Soldiers Are Sent to Glasgow

Strike Troubles Grow More Serious

ENGINEERS MAKE DEMAND

Suggestion to Stop Every Industry in London is Voted Down—Some Serious Rioting—Belfast Committee Plans to Make Strike General Throughout Ireland

Glasgow, Feb. 1.—Thousands of troops have arrived here and sentries with fixed bayonets are stationed at strategic points about the city.

London, Feb. 1.—Branches of the Society of Engineers resolved last night to strike on Feb. 6 for a working week of forty hours.

Several speakers at a meeting last night urged a movement for a national strike, declaring the time had arrived for the workmen to demand control of production.

There was serious rioting yesterday in the mining districts of Lanarkshire, particularly at Bell's Hill, where much damage to property resulted.

EXTEND IT ALL OVER IRELAND. Belfast, Feb. 1.—The strike committee announced last night that it contemplated trying to extend the strike to the whole of Ireland.

Replying to an appeal from Joseph Devlin, M. P., that he intervene in the strike, Premier Lloyd George replied that the British government did not control the hours of labor and that he was in complete agreement with the reply of Andrew Bonar Law, lord privy seal, to the protest at Glasgow, declining to stop the strike there.

London, Feb. 1.—(By the Associated Press)—The administration of Belfast from Artisans Hall by self-constituted police forces of 300 special constables is continuing.

The force is co-operating in perfect harmony with the city police, and without smashing and other disorders which prohibit extreme agitators and Sinn Féiners from obtaining permission from the committee before airing it publicly.

The strikers' newspaper did not appear on Friday, but it has been announced that an eight-page paper will be issued on Saturday.

Football matches, dances and concerts at which strike leaders were present have been arranged for the week-end.

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GERMAN ARMIES ARE RETREATING

Are Giving Way Before the Soviet Troops

THE FRONTIER MENACE

Situation Grave as Bolsheviks and Poles Threaten—Germans Miss Effectiveness of Military Authority

Berlin, Jan. 30.—(By the Associated Press)—Germany's eastern frontiers are most gravely threatened by the Bolshevik and Poles, according to the "Tagblatt," which gives the following report of the situation:

"Strong Bolshevik armies stand before the borders East Prussia, an irruption of Poles threatens West Prussia, and that portion of West Posen which is still in German hands is subjected to a renewed Polish menace, which means that the province of Brandenburg is also in danger.

Russian troops occupy a line from Liban to Kovno. The fortress of Kovno is not in their hands, but the Bolsheviks stand directly in front of it and have at their disposal numerous divisions which are held together and led forward by iron discipline. The soldiers' councils no longer play the role in the Bolshevik army that they did at the beginning of the revolution.

The German eighth and tenth armies are retreating before the Soviet troops. The "Iron Brigade," which now, as a result of losses, has melted into the "Iron Brigade," numbering some hundreds of men, is also there. It would unquestionably be possible to offer resistance to the Bolsheviks beyond the East Prussian border if the Germans were led by a single determined will.

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The Ex-Kaiser Grows Whiskers, and Will Retire Behind Them

Amorogren, Feb. 1.—(By the Associated Press)—The former German emperor's barber returned to Berlin on Thursday, his services being no longer required.

Polish populations should form a part of new Poland, but justice likewise compels us not to tolerate that territories be replaced under foreign sovereignty which are inhabited by indisputably German populations.

IN PERSIA.

President Harry Pratt Judson of the University of Chicago, in a recent interview gave an interesting account of affairs in Persia, which he has just visited. He says:—

It is worth while for the citizens of St. John to consider what Halifax does in regard to the care of the children. Dr. Hunt says that the work of the court has been of very great benefit and its usefulness is steadily growing.

A GREAT NATIONAL SERVICE

The Rotary Clubs of Canada have pledged themselves to raise \$50,000 or more to be expended in connection with the great educational convention in Winnipeg next fall.

It is proposed to bring together in Winnipeg next fall leaders in education, industry, labor, and every department of activity, from various parts of the world, and have them deliberate on the question of how Canada can better give in her schools teaching in morals and the ideals of the higher citizenship.

THE TARIFF.

