The action of the German Von Kahr as military dictator of Bavaria was received.

Action Unexpected.

Bavarla's action was wholly unexpected and the Government leaders were at first at a loss to account for it. Although it was not viewed as a studied affront to the central Government, the manner in which it was launched nevertheless was construed as a piece of censorial criticism of the way in which the Berlin Government had called off passive resistance in the Ruhr. This view prevailed despite assertions from Bavaria that her measures were wholly prompted by the suspicious activities of the guards of Adolph Hitler, the National Socialist leader and their allied organizations.

Official opinion in Berlin inclines to the belief that Dr. Von Kahr will be fully able to cope with the situation in Bavaria and that the outbreak there is unlikely to extend beyond the Bavarian frontiers, despite the noisy agitation of the factions classed as "superpatriots" whose fighting strength is asserted to be grossly over-estimated.

The Von Knilling Government in Bavaria is believed here to be able to rely on the Bavarian police, and in an emergency it would also receive the support of the Reichswehr formations garrisoned in Bavaria.

WOULD MAKE OUR CLIMATE WARMER

Damming of Belle Isle Strait Feasible But Likely Very

Sydney, N. S., Sept. 27.—The territory and people in the vicinity of the Strait of Belle Isle have been affected very much by the abnormally cold summer season just closed, according to Captain A. E. Calder of the Dominion Biological Department, here in the little auxiliary schooner Prince, from a surveying trip of several weeks in the north.

Captain Calder said it would be feasible to dam Belle Isle Strait but the expense would be enormous, and a dam to stand the great pressure of currents and drift ice might have to be three miles thick. The result, in his opinion, would be of a mixed nature. The climate of the Maritimes would probably be much warmer, and the

The climate of the Maritimes would probably be much warmer, and the Gulf of St. Lawrence navigable all winter, but the influx of warm water to the gulf would probably drive away most of the cold water fish, such as cod, and compel a re-organization of the whole of the Maritime fishing industry. Another result would probably be to give that portion of the Gulf next to the dam 40 foot tides of the "bore" or tidal wave variety, similar to those of the Bay of Fundy.

Menthol Up 80 Per Cent in N. Y. Market as a Result of Speculation.

(New York Times.)

Menthol was the outstanding feature of the drug and fine chemical market last week, a rather spectacular advance having its origin in causes resulting from the Japanese carthquake, says the current issue of The Oil, Paint and Drug Reporter. No news whatever concerning the stocks of crystals and crude oil or of the three menthol factories at Yokohama was received by the local trade. Speculators in the local market were responsible for an increase in prices amounting to 80 per cent. The asking price for menthol is now \$17 to \$20 a pound, against \$9.50 before the Japanese disaster.

The Yokohama stocks had been as tabilizing element in a bull and bear contest that has ruled the market here for some time, and if they have been wheel out a strong situation will earlied that was advanced on the strength of the disaster. Camphor is produced in Formosa and marketed from Kobe, and both points were untouched by the earthquake. Japan wax and insect flowers were also increased in price. Quinine was unaffected, although one of the largest factories in the world was at Tokio.

Botanicals were firm with demand light but prices strong and high in the country. Conditions now favor the selers. Shellae was advanced sharply at Calcutta, London and New York Arrivals of tanstuffs from the Far East continue heavy. The tanning industry has been getting under way for some weeks, and shipments of statistics are now being received.

A further advance occurred in cottonseed oil future on the New York Produce Exchange. Linseed oil was steadler in the local market to the extent that in some quarters slightly higher prices were quoted for less than carload lots, due to a rise in seed prices. There was no change in carload a quotations. Turpentine and rosin were steady and there were few price changes.

The farmers have not been able to do as much painting this year as they would like to do, and the best demand for paints comes from the larger towns and cities. The urban demand has caused an unusually active demand for interior paints, and consumption of flat wall paints is greater than ever before at this season of the year. The outlook for Fall business is so good that the business of the paint industry for 1923 promises to break all records, according to The Oil, Paint and Drug Reporter.

The demand for sulphate of ammalia and other fertilizers is not active at the present time, as fertilizer mixers are holding back orders until they can get some other line on the Fall demand. Japan is the best foreign customer of the producers of sulphate of ammonia. It is feared that deliveries already contracted for with the Japanese of the sulphate o of ammonia. It is feared that deliveres already contracted for with the Japanese customers will be interfered with and that there will be considerable material forced into the resale market as the result of the earthquake. Notwithstanding this, the fertilizer demand is expected to be better than that of the

expected to be better than that of the Fall of 1922.

