This work demands greater energy than it has as yet received and may profitably be the chief subject of consideration at this meeting of the G. D. In connection with this subject, I would respectfully suggest, that a Special Committee be appointed to prepare some effective plan for arousing the country to the immediate importance of this question, in order that constitutional measures may be taken to rid the country of this traffic—that this Committee proceed at once to this responsible work, and that this Grand Division do not adjourn its Session until we have a plan which if at once carried out, will result in honor to the Order, and blessings to the wretched.

I am happy to say that every report from my deputies breathes a spirit of determination to follow the traffic to the place of its intrenchment, viz.: Legislative sanction—even should they in the noble effort be guilty of striking a blow at the

The G. S. will furnish you with all necessary information respecting the state

of the subordinate Divisions under your jurisdiction.

With few exceptions, every report I have received from my Deputies since the last Session of this body, have been of the most encouraging character—testifying to the increasing conviction among respectable and influential men of the value and importance of the Order and that our accessions in many localities have been from that class of society. I have reason to believe that the suspension of sick benefits and reduction of the initiation fee, has been promotive of the interests of every Division where it has been adopted, and I am confident that were all the wealer, and in a pecuniary sense, poorer Divisions to adopt the same plan, their prosperity would be materially promoted thereby—many Divisions have died from starvation, their means being entirely exhausted by incessant drafts for benefits.

I have had but few applications to settle constitutional questions, which indicates increased knowledge among the Divisions of the proper working of subordinate Divisions, and a more thorough acquaintance with the rules and usages of

In consideration of the pecuniary resources necessary to effectively carry out any plan for the obtainment of a Prohibitory Law, I would suggest, that the proceedings of the semi-annual Sessions of this body, and only that part which involves any changes as affecting the subordinate Divisions, be published and issued on a Synopsis sheet in the form of a Circular.

By adopting this plan, a large amount would be saved annually, which can be

appropriated to a far more telling purpose.

I am sorry to report that the Divisions have not realised the benefit anticipated by the introduction of the new Ritual. The extreme length of the initiatory ceremony, and the peculiar style of its composition-requiring in order to be at all bearable, practiced readers, or accomplished repeaters—has, as far as my know-ledge extends, proved far less effective than the old work, with all its defects. It would be a great boon to the order, could we secure the privilege of materially abreviating that prolix ceremony, which privilege might be granted without com-promising either the talent, taste or judgment of the N. D.

It is deeply to be regretted that Divisions are not more prompt in forwarding It is deeply to be regretted that Divisions are not more prompt in forwarding the returns; my predecessors have so repeatedly complained of this irregularity, and neglect of duty, that it would appear superfluous in again taking notice of the matter, but the vital importance of this subject, in connexion with the welfare of the order, must plead my excuse. I have during the past term repeatedly written to delinquent Divisions, and failing to hear of their condition, have applied to the Deputies, and in some few instances have procured information. Punctuality in making the Quarterly Returns very much depends upon the faithfulness of the Recording Scribe, and the Divisions would do well not to change that officer too frequently. In many instances the returns are not made out in season, and the D. Recording Scribe, and the Divisions would do well not to change that officer too frequently. In many instances the returns are not made out in season, and the D. G. W. P. permits the installation to proceed contrary to law, on merely a promise to attend next meeting to the neglected duty. Now it would obviate the difficulty if the Deputy would notify the Division of his intended visitation, and request that the Quarterly Returns be duly ready, and insist upon the same with respectful the Quarterly Returns be duly ready, and insist upon the 21st of March, only 197 firmness, before proceeding to install the officers. On the 21st of March, only 197 Divisions had rendered their Returns for December Quarter, from which it was not provided the proceeding to make a satisfactory return to the National Division: I thereutterly impossible to make a satisfactory return to the National Division; I there-fore requested an extension of time from our Most Worthy Scribe, who kindly granted me another month. I was then under the necessity of writing, in many instances, two or more letters to the delinquent Divisions, and with considerable instances, two or more letters to the definquent Divisions, and with considerable difficulty by the 29th of April, received returns from 292 Divisions; which number completed the Statistics of this body to the National Division. At the same date 52 Divisions remained in default with the December Returns. A full Report would be shown at least one thousand more members, and a corresponding amount of receipts.

CAPITO TAX.

Judging from the information received at this office, the alteration in the per centage to the Grand Division has, with some few exceptions, been approved by centage to the Grand Division has, with some tew exceptions, been approved by the Divisions; in fact it is a matter of congratulation, and appears indicative of the earnestness and well-known liberality of the Sons in this Province to extend and promote the usefulness of the order. Still, a few Divisions desire to return to the old rate of per centage, as they apprehend the "tax is a stumbling block," and will cause them to be continually expelling members.

DUES.