The Toronto Star, discussing the tariff issue, urges the farmers and manufacturers to get together and study the problem together, instead of assuming a hostile attitude. Its remarks are worthy of attention. We quote:

Persia will henceforth be free from the fear of Turkish tyranny. We would like to think that something of her ancient glory, under new and happier conditions, might be restored to her; not by conquest, but by the development of a free commonwealth, with something of real value to contribute to the sum of human welfare.

The strike situation in the mother country grows more serious. Whether military intervention will be necessary to prevent serious disorders in Glasgow and Belfast is still uncertain.

Foodstuffs are to be carried from England to Belgium by a squadron of airplanes. Thus the use of the airplane in commerce is shown to be practicable.

The Standard is again disrupting the Foster cabinet. This is a harmless pastime. Meanwhile the Foster cabinet goes cheerfully on with its task of giving the province good government.

A portion of the British press is very critical of the proposed settlement of the question of the former German colonies.

The Royal Standard Chapter, I. O. D. E., was most successful in its appeal for books and magazines for the St. John county hospital. The books received will form an excellent nucleus for an up-to-date library.

R. N. W. M. POLICE TO USE AIRPLANES

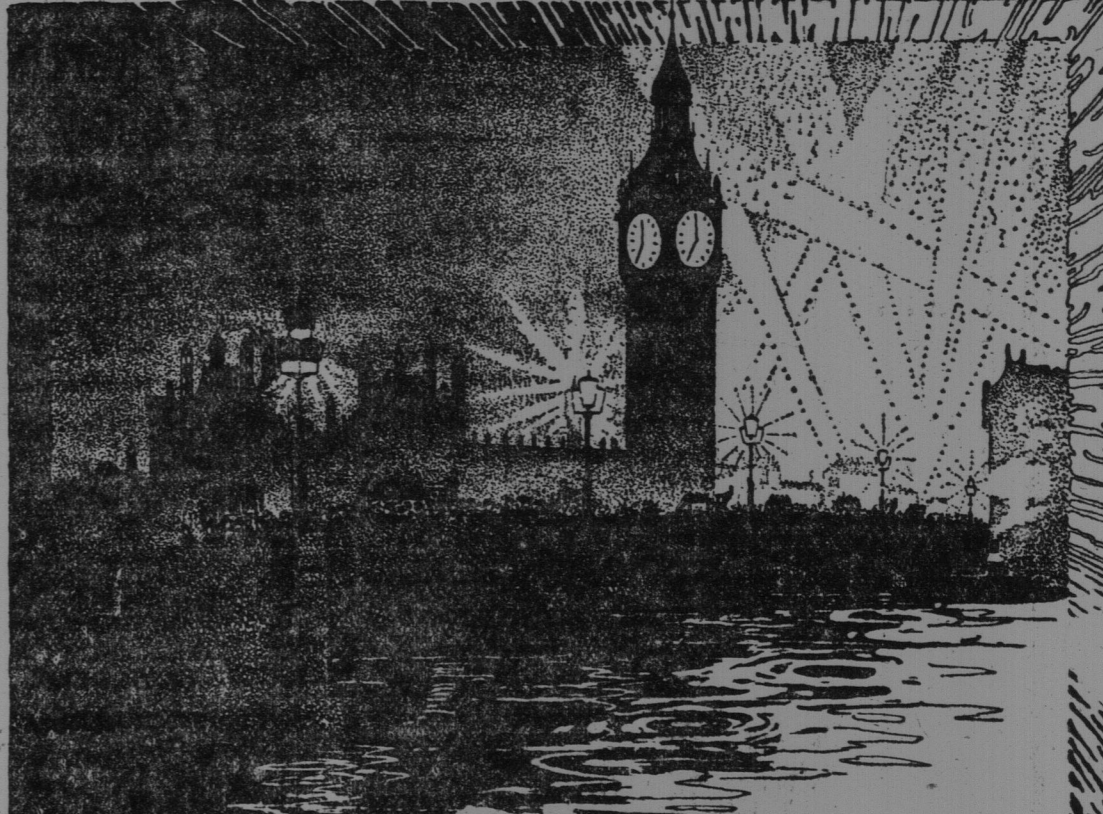
Ottawa, Jan. 31.—That the equipment of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police will soon be supplemented by the addition of an airplane service is declared here to be assured. As a matter of fact, it is stated that the force, during the war, supplied a sufficient quota to the overseas flying service to form the nucleus of a flying force, which will annihilate the distances, which now render the northern patrols both tedious and hazardous, and which will also facilitate greatly regular communication between the present outposts of civilization, and the outlying police and trading posts round the Arctic.

