleges and have embraced liberal professions.

When our pupils leave us they manifest the interest they take in the prosperity of our Schools, as well as their high appreciation of the advantages they have received, by working among their neighbour, in order to induce them to send their children to Pointe-aux-Trombles. Pupils who had come to us Roman Catholics last year came back this session, some of them bringing with them two, three, or four new scholars cach.

Before leaving the school each scholar is provided with a new Bible and some tracts to read to his parents or distribute among his neighbours, so that every one of them can do some missionary work during the vacation,

During the past session the Spirit of God has worked mightily amongst us, and we have never before witnessed more spiritual life among our young people, especially among the girls. Thirty-one pupils have since January last accepted Christ as their Saviour, and have confessed Him publicly. May the Good Shepherd watch over them, and keep them in the path of laith and truth, so that they may glorify His name by their holy lives.

In closing this report we desire to express our deep gratitude to God, who has been so visibly with us and has blessed our work so abundantly. We desire also to thank the friends of our Mission whose liberality has generously increased in proportion to the number of our pupils.

# MAINTENANCE OF THE POINTE-AUX-TREMBLES SCHOOLS.

As stated in reports of former years, after deducting the fees paid by the pupils, and expense of repairs, &c., the average cost to the church of each pupil is about \$50 per session. The Board are most auxious that the institutions should be supported by means of scholarships of \$50 each, guaranteed by private individuals or Sabbath Schools. A particular pupil is assigned to the donor of a scholarship, to whom reports as to the progress made are forwarded from time to time. In this way a Sabbath School, contributing a scholarship, is put directly in correspondence with the Mission School, and the letters, if read publicly to the Sabbath School, tend to keep up their interest in the work. Moreover, the school can every Sabbath remember by name, in its prayers, the pupil it supports, and can scarcely fail itself to receive benefit by being thus directly brought into contact with the pupil educated by means of its missionary contributions.

### LIST OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

The following is a list of scholarships received or promised by Congregations, Sabbath Schools and private friends, to all of whom the Board extend their cordial thanks for their generous contributions and warm sympathy. They confidently hope for the continuance of these, and they carnestly solicit generous help from other friends and Sabbath Schools, so that they may be able to extend the benefit of the institutions to a much larger number of pupils. New buildings for the extension of the work are urgently required.

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It is very much to be desired that some of the friends of French Canadian Evangelization will furnish the Board with the means wherewith to erect suitable buildings. Few better inyestments of the Lord's money can be found anywhere.

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### NOTES REGARDING FIELDS.

The annual reports of the missionaries of the Board furnish ample evidence of the progress of the work. The following notes are culled from these reports:

New Glascow, &c. The Rev. M. F. Boudreau gives several incidents illustrative of the benefits derived from the distribution of Bibles in former years. He speaks encouragingly of the pargress made, and refers to one of his meetings at Abercrombie lately, when four of the converts spoke, and five led in prayer, thus strengthening each other in the Divine life.

CANNING STREET, MONTEFAL.—The Rev. A. B. Cruchet reports the loss by emigration during the year of twelve families and fourteen communicants, and the gain—chiefly from the Church of Rome—of eight families and ten communicants.—The attendance of the membership is more regular than heretofore, and family worship is observed in many of their homes.

GRENVILLE. -The Rev. R. Hamilton mentions a fact showing the result of the influence exercised in the Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools. A boy belonging to a Roman Catholic family in the district, who never was in church before he attended Pointe-aux-Trembles last year, now comes to church and sometimes brings a Roman Catholic friend with him.

St. Valerien.—The Rev. J. Vessot reports 215 visits to Protestant and 390 to Roman Catholic homes during the year. Recently two families renounced Romanism through his instrumentality, and connected themselves with his mission.

ST. MARTINS, &c. The Rev. T. A. Bouchard says that generally speaking he now meets with little hostility or persecution. The great hindrance is ignorance on the part of the people, arising from the inability of many of them to read. To these who can read, religious books are lent by Protestant neighbours, and thus the seed is being scattered in many a home where the minister cannot well gain admittance.

ST. Francis District. The Rev. T. Charbonnell reports holding a meeting a short time ago, which was attended by seventeen adults, he ides children, all of whom, with two exceptions were Roman Catholics. At its close the most influential man of the district took him aside privately and asked a loan of a copy of the Bible that he might read it for himself. The mission school opened test Fall at Ditchfield is proving a blessing to the neighbourhood.

Grand Bend, &c. —The Rev. S. A. Carrière conducts a morning service in English, attended by 130 persons, and an afternoon service in French, with an average attendance of 70. The Salbath School has nine teachers and an attendance of 80, including the Bible class, which is taught by Mr. Carrière himself. He reports the Roman Catholics of the district as better disposel. During the year three of them withdrew from the Church of Rome, two of whom had regularly attended Mr. Carrière's services for twelve months previously.

ITALIAN MISSION, MONTREAL.—There are about 800 Italians permanently residing in Montreal, nearly all of whom are known to, and most of whom are visited by our missionary, the Rev. A. Internoscia, who labours with unwearied real to benefit them temporarily and spiritually. He has been instrumental in having a number of them undertake market gardening on a small piece of land in the outskirts of the city, and hopes in this way to build up a fair sized congregation in Montreal. He reports a slightly larger attendance at the Sabbath service, and feels more encouraged in his work. An Italian hymn book, with simple gospel songs, has recently been introduced in connection with his meetings.

QUEBRC. The Rev. Jos. Allard has been greatly encouraged in his labours during the year. He reports in detail a large number of interesting cases of persons, young and old, who have most of them given up the errors of Romanism and accepted the Saviour. An early opportunity will be taken of publishing Mr. Allard's report, the closing words of which are: "The outlook has never been so bright, and we are evidently on the eve of some great movement among those for whom we have laboured and prayed."

OTTAWA PRESENTERY,—The Rev. Dr. Moore thus writes:—"In our field I am glad to say that the prospects are encouraging. In all the Roman Catholic churches in the county special efforts have been made to prevent the people attending our services, and to keep the children from our schools. That these efforts have been in any measure unavailing is one of the signs that people are beginning to learn that Protestantism is a real religion, and that faught by many living examples they are slowly awakening to a spirit of enquiry and independence. There are now eight mission schools in the bounds of the Presbytery. Two new ones have recently been established, and another will likely be opened in June. In all these schools the attendance of Roman Catholic children will not be less than tifty. When it is remembered that in every one of the schools the scriptures are read daily, and in nearly all the Shorter Catechism is carefully taught, and that by teachers who have a true missionary spirit, it will require no argument to prove the importance and value of this agency. In Ottawa city the new French Presbyterian Church buildin, is approaching completion. At Masham two persons were added to the church, at L'Ange Gardien eleven, at Montebello two, and at Namur eight. In this latter field the Rev. I. Matthieu has gone steadily and prudently forward; three new schools have been opened, and there exists a quiet spirit of enquiry among the people of the whole district. The gains may seem small, but as the result of constant inspection and close personal contact with the work, I am convinced that the numbers reported from our stations give a very inadequate idea of the influence for good exerted by our Missionaries.'

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At a I towards pa STE. ANNE, ILLINOIS.—The Rev. C. Chiniquy reports that fifty persons have, during the year, found Christ, fifteen of whom are pupils at our Mission school at Ste. Anne. Vigorous etforts were put forth by the nuns to gather into the large new convent recently built in the town the children attending our school. These efforts have, however, proved userailing, and Mr. Chiniquy reports that some of the French Catholic children have left the convent and are now regular pupils with us. He refers to the Mission established less than a year ago in Chicago, where there are about 20,000 French Canadians, and where, in connection with his own and the Rev. Mr. Seguin's labours, about one hundred families have already left the Church of Rome. Speaking of the converted Priests' Home, Mr. Chiniquy says: "Two ecclesiastics of the neighbouring Roman Catholic College of Bourbonnais have broken their fetters and come to the Home, where they have accepted the truth as it is in Jesus. One of them is already preaching Christ with great success among the French Canadians in Green Bay, Wisconsin. The other, who is the nephew of one of the most influential priests in the United States, is now preparing Eimself to preach Christ and Him required."

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St. John's Church, Montreal.—The following is the report of Rev. C. A. Doudiet:—Some good friends of Missions, and even Missionaries themselves, feel tempted at times to be discouraged at what appears to be the slow progress of the Gospel among French Roman catholics in the Province of Quebec.

Killen, writing of the advance of Christianity between the 1st and 4th centuries, says. "That it moved on like the flowing tide, and yet its advance during any one year was not very perceptible. At the termination of the first century its adherents were, as yet, a little flock, thinly scattered over the empire."

The religion of a nation can no more be changed in one day now than it could then, and we have not Apostles like the twelve, to prove the claims of the Gospel among the heathen by healing the sick or raising the dead, as we read that Peter, John and Paul did. But if miraculous power is a thing of the past, the preaching of the Word of Life is still, and shall always be, to them that believe, the power of God unto Salvation; and if, instead of jealously comparing each year with the preceding one, we look at the work from period to period say each ten years—we would be astonished to hear that any one should talk of the work retrograding.

Fulling Mission Churches here is almost as hard a task as filling a sieve with water. Nor is it to be wondered at. There is no comfort here for French Protestants. They receive but scant ympathy from many of their English brethren, and they are branded by their fellow-countrymen of French descent, as traitors and apostates. With Protestant Ontario in the West, and the great Protestant United States South of them, why should they remain among functioal image worshappers? And thus, year after year, the exodus goes on, and the communion rolls of our French Churches show such emigration sufficient to change the membership almost totally in a very few years. We have seen in print, and often heard the statement, that the emigration of converts was a convenient way to account for the slowness of our progress. I cannot speak for the whole of our Mission Churches, but in the one specially under my pastoral supervision I find that, out of a list of one hundred and eighty communicants in 1877 or eight years ago, there are only morten left. And yet the membership is nearly as large to-day, and the number of adherents is much greater.

Some members leave without notifying the Pastor, or asking for a certificate. It is, therefore, not easy to account for every departure, but in those eight years one hundred and forty-five communicants have left the country, chiefly for the United States. If we add the further loss of thirty-five who went back to Rome, and twenty-one who died in the faith, it will be seen that one hundred and ninety-one people—quite a respectable congregation—all communicants at one time, have been lost to us, and that if, as some claim, we gained little or nothing, the Church would have closed its doors for want of a congregation. But, in the same period of eight years, two hundred and sixteen new members have been added by profession of faith, and also seventy-eight by certiheate, leaving, therefore, with the original nineteen members of the old list, a total of one hundred and twenty-two on the roll. Our Mission Churches must progress or die. There is no alternative.

The presence of our converts, like a leaven of truth, has made it possible to open a number of Mission Churches in the New England States, and many Pastors of Ontario could testify to the presence of French Protestants in their Churches.

But there is one aspect of our progress which is not enough considered. It is the greater accessibility of the people. In each of our Churches we have families, or portions of families, through whose help we get introduced to liberal minded. Roman Catholics. We visit them in a friendly way, and it is not long before they themselves ask us about our faith. Some believe, and of course others do not. There is nothing strange in this. The Apostles had the same experience. Thus I have access to at least one hundred and eighty families, Protestant and Catholic, or about four hundred and hity souls.

The converts do not contribute much for the support of the Gospel. This is regrettable, but it is true. The cause, however, is not found in any unwillingness to do so, but in their poverty. The lew who are in comfortable circumstances do probably more in this respect than many similarly stuated in English-speaking congregations, but they are too few to make up large amounts.

At a late meeting of the congregation, when a subscription was passed round to raise money towards paying the Minister's salary, thirty people, at most, being present, the sums subscribed

reached one hundred and thirty-two dollars. About the same number of people paid for the same purpose one hundred and nineteen dollars during the last year. But do the others give nothing? They do not average two dollars per communicant yearly, and not a few of the communicant receive help instead of helping us; more are so straightened in their circumstances, that a Minister would be hard-hearted who should go and press them for contributions. If it is asked, why, from year to year, we have so many poor people, the answer a sad one to give is, that many whom the Gospel has raised from poverty, and made what they now are, and what they would never have been without the Gospel, leave us and join English congregations, where the society is more fashionable, and where they will not be so much exposed to persecution and insult, as we constantly are in our poor chapels. There are instances of such people who never, whilst they were with us, contributed more than an occasional five cents on the plate, but who, upon joining English congregations, paid from five to ten dollars for each sitting taken there. But although they have not come to the help of the Lord against the mighty, we shall in time overcome even this pecuniary difficulty.

It may interest the friends of our Mission to know something of the kind of treatment we occasionally receive from Roman Catholics. If, as some claim, Romanism is a branch of the Christian tree, the rottenness of that branch was never better shown than in the attack made upon St. John's Church last 5th November. Lest we should be told that it was the work only of the ignorant and brutal among the French population, let it be remembered that the medical students of Laval and Victoria figured in the unenviable position of leaders in this most unprovoked and cowardly attack upon unoffending people. The Chairman and the French members of the Police Committee, with one honourable exception, staunchly refused to pay any damages for this outrage, and in doing so more than once showed that the true motive for this refusal was hatred of French Protestantism in general and of Mr. Chiniquy in particular. It remains to be seen whether the Church will seel: reparation in the Courts.

But if these things are rather discouraging, it is pleasant to see that in the last four months we have had no less than thirty-eight additions to the membership of the Church, chiefly young people that have been under instruction for some time past. Thirty-four of these have been Roman Catholics. At the last communion fifty-four communicants sat down at the Lord's table.

The attendance on the Lord's day has varied from sixty people to two hundred. The average, however, has been eighty to ninety. The Sabbath School, Bible Class included, numbers eighty on the roll and forty-five average attendance. The families are scattered over a very large area; this prevents the younger children from attending as regularly as they would do otherwise, and where the parents are very poor, they plead that the children are not sufficiently well dressed or shod to come. The prayer-meetings vary very much, sometimes reaching fifty, oftener down to twenty-five people. Most of the members of the Bible Class have joined the Church in full communion, and occasionally assist me as Sabbath School teachers.

Every now and then I get calls from strangers, wanting to know more about our Protestant faith. I had two such cases lately. One is that of a substantial farmer from a village a few miles from Montreal, who drove in several times purposely to hear the Gospel preached, and finally introduced himself to me, and asked for the solution of some of his doubts. After a couple of very long conversations, he professed himself desirous of being admitted to membership, although unable, from the distance, to attend reguiarly, and was very much pleased when, at a subsequent interview, I informed him that the Session had granted his request.

Another case is that of a respectable workman of the city, who dropped in one evening to hear what was going on in the Church, and liked it so well that he came again and again, sought me at my residence, and, after two or three visits, professed his faith in the Gospel, and accompanied it by works, subscribing five dollars to the funds of the congregation.

I owe much gratitude to some of the ladies of the congregation, who got up a soirce and a concert, realizing about \$75, with the view of renovating and thoroughly repairing the inside of the Church. Most of the amateur artists were French Protestants, and their performances, instrumental and vocal, showed the presence of no small talent in our somewhat restricted social circle.

I baptized thirty-two children in the calendar year ending January 1, 1885,—one-half of that number being the children of converts. Eight of our people died during the same period, and twelve called upon me to officiate at their marriage.

An interesting fact in relation to one of the deaths mentioned above, is that the person, a woman of about sixty, had never professed herself a Protestant until she neared death. One of her daughters had died the preceding year, who was an adherent of my Church, but when sickness had rendered her insensible, her aunts had sent for the priest, who anointed her, and professed to believe that she had recanted her errors. She was duly buried in the Roman Catholic cemetery, although a staunch believer in the Gospel. The mother was very much hurt at the refusal of the Roman Catholic clergy to officiate at the funeral, unless a considerable sum was first paid, and, therefore, when she, in her turn, felt death approaching, she did not send for the priest, but was quite satisfied to have the Protestant minister visiting her, and praying with her, and for her. She was, therefore, buried from our Church in the Mount Royal Cemetery at the wish of the remaining daughters, who are both Protestants and communicants.

But I must bring this rather long report to a close, and in doing so, would urge all friends of

# MISCELLANEOUS.

REV. C. CHINIQUY.

At a meeting of the Board in September it was agreed to invite Mr. Chiniquy to spend two months in visiting and conducting special meetings in several of the fields under their care. Mr. Chiniquy cordially accepted the invitation, and began work in Montreal on the first of November. The meetings were held in St. John's, Canning Street, and Hochelaga churches, and were very largely attended. As is well known, serious riots occurred in connection with the meetings, and considerable damage, was done by the mobito both St. John's and Canning street Churches. At first police protection was refused, but was eventually granted by the civic authorities, and for weeks the places in which the meetings were held were guarded by from 50 to 60 armed policemen. The life of the veteran missionary was frequently imperilled, and owing to the excited state of feeling throughout the Province, it was deemed unwise to allow Mr, Chiniquy to visit other places. He labored zealously for nearly two months in the city of Montreal, and during that time he not only addressed crowded meetings in the churches, but met and conversed privately with large numbers of Roman Catholics, many of whom professed to embrace the Gospel. On one occasion he met and conversed with nearly forty French Catholics in the house of one of the missionaries of the Board. In connection with Mr. Chiniquy's services a meeting was held in Knox Church on the 13th of November, attended by thirty-four Protestant ministers of all denominations in the city, when the following resolution was unanimously adopted, on motion of Rev. Dr. Potts:-

"That is the opinion of the one ting, composed of the Ministers of the various Protestant churches in the city (Montreal, full liberty of waship and liberty of speech are rights which belong to all creeds and nationalities in the tast, and should be treely accorded without hindrance or que tron;

"That the resent acts of the mob in this city, whereby several of the French Protestant churches have been repeatedly attacked and damaged, are a wanton and unwarrantable interference with these rights, such as merit, the cerest condemnation;

"That while gratefully recognizing the service rendered by the police in restraining the violence of the mob, and () of ing to prevent further damage to property and life, this meeting respectfully urges the authorities to take the () tyigorous measures to prevent any continuation of these unlawful acts, and pledges to them its hearty encouragement and support in so doing."

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETIES.

The Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Society of Montreal employs a French Bible woman in visiting the homes of the French speaking people of the city, and a similar work is sarried on in Quebec by a Bible woman, under the auspices of the ladies of that city.

### FRENCH IN ENGLISH CHERCHES.

In addition to the large number of French Canadian Protestants who have gone to the United States, and formed themselves into congregations there, many have connected themselves with English speaking Presbyterian churches in Canada. This is especially true of the Province of Quebec, and the Eastern part of Ontario. Not only are the names of French speaking persons on the communion rolls of many of our English churches, but some of the most active office-hearers of more than one English speaking congregation are: converts of our French mission. In a letter received last month from an English speaking minister of our church appears the following sentence: "At our meeting of Session to-day we received into fellowship fifteen French people. All of them are heads of families with the exception of two,"

### BRITISH AGENCY.

The Board appointed the Rev. Mr. Alex. MacGillivray, M. A., of St. Andrew's Church Williamstown, as their agent in Britain. Mr. MacGillivray accepted the appointment, obtained leave of absence for one year from his congregation and Presbytery, and sailed for England in the beginning of January. He has since labored very diligently in the interests of the Board, and, notwithstanding the severe commercial depression, has succeeded in collecting up to 15th April, the sum of \$1,232,86. Mrs. Macnider, of Edinburgh, stilt continues to render valuable aid on behalf of the work of the Board. To her, as well as to Mr. Mac-tillivray, the cordial thanks of the Board are tendered.

### FINANCES.

As will be seen from the appended financial statement the receipts for the year from all sources have been \$28,735.69, as compared with \$31,375.38 for the preceding year. While there is a falling off of about \$2,500, it is encouraging to know that the actual receipts from Canada are nearly \$4,000 in excess of those of the year preceding. Among the receipts are \$965.55 from the Presbyterian church of Ireland, and \$174.52 from the National Bible Society of Scotland, to whom the cordial thanks of the Board and of the church are due. Notwithstanding the fears entertained throughout the year, it is very encouraging to be able to report that

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all salaries, &c., have been paid in full, and there remains a small balance in the treasury. As the salaries are in most cases paid monthly, and as fully \$10,000 are required prior to the end of September, congregations and friends of the work are earnestly requested to forward their contributions before that date. The Board take this opportunity of expressing their hearty appreciation of the monificent contribution of Mr. G. D. Fergusson, of Fergus, Ont., who agrees to meet in full the salary of a French colporteur.

### TRAVELLING MISSIONARY.

Believing that the time has come when in the interests of the work it is most desirable that the fields should be visited from time to time by an experienced ordained French missionary, the Board have resolved, subject to the approval of the General Assembly, to appoint one of their missionaries to this work, under such regulations as may be deemed desirable, his duties in part being to visit and hold special services, and dispense ordinances in those districts more particularly where there are no ordained missionaries of the church.

### CLOSE.

The progress made in the work of French Canadian Evangelization has been very marked, especially in recent years. Half a century ago there was scarcely a French Protestant in the whole country; to-day thousands of men and women can be found who have renounced their allegiance to Rome, many of whom have, by God's grace, become humble followers of Jesus. Half a century ago there was not a single French Protestant congregation in the land; to-day they number nearly one bundred. Half a century ago the Bible was virtually an unknown book in almost every French parish is the Province of Quebec; to-day it is doubtful if there is a single parish in which the Bible cannot be found—a single parish which has not to a greater or less extent felt the influence of Bible truth.

So recently as eleven years ago it was difficult to gather together a congregation of 20 or 25 French Protestants in the city of Montreal. In the report for 1871 of St. John's church—the only French Presbyterian congregation then in the city—the following words occur:—"In some meetings there have been above 20 persons present in one only 8, in another 9, but the general attendance was between 12 and 16. We are now 47 communicants, living in Montreal, of which 7 did once belong to the Church of Rome." This was but eleven years ago; to-day there are in Montreal hight French Protestant congregations, and identified with these are nearly 400 families, most of whom have been gathered in from the Church of Rome.

