

## THIRTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.

MINUTES OF THIRTY-FIRST ANNUAL MEETING, held April 18, 1894.

#### PRESENT:

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. F. M. Dewey.

The minutes of the last meeting of Governors were read and confirmed. Letters of regret were received from Reverends W. S. Barnes and J. H. Dixon at not being able to be present, with assurances of their sympathy in the work.

#### THE PRESIDENT'S REMARKS.

In the course of his opening remarks said, that during the year the work of the Institution had gone on in a most satisfactory manner: the inmates properly cared for, were contented, and on the whole happy. It would be a cause of much gratitude to God, by the Governors and Friends of the Institution, to find the good work begun thirty-one years ago, nurtured through many financial difficulties with no little anxiety and care, still doing its good work : providing a permanent Home of comfort for the friendless. and homeless, on the Thomas Molson Farm, at Longue Pointe. The Relief Board had met every Monday morning during the Winter, and twice a month during the remainder of the season, and no one duly recommended had been refused the privileges of the Institution. The Home for Incurables and Convalescents would soon come under the management of the ' House

of Industry and Refuge,' and as it would entail considerable outlay, it was hoped that the Friends of the Institution would help towards furnishing it. The Building which had been so generously given by Mr. James Moore in memory of his deceased Brother, would be called the Moore Wing.

During the year, nine Governors (Life and Elective) had died. Of the first Life Governors, only thirty-two remained, and of the Elective, about fifty. He referred in feeling terms to the deaths of Mr. Richard Holland, who had for many years discharged the duties of Treasurer, and Mr. George Cruikshank, who had for long acted as Honorary Secretary. The mortality among the aged inmates of the Institution had been more than usual; yet the numbers of admissions kept much about the same.

The President then called upon the Secretary, Mr. D. McMillan, to read the annual Reports and financial statement for the year.

That the thanks of the Governors are due, and are hereby tendered to the Ladies of the Industrial-Rooms, for their self-denying labors in providing so much work for a poor but deserving class of women, and for the interest they manifest in the comfort and welfare of the inmates of the Home.

Moved by George Childs, seconded by Joseph Richards:—

That the thanks of the Governors be conveyed to Doctors J. B. McConnell, J. T. Finnie, F. G. Finley, F. E. Thompson and H. D. Hamilton, for their efficient and gratuitous services rendered by them as visiting Physicians during the year.

Moved by Daniel Watson, seconded by Hon'ble J. K. Ward:—

That the thanks of the Governors are due, and are hereby tendered to the Protestant Ministers and other Christian friends of the City who so faithfully conducted Divine Service every Sabbath, and visited the inmates of the Country House and City Refuge.

Hon'ble J. K. Ward, in accordance with notice, moved:—That steps be taken to reduce the qualification for Life Governors from \$400 to \$200. After some discussion he withdrew the motion, and gave notice, that at the next annual meeting he would move that the qualification be \$100 with yearly subscription of \$10.

In accordance with notice, it was moved by Mr. James Moore, seconded by Mr. Wm. G. Murray:—

That in order to ensure a fuller attendance, the meetings of the Governors and "Board of Management be held on Wednesday at 3 o'clock, instead of four, as at present. Carried.

Some discussion was held on the preparing of the annual Report, having it printed and distributed among the Governors and Subscribers a week previous to the annual meeting. After further discussion, the matter was left with the management. The meeting was closed with prayer by the Reverend E. McManus.

### THIRTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT, FOR YEAR ENDING MARCH 31st, 1894.

The Board of Management of the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge have the honor to submit the following Report:—

#### INMATES.

The average for the year was 126, the highest number 130, the lowest 122. Shewing an average of one more than last year.

#### NIGHT REFUGE.

The number of night lodgings given was: men 29,510; women, 752; total, 30,262, being 2,376 over last year.

#### SOUP KITCHÉN.

The quantity of soup and extra meals was 77,116, being an increase of 6,328 rations over last year.

