In the year 1879 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and one of the Moon.

I.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, January 21-22, 1879, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, Jan. 21, 20h 59m, 5, Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude $51^{\circ} 3' W.$ of Greenwich, and Latitude $24^{\circ} 0' S.$

Central Eclipse begins generally, January 21, 22h 3m, 0, in Longitude $68^{\circ} 20' W.$ of Greenwich, and Latitude $27^{\circ} 32' S.$

Central Eclipse at noon, January 21, 23h 45m, 9, in Longitude $6^{\circ} 28' E.$ of Greenwich, and Latitude $31^{\circ} 0' S.$

Central Eclipse ends generally, January 22, 1h 42m, 8, in Longitude $64^{\circ} 30' E.$ of Greenwich, and Latitude $7^{\circ} 45' N.$

Ends on the Earth generally, January 22, 2h 46m, 2, in Longitude $47^{\circ} 18' E.$ of Greenwich, and Latitude $11^{\circ} 20' N.$

II.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, July 18, 1879, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, July 18, 18h 10m, 7, Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude $5^{\circ} 13' W.$ of Greenwich, and Latitude $10^{\circ} 32' N.$

Central Eclipse begins generally, July 18, 19h 13m, 3, in Longitude $19^{\circ} 46' W.$ of Greenwich, and Latitude $7^{\circ} 44' N.$

Central Eclipse at Noon, July 18, 21h 9m, 2, in Longitude $44^{\circ} 13' E.$ of Greenwich, and Latitude $12^{\circ} 18' N.$

Central Eclipse ends generally, July 18, 22h 55m, 4, in Longitude $98^{\circ} 16' E.$ of Greenwich, and Latitude $23^{\circ} 18' S.$

Ends on the Earth generally, July 18, 23h 58m, 0, in Longitude $83^{\circ} 50' E.$ of Greenwich, and Latitude $20^{\circ} 31' S.$

True Latitude of Church Hill.....	$47^{\circ} 34'$ North.
Longitude (West of Greenwich).....	$52^{\circ} 42'$ West.
Variation of the Compass.....	$32^{\circ} 30'$ and increasing <i>seven seconds</i> annually.

NOTE.—The Tide Tables (in the Calendar pages) may be rendered applicable to various other places on the coast, by simply adding or subtracting as the case may be, the difference between the times of High Water on the full and change of the Moon at St. John's, and the time of the full tide at any other harbor; for example, to find the time of High Water at any of the principal harbors of Conception Bay, add 45 minutes to the time at which it will be high water at John's; for Placentia Bay add 2 hours; for St. Peter's, 1h. 50m; for Ferrole, on the French Shore, 4 hour, &c.—See table LVII of Norie's Epitome.

FEBRUARY.—February (Latin, *Februarius*) received its name from Februalia, a feast of sacrifices and purifications held by the Romans in this month, in the vain hope of being cleansed from the sins of the whole year. It corresponds to ADAR (Ezra vi. 15,) the sixth civil, and twelfth sacred month of the Jews. By the Saxons it was called *Sproutkele*, as cabbages begin to sprout now; and also *Sol-monath*, the month when pancakes were offered to Sol, or the Sun.

The Royal Family of Great Britain.

ALEXANDRIA VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, only daughter and heir to the late Prince Edward, Duke of Kent, fourth son of King George III. Her Majesty was born at Kensington Palace on the 24th May, 1819; baptised on the 24th June, 1819; ascended the throne on the demise of her uncle, King William IV., 20th June, 1837; proclaimed 21st June, 1837; and crowned at Westminster on the 28th June, 1838. Her Majesty was married at St. James's Palace, on the 10th February, 1840, to her cousin, his late Royal Highness, Francis-Albert-Augustus-Charles-Emanuel, Duke of Saxe, Prince of Coburg and Gotha, who died at Windsor Castle on the 14th December, 1861. LIGHT HOUSES, HARBOR LIGHTS, &C.

The Lights in the following list are exhibited nightly, from sunset to sunrise.

No. 1, 1876. *Long Point, Twillingate, (Toulinguet)*—Revolving white light, attaining its greatest brilliancy every 30 seconds, visible in clear weather 27 nautical miles; 335 feet above sea level. Latitude $49^{\circ}41'0''$ N., long. $54^{\circ}49'0''$ W. The light tower is painted red and the keepers dwelling (detached) is painted white and the roof red. Samuel Roberts, Keeper; Jas. H. Preston, Assistant.