It is now ten years since the union of the Presbyterian Churches in Canada, when the Board of French Exangelization was instituted. Comparing the French work in 1875 of the several branches of the Churches then happily united, with the statistics in this Report, we find the following:—

During the past year alone nearly as large a number of French-speaking communicants were received into fellowship with our Churches as the total number of communicants on the roll of the French Churches in 1875. To bring out the contrast more clearly, it ought to be borne in mind that during these ten years a considerable number of French Canadian Protestant congregations have been organized, under former missionaries of our Board, in the United States, composed very largely of converts from our Mission here; and that many more of the converts have found Church homes in English-speaking congregations throughout the bominion.

Encouraging us has been the progress in the past, there yet remains much to be done. The French-speaking Roman Catholics in the Dominion number about a million and a quarter. To give these people a pure Gospel, the Board earnestly solicit the sympathy and prayers and liberality of all who love the truth.

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# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF KNOX COLLEGE.

The total receipts during the past year, applicable to the ordinary expenses of the College, have been 815,280,35. Of this amount 85,674,83 was derived from the Common Fund and 89,147 from the income arising from investments and other sources. The expenditure during the same period has been 815,197,72. The various details of income and disbursements will be found in the Treasurer's statement appended hereto.

The amount of Endowment Fund, available for income, was stated in last year's Report as 861,837.86. There has been received, on account of subscriptions for Endowment Fund during the year, \$38,597.66, and the unpaid portion of Mr. Maclaren's donation, on which he pays interest, is \$30,000. There is thus available for revenue an endowment of \$130,435,52.

Every possible effort has been made to reduce the expenses, and in many respects the usefulness I the College has been impaired by the extreme economy which a very limited income has demanded. The Building Fund account has now been closed as almost all collectable subscriptions have now been received, and the interest on the mortgages on the premises must now be charged against the annual income as one of the ordinary expenses. The repairs to the buildings must also be charged to income account, and as years pass the expenditure on this account must necessarily increase. Further a blitions to the teaching staff must speedily be made if the Church desires this College to be maintained in a position of equality with the other theological seminaries. The Board therefore see that in the immediate future there must be an increased expenditure which existing arrangements will fail to supply. The Common Fund is steadily decreasing in amount, as the following ligures show:

It has become more evident to the Board that the College has been the sufferer from the establishment of this Fund. The congregations composing the former constituency of this College when the Common Fund was originated have in each year contributed much more to the Fund than the proportion accruing to this College, while other districts of the Common Territory have failed to contribute what might equitably have been expected from them. The Board also observe with regret that in many quarters there has not been that loyalty to the instructions of the Assembly in regard to congregational contributions to this Fund which might have insured its success. therefore, after another year's experience of the working of this system, and mature consideration of the subject, respectfully request the Assembly to abolish the Common Fund, and permit congregations to contribute directly to the support of whatever Colleges they desire particularly to benefit by their liberality. The Board believe that to leave each congregation perfectly free in the matter would greatly enlarge the amount contributed, and innre to the good of all our Colleges, while at the same time relieving the management of our various seminaries from even apparently asserting claims adverse to each other in the Assembly.

A scheme for the confederation of the various Colleges and Universities in Ontario was submitted to the consideration of the Board by the Hon, the Minister of Education. The general features of the measure were approved by the Board, and for various reasons the Government have not as yet taken further action in regard to the matter. The Board have, however, applied to the University of Toronto for altiliation, and have every reason to believe that their application will be favourably received. In addition to the recognition of the teaching of the College, alliliation will entitle the Board to a representative on the Senate of the Provincial University.

The Board observe with pleasure that the work of the College has been carried on with success during the past Session, and that the attendance in the Theological Department has been larger than at any time in the history of the institution. The particulars of the College work will be found in detail in the Report of the Senate berewith transmitted.

The attention of the Board having been called to the fact that the salary of the Rev. Dr. Proudtoot has not yet been increased in the same ratio as that of the professors, they recommend to the Assembly that this should be done.

The number of students residing in the College residence was 76; and the domestic arrangements of the College continue under the eareful and satisfactory management of Mr. and Mrs. Fullerton.

The following abstract of the Class Reports is here given :-

Dr. Caven, as in other Sessions, conducted the Classes in Evegetics and Biblical Criticism. During the First Term the Senior Exegetical Class was engaged in the study of the Epistle to the Hebrews, and during the Second Term selections from the Prophecies of Isaiah were studied. The students of the third year prepared, each, a Hebrew Critical Exercise, and those of the second year a Greek Critical Exercise as required by the Church. These were carefully examined.

The Junior Exercise as required by the volument. These were carefully examined.

The Junior Exegetical Class read critically in the Acts of the Apostles during First Term, and in the Book of Genesis during Second Term. A course of lectures was given to this Class on Hermeneutics. The Junior Exegetical Class consists of the first year's students. The same students gave one day weekly throughout the Session to Biblical Criticism; which was taught partly by lecture,

and partly by text-book.

Dr. Gregg reports that he conducted the Classes in Apologetics and Church History. In Apologetics getics, the students of the first year heard lectures on Natural Theology and the Evidences of Chritianity; the second year's students were examined on Cairns' Unbelief in the Eighteenth Century, and in the chapter of Hodge's Theology on Antitheistic Theories.

In Church History, the first year's students heard lectures on the period from the time of the Analysis at A. D. 277, the history of the Church form the data till the present time was reviewed.

Apostles to A.D. 787; the history of the Church from that date till the present time was reviewed in the Class consisting of the second year's students.

The students of the three years were examined in different portions of Smith's O. T. History. Dr. Gregg examined and criticized Homilies by students of the first year, and Essays by those

of the second year.

Dr. Maelaren reports that he conducted, as in former years, two classes in Systematic Theology. The Senior Class (second and third years) heard lectures on Justification, Adoption, Sanctification, Good Works, the Moral Law, the State of the Soul after Death, the Resurrection of the Dead, the tyron works, an arona law, the State of the Soul after Deam, the resurrection of the Dead, the Second Advent, the General Judgment, and Conditional Immortality. This Class met five times a week. The students of the second year underwent a written examination at the close of the Session upon "Fairbairn on the Revelation of Law in Scripture."

The Junior Class (first year) met four times weekly, and received instruction on Introduction to Theology, Inspiration, Rule of Faith, Attributes of God, Trinity, Decrees of God and Election.

In both Classes full conversations were held with students on the subjects discussed, which, it is the received present media.

believed proved very useful.

Dr. Proudfoot reports that during the first term be delivered to the students of the Second and Third Years forty-one lectures on Systematic Homiletics. He also heard and criticized thirty-two discourses; one from each student of these years. He prescribed texts for discourses to students of the first and sec and years.

As in former reports Dr. Proudfoot remarks that the time allotted to Homiletics is inadequate, and refers to the disproportion in our course of study in the time devoted to the acquisition of knowledge and that given to the acquiring of skill in the communication of it. The Homiletical study of

Scripture might with advantage receive much attention.

Elocation was taught by Prof. S. S. Neff, of Philadelphia, and the students evinced much interest in his instructions. All the Professors report entire satisfaction with the attendance and deportment of the students.

### PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT.

Mr. J. C. Smith, B.A., was re-engaged as Tutor in Latin, and Mr. Wm. Farquharson, B.A., wa-appointed Tutor in Greek. Both of these gentlemen have given entire satisfaction in the discharge of their duties.

McConnell, to whose illness reference is more in the Report of last Session, died shortly before this Session commenced. He also had greatly approved himself by his diligence in study, and his zeal in the service of Christ.

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The Junior Class read Casar, De Bello Gallico, Bk. III., 1-11; Harkness Latin Grammar from the beginning to the end of the irregular verbs; Arnold's Prose Composition, Chs. I.-XXII.

The Senior Class in Greek read Herodotus, Ch. I. XIV.; Homer's H. B. XXII., 1–230; Curtius'

Grammar to the end of the irregular verbs, and the Syntax of the Article and Cases of the Noun.

The Junior Class read John's Gospel, Ch. X.; Xenoph., Anab. B. V., Ch. 1, and Cl. 2: 1-2: Cutius' Grammar to the end of the regular verbs, and the Syntax of the Article and Cares of the

Mr. McNabb, second year, left the Classes in February, to return to Scotland, where the

prospect of a regular University course presents itself.

Messes, Dodds and Patterson, of the first year, attended the lectures but did not write at the -vamination.

As in past years Dr. Gregg kindly gave instruction in Mathematics to the Junior Class.

The Librarian, Mr. R. C. Tibb, B.A., reports that 303 volumes were taken from the Ordinary Department of the Library during the Session, and that the Consulting Department was much used. The works on Science and Philosophy were in much request, and several not yet on the shelves were aked for. Forty-four volumes were re-bound during the Session. The Librarian gives a detailed list of the additions made to the Library since last report. These include about eighty volumes, besides many Periodicals and Reports of various kinds. Complete sets of Augustine, Chrysostom, Athanasius, Ambrose, and Gregory the Great were added.

The Librarian suggests that the Consulting Department be rearranged, and that movable shelves be substituted for those now in use; and that several new works should be procured in the Philosophical and English departments. The system of classification adopted during the last session

has been found to work well. The several College Societies are in a prosperous condition. The Music Class is large, and was efficiently taught by Mr. Collins. The Metaphysical and Literary Society, of which Mr. J. C. Smith, B.A., was president, prosecuted its aim with much enthusiasm, and its public debates continue to be remarkably well attended. The Students' Missonary Societa this summer sends out twenty-one Missionaries, supported entirely by the Society. The great importance of this Society in developing Missionary zeal in the College, and in preparing its members for taking their share in the administra-

tions of the Church has repeatedly and emphatically been recognized in the Reports of the Senate.

The Rev. W. M. Martin, W. A. Duncan, M.A. and W. S. McTavish, passed their first examination for the degree of B.D.

At the close of the Session on the 1st of April the degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon the Rev. Robert Torrance and the Rev John Gray, M. A

The Senate records with pleasure a visit to the College by the Rev. Professor Patton, D.D., LL.D., of Princeton, N.J., who delivered in Convocation Hall on the Monday preceding the close of the Session, an admirable lecture on the History of Theistic Discussion, and again addressed the College in connection with the closing exercises.

The Senate agreed to ask the General Assembly to grant J. W. Rae the Standing of the first year in Theology.

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGE.

(FORTY-FOURTH SESSION.)

### L. ATTENDANCE,

The number of students attending classes last session was: In Arts, 243; in Medicine, 135; in Theology, 34. A majority of the medical students attend one or more Arts classes, and are thus counted twice, but there are 152 regular undergraduates in Arts. The total number studying with a view to the Ministry of our Church is 73. Of the 34 in Divinity 16 belong to the first year, 11 to the second, six to the third, and one is taking a post-graduate course. The number studying for the Ministry, as well as the number of students in every faculty, is greater than ever before in the history of the University. Every year since 1869 an increase over the previous year has been registered.

# II. THE CALENDAR.

Along with this report, copies of "Extracts from Calendar" are submitted, with information as to standing of students, courses of study and other subjects. The Calendar can be obtained at any time on application to the Registrar, Rev. George Bell, LL.D.

# III. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS.

For the first time we have to report a somewhat serious deficit in revenue. A year ago the General Assembly was informed that this would be unavoidable, unless such a re-arrangement was made of the proportions paid out of the Assembly's Fund to the different Colleges as would secure to our Theological Department the \$4,000 that the Church fully admitted Queen's to be entitled to. Instead of \$4,000, the sum of \$2,290 has been received, but our deficit, instead of being \$1,710, is only \$1,251.

We do not ask the Assembly for an increased grant, but simply that the contribution to our revenue which the Church assumed shall be secured to us. Since the arrangement was made four years ago, there has been added to the staff a third Professor in Theology, but the cost of this addition

has been borne by special subscriptions. If we had two or three chairs in Divinity endowed, we would not ask the Assembly for any portion of the College Fund, but since the Union our Theological

Faculty has lost more revenue than has been made up to it by endowment.

Besides the shrinkage in our receipts from the Temporalities' Fund, the grant of £550 stannally, formerly given by the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland, has now been entirely withdrawn. The annual expenditure for the Theological Department of the University is \$8,600. The sources of revenue at present are: share of General Assembly's Fund, \$4,000; special subscriptions for five years for third chair, \$2,000; share of Temporalities' Fund, \$550; interest on Endowment, \$2,050, or \$8,600 in all.

We do not doubt that the Committee appointed by the Assembly will suggest a course that will prevent deficits in the future. On our part we are determined to keep expenditure strictly within revenue, but this can be done only if the Church's contribution is equally reliable with our other

sources of revenue.

### IV. FURTHER LEGISLATION.

One of the provisions of the charter of Queen's is to the effect that Professors not in the Theological Department shall subscribe such a formula declaratory of their helief in the doctrine of the Confession of Faith as the Synod may prescribe.

This provision has been in abeyance since the Union; and as the Trustees intend to apply to the proper authorities for an Act amending the Act of 38 Vic., cap. 76, in the direction of further defining and extending the power of the University Council, they propose that the provision be abrogated.

V. I NIVERSITY CONFEDERATION.

The Minister of Education of the Province of Ontario invited last year the Chancellor and the Vice-Chancellor of the University to meet at his office with representatives of other Universities and teaching bodies. The result of several conferences was a scheme of confederation which was sent down to the Board by the Minister. An indexon answer was promptly given, and steps were then taken to ascertain as widely and fully as possible the views of the graduates, alumni, benefactorand other constituents of Queen's. When Convocation was held on April 29th last, it was ascertained that these were practically a unit in favour of declining to enter into the proposed confederation, and the Minister was informed accordingly. Convinced that this action rendered it even more imperative than it was before that the University should be thoroughly equipped for its great work. the Convocation proceeded to organize an association for increasing the endowment of the University similar to those associations which have done so much directly and indirectly for the Scottish Universities. It is hoped that every friend of Queen's will join the association, and that the results will be as beneficial in the New as they have been in the Old World.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE PRESBY-TERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL, FOR THE YEAR 1884-5.

The Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, beg leave to present the following report for the past year, and in doing so would express their gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the prosperity which He has made to attend its work.

Nothing has occurred to interfere with the full measure of its usefulness. From the accompanying Report of the Senate, it will be seen that the number of students in actual attendance has been essenty-three; of these, eight have completed their course, two of them being qualified to preach in both English and French. The total number of graduates is now over one hundred. In reference to the financial position of the College, the fact of chief importance to be noted is the

reception of the sum of \$40,000 from Messrs. Hugh, James and Robert Mackay, as an endowment for the chair in honour of the late Edward Mackay. This generous gift makes a substantial addition to the resources of the College, and establishes in connection with it a memorial worthy of one who was in his lifetime ever a warm friend of the institution. The full benefit of this endowment has not, of course, been obtained for the past year, and the Board regret that they have again to report a deciency in the year's ordinary revenue, amounting to \$658.69, which, with that of last year, makes a total deficit of \$1,209.66. The amount received from the common College Fund was only \$2,837.42. or nearly \$500 less than last year. It is evident that this Fund is less and less to be relied on as a source of revenue, unless the Assembly can devise some means whereby it will be made to appeal more strongly to the liberality of the Church.

As is known to the Assembly, one of the principal sources of revenue for the College consists of special subscriptions for the maintenance of the Exegetical Chair and other expenses. These subscriptions were made to extend over a period of five years, and will expire after another year and a-half. The Board have had in view the necessity of making provision for this event, and feel that the most stifactory way of doing so would be to secure a further endowment of say \$90,000, and have accordingly appealed to the Church for that amount. Nor have they lost sight of the desirability of securing the foundations for one or two additional chairs in the College, in order that the work of instruction may be properly overtaken. They foundly cherish the hope that the time is not far distant, when the sum hested may be furnished by those who are heartily interested in the cause of theological education.

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## REPORT OF THE SENATE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL, FOR THE SESSION 1884-5.

To the Venerable the General Assembly :

The Senate of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, report with gratitude the continued progress

in efficiency and public favour of the institution over whose academic interests they preside.

The whole number of students in attendance during the session was seventy-three, of whom thirty-two were in Theology, fourteen in the Literary Classes, and twenty-seven, while residing in the College Building, pursued their studies in McGill College. Twelve of the students were French-Canadians preparing for the work of evangelization among their countrymen, and two of these, of whom one is Gold Medallist in Arts and the other Gold Medallist in Law, this year completed their theological studies.

Much good has also been accomplished by the Alma Mater Society and the Students' Philosophical and Literary Society in their respective pheres. The former contributes annually a Scholarship of fifty dollars for excellence in Oriental Languages. It is believed that the action of the Venerable the General Assembly in according to that Society the right of nominating annually three members of Senate has already stimulated the atterest of graduates in the welfare of their Alma Mater, and in the work of the Church at large.

## REPORT OF THE GOVERNORS OF MORRIN COLLEGE, QUEBEC, 1885.

In presenting to the General Assembly the Report from Morrin College for the Session 18845, the Governors gladly and gratefully acknowledge the goodness and mercy shown them through the year by the Head of the Church, so that the work of the College has been carried forward under circumstances of a most encouraging nature. Twenty-three students have been in regular attendance on the classes, the largest number that has ever yet been present at any one Session; while in addition, there have been about twenty occasional students receiving instruction in particular branches.

In the Arts Department, twenty-one students have been regularly enrolled in the various-classes taking the full course of study as required by McGill University, to which Morrin Colleg is affiliated in Arts. The Graduating Class numbered six, each of whom obtained his degree as Bachelor of Arts, the answering of tive of these being such that they were not only placed in the first class at the finel examination, but also received special certificates of first rank, general standing.

Of these twenty-one students, the Governors are happy to say, that nine or ten have already made known their intention of studying for the Ministry of the Gospel. The high standing which several of them hold in the Arts classes, gives promise of much usefulness in the great work to which they are looking forward, when in the providence of God, they may be enabled to enter thereon. Five of this number are, during this summer, employed in mission work, under the direction of the Home Mission Committee of the Assembly.

The presence in the Arts classes of so many students looking forward to the Ministry, led to these being formed into a class of Junior Divinity, which met once a week during the Session for Lectures in Homileties and practical instructions as to the composition of sermons. These junior students were thus in some measure prepared for discharging the duties of their summer appointments with comfort to themselves and with hopefulness to the Church.

In the Theological Department, there were but two students: Norman McLeod, B.A., who has now completed his second year in Theology, and James Sutherland, in reference to whose standing, a special application will be made to this Assembly by the Presbytery of Quebec. Both of these students are also engaged in Home Mission work under the Assembly's Committee. Morrin College but thus furnished this year seven young men to aid the Church in her Home Mission work.

In reference to Pinance the Governors regret to state that the income of the College is far below its requirements, so that its work is carried on under many difficulties. There is urgent need of a considerable addition to its resources, but various causes combine to render present efforts in this direction exceedingly difficult. At the same time the Governors have great pleasure in stating that since last Assembly, there has been bequeathed to the College for the endowment of the Chair of Theology, a sum of \$2,000 by the late Philip Peeblea, Esq., of Chalmers Church, Quebec, a legacy which is not, however, immediately available. There has also been obtained for the same purpose, a further sum of \$550, which has been invested in Bank Stock.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, HALFFAX, 1884-5.

The session was opened on the evening of November 5th, by a lecture from Rev. Dr. Pollok, on the recently published manuscript known as ATANNI TON AHONTONON, and was closed at a meeting held in the Library in Presbyterian College. Pure Hill, on the 30th of April, when the Senate's report of the work of the session was read by Rev. Dr. Currie. Prizes were awarded, and the students were awarded by Rev. Net McKay, Dr. McRae, and Rev. Joseph Annand, of Anciteum, who briefly pleas the claims of those who are still without the word of life.

Seventeen students have been in attendance during the past Session, ten of the first year and seven of the second. One student of the first year, who found himself placed in exceptional circumstances, prosecuted his studies at home, and underwent the written examinations.

The work of the several classes went on with wonted regularity. The general health was excellent. For the comfort and freedom from distraction, in carrying on the work of the session, grateful acknowledgment is due to the Giver of all good.

In the class of Systematic Theology, attended by seven students of the second year, the principal topics discussed were, the Nature and Attributes of God; Creation; Providence; the Fall, and its Consequences. In the way of text-books, some chapters of Hodge's second volume were used. Homilies and polemical theses were real and criticised, as usual. The class of Apologetics was attended by ten students. The evidence of natural and revealed religion was discussed as in former years. Some portions of Isaac Taylor's "Transmission of Ancient Books," were studied in connection with the historical evidences. Some chapters of the Confession of Faith were also read in the class. The exceptical hour on Tuesday was given to the Epistle to the Hebrews, about four chapters being read in the course of the session. This class was attended by all the students.

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In the department of Church History, Pastoral Theology, and Homiletics, the history of the Christian Church from the beginning of the Christian era to the middle of the fifteenth century, was studied by means of text-books and examinations twice a week. As attention was confined to the Eastern Churches during the centuries subsequent to the end of the seventh, it leaves the history of the Western Church from the beginning of the eighth century to be traced during the next term. A course of lectures on the history of the Scottish Church from the year 1637 to the year 1660, was given on three days of each week, during the first three months of the session. As this short period comprises the history of the Covenanting movement, together with the debates of the Westminster Assembly, and the completion of the Westminster Standards, it required special attention. Subsequent to the first sessional examination in January, a course of lectures was given in Pastoral Theology. By the omission of one or two subordinate topics, this course was completed by the end of the session. All these subjects were included in the sessional examinations. Seven chapters of the First Epistle to the Corinthians were critically read in the exceptional class. Eight discourses were also read and criticised. In Elecution, instructions were given and a few exercises were performed.

In Hebren two classes were conducted, each of which met five times a week. The Junior class, attended by the first year students, went over the ordinary ground, committing to memory paradigms and vocabularies, and reading selections from the Scriptures equivalent to about twelve chapters of average length. Every lesson was reviewed twice in the course of the term. More attention than formerly was given to the memorizing of vocabularies and of the first three chapters of Genesis, as it was thought that a student furnished with such a stock of words, would be prepared to read many of the easier historical portions of Scripture. Constant drill was given in

translating Hebrew into English and English into Hebrew.

The Senior Class, composed of students of the second year, read exegetically selections from the more difficult books, including passages from the Minor Prophets and several of the Messianic Psalms. In almost every case the text was compared with the Vulgate and the LXX Pursuing the practice adopted last term, several chapters selected from the historical and easier prophetical books were read at sight. Instruction in the higher syntax of the language was given from such writers as Ewald, Driver and Müller. In Chaldee this class read four chapters of Ezra, and selections from the Targums of Onkelos, Jonathan and Pseudo-Jonathan. As an optional exercise, this chass also devoted some time to the elements of Syriac grammar, and read three

chapters of the l'eshito version.