#### MAINTENANCE.

The cost of maintenance has been \$10,738.51, being \$73.58 more than in the previous year; the sum of \$5,190,71 was expended for food, being \$228.81 less on this item than in the year 1892-3.

#### DEATHS.

Twenty-four deaths occurred during the year sixteen men and eight women. Fifteen died at Country House, three men died in Refuge, one died suddenly on the street, four men and one woman died in General Hospital; all aged people.

#### KINDLING WOOD.

This industry is carried on as usual. The sales during the year are in advance of the previous year, and the returns satisfactory, as will appear by Treasurer's statement. A large stock of dry wood is on hand, and it is hoped that the friends of the Institution will continue to patronize it.

#### OUTDOOR LABOR.

During the Autumn and Winter months, men were, as formerly, sent out to work, and have given general satisfaction. The proceeds carried to revenue account \$651 as against \$793 last year.

#### POOR RELIEF COMMITTEE.

The committee met as usual in the Board Room every Monday morning at nine o'clock during the winter months, and the summer every second Monday at same time and place. Their duty is to attend all that relates to the internal arrangements of both the City and Country House.

#### INDUSTRIAL ROOMS.

The Ladies of the Industrial Rooms and visiting committee are entitled to the thanks of the Governors and the community, for their unremitting attention to the work committed to their management. Their report will be laid before you.

#### BOARD OF OUTDOOR RELIEF.

The thanks of the Governors and of the Public are due to the Board of Outdoor Relief, for the efficient manner in which they have discharged the important and onerous duties committed to them. Their report will be laid before you.

#### RELIGIOUS SERVICES.

The Board place much value on the faithful and self-denying attention' shewn by the ministers of the city and others who attend to the moral and religious interests, both those of the Night Refuge and their weekly services at the Country House.

#### IN MEMORIAM.

During the year we are called on to mourn the death of nine of our fellow Governors, viz.: John McLennan, Wm. Macdougall, Peter Redpath, Thos. M. Taylor and W. Fred. Kay, Life Governors; Richard Holland, George Cruikshank, David Brown and Henry Morgan, Elective Governors.

The Board desire to record its deep sense of the loss sustained by the death of two officers of the Institution during the year, vix.: Mr. Richard Holland, Treasurer, who long discharged the duties of that office, and took a deep interest in the work of the House; also, Mr. George Cruikshank, Honorary Sectary, who performed the duties of that office with great satisfaction for a period of about nineteen years, and took a warm interest in all the benevolent work of the House, and at his death has remembered the Institution by a bequest.

We are now pleased to state, that this long desired branch of our benevolent work will be early supplied, as the building is nearly completed, and it is hoped will be ready for occupancy in June, when we purpose to invite our Governors and friends to congratulate them on the accomplishment of a work so longed desired and prayed for.

As this will add to our expenditure, we trust our fellow citizens, as in the past, will help with their generous gifts.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF OUTDOOR RELIEF FOR WINTER OF 1893-94.

The Board beg to submit to the subscribers of the Outdoor Relief Fund the Annual Report of its proceedings during the past year, together with the account shewing the receipts and expenditure for the same period. On December the 7th, 1893, a meeting was held of city clergymen, representatives of some of the national societies, and Committee of House of Refuge, with a view to arrange for the winter's work. After fully discussing the subject of relief, it was resolved that the operations of the Board be carried on as usual, and the following gentlemen were appointed a Committee for that purpose, and to make an appeal to the public through the press for donations to sustain the work, viz., Charles Alexander, James Moore, Wm. Reid, Hon. J. K. Ward, Joseph Richards, and George Cruikshank.

