Wilson Not Yet Sufficiently Aroused To Go Into The War

No Action Without an Extra Session of Congress

THAT'S THE OUTLOOK TODAY

Present Congress in Expiring Hours Likely to Give Authority for Arming of Merchant Vessels for Defence Against Submarines

Washington, Mar. 3.—President Wilson has no intention of taking action that would bring war with Germany unless Congress is summoned in extra session. This was communicated to the leaders today by representatives of the president, who take the position that if no extraordinary crisis arises it will not be necessary to call an extra session before late in the spring and then only to pass any appropriation bill which may fall at the present session.

Washington, Mar. 3.—Congress expected today to take final steps toward giving President Wilson authority to arm American merchant ships for defence against submarines and the navy department was ready with guns and gunnery to carry out the president's orders. The bill conveying the authority was before the senate when it convened this morning after a session which continued long past midnight, occupied by eight hours of debate on international relations. Despite the extended discussion, little real opposition to the measure was expected. Some senators declared they believed the arming of merchant ships would lead to war, but said they were willing to accept such a result.

The senate expected to substitute its own bill for the house measure by approval by the House was considered likely. The parties. Congress adjourns with the control of the next House still in dispute. As a result of the death of Representative Conroy of New York, the Republicans appear to have the lead. They now have 57 votes assured. It is conceded, while the three newly elected Democrats are seriously ill, they will not be elected before next November. Five members of the incoming congress are classed as "independent." Hence if a special session of Congress is called before next November it would appear that the Republicans would have the advantage. A majority of a membership of 218 members are necessary for the election of a speaker, however, the Democrats are not without hope.

Washington, March 3.—Senators and representatives today entered upon their last twenty-four hours of the session with legislation before them which may keep them continually at work until next Sunday, when by law the sixty-fourth congress expires. The bill to give the president authority to arm American ships and the principal appropriation bill were the principal items under pressure in the senate to be followed by the military academy appropriation.

BRITISH MUST CUT TO THE BONE

Newspapers Hit Again—Drastic Nature of Import Restrictions Not Yet Grasped by People in General

London, March 3.—(By Stewart Lyon, special correspondent of the Canadian Press Limited.)—Further reduction in the size of newspapers, which are already for the most part skeletons of their former selves, or increases of price are certain to follow the announced intention of the government to lessen, by every possible means, the importation of print paper. The suggestion is seriously made that news and advertisements of public importance should be printed and that no paper be put at the disposal of publishers for printing advertisements for luxuries or goods involving importation.

People at large do not yet fully grasp the drastic restriction of imports, though the trading and manufacturing classes do. The country's resources in bulky things like timber for use as mine props, low grade iron ores and oil producing shale are being used for emergency supplies. Fine old handwood timbers, the product of centuries of growth frequently are sent on their way to the sawmills. The depletion of boarded or unutilized natural resources is the inevitable result of the submarine blockade. It is felt that the nation which gives its manhood to the cause of freedom without stint cannot hesitate in giving inanimate things, however dear.

IN THE WEST INDIES

Port of Spain, March 3.—At yesterday's meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of the British West Indies, England's prohibition of coconuts and rum as imports was taken up and a resolution passed urging that the prospective customs conference include commercial representatives and that it also discuss the possibilities of freer trade internationally. Other resolutions adopted favored the restriction of business activities of enemy subjects, compulsory registration of aliens, facilitation of exchange of laborers between colonies, development of oil resources, metric system and the purchase of government supplies by government agents.

Germans Fail to Reach Goal in Pirate Work

FEBRUARY'S RECORD

Tonnage Sunk 40,000 Tons Instead of the Million Threatened—Not Much More Than in the Ordinary Submarine Warfare

London, March 3.—Germany failed by slightly more than a fifty per cent margin to make good her threat to sink 1,000,000 tons of merchant shipping during the first month of unrestricted submarine warfare, according to reliable figures. Her submarines, the figures show, succeeded in sending to the bottom during February only, in round numbers, 40,000 tons. This figure exceeds by only 140,000 tons, it is now declared, what the British authorities expected would be sunk during that month if ordinary submarine warfare had been continued. It compares with 346,656 tons sunk during December, and 322,067 tons during January.

