STEAMER CRYSTAL STREAM BURNED AT COLE'S ISLAND WITH LOSS OF FOUR LIVES

Terrible Fatality on the River in Which Men Well Known in St. John Were Caught Like Rats in a Trap--Miraculous Escape of Others--Half a Dozen Persons Were Badly Injured




The most horrifying fatality that has ever occurred on the St. John river took place early this morning at the West Wharf, Cole's Island, Queen's County, sixty miles from this city, when the steamer Crystal Stream, of Indian town, caught fire and burned, bringing death to four of her crey, and injuring to a greater or less extent a half dozen others. Besides this the boat was totally wrecked and in drifting against the new bridge nearby was the means of communicating the fire to that structure causing it to be almost totally destroyed.

Word of this terrible catastrophe reached town by 'phone from Cody's Station, five miles distant from the scene of the fire, at 7 o'clock this morning from Capt. Fred Mabee, of the ill-fated steamer, but during the day further particulars filtered through from the distant village, each report being more dramatic and awful.


The cause of the accident is not definitely known, but judging from news so far to hand, it looks very much like a repetition of the David Weston disaster of a few years ago, when three so far to hand, it looks very much like a repetition of the David Weston disaster of a few years ago, when three lives were sacrificed, though the Crystal Stream burning is more shocking and horrible to contemplate. The fact of four men being penned up between decks in their bunks asleep, while fire over which there could be no control raged above them, cutting off escape, introduces a horrible phase to the fatality. Despite the heroism of other members of the crew and shore people the able-bodied men were lost in the flames, the incinerated remains indicating that they died as rats in traps.


MEN BROKE CONTRACT


