Joe Martin Won't Have Them in British Columbia if He Knows It.

NO BLOOD MONEY THERE.

Several Railway Subsidies Which Were Soft Things Have Been Repealed by the Legislature.

Messrs. McKenzie and Mann Are Said to Be Viciously Affected by the Bill - No Actual Contracts Had Really Ever Been Entered Into With Them-What Purported to Be a Contract Though Had the Provision That It Should Be of No Effect Unless With a Subsidy Satisfactory to McKenzie and Mann.

Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 26.-Not for many years has there been so short a session of the British Columbia Legislature as the one that closes to-morrow.

Hon. Joseph Martin, in explaining the bill, remarked that the late Government had purported to enter into certain contracts with McKenzie & Mann, with reference to the construction of a line of railway from Pentleton to Boundary Creek.

As a matter of fact, no contracts had been entered into. There had been what purported to be contracts, but they were voided by the insertion of a condition that they should be of no effect unless in the case of a subsidy "satisfactory to McKenzie & Mann."

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MR. KIPPLING IN BAD SHAPE

Condition on Sunday Gave Rise to the Gravest Apprehension as to the Outcome.

DR. JANEWAY HURRIEDLY CALLED.

Inflammation of the Lungs is the Malady-Doctors Constantly Convinced of His Danger.

New York, Feb. 26.-There was a general impression about the Hotel Grenoble at 5 o'clock this afternoon that Rudyard Kipling's condition was worse than at any time since he became ill. Dr. Janeway arrived at the hotel at 3.30 p.m., and he was not expected until later in the day, it looked as if there had been a sudden change for the worse, and that the physician had been called.

He remained in the hotel until 4.15 and then left, retaining in his hand a letter almost at the same time an oxygen tank was brought to the hotel and taken up to the King apartments on the first floor. The oxygen was to be administered was practically admitted by Dr. Janeway. This is heroic treatment, and is resorted to only in extreme cases.

Both Dr. Janeway and Dr. Dunham were with Mr. Kipling alternately through last night, and both were in attendance on him the morning of the 26th. Dr. Janeway, Dr. Janeway, Jr., a son of Dr. E. G. Janeway, was also called in consultation concerning the critical condition of Mr. Kipling.

Dr. Dunham came from the sick chamber soon after 11 o'clock. His wife is a sister of Mrs. Kipling. "Is Mr. Kipling suffering from pneumonia?" Dr. Dunham was asked. "We will call it inflammation of the lungs," he replied. "If he gets through to-day he will be much nearer safety," said Dr. Dunham.

Dr. Janeway would not tell anything about Mr. Kipling's condition, saying that there was nothing to add to the bulletins. It was learned, however, from other sources that Kipling is extremely weak. At times he recognizes those around him. Those at the bedside are: Dr. Janeway, Dr. Dunham, his mother, Mrs. Balestier; Mr. Doubleday, the children and two nurses.

The following bulletin was issued at 7 o'clock to-night: "Mr. Kipling's condition has been very serious during the whole day of the disease, giving rise to the gravest apprehension for the outcome. The medical men were making almost constant use of oxygen. Their demeanor indicates that they are confident of the disease. Mr. Kipling was delirious at the above bulletin was issued. Mr. Dunham would say a word; in fact, neither ventured from the patient's side for more than a minute at a time."

Low and Unconscious. New York, Feb. 26.-At 9.20 o'clock the following bulletin was issued: "Mr. Kipling's condition remains the same as last night. He is unconscious. It was said at that hour that Mr. Kipling was very low and unconscious."

Bulletin at 3 a.m. New York, Feb. 27.-Mr. Kipling's condition was reported as unchanged at 3 o'clock this morning.

ARRESTED AT SARNIA. Archibald McKay Macdonald, a Bookkeeper at Waubesa, is Apprehended.

The local police received a telegram from Sarnia last night stating that Archibald McKay Macdonald of Waubesa had been apprehended there just as he was about to cross the line for Toronto.

The charge upon which Macdonald was arrested was that he had stolen from the firm of \$585. Macdonald was bookkeeper for the firm, and he is alleged to have stolen the sum of \$585 over a couple of years. The prisoner took ill about two months ago with typhoid fever, and he was confined to his bed for several months. During Macdonald's illness nothing was known of his whereabouts.

Last Friday Mr. James Scott of this city, president of the company, received word that Macdonald was about to leave the country, and he asked the local police to intercept him. The police were directed to Scott's residence, and Macdonald was arrested there.

The prisoner is a young man, and has a wife and two young children. He had been employed with the firm for about five years. It is said that Macdonald reached Sarnia by driving from Toronto under a false name, where he took a train for the United States.