PAPAL YEAR BOOK CHANGES

London, Jan. 31.—(British Wireless Service)—A noteworthy feature of the Papal year book for 1919, just published in Rome, is the suppression of the official names of dioceses hitherto forming part of the German and Austro-Hungarian empires. These are replaced by "geographical and regional designations." Under "Austria" the only diocese shown is that of Vienna, while the diocese of Prague is listed under "Bohemia."

KILLED IN HYDROPLANE

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 1.—Ensign Jan A. Clarke, an aviator attached to Hampton Roads naval base, was fatally injured today in the wreck of a hydroplane which he flew low over the Norfolk Country Club in order to drop note to his wife, who lives there. Lieut. Noel E. Sainsbury, who was in the plane, escaped uninjured. After passing the club house the plane struck a tree and one wing was demolished. The machine then swung into Lafayette River, and after striking the water crashed against a pier. Sainsbury saved himself by stretching out the cockpit, but Clarke's head was crushed between the pier and an upright of the machine.

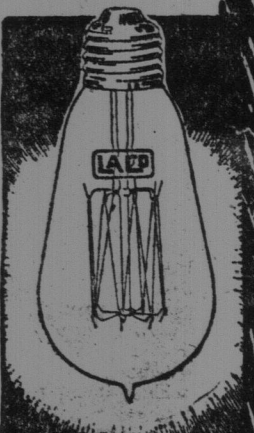

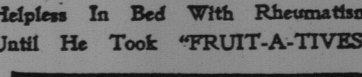

To Open Lands
at Peace River
for Wheat Crop

(Boston Monitor.)

At a time when two of the greatest needs of the world are raw material and an increased grain supply, there is something peculiarly satisfactory in the news that the great bridge which will carry the railway across the Peace River, in Northern Alberta, is completed. Millions of acres of hard wheat country are thus made available for settlement and colonization. The task of constructing the bridge and the railway connecting this far-northern point with Edmonton, and so with the rest of Canada, has not been an easy one. Many difficulties have had to be overcome, and now the old Peace River crossing is spanned by a bridge opening the way for the Canadian railways to push on into the vast fertile stretches north of that river. That the Peace River lands have a great future cannot be doubted. As was pointed out in the recent article on the question appearing in this paper, the territory appearing in this paper, between latitude 54 to 59 degrees north, and from longitude 112 to 123 degrees west, is peculiarly adapted for settlement. The soil is rich and fertile, and in every way excellent, and remarkably moderate, considering the latitude. The winters are at times tempered by the Chinook winds from the Pacific; the seeding time is much the same as it is farther south, and practically the entire district of some 3,000,000 acres is suitable for raising grains, grasses and vegetables. It is, moreover, in places, thickly wooded with valuable timber, while both metallic and non-metallic mineral deposits are known to exist in great quantities. In addition to all this there is every evidence of a high grade coal supply, while the springs of natural gas and tar rising to the surface indicate the presence of a considerable supply of these valuable commodities in the river valley. All these resources are only awaiting development, and that the work will be carried on with the utmost energy is practically assured by the action of the federal authorities, who have indicated that all vacant agricultural lands in the Peace River district, within fifteen miles of existing or projected railways, should be held for soldier settlement. Liberal loans are to be provided, and every help and encouragement is to be afforded by the authorities to the returning soldiers settling there. The new colonists will find an outlet for their energies in many directions, for, according to the agricultural experts, the Peace River section must not only devote itself to the growing of hard wheat on a large scale, but, in order to secure the best results, must also engage in mixed farming. Thus the territory promises to be, not only a great grain district, but also a home for the returning soldier, and represents a welcome development not only to a Canadian but from a world point of view. During the last portion of the war, each year, as it passed, was more remarkable than its predecessor for the whole-heartedness with which the people of the allied nations threw themselves into the work of achieving the great task which had been laid upon them. The Canadian nation contributed what it could best, and each its special products and ability, and to the utmost it was able. There is no reason to suppose that the break in this great effort. The war, won, but the stupendous task of reconstruction lies before the nations, and every nation must again bear its share. Canada with her vast natural resources and almost limitless lands, has a special duty to herself and to humanity, and more than any other nation, is mindful of what she has done in the past, have no doubt that she will rise to the occasion, once again, and do her duty and more than any other nation, will be of peace, as she did in the days of war.

