





to twelve feet in width, with other bazars at right angles to it. Neither differ much from those I had seen elsewhere, except for the stepped incline. Otherwise the inner Jerusalem is much like the Musky at Cairo or the bazars at Lucro or Assuan. The chief features everywhere in the East are an easy-going primitiveness, a contemptuous familiarity with dirt and dust, and closely packed shops—or recesses—in which business is done.

"The main thoroughfare from the Jaffa gate ends at the foot of the steps approaching the Mosque of Omar, said to be the oldest mosque in the world, and erected on the site of the ancient temple of the Jews. It dates from the seventh century, and its courtyard level is some twenty feet above the level of the old temple floor.

"Mounting the steps, we find ourselves in this courtyard, and, turning around to face the area we had just crossed, we get a very fine view. Looking back, there is the whole of the walled city, which seems the best part of a square mile in area; away on the right is a quaint looking wall with colonnades and covered arcade built by the Turks on their occupation of the city in the fifteenth century; to the left the Mosque of Akse, with again an extensive courtyard, and, in the shade of some trees thereon, Arabs at their prayers.

Forty Thousand Spectators Hear His Majesty Speak of Improvement in Providing Recreation for Troops.

(London Daily Mail.) Fully 40,000 spectators were present at a review of troops by the king at Aldershot, Long before the khaki-clad soldiers had arrived, the reserved enclosure and surrounding slopes were filled with

and surrounding slopes were filled with people. From early morning crowded motor cars, wagonettes and omnibuses arrived from all parts.

The Queen and Princess Mary wore grey costumes and cloaks, and Prince George, in naval uniform, motored to the royal pavilian. Soon after the king rode up with his staff.

This peace-time review of a warlike pageant was a wonderful picture in the brilliant morning sunshine. Although the troops were still in khaki, the review marked the transfer from war to peace.

The review presented all the familiar peace-time features. Cavalry galloped past to their own regimental marches; rifemen marched by to the time of "95," the South Wales Borderers to the "Men of Harlech," the Fusiliers to the "British Grenadiers," and the R. The queen showed keen interest in the comfort of the wives and children, and made a surprise visit to the married quarters. The royal party then motored to the Cambridge Hospital, where they were received by Colonel H.C.R. Hime and the superintendent, Miss E. M. Lyde. 



Prince George's Cruise.

When Prince George joints the Temeraire at Portsmouth he will begin the practical stage of his training as a sailor. For the last four years he has been under instruction at the Osborne and Dartmouth naval colleges. According to present intentions, he will be the real sailor prince among the king's sons. The Prince of Wales had a naval training as a cadet and midshipman, but had to relinquish the practical side of the profession for higher responsibilities. Prince Albert went a stage further, and was a sub-lieutenant at the Battle of Jutland, but, being passed unfit for sea duty owing to his gastric trouble, he transferred into the R. A. F.
