SWEETING TARIFF CHANGES May Be Made In Canada by Ofder-

OTTAWA, May 9 .- (Special.) - Rather sweeping reductions in the Canadian tariff are likely to be made by the Borden government in a few days, probably before the elections come off in Saskatchewan. The reductions will be made by an order in council.

Farmers are likely to get relief in the items of lumber, cement, agricultural mplements, clothing, sugar, explosives, fence wire, cotton, coal, coal oil, doors, eather, boots and shoes, rubber goods The reductions are aimed, it is said, especially at articles produced by com-bines. Cement is one of these.

"I have just come," said the premirr, "from witnessions a spectacle to which I suppose there has never been a parallel in the history of the word—the great British fleet which is now assembled under the eyes and in the presence of the King at Weymouth. There never has been, I believe, in the same space of water such an aggregate There never has been. I believe, in the same space of water such an aggregation of the implements of destruction, and as I went around the fleet and inspected at close quarters some of these magnificent, if monstrous, achievements of modern science, the thought could not but occur to me when thought could not but occur to me whethe time might not some day arrive perhaps within the lifetime of the younger of those who are sitting at these tables, when this gigantic ex-penditure would be diverted into more fruitful and fertilizing channels and the world be saved from the incubus which at present rests upon some of its best aspirations.

"So far as we are concerned and so far as the fleet of Great Britain is concerned, we know it to be and the world knows it to be an instrument not of aggression, but of defence, and with the countless and ever multiplying interests of which we are the trustees and guardians we cannot afford, so long as the world remains in its present tem-per, to neglect any means for making these interests secure against every danger. Rio Makes Another Record-Bank Rate Reduced to 3 Per Cent

The stock was advanced to 214%, a full two points up from the previous day, but the close, at 213 bid, represented a net gain of only a small fraction, late profit-taking wiping out a large portion of the appreciation.

Gold Output Of Rand at New Record Steel Will

LONDON, May 3.—At the annual meeting of the Transvaal Chamber of Mines Mr. H. O. K. Webber sounded a cheerful note of optimism regarding the future of South African gold mining. The mines of the Rand during the month of March made another record, the production reaching 830,723 ounces, against 676,065 during the similar period of 1911.


