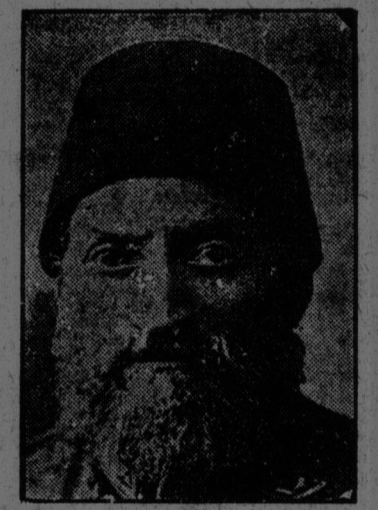

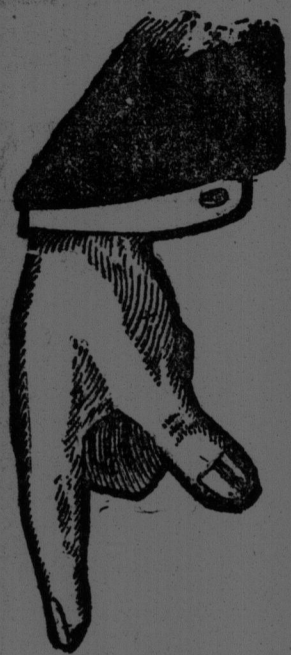

LA MARQUISE de FONTENOY

Trying to Make Buckingham Palace Exterior More Presentable - Archduchess Ella

Thanks to the smoke and soot which fill the atmosphere of the British metropolis to the extent of thousands upon thousands of tons, according to recent chemical investigation, public buildings and private residences have to be submitted periodically to cleaning, scraping, and repainting on the outside.

The facade of Buckingham Palace alone has received no scraping or painting for more than sixty years, and that is why it presents an extraordinarily grimy and dingy appearance, now rendered all the more noticeable by reason of the whiteness of the great marble memorial of Queen Victoria at the entrance of Mall, and to which the palace furnishes an extremely sombre background.

The exterior of King George's metropolitan residence has remained so long so because his grandfather, the Prince Consort, had a theory that if the facade were treated with oil, well forced into the material, a surface would be produced capable of resisting the deleterious effects of the London atmosphere.

Upon the results of this investigation will depend whether or not some means can be devised for securing the stone and repainting it, or whether it will be necessary to reconstruct the entire frontage of Buckingham Palace. The general impression thus far is that the latter will be the only thing to do.

While parliament will be asked when it meets to vote the necessary amount of money for the work, no matter what its cost, will not involve any additional burden upon the taxpayer.

Queen Victoria, King Edward VII, and King George, have each, on their accession to the throne, usually turned over, for the terms of their respective lives, the so-called crown property to the national treasury in return for a civil list.

The palace occupies the site of a mansion built by the Duke of Buckingham at the beginning of the seventeenth century, was formerly known as Buckingham House - was purchased by George III, in 1763, and became the principal residence of his consort, Queen Charlotte, George IV, after his accession to the throne, enlarged and repaired the palace at the cost of several millions of dollars, but was so much disgusted with the result that he declined to live there.

A recent ceremony of renunciation at the Court of Vienna in which Archduchess Ella, the granddaughter of the emperor, played the leading role, is one which takes place on the eve of the marriage of every princess of the reigning house.

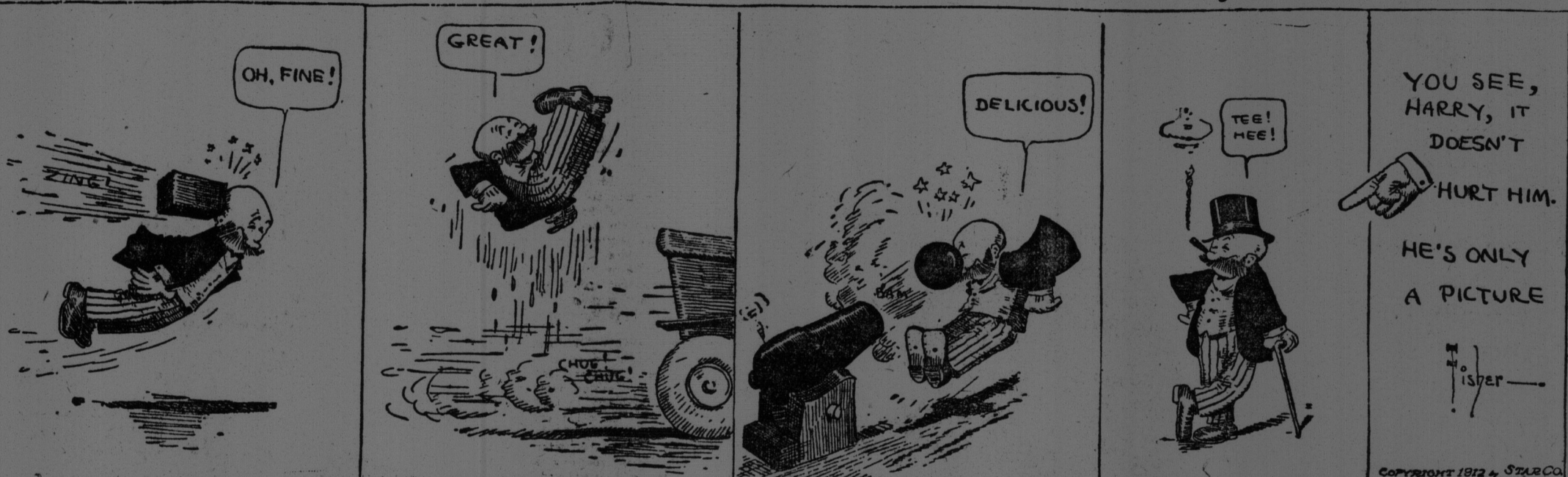

SUPREME COURT FINDS MRS. EDDY BEQUEST IN VIOLATION OF LAW

Boston, Oct. 11.—The full bench of the supreme court of Massachusetts has decided that the bequest of \$155,000 left to the Christian Science church by the late Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy was in violation of the so-called church statute of the state. Under the will Mrs. Eddy created a public charitable trust, the supreme court found. Because of this fact, the gift does not become null, and the trust can be administered by trustees to be appointed by the court, the full bench decided. The finding of the full bench affected the old home of Mrs. Eddy in Commonwealth avenue and the Chestnut Hill home where she died. The decision brought an end to the litigation which has been going on for more than a year over the \$2,000,000 estate left by Mrs. Eddy. Most of the estate is in New Hampshire and under the jurisdiction of the supreme court of that state. Last spring the New Hampshire supreme court decided that the \$2,000,000 trust fund created out of her estate by Mrs. Eddy for the benefit of the Mother Church was valid. Mrs. Eddy in her will left most of her fortune to the Christian Science church in Boston for the dissemination of Christian Science. The decision of the Massachusetts full bench dealt with the charge made by lawyers for the commonwealth that the teachings of Mrs. Eddy were against public policy. The court ruled it could not interfere in this sense, as it did not have sufficient information in regard to this point. GENTLE HINTS. For the next three weeks the country will be at its loveliest.