The Exegetical Class, composed of students of the first and second year, had as a Monday exercise the study of the Canon. A text-book was used which gave a fair outline of the subject. This was supplemented by extracts from such writers as Keil, Reuss, Westeott and Ezra Abbot. On Wednesday, exegetical lectures on the Epistle to the Philippians were delivered to this class during the greater part of the term. The object of this course was not so much to impart a knowledge of the Word as to train the students in exact methods of exegetical study. At this hour, during the latter part of the term, students of the first year read a Greek Critical Exercise, which was remarked on, both by the class and from the Chair. The hour on Friday was devoted to a course of lectures on the Criticism of the New Testament text, which discussed such topics as the history of the transmission of the text, the classification of the witnesses, the character of the leading printed editions, the critical principles of such editors as Griesbach, Lachmann, Tregelles, Tischendorf, Westcott and Hort, etc.

During the session two written examinations were held in all the departments, one in

January and the other in April, the results of which were very satisfactory.

The only graduate for the year has been Mr. Daniel Fiske, who passed the usual written examinations, though his actual attendance was prevented by a special missionary engagement, which the Presbytery of St. John requested that he should undertake and cischarge. Mr. J. K. McClure, having studied two sessions at Pine Hill, took his third at Union Theological Seminary, and graduated there. The actual attendance was seven of the second year, and ten of the first. These numbers are an approximation to what the Church requires. Homeand Foreign Missions. Of our own young men, there are this year but three, the two mentioned and one returned from Scotlan I, who will be lie used to preach the everlasting Gospel, but what are those to meet the wants of lifteen vacant charges, and to respond to the published notice of the Foreign Mission Board for another labourer. In truth the position of the Church this spring on account of the dearth of young preceders would have been one of discouragement and sprittnal distress, had it not been for the timely arrival from Scotland of three Ministers and four Theological Students, who have responded to our lavitation, and who have come from the Established, the Free, and the United Presbyterian Churches. While truly thankful for this timely aid, the conviction remains that this and every other portion of the Canadam Church should send up a sufficient number of their own most promising and best educated young men to provide preachers to fill the land and carry the Gospel to the regions beyond.

Some valuable contributions have within the year been made by purchase and gift to the Labrary, which now contains 9,000 volumes. These have been carefully catalogued by the Professors, a work which is commonly done by a paid Librarian. The Board gave cordial thanks to the Professors for this work, truly a work of labour as well as of love. As the Library is still delicient in works of recent publication, its improvement in this department is commended to the

consideration and liberality of the friends of the College.

The Committee notice that proposals have been made, and will be brought before the General Assembly, to have a summer session in one of the Colleges, so that the students attending such session may be able to supply some of the numerons mission stations thrown vacant during winter. If such a step should be thought desirable, the advantages of this situation are unequalled. The ralubrity of the air, kept cool by the Atlantic sea breeze, the beauty of the scenery, and the facilities for boating and bathing on the North-West Arm, make the place peculiarly suitable for such an experiment, which, in the opinion of this Committee, is well worthy of a trial.

The Board would express thanks to the congregations and friends who have furnished the means of giving considerable sums in prizes and bursaries. They would make special mention of their friend in St. John's, Newfoundland, for \$200 per annum for six years, and of their unknown friend in New Glasgow, who furnishes a bursary of \$60 annually. Their disbursements for the

The Bursary debt reported last year of \$260.78 has been reduced to \$200.80, our expenditure being about \$60 less than receipts.

GENERAL FUNDS.

The receipts, both from invested funds and from churches, are but slightly changed, there being a small increase in the first and a decrease in the second—Interest and dividends in 1884, \$6,612.36, in 1885, \$6,655.07; congregations in 1881, \$2,268.19, in 1885, \$2,188.49; the total, \$66.99 less than last year. One hundred and thirteen congregations contributed, leaving a goodly number which have given nothing. But the pressure for other funds, and more especially for Angmentation, was so urgent and persistent that it was felt that the College might be left to the loyalty and liberality of its steadlast friends who regard its welfare as closely connected with the progress and prosperity of the Church. These have done their part, but they could not do the work of others, so that there has been a short-coming.

While the receipts have been \$8,843.36, the disbursements have been \$9,987.68, making an adverse balance of \$1,142.12. The sum of \$335.50 belonging to the closing year was received after the closing of accounts, reducing really the loss on the year to \$806.62, and the ontlay for the Arts Course to \$3,182.10. It should, however, be noted that \$3,517.90 were expended in the maintenance of the Arts Course; so that less than \$6,500 are expended annually in the support of Presbyterian College at Pine Hill. This institution is conducted with great economy, and the Board would respectfully invite examination of the accounts to be published, as furnishing the most convincing evidence of the fact. The Board anticipates a diminution of the amount annually expended for the Arts Course in Dalhousic College, and when this occurs they trust our ir .me

will not be overrun by our expenditure,

The Board, in conclusion, would record gratitude for many tokens of good during the season past. The Principal has resided in the building, and the students have thus been under his superintendence and charge. The prayer and missionary meetings of the students have been maintained, and the discourses of the Professors in turn on the second Sabbath evening of the menth happily enjoyed. The Board would be speak for the Professors and Students a continued interest in the prayers of the Church; so that in piety and spiritual power, as well as in numbers there may be enlargement. It is from the Lord of the harvest that labourers are to be sought, and when sought by His people in faith and prayer, and with corresponding effort, the Lord will provide a band of young men whose hearts He has touched with desire to make known the "Good news of the Kingdom."

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF MANITOBA COLLEGE, FOR THE YEAR 18845.

The Board of Management of Manitoba College begs leave to submit to the General Assembly

the following report of the Institution for the past year:

From the Report of the Senate, which is berewith transmitted, it will be observed that the whole number receiving instruction in the various classes during the past year has been sixty. Of these, et. ht were engaged in the study of Theology; thirty-six were in attendance in the Arts Classes, and the remainder were either connected with the Preparatory Department or taking occasional classes It is satisfactory to be able to state, in view of the urgent needs of the Mission field to the west, that a fair proportion of those in the undergraduate and in the preparatory course have the ministry in contemplation.

To assist the Professors and the Tutor, Mr. Campbell, in overtaking the ever increasing work of the Institution, two of the more advanced students were engaged to give a limited amount of instric-

tion in the more elementary branches.

From the accompanying Financial Statement it will be seen that the entire income of the Cobego From the accompanying Financial Statement it will be seen that the entire income of their onese for the year, including moneys received for fees and board, was \$27,829.59. Of this amount, \$7,207 of was contributed for endowment by persons in Great Britain and Ireland in connection with Dr. King's visit last year. The Board has received notice of an addition to this amount in the form of a grant by the Alission Board of the United Preshyterian Church of Scotland of £259, "towards the endowment of the chair occupied by Dr. King." With the view of aiding the Synod of Manitolas in meeting its obligations in connection with the salary of the Principal, the Board of Management has account to salary to the Principal, the Board of Management has agreed to assign to it for the coming year the proceeds of the Endowment Fund, the capital of which will, it is needless to say, be kept intaca. Through the generous donations of friends in Torons, and Montreal, amounting to nearly \$1,800, the Board was able to meet the second instalment due to the Building and Loan Association. The other sources of income enumerated in the Treasurers Report have enabled the Board to meet punctually and in full all the claims against the Institution without incurring any additional debt.

This result, however, has been reached not through an increase in the congregational contributions either of the Eastern Provinces or of Manitoba and the North West Territories over those of lacyear, but through the liberal donation, repeated for the fourth time, of the Hon. D. A. Smith, and through the ricumstance that two years proceeds of the Marriage License Fund came into the treasury of the Board within the financial year. The Board, while deeply grateful for the liberal and given to the Institution by many of the congregations of the Church, would respectfully call the attention of the Assembly to the circumstance that the appointment of a collection on behalf of the College has been disregarded by a very large number of congregations, and that unless some action i taken in the way of securing a more general observance of the appointment, the Board cannot expect to meet in the future the current expenses of the Institution, and still less to reduce the still large

indebtedness.

The Board desires to record its gratitude to the Presbyterian Church of Ireland, the Church of Scotland, the Free Church of Scotland, and the United Presbyterian Church of Scotland, for the generous interest manifested by them during the year in Manitoba College. Without the aid given by these Churches the Institution, with its large possibilities of good in relation to the supply of Cospel ordinances for the settlers in the North-West, could exarcely have been maintained. The Board would also express its toanks to individual contributors, whether for the purposes of general revenue, of reduction of debt, or of endowment. The Board takes the liberty of mentionin, acconnection with the last object the names of two contributors, Sir Peter Coats, of Auchendrane, and J. C. White, Eq., of Overton, each of whom gave £200 for this object. The College library received

a valuable addition in thirty two volumes from the library of the late Rev. Dr. Black.

In addition to the money due in Dr. Beid's office for overdrawn payments to the College there is still the sum of \$11,100 due to a Loan Association. The Board trusts that the General Assemble will continue its approval of any efforts made to reduce this indebtedness by appeals to those wh

may be disposed to aid in the all but necessary work.

The Board still further requests the General Assembly to empower it to apply for a change in the Act of Incorporation, by which the members of the Board may be increased from lifteen to twenty-five.

A class in  $\Lambda$  pologetics was taught once a week during the greater part of the Session by the Res. D. M. Gordon, B.D., and a class in Church History, meeting also once a week, by the Rev. John Pringle, B.A. The Senate, as they are assured the students also do, attaches much importance to the service thus rendered by these brothren.

A popular Sermon was given in the course of the Session by each of the students and criticized by the Professor. A Critical Exercise, in addition, was prescribed for the students of the third year. Written examinations were conducted on the various subjects of study at Christmas are at the close of the Session. In the latter, Dr. King was assisted by the lecturers, and the Rev. C. E. Fitblado

and Rev. D. Stalker, B.A. The examiners expressed their satisfaction on the whole with the papers given in. In the case of one or two students who had laboured under some disadvantages, a supplementary examination in Hebrew was prescribed.

Dr. King would again express much satisfaction with the students in Theology; their attendance was punctual, their attention to the work of the class close, and their progress creditable to their dilizence and ability.

The usual examinations have been held at the close of the College Terms, and with results, on the whole, satisfactory to the Professors.

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Twenty-four students connected with the Institution took part in the University Examination-last year. Three received the degree of B.A.; J. H. Mulvey, D. H. McVicar, D. S. McPherson.

Twenty-nine students are taking part in these examinations this year, with what results is not known at this date. The number would have been still larger, but for the presence at the front with their battalions of some of our undergraduates. The Senate regrets to have to report that two of the former students of the College, J. B. D. Code, B.A., and A. Ferguson, are among the number of the fallen.

It may be mentioned that an amount approaching \$3,000 is now offered annually in Scholarships by the University of Manitoba, as the proceeds in part of the Isbister bequest of \$35,000. This at afford valuable assistance to the Arts' students of this and the other affiliated Colleges.

The Students' Literary Society has had a most successful year under the presidency of Dr. Bryce. Its members have cultivated public speaking, reading and essay writing, and with the succion of the College authorities, prizes in these departments have been awarded by the rotes if the Society to those deemed entitled to them.

The Students' Missionary Society, organized last year, and employing one missionary, has the year undertaken the support of two. The Senate regards this spirited action of the students with much satisfaction, in view especially of the needs of our wide mission field.

In addition to a short time spent each morning in reading of the Scriptures and prayer, prover meetings were held every Sablata morning in the College, and every alternate Friday afternoon, it is hoped with good results in the case of some.

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## REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

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The Committee appointed by the Assembly to supervise the Sabbath school work of the Church, beg leave to report as follows regarding this interesting and important sphere of the Church's operations:

#### 1. REPORTS AND ATTENDANCE.

According to the instruction of the last General Assembly an attempt was made to ascertain how many children of the Church, of school age, did not attend the Sabbath schools of the Church. For this purpose two questions were asked the first requiring a statement of the number of children soing to other Sabhath schools, and the second, the number not attending any school. As might have been expected, the answers to these questions are of a somewhat indefinite character. From the nature of the case it could not be an easy task for superintendents of Sabbath schools to obtain accurate statistics of those who go to other schools or go nowhere. And the value of the returns depends upon the care with which the enquiries have been conducted, which we could scarcely expect in all cases to be the same. Some of the answers are quite indefinite, such as, "a few," not many," "several"; but in a very considerable number of our congregations it is clear that an honest effort has been made to ascertain the exact numbers that do not attend our Sabbath schools. From the reports of the different Presbyteries we gather that a comparatively small proportion of the children do not attend our Sabbath schools. For example, in the Presbytery of Truro, with a total attendance in the schools of 2,315, there are reported three as going to other schools, and 66 In that of Prince Edwarf Island, where the total attendance is 2,541, there are 40 returned as going to other schools, and 213 to none. Throughout the whole Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, reporting 169 schools and 16,908 scholars, there are returned 297 going to other schools and 687 going to none. These are fair representative examples of the results of the enquiry made by your Committee. And we may thence conclude, that while there are too many of the children of the Church who do not avail themselves of the valuable instructions and influences of our Sabbath schools, the number is not so great as was feared. The returns that have been made, however, are in many cases indefinite, and can scarcely be considered in any case as perfectly accurate. And in estimating the comprehensiveness of our Sabbath school work, there is another element which must be taken into account. From a large number of the preaching stations of our Church we have no reports at all. In a certain proportion of those preaching stations there will be Sabbath schools established; in the remainder there will be none. And we are not at present able to say how the Sabbath schools are attended to in non-reporting stations. The magnitude of this element of uncertainty may be seen from the following tabulated statement of the number of preaching stations within the bounds of our Church, and the number of reporting Sabbath schools:

From this table it vill be seen that there is a very large number of places at which the Gospel is resularly preached, by the ministers of this Church, where no Sabbath schools are established, or if established, their reports have not been returned. Your Committee is of the opinion that there should be a Sabbath school for the instruction of the young in every place at which the ordinances of the Gospel are regularly supplied. And the conclusion is inevitable that there is a very large number of places within our bounds, in which there has been serious neglect, either of Sabbath school work in connection with the ministrations of the Gospel, or of reporting the work which has been done. The renedy for this serious neglect lies chiefly in the hands of the Presbyteries of the Church. You: Committee is of the opinion that the Presbyteries should exercise a much more wat bful care ever the operations and interests of the Sabbath school than at present; that the Committee, or the Presbyterial Association concerned with this work, should include the best men in the Presbytery; and that the Church should aim, if possible, to have a Sabbath school in operation at every place where our ministers preach the Gospel, and to obtain from every Sabbath school are report of its work.

In connection with the attendance at Sabbath schools, reference may be made to the presence of parents. The attendance of parents, during the Sabbath school hours, is calculated to encourage the teachers in their self-denying labours; and it would be well for parents, when possible, to give the encouragement of their presence both to the teachers and the children. From the reports received, it would appear that only a small number of parents favour the Sabbath schools with their personal attendance. The people of Glengarry are to be highly commended in this respect, as we find reported from that Presbytery the number of 229 parents who attend the Sabbath schools more or less regularly. This number, in proportion to the number of schools reporting, is the largest returned by any Presbytery in the Church; the Presbytery of Toronto, however, with its 83 schools, reports 261 parents as attending.

We now come to the consideration of the actual number of scholars attending our Sabbath schools and Bible classes. This will be seen from the following tabulated statement of attendance throughout the five Synods of the Church:

From a comparison of the schools reporting and the scholars attending in 1884 and 1885 respectively, it will be seen that the returns of both these years are exceedingly imperfect. In the Mariting Provinces, in the Synods of Montreal and Ottawa, and of Hamilton and London, the number of schools reporting was very much larger last year than this, and we cannot be exceeding the truth if we estimate the number of children under Sabbath school instruction at more than 100,000.

#### H. SPIRITUAL RESULTS.

It is impossible to give anything like a definite statement of the spiritual results which follow from the labours of the host of Christian workers who find a concental sphere for their energies in the Sabbath schools of the Church. We cannot believe that the faithful and persistent efforts of our large band of teachers will fail to bring great blessings to the children and youth of our land, although it may, in many cases, be months and years before the blessed results are manifest. The conveying of important Christian instruction, the exercise of the benign influences which pervade the very atmosphere of a Sabbath school, and the training in habits of Christian attendance and Christian virtue, which constitute or accompany our Sabbath school work, must be productive of very valuable results in the lives of the generation which is now gradually advancing to its position in the great battle of life, and our Sabbath school workers cannot be too deeply impressed with the thought that to them is committed in part the responsibility of preparing the young natures of their pupils for entering upon and taking part in the privileges and duties of the kingdom of our Lord. the first and grandest aim of all Sabbath school work; the aim which Christian parents and Sabbath school teachers and ministers should keep constantly before them. How completely this aim reached in our Sabbath schools it is impossible to say. The great difficulty is to retain the older scholars, and especially the boys, in the Sabbath school until the Christian character is thoroughly impressed upon them and they have taken their position as professed and real members of the kingdom of Christ. We all know that this difficulty is but very partially overcome by the combined efforts of parents and teachers and minister; and perhaps it wost be confessed that neither parents nor teachers nor ministers are sufficiently alive to the importance of this aim of our Church work. The statistics which we have collected show that something is being done in our Sabbath schools towards the development of the Christian life in our scholars; but any statistics which we could collect would be necessarily imperfect. The most accurate statement of the number of those who have professed Christ would not enable us to gauge the strength of their faith or the clearness of their knowledge; nor could it show the wider Christian influences which have been brought to bear upon the still larger number who have made no profession. In so far, however, as it is possible to measure the spiritual results of our Sabbath school work by a statement of the number who have made profession of their faith we give the following:

#### III, CONTRIBUTIONS TO MISSIONS.

Amongst the questions that were sent by your Committee to the Sabbath schools was this:
"What means taken to interest the children in the missions of the Church, and to train them in
systematic Christian liberality?" And there was circulated a brief statement of the missionary
operations of our Church which seemed to be peculiarly litted to interest the children. This circular

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as this: them in scionary circular statement was designed to suggest to superintendents and teachers the idea of bringing prominently before the children the duty of systematic liberality, and training them to give for the advancement of the Gospel. And the object of the question above quoted was not merely to obtain answers by which a report might be filled up, but chiefly to suggest to superintendents that some means should be taken "to interest the children in the missions of the Church, and to train them in systematic Christian liberality." The answers to the questions, as might be expected, are marked by wonderful variety. In some cases, missionary sermons are preached quarterly. Missionary addresses are given in other cases. In one school, in the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, contributions are taken up by envelopes extending over the whole year. In a great many of the schools, or rather it might be said a large majority of them, no special effort is made for this end; and there is one school, in the Synod of Hamilton and London, which actually undertakes to defend its neglect of seeking to cultivate the missionary spirit upon the ground that such an attempt would "drive away scholars." Several schools endeavour to stimulate a right spirit by "collections and exhortations." One recommends "the study of the Shorter Catechism" to promote liberality and interest in missions. One Presbytery report morims us that "some give the children an orange at Christians, trusting that they may send the Gospel to those who send oranges to them." Various modes of taking contributions, weekly, morthly, or quarterly, are reported; and it is plain that in a large number of the best Sabbath schools of the Church very commendable efforts are made to excite interest in the minds of the children in the missionary work of the Church, and train them in the grace of liberality; but there is a dark side to this picture. From the reports of our Sabbath schools, we learn the important fact that more than one-half of our Sabbath schools no attempt is made to arone the m

#### IV. PRESBYTKRIAL CONFERENCES.

One of the injunctions of last Assembly to the Presbyteries of the Church was that they should "use diligence in holding conferences." Your Committee believes that this injunction is one of great importance, and that the Sabbath school work of the Church will never be placed upon a satisfactory basis until the Presbyteries take hold of it in a more thorough business-like way than the majority of them do at present. There are multitudes of places within the bounds of our Presbyteries where the Gospel is regularly preached at which, apparently, there are no Sabbath schools. There are large numbers of our Sabbath schools from which no reports have been received; and there are large numbers of them which are never taught the importance of practical missionery work. Such being the case it is surely important that the members of the Presbyteries should confer together as to the best methods of remedying these acknowledged defects, and securing that Sabbath school work shall be more widely and efficiently done and better reported. In obedience to the injunction of the Assembly, only fourteen of our Presbyteries held conferences upon Sabbath schools, leaving twenty-four who did not. The names of the fourteen are the following: Trure.

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Prince Edward Island, St. John, Lanark and Renfrew, Glengarry, Lindsay, Toronto, Guelph, Hamilton, Sarnia, Huron, Maitland, Brandon and Bruce.

#### V. PREPARATION OF TRACIERRS.

One of the most important problems connected with our Sabbath school work is how to secure efficient, well-prepared teachers. Questions hearing upon this subject were asked by your Committee, but nothing of a very satisfactory kind was elicited in reply. A variety of methods is employed to help teachers to do this work, as, for example, teachers' meetings, Wednesday evening lectures upon the lessons, suitable sermons, and so on. But no general effort is made to endeavour to train young people for becoming teachers. The plan of preparing a course of Bible study for this purpose, to be conducted by the Presbyteries, was soggested as a possible course to be pursued; but the opinions expressed upon it by school superintendents and Presbyterial Committees are not so generally favourable as to warrant your Committee in recommending its adoption. The whole matter is one of no small consequence, and your Committee would suggest that it should still be kept in mind by their successors as a problem to be solved.

#### VI. SABBATH SCHOOL LITERATURE.

There seems to be a very large supply of book literature in the libraries of our Sabbath schools, and if care has been used in selecting the thousands of volumes which are in circulation amongst the smildren, the reading of them cannot but be productive of good. It is satisfactory to know, also, that the literary helps to the study of the lessons are very generally selected from that admirable erries is also taken in our Sabbath schools a sufficient number of interesting children's papers, which are supplied by a serprising publishers in great profusion. But there is one desideratum in the way of literature in regard to which your Committee believe that the time has come for the Church to take some definite and decided action. One of the questions issued had reference to the desirability of the publication of a "Children's Record" in some form or other. The replies to this question, in so far is replies have been returned, are, upon the whole, favourable. That it is important to arouse the interest of our children in the different branches of the Church's work, to give information to them regarding what is being done, and to stimulate and guide them towards an intelligent and systematic Christian liberality, your Committee limity believe. And they would expressly for the benefit of the children of our Church.