London, March 3.—The Anti-Slavery Abolition Society has issued a circular to the secretary of state for the colonies to declare by proclamation the freedom of 185,000 slaves in the territory known recently as the German East African protectorate. The publication of the appeal is sanctioned by the colonial office.

SEEK TO MINIMIZE THE RECENT GREAT GAINS BY BRITISH

German Statement on Retirement on West Front—Say Khaki Forces Now in Marsh With Many Difficulties to Overcome

London, Mar. 3.—A long Berlin telegram received in Amsterdam and transmitted by Reuters supplements the short statement in Thursday's official statement from German general headquarters concerning the evacuation of positions. After asserting that this withdrawal was made unobserved and without losses, the telegram says that "the German rear guards contrived to conceal the evacuation and for days held up the British who had from ten to twenty times their number and who suffered severely. The British statement adds that eighty prisoners and 400 men killed in one rear-guard encounter near Little Wood on the Combaux-Puisieux road.

EGGS FROM CHICAGO

Local Merchant Brings in 50 Cases—Today a Market Prices

A local wholesale grocery merchant in St. John yesterday received fifty cases of eggs all the way from Chicago. The eggs were shipped by express and were only three days in coming. The fact that merchants are sending as far as Chicago, a distance of nearly 1,900 miles, indicates that eggs are not procurable in nearby places. Eggs are, however, reported a little easier in the local market today than they have been through the week. The price today is sixty cents a dozen. In New York the wholesale price some days ago was thirty-two cents.

GERMANS ADMIT THE INTRIGUE AGAINST STATES

Say Nothing Was to be Done With Mexico Until Sure That Wilson Would Declare War—May Mean End of Van Bernstorff's Career

London, Mar. 3.—Foreign Secretary Zimmermann's instructions to the German minister to Mexico, as published in the United States press, and the English report that a German plot had been revealed to get Mexico to declare war against the United States and to secure Japanese aid against the United States, Secretary Zimmermann answered: "You understand that it is impossible for us to discuss the facts of this revealed plot just at this moment and under these circumstances. I therefore may be allowed to limit my answer to what is said in the English reports, which certainly are not inspired by sympathy with Germany. The English report expressly states that Germany expected Mexico to remain on terms of friendship with the United States, but that we prepared measures of defense in case the United States declared war against Germany. I fail to see how such a plot inspired by unfriendliness on our part, in the event of a military conflict with the United States—in order to balance the scales, the admission to our favor of a new enemy.

MAY END BERNSTORFF'S CAREER

London, Mar. 3.—The German press has been ordered not to publish a word regarding the American-Mexico revelations until further notice, according to an Amsterdam dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company. It says that only a few circles are aware of the intrigue and that it is considered possible the result of the affair will be the resignation of Foreign Secretary Zimmermann and the ending of Count Von Bernstorff's career as a diplomat.

GERMANS LOSE NEW ZEPPELIN

London, March 3.—It is reported that a new Zeppelin, on speed trials at Ghent, caught fire on Monday and was completely destroyed. The crew perished with their airship. Two Belgians, who witnessed the disaster, were arrested and taken to Germany.

CHILD WELFARE

The attorney-general reviewed the report of the superintendent and said that the reference made to the work of Children's Aid Societies, was most commendable.

"The Nova Scotia report gives a number of fine instances of boys released on probation from reformatories and turning out well. Here are two of them: 'A boy of sixteen years, who had already served a term in a reformatory, was convicted of theft and made a ward of the superintendent, who found a home for him with a very fine family, in a quiet country district. The boy remained there over two years, giving entire satisfaction, and developing into a fine specimen of young manhood. He was overseas, did his bit at the front, was wounded, and is now in England training men for a particular duty at the front.'