Imported chemicals are low in price and offer buyers unusual opportunities. Importers are carrying large stocks of carbonate of potash, but caustic potash is in somewhat lighter supply. Labor troubles in Germany have interfered with production and importers here believe that shipments will be small compared with last year. Shipment prices have been advancing and "it seems inevitable that higher prices will prevail here later on." At the present time, with stocks good, prices are low.

Maritime Claims.*

Moncton Transcript.)

The Montreal Gazette's reply to criticisms of its editorial a few days ago on the Maritime Provinces is a weak attempt to skate hurriedly over some mighty thin ice. The Gazette has not gone to the root of the matter. It is amazing to find an important daily newspaper like the Montreal Gazette contending that "between the railway and the waterway (the canals) absolutely no distinction is made," as "both are free of tolls," and that "if not one cent is paid for passage through the canals, neither is one cent paid for use of the road-bed on carriage of goods over the Intercolonial. The waterway and road-bed are alike free from toll. Does the Gazette expect serious-minded citizens to be impressed by a statement of that character? It is ridiculous! By no stretch of the imagination could such a comparison be justified. The road-bed of any high-class railway demands daily and constant labor and a steady stream of materials to keep it in shape. No mater where the Gazette may draw the line between rolling stock and other railway equipment which is not free, and the road-bed, which is called free, the fact remains that the railway charges are influenced and must be influenced by road-bed costs. In other words the Intercolonial road-bed is in no sense free. The canals are. Therefore it is folly to argue that "free canals and a free road-bed involve neither discrimination nor cause for complaint," so far as the Maritime Provinces are continued to suffer in order that the proceeds of which will go to the N. 

New York, Sept. 27.—The Rev. John Falbot Smith, for the last fifteen years pastor of the Roman Catholic Church of the Sacred Heart at Dobbs Ferry, died yesterday in Misericordia Hospi-

rather Smith was born 68 years ago at Saratoga, N. Y., and was graduated from the divinity department of St. Michael's College and Seminary, Toronto. In 1881 he was ordained a priest by the late Bishop Wadhams. From 1889 to 1892 he was editor of the New York Catholic Review and for 18 years was chaplain of the Convent of Mercy in New York. He founded the Parish Theatre in 1918 and in 1920 the Catholic Writers' Guild. As a writer Father Smith was known to the public as the author of "A Woman of Culture," "Solitary Island," "His Honor the Mayor," "Saranac," "The Man Who Vanished" and a play, "The Black Cardinal," which later was published as a novel.

SWIFT JUSTICE IN SPAIN WARNING

Execution of Two Highwaymen Comes as a Surprise.

Port Vendres, Franco-Spanish Frontier, Sept. 27.—(Associated Press).—The execution at Barcelona on Sunday morning of two highwaymen convicted of holding up the paymaster of the Pensions Office on Thursday last is taken as a warning to the criminal element of the speedy justice to be expected under the regime of the new Military Directorata. The ruffians were tried and executed within seventy-two hours of their crime, a radical departure from the previous mode of dealing with such offenders in Spain.

General Primo Rivera, President of the Directorate, has declared his intention of using the strictest measures against all criminals. The judgments of the courts-martial, he promised, would be promptly carried out, and in the event the sentences entailed capital punishment, the criminals would no longer be "honored" by a firing squad but would be garroted at the hands of an ordinary executioner.

Another indication of the intention of the Directorate to proceed with energy against lawbreakers is seen in the nomination of General Martinez Anido as Under-Secretary of the Interior, as well as the appointment, soon expected, of General Miguel Arlegui, as General Chief of Police for all Spain.

Spain.

The problem of the reform of the electoral system, which under existing conditions leaves opportunities for corrupt practices, is one which is expected to give the Directorate some deep thought. The first step of reform will probably be dissolution of the hereditary rights and life tenure of Senators

The fundamental idea of reform under consideration is introduction of proportional representation. No mention has been made of women's rights.



Seattle, Sept. 27.—What Haakon H. Hammer, business representative of Captain Roald Amundsen, called "the true story" of why an attempt by Captain Amundsen to fly over the North Pole last summer was abandoned has been told by Hammer and Lieutenant Oskar Omdahl, aviator in the project. Mr. Hammer and Lieutenant Omdahl said that Captain Amundsen had been led to believe that the plane could fly for twenty-two hours with one stock of gasoline, whereas its capacity was only eighteen hours.

Mr. Hammer declared that a break in the landing gear of the plane, to which abandonnent of the attempt of Captain Amundsen and Lieutenant Omdahl at Wainwright, Alaska, on the Arctic Coast, had been previously aittibuted, was a minor difficulty that could readily have been overcome. 