#### VII. BECOMMENDATIONS.

Your Committee would beg leave to make the following recommendations:

That the Assembly should at once take such steps as would secure the issuing to the children
of our Church a "Record" or other monthly periodical for the purposes specified in the last section
of this report.

That the Presbyteries be enjoined to aim at the establishment of Sabbath schools, if practicable, at all places within their bounds where the Gospel is preached; to secure reports from every sabbath school; and to seek, by holding conferences or otherwise, to diffuse an intelligent interest in Sabbath school work.

3. That all Sabbath school superintendents and teachers be urged to seek first the spiritual life and welfare of the children committed to their care, and also to give due and earnest attention to the cultivation of a spirit of systematic Christian liberality.

 That the Sabbath School Committee be so constituted, and such arrangements be made in reference to it, as that it will be possible for it to meet once or twice during the year for the purpose fearefully considering and supervising the important interests committed to its care.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

## REPORT OF THE HYMNAL COMMITTEE.

The Committee beg to report that during last year the Children's Hymnal for use in Sabbath chools, with music, which they were authorized to prepare, has been published. One edition with melody alone, at five cents per copy, and a harmonized edition, at thirty-live cents per copy, have seen published. This Hymnal contains selections of Psalms, Paraphrases and Hymnas specially slanted for the young. Both editions have been very neatly printed, and seem to have met with zeneral approval throughout the Church. Of the five cent edition upwards of 30,000 copies have seen sold within the last six months, and of the harmonized edition about 1,000 copies have been sold within the last few weeks.

It was stated in last year's report that the Hymnal Committee had made arrangements for the gablication of an edition of the Paalter with mosic prepared by the Free Church of Scotland, which sudds consented to forego on our behalf the royalty received on editions sold in Scotland. This edition, which has been prepared under the direction of Dr. Hopkins, the accomplished musical editor of our own Hymnal, has now been published, and has given great satisfaction. It is printed with cut leaves, and is sold either separately or beauto along with our won Hymnal with music.

with cut leaves, and is sold either separately or bound along with our own Hymnal with music.

Since January the price of the Hymnal with music has been reduced from ninety to eighty cents,
and of the Psalter and Hymnal from \$1.50 to \$1.25.

The Committee regret that, owing to circumstances which they could not control, a tonic-sol-fachtion of the Hymnal, which they agreed to publish, is not yet quite ready. It is hoped, however, that it will be ready in a month or two. The price at which it is proposed to be sold is eighty cents per copy. This price will scarcely meet the expense of publication, unless at least two or three thousand copies are sold.

It becomes necessary to employ a special editor to transpose the ordinary notation into the tonicsol-fa form. Dr. Jenkins, who is now in England, has kindly undertaken the revision of the Hymns, and his services in this and in other matters have been of great value to the Committee. The revision of the harmonized edition of the Children's Hymnal was kindly undertaken by Mr. MacDonnell.

The firm to whose enterprise and energy the Committee were indebted for the publication and sale of the Hymnal in former years having during the past year ceased to be publishers, the contract with them has been terminated. It became therefore necessary for the Committee to make temporary arrangements. These involved them in pecuniary engagements, which have greatly added to the labours of Mr. McMurrich, the Secretary and Treasurer of the Committee. The temporary arrangements have proved satisfactory.

The Treasurer's statement will show that, although less than the usual amount of royalty has

been received during the year, the assets of the Committee largely exceed their liabilities.

The propriety of publishing a tonic-sol-fa edition has been urged on the Committee, who are favourable to the proposal, but they think it well to defer taking any action in this direction until they find the measure of acceptance with which the tonic-sol-fa edition of the larger Hymnal will be received.

In conclusion the Committee recommend

1. That the Assembly authorize the Hymnal Committee which may be appointed for the ensuing year to call for tenders for the publication of such editions of the larger Hymnals, and also of the Children's Hymnals, as they may deem necessary, and to enter into a contract for the publication of

the same for a term of years.

2. That the Asssembly further authorize the issue of a tonic-sol-fa edition of the Children's Hymnal, should the Committee deem it advisable.

## REPORT ON THE STATE OF RELIGION, 1885.

In presenting to the Venerable the General Assembly their Report for another year on the State of Religion, your Committee have much pleasure in stating at the outset that the Reports which have been received from the various Synods are, with certain exceptions, of a very favourable and hopeful character. As no small difficulty has hitherto obtained in inducing the Sessions of our Church to send replies to the questions that are annually submitted to them, your Committee are happy to find that a perceptible improvement has taken place in that important particular during the past year. In the Synod of the Maritime Provinces Reports were received from all the Preshyteries with the exception of the Preshytery of Newfoundland. Members of the latter

Presbytery, however, furnished information of which advantage was taken in the preparation of the Synod's Report. The Synod of Montreal and Ottawa had to confess that in 1881, as nearly as could be estimated, two-fifths of its Sessions failed to send replies to the questions which were submitted to them. Though in the important Presbytery of Montreal twenty-one Sessions sent no reply during last year, the Synod has to report a much smaller number of delinquents than in the previous year. With regard to the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, your Committee have to state that the Pre-bytery of Saugeen sent no Report, and that several Sessions in the Presbytery of Lindsay and in the Presbytery of Owen Sound sent no replies during the past year. It appears that in the Synod of Hamilton and London the Presbytery of London sent no Report, and that eighteen Sessions in the Presbytery of Hamilton are in the category of delinquents. The Report of that Synod contains the satisfactory intelligence that "the year gone by is one of the most prosperous in a spiritual sense that this section of the Church has ever known." Your Committee received a Report from the Presbytery of Rock Lake, Manitoba. No Roport, however, was forwarded by the Synod of that Province. Whatever extenuating causes may obtain in connection with such an omission on the part of the Synod of Manitoba, your Committee are of opinion that it will be a matter of great regret to the members of Assembly that no Report on the State of Religion has been received from a portion of our Church, which has for several years engaged the earnest attention of the Assembly, and in which the members of our Church naturally take the deepest interest. Your Committe has chosen to be somewhat explicit in furnishing the Assembly with information respecting the attention which was given during the past year to the questions that were submitted to the Sessions of the Church regarding the State of Religion. Your Committee believe that if the Assembly continues its admonition to Sessions, the expectation may fairly be entertained that at no distant day Reports will be received from all our Sessions, and that thus it will be possible so far as himan observation and sagacity can avail, to determine how the cause of pure religion is progressing among all the congregation, and throughout all the bodies of our Church. While great deference work of the Church with all its Spiritual results is such as never can be tabulated or put upon paper by any Committee or embodied in any Report that may be drawn up," your Committee beg respectfully to maintain that in seeking to gather even such information as is accessible to human judgment with regard to the State of Religion, the General Assembly is pursuing a course which

cannot fail to confer very important benefits in the Church at large.

Your Committee beg to remark that, as it was deemed advisable by the Assembly of last year to determine the method which had obtained until that time in the preparation of questions affecting the State of Religion, and to assign to Presbyteries the pewer and the permission to frame such questions as might be considered most suitable to the peculiar circumstances of any Presbytery, it is somewhat difficult to observe lucidity and conciseness in the preparation of this Report.

Your Committee have great pleasure in conveying the assurance to the Assembly that all the Esports which have been forwarded to them speak in very favourable terms of the success which has attended the ordinary measure of grace during the past year. The Report of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces is to the effect that "the people generally prize highly the ordinances of God's House, and obey the Apostolic injunction not to forsake the assembling of themselves together." The reference in the Report of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa to the attendance of our people in the anctuary, and to the reverence wherewith the Sacrament and services of the Church are regarded, is of an encouraging character. These favourable words occur in the Report of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston: "It is surely a matter for profound thankfulness that, notwithstanding the many materializing influences of the age we live in, the public services of the sanctuary are securing an increasing hold upon the affections of the people." It is stated in the Report of the Synod of Hamilton and London "that year oy year our people are putting more value on the ordinary means of grace. \* \* \* Not the least encouraging feature of these Reports is the evidence which is furnished by them that the ordinary means of grace are supported and appreciated more highly than ever." The Presbytery of Rock Lake repeats that the attendance is increasing, and that there are many satisfactory and hopeful signs of Spiritual life in nearly all the congregations."

Your Committee are confident that the members of Assembly will regard with great satisfaction the information that the ordinary ministrations of God's House have been largely blessed during the bast year. While all lovers of the Gospel of the Son of God have always cause to rejoice whenever and wherever it is favourably influencing the hearts and spirits of men, it must in an eminent degree be gratifying to know that the normal methods of presenting the truth of God to the human heart and conscience, and of building up believers in their most holy faith, are successful. For it must never be forgotten that the healthful existence and the vigorous perpetuation of the Gospel acrosothe ages, are, so far as human agencies are concerned, inseparably associated with the Christian Church. At a time when adventitions methods of imparting religious instruction are in vogue in our own as well as in other lands, it must afford the members of Assembly particular pleasure that all our Synods speak in terms so satisfactory and so hopeful respecting the ordinary means of grace.

So far as what is commonly known as a special work of grace is concerned, or, to vary the phraceology, so far as regard is had to evangelistic services, your Committee have to report that such ervices have not been held to any large extent during the past year. Where such services have been held, however (as in the Presbyteries of Lanark and Renfrew, and elsewhere), the result has been a puckening of the spiritual life of the people, and a considerable accession to the membership of the congregations.

The reports which have been submitted to your Committee concur in recommending that wherever evangelistic services are held, they should be conducted by ministers of our own Church, Certain Presbyteries, and the Synods of Hamilton and London, call attention to "the necessity of greater care in choosing labourers, and caution against receiving many who come as professional revivalists." The experience of the Presbytery of Hamilton is thus detailed:—"Some of our Churches in past years employed a foreign evangelist with large and promising results for a time, and followed by a state of spiritual paralysis and atrophy that renders large masses of the young

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favourable sions of our mmittee are ular during rom all the the latter people almost inaccessible an impervious to all ordinary Gospel means and influences, and they are now to be found in the skating rink and in the ball room, seeking the excitement which they no longer find in the manual of green.

longer find in the means of grace.

Your Committee are happy to find that a commendable amount of attention is given to Sunday school and Bible classes throughout the Church. It is stated in the Report of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces that "Sunday schools generally are reputed to be doing good work, in supplementing parental instruction." It appears from the Report of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa menting parental instruction." that a large addition was made during the past year to the membership of the Church by means of the Sunday school. In fourteen congregations in the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew there was an accession in the aggregate of one hundred and sixty-live communicants through the Sunday school and the Bible class. These remarks are made in the Report of the Synod of Hamilton and London

"Many of the young people are passing into the communion of the Church. In a large and growing number of cases, the training of the young is turned over to the Sunday schools." Sunday school work, it is averred, "no matter how efficient it is, is a sad substitute for home training. The Church must sound a note of alarm on this point, and solemnly warn against a tendency that will

prove ruinous in the end.

With regard to the very important question as to how our young people can be brought into the communion of the Church, your Committee beg to commend to the Assembly an inquiry which imade in the Report of the Synod of Hamilton and London: "Do we give our children their proper place and character as within the covenant, and treat them as the children of the Church. Without presuming to offer any accurate definition of the relation in which children stand to the Christian Church in virtue of their baptism, your Committee venture to suggest that it would be well for our ministers to impress on the young more generally and seriously than perhaps is now the case that they are already within the pale of the Church, and that it therefore becomes them, and that indeed the very fact of their baptism presupposes, that whenever they have reached a sufficient degree of wisdom and intelligence, they will make a public profession of their faith in Christ.

It must be a source of great satisfaction to the Assembly that in our day the Christian Church

is realizing, more generally and earnestly than perhaps has ever been the case before, that Christians are the body of Christ and members in particular: in other words, that Christians, whether in the capacity of Churches or Congregations, are collectively the body of Christ, and, as individuals, are limbs or members of that body; that, accordingly, every member has his own work to do, and that a listless or inactive Christian ought to be regarded, and must speedily come to be regarded, as a

contradiction in terms.

To a question which was asked by the Presbytery of Glengarry the reply was returned: new idea to many of our people, that of every member being a co-worker with the Lord. The old and popular view seemed to be that if a professing Christian is usually right in his social relations. regular at public worship, giving of his means an occasional offering, he is doing all that may be required of him a view still very prevalent. Your Committee beg to remark that as the view to which reference has now been made doubtless pervades our Church to a large extent at least, it is on every account advisable to admonish the members of our congregations that they have their own work to do, that they sail they alone can do that work and ought to do it, and that no less is involved in their being limbs or members of the body of Christ. The Synod of Toronto and Kingston maintains that "immense possibilities of good seem to be wrapped up in a suggestion which one of it-Presbyteries made, to the effect that there ought to be in every congregation a society the duty of whose members should be to go out into the highways and hedges, and compel the careless to come in that the House of God may be filled." It is averred in the Report of the Synod of Hamilton and London that "if there were more systematic visiting on the part of our intelligent, earnest and devoted men and women, a brighter day would dawn. It is a shame to the Crurch that she allowso many to grow up within her borders and permits them to be cared for by those who are as ignorant as themselves, and in consequence to get a stone instead of bread." Your Committee believes that attention is thus directed to a means which for not hitherto been developed to any appreciable extent in our Church, whereby, without imposing any severe labour on our communicants, or inducing them to assume the functions of the preacher or religious instructor, or without interfering with the discharge of their daily avocations, they could render very efficient aid, and be instrumental in bringing many into the Church. By deferring to the spirit of the words which are recorded regarding Andrew, that he brought his brother Simon to Jesus "and he brought him to Jesus the members of our congregations can contribute material assistance towards increasing the attendance in the sanctuary, towards removing the difficulty which is experienced in inducing our young people to become communicants, and therefore towards making our Church more useful and powerful in the land than it is or can otherwise be.

It must be at all times pleasant to contemplate the least accession which would be made to the power and vitality of Christianity in the world were all the members of the body of Christ to perform their respective duties with faithfulness and vigour. It appears to your Committee that the loud appeals which are made at home and abroad to the zeal and liberality of Christians are so poweful. and indeed so irresistible, that much larger gains to the cause of Christ can with all confidence be

expected in the time that is before us than have been realized for centuries.

Your Committee regret that they cannot speak in favourable terms regarding family worship and the cultivation of religion in the home. The remark is made in the Report of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, that "the pressure of our modern life is too frequently allowed to shorten the time allotted to that service even when it does not suspend or push it aside altogether." of Montreal and Ottawa reports that "there is a perceptible improvement in the observance of family worship, and that the propriecy of offering to God the morning and evening sacrifice of praise and prayer in the home and in the family is receiving wider recognition." The Report of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston is to the effect that it is only too apparent that there is great room for improvement in the religious tone of the home life. It is apparent to your Committee that the cultivation of religion in the home is not receiving that measure of attention to which it is unquestionably entitled, and that there is a necessity for directing the minds of our people to a more serious and consiste religion, the of the Churc

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As giving o can be induced which go very state that in th and consistent observance of that Important duty. With regard to the entire subject of family religion, the language of one of the Reports is very appropriate: "Here we reach the very citadel of the Church's strength and efficiency; the corner-stone on which the whole edifice is built."

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The reports which have been forwarded to your Committee bestow considerable attention on prayer meetings, on the manner in which such meetings are conducted, and on the interest which is taken in them by the elders and members of the Church. It is clear to your Committee that the prayer-meetings, with some incouraging exceptions, are not well attended, and that no adequate interest is taken in them. Were the Assembly to adopt the language which occurs in one of the Reports, that "the prayer-meeting is a spiritual thermometer indicating the temperature of religious life in a congregation," then the admission seems to be unavoidable either that the religious life of our congregations is unsatisfactory, or that the test which the prayer-meeting furnishes is to be accepted with many modifications. Your Committee is convinced that after every legitimate allowance has been made for the demand of business, and for other extenuating circumstances, a much larger proportion of our congregations ought to attend the prayer-meeting.

Such references as these occur in the Report of one of our Synols concerning the interest which our elders take in the prayer-meetings: "The interest of the elders may be deep but it is not manifest." "The elders are not wanting in interest but there is room for great improvement." It is stated in the Report of another Synol, "that many of the elders would have to set a better example than they do at present before they urge others."

It is a stated in the property of another synol, "that many of the elders would have to set a better example than they do at present before they urge others."

It appears that particular enquiry was made by some of the Presbyteries in the Synod of Hamilton and London respecting the work and functions of Edders. It is to be regretted that the result of this enquiry is "that elders do not magnify their office nor improve their opportunities as they might." Your Committee are mindful that it behoves all who name the name of Christ, whether they are occupying influential positions in His Church or not, to defer without hesitation, even when their wisdom is ripest and their read is warmest, and their succe as is estensibly greatest, to His own words, "So likewise ye, when ye shall have done all those things which are commanded you, say we are unprofitable servants, we have done that which was our duty to do." This citation from the Report of the Synod of Hamilton and London has certainly the merit of being at least forcible and unambiguous. The spiritual force of many of our congregations would not suffer any sensible diminution, if the whole eldership were removed, and in some instances it would be a happy deliverance. And though we have many 1 oble men in the eldership, to whom the Church is greatly inbebted, yet with some exceptions, the ideal elder is a development awaiting future days. He is still sleeping in his native elements.

Your Committee beg to insert a reply, which was received by the Presbytery of Glengarry, to a question affecting the peculiar work of Sessions. "The Session finds these conferences very helpful indeed. We meet, and each elder gives us a report of his district and states any difficulty that he may have. When any difficulty is reported the elders take counsel together as to the best method of dealing with the matter, and may appoint one of their number to co-operate with the elder who has the difficulty. From the little experience which we have had of such conferences, we have found them exceedingly helpful and profitable to the members of the Session." Your Committee take the liberty of commending the practice of the Session whose Report has just been cited. It may be afely affirmed that at no time has the power of our eldership been sufficiently developed and utilized; when every allowance has been made for the pressure of business and for the modesty which elders, whe are otherwise able and sensible, and carnest, and influential, are want to exhibit, your Committee are of opinion that, by assigning to an elder a district of sulficient size and convenience, he could, without much difficulty, find leisure to cultivate an intimate acquaintances with the families in his district, and thereby to advance the welfare of the congregation.

As liberality is an indication or a criterion of the Life of the Church, concerning which there can be little or no difference of opinion, your Committee have the satisfaction of informing the Assembly that the Reports which contain any reference to liberality in the support of ordinances are very favourable. The Reports which were made to the Synod of the Maritime Provinces are said to be "unusually encouraging, though every Presbytery feels that there is still much room for improvement in the matter of giving." The Synod of Montreal and Ottawa has to report that there is a marked and steady increase in the liberality of our congressions, and that no complaints are made, as might reasonably be expected, in consequence of the comparative depression of business which has prevailed for some time. Your Committee regret that no information whatever is given in the Report of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston respecting the liberality of its congregations during the past year. The regret of your Committee is all the greater because many of the richest and most liberal congregations of our Church are within the bounds of that Synod. In the Report of the Synod of Hamilton and London such remarks as these are made: 'Much yet remaining to be done in the way of Christian liberality, very few Reports express satisfaction with the present standard, and many regret that matters are not better." In the Presbytery of Sarnia five congregations have risen to and above the minimum; one to 8800, another to 8900; while a third, which began with a salary of 8400, has increased year by year till this year representatives from it came of their own accord, and informed the Presbytery that they were now prepared to do without supplement, and meantime they have built and paid for a church of \$3,500 and only fifty families.

It is a thrice-told tale that the Christian Churches of the world and the numerous Societies, whose very existence is to be ascribed to the broad and philanthropic spirit of the Gospel, are much retarded in their operations through the dilliculty which is experienced in raising or in obtaining a sufficient sum of money to carry on as well as to extend their various undertakings. Your Committee are opinion that it is incumbent on the ministers of our Church to impress more strongly than ever on our people that to be liberal, according to the measure of his prosperity, forms, and ought to be

regarded as forming, an essential element in the conduct of every worshipper of God.

As giving or liberality is largely a matter of education, and as not a few of our members who can be induced to be liberal even in a small measure too commonly add unpleasant qualifications which go very for to destroy the value of their liberality altogether, your Committee venture to state that in their judgement one powerful means of acquiring strength and money for the vigorous

prosecution of the various schemes and enterprises of our Church is to be found in so educating the boys and girls of our congregations that as soon as they have any money of their own, or begin to earn money for themselves, they will contribute towards the support and extension of the Gospel. Your Committee beg to make this citation from the Report of the Synod of Hamilton and Loudon, "One report States that the young are not trained to give, the head of the family alone contributing."

Your Committee beg to bring under the favourable notice of the Assembly the method which the Presbytery of Toronto adopted during last year of holding congregational Conferences on the State of Religion. Deputations consisting either of a minister and a layman or of two uninsters were appointed to visit congregations. Your Committee are happy to find that important benefits have resulted from the method of which mention has been made. People and ministers unite in giving a verdict of unqualified approval of that means of ascertaining and promoting the State of Religion among the congregations of that Presbytery, and the other members giving nothing. And when these grow up to have homes of their own, giving to the cause of Christ is an entirely new thing to them, a lesson yet to be learned. Whatever comes from a home should be divided among its members, and each learn to give something, that people young and old alike may learn to worship God by their contributions and in the collections as in the prayer and praise."