"A boy released from a reformatory institution on probation worked for a time in a grocery store. One of the first to go overseas. Was wounded and returned home. Afterwards returned to the front and is now a lieutenant."

New Brunswick needs a radical improvement in its whole system of caring for children, from the introduction of the kindergarten into the public school system to compulsory attendance, medical inspection, care of feeble-minded, better care of delinquents of both sexes, and a more practical system of education for those who must leave school at an early age.

The urgent call that has gone out to speed up shipbuilding in the British Empire cannot but cause deep regret in St. John that the one great opportunity to have a large shipbuilding plant at this port was rejected when the present government at Ottawa handed back to Cammell, Laird & Co. their deposit of \$100,000 and thus prevented the completion of a contract under which steel vessels would today have been under construction at St. John.

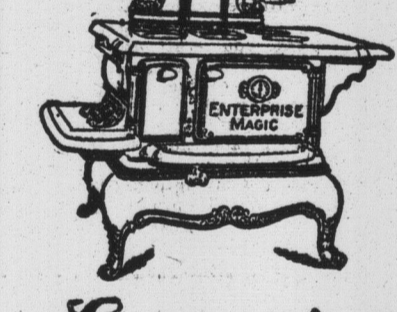

Civilian Army of Night Ploughers

Part of New Scheme to Increase Production of Foodstuffs in British Isles

London, March 2.—"We want 2,000 American tractor ploughs for the use of a civilian army of night ploughers which we are about to enlist throughout the British Isles," said Sir Arthur Lee, director-general of food production, to the Associated Press today. This new department, which is the outgrowth of Germany's submarine campaign aims at the enlistment of several hundred thousand civilians to cultivate every available bit of soil.

"We hope to make the tractor ploughs fill the gaps caused by the shortage in labor," continued Sir Arthur. "For this reason we are going to import 2,000, or as many as we can, from America. We are going to equip them with headlights for night ploughing. Laborers can work on eight hours, but tractors can work twenty-four hours. They will be driven by taxicab drivers and chauffeurs, who will be able to learn their mechanism in a few hours.

"Behind every plough will be a skilled farmer. They will be assisted by prisoners, conscientious objectors, members of the home defence forces and women. In this way we hope to produce enough food to make us independent of outside help as long as the war lasts. We do not believe we will be able to produce sufficient to feed the population in time of peace, but are confident we will be able to grow enough to save off starvation during the war. For this we think the German submarines. The already have given England an agricultural policy which is destined to make us to a large extent self-supporting. The submarines also have revived rural life, giving the farmers a minimum wage and generally making our national defence more effective than a thousand speeches in parliament."

Reports Exodus From Dominion

Movement to States Heavily Says Niagara Immigration Commissioner—War Given as Reason

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Mar. 2.—According to a report just compiled and filed in Washington by the Commissioner of Immigration of District No. 1, comprising that portion of the Canadian frontier along the Niagara River, 72 per cent of the persons entering the United States at the different ports on the border during the year 1916 were Canadian citizens.

During the year covered in the report there were 115,498 applications for admission to the United States. Of this number only 73,029 were admitted. This includes aliens of all nationalities. Of this number the report states seventy-two per cent were Canadians.

The others were from various countries, including citizens of the United States desirous of returning to this country.

In his report Commissioner Clark states that the heavy exodus during the year keeps up at the same rate as during the latter months of 1916, when it was the heaviest of the year. Reasons given for the great influx from Canada include, according to Commissioner Clark, fear of conscription, war conditions, and more recently the newly enacted immigration laws which become effective on May 1, next.

"A notable feature of the year's work," the report concludes, "is the fact that there has been practically no trans-oceanic immigration to Canada for two years past, yet the number of aliens admitted to the United States from the Dominion was greater than in any previous year since the border inspection was organized. This unusual situation is accounted for by reason of the unprecedented movement of Canadian citizens from Canada to the United States, more than 72 per cent of all aliens admitted at the border being citizens of Canada."



