

N. S. PLANS FOR CHANGING THE RULE OF ROAD

Hallfax, N. S., March 8—(By Canadian Press)—Nova Scotia's highway traffic may be "driving to the right" after April 2 if a bil-to be introduced by Hon. Wm. Chisholm, minister of highways in the local house next Tuesday, becomes law. It is pointed out that April 2 would be a most advantageous day to effect the change since motor vehicle traffic is prohibited on country roads during the whole of that month and horse-drawn traffic would have that length of time to become familiar with the new rule of the road.

There is also a likelihood, it is said, that the change will be delayed in towns having tram car service, since the short time available may not be sufficient for the street car companies to make the necessary changes.

\$32,000 in a Single Pot -Break-up of Session Will See End of Game Where Chips Cost \$1,000 a Stack.