No. 1, 1874. *Can Island, Seldom-come-by*—A fixed white light at an elevation of 85 feet above the level of the sea, visible 12 miles in clear weather. The tower and dwelling are of wood and attached, and are situated in lat. $49^{\circ}35'05''$ N., and long. $54^{\circ}10'35''$ W. The apparatus is dioptric, of the 8th order, with a single argand burner, and illuminates an arc of the horizon of 270° . John Hodnot, Keeper.

Offer Wadham Island, 1858.—This is a fixed white light, produced by a two-wick burner, burning on a circular Brick Tower, 100 feet above the level of the sea, and can be seen in a favourable state of the atmosphere 15 nautical miles. The keepers house is of wood, painted white and detached. Situated in Latitude $49^{\circ}16'0''$ North, Longitude $53^{\circ}45'0''$ West. Charles Prowse, Keeper; Henry Waterman, Assistant.

Puffin Island, Greenspond, 1872.—This light house is built of granite. The tower and keepers dwelling are attached. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, of the 4th order. The light is a fixed red one, produced by a two-wick burner; it is 85 feet above the level of the sea and in clear weather should be seen a distance of 12 miles. The light is visible from North by East, through South to West by North, by compass, and is situated in $49^{\circ}3'37''$ North lat., and $55^{\circ}2'27''$ West long. Fred. W. Oakley, Keeper.

Cape Bonavista, 1843.—Situate in lat. $48^{\circ}41'50''$ N., long. $53^{\circ}5'20''$ W.; is a revolving light, showing alternately every 90 seconds a white and red light. It is produced by 16 argand burners and reflectors, at an elevation above the sea of 150 feet, and

in favourable weather it can be seen 18 nautical miles. By keeping this light open with Cape L'Argent, it will carry you clear the Flower Rocks. Matthew White, Keeper; Thos. White Assistant.

Green Island at the entrance of Catalina Harbor, Trinity Bay, 1857—Situate in latitude $48^{\circ}30'16''$ N., long. $53^{\circ}2'40''$ W. A fixed white light, at an elevation of 92 feet above high water, which in favourable weather will be seen from E.N.E. seaward, to S.W., 15 nautical miles. Vessels bound Northward by keeping this light open with the North Head of Catalina until Bonavista light opens with Cape LeJean, will give the Flower Rocks an ample berth—or when coming from the Northward and bound for Catalina, by giving the N. head a moderate berth, you will clear the Brandies Rocks by steering for Green Island light. Peter Woods, Keeper; Peter Martin, Assistant.

Fort Point, Trinity, No. 3, 1873.—A fixed white light upon a wooden tower, painted white, and at a height of 75 feet above the level of the sea, visible in clear weather for 11 miles. The erection is situated in $48^{\circ}21'55''$ North lat., and $53^{\circ}20'51''$ West long. The apparatus is dioptric, of the 8th order with a single argand burner, and illuminates an arc of the horizon of 320° .—In entering the harbor the light must be kept on the port hand. Keeper, Wm. Rowe.

Baccalieu Island—The light-house is situated on the northern end of the Island—Latitude $48^{\circ}8'51''$ North, long. $52^{\circ}47'50''$ West—the tower is of brick, the keeper's dwelling (a square building detached from the tower,) is painted white, with the roof red. The light is a catoptric, first class Holophotal revolving white light, shewing a flash every twenty seconds. It is elevated 443 feet above high water, and can be seen in clear weather 30 nautical miles. When the southern end of the Island bears N.N.E., the light will not be visible when nearer the Island than 8 miles. It was first exhibited in 1858. John Ryan, Keeper; Michael Ryan, Assistant.

Carbonear Island, No. 1, 1878.—A fixed white light, 195 feet above sea level, and visible 16 miles in clear weather. The tower and dwelling are of wood, in one building, and are situated in $47^{\circ}44'24''$ N. lat., $53^{\circ}09'22''$ W. long. The apparatus is dioptric, of the 8th order, with a simple argand burner. The whole horizon is illuminated. Keeper, George H. Taylor.

Harbor Grace Island—The light at this station is revolving, showing in every direction two white flashes, followed by one red flash. Each flash attains its greatest brilliancy every 30 seconds. This light, in a favourable state of the atmosphere, will be seen 25 nautical miles. It is situated in lat. $47^{\circ}42'45''$ N., and long. $53^{\circ}8'15''$ W. Austin Oke, Keeper; P. Houlahan, Assistant.