THE FEAST OF PURIM

Purim, which this year will be celebrated on March 8, beginning, however, on Wednesday evening, the 7th, is one of the minor holidays of the Jewish calendar. It commemorates the deliverance of the Jews of Persia from the power of Haman, the vizier of King Ahasuerus. Haman had cast lots (hence the name "Purim" which means "lots") to determine which month was to be set for the massacre of all the Jews in Persia. Mordecai and his niece, Esther, becoming aware of the plot, succeeded in disposing of their enemies on the 13th and 14th of Adar. The deliverance of the Jews from the threat of annihilation and their victory over their enemies have ever after been celebrated as the Feast of Purim.

The Feast of Purim never attained as high a degree of spiritual influence as did some of the other festivals. The usual Psalms of praise read on other holidays are omitted on Purim. The one characteristic of the Purim ritual is the reading of the Book of Esther on the evening of the thirteenth day of Adar. As a folk celebration, Purim made up for whatever influence it may have lacked as a religious festival. It was celebrated as a carnival; masks were worn by old and young; Purim plays were given, re-enacting the drama of their enemies on the 13th and 14th of Adar. The deliverance of the Jews from the threat of annihilation and their victory over their enemies have ever after been celebrated as the Feast of Purim.

Every Jew, no matter how poor, would give something to someone more needy than himself. And so the day of popular rejoicing was touched with the elevating spirit of benevolence.



Rev. Worth M. Tippy, Highest-Salaried Methodist, Resigns

Plans to Broaden Work - Hopes to Bring Church Forces Into Everyday Industrial and Social Problems

(New York Times). The Rev. Worth M. Tippy, pastor of Madison Avenue Methodist Episcopal church, the highest salaried pastor in his denomination, has, at a sacrifice of \$4,000 a year, accepted the office of secretary in charge of Social Service in the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

Mr. Tippy has also been of the belief that the churches of the nation should take a leading part in bettering conditions of labor, in elevating women to an equal status with men in enforcing the six-day work week, in advocating prison reform, and in turning the churches over to the use of the people for proper recreation purposes.

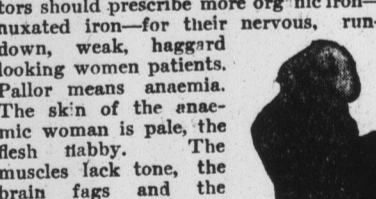

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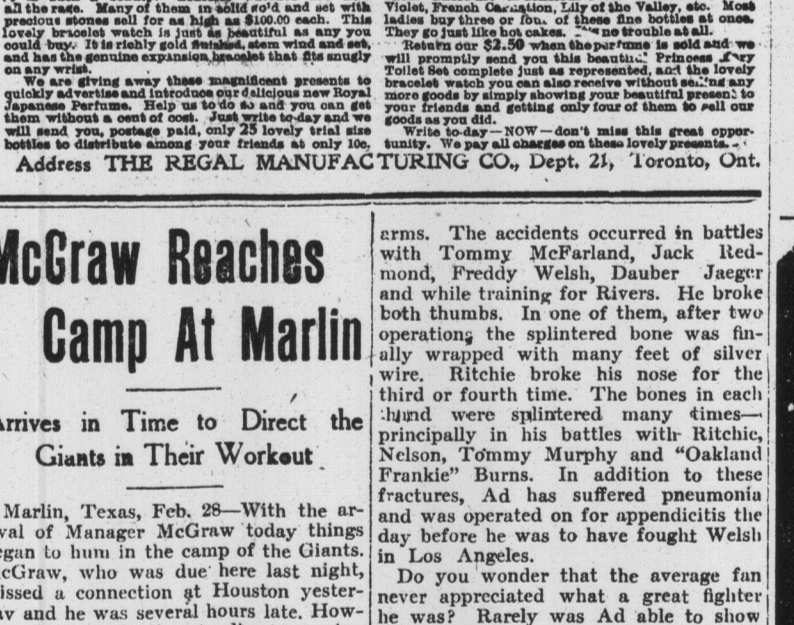



STEEL SHIPBUILDING
According to a report from Ottawa a two million dollar company has been incorporated under the name of the International Shipbuilding Corporation, Ltd., with headquarters in Montreal. The company is to conduct steel shipbuilding on the Miramichi, as was announced in the Times. Local men are said to have some interest in the company.