Your Committee have thus endeavoured to present to the General Assembly as faithful and alucid a summary as they could of the reports which were submitted to them. There is surely profound cause for thankfulness that there are strong evidences of improvement and of progress among our congregations, inasunuch as a Church we are realizing more fully what our obligations are, and what the best methods are for evoking the co-operation and liberality of our members, and for deepening and strengthening the power of the Gospel in our land. Calmness and courage may well enter into the character of any Church that, like our own, has begun to realize the grandeur of its responsibilities, and to summon to its aid all its members that each one, conscious of the duty which he has to perform and fired with rather the enthusiasm, may prove himself a good soldier of Jesus Christ, and enter a good warfare for the cause of pure and undefiled religion among the Presbyterian homes and settlements of the Dominion of Canada. If we take the stern logic of facts as our guide or criterion, your Committee are very confident that for ability and devotion on the part of our ministens; for faithfulness on the part of the majority of our members; for the services which our Church is able to render to our country; for the majority of our members; for our commendable resolve to pass beyond ourselves and, honouring the instructions of the Saviour of mankind, to think kindly of the heathen, and to put forth a hand to help them out of their spiritual ignorance—our Church can compare very favourably indeed with any of the Christian Churches of the world. But ten years ago there was planted in this city an ecclesiastical acorn, not without some anxiety, but amid courageous hopefulness. Already it has become to the delight of ten thousand Presbyterian hearts, a sapling fair and fresh and vigorous, inviting all the members of our Church to entertain a strong confidence that with all the wisdom and appliances and energies which are available, and whi

#### REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

In the Report of last year reference was made to a Bill introduced in the Dominion Parliament by Mr. John Charlton, M.P., in the interests of Sabbath observance, and which had received its first reading. At an early stage of the present session the Bill was brought forward for its second reading, and Mr. Charlton addressed the House in its support, in one of the ablest and most comprehensive speeches ever delivered on the Sabbath question before any legislative body.

Exception was taken to the Bill by the Secretary of State and the first Minister, on the ground that the matter with which it proposed to deal falls within Provincial jurisdiction, as affecting civil rights. If Parliament were prepared to assume the responsibility of declaring a breach of the Sabbath a crime instead of merely an unlawful act, the matter might thereby be brought within the competence of Parliament. On this ground the Bill was declared ultra vires of the Dominion Parliament.

Your Committee are happy to say that, so far as Ontario is concerned, this decision has been promptly accepted.

A Bill, substantially the same as Mr. Charlton's, was introduced by Mr. Wood, M.P.P., during the recent session of the Ontario Legislature, and has become law. The Bill provides that Sunday excursions, or the carriage of Sunday passengers for amusement or pleasure only, shall be unlawful, and shall not be deemed a lawful conveying of travellers withing the meaning of any statute of Ontario permitting the conveyance of travellers an the Lord's day. The owners of any steamboat or railway, by which any such Sunday excursion is wholly or partly made, are liable to a fine of \$400 for each offence.

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In the Report of the Committee of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston on Sabbath observance, reference is made to the profanation of the Sabbath prevalent at Owen Sound and Port Arthur in connection with the lake traffic of the Canada Pacific Railway. The Presbytery of Owen Sound has opened correspondence with Mr. Beatty, manager of the lake traffic, in reference to this evil.

It has become a matter of public notoriety that certain newspapers in Toronto, under pretence of meeting the demands of public anxiety in reference to the troubles in the North-West, recently commenced the publication and sale of a Sunday issue. Had it been simply the issuing of a bulletin on occasion of some occurrence of great concernment, the case would have been quite different. The friends of the Sabbath in the city acted promptly, the law was put in force, arrests were made, fines were imposed, and the Sunday newspaper, a pestilent evil wherever it has been tolerated, was, within a very short time, suppressed. The example set by Toronto in this matter is worthy of being commended in the very strongest terms.

In conclusion your Committee recommend:-

1. That Synods be instructed to report, through their respective Committees on Sabbath Observance, to the Assembly's Committee.

2. That the Bill recently passed by the Ontario Leigislature in the interest of Sabbath observance be printed with this Report in the Appendix of the Minutes of Assembly.

3. That in the other Provinces of the Dominion where similar legislation may be needed, Synods be directed to request the co-operation of the other branches of the Christian Church in order to the obtaining of such legislation.

4. That local Committees be formed where needed, and that funds be provided for putting the law in force.

BILL. An Act to provide for the Better Observance of the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, by Prohibiting Sunday Excursions of certain kinds.

HER MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:-

1. Sunday excursions by steamboats plying for hire, or by railway, or in part Sunday by any such steamboat and in part by railway, and having for their only, or prinexcursions cipal object, the carriage of Sunday passengers for amusement or pleasure only, and to go and return on the same day by the same steamboat or railway, or any other. owned by the same persons or company, shall be unlawful, and shall not be deemed a lawful conveying of travellers within the meaning of any statute of Ontario permitting the conveyance of travellers on the Lord's day.

2. The owner or owners of any steamboat or railway by which any such Sunday Penalty. excursion is wholly or partly made, shall for each offence against this Act, forfeit and pay the sum of \$400, to be recovered by action before any court having jurisdiction in civil cases to that amount by any person suing for the same under this Act, and for the purposes thereof.

3. The action for the recovering of any penalty incurred under this Act must Procedure. be brought before a court having competent jurisdiction, as aforesaid, in the place from which the steamboat or train employed in the unlawful excursion, on which the action is founded, started, or through, or at which it passed or stopped in the course thereof, and must be brought within six months after the commission of the alleged offence; and notice in writing of such action, and the cause thereof, must be given to the defendant at least one month before the commencement of

4. All sums of money recovered by action under the foregoing provisions of this Application Act shall be appropriated as follows: - One moiety thereof to the plaintiff in the of penalties. action, and the other moiety to the municipality of the city, town, village or place from which the unlawful excursion started, to be applied for the purposes of meh municipality.

5. The expression "owner or owners" in this Act includes any corporation "owner," owning the steamboat or railway referred to, and the expression, "person or meaning of. persons," includes corporations.

6. This Act shall not apply to ferries or to steamboats when employed thereon. ply to ferries.

7. The captain or other person in charge of any steamboat, and the conductor Liability of or other person in charge of any train, used for the purpose of any such Sunday captain or excursion shall be liable to the like penalties as are prescribed by the Revised other person Statute, departed 180, entitled day but the Prescribed by the Revised in charge. Statute, chapter 189, entitled An Act to Prevent the Profanation of the Lord's Day, for the violation of that Act; and the said penalties shalf be recoverable, and applied in like manner as the penalties in the said Act mentioned.

### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance have to report as follows:-

Early in February last a list of questions, prepared by a sub-committee, was sent to all pastors in charge of congregations, to all missionaries whose names appear on the Synod rolls, and in the case of vacancies, to the elders representing them.

These questions were designedly such as to admit of brief answers, and yet such as might

well elicit all the information and suggestions necessary.

Returns have been obtained from all the Synods of the Western Section of the Church. The Synod of the Maritime Provinces, which meets in the month of October, has not reported as a Synod; but reports from three of its Presbyteries, together with an interesting and comprehensive statement from the Convener of its Temperance Committee, largely compensate for the lack of the more formal document.

Of the twenty-seven Presbyteries in the Western Section of the Church, nineteen have reported to their respective Synods, and five of the others, together with twenty-one Sessious, have reported directly to your Committee. These reports, as a whole, are of the most cheering character, and seem fairly to reflect the spirit of a movement more fruitful in results during the

past year than its most sanguine friends could have ventured to expect.

1. In answer to the first question—"What progress has the cause of Temperance and Prohibition been making in your locality during the past year; and what means have been employed in your congregation to promote Temperance and Prohibition sentiment"? the reports, with marked unanimity, testify to the great progress made during the year, and look forward with enlarged expectations to more signal victories.

Many of these reports have to tell of battles fought and triumphs won—triumphs which have been largely helped and enhanced by the ministers and members of our own Church, who by earnest advocacy, pointed appeals, active effort, and ballots cast for the protection of domestic happiness and public morality, have contributed their full share to the success of one of the

grandest social and moral reforms of this century.

II. The second question inquires whether or not the recommendations of last General Assembly have been carried out: (1) As to the formation of Temperance societies in congregations; and (2) "that our Sessions and S. S. teachers, in their respective spheres be recommended to give special prominence to the subject of Temperance." In a large number of congregations such societies have existed for several years, while others think them unnecessary owing chiefly to the fact that there abound similar societies of an undenominational character that are doing a good work and enjoying public confidence. A large proportion of our elders and S. S. teachers are total abstainers, and many of them are actively engaged in promoting the cause of Temperance.

III. The third question is—"Has the deliverance of last General Assembly, as found on page 34 of Assembly's Minutes, been brought before your congregations?" A large number of Sessions have substantially compiled with the spirit of the request and answer in the affirmative. In the case of such as have failed to do so, widely differing reasons are assigned. The report of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston alleges that the neglect is due to the fact that said deliverance of last Assembly "embodies the views of the most radical wing of our Temperance Committee, and is too hot and strong for most of their brethren"—while, on the other hand, our brethren of Prince Edward Island inform us that they no longer need such a deliverance, and would rather not, by reading it, suggest to their people that the Church, as a whole, had been so long in

waking up to its duty.

IV. In reference to question four, which inquires into the working of the Canada Temperance Act, your Committee has obtained, on the whole, most satisfactory replies. In P. E. I. the Act is found to be easily enforced. In one county it is reported that the traffic would be dead, were it not that a few unprincipled medical men prolong its agonies by granting certificates for procuring liquor contrary to the spirit of the law. In Nova Scotia the Act works well wherever the effort is made for its enforcement; but in New Brunswick the difficulty of enforcing the law has been greatly intensified by recent decisions in the courts. In Ontario but little testimony could be elicited, as in only one county had the Temperance Act been in operation prior to the 1st of May last, but that little is eminently satisfactory. As to its effect on business, the County Clerk of Halton certifies that the assessed value of property in the county has increased \$685,775 between the years 1880.4, which disproves the allegation, so frequently made, that the adoption of the Scott Act tends to depreciate the value of real estate. As to morals, it may be stated that on the 30th of September last, the Inspector of Ontario Prisons shows only two empty gaols—one being the Halton County Gaol, and the other the gaol in Lindsay—where the late Father Stafford laboured so long and earnestly in the cause of Temperance. In the County of Oxford the Canada Temperance Act has been in force since the 1st of May last, and the Mayor of Woodstock, the county town, stated a few days ago that "the passage of the Act has stopped nineteen-twentieths of the drinking in Woodstock," and he has authorized Temperance men to make whatever use they please of this statement.

V. To question five, viz.: "Is it your opinion that the people are prepared for total Prohibition?" by far the larger number of reports answer in the affirmative, while others admit that the

sentiment of the country is fast ripening in that direction.

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II. This A Canada in pass ness, and than constitutional will reject said strengthening VI To the sixth and last question, asking for any information or expression of views, a number of practical suggestions have been offered, some of which are: That there should be great faithfulness shown in the pulpit in dealing with intemperance—that Temperance text-books should be used in our secular schools—that a Temperance article should be inserted in each number of the Record—that temperance legislation should proceed in the line of the Canala Temperance Act, leading up to total Prohibition, etc. Some Sessions, having used unfermented wine at the Lord's Supper, remind us that unfermented wine is a fact—that it is kept by the tun in France, and can be had or made ir Canada. In this connection the Report of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa refers us for full information to the work of Dr. Norman Kerr, of London, "Unfermented Wine a Fact."

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APPENDIX.

Under this heading also many reports take occasion to condemn unsparingly the Senate's so-called amendments to the Cruada Temperance Act, and the hope is frequently and earnestly expressed that this attempt to thwart the will of the people, and rob the friends of Temperance of the fruits of long years of struggle and toil, will meet with an emphatic rebuke from this Church whose principles of government are the very essence of true freedom, and whose history has been a noble record of loyalty to constitutional government, and protest against tyranny and

Your Committee feel bound to say that never before was the outlook for the principles of Temperance so encouraging as now. The great strength of this movement lies, not in the degree of legislative reform attained, nor in the attitude of legislative bodies towards it, but in the thorough awakening of the people to a proper sense of their obligations and interests in regard to the great evils of intemperance. Yet it is gratifying to note that since the passage of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, seventy-five contests have been waged in the different Provinces of the Dominion, resulting in sixty-two victories for the friends of Temperance and Prohibition. Fifty-seven counties and cities have adopted the Act, and forty-two are already under its operation, embracing upwards of a million and a-half of our population. In Ontario alone twenty-five, of her forty-three counties, have declared at the polls that they desire the total suppression of the liquor traflic, and these counties cover two-thirds of her populated territory. A total majority of over 50,000 votes has been cast for the Act. Six attempts to repeal it have all been signally defeated, and there are seventy-four members in the Dominion Parliament, elected by constituencies in which the Canada Temperance Act has been carried.

Thus more and more are the people coming to realize the fact that to liceuse wrong is a national crime, and that to derive a revenue from that which works such ruin to the race is to "have fellowship with the throne of iniquity," and to "frame mischief by a law," and the fore-mentioned triumphs indicate clearly that the people are now disposed to act in accord with their convictions.

It may be further stated that in the few defeats sustained the adverse majorities were very small, whilst the majorities in favour of the Act, as indicated above, were large and in some instances overwhelming.

In these contests the friends of Temperance owe not a little to the faithful and persistent advocacy of Prohibition by many of the leading secular journals throughout all the Provinces, the value of this advocacy being specially felt in the Province of Quebec and Eastern Ontario where the Montreal Witness has for so many years borne unflinching testimony to the principles of Prohibition

powerful impulse which has carried this movement so far, based as it is upon the firmest convictions cherished by the most enlightened and resolute of our people, may be relied upon to press it forward in the face of all opposition to its proper issue in the complete suppression of the liquor traffic.

In conclusion your Committee would submit the following deliverance for the adoption of this Assembly:—

#### BECOMMENDATIONS.

I. This Assembly reaffirms its deliverance of last year to the following effect:-

1st. That we regard the ..affic in strong drink as one of the greatest hinderances to the progress of the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ.

2nd. That in view of the evils wrought by this scourge of our race, this Assembly would hail with gladness the utter extermination of the traffic in intoxicating liquor as a beverage, by the power of example, public opinion, and the strong arm of the law.

3rd. That we rejoice at the wonderful advancement of Temperance and Prohibition sentiment throughout the world, and especially in our own land; and would recommend our people by voice, vote and example, and by all peaceful and righteous means, to work for the abolition of this great evil.

4th. That we reassert our approval of the principal of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, and recommend the adoption of said Act as the best available means for the legal suppression of the traffic.

II. This Assembly records its emphatic protest against the recent action of the Senate of Canada in passing amendments to the Canada Temperance Act, calculated to destroy its usefulness, and that in the face of the popular will previously expressed in the manuer provided by constitutional government; and hereby expresses the earnest hope that the House of Commons will reject said amendments, and consent to no change in the Act, except in the direction of strengthening its prohibitory character and increasing the means of enforcing it.

III. Believing, as we do, that in this cause permanent success can only be attained by instilling into the minds of the young, the Assembly again enjoins all parents, pastors, and Sabbath school teachers to give due prominence to the training of the rising generation in the principles of Temperance and Prohibition.

IV. The Assembly again records its thankful recognition of the earnest efforts put forth by

the Christian women of our land on behalf of this cause.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND OF THE MARITIME PROV. INCES.

The Committee of the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces beg leave to report as follows:-

Balance ..... leaving a surplus of \$2,532.53 to be added to our capital fund, which now amounts, with arrears of members' dues bearing interest, to \$62,966.90.

During the year one minister upon the Fund, the Rev. Murdoch Stewart, has died, and his widow is now in receipt of an annuity. No widow upon the Fund has died during the year. Two orphans have reached the age of eighteen, and are now no longer upon the Fund. There are thus now receiving annuities seventeen widows, one family of two children deprived of both parents, and eight fatherless children. The total amount paid in annuities since the formation of the Fund has

been \$19,606.99.

Four ministers have joined the Fund during the year, the whole number of contributors at this date being ninety-four. Fifteen of these, however, have removed from the bounds of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces having only seventy-nine contributors resident there. Of these, seven belong to the Synod in connection with the Church of Scotland; so that only seventy-two in connection with the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, including our foreign missionaries, are contributing to the Fund. Of course a number of our ministers are in a position in which such a provision will not be needed. Some, too, are upon other funds. A number also are connected with life assurance associations. But when all such cases are taken into consideration, there must still remain a considerable number of families for whom no provision has been made in the event of their natural provider being removed, and events in Providence have read some painful lessons as to the consequences which may result from such neglect. Your Committee have, therefore, during the past year been pressing upon the younger ministers the importance of availing themselves of the advantages of the scheme in time. They cannot but feel that no other institution can afford to widows and orphans the same advantages at so little cost. Some of our ministers are paying in life assurance annually sums of fifty or even one hundred dollars, and yet to a widow and orphan children our Fond would in many cases secure nearly equal advantages. We need only mention the fact that though our scheme only commenced in 1865, and it was three years later before any annuities were payable, yet already two widows have received each over \$2,200, and another over \$2,900, and each

of them may yet receive annuity for a good many years to come.

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## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE AGED AND INFIRM MINIS-TERS' FUND (WESTERN SECTION), FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30TH APRIL, 1885.

During the year recently closed, forty-six Aged or infirm Ministers have received assistance from the Fund. Of these the names of nine appear for the first time on the list of beneficiaries. Fournames appear for the lost time, those of Dr. Mann and Messrs. Fletcher, Allan, and Morrison. The name of Mr. Forrest also, whose case calls for particular notice, has been removed for the present. Mr. Forrest has, for the last three years, regularly refunded his half-yearly payment. Though his health is far from being re-established, it is thought that, so long as he is able for the work he is regaged in, it is better that his name should not appear on the list. Mr. James Hanran's name has, after correspondence with the Presbytery of Quebec, been replaced, the Committee being satisfied that there is no good reason for its permanent removal. Besides the payment of two years' annuity to Mr. Hanran, it will be seen that other four of the beneficiaries have been paid for a larger or smaller portion of the previous year, besides receiving their annuties for last year—the back payments amounting in all to \$698.50.

While this list is now reduced to forty-one, by the removals above referred to, the present number of annuitants is forty-three, Messrs. John Irvine and W. A. Lang, who are entitled to benefit by the action of last Assembly, not having presented their applications and relative papers to the Committee, till the year was so far advanced as to make it convenient to place their first payment against the income of this year. The action of the approaching Assembly will very probably bring up the number to fiftu.

The whole amount paid to annuitants is \$8,661, and exceeds the amount reported last year by \$1,172. The increase would have been \$1,707, if the Committee had been able to order payment up to \$220, the maximum of the last four years. It will be seen, however, from the statement of income that follows, that they were not at liberty to do this, and that, even in ordering payment up to \$200, they have not kept themselves strictly within the regulations. While, by the action of last Assembly, ten ministers became entitled to benefit from the Fund, there has been a falling off in the income available for current expenditure. The interest on capital shows an increase of \$274.78; but the amount received from the rate is \$119.94 less than that of the previous year, and the congregational contributions have fallen from \$5,532.38 to \$4,974.02, a decrease of \$558.29. The Assembly, therefore, will see that, while the Committee were instructed to assist ten additional ministers, the Church has fallen off to the extent of \$403.45 in supplying the means at their disposal. Had the Committee kept close to their regulations, they could not have ordered the payment of more than \$180. But, after fully considering all circumstances, they felt they might take the responsibility of ordering payment up to \$200. In doing this, the, not only exhaust the working balance of \$748.41, with which the year began, but use for current expenditure a number of small bequest and donations, amounting to \$684.50, and as appears from the balance against the Fund, incar a debt of \$333.87. They would not have considered themselves justified in assuming such a responsibility were it not that they are receiving assurances from all quarters that much more interest is being manifested in the Fund, as the result of their having, during the winter, called the attention of Presbyteries to its condition and the claims upon it, and that the i of the twenty-dollars by which most of the annuities have been reduced.

The Committee, before making an appeal to the Assembly, in view of the work that is before their official successors of the present year, think it well to present a statement, showing what habeen done for our Aged and Infirm Ministers from year to year, since the Assembly of 1878 passed the resolution providing for the increase of the capital.

The Committee, in founding upon the statements now presented an appeal to the Assembly and Church, in behalf of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, would respectfully submit that they have been obliged to work, during the last four years especially, under great disadvantages. The Widow-Fund of the branch of the Church that originated the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund, was so early instituted as to secure for it the accumulation of a large capital that prevented all anxiety in view of any possible strain to which it might be subjected. But the comparatively late institution of the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund rendered it impossible that, with the small annual income of a half collection, there should be any such accumulation, as would secure even a moderate annuity to retired ministers, when, after a few years, their number might be expected to increase much more rapidly than at first. The time accordingly soon came, when the little store that had been gathered had to be drawn upon for the payment of annuities. The Assembly, seven years ago, wisely laid an arrest upon the reduction of capital that had been going on for three years, and passed a resolution that has secured its increase from \$3,500 to \$13,000. But, though large additions have been annually made to the number of beneficiaries, the Assembly has not yet occupied itself with the serious consideration of the ability of the Fund to bear the overground burden laid upon it. With all due respect, the Committee would make two suggestions, one of which has been made before

more than once. They would suggest, in the first place, that the Assembly should without further delay the Assembly or lers a collection for the two beneficiary. Funds. They are fully persuaded that, so long as the Assembly or lers a collection for the two Funds on the same day, our people generally will construe the appointment as an intimation on the part of the Assembly that it does not regard the claims of either Fund as very urgent. It may be so in reference to the Widows' Fund, but all who take an intelligent interest in the schemes of the Church know that it is far otherwise in reference to the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund. The Committee would, therefore, once more earnestly urge the Assembly henceforth to appoint that the Congregational Collection for the Fund be made on a day for which menother collection is appointed, and thus remove a prevailing impression that is prejudicial to the interests of the Fund. They would also most respectfully suggest, that the Assembly, besides commending the Fund to the liberality of the Church, would place its own interest in the Fund beyond all question by setting upart a time for the thorough consideration of all matters connected with it. For they cannot but think that the hurried consideration of the Annual Report, after repeated postponements, which has been the usual treatment of it, is fitted to prejudice the Fund in the estimation of the Church. While every scheme of the Church is entitled to a portion of the Assembly's time, which shall be its own to the exclusion of all other matters, the Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund has a special claim to the Assembly's earnest consideration in view of the recent very rapid increase of the number of ministers dependent on it. The increase has been so great during the last five years that, if Presbyteries are faithful to the Fund, and careful that it be not resorted to and relied upon as a means to get rid of congregational difficulties, it will probably be found that the highest percentage of annuitants has been reached, or, in other words, that but for the extension of the Church in the new settlements, the removals from the list will from year to year balance the additions.