Harbor Grace Beach Beacon and Light, 1850.—A fixed white light in a white painted wood Tower stands on the point of Beach at the entrance of Harbor Grace. Entering with a fair or leading wind, bring it to bear W. or W. by S., and by keeping the light or building a little on the starboard bow it will bring you clear of the Bar, on which at low water there is not more than 8 feet

Cape St. Francis, No. 2, 1870.—Lat. 47°48'.30", long. 52°46'.50". A *fixed red* light at an elevation of 123 feet above sea level; under favourable circumstances it will be seen 12 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, of the 5th order, with a single argand burner.

Cape St. Francis Fog Alarm, No. 1, 1877.—A powerful *Siren Trumpet* will be sounded during the continuance of thick weather and snow storms. It will be sounded five seconds and silent five seconds—sounded five seconds and silent forty-five seconds in each minute. The buildings at this station are of wood, painted white—the roofs flat. On the higher roof is the lantern, elevated above it on a square block. The lower building is the Fog Alarm house. Jno. Hagan, Keeper; Jonas Soper, Engineer.

Fort Amherst, at the entrance of St. John's—A light was first established at this station in 1813; in 1850 a new House, Lantern and apparatus were erected. The light, a *fixed white* one, burns at an elevation of 114 feet, is produced by a double argand burner placed in the focus of an annular lens of the fourth order, and in favourable weather can be seen 16 nautical miles. When Cape Spear is enveloped in fog a heavy piece of ordnance is also discharged at this Fort every hour during daylight, to assist vessels in making the harbor. It is situated in lat. 47°35'.54" N., and long. 52°40'.18" W. John Shepherd, Keeper; Thomas Moore, Assistant.

St. John's—Two *red* lights intended as leading marks for vessels entering the Narrows. The lower light is on a mast on the roof of the Custom House. The upper light (400 yards in the rear) in a small Tower, near the N.E. angle of the Congregational Church, and 180 feet above the level of the sea. As leading marks during the day there is a disc on the mast head on the Custom House and another on the apex of the Tower roof—the discs are painted *white*. By keeping these lights or discs in line the largest vessels will clear all dangers.

Cape Spear, 1835.—This light is produced by seven argand burners and silvered reflectors, at an elevation of 264 feet—it revolves, shewing a bright *white* light every minute, and in favourable weather can be seen 26 nautical miles. It is situated in 47°31'.11" N. lat., 52°36'.59" W. Longitude. James Cantwell, Keeper; Dennis Cantwell, Assistant.

Cape Spear Alarm, No. 2, 1878.—A Trumpet, sounding by the escape of compressed air, has been placed at this station, in a wooden building on the Bill of the Cape, nearly 600 yards N.N.E. from the Light House. It will be sounded for seven seconds of each minute during the continuance of thick weather or snow storms. The range of sound will probably be from 1½ to 10 miles, according to the direction and intensity of the wind or other atmospheric disturbance.

Ferryland Head, 1871.—A *fixed white* light of the 3rd order,

burning on a brick tower 200 feet above the level of the sea, visible in favourable weather 10 nautical miles. Lat. $47^{\circ}00'.58''$ N., and long. $52^{\circ}51'.07''$ W. The tower is of red brick; the keepers dwelling, detached from the tower, is painted white and the roof red. Michael Kearney, Keeper; Phillip Kough, Assistant.

Cape Race—A revolving white light, which will be visible to seaward from N.E. by E., round by the S.E. and S. to W. The light is elevated 180 feet above the mean water level of the sea, and may be seen in clear weather 19 nautical miles from a ships deck. The tower is striped red and white vertically. It stands close to the old Beacon, which has been cut down. Lat. $46^{\circ}30'.30''$ N., long. $53^{\circ}4'.30''$ W., and was first exhibited in 1856.—Michael J. Hally, Keeper; James Simms, Assistant.

Cape Race Steam Fog Alarm—A powerful Steam Whistle has been placed on Cape Race, about 250 feet South of the Light-house. It is sounded during thick or foggy weather or snow storms, for ten seconds, with intervals of silence of fifty seconds, in each minute. The Whistle will probably be heard in calm weather 20 miles; with the wind 30 miles; and in stormy weather against the wind, from seven to ten miles. P. Myrick, Engineer.

Cape Pine—This tower is of iron, built by the Imperial Government in 1849-50, and first put into requisition on the 1st January, 1851. It is a fixed white light, has 17 argand burners and reflectors—elevated above the level of the sea 314 feet—situated in lat. $46^{\circ}37'.4''$ N., and in long. $53^{\circ}31'.48''$ W. In a favourable state of the atmosphere it can be seen 26 nautical miles. George Hewett, Keeper; Wm. Costeloe, Assistant.