The meeting of the Board for the distribution of relief commenced on Thursday, the 21st day of December, 1893, and was continued weekly on Thursday to the 22nd day of March, 1894, as shewn by annexed statement. Since the Board closed, a number of helpless families, widows, and deserted wives have been cared for. The relief given consisted of fuel, wood and coal, bread, tea, oatmeal, flour and soap, new and cast-off clothing. Each case brought under the notice of the Board was carefully investigated, and, if found worthy, relieved. The Board acknowledge and return thanks for the very generous support afforded by the citizens. To the friends at St. Lambert, through Rev. Mr. Dart and Mr. G. Beattie, for their sympathy and aid; to the city newspapers, viz., Gazette, Herald, Witness and Star, the Board return sincere thanks. The Board desire to record the valuable services rendered to them by the Rev. Messrs. Patterson, McManus, DeGruchy, Morin, Ridel and Barnabas, Messrs. P. Sinclair, P. McLeod and L. Bonnefant, and other Christian workers, in attending the Board, visiting and reporting cases that come under their notice. The account current with D. McMillan, Secretary and Treasurer, duly audited, is herewith submitted, shewing a balance due the Treasurer of \$4.56, with a debt of \$482 carried on from last year; also several accounts for this winter not yet paid, which will make the amount due by the Board over \$700, which we trust will be provided for by the friends of the poor.

This Statement shows the number of families relieved, the quantity of coal and firewood distributed, and the nationality of the recipients.

## ATTENDING PHYSICIANS' REPORT.

To the Board of Management of the House of Industry and Refuge.

GENTLEMEN,-During the past year the health of the inmates of both the Country House and the city Refuge has been fairly good. In the spring months, also in the early winter, influenza prevailed to some extent-in a few cases with fatal results.

Twenty-four deaths took place during the year: 15 at the Country House; 5 at the Montreal General Hospital; 3 at the Refuge; I died on the street.

The ages of these ranged from 48 to 89 years, or an average of about 72 years. Nine were natives of England, six of Ireland, five of Scotland, two of the United States, one of Canada, one of Newfoundland.

Since our last Report, the Institution has been supplied with a good stock of necessary drugs, in handsome bottles, making a very great convenience to the medical attendants, and providing a long-felt want, which we much appreciate.

The customary attention to the thorough ventilation of the wards, and also their cleanliness, we note with pleasure. When we consider that the greater number of the inmates are very old and feeble, it is surprising what remarkably good health they enjoy. And this we attribute largely to the pure air of the country and attention to hygienic detail.

#### THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE INDUSTRIAL ROOMS.

### WEDNESDAY, APRIL 18, 1894.

We regret that, in consequence of there being no regular Secretary for the past year, it is impossible to give a full annual report : and a short summary of the year's work is all that is attempted. One hundred and thirty-six women have been given sewing during the year, and \$3,949.25 has been paid them for the same. They are classified as follows: Episcopalians, 68; Presbyterians, 30; Methodists, II; Baptists, 10; Italians, 4; Congregationalists, 4; French Protestants, 9. Large orders from the Victoria and Montreal General Hospitals have materially aided us in our work, and our best workers have also been kept busy with numerous wedding orders, a much larger quantity of finest needlework having been turned out. As usual, a kind patron of the Industrial Rooms sent \$40 to be expended in giving summer trips to the poor workers; and yet another lady allowed Miss Rhind to provide fuel for the very poor when needed. 18 families were thus helped. The Annual Bazaar was held in the Windsor Hall on December 4th and 5th, and realized \$3,456.96. The Spring Sale brought in \$487.78, and was held at the Industrial Rooms, 689 Dorchester street. The women were remembered as usual this Christmas, a basket of provisions being given to each. A list of contributions to this good cheer is appended.

Members of St. Andrew's Church and St. Paul's Church Ladies' Aid Societies have, as formerly, done a large share of the work of visiting the women at their own homes, and helped not a few.

The Old Peoples' Home at Longue Pointe has not been forgotten during the past winter, many kind friends having provided entertainment for them.

Cordial thanks is here extended to the different churches for the generous collections made in behalf of the Industrial Rooms' Annual Bazaar, and much help at Bazaar time. Also to Messrs. D. Bentley & Co., for printing; Messrs. Burland & Co., for tickets; Editors Gasette, Herald, Witness, Star, for insertion of notices; and to all the other kind friends who have helped during the past season.