There being at present forty-three names on the list, and there being a likelihood that a few more may be added by the Assembly of this year, not less than 180,000 will be required to meet all claims. Allowing over \$2,000 as income from the rate and the capital, the congregations should be urged to contribute nearly \$3,000, an amount that would be largely exceeded, if the congregations generally were to follow the noble example of a few that are, some of them, even more than

exemplary.

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The Committee would, before closing, call the attention of the Assembly to the applications of everal ministers, who have not paid the rate hitherto, to have their forfeiture of claim to full benefit from the Fund cancelled. Instead of embodying these applications in their report, they think the proper course is to bring them before the Assembly by a separate document presenting the cir-

cumstances in detail.

The Committee would also ask the Assembly so far to modify the law respecting forfeiture, that the Committee shall have power to cancel it in the case of a minister who is not incre that seven years in arrear in his payment of rate. At present this power is in the hands of the Assembly. The Committee believe that the Assembly would not, in any case, refuse to grant the application that is now required in such cases; so that the giving of the power to the Committee would both save the time of the Assembly, and spare the feelings of ministers whose non-payment of rate may have been mainly owing to straitened circumstances.

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## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS.

Your Committee feel that the first sentences of their Report for the year which their labours embrace should record their thankfulness to Him who has preserved their souls in life, who has blessed His Church with peace and prosperity, who has promised to bless her still, and whose faithfulness in the past is an incentive and encouragement to pray that He will cause her to break forth yet farther upon the right hand and upon the left. Through the continued presence and working of Him who filleth all in all, and the pouring out of His Spirit, according to His promise, on individuals and families and congregations; and in answer to the believing and importunate supplications of those who set Zion before their chief joy, He has maintained and advanced her cause, and He calls upon her to bear testimony to the great things He has wrought for her.

Your Committee have had under their consideration the overture from the Presbytery of Sarnia, referred to them by the Assembly, asking a definition of a Family, what was to be regarded as constituting a Family, and to be reported as such in the Statistical Returns of Congregations. The following definition was proposed and approved of by all the members of the Committee except one, the ground of whose objection was that it was not a philosophical definition that was needed but a practical distinction: "A family is a number of individuals, joined by natural or other ties, living together under the same head." That may be regarded as the definition by the Committee, in support of which several reasons may be assigned, and if the General Assembly see proper to adopt it, or prefer another and think it necessary to have it published for the guidance of congregations, it may be embodied in the schedules prepared in future years.

It is to be assumed that all Presbyteries which last year reported congregations in their bounds as in arrears with the stipends of their ministers have carried out the injunction of the Assembly, and taken measures to have them paid. It is teared, however, that facts will come to light in this Report, showing that this injunction has not, in all instances at least, been executed.

Another recommendation in last year's Report, approved by the Assembly, was that Presbytery Clerks be reminded of their duty to return all names on their Rolls, both Professors in Colleges, Ministers who have retired with the leave of the Assembly, and others, and that all the salaries of such be entered in the column for stipend paid, as well as promised. On the sheet prepared for Presbyteries the attention of Clerks was called to this, but all have not attended to it—the Returns from Ilalifax, Montreal and Kingston report both names and salaries; Toronto gives the names but not the salaries; Winnipeg gives neither.

Your Committee have no means of knowing to what extent the instructions of last Assembly were fulfilled as to the appointment of a Committee in the bounds of each Presbytery, charged with the duty of collecting and tabulating the Statistical and Financial Reports of Congregations, but if they have been acted upon in all there are some in which no improvement has been made either in the fulness or accuracy of the returns sent in, or the seasonableness with which they have been forwarded to the Committee. The report from the Presbytery of Miramich was not received till the 21st of May - that from the Presbytery of Halifax, all whose congregations close their year with the 31st of December, was received on the 22nd of May—those of Winnipeg, Rock Lake and Brandon came in one parcel and thus evidently through some one person instead of from each Clerk directly, and reached the Committee on the 28th of May—and it was not till after the Convener had corresponded with the Clerks of these Presbyteries reminding them of their neglect or delay that the returns were procured. It may be inferred that unnecessary delay was imposed in commencing the compilation of this Report, and, indeed, it was at one time apprehended that the printer would be so far advanced with his work that they could not appear in the report submitted to the Assembly.

Although not a matter of any great moment yet it is only just to the Committees of preceding years to state that there is an error in the Minutes of the last General Assembly when disposing of the Report then presented. In an addendum the Committee are instructed to provide a column in the schedules for all families connected with congregations; such a column has been provided for years. What was intended was to insert a column additional for families connected with congregations contributing—or what perhaps should have been worded as not contributing—to the support of ordinances. This has now been done by your Committee in terms of these instructions; but they have to state that it has not reached, unless to a very limited extent, the object for which it was introduced. In the Presbytery of Toronto alone there are twenty congregations not furnishing the information requested; and, indeed, there are very few in which all give it. It may be premature to pronounce the question of no value. Perseverance may succeed in gaining fuller information, although there may be room for a difference of opinion as to whether it is of such importance as to deserve a place in the Statistics of the whole Church.

Your Committee felt themselves charged with a very important and in some respects delicate daty when it was entrusted to them to endeavour to ascertain if the congregational year might not in all cases, as it is now in many, be made conterminous with the calendar year. In applying themselves to the discharge of it they published the following in the slips sent down to congregations, "Please state fully and definitely the date at which your congregational year closes,"—a request not numecessary, as in some cases this has not been attended to, and even during this last year, and on one of the slips with this request, a return—which appears among the 'Delayed'—was received by the Convener with neither the name of the congregation—and it is a settled charge—nor of the Presbytery in whose bounds it is, nor the date, either year or month, entered. Farther, the question was proposed, "Do you know any good reason why the congregational year should not close with the calendar year?" These were prefixed to both the Statistical and Financial slips so that there might

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be the opportunity for the Session and also for the Managers to give their opinion. Then a circular was addressed to Presbyteries, attached to the sheet for collecting the Statistical Returns in tabulated form containing these questions: "1. How many congregations in your bounds report their year as terminating with the calendar year? 2. How many report their year as closing on the 31st of Alarch? 3. How many offer any objection to making the congregational year conterminous with the calendar year? 4. Please state briefly these objections."

Summarizing and condensing the answers received, it may be stated that 9 Presbyteries with 145 pastoral charges close their year with the 31st of December, except that 8ydney has 1 congregation, and Victoria and Richmond 1, which do not. These Presbyteries are the following:—Truro, Sydney, Victoria and Richmond, Halifax, Wallace, Pictou, St. John, Newfoundland, Glengarry. The Presbytery of Miramichi with 16 pastoral charges has 7 which close on the 31st of December, 6 on the 31st of March, and 3 on intervening dates. Montreal with 38 charges reports two-thirds, say 24, ending their year with the calendar one. Lanark and Renfrew with 28 charges has 11 which close their year with the calendar year, 9 with the 31st of March, 2 in April, 3 at various other dates, and 3 give no date. Peterborough has 22 charges, 15 congregations of these close their year with the 31st of December, and 11 on the 31st of March. Whitby with 14 charges has 10 'congregations closing with the calendar year, and 8 with the 31st of March. Limbsay, in whose bounds there are 14 pastoral charges, has 4 congregations ending their year with the 31st of December, and 1 partially ending at this date, and 14 with the 31st of March. In the Presbytery of Tornot, which contains 66 charges, 19 close with the 31st of December, and 21 with the 31st of March. Sangeen has 18 charges, and of these 9 congregations close their year with the calendar year, and 9 with the 31st of March. No report has been received from the Hamilton Presbytery, Paris with 20 pastoral charges; 20 congregations make their year conterminous with the calendar year, and 9 with the 31st of March. No report has been received from the Hamilton Presbytery. Summarizing and condensing the answers received, it may be stated that 9 Presbyteries with 145 year, and 9 with the 31st of March. No report has been received from the Hamilton Presbytery. Paris with 20 pastoral charges reports them all as ending their year with the calendar year for local purposes, but as taking on to the 31st of March for the Schemes of the Church. London, with 28 charges, has 18 winch end their year with the calendar year, and 10 with the 31st of March. In Chatham Presbytery, containing 21 charges, all close their year with the 31st of March. Stratford has 19 pastoral charges, 9 congregations in these close with the calendar year, and 18 with the 31st of March. Huron has 16 charges, and in these 8 congregations end their year with the 31st of December, and 16 with the 31st of March. Maitland reports about one-half of its congregations, say 11—for the number of its pastoral charges is 23—ending their year with the calendar year; one-fourth, say 6, with the 31st of March, one-fourth not reporting. Bruce, with 20 pastoral charges, reports 10 congregations closing with the calendar year, 14 with the 31st of March, and the others at varions dates. Sarnia has 20 pastoral charges, but the Clerk states that he has no means of knowing just now the dates of the congregational year, yet he had precisely the same opportunity of ascertaining this for his Presbytery that the Clerks of other Presbyteries had for theirs. Apparently he has not looked carefully at the returns sent him. he has not looked carefully at the returns sent him.

Summing these up we have in the Presbyteries mentioned 446 pastoral charges, and in these 204 congregations have the calendar year for their congregational year, and 180 close with the 31st of March, or a total of 346 congregations in 28 Presbyteries, taking in the 9 first named which end their

year on the 31st of December.

The following Presbyteries report the congregational year in their bounds as ending on the 31st of March:—Prince Edward Island with 27 pastoral charges; Lunenburg and Shelburne with 9; Quebec with 21; Ottawa with 25; Kingston with 28; Chatham with 21; Sarnia uncertain, but the Presbytery return is dated the 31st of March, with 20 charges, and Winnipeg, Rock Lake and Brandon not answering the questions, but whose Returns as Presbyteries are headed with the 31st of March, and containing say 94 charges or mission fields.

Adding these together there are 10 Preshyteries with 245 charges in which the congregational year closes with the 31st of March.

Brockville Presbytery with 18 pastoral charges dates its year to the 30th of April, the latest of

any in the Church.

No reply to the questions issued has been received from the following Presbyteries:—Truro, Halifax, St. John and Newfoundland,—but the Returns from each are dated the 31st of December, so that they may be regarded as approxing of this date—Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Ottawa, Brockville, Hamilton, Winnipeg, Rock Lake and Braudon, in all 8 Presbyteries, but they date from the 31st of March, or, in the one case already mentioned, 30th of April, so they may be looked upon as approving this date.

No Presbytery offers any objection to making the congregational year coincide in all cases with

the calendar year.

The Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew reports that there is a growing desire to have the two vears correspond.

The Presbytery of Maitland reports that the change would be a great improvement.

The Clerk of the Presbytery of Paris doubts if the congregations in his bounds can be brought to adopt the calendar year for the Schmass of the Church. But since they have adopted it already for local purposes, what objection can the se be against adopting it for the Schemes also? No inconsistent would be able that the first the Schmass of the Church. venience would be felt after the first year.

One congregation in the Presbytery of Toronto objects, but gives no reason. Another, the First Presbyterian Church, Victoria, in the same Presbytery, objects on the ground that the calendar year is considered the worst time for holding congregational meetings, on account of the weather and holidays; but, unless there is something very peculiar in the climatic conditions and festival customs of that locality, the same reason would have prevented those which have been accustomed to close their accounts at the end of the year, and to hold their annual meetings about the same time.

One congregation in the Presbytery of Barrie objects, giving as a reason, that collections cannot be made in the country to close accounts at the 31st of December, as grain must be sold.

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One congregation in the Presbytery of Bruce objects, alleging that the congregational accounts close at different dates--but there is no formidable obstacle to their being all brought to the same date there, as they are in so many places.

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ral customs ned to close ime. ions cannot Your Committee think that there is no necessity for going into greater detail. They are prepared to furnish all the information that has been communicated to them and they have encleavoured to collect it in as full and precise a form as practicable. One Presbytery might be mentioned, in which 20 congregations close their year on the 31st of December, 1 congregation on the 12th of January, 1 on the 4th of February, 9 on the 31st of March, 1, a Mission Station, on the 1st of April, and 3 on the 30th of April; but it is thought that the Assembly has the matter now so definitely before them as to be able to come to a decision.

It is with some misgivings that your Committee incorporate in this report the returns received from the three Presbyteries constituting the Synod of Manitoba, being of the opinion that the distinction has not been observed between pastoral charges and mission fields; but, lest there should be any injustice done either to it or to the Church at large, they judge it better that they should be included.

The total number of pastoral charges is 873, an increase of 47 on the previous year and of 127 on the year preceding that.

on the year preceding that.

In the Synod of the Maritime Provinces there is a decrease of 2, as follows: 1 in the Presbytery of Halifax, and 3 in that of St. John; with an increase of 1 in Sydney, and 1 in Prince Edward Island. The Synod of Montreal and Ottawa shows an increase of 2 pastoral charges, 1 in the Presbytery of Quebec, 1 in that of Montreal, 1 in Ottawa, and 2 in Brockville, while there is a decrease of 3 in that of Lanark and Reufrew. In the Synod of Toronto and Kingston there is an increase of 19, the Presbytery of Toronto showing an increase of 14, Barrie of 5, Kingston, Peterborough and Guelph 1 each, while Lindsay shows a decrease of 2 and Sangeen of 1. In the Synod of Hamilton and London there is an increase of 6, 1 each in Paris, London, Stratford and Sarnia, 2 in Bruce and 3 in Chatham, while Hamilton gives a falling off of 2 and Maitland of 1. The number of pastoral charges reported last year in Manitoba was 73, this year 94, giving an increase of 21.

The total number of Ministers in charge is 714, without giving the number of those Retired, with

The total number of Ministers in charge is 714, without giving the number of those Retired, with 12 Professors reported, those of Manitoha College not being mentioned in the report from the Presbytery of Winnipeg, 3 Agents of the Church, 5 Missionaries to foreign parts—the Presbyteries of Toronto, Barrie and Guelph returning one each, and that of Stratford two—and Brandon has 4 Missionaries to the Indians, with 12 apparently Catechists, but not so designated, and yet not styled Ministers, and Rock Lake gives the names of 3 Catechists.

Munsters, and Rock Lake gives the names of 3 Catechists.

The total number of vacancies is 159, or 46 more than for the previous year, 28 of these lying in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces; 24 in that of Montreal and Ottawa; 47 in that of Toronto and Kingston; 37 in that of Hamilton and London, and 21 in that of Manitoba, 2 appearing among the Delayed Reports. The Presbytery of Brandon has the largest number, 19; that of Toronto has 15; Hamilton, 14; Kingston, 10, and St. John 8. In the other Presbyteries they vary below the number just given; Brockville with 6; Quebec, Ottawa, Sangeen, London and Chatham, 5 cach; Prince Edward Island, Miramichi, Montreal, Glengarry, Barrie, Owen Sound, Paris and Bruce, 4 each; Sydney, Victoria and Richmond, Peterborough and Limdsay, 3 e..ch; Halifax, Wallace, Pictou, Whitby, Sarnia and Winnipeg, 2 each; Guelph, Stratford, Huron and Maitland, 1 each—in all 157, with the 2 among the Delayed Returns, 159. It will thus be seen that there is a wide opening throughout the bounds of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for men to preach the everlasting Gospel; that there is an earnest appeal to her ministers and people urging them to pray that the Lord of the harvest would send forth labourers unto His harvest; that there is a loud call addressed to parents to devote their sons to Christ Jesus to serve Him in the ministry of the Word, and to young men, who have been baptized with the Spirit to consecrate themselves to this as their lifework.

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In the Synod of the Maritime Provinces there are 5 Presbyteries either having no Mission Fields or not reporting them, namely, Sydney, Victoria and Richmond, Wallace, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland. The Presbytery of St. John has 10; Halifax, 6; Miramichi, 5; Pieton, 4; Truro, 3; and Lunenburg and Shelburne, 1—29 in all. In the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa there are 15, of which two are in the Presbytery of Quebec, 7 in that of Montreal; 3 each in Ottawa and Brockville; Glengarry, and Lanark and Renfrew not reporting any. In the Synod of Toronto and Kingston there are 88; of these 60 are in the Presbytery of Barrie, which appears to have the most mission work of any Presbytery throughout the Church; 7 in Kingston; 6 each in Peterborough and Owen Sound; 4 in Saugeen; 3 in Lindsay, and 2 in Guelph; but the more detailed report of these Mission fields will appear subsequently.

Mission fields will appear subsequently.

The total number of reporting congregations is 928; last year, 918. In the Synod of the Maritine Provinces, with 178 pastoral charges, 5 Presbyteries report in full, namely, Truro, Pictou, Lamenburg and Shelburne, Miramichi, and Newfoundland; Sydney has 7 non-reporting congregations, all vacaucies except one, namely, Mira: Prince Edward Island has 4; Wallace, 2; Victoria, and Richmond, Halifax and St. John, I each; or 16 in all. In the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, of 19 pastoral charges 11 congregations do not report; 3 in the Presbytery of Quebec, of which 2 are vacancies; 3 each in Glengarry and Brockville; and 2 in Montreal. The Presbyteries of Ottawa and of Lanark and Renfrew report in full. In the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, with 231 pastoral charges, only 1 Presbytery, Guelph, reports in full; Lindsay, Whitby and Barrie have 1 each not reporting; Peterborough has 3; Owen Sound has 5, of which 2 are vacancies; Sangeen 5, all of them vacant; Toronto, 7; in the Presbytery sheet 10, but three have since come to hand and are printed in the Delayed Returns; Kingston, 14. This Synod appears in a more unfavourable light than any of the others as regards the number of non-reporting congregations; that is, all the Presbyteries in its bounds have non-reporting congregations except one, and the entire number of such congregations is 37. In the Synod of Hamilton and London, with 209 pastoral charges, there are 27 non-reporting congregations: Hamilton Presbytery has 8; London, 7; Sarmia, 7; Bruce, 4; and Chatham, 1; Paris, Stratford, Maitland, and Huron, 4 Presbyteries of the 9 which compose the Synod, send in full reports.

The total number of non-reporting congregations last year was 113, this year they have fallen to 91, showing a gratifying improvement, which, it is earnestly to be hoped, will go on till there be not a congregation or station which shall be found in default when similar reports to this are being prepared and presented to the Supreme Court. Let your Committee appeal to all Ministers and office-bearers, and to the Clerks of Presbyteries who can do so much in the way of helping, to endeavour speedily to bring about a result so much to be desired.

Proceeding now to the Statistical reports, and to the replies given to the questions sent out to congregations and stations, your Committee have to state that there were 1,802 churches or stations supplied in connection with the 873 pastoral charges that exist. Last year the number was 1,687, giving an increase of 115. In some Presbyteries the number is large, that of Brandon being the most striking, which gives 235 in connection with its 63 charges. In the Synod of the Maritime Provinces the Preshytery of Halifax has 81 such churches or stations to its 30 pastoral charges, but the average throughout the Synod is less than 3 to each charge. In the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa there it less than 2, the largest proportion being in the Presbytery of Ottawa, which has 25 pastoral charges and 63 churches or stations supplied in connection therewith. There is less than 2 also in the Synod of Contract of the Presbytery of Ottawa, which has 25 pastoral charges and 63 churches or stations supplied in connection therewith. of Toronto and Kingston, no Presbytery going above that number with the exception of Barrie. The same remark will apply to the Synod of Hamilton and London, in which Chatham is the only Presbytery which goes above 2, the number of pastoral charges being 21, and of connected churches or stations supplied, 49. Rock Lake has the highest proportion in the Synod of Manitoba, namely, 13 to 69: Brandon comes next, 63 to 235; while Winnipeg has 45 churches or stations in connection with its 18 charges.

The sitting accommodation provided for those in attendance on the public ordinances of divine

grace is 377,053, being an increase of 8,014 on that of the previous year.

The number of families reported last year was 68,421; this year 71,833, or an increase of 3,412. Let it be stated with all plainness and emphasis that these figures do not give an adequate representation of the strength of our Church with regard to the families which worship within her walls. It might be expected that here we should have full returns, but the fact is the reverse. It might be supposed that with our Kirk Sessions, whose duty it is to look after the spiritual welfare of all the households and individuals, young and old, over whom they have been set in the Lord, and our Deacons' Courts or Boards of Managers, upon whom it devolves to attend to the outward business of the house of God, the number of families in every congregation would be definitely known, and could be precisely reported. In the Presbytery of Montreal, Crescent Street Church, Montreal, does not report its families; neither does College Street, Toronto, in the Presbytery of Toronto. Others might be mentioned, but your Committee confine themselves to these. And then there is

the large number of families belonging to non-reporting congregations.

When your Committee proceed to the next item, namely, the number of families contributing to the support of ordinances, the Assembly will see how far the addition of this question to those formerly proposed has failed of its object. Of the 71,833 families connected with the Church, according to the reports, only 48,652 are returned as contributing. It would serve no good purpose to make any further use of this item. It will occur to everyone that there are not 23,181 families in the Church which do not contribute of their means to the support of the Gospel in their midst, or its proclamation to others. An examination of the printed tables will show that very many congregations have not answered this question; and it would be a slander on Christian households, a gations have not answered this question; and it would be a snamer on Christian housenbas, a reproach upon our land, as if poverty instead of plenty was predominant, and a reflection upon the faithfulness of the pulpit in one important part of its duties, upon elders and deacons and managers, were it to be accepted that only such a comparatively small number of families belonging to the Church, and enjoying its manifold and valuable privileges, acknowledge their obligation to give as God has prospered them for the support and extension of His kingdom of grace. While dissatisfied, however, with the reports on this particular, your Committee would not be discouraged. They do not recommend the discontinuance of the question in future schedules. An important use may be made of it. Perseverance in putting it may lead those whose duty it is in congregations to attend to such matters to be more careful and faithful, and keep themselves hetter informed as to the families connected and those contributing, and thus deliver their own souls from blame; and may lead to dealing with those which do not give, or do not give proportionately to their means, and thus secure the great personal spiritual object, to say nothing of the relative and public benefit, of inciting them to free themselves from guilt—guilt in the sight of Him who has a claim to theors as well as to themselves; and of Him who gave Himself for them that He might redeem them with His blood, and offers Himself to them with all His fulness-and guilt towards those who minister to them in spiritual things, and to whom it is but a small matter-a very inadequate return-if they minister to them out of their carnal things.