Cape St. Mary's, 1860.—A revolving catoptric light of the first order, producing alternately every minute a brilliant red and a white light, burning at an elevation of 300 feet above the level of the sea, and will be seen in a favourable state of the atmosphere 26 nautical miles from a vessel's deck; situated in $46^{\circ}49'.30''$ N. lat., $51^{\circ}11'.34''$ W. long. The tower is of brick, and on each side stand the dwellings of the keeper and assistant, the sides of which are painted white, roofs red. John Rielly, Keeper; Wm. J. Collins, Assistant.

Dodding Head, Great Burin Island, 1858.—This light is revolving, catoptric, of the second order, producing a brilliant white light every minute, burning at an elevation of 430 feet above the level of the sea, and in favourable weather can be seen 20 miles—situated in $47^{\circ}0'.27''$ North latitude, $55^{\circ}8'.47''$ West longitude. Austin Sheppard, Keeper; John Churchill, Assistant.

Brunet Island, Mercer's Head, Fortune Bay—A powerful flashing white light, and attains its greatest brilliancy every ten seconds. It burns at an elevation of 408 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather may be seen at a distance of 35 miles and be visible in every direction from North round East and South, to W.N.W. Mercer's Head is a bold headland and situated in long. $47^{\circ}16'.0''$ W., and lat. $56^{\circ}59'.30''$ N. Martin Sparrow, Keeper; James Gaulton, Assistant.

Garnish, Fortune Bay—A Beacon Tower of wood, carrying an

Octagon and Lantern, in which a *red* light is exhibited. Lat. $47^{\circ}14'.0''$ N., long. $55^{\circ}24'.0''$ W. (approximate). John Grandy, Keeper.

Belloram, Fortune Bay, No. 1, 1873—A *fixed white* light, at an elevation of 35 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be visible seven miles. The building is a wooden tower, painted white, and is situated in lat. $47^{\circ}20'.0''$ N., and $55^{\circ}27'.15''$ West. long. The apparatus is dioptric, of the 8th order, with a single argand burner, and illuminates an arc of the horizon of 270° . In entering the harbor the light must be kept on the port hand. Samuel Clewett, sr., Keeper.

Rocky Point, Harbor Breton, Fortune Bay—Situated in latitude $47^{\circ}27'.30''$ N., longitude $55^{\circ}47'.45''$ W. A square wooden tower, carrying an Octagon and Lantern, in which a *fixed white* light will be exhibited. The apparatus is dioptric, of the 8th order, with a single argand burner, with a *red* light to mark the Harbor Rock. Wm. Lorenzen, Keeper.

Beacon, Ireland's Eye, entrance of La Poile Bay—A square building of wood, painted white, with three black bands, has been erected on this Island. It is 75 feet high and is supported on four chaises.

Boar Island, Burgeo, No. 2, 1874—A *fixed red* light, at an elevation of 240 feet above the sea, visible 17 miles in clear weather. The tower and dwelling are of wood and attached, and are situated in latitude $47^{\circ}30'.12''$ N., and longitude $57^{\circ}35'.13''$ W. The apparatus is dioptric, of the 6th order, with a single argand burner, and illuminates an arc of the horizon of 270° . Edward Dicks, Keeper.

Rose Blanche Point, No. 2, 1873—This Light house is built of granite, upon the eastern head. The tower and keepers dwelling are attached. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, of the 4th order, and a *fixed white* light will be produced by a two wick burner, at an elevation of 95 feet above the level of the sea. It should be seen in clear weather 13 miles. The light illuminates the horizon from East by South, through South to West by compass, and is situated in lat. $47^{\circ}35'.48''$ N., and $58^{\circ}41'.30''$ W. long. Shag Island Black Rock bears West from the light and distant about one mile. Rose Blanche shoals W.S.W. half a mile, and Petites Black Rock E. by S. three miles. Keeper, John A. Roberts.

Channel Head, Port-au-Basques, No. 1, 1875—A *fixed red* light, at an elevation of 90 feet above the level of the sea. The light tower and keepers dwelling are of wood and detached. Lat. $47^{\circ}33'.47''$ N., and long. $59^{\circ}07'.10''$ West. In clear weather the light should be visible twelve miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, of the 8th order, with a single argand burner. The whole horizon is illuminated. Timothy Pike, Keeper.

John T. Nevill, Inspector of Light-houses.