BANNERMAN'S FIRST "CROPPER." Got Tangled Up in Trying to Hold Both Factions of His Followers on Friday Night.

London, Feb. 26.-Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, after such an excellent start on his new mount, the Liberal leadership, "came a cropper" Friday evening at the first hurdle. John Morley, the former Chief Secretary for Ireland under the Liberal Government, challenged the Government on the Sudan policy, by moving a resolution of the supplementary estimates.

Sir Edward Grey (Liberal), formerly Parliamentary Secretary of the Foreign Office, rose and pointed out that the Khartoum expedition was necessary, in consequence of the supplementary estimates.

Then Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman spoke, tried the impossible feat of agreeing with both of his associates, and ended by voting with Mr. Morley, who was also supported by Mr. Labouchere and the front Opposition bench. Over a dozen Liberals, including one who voted with the Government, Herbert Henry Asquith, the former Liberal Secretary of State for Home Affairs, and some others, abstained from voting. This division presents the Liberals as being in a woful condition of divided counsel, and the rebuff of Henry Campbell-Bannerman's leadership is the subject of general comment to-day.

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KILLING THEM ONE BY ONE.

Philippine Sharpshooters Continue to Harass the U. S. Troops.

Manila, Feb. 26.-According to the advice brought this morning by the steamer Neustra Senora Del Carmen, whose arrival here was expected on Feb. 25, Commander Cornwell sent an ultimatum ashore, declaring the intention of the American troops to peacefully occupy the island, by force if necessary. The rebels immediately vacated, taking their guns to the hills, a party of marines and blue jackets was landed, and the American flag was raised by them over the Government building which still occupied the main square.

The steamer brought despatches from Brigadier-General Mills, at Iloilo Major General Otis, reporting that all was quiet there, that there had been no further fighting, and that the rebels had been restored, and business was being resumed. General Mills thinks it probable that the natives will soon be induced to peacefully accept the inevitable, and that the example set by the inhabitants of Negros is having its effect on the island, which, though not entirely convinced, are in General Mills' opinion, open to reason.

Madras official despatch from Manila says: "The situation here is very serious. The foreign warships are being ordered to leave Manila, and to go to Zamboanga, island of Mindanao."

WASHINGTON GETTING ANXIOUS. A Suspicion That Admiral Dewey Had Good Reason for Sending for the Oregon.

New York, Feb. 26.-A Washington despatch says: "The arrival of the German cruiser 'Kaiser' with Angara at Manila to-day and the reports of the Filipino forces from Zamboanga, the interest of Aguinaldo, there is a well-founded suspicion in the public mind here that the Oregon must be in the Philippines, and that the presence is desired as much for the moral effect in preventing foreign interference as for the purpose of the Oregon's guns."

"The anxiety of the officials has reached such a point that there is no further doubt that the United States will be asked to submit an explanation. The meeting of foreign consuls yesterday, followed by Admiral Dewey's request for the Oregon, is regarded as highly significant, but in the official despatches there is no mention of the two incidents, and, in fact, the authorities declare that they have not been advised of the foreign consuls' conference."

"Much to the surprise of the officials, the civilian members of the Philippines Commission have not yet arrived at Hong Kong, where the Baltimore is waiting to convey them to Manila. The Baltimore will be accompanied by Prof. Schurman and his associates arrive at Manila, because they expect that they will be able to establish an immediate communication with the insurgents, which will result in convincing them of the futility of the United States' efforts. 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MANOEUVER IN ARMS

Ottawa Govt. Has Got Into a Nasty Mess Over Dead Man's Island.

PEOPLE WILL FIGHT IT.

Won't Let Yankee Capitalists Come in and Destroy Their Fine Natural Park.

Armed Men Have Been Placed in Charge of the Property to Prevent the Chicago Syndicate, Who Want to Build a Sawmill Thereon, From Taking Possession-An Appeal to the Imperial Authorities-Where Will It End?

Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 26.-[Special.]—A desperate fight is on in Vancouver, and it is of more than local interest. Robert Stuart and T. Wells, two Chicago millionaires, have secured a lease from the Canadian Government of the Imperial naval reserve, held in trust by Canada for a national park, which is said to be one of the most beautiful national parks in the world. The millionaires propose erecting a huge sawmill thereon to catch gigantic orders for lumber from China and Australia.

Vancouver citizens wanted to secure the park for themselves, but were snubbed by the Canadian Government, who handed it over to the Chicago capitalists. They accused their representative, Rev. George Massey, of receiving a bribe of \$10,000, and several aldermen of being offered \$20,000, as the site is perfect for mill purposes and is leased for a long term.

