SARAH GOODERHAM DEAD FOREMOST IN W.M.S. WORK

Took Deep Interest in Church Work and in Charitable Enterprises.

Mrs. Sarah K. Gooderham died yesterday at the residence of her son-in-law, P. W. Ellis, 96 Glen-road, Toronto.

Mrs. Gooderham was one of the late James Gooderham, who was formerly a resident of Stratford, Ontario, and who took a great interest in the organization and building of the Credit Valley Railway and was a director of the same.

On the day the road was opened she met with an accident that resulted in her death.

Mrs. Gooderham took an active part in church work and was identified with the Methodist Church in Canada. For a number of years she was on the boards of the Girls' Home, Boys' Home, The Haven and the Young Women's Christian Association.

In her first year she seconded the resolution to form conference branches, from which a general board and executive could be drawn.

COMMISSION CONSIDERS COMPLAINT OF HIGH RATES

What It Costs to Travel on the Trolley Cars at Niagara Falls.

Niagara Falls, Sept. 15.—The commissioners of Niagara Park have been in session all day, but as yet have taken no action respecting the complaint filed by the board of trade as to the excessive fares exacted by the electric railway that runs from Chippewa to Queenston.

Some of the fares are most exorbitant. From Bridge-street to the new steel arch bridge below the falls, a distance of about one mile and a half, the fare is ten cents.

From there to Chippewa, another five cents, and from Chippewa to Queenston, about six miles, the round trip fare is 25 cents.

From Queenston to Chippewa, about ten miles, the round fare is 75 cents.

From Niagara Falls, Ont., to Niagara Falls, N. Y., the round trip is 20 cents, and from Niagara Falls, N. Y., to Niagara Falls, Ont., 25 cents is charged for the round trip.

The entire road is built and operated upon the Indian reserve, which belongs to the Province of Ontario.

There is a rental of \$10,000 a year, out of which the park commissioners are to receive a sum of \$5,000. The original company was composed of E. B. Osler, M.P., and J. G. Macdonald, M.P.

The road is now owned by the International Railway Company and controlled by American capital.

BURGLARS AT GALT.

Accident and Attempted Suicide in Busy Town.

Galt, Sept. 15.—(Special.)—At an early hour burglars entered the residence of Major E. J. Beaumont, barrister, Walnut-street.

The occupants were awakened by a noise. Armed with a gun, Major Beaumont searched the house and found evidences of intruders having ransacked the drawing-room, but they decamped, with what amount of booty is not known.

So many extraordinary accidents occurred on Dickson-street to-day, George Campbell, who trains and exercises John Scott's horses, was driving a big roadster stallion in a light sulky when a shoe of one of the horse's right hand foot in swinging forward struck and locked on the right wheel.

The horse, however, lurched heading to the road, alighting on its shoulder and side. The cart made an arc circle thru the air, coming down right over the head and forequarters of the struggling animal.

The driver was hurled 20 feet, but not seriously injured. Separating the interlocked hoofs occupied considerable time. Apart from slight scratches the stallion was uninjured.

Lawyer Hancock and Mr. Simon Metcalfe, when returning late last night from the G.T.R. station, Concord-street, saw a cloaked and hooded woman on the track whose actions excited the suspicion that she was going to commit suicide by throwing herself in front of a moving train.

The woman was in the very act of committing the rash deed when the men ran forward to intercept her. As she saw them coming she fled along a dark street. There is no clue to her identity.

VOLLEY OF REVOLVER SHOTS IN BROOKLYN STREET FIGHT

New York, Sept. 15.—Thomas Murphy, Henry McGarry and Michael Kennedy were wounded by revolver shots, fired by a party of about half a dozen Syrians, in a Brooklyn restaurant to-night.

Murphy and Kennedy are likely to die. The Syrians used insulting language toward the proprietress of the restaurant, and the fight ensued.

Murphy, McGarry and Kennedy were friends of the woman. They used their fists and the Syrians fired a volley of 20 shots.