Light Dues—One Shilling per ton on all vessels entering any port or harbor of the Colony, except coasting, sealing, or fishing vessels; but not to be levied more than once in one year. Sealing and coasting vessels—sixpence per ton on registered vessels

of 40 tons and upwards; fifteen shillings per ton on all vessels less than 40 tons.

The 19th of Victoria, Cap. 5, Sec. 5, enacts,—“That no greater sum than £25 sterling shall be in any year levied for Light Dues on any steamer or vessel entering any port of this Colony; and no steamer plying between Europe and any port of North America, and entering any port of this Colony as a port of call, shall be liable to pay any Light Dues, or other port charges, except pilotage.”

Gallantry Head, Island of St. Peter's—The fixed Light on Gallantry Head, (Island of St. Peter's) since the 10th August, 1862, has been replaced by a Flash Light, with intervals of twenty seconds, and by one red flash after two white flashes; situated in lat. $40^{\circ}45'30''$ N., long. $58^{\circ}27'$ W.; elevation above high water, 64 metres, (204 English feet). Distance at which the light is visible, 18 miles. The light is hidden at the Northward by the high land of St. Peter's.

Light at the South entrance of St. Peter's—Since 1st October, 1862, the entrance of the harbor of St. Peter's, called South Channel, has been marked by two small fixed Lights, one of which is a white Light, illuminating three fourths of the horizon and placed on the Battery—and the other a red light, on the plain at the north of the town. The white light has an elevation of 11 metres, and is visible 6 miles. The red light is elevated 19 metres, visible 3 miles distant. The line connecting these two lights indicate the middle Channel.

The position of the red light has also been so determined that as soon as it is seen on the left of Cape Eagle, vessels coming from Columbiar in beating into the N.E. entrance will have nothing to fear from the shoals of Cape Rouge.

Light on the South West Point of the Island of Dogs, called Pointe a Leconte—Commencing on the 1st August, 1874, a light will be exhibited on the South West Point of the Island of Dogs, at the place called Pointe a Leconte at 400 metres (437 English feet) above the level of the sea. It will be seen in clear weather 7 miles. The extent of the light is circumscribed in a sector of 163° , presenting two cones of light, one white, of 40° , will light the passage of the S.E. so as to permit vessels which maintain position within this cone to avoid at the right the shoal Bataille, and to the left the rock of Cape Noir and the rock Bertrand.—The second cone will be red, of 123° . It should be avoided by vessels entering by the S.E. passage, and will enable them, when they have quitted the white cone, to come to anchor in the roadstead or in the Barachois, in following the line of the white light from Pointe aux Canons, and of the red light from the interior of the city.

A Light House has been erected by the Government of Canada, on the western side of Cape Ray, on the South-west coast of the Island of Newfoundland. Latitude $47^{\circ}37'$ N., long. $59^{\circ}18'$ W. A powerful flash white light is exhibited, making a complete revolution in two and one quarter minutes, and flashing every ten seconds; at a long distance, however, it has the ap-

pearance of a steady light. The light can probably be seen at a distance of 20 miles in clear weather.

The Tower is a wooden building, hexagonal in shape, forty-one feet high, and painted white. The keepers dwelling, also of wood, stands at a little distance from the Tower, and is also painted white.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric and consists of twelve lamps and reflectors.

A Fog Whistle is in operation at Cape Ray. It will be blown in thick and foggy weather and during snow storms, for ten seconds in each minute, leaving an interval of fifty seconds between each blast. It can be heard from 3 to 15 miles.

Letters for the British West Indies, 10 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and 10 cents for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

Newspapers to United States, the Dominion and West Indies, 2 cents, and to England 1 cent.

Foreign Newspapers re-mailed for transmission to the Outports, are charged 1 cent each, prepaid by stamp.

All correspondence addressed to the United Kingdom, United States, the Dominion, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward's Island must be prepaid, or it cannot be forwarded.

INLAND POSTAGE.

For Letters Under $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. 3 cents.
Under 1 oz. 6 cents.
3 cts. for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., prepaid by stamps.

For book packets, pamphlets, magazines and periodicals, not exceeding three pounds in weight, transmitted by post within the Island are charged 5 cents for every quarter pound of their weight.

PARCEL POST.

Parcels closed at the ends and sides, but not sealed or closed with gum, may be posted at any Post Office in Newfoundland for conveyance to any other Post Office (not Way Office) in the Island, at a rate of Postage subject to the following conditions:—

- 1—No letter or letters shall be concealed.
- 2—The parcel shall not contain any explosive substance, glass, liquid or other matter, likely to injure the ordinary contents of the mail, under penalty of forfeiture of the parcel.
- 3—The weight of the parcel should not exceed 3 lbs., nor the size exceed one foot, in length or breadth, or six inches in thick-

ness. It must be so put up that the contents may be examined, to prevent letters or other communications being enclosed.