EDUCATIONAL IDEALS

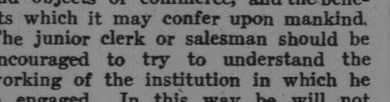
(Toronto Star.)

The conflict between the technical or vocational and the cultural view of education is an old one. The right education system would neglect neither. The pupil is to be not only a worker but a citizen, a man or woman having varied and important social relations. The hours of leisure are to be considered as well as the working hours. Education largely determines what is read and talked about in the home, what kind of plays, concerts, lectures, public meetings are sought as means of spending the evening, what use is made of our public libraries. All but a small percentage of the people receive only the education given in the primary schools, the age limit for which is fourteen years. We believe this limit should be extended. The years between fourteen and eighteen are most critical, and in them a right or wrong direction may be given to the whole life. But even if the limit be extended for a year or two, it must always be remembered that for a considerable time after leaving school the boys and girls will be thrown upon their own resources. It is most important therefore that during the school age they shall be inspired with a love of good literature, and a thirst for truth. They should be taught to read in the fullest sense—that is, they should be taught how to continue their education by reading, how to pursue courses of study. They should be taught to think.

All this is not to minimize the importance of agricultural, technical, or vocational training. One's occupation is a large part of his life. It is not to be considered merely as a means of earning a living. Much depends upon the spirit in which the work is done, the element of pride in the work or the lack of pride. Agricultural college education, for instance, has other aims than to dignify agriculture, to show it in its true light as a noble science. Technical training is not intended to make useful drudges for industry, but to elucidate for the mechanic the principles underlying his calling, so that while he is working at his trade his mind is continually being developed.

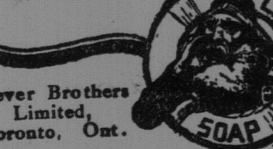

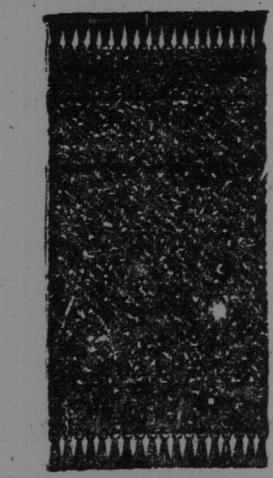

SLAYER OF CANADIAN SOLDIER MUST PAY PENALTY FOR CRIME

New York, Jan. 31—Richard Harrison, convicted of murder, failed today in an attempt to save himself from the electric chair by trying to escape from the Tombs while keepers were on the way to his cell to take him to court to be sentenced. He got as far as the prison yard when he was caught. Justice Weeks sent him to Sing Sing to be electrocuted during the week of March 10.

Harrison shot and killed George J. Griffiths, an invalided Canadian soldier, during a hold-up at a waltz club here last September. With several companions Harrison was alleged to have tried to rob persons at the club. A policeman killed one of the hold-up men.

TEXTILE WORKERS VOTE FOR CALLING STRIKE ON MONDAY

Lawrence, Mass., Jan. 31—The general committee of textile workers of this city unanimously voted tonight to call a strike in all the mills on Monday next unless the manufacturers before that time grant their demand for a forty-eight hour week with fifty-four hours' pay. The decision affects about 30,000 workers.

40,000 Affected. New York, Jan. 31—Forty thousand textile workers in central New York may be thrown out of work Monday as the result of a deadlock which developed today in the conference called by Governor Smith's reconstruction commission to settle the controversy over an eight hour day, it was announced tonight. Refusal of the Harmony mills at Cohoes to accept a compromise was blamed for the hitch by Mrs. Henry Moskowitz, secretary of the commissions' industrial relations committee.

Further efforts to effect a settlement will be made by the industrial relations committee, Mrs. Moskowitz said tonight, but she was unable to state what proposals would be suggested as the basis of an agreement.

Union Issues Order. New York, Jan. 31—Orders directing 700,000 members of the United Textile Workers of America to establish an eight-hour day Monday regardless of objections of employers were issued today by the unions' executive committee, according to an announcement here tonight.

