

THE CASE OF FORMQSA.

Now if Formosa had fallen into British hands, what would the people either of Formosa or the United Kingdom have gained? The answer, unfortunately, is that they would have gained another considerable burden, another addition to taxation. The camphor industry, like the famous pearl fisheries of Ceylon, would have been handed over to some private monopolist. Not so with Japan. The Camphor industry has been worked by the Japanese for the Japanese, and in the revenue accounts of Formosa for 1905-6, it is shown that of a total revenue of 20,013,194 yen, as many as 13,283,220 yen are "Receipts from public undertakings and state property." 