TWENTY-THREE DEATHS
Twenty-three deaths were reported to the Board of Health this week as follows:—Scurvy, three; pneumonia, three; pulmonary tuberculosis, three; bronch pneumonia, two; asthma, one; uremia, one; diphtheria, one; heart disease, one; Hodgkin disease, one; premature birth, one; meningitis, one; tubercular laryngitis, one; leukemia and puerperal septicemia, each one.

STEAMER SOLD FOR \$15,750
The river steamer Hampstead was sold at auction at Chubb's corner at noon today by Sheriff Wilson. It was knocked down to David Coy of this city for the sum of \$15,750. The explanation of the bargain price in river steamers lies in the fact that the steamer was badly burned some time ago, and the value of what remains of her hull and machinery, after deducting accumulated claims for wharfage and slippage, is regarded as prohibitive.

MUST GO TO SCHOOL

Parents Censured as Cases are Heard in Police Court

Evidently the truant officer has started a campaign against boys and girls under fourteen who, either through their own fault or the fault of their parents or guardians, have not been attending school regularly. This morning in the police court there were five boys and one girl before Magistrate Ritchie for non-attendance at school. Dr. S. H. Bridges, superintendent of the city schools, Truant Officer McMahon and members of the school board and the principals of schools were in court.

It was shown that some of the truants had been absent upwards of thirty-six days in twenty days, and some others sixteen days, etc. The parents or guardians of the children were in court and told they were liable to \$2 a day for every day the child was absent from school.

One case of a little girl was pathetic. She said she wanted to go to school and liked to go, but her mother would not let her go. The mother was severely censured. The magistrate penalized the parents, imposing a small fine on all. He said that it was not the boy or girl problem, but today it was the mother and father problem. He laid all the blame on the parents in cases where children were not going to school. With this opinion, Dr. Bridges said he was heartily in accord. It was the case of neglect of children on the part of the parents, and some of them wanted to get their boys to the reformatory. The cases dealt with today will come up again on next Saturday, and also some others set over from this morning.

Those who appeared in court today must report on Saturday next that they have started to attend school again.

GIRLS' CLUB CLASSES
The Girls' Club is carrying on educational work of a special character this winter and with growing success. Last Wednesday evening, for example, classes in primary studies and French were conducted by a graduate of Acadia College, and two graduates of Mt. Allison Business College taught a number of bright girls stenography and book-keeping. The enthusiasm shown by the young people was most inspiring. The business classes have asked for another evening as well. By joining the club any girl who wishes to improve herself has an excellent opportunity, if she will avail herself of it. There were twenty-one girls present on Wednesday evening.

BACK YARD GARDEN MOVEMENT GROWS

St. Thomas, Mar. 2—An organization was formed last evening in St. Thomas to be known as the Home Gardening Association. President Bennett, of the St. Thomas Horticultural Society, was appointed president and John T. Freely secretary-treasurer. The members of the city council and board of education were appointed "the Back Yard Gardeners' executives." George Baldwin, of Toronto, of the Back Yard Gardeners' movement, will address a public meeting here at an early date. It is expected every vacant lot in the city and all uncultivated land nearby will be under cultivation this summer.

Seattle Team Champions
Portland, Ore., March 8.—Seattle won the championship of the Pacific Hockey Association here last night when they defeated the Portland Club in a sensational game, 4 to 3.

Reichstag Adjourns
London, March 8.—The Reichstag has adjourned until March 20, according to a Berlin despatch to Reuters' by way of Amsterdam.