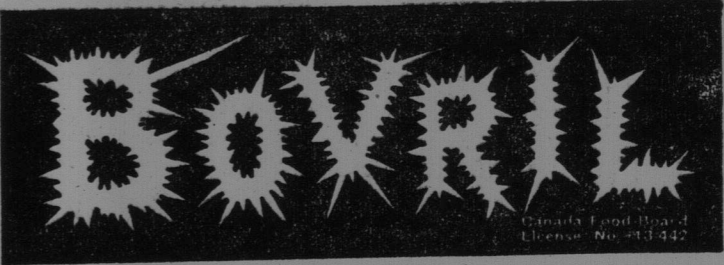

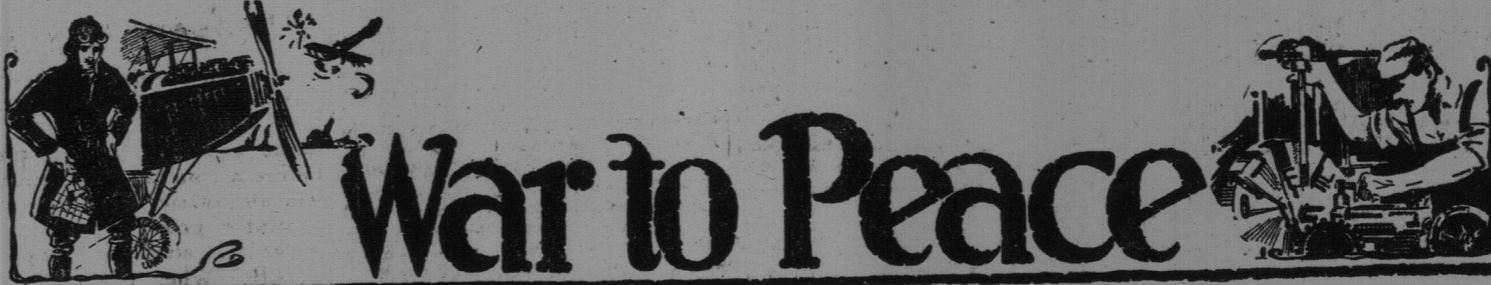

War to Peace

Training the Invalided Soldier

WHEN the first Canadian casualties were announced every heart in Canada thrilled with the thought—"What will the country do to help these men overcome the handicaps they have suffered?"

Since that day Canada has been quietly developing a wonderful organization to help restore the strength and earning capacity of her invalided soldiers.

This work is in the charge of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment. It is divided into three classes.

Ward Occupations.

Soldiers who, on account of their injuries, are confined to wards or to their beds in hospitals are taught handicraft work of various kinds. This work is not meant to train a man in work by which he could earn a living. It is encouraged rather because it diverts the soldier's mind from his disability, and gives him light exercise. In this way it assists wonderfully in the soldier's recovery.

Occupational Therapy.

This work is conducted in hospitals. It is intended mainly to help in the cure of the patient. But it often serves as the ground-work for a course in Industrial Re-training. The following gives some idea of the breadth and scope of the subjects taught in these classes—Mechanical drawing, woodworking, boot and shoe repairing, machine shop practice, gardening, poultry raising, civil service instruction, book-keeping, stenography, telegraphy.

Industrial Re-Training.

When a man is so injured by war service that he cannot follow the occupation or trade that he worked at before

re-estabing, the Department trains him for a new occupation.

For this work, use is made of Technical Schools and Universities at fourteen centres throughout the Dominion. Here primary training is given by specially planned courses. This helps a man begin his actual re-training work intelligently.

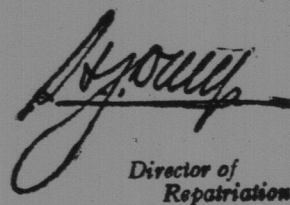
Most of the re-training is given in actual factories and shops. Hundreds of large and small concerns have co-operated whole-heartedly in this work—placing at the disposal of the Department, without charge, their equipment and the services of many of their staffs.

Ninety-five per cent of those who have been granted "Industrial Re-training" courses by the Department have been successful in becoming self-supporting in a new trade or occupation.

These benefits are given by the Department to ex-members of the Canadian, British and Allied forces living in Canada, who come within the classes for which these benefits are provided.

