

Russia's Fate in Far East Depends on 1 Its Long Trans-Siberian Steel Way.

Equipment Kept Secret. The equipment of the Trans-Siber-an Railway is apparently a carefully The equipment of the Trans-Siberian Railway is apparently a carefully guarded secret. In the official guide which the Russian government issues, a hardsemely bound and profusely engraved volume of 520 pages, the only inkling regarding the equipment is given in connection with the statement of traffic upon the various divisions of the road, including 1899. It is stated that the West Siberian Railway, which is that portion of the line from Cheliabinsk, about 1300 miles west of Moscow, to the River Obabout 1300 miles cast of the Cheliabinsk, was in 1899 blocked with 7000 "wagons," or freight cars, carrying 180,000 tons of freight. During 1898 this portion of the road transported 1.880,000 tons of freight, 307,000 passengers and 195,000 immigrants.

The Mid-Siberian Railway, which is the name given to that portion of the road from the River Ob to 188 396,000 tons of freight and 476,000 passengers. On the West S berian Railway, from the time of its opening until 1898, passenger and freight traffic increased over 50 per cent.

Falls Below Demands. During 1900 the railway transported only 798,000 tons of revenue freight, and yet it could not carry all that was offered. In 1902 the record for the entire road was 1,980,000 tons of freight and 1320 passengers. The rest fund never had reached such a point, however, on account of the large amount written off for depreciation.


