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RUINING THE FISHERIES.
REVOLUTIONS OF AN OFFICIAL
REPORT BROUGHT TO LIGHT.

Remarkable Decrease in the number of
fish caught in New Brunswick
Waters.
Specialty Written for the Star.
The official report of Mr. W. H. Venning,
Inspector of Fisheries for New Brunswick,
for 1888, as published in the
Marine and Fisheries report, shows it to
be one of the most discouraging official
reports that has been issued by the
Government in connection with the
fisheries of the province.

It is to be regretted that the publication
of the facts in this report is not
more generally known. The enormous
decrease in the number of fish caught
in the waters of the province is a
matter of fact, and one which is
not only a loss to the province, but
also a loss to the country.

Some of the reasons for the decrease
in the number of fish caught are
the following:
1. The use of dynamite in fishing.
2. The use of poison in fishing.
3. The over-fishing of the waters.

of Toshi were driven out by the
Egyptians, leaving thirty-four of their
number killed. A number of Derivahs
were captured, and General Grenell
and his staff have been ordered to
leave the Derivahs for Toshi.