During the period a man is being "Re-trained" he and his dependents are granted adequate pay and allowances.

ADVICE TO SOLDIERS BY ONE WHO WAS OVER AND LOST HIS SIGHT

Ottawa, January 27.—Incidentally in connection with the work of the Soldiers' Aid Commission some good advice given by Harris Turner, editor of Turner's Weekly, is well worth quoting. Mr. Turner went overseas as a private with the Princess Pals and lost his sight through being wounded. He is a prominent western member of the G. W. V. A. and his opinion of this will be respected by all returned men. Mr. Turner says: "A great responsibility rests on the soldier who gets a job through this agency, if he falls down on the job he accepted, makes it harder for every returned man who comes after him. When he does not do his best he is penalizing his comrades who have not yet returned. If he does his best, he makes it easier for all those who come after him. If he is not prepared to do his utmost to fill the position he secures through the agency of the commission, he should keep away from the commission, for he will kill it, if he shows himself in sufficiently large numbers. "If a man realizes that all the agencies and schemes in the world will not bolster him up, when he is not prepared to do what he can, the question of the difficulties surrounding the demobilization of the men will be much easier to answer than it is now. Discharged men will lose their positions from time to time. If they lose them unjustly the matter should be brought home forcibly to the employer who committed the injustice, but if the dismissal of the veteran is the veteran's own inability to fill the duties of the job satisfactorily, then he is hurting the entire cause of the returned soldier unless he keeps his mouth shut. As a general rule, an employer does not hire a man unless he wants one and it is just as general a rule that an employer does not fire a man unless he fails to do the work satisfactorily. If a man is sacked, let him take a good look at his own end of the deal before he lays a complaint against his employer. If he does not carry on properly on his job, gets fired, and then raises a horrible row about the way returned soldiers are treated, he ultimately brings discredit upon everyone who tries to help him. If, on the other hand—and there have been such cases—a man is given just treatment he brings credit upon himself and upon all organizations which have tried to help him."

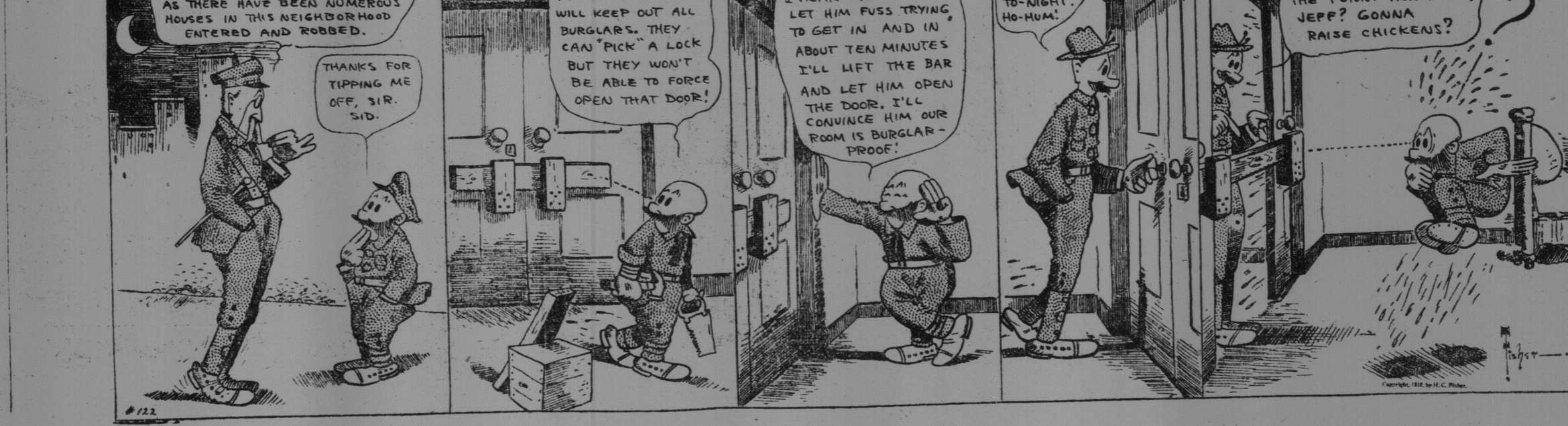

A NICE GAIN
Customs returns for January here totalled \$289,590, compared with \$288,287.33 for the corresponding month last year.