The number of single persons is 9,393—last year it was 8,717—but on this point also a number of Sessions do not report any, although there is good reason to conclude that they are to be found, if sought for, in their bounds. When your Committee mention that St. Stephen's and St. David's, in the City of St. John; Chalmers Church, in the City of Quebec (which, by the way, reports neither the number of its sittings nor of its families); Crescent Street Church, Montreal; St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa; St. Andrew's Church, Kingston (a vacancy); and College Street Church, Toronto, not to specify others in other Presbyteries, do not answer this question, there is ground to surmise that the returns are not so full as they ought to be, and that office-bearers are not so faithful as they should be in looking after young people who may have come from other localities and are now

residing in their bounds.

The total number of communicants reported is 123,444, being an increase of 5,114 on the previous year, which showed an increase of 1,823 on the year before, or nearly 7,000 for the two years. Of these 26,764 were in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, being an increase for the year of 1408.

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previous ears. Of of 1 408. The Presbytery of Pictou contains the largest number in that Synod, 5,254; Halifax comes second, 4,897; Prince Edward Island third, 3,917; Truro fourth, 3,136, and so down to Lunenburg and Shelburne with 706, Sydney with 673, and Newfoundland the smallest, but not by any means the weakest, with 383. In the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa there were 22,548 against 21,873 last year, which shows an increase of 675. As might be expected, the Presbytery of Montreal contains the largest number, 7,570, and Lanark and Renfrew stands second with 5,117; but as the number in each Presbytery can be seen by referring to the printed tables, with the exception of Quebec, whose clerk has not added up the columns—and he with another, and two clerks in the Synod of Manitoba are the only exceptions—we need not reproduce them here. In the Synod of Toronto and Kingston there are 35,424, being an increase of 746, of which 10,216, or 351 fewer than last year, are in the Presbytery of Toronto—all the other Presbyteries coming far short of this one, so that it may be regarded as the stronghold of Presbyterianism throughout the Church. In the Synod of Hamilton and London the aggregate is 33,160 against 30,967 the foregoing year, being an increase of 2,193. In the Synod of Manitoba there is an increase of 254, the number this year being 3,982. In making up these figures we have taken this year those of the Delayed Returns; last year these were omitted.

The number of communicants added this year was 9,036 on their own profession and 4,997 by certificate, or an aggregate of 14.033, being an increase of 1,852, and the number removed was 8,145, so that a comparison of these figures would show a gain of nearly 6,000 throughout the bounds. In considering the additions the chief interest is doubtlessly to be attached to the number joining on their own profession. These may be regarded as marking the results of the aggressive warfare which the Church is commanded to maintain for the subjugation of simens, and bringing them from the kingdom of darkness into that of Christ Jesus. And it must be a matter of thanksgiving that, in so many instances, men have been prevailed on to put on the Lord Jesus, and enroll themselves publicly among His covenanted people; and that He has borne testimony to the word of His grace, and let His work and power appear before His servants. God has been sending the rod of Christ's strength out of Zion, and giving Him to see of the travail of His soul, and to enjoy the resultant satisfaction alforded. And must not the prayer of each believer be, that the grace which has converted and brought these persons to receive the Gospel may be abundantly granted them, enabling them to walk worthy of the vocation wherewith they are called, and to be stedfast, immovable, and always abounding in the work of the Lord?

In the course of the year 9,478 infants have been baptized, and 792 adults. It may be safely assumed that the former belonged to households whose parents had been brought into the covenant with Him who has said "I will be a God to thee and to thy seed after thee." Questions suggest themselves, and, if answers were obtained to them, no doubt interesting facts would be collected respecting the latter. But those facts are known to Him who has declared that he who believeth and is baptized shall be saved, and whose commission to his servants in the Gospel embraces the administration of the sacrament of baptism to those who have not formerly enjoyed it on the credible profession of their faith—for it must be held, regarding that ordinance, that if once validly administered it is not to be repeated—thus differing in an essential feature from the other sacramental institution of the New Testament Church.

The number of ruling elders is 4,626, an increase of 160. The proportion of these to pastoral charges varies considerably, and the same remark will apply to the number of communicants, but it would be unprofitable to pursue the subject in reference even to Presbyteries, and even if your Committee were to take congregations, still no practical result could be suggested, as each must be left to judge as to the number of those whom it may consider qualified, or see proper to call, to be stewards of the kingdom in their mids... Other office-bearers are reported as 7,284, showing an increase of 336.

Last year it was the privilege of your Committee gratefully to mention that there was an increased attendance at the weekly prayer meeting. According to the Reports the number this year is not so great by 455, the whole attendance (average) being given as 36,565. But still there is a decided increase on the attendance of the year immediately preceding. Yet, with an increase in the number of families connected with congregations, and of communicants on the roll, and of adults who have been admitted to the Church by baptism, a falling off in the number of those waiting upon God in this service would not have been anticipated. Is there not a call to the prayer that God would revive His work in the midst of the years, and remember His promise to open the windows of heaven and pour out a blessing till there be not room to receive it? If prayer for this were more frequent and urgent would the promise not be fulfilled?

Sabbath schools and Bible classes are reported as having an attendance of 99,059, an increase of 4,678, waited upon by 11,014 engaged in Sabbath School work, being an increase of 242 for the year, and giving an average of nearly 9 to each one who has consecrated himself to the Lord in this service. In Sabbath school and congregational libraries, which appropriately fall to be noticed in this connection, there were 185,682 volumes, an increase of 6,211; and this is irrespective of that class of literature for Sabbath School purposes which has reached such an extensive circulation, and which, whether distributed weekly or monthly, is received, in its different forms, with such readiness, not to say keenness, by the children, and which is read with such interest in their homes by older

Last year 343 congregations reported missionary associations as instituted and at work among them, Throughout the Church there is only one Presbytery which has not such an association, namely, Victoria and Richmond; 3 report 1 each, namely, Sydney, Lumenburg and Shelburne, and Rock Lake; 2 have 2 each, Newfoundland, that is, one in each concregation, and Saugeen; 3 have 3 each, Wallace, Winnipeg and Brandon; Hamilton has the largest number of any Presbytery, but not relatively to the number of its pastoral charges, for this distinction must be given to Newfoundland. Eleven Presbyteries and 178 pastoral charges in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces have 64 such associations; 6 Presbyteries and 149 charges in the Synod of

of Montreal and Ottawa have 62 associations; 9 Presbyteries and 23 pastoral charges in the Synod of Toronto and Kingston have 122 associations; 9 Presbyteries and 209 charges in the Synod of Hamilton and London have 108; 3 Presbyteries and 94 pastoral charges in the Synod of Manilton have 7; while the Delayed Returns contain 3, making the aggregate of 366.

The 873 pastoral charges have provided 452 manses and 54 rented houses for their ministers, being an increase of two in each; showing that the feeling still exists that homes should be provided by congregations for those who are sent to them by the Shepherd and Bishop of souls to minister to them in the things of the Gospel. Still there are about 300 by which such provision is not made.

To the last question on the Statistical Schedule, "Did the congregation build church or manse during the year?" 25 reported having built manses, 31 as having built churches, 2 reply "Yes," but the Committee cannot ascertain which it was, or whether it was one of each: one reports as having bought church, which is equivalent to having built it: 2 as having repaired church; 1 as having enlarged, and one reports having built a school-room. It is gratifying to find that congregations still show their interest in providing for themselves edifices in which they may wait with comfort on the God of ordinances, and furnish increased accommodation for increasing numbers, and that they are not forgetful of their pastors, but study to provide them with suitable residences.

In the 20 Presbyteries which report mission fields there are 222 churches or stations, with sitting for 11,961 persons; 2,992 families, of whom 1,020 contribute to the support of ordinances; and 156 single persons; the number of communicants, 3,260, of whom 254 were added on their own profession, and 39 on certificate, and 55 were removed; 190 infants were baptized, and 16 adults; the number of ruling elders is 69, and of other office-bearers 136; weekly prayer-meetings were attended by 857, and the number in Sabbath school and Bible class was 1,991, among whom 186 were engaged teaching or discharging other duties; the volumes in libraries sum up to 2,959. In none of these fields is there a missionary association, but they report 5 manses, 2 of these in the Presbytery of Quebec, 1 in Ottawa, 1 in Brockville, and 1 in Chatham. Three report having built churches, namely, Lunenburg and Shelburne, Quebec, and Kingston. Chatham replies "Yes" in two cases, but does not state whether churches or manses are meant, and the Committee have no means of knowing.

In view of the length to which this Report has already extended your Committee feel that they must present the Returns on Finances, which have been received through Presbyteries from congregations and stations in the most condensed form.

The total amount promised as stipend was reported as \$617,493, last year \$586,266, an increase of \$31,207. Several of the settled charges do not report this item, a neglect or omission which deserves animalversion, for Treasurers and Managers must in all cases know the amount, or can readily ascertain it by looking to their accounts. Your Committee would merely refer to the printed tables as showing the instances in which this neglect or omission is chargeable. The amount paid by congregations alone, that is raised by the people and contributed to the support of their pastors, was \$612,702, which indicates that the liberality of congregations has exceeded their engagements, for it is understood that there is no entry here of any sum received from the Supplementary or Augmentation Fund, nor from any other source. This gives an increase of \$34,858; but there are included salaries of professors and others where they have been reported.

It might be expected from this state of things that there were no arrears, but unhappily this is not the fact. There are \$2,802 in excess of those reported last year, amounting in all to \$14,003. Of this sum \$6,985 are due in eight of the Presbyteries in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, for three report no arrears. In the Presbytery of Sydney there are \$2,253, with its fourteen pastoral charges, and thirty-six churches and stations, but let it be remembered that seven of these do not report, so that the sum may be actually greater. There are \$1,654 of arrears in the Presbytery of Victoria and Riehmond and \$1,350 in that of Miramichi, \$729 in \$54. John and \$635 in Halifax. In some instances these arrears have been the accumulation of years, and the question naturally arises how have Presbyteries allowed such a state of things to arise? What action have they taken to prevent it? What have they done to give effect to the injunction of last Assembly? There are only ten Presbyteries throughout the Church which give no arrears, and they deserve to be mentioned as model ones in this particular; they are Truro, Wallace, Newfoundland, Montreal, Brockville, Whitby, Lindsay, Paris, Huron and Samia. It is to be presumed that this column has been honestly filled, and in most instances there is satisfactory evidence that this is so, the stipend paid being equal to that promised, as in Newfoundland, and in some others above, but Brockville has \$11,131 in the column for stipend promised and only \$10,521 in that for stipend paid, and Paris \$20,133 in the former and only \$19,105 in the latter, Winnipeg \$13,928 in the one and only \$10,657 in the other, while Brandon, with \$9,569 promised by congregations alone, and \$9,847 paid by them, the payments being thus in excess of the sums promised, reports an arrears of \$1,163, by congregations. Has this been a legacy from former years?

The total stipend received from all sources was \$643,888, being \$76,954 more than for the foregoing year, and this gives an average of a little more than \$900 to each pastor, \$100 more than last year; but now, as then, between \$300 and \$400 from each church or station supplied. Your Committee need not dwell on the extremes between which stipends range, in some instances quite inadequate for the comfortable maintenance of those to whom they are paid, and in most instances amounting to no more than a comfortable competence, but they are warranted in making the remark that thereappears to be a growing disposition, as the resources of the people increase, to deal in a more liberal spirit with those whom they have chosen to serve them in the Lord.

On churches and manses \$398,439 have been expended, or \$61,696 more than the previous year, and on other strictly congregational objects \$276,321, or \$16,599 more than for the same purposes in the year preceding, the two items showing an increase of \$78,295.

For stipend, on churches and mauses, and for strictly congregational objects, including professors and other salaries as before, the actual expenditure has been \$1,301,583, or an increase of \$131,488.

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professors \$131,488. Looking at such figures must we not acknowledge the operation of the disposing grace of God who has put it into the hearts of His people to give thus liberally for the dispensation of ordinances among themselves? Has the past year been one of commercial depression? Has trade been languishing in our horders? Have agricultural products not been meeting with prices at one time current? God has opened the hearts of the Christian community, and maintained their interest in their spiritual privileges and their sense of their value.

Taking next the Schemes of the Church and the Colleges as first in order, the entire amount raised for these was \$53,969, which was \$6,502 more than for the year 1883-84. The contributions to the Ordinary Fund show a decrease this year, as they did for the one before. Those to the Special Fund an increase of very nearly \$8,000, and those to the College of Manitoba an increase of \$2,322, the actual figures being \$5,822.

The Home Mission Fund has received \$33,674, a decrease of more than \$6,000, but this fact must not be overlooked that a considerable amount formerly embraced under this heading is now reckoned in the Augmentation Fund. This last has received \$30,378, which gives an increase of \$6,771. These contributions include the amounts realized in both the Eastern and Western sections of the Church.

Last year the amount received for the French Evangelization Fend and eported through Presteries was \$18,186, this year \$18,265, a slight increase, but not actually representing the state of that Fund as to revenue.

To the Foreign Mission Fund \$39,729 were contributed, according to the Reports, a decrease of between \$400 and \$500. But it is known that this fund also is in receipt of amounts which do not pass through the books of any treasurer of congregations, and not, perhaps, through these of the agents of the Church. It has been so supported that the Committee has been able not only to keep up its former staff of labourers in the Foreign field, but even to add to their number.

The amounts paid to the Fund for Aged and Infirm Ministers was \$5,966, a decrease of between \$700 and \$800: to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, \$4,657, a decrease of \$87: and to the Assembly Expense Fund, \$3,522, a decrease of \$332.

The total contributions to the Schemes of the Church were \$188,741, giving an increase of \$3,045, while that for the year preceding was \$18,891. Not to examine and compare the contributions of Presbyteries your Committee may state generally, that the Synod of the Maritime Provinces shows an increase of more than \$4,000, the largest amount coming from Halifax, \$8,297, out of a total of \$33,498; the next from that of Picton, \$6,648, and the third, \$4,241, from Prince Edward Island, the smallest being from Victoria and Richmond, although it has not the fewest communicants. In the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa there is a decrease of \$1,372, the Presbytery of Quebec and Lanark and Renfrew alone showing an increase; but all the others a decrease. In the Synod of Toronto and Kingston there is an increase of \$23; 1; Lindsay, Toronto, Barrie and Guelph giving an increase, the others showing a decrease. In the Synod of Hamilton and London there is an increase of nearly \$1,000, but the Presbyteries of Hamilton, Chatham, Huron and Bruce report a dimmu ion. In the present Synod of Manitoba there has been an increase of \$835.

The amount raised for missionary purposes by Sabbath schools and Bible classes was \$16,422, an increase of \$1,692, which speaks well for the growing interest of the rising generation in both Home and Foreign Mission work.

To Synod and Presbytery Funds \$6,608 have been paid, and to religious and benevolent purposes not falling under any heading previously given, \$57,541, which shows a falling off of about \$13,000 from the amount given last year.

Taking now the last column of the Financial Statement, it is found from the additions that the large sum of \$1,558,218 has been raised for all purposes, or an increase of \$104,594 on the year 1883-84. Of this aggregate amount the Synod of the Maritime Provinces raised \$291,904; that of Montreal and Ottawa, \$346,327; that of Toronto and Kingston, \$481,857; that of Hamilton and London, \$360,621; that of Manitoba, \$58,143, while the Delayed make up \$19,366. In the Synod of the Maritime Provinces there is an increase of \$12,061, but your Committee must not delay by tracing this through Presbyteries; in the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa there is an increase of \$17,592; in that of Toronto and Kingston of nearly \$60,000; in that of Hamilton and London of a little more than \$3,000, whereas that of Manitoba gives a decrease of about \$24,000, a serious falling off, thus bringing down the increase to a little more than \$98,000, to which \$6,268 have to be added from Delayed Returns.

Collecting the items on the reports of Presbyteries from the Mission Stations in their bounds, your Committee learn that \$15,978 have been raised for ALL purposes. Of this sum \$8,586 are represented as paid for supply of preaching or stipend; \$1,446 have been expended on church or manse; \$771 on other local objects, and for these three purposes \$15,052. For the Schemes of the Church \$723 have been raised; and the balance, the items of which cannot be stated distinctly, for Synod and Presbytery funds and other religious and benevolent ends.

The following table indicates the average contributions per family and communicant towards stipend, all strictly congregational objects, the Schemes of the Church, and ALL purposes:

The average contribution for stipend over the Church at large was 88.53 per family, last year 88.20, increase 33 cents; and per communicant \$4.0°, last year \$4.82, increase 14 cents. For all strictly congregational purposes the payments were at the average rate of \$18.17 per family, last year \$16.51, increase \$1.66; and per communicant \$10.54, last year \$9.71, increase \$3 cents. There were raised for the Schemes of the Church, according to the reports, at the rate of \$2.57 per family, last year \$2.61, a decrease of 4 cents; and per communicant \$1.50, last year \$1.53, a decrease of 3 cents. For ALL purposes the average rate per family was \$21.70, last year \$20.47, an increase of \$1.23; and per communicant \$12.02, last year \$12.04, an increase of 58 cents.

Your Committee close their report with the following recommendations:-

1. That it be an instruction to the Committee to be appointed to issue questions for the ensuing year similar to those issued for the year 1875-76, so that there may be an opportunity of ascertaining from comparison the progress of the Church during the intervening ten years.

2. That, for the purpose of uniformity and to enable the Committee to procure fuller and more satisfactory information, it be a recommendation to Presbyteries to take action to have all the congregations and stations throughout their bounds close their congregational year with the calendar

3. That Presbyteries be again reminded of their duty to appoint a Committee of their number, at their last meeting before the 31st of December or their first one after the beginning of the year, charged with the work of collecting and tabulating the Statistical Returns of congregations and stations in their bounds, and that such Committees be required to report to their Presbyteries at as early a meeting as possible, and that Presbyteries forward these reports soon afterwards to the Assembly's Committee.

4. That such steps as may commend themselves to your Venerable Court be taken to prevent the injunction that Presbyteries deal at once and faithfully with all congregations in arrears with their stipends to their ministers from remaining a dead letter, as it is to be feared it is in too many

5. That instructions be renewed to Presbyteries, and especially to those who have failed to comply with them in the past, to return the names of all ministers, professors and others standing on their roll with the salaries they receive, if any.







## OBITTAR A NOTICES.

REV. SAMUEL BERNARD died at Noel, N.S., on the 24th November, 1883. He was a native of Prince Edward Island; studied at Truro, Halifax and Princeton. He was a minister of great energy and ability. He left a widow and three children.

REV. JOHN BOYD, minister of Bass River, in the Presbytery of Miramichi, died from injuries sustained by being thrown from his carriage when returning from a visit to a sick parishioner. Mr. Boyd was in the very prime of life, and had been only about five years in the ministry. His sudden removal was the cause of deep sorrow throughout the Presbytery and wherever he was known.

REV. WALLIS INGLIS died at Ayr on the 18th October, 1884, after a long and painful illness. Mr. Inglis was a man of strong character, of much originality and of deep piety. He was for some years a missionary in Africa, a fellow-labourer of Dr. Livingstone. In consequence of troubles in the country where he laboured, he was obliged to leave, and after a time returned to Britain. In 1855 he came to Canadans a missionary of the U. P. Church of Scotland. He laboured at Riversdale, at Kincardine, and afterwards at Ayr. In the various fields which he occupied he laboured with self-denying zeal and untiring energy.

REV. ALEXANDER MANN, D.D., died at Pakenham on the 15th September, 1884. Dr. Mann was a native of Aberdeenshire, and came as a missionary to Canada about forty years ago. At first Dr. Mann had a large field of labour, embracing five townships; afterwards he confined his ministrations to Pakenham, where he had two preaching stations. In 1876 Queen's University conferred upon him the degree of D.D. Dr. Mann was a laborious and faithful minister, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him.

REV. WILLIAM ROSS, of Megantic, died on 25th July, 1884. Mr. Ross was a native of Ross-shire, Scotland, and was educated at Edinburgh. In 1860 he came to Canada, and was first settled in P. E. Island. In 1869 he was translated to Lochiel, Glengarry, where his ministrations both in Gaolic and English were highly valued. He was a devout Christian, a warm-hearted friend and a faithful minister of the Gospel.

REV. ALEXANDER McLEAN, probationer, died at Moore, County of Larabton, on the 11th August, 1884. He was the son of the late Rev. A. McLean, of P. E. Island, and was educated at Dalhousie College, Halifax, and Queen's College, Kingston. While filling up appointments in the Presbytery of Sarnia, he was seized with typhoid fever, which after some weeks proved fatal. Lie was a young man of deep and unobtrusive piety, highly esteemed wherever he was known.

REV. DANIEL ALLAN, one of the pioneer ministers, died at Goderich towards the end of the year, aged seventy-nine years. Mr. Allan, who was a native of Rossshire, Scotland, came to Canada in 1838, and for several years laboured at Stratford and Woodstock. Afterwards his labours were confined to the Township of North Easthope. Mr. Allan was a good scholar, a powerful preacher and a most laborious pastor.

REV. MATTHEW WILSON, of Sydney Mines, Cape Breton, died on the 13th December, 1881, at the advanced age of eighty. He was a native of Scotland, and came in 1842 to take charge of the large and scattered congregation of Sydney Mines. He continued pastor till 1883, when he retired from active duties. Mr. Wilson was one of the fathers of the Church in Cape Breton, and laboured with great faithfulness and devotedness.

REV. JOHN STRAITH, of Shelburne, died on the 10th January, 1885, in the fifty-ninth year of his age. He was educated at Knox College, Toronto, and began his ministry at Valetta in 1857. Subsequently he laboured at Ingersol, Paisley, and Shelburne, where he was settled about two years ago. Mr. Straith was well known and highly honoured throughout the Church as a faithful, laborious and devoted minister. Mr. Straith left a large family to lament his decease, one of his daughters being the wife of the Rev. John Jamieson of the Formosa Mission.