There are many Divisions that have entered warmly into the temperance reformation, and desire to continue their connexion with this Institution, but they wish mation, and desire to continue their connexion with this Institution, but they wish to adopt a lower scale for initiation fees and dues; many are not satisfied with the process of suspending benifits, and a division of funds at the end of each quarter, while others are of the opinion, that as the per centage is not now estimated upon the amount of receipts, they are at liberty to pay any amount for dues. Some Divisions, it is believed, pay merely a nominal amount for initiation fees and dues, Divisions, it is believed, pay merely a nominal amount for initiation fees and dues, Divisions having suspended by the constitution as revised, is—for initiation fee 5s., and 3d. for weekly dues.

Several Divisions having suspended benefits, the "cash on hand and money invested" heretofore returned has been omitted, and should this system become prevalent, the "cash on hand" item will eventually dwindle down to an insignificant sum, which will materially affect the character of this institution, claiming to be a beneficial society.

new ceremonies. Letters of inquiry and containing orders, poured in with each mail, and the Divisions were supplied as promptly as possible, at the prices decided upon last session. I found some difficulty in forwarding them at low rates by mail, with the cards and odes inclosed, without leaving the ends of the parcels open, and being the private affairs of the order, I deemed it proper to have the parcels securly sealed, and made arrangements to have the same forwarded by express; the agent engaged to have the parcels speedily and safely delivered, which I regretted afterwards to find was not the case; and a few parcels, after going to the Ports, were taken no further, and have since been returned to this office. In the meantime, I conferred with the G. W. P., and we decided on sending them by mail, with the ends open; and afterwards they have been conveyed by mail at small expense, and without difficulty or miscarriage. It will be advisable for the Grand Division to pass an order terminating the use of the old ritual, and requiring the new ritual to come into general use—otherwise to petition the National Division to leave the choice of the old and new ceremonies optional with subordinate Divisions, as many Divisions prefer the old ritual, with all its imperfections.

The sets of rituals comprised one Blue Book, five Officers' Cards, and twelve Ode Cards, consequently, to supply large Divisions with extra cards, I had to draw upon the sets, not considering myself authorised to procure them printed. You will please pass an order for the printing of Ode Cards.

CERTIFICATES OF MEMBERSHIP.

In accordance with a resolution of the Grand Division, I procured 1000 Certificates of Membership for Subordinate Divisions, from Bro. Hoover, in two parcels; the first 500 was received duty free—the second 500 were detained at the Custom House, and a duty of 12½ per cent imposed: the Collector insisting upon the duty being paid, as blank certificates are classified with engraved blank Bank Notes, &c., and therefore to save the G. Division from loss—the 500 were charged sufficient to cover expenses. The engraved Certificate of Membership for members of Grand Division, approved at the last Session, could not be altered as required to suit members of this G. Division. The cost of making the necessary alteration would be more than having a new plate engraved; it will therefore be needful to procure another certificate. 969 certificates have been supplied to S. Divisions.

CREDENTIALS

Have been forwarded to 323 Divisions for Representatives to the Grand Division, and charged one penny each. The Representatives would be spared much trouble, if the Subordinate Divisions would carefully comply with the instructions, contained in Sec. 2nd, Rule 2, Constitution of G. Division, and Art 2, Chapter 2, Revised Rules.

PRINTING.

The Printing bill for the last term will be found reasonable, when compared with the amount of work done. When the present G. S. came into office, he found blank Commissions for Deputy Grand Worthy Patriarchs, and other blanks nearly exhausted, which required to be renewed. Credentials for Representatives, and Synopsis Circulars, and also, 1500 proceedings of last Session were printed and circulated according to former precedent.

Should the Grand Division decide upon continuing having the proceedings of each session printed in book form, I would respectfully suggest, that the Divisions and D. G. W. P.'s be supplied at cost price, as the amount paid for printing the entire proceedings for the last two semi-annual meetings, amounted to the large sum of

At the commencement of the year, I forwarded to each Division a statement of their several accounts, debtor and creditor, with the Grand Division. It must be apparent that errors will sometimes occur to the most careful, and especially where a multiplicity of entries have to be made, and some hundred ledger accounts kept; however, I have much pleasure in stating, that with few exceptions, the accounts were found correct.

PROHIBITORY LIQUOR LAW.

It is necessary that this Grand Division take active and energetic means to improve public sentiment, to secure the enactment of a Prohibitory Law. At the last Session of the G. Division, the consideration of this most important measure was deferred; but the time has now arrived when an effort must be made for the legal suppression of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, the grand feature of protection from the evils of intemperance. The G. W. P. in his able report has given you satisfactory information and evidence from all parts of the Province, that a Prohibitory Law is required, and loudly called for, as the only effectual weapon we can use against the "all pervading destroyer" of our race.

A great responsibility rests upon the members of the Grand Division at this session assembled; and if there ever was a time in the history of the Temperance Reform in our Province, when bold, efficient and judicious efforts was imperiously demanded on the part of its friends—that time is now. Information must be diffused previous to the coming election, and in no better way could that object be accomplished than by the employment, for some time, of three or more efficient and good Lecturers.