TO THE HALIFAX STAFF.
Miss Ethel Hawker has returned from Toronto and will leave tonight for Halifax to join the staff at the Technical College for the teaching of the disabled soldiers. She not only passed successfully all examinations in Toronto, but samples of her work were selected for exhibition. She has with her samples of this work in book-binding, map-making and basketry, and it shows remarkable skill in execution. Miss Hawker will be a decided acquisition to Doctor Sexton's staff in Halifax. He told the totarians this week that in this matter of preparing disabled soldiers for gainful occupations Canada had successfully solved at least one of her after-war problems—and he was able to quote results to prove the correctness of the statement.

MRS. WALTER P. MUNFORD.
The death of Mrs. Matilda Munford, wife of Walter P. Munford, occurred at an early hour this morning at her home, 48 Elm street, after a lingering illness. Mrs. Munford, who died after her marriage was Miss Mabee, was a native and life-long resident of the city and had reached the age of seventy-three years. She is survived by her husband, five daughters, Mrs. Henry Stackhouse and Mrs. J. P. Stackhouse of this city, Mrs. Frederick Warner of Toronto, Mrs. Susan Woods of Hamilton and Mrs. Alice Tolson of Fall River; one step-daughter, Mrs. Barbara Kelly of St. John; one son, Edward Woods of Boston, and two step-sons, William and David Munford of St. John. They will have the sympathy of many friends in their loss.

WITH THE LID OFF

Food Inspector Potts Speaks Of War-Time Restrictions

Back to Peace Basis in a Few Days — New Brunswick Well Observed the Regulations

Food Inspector W. S. Potts of this city expects that by Feb. 10 the government's many restrictions upon food selling and buying will be entirely lifted and that once again Canada will be upon a straight peace basis.

For some time limitations have been raised on flour, sugar and cereals. The bakers can now use what they like and possibly by the 10th of this new month they will be allowed to take back stale bread.

Housewives and confectioners can build the most tempting frostings on their cakes but it is not yet stated whether or not ice cream manufacturers will be allowed more than the war-time 10 per cent of butter fat in their goods. Prior to the restrictions some ice cream contained as much as 25 per cent butter fat.

You can now order and serve any kind of meat at any hour of the day or night in public eating houses. The lid is off completely, go as far as you like.

In the matter of sugar, householders and confectioners are free again to use as much as they desire. No sugar certificates have to be sent back to Ottawa by wholesale dealers, telling who purchased them and how much.

Retail grocers will not be required to have government licenses after the 10th and it is now being debated whether or not there will be any wholesale licenses. It is likely that the government will exempt from license the ability to be exempted from license the general lifting week after next. However, even upper Canadian fruit dealers say the government license is a good thing for them as it keeps grocers and others from carrying on a general business because of the various license fees.

Inspector Potts tells "The Times" that New Brunswick was a "pretty good boy" during the food restricting period. He was not called upon to apply the power of the law to a single case for deliberate infraction or open disobedience. Grand Manan was a source of some little trouble on the sugar question—a matter of getting over-supplies and sending in American goods nearby—but for five weeks the island was cut off and then sugar was doled out until the dealers realized that they must obey the regulations. When Washington raised its sugar restrictions Grand Manan was treated more liberally.

"I think both the trade and the people have shown a wonderful spirit of sacrifice and co-operation during the food scarcity," said the inspector. "Of course I had to do a lot of explaining and take considerable abuse, but I realized that such would have to be expected in the various circumstances, so I simply plodded along and kept smiling."

Asked if he thought some overly "smart" dealers would probably try to take advantage of war-time substitutes for increasing their profits on confections of various kinds now that the new trade is raised, the inspector said he was sure the people would not stand for any fooling unless prices were cut proportionately. If there was much of this done the government, whom the people supported in war-time, would likely turn round and get after profiteers in protection to the people.

PRESENTATION.
L. A. Belyea, who for the last sixteen years has been traveling salesman for the Frost & Wood Co., Ltd., in the southern part of the province, has his connection with that company and will devote himself to the life insurance business, in which he had been engaged successfully before going with Frost & Wood. Before closing last evening, the manager of the establishment, W. F. Burditt, called the staff together and, after expressing his regret at the loss of Mr. Belyea from the organization and referring to the pleasant relations which had existed while he had been with them, presented to Mr. Belyea on behalf of the staff, a handsome leather traveling bag. Mr. Belyea, in responding, said that he felt keenly the severing of his connection with the company and staff and spoke of the harmony which always had existed among them. Mr. Belyea will continue to make his home in St. John.