Armed Men in Charge. The city have raised a big fund to engage the services of the Imperial Government, while the Park Commissioners, claiming that the sawmill site is in the city limits, and that property in the city for the purpose of a park, intense excitement prevails in the city. 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

Detroit, Feb. 25.—Hon. David Mills, Canadian Minister of Justice, was the guest of honor at the sixty-third anniversary exercises of the Detroit Bar Association. His subject was "The Comparative Constitutional Law of Canada and the United States." In mentioning the fact that the United States had recently crossed the "boundary" which marks an imperial system, Mr. Mills said: "You have entered upon the work begun by the mother of free states a century ago. You, too, recognize your high calling, have taken upon the white man's burden, and I am sure that the feeling of every Canadian is that this new departure in your historical development may be of great value to yourselves and of priceless advantage to the world."

HIS THIRTY YEARS' EXPERIENCE.

Senator Cox Never Touched Liquor or Smoked Tobacco—God Fought for the Americans.

Senator George A. Cox presided at the Canadian Temperance League's meeting in the Pavilion yesterday afternoon, and made a brief personal reference. He said: In March, 1853, I presided over a meeting of the Pederboro division of the Sons of Temperance, when I had the honor of being elected patriarch. From my personal experience I can say that it is not necessary to take a glass of wine or a cigar in order to be thought manly. OMINEA REGION IN NORTHERN BRITISH COLUMBIA SAID TO RIVAL KLONDIKE IN RICHES.

EXPEDITIONS ARE GOING THERE.

Letter From "Alice A." People in England—Mining Stock Quotations and Sales.

There are indications that the Omineca region, in Northern British Columbia, may prove as rich in gold as the Klondike. The Vancouver, B. C., Province, in a recent issue, said:

"On the steamer Willapa, which left for the north today, is a party of men who have a long tramp before them. They belong to the Forty-third Mining and Milling Company, and intend to go in to Manson Creek by way of the Naas River. A. F. Corton, engineer, and P. W. Keough, superintendent, are at the head of the party. Both have spent three seasons in the Omineca country, and expect to be gone until the snow falls next winter. The company has been quietly working its claims on Manson Creek for three years and the development has been on a large scale, many thousands of dollars having been expended. Large claims had to be built and an hydraulic elevator put in. All this work has been completed and a big clean-up is looked for this year.

"Manson Creek is richer than Cariboo," said Superintendent Keough to The Province just before sailing. In olden days \$1,500,000 was panned out practically from the surface. Lately little has been heard about the creek, but it has been making a good living for years. I have known men to pan out \$5 and \$6 in one day, and on a Sunday just for something to do. This year we expect to be rewarded for three years of hard development work. That it will be a handsome return I have not the least doubt. I know that our claims are exceedingly rich, and will yield something from Manson which will pay over the big street of smutty which we will have to cover. We go up the Naas river, then strike southeast. From Hazelton we go northeast and take the trail three weeks to a month to reach Manson. In May Col. Willapa will leave Vancouver and go in to Manson by way of Ashcroft. He will take in additional supplies."

"Another party, which is expected to go in to Manson by way of the Willapa, and will accompany the representatives of the Forty-third Company, are men of the St. Anthony Exploration Company. This company has also claims on Manson Creek, opposite to those of the Forty-third Company. Among the party were: T. R. More, manager; C. A. Thompson, in charge of the expedition; Superintendent of transportation; Mr. Church and five men. They took in with them a lot of goods, which were purchased in Vancouver.

"I have also made a test and forward you my report, together with that of the assayer of the Bank of England. The man who was present when I opened the parcel was much surprised to find that I had sent him the enormous body of ore which your property contained, and expressed his opinion that it would not be long before any satisfactory results would be secured from 50 to 100 such times as it is his intention that there should be no delay in the immediate erection of the necessary plant. I should, therefore, advise you to forward in every month the proceeds of timber for the erection of buildings, etc."

"I informed him about your purchase of the steam launch, and explained to him how useful it would be for hauling timber to the mill site. I am of opinion that you should continue the sinking of shaft No. 2 for at least a depth of 150 to 200 feet. If that some very deep shafts are found at this or a greater depth. In any case you will have the advantage of the water, and the dyke of low-grade ore runs to a considerable depth. Of course, it will be necessary for you to have a pump for pumping purposes. I do not anticipate that you will have any great difficulty with the water, other than the surface water. On no account would I advise you to proceed with the shaft of the 55-foot level. No. 2, as you may strike gravel or sand carrying a considerable amount of water, which would be a great disadvantage. I have already reached there would be a dip in all probability would hold a body of surface water."

"I have little more to add at present, and need not write you more fully as to the results before mentioned regarding ore. I intend to go to the mill site in a few days, and will be in the amount of ore which could be supplied to a mill. Yours truly, "W. D. Ramsay."