4—Parcels must be prepaid at the following rates:

Under $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. 4 cents.
 Over $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. and not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. 8 cents.
 Over $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. and not exceeding $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. 12 cents,
 and so on, adding 4 cents for every $\frac{1}{4}$ lb., or fraction thereof.

5—The parcel may be registered on payment of a fee of five cents in addition to the postage.

6—If the name and address of the sender be written on the parcel, it will, if delivery should fail from any cause, be returned unopened to the sender, on payment of an additional rate of 16 cents for the return conveyance.

7—The parcel should have the words "by Parcel Post," plainly written over the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the Post Office address of the intended receiver, including the name of the district in which the Post Office is situated. The following is an example of the mode of address recommended:

PROHIBITORY CLAUSES.

No written communication shall be enclosed in any circular, periodical, pamphlet, book, book parcel, or parcel for the Parcel Post; and no communication shall be written upon any circular, periodical, pamphlet, book, book package or parcel.

No letter, or any writing, or any marks to serve the purpose of a letter, shall be written upon or enclosed in any newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper.

Prepaid books, pamphlets and magazines for Great Britain, Dominion of Canada and United States, are charged the following rates, when exceeding two ounces in weight:

For a packet above two ozs. and not exceeding 4 ozs., 4 cents.
 not exceeding 8 ozs., 8 cents.
 over 8 ozs. and not exceeding 1 lb., 16 cents,
 and so on, adding 4 cents for every additional 4 ozs., or fraction thereof, when the packet exceeds two ounces in weight.

Books, trade patterns, or samples, and all printed papers, other than newspapers, not exceeding *two ounces in weight*, are forwarded to the United Kingdom at the reduced rate of:

For a packet not exceeding 2 ozs. 2 cents.

Unpaid Books for the United Kingdom or other countries will not be forwarded.

Letters for officers serving in H. M. Service abroad are chargeable with the ordinary rates of postage.

Rates of Postage on Letters posted in Newfoundland for the following Countries and places:

United Kingdom, Dominion of Canada and the United States, 5 cents per $\frac{1}{4}$ oz., rate.

France, Spain, Portugal, Italy, Holland, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland, Russia, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Malta, Gibraltar, Ionian Islands, Greece, Larnica, Mitelene, Azores, Algeria, Tunis, Turkey, Egypt, and Bermuda, 10 cents per $\frac{1}{4}$ ounce rate.

Aden, Africa, (South and West) Ascension, Australian Colonies, Bourbon, Brazil, Borneo, Cape de Verde, Cayenne, Cape of Good Hope, Ceylon, China, Falkland Islands, Fernando Po, Gambia, Gold Coast, Gaudaloupe, India, (via Southampton) Java, Japan, Liberia, Martinique, Mauritius, Reunion, Singapore, Sierra Leone, 17 cents per $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. rate.

Buenos Ayres, Coasta Rica, Grey Town, Gautemala, Hayti, Hong Kong, Labuan, Mexico, Monte Video, Penang, St. Helena, St. Croix, United States of Columbia, (New Grenada) 29 cents per $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. rate.

As the postal rates for Foreign Countries are often changed, it would be well to inquire at the Post Office if the amount of Stamps on Letters is sufficient to prepay to destination.

Letters sent via Brindisi are charged 4 cents additional per $\frac{1}{4}$ ounce rate.

Per Packet, via Hallfax, Bermuda, 10 cents; United States, Dominion of Canada, Prince Edward's Island, 5 cent per $\frac{1}{4}$ oz.

Rule of Rating Letters by British Packet.

For all countries, under $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. one rate; under 1 oz., two rates; under $1\frac{1}{4}$ oz. three rates, and so on, adding one rate for every $\frac{1}{4}$ oz.

Letters Posted in Newfoundland for delivery at any place within the Island, are charged 3 cents for every $\frac{1}{4}$ oz., if prepaid, and 6 cents unpaid.

REGISTRATION.

Any Letters found to contain Coin, as well as any having the word "Registered" written upon them, which may be posted in Newfoundland, will be forwarded to any part of the Colony or the United Kingdom, charged with a double registration fee.

For Foreign countries and Dominion of Canada they will not be forwarded unless fully prepaid, both postage and registration fee.