REV. JOHN MORRISON, of Waddington, N.Y., died on the 3rd January, 1885, at the advanced age of eighty-six. He had been lifty-five years a minister, forty years having been spent in Waddington. About two years ago he retired from active service. His long pastorate, his genial disposition, and his ability as a preacher made him much respected on both sides of the St. Lawrence.

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Frame chi 3. Spi Negotiated REV. ROBERT SEDGWICK, D.D., died at Musquodoboit, N.S., on the 2nd April, 1885. Dr. Sedgwick was born at Greenock, 10th May, 1804. Having completed his studies for the ministry, he was ordained as pastor of the Belmont Street Secession Church in Aberdeen. In 1848 he came to Nov. Sectia, and was settled at Middle and Upper Musquodoboit, where he laboured till his retirement. The degree of D.D. was conferred upon him by Queen's University about eight years ago. Its Sadwick was no ordinary man. As a preacher, he was singularly fresh, vigorous and powerful. Dr. Sedgwick was no ordinary man. As a preacher he was singularly fresh, vigorous and powerful, and was always listened to by large and attentive congregations. He took a deep interest in everything connected with the Church, and his removal leaves a large void, not only in the circle of his friends, but in the wider circles of the Church and the community.

REV. CHARLES FLETCHER died at Goderich on the 9th March, 1885. He was a native of Fifeshire, and was ordained in 1812. He was minister at Chippawa, Goderich and elsewhere. In 1850 his health gave way, and he was obliged to retire from the active duties of the ministry. Mr. Fletcher took an active interest in the affairs of the Church and in Temperance work, and was much

respected by all who knew him.

REV. ROBERT McKENZIE, M.A., minister of Dalhousie and North Sherbrooke, died at the Manse, on Saturday, 18th April, after a short illness. Mr. McKenzie had been over thirty years in the ministry, ten years having been spent in Dalhousie and North Sherbrooke. Mr. McKenzie was a diligent and faithful minister, and was highly respected by all who knew him.

REV. JAMES DICK died at Richmond Hill on the 1st June, 1885, in the seventy-seventh year of his age. Mr. Dick had laboured long and faithfully in the work of the ministry. At one time he was minister of the Gospel at Emily, now in the Presbytery of Peterborough. For many years he took an active part in the public work of the Church, and was throughout his whole ministry an earnest and faithful minister of the Gospel, while by his consistent Christian life he adorned the Gospel which he preached. Mr. Dick was much beloved by his co-Presbyters and h ongregation, and by all who knew him.

REV. W. E. McKAY, M.A., died at Orangeville, on Tuesday, 2nd June, 1885, in the toy-eighth year of his age. Mr. McKay was for a lengthened period minister of the Gospel (\*) Orat. - (lle, and had only recently resigned his pastoral charge and retired from the active duties of the ministry. He leaves a widow and family.

REV. JOHN JOSEPH CASEY, B.D., minister of Taylor Church, Montreal, died from small-pox on the morning of the 10th June, 1885. Mr. Casey was a native of Dublin, and was ableated for the Roman Catholic priesthood. He came to Canada about twenty-two years ago, and, having embraced the Protestant faith, be became a student in the Presbyterian College, and was is finished his studies at Princeton. For a time he was minister in Elgin and Athalstane, a nee he was afterwards translated to Taylor Street, Montreal. He was a man of vigorous intellect, and was highly esteemed by his brethren. A widow survives him,—the daughter of Rev. J. Watson, M.A., of Huntingdon.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING FUND.

Church and manse building has not been so extensively carried on during the past year as during 1883-4. The stringency in money matters has increased rather than diminished, and in several cases people have had to choose between having a minister and building a church. When the choice lay between bread and a plate on which to have it served, the people chose the bread.

The Board considers its function to be to stimulate rather than stifle local effort. Presbyteries are the best judges as to the requirements of localities, and the Board confines itself largely to consideration of two points, viz., whether the people are doing their part; and secondly, what aid, in justice to all interests, should be given.

Money has been advanced to complete buildings previously erected, but which congregations unaided could not finish, to erect churches and to erect manses. As in previous years the aid accorded assumed the form of grant or loan, according to the character of the structure and the circumstances of the people. Three congregations received aid to complete buildings, two to erect manses, and eleven to build churches. The manses are comfortable frame buildings, one of them being lined with brick. Of the churches, one is brick, four log, and six frame buildings. By several congregations a beginning was made in church erection, as at Shanks', Brandon Hills, etc., but the work was suspended till the present season owing to financial inability to proceed.

To enable the Assembly to understand the advance node in the crection of church edifices during

To enable the Assembly to understand the advance made in the erection of church edifices during the year, notice is taken of all structures, whether aid was received from the Fund or not. For convenience sake the buildings are grouped under the names of the Presbyteries to which the con-

gregations belong.

The total cost of buildings erected in the mission field has been about \$30,000, and the aid advanced or stipulated for amounted to \$5,500.71. The total cost of buildings erected amounted to over \$80,000.

As will be seen by the Treasurer's statement several of the congregations aided in previous years have paid instalments on loans. The financial depression prevailing has prevented other congrega-tions from implementing their engagements. Till an improvement takes place in the business out-look of the country the Board does not deem it to be prudent to press paym at unduly. Security is taken in every case for loans by mortgage on the property, or notes of trustees, or both.

The North-West Land Company has continued to grant suitable sites for churches free of cost

in villages, towns and cities where they own land.

The C. P. R. Company has kindly conveyed all lumber for churches and manses to be built on their line at half the rates charged by them in other cases.

The delay in constructing branch lines of railway through the country has seriously interfered with the erection of church edifices. The congregations at Birtle, Pilot Mound, Swan Lake, Marney, Newdale, and other points, have been anxious to build, and were afraid of making a beginning till lines were located and the sites of stations determined on.

During the coming summer there promises to be considerable activity in building. At Oak Lake, Griswold, Whitewood, Fort McLeod, Cathcart, and other points preparations are in progress for erecting churches. At Calgary, Medicine Hat, Fort Qu'Appelle, Qu'Appelle, Neepawa, and other points, the people are moving to erect manses for their pastors. The work is most urgent. If missionaries are to be encouraged in their work, they and their families must be comfortably housed. At some points it is impossible to rent a house. Missionaries cannot build houses themselves owing to cost, and hence they are obliged to live sometimes in houses where health is impaired. The actual suffering of many of them has been brought before the Board by the Superintendent of Missions, and an effort is to be made this season to prosecute the work as extensively as funds will allow. In this connection it might be mentioned that a gentleman in Chuton, Ontario, on learning of the hardships of our missionaries on account of insufficient shelter, authorized the Board to draw on him to the amount of \$500 to build a manse. This is an example worth being followed up. The Church provides houses for her missionaries in India and China, and rightly so. Surely the missionaries in the

building so cheap as this year. Lumber can be purchased at about half the price charged two years ago. Labour can also be engaged at a reasonable figure. Now is the time to build. Subscriptions to the amount of \$8,156.52 were obtained during the year. These added to the subscriptions previously obtained would give a total of \$103,475.58. A large percentage of the total amount was subscribed in Winnipeg, and in consequence of the changed circumstances of subscribers there, it is feared that a considerable shrinkage will take place, while in the case of almost all subscribers in the North-West the Board must exercise patience.

The Board gratefully acknowledge the great interest taken by congregations in Ontario in the work and the liberal aid given. A legacy of \$100 was left to the Superintendent for Mission work in the North-West by Neil Currie, Collingwood, and \$.0 of the amount was given to the Board and the other \$50 applied to Home Missions. Mention should be made of the action of a friend in Newfoundland, although his name cannot be given. He sent the Board \$1,000 to begin the Fund. Receiving a letter giving an account of the work done in past years, he read it to his biends. They expressed a willingness to aid in this work, and a draft for \$1,000 is purchased and forwarded. A prominent member of the Church in Toronto visited the country this spring. He had been aiding

the Board from year to year. Seeing the work done through the country, he spring. He had been adding the Board from year to year. Seeing the work done through the country, he expressed himself as more than pleased and offered to increase his subscription. "When a leading Episcopalian was speaking to me," he said, "about the energy of our Church and her success. I felt proud of being a Presbyterian." Another from the same city of churches volunteered to be a life subscriber to the Fund. We are yet only on the threshold of the work. There are 46 stations in connection with the supplemented congregations, and but 19 churches. There are 15 congregations, and but 9 manses. In the mission field proper are 298 mission stations and but 40 churches. There are 70 mission fields, and but 5 manses. Services are frequently held in dugouts, where a tall man finds it difficult to stand erect and keep his head, out of the hay that frequently forms part of the roof. Congregations betts, and but a manses. Services are trequently near in augusts, where a tail man mass to stand erect and keep his head out of the hay that frequently forms part of the roof. Congregations in dugouts grow like a foot in a Chinese shee. Judicious and timely aid in church erection will give visibility, promise and permanence to the work. In the newer settlements a missionary, to carry on his work, must be furnished with a manse. The effectiveness of missionaries has been much increased by the manses already built.

The balance at credit may seem large. It must be borne in mind, however, that building operations are suspended during winter; that a larger proportion of subscriptions are pa'd in during that season; that in the absence of the Chairman and Secretary at the front appropriations have not been made this spring, although applications are forwarded by Presbyteries. In a few weeks a large part of the balance will have been checqued out to aid congregations now building.

At one time it was feared in the East that the Rebellion might interfere seriously with our work. This has not been the case to any appreciable extent. Not a church or manse has been touched. Immigration has been checked, but even now a considerable number of settlers are coming in to begin farming operations, and since the collapse of the Rebellion has been so complete, no fears need be entertained for the Inture.

With thankfulness to God for what He has enabled us do, let us endeavour more adequately to overtake the wants of this growing field.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE "PRESBYTERIAN RECORD" FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30th MAY, 1885.

In presenting the Tenth Annual Report, the Committee have pleasure in referring to the continued success and usefulness of the Presbyterian Record.

It will be remembered that when the Record was instituted, ten years ago, it was designed to take the place of four official monthly magazines which had been published for many years, and with acknowledged ability, under the anspices of the Churches now happily united in the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Each of these magazines had attained a large circulation, and had come to be so closely identified with local interests that the discontinuance of any one of them could not be effected without many regerts, and perhaps serious migrings in some constructions. not be effected without many regrets, and, perhaps, serious misgivings in some quarters as to the ultimate success of the new enterprise. to represent so large a constituency, spread over a territory reaching from the Atlantic to the Pacific, must necessarily differ in many respects from its predecessors. For one thing it was found impossible, within the limits to which it was restricted, to give the publicity to local matters which had contributed largely to the popularity of pre-existing magazines. And then, the secular press has in recent years largely supplied the demand for information of that kind. Besides, there has grown up a number of excellent weekly papers, in different sections of the country, avowedly published in the interests of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

All of these papers are conducted with marked ability, and are largely circulated. In a sense each of them is a rival of the Record, and it would not have been surprising had their combined outerprise and influence resulted in reducing the circulation of the official organ of the Church to a minimum. So far from this being the case, however, these journals have been the staunchest allies of the Record. They have with common consent conceded to it the right of procedence and lave never alluded to it in other than the most friendly and courteous terms.

In view of such considerations, it is with no small satisfaction that the Committee are able to report that the circulation of the Record is steadily increasing and that it is now larger than at any period since it was commenced. The average circulation during the past six months, has been 3,500. The number of congregations that supply each family with a copy is increasing. It is believed that the influence of the magazine was never greater than at present; and it is confidently hoped that the close of the Calendar year will find the concern to be on a sound financial basis.

The Committee take this opportunity of expressing their conviction that under its present management the Record has been in no small degree instrumental in cementing the Union of the Presbyterian Church in this Dominion, and that it has also been helpful in furthering the interests the missionary and benevolent schemes of the Church. And it is not without concern that in closing this report, the Committee announce, at the request of the managing editor, that owing to ungent personal reasons, he contemplates being absent from the country for some twelve months, and that in consequence he deems it necessary to tender the resignation of the important office he now holds, expressing at the same time his desire to continue his labours until the end of the current year, in order that ample time may be had to make suitable arrangements for the future.

The Committee feel assured that the General Assembly would contemplate the withdrawal of Mr. Croil from the editorship of the Record with great regret, as likely to effect seriously its prosperity, his connection with the magazine having contributed not a little to the success it has achieved; and they recommend that his resignation be not accepted, but that it be left with the Committee on the Record to make temporary arrangements for carrying on the work during Mr. Croil's contemplated absence.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPPLY OF LABOURERS FOR HOME MISSION WORK.

The Committee on the Supply of Labourers for the Home Mission Work beg to report a

1. That the need of additional missionaries continues to be felt, particularly in the lower portions the field and especially during the winter months, and that serious loss will be sustained by the burch in these fields except a larger number of labourers can be secured than we can hope to obtain in the ordinary way.

2. That the difficulty felt by those who are invited to enter upon the work without any previous paration is so great, that it is likely to prevent many of those who realize most clearly the responsi-

bility of such a step from undertaking it.

3. That the proposal received at last Assembly, that such labourers should be invited to attend betures in the colleges, would be made much more valuable if such attendance and study were accepted, or had some specific value assigned to it, as a part of a course of preparation for the ministry.

4. The Committee therefore respectfully suggest that men commended by Presbyteries for this work be admitted to any lectures and examinations of which they may be able to avail themselves And that in any case where a Presbytery is satisfied, from the success of the missionary in the field that he possesses the qualifications for the work, such attendance and such study shall be accepted a part of a course of preparation for the ministry.

5. The Committee further recommend that Presbyteries be reminded that this course is here.

intended for those who are in a position to take a regular course, and that great care should a exercised in the acceptance and commendation of labourers for this special course.

# REPORT OF DELEGATES TO THE PRESBYTERIAN COUNCIL AT BELFAST.

The Presbyterian Council assembled according to appointment at Belfast, and was in session from June 21 to July 3. The attendance was large and embraced representatives from all or almost all the Churches entitled to send delegates. Ten ministers and four elders were present from this Church, and it is only just to say that a prominent place was given to the Canadian delegation on the programme of the Council's proceedings. Principal MacVicar was appointed to act as chaiman of a Committee on the admission of Churches to the Alliance, and had the responsibility of bringing on a Committee on the admission of Concrete to the Affinine, and had the responsibility of bringing a matter of finish importance, and of considerable delicacy—the admission of the Comberland Probyterian Church—before the Council.—An excellent paper was read by Dr. Burns on Romanism in Camada, and a paper on training for the Ministry, by Dr. King.—A valuable report on the Eldership was presented by Mr. Croil, who was also very appropriately called to preside over the Council in the evening on which the important subject of Foreign Missions was under review.—Dr. Cochrane, Dr. Cochrane, the Convener of the Western Section of our Home Mission Committee, gave a forcible and elequent statement of the condition and requirements of our vast mission field. In addition to the more formal papers and addresses by these representatives from the Canadian Church, Principal Caves, Dr. Mathews, and others, took part in several of the important discussions in the Council, and made, it is believed, valuable contributions to its proceedings.

It does not belong to this Report to refer even to the large number of questions which were discussed, and of resolutions adopted, in the Council. It is hoped, however, to call the attention of the Assembly to the important action taken looking to co-operation in Foreign Mission work by different Churches of the Presbyterian order, and to the fuller organization of the Council for executive purposes. The Executive is divided into two branches, an European and an American. The American branch has a Canadian section, the members of which are Rev. Principal MacVicar. Principal Caven, Dr. Cochrane, Dr. Burns, Dr. Mathews, and J. Croil, Esq. All of which is respectively submitted by

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING HOUSE, ETC.

Your Committee, having carefully considered the memorial and overture presented to last Assembly on the subjects of a Publishing House, the establishment of a Book Room, and the issuing

of a denominational organ under the control of the General Assembly, beg to report:

First, That they do not deem it necessary or desirable that the Church should enter upon the business of publishing or printing. Second, That there is no need of a Presbyterian Book Room. inasmuch as the book-selling business throughout the Dominion is largely in the hands of office-bearers and members of our Church, and our people have through them ample facilities for the purchase of Presbyterian literature.—Third, That inasmuch as there are several journals furnished by private enterprise in the interest of the Church, and as the Assembly already possesses an official organ is the monthly Record, there is at present no need of our entering upon the publication of a weekly

Though not called upon to refer to other matters, the Committee were led, in the course of their consideration of the subjects before them, to note the advisability of some assistance being given by the Church to the firms who are seeking to supply our people with suitable reading for the family and Sabbath schools, by the preparing of a catalogue of such books as the Church could recommend and they would suggest that it might be well for the Assembly to appoint a Committee for this purpose.

The only recommendation which the Committee would submit for the approval of the General

Assembly is as follows: That while declining to give any official recognition or special recommends tion to any particular denominational journal, the General Assembly cordially recommend to all people the various papers and periodicals now published in the interests of Presbyterianism in Canada. 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# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION IN SCHOOLS.

This Committee was appointed by last Assembly in the following terms: "The General Assembly under the deep conviction of the importance of the instruction of the young being founded a Christian truth, and sympathizing with the action of the Synod of the Toronto Diosess of the Christian truth, and sympathizing with the action of the Synod of the Toronto Diosess of the Christian divided to co-operate with any Committee that may be appointed by the Synod or any other branch functions."

The Committee have now to report that in the month of Angust hast a circular was sent to each member of the Committee by the Honourable G. W. Ross, Minister of Education for the Province of Opatrio, accompanied by a draft copy of "Selections of Bible Readings" which might be authorized by serving the Public and High Schools of the Province. In the circular the members of Committee servinited to meet the Minister of Education and discuss the proposed book and regulations for Engons Instruction. This meeting was held in Toronto on the eleventh day of September last, and as attended by several members of the Committee. There were also present some members of the Committee of the Anglican Church, some from that of the Methodist Conference and ministers of the Congregational denomination.

The Committee appreciate the courtesy shown at this meeting by the Minister of E lucation, all the patient care with which he received and considered the views expressed by those present, all the matter was under discussion. The points more particularly submitted were: (1) The copriety of making a selection of Scripture lessons; (2) The appointment of a joint committee to repare such a book; (3) The way in which the book should be used and regulations for its use; 1. The giving of religious instruction by clergymen; (5) The practice of devotional exercises in the chool. At the suggestion of the Minister of Education each Committee appointed a sub-Committee timest with a representative of the Department of Education and revise the draft submitted. These sub-Committees accordingly held a joint meeting, at which the Secretary of the Department resided, and accomplished the revision as fully and carefully as their time would permit.

As a result of these conferences and deliberations the Committee have much pleasure in laying son the table of this Assembly a copy of "Scripture Readings for High and Public Schools of fluxing," containing also regulations for their use, as approved by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Concil on the 16th day of December, 1881, and the forms of prayer with which the schools are to be penel and closed. Although, as will be seen from the above statement, the Committee has taken seep part in preparing the book, and has been consulted regarding the Regulations, still the Department of Education assumes all responsibility in the matter.

The readings consist of many of the most instructive portions of the Old and New Testament Sciptures taken from the historical, devotional, and didactic hooks. The regulations provide for rading one of these selections each day at the close of the school without note or comment, for gaver at the opening and closing of the school, and for repeating the Ten Commandments, always with due regard to any conscientious scruples which parents and guardians or teachers may have as tereligious exercises and instruction. It is further recommended that passages of Scripture be-manufed to memory; and where all concerned are agreed even more may be done, as the regulations are intended not to prevent the wishes of parents and trustees being carried into effect, but other to afford all reasonable liberty of action. The seventh regulation is intended to facilitate as first specially the giving of Religious Instruction by clergymen out of school hours.

It is to be expected that difference of opinion will exist on such points as the preparation and use is volume of selections, rather than authoritatively indicating what portions of Scripture should be real while the whole Bible is in the hands of the scholars; the omission of certain verses and the section of parenthetical clauses for the sake of correction and elucidation; the reading of the lesson a the teacher alone before the scholars, rather than having the scholars read from their own books; the compulsory requirement of devotional exercises; the giving of religious instruction by clergymen at their substitutes after school hours, ste; but we may not forget that there are difficulties of a greated kind connected with a non-denominational system of education, and in the opinion of the Minister of E function and those associated with him, these are of such magnitude as to prevent more and one towards adequate Biblical instruction, at least until such time as public sentiment has sade further progress in that direction.

For a number of years this subject of the Religious Instruction of our youth has been promisently before the general public and the Church courts. The Committee, although not prepared to withstall has been done which may and which should be done, nevertheless feel satisfaction with what his been accomplished. The school system of the Province of Cutario is clearly seen to be not only secular; God and his supreme authority are acknowledged; the spilit of the school law which carles that "pupils shall be allowed to receive such religious instruction as their parents and scalinus may desire" is so far carried into practice; regard is shown to the principle fail down in that law, "As thristianity is recognized by common consent throughout this Province as an exential element of celection it ought to provide all the regulations for elementary instruction;" adinstruction of the young in the principles of Christian morality as well as in the practice of natural virtue is so far made part of the work of public schools. On the attainment of these results the Christian public may well be congratulated, and for them thanks are due to our educational attention.

Further, in order to strengthen the hands of those who may from time to time be entrusted with the di important interests of the education of our youth, and that they may soon feel assured that any well-directed effort put forth with the view of bringing Scripture truth and religious influence to hear upon our youth will have the hearty support of the Christian people represented by the Presbyterian Church, the Committee respectfully recommend:

That this Assembly, acknowledging the courtesy of the Honourable the Minister of Education shown to their Committee, repord satisfaction with what has been accomplished in the way of giving religious instruction in our schools, and accept the same gratefully; and also that the Assembly renew its testimony that nothing short of acquaintance with the will of God as revealed in the Bible will suffice to make a people God-fearing, virtuous and law-abiding, or afford adequate guidance for life and duty; and declare its readiness to co-operate in any measures which may be proposed by the educational authorities for securing similar privileges for the young in the other Provinces of the

In conclusion the Committee invoke the blessing of God upon his Word as it will now be used in the schools of Ontario, praying that it may not return unto Him void; but may, by the blessing of the Holy Spirit, elevate the character and purify the hearts of our children; making the nation free indeed and delivering them alike from ignorance, superstition and pride of reason, and producing that Godliness which "has the promise of the life that now is and of that which is to come."


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
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