HARBOR REVENUE

Lumber Shipments Commencing Again in Old Time Form

Harbor revenue for January showed a total of \$25,427.92, as compared with \$25,402.21 in January, 1918, which was about \$5,000 greater than in the previous year.

While the revenue for last month did not show a large increase, the expenses were more than \$2,000 less, owing to the fact that the city in not paying heavy bills for wharf piloting and that will considerably improve the standing of the account in the course of the year.

Lumber shipments again are commencing in something like their old time volume, as vessels are being released from the war trade and are returning to their ordinary pursuits. Several vessels have arrived in port in ballast for cargoes of lumber and the lumber scows around the wharves and slips help to give the harbor the appearance of pre-war days. The lumber shipments are starting opportunely to offset the loss of revenue caused by the recent British embargo on imports of various commodities.

SERG. JAMES SULLIVAN PROMOTED TO TORONTO

Serg. James Sullivan of the Ordnance Corps, who has been promoted to Toronto in January, 1918, will go there, was given a happy surprise last evening when about seventy-five friends gathered at his home and through J. W. Knodell presented to him a handsome steamer trunk. Members of his detachment, No. 7, C. C. C., were also present. The evening was enjoyed with games and music and all joined in regret at the coming departure of Serg. Sullivan and family from St. John, as well as in congratulations at his promotion.

Sergeant Sullivan, prior to the war period, when he had a little more time to himself, was very active in temperance and boys' work, and was extremely popular with young people. For several winters he gave physical drill to the members of the Boy's Club with great success. The departure of himself and family will be much regretted by a wide circle of friends, but he says he will want to return to St. John when his period of service expires, for he can never forget this city and its happy associations.

THE MILK SITUATION

The milk situation is somewhat unsettled today. When the Kings county producers announced a reduction of six cents on an eight-quart can in their price to the local dealers, a drop of a cent a quart in the price to be paid by the consumer was expected. One large dairy concern, which had been selling milk over the counter at a cent less than other dealers, promptly announced that their retail price would be twelve cents a quart, and this went into effect today. Some dealers are selling at thirteen and others promise a reduction to that price on Monday, as the milk they are selling today was shipped and charged to them yesterday at the old price. There are some dealers here protesting against making the reduction on the grounds that the producers are attempting to set both the wholesale and retail prices, and are doing so without considering the retailers' end of the proposition. It was pointed out this morning that the drop of a cent a quart by the retailers when the reduced wholesale price is only six cents, will mean a loss of two cents a can to them.

MISS MILDRED WILSON PRESIDENT

This Morning's Session of Girls' Conference — Miss Myrtle McGaritty Secretary

The opening session of the Canadian Girls in Training Conference in Centenary church was held last evening. More than 400 delegates had registered and with general attendance the church was filled almost to capacity. The meeting was addressed by Miss Mary Edgar of Montreal, Rev. C. A. Myers of Toronto, and Miss Winifred Thomas of Toronto. Mrs. E. W. Wentworth presided. Devotional opening exercises were conducted by Mrs. David Hutchinson of North End.

In proceeding with organization for the coming year a nominating committee brought in the name of Miss Mildred Wilson for president and Miss Myrtle McGaritty as secretary. The report was unanimously adopted. Miss Wilson is the daughter of John E. Wilson.

When the new president assumed the chair and the secretarial work had been handed over to the new incumbent of the office, very interesting addresses were delivered by the visiting notables from Upper Canada.

Miss Edgar spoke upon the physical and intellectual phases of the movement as part of the fourfold development of girls and Miss Thomas spoke along the lines of religious and social activities. Rev. Mr. Myers dealt exclusively with the social branch of the Canada-wide affiliation.

This afternoon the session is being devoted to a "demonstration" of the Canadian Girls in Training programme, dealing with the Sunday school, the mid-week session, the C. G. I. T.'s relation to other agencies, the business session, devotional period, etc., a familiarizing reproduction of the girls' routine in connection with this work.