MONEY ORDER BRANCH.

Money Orders are now interchanged with the United Kingdom, Dominion of Canada, P. E. Island and the United States, at the following rates of commission:

Scale for United Kingdom—Orders up to £2 stg., 1s. stg.; from £2 up to £5, 2s.; from £5 up to £7, 3s.; from £7 up to £10, 4s.

Scale for the Provinces—Orders up to £5, 1s.; from £5 to £10, 2s.; from £10 to £15, 3s.; and from £15 to £20, 4s. No single

Order can be granted for more than £20. No half-peace to be introduced in the Orders.

Business of Money Order Office closes one hour before closing the Mails by Steamer.

SYSTEM.

1—Money Orders are made out in forms supplied for the use of the Money Order Offices.

2—Persons applying for Money Orders are recommended to use printed "Application Forms," printed for that purpose.

3—Place of payment of a Money Order may be changed in accordance with instructions provided therefor.

4—Alteration of payee's name may be effected by issue of a new Order and payment of commission thereon.

5—Applicants for Money Orders are expected to observe due care in the examination of the same, relative to filling and stamping; defect in Orders, when presented for payment, may cause difficulty and delay, for which the paying office is not to be held accountable.

6—Postmasters should be particularly careful to obtain from the person who presents a Money Order, whether the rightful owner or not, full information as to the Christian name, surname and address of the party who originally obtained it, unless such party be a firm, when the name of the firm will suffice. *The only exception to this rule is—*When an Order is presented through the Bank, in which case it will suffice that the Order, being properly signed, be also crossed with the Banker's name.

7—As however, *after once paying a Money Order, by whomsoever presented, the office will not be liable to any further claim, the public are strictly cautioned,—*

1st—To take all means to prevent the loss of the money Order.

2nd—To be careful on taking out an Order, to state correctly the Christian as well as the surname of the person in whose favor it is drawn.

3rd—To see that the name of the person taking out the Money Order is correctly known to the person in whose favor it is drawn.

8—Payment of a Money Order must be obtained before the end of the sixth calendar month after that in which it was issued, otherwise a new Order will be necessary, for which a second commission will be charged; and if the Order be not paid before the twelfth calendar month after that in which it was issued, all claims to the money will be lost.

Neglect of the foregoing instructions will risk the loss of the money, besides leading to delay and trouble in obtaining payment.

9—Postmasters should recommend the use of Money Orders for the transmission of money, in preference to such transmission otherwise.

Suggestions to the Public.

Facility will be given to the Post Office in the discharge of its daily duties, and greater security afforded to the public, by careful attention to the following recommendations:

Post all Letters and Newspapers, &c., as early as practicable, especially when sent in large bundles.

When a number of Newspapers are addressed to the same office, put them up in one parcel.

When a number of circulars are posted, tie them up in a bundle, with the address all in one direction.

Address letters, papers, &c., in a legible and complete manner, always giving the name of the Post Office; and if there be more than one Post Office of that name, the name of the district in which situated. In case of letters going abroad, the name of the country, as well as of the town and city, should be given in full. Letters, for example, intended for London, England, if simply addressed "London" would be forwarded to London, Canada West, and thus be delayed.

Letters, Papers, or Parcels for Outports should have the name of the District, the Post or Way Office, distinctly written as part of the address. For instance, Letters for Bonne Bay, French Shore, are sometimes sent to Bonne Bay, Fortune Bay District, being simply directed Bonne Bay—there are several settlements named Broad Cove, Little Bay, English Harbor, Blackhead, Balline, Caplin Cove, Deer Island, Flat Islands, Fortune, Fox Cove, Freshwater, Island Cove, Long Harbor, Burgeo, New Harbor, Salmon Cove, Seal Cove, Ship Cove, and unless properly directed, are liable to go to wrong office for delivery. The loss and inconvenience arising from imperfect directions, is caused by the carelessness of the sender, and no blame can attach to the Post Office—other places besides those named, have settlements with corresponding appellation, hence the necessity of being particular in addressing all letters, &c.

See that every letter, newspaper, or other packet sent by post, is securely folded and sealed. Every such packet has to be several times handled; and even when in the mail bag, is exposed to pressure and friction. Unless, therefore, the article be light and pliant, it should be enclosed in strong paper, linen, parchment, or some other material which will not readily tear or break.

Fasten the covers of newspapers firmly, so as to prevent them from slipping out.

When dropping a letter or newspaper into a letter box, always see that the packet falls into the box, and does not stick in its passage.

Never seal letters for the East and West Indies and other hot climates, with wax. Such a practice is attended with much inconvenience and frequently with serious injury, in consequence of the melting of the wax, and the adhesion of the letters to

each other. In all such cases use wafers or gum and advise your correspondents in the country referred to, to do the same.

Never send money or other articles of value through the Post Office, except either by means of a money order, or in a registered letter. "Any person who sends money or jewellery in an unregistered letter, not only runs the risk of losing his property, but exposes to temptation every one through whose hands his letter passes, and may be the means of ultimately bringing some clerk or letter carrier to moral ruin." Carefully secure every letter or packet containing money or value, first with gum and afterwards with good sealing wax, on which mark the clear impression of a seal.

On posting a registered letter or packet, always obtain a receipt for the same at the office where posted.

When letters or newspapers are delayed and missing, at once communicate the fact to the Postmaster of the Division in which is situated the Post Office at which the delayed or missing letters were posted. In case of a missing letter enclose value, state the exact contents, the exact address, and the office at which posted; the name of the person by whom posted, and the name of the person by whom received at the office. In the case of a delayed letter or paper, send the cover or wrapper in an entire state, in order that the place of delay may be ascertained by an examination of the post marks.

Trouble and loss occasionally arise out of the carelessness or dishonesty of parties employed in the Post Office service; yet instances are not wanting in which it has been shown to the satisfaction even of the complainants, that the fault at first attributed to the Post Office, in truth rested in other quarters. Theft by private hands, although very difficult of proof, have not unfrequently been brought to light; and it is greatly to be desired that those who suffer loss should, in the first instance, and while the circumstances are fresh, endeavour to ascertain with the utmost precision all particulars respecting the despatch or receipt of the lost letters or papers, and lose no time in communicating this information to the Postmaster. Indeed, generally speaking, it is only by careful inquiry into minute details that the offender can be detected, whether he be a servant of a department or not.

The Post Office is a department which admits of constant improvement and expansion. The public, by sending to the Postmaster General, clear and correct information respecting faulty arrangements, may materially benefit the service. It must be remembered, however, that changes in machinery so extensive and intricate as that of the Post Office, must be made cautiously and with much previous consideration.

Time is generally required to carry out any material change in postal arrangements; for even when decided upon, old contracts, requiring notice of termination, may have to be got rid of, and tenders for new contracts invited by public advertisements, before the decision can take effect.

New Post Offices are established by the Department wherever it is ascertained that a sufficient number of inhabitants can be accommodated, and a sufficient amount of postal revenue collected to warrant such a measure. When a new Post Office is required, a petition should be addressed to the Postmaster General, signed by as many of the inhabitants as can conveniently subscribe the same. The petition should state the name of the settlement and district in which it is desired the office should be established; the distance from the neighboring offices; whether at the sight of the proposed Post Office there is a village; the number of mills, stores, taverns, and houses thereat; the extent of the settlement to be served and the probable cost of the mail; together with any other facts which may form any ground for the accommodation applied for.

It shall not be lawful for any Importer of dried Fish to Warehouse the same in any of the Ports in this colony or its Dependencies, without the payment of the duty hereinbefore imposed; and the provision of any Act of this Colony with regard to the Warehousing of Goods on the first entry thereof, or to the allowance of drawbacks upon exportation, shall not in either case apply to or be construed to apply to such fish: Provided, that the section shall not apply to such fish of British catch and cure, unless otherwise declared by Proclamation of the Governor, published in the *Royal Gazette*.

All Yachts sailing under Warrant of the Lords of the Admiralty, or belonging to the Royal Yacht Club, shall be exempted on view of the said Warrant, from payment of all local Duties whatsoever.

Harbor Dues.

The following amounts, as Harbor Dues, shall be paid by Vessels arriving at the Port of St. John's, at the time of their being entered at the Custom House, except Ships of War and Vessels engaged in the Coasting trade and Fishing, viz.:

Every vessel of Sixty tons and upwards, and not more than One Hundred tons, \$2.

Every vessel of more than One Hundred tons, and not more than Two Hundred tons, \$3.

Every vessel of more than Two Hundred tons, and not more than Three Hundred tons, \$4.

Every vessel of more than Three Hundred tons, and not more than Four Hundred tons, \$5.

Every vessel of more than Four Hundred tons, \$6.

Provided, that no vessel shall be compelled to pay Harbor Dues more than once in every half-year viz.: Once between the First day of January and Thirtieth day of June, and once between the Thirtieth day of June and First day of January.
