

### Hcw Tripoli Was Ruled. tu y with an interruption in

Although 'tripoli was not formally declared a Turkish villayet until 1835, it has been under Turkish domination from the 16th century, the only interruption being in 1714, when the Arab population contrived to gain a slight measure of independence. The Sanjek of Banghazi has been administered separately for a little less than forty years.

The chief authority, both civil and military, in Tripoli rests with the Governor General, under whom are a number of lesser officials with authority over subordinate governments, cantons or districts Sheikhs still possess authority over Arab tribes and Berber assembles still raise taxes. Banghazi has a mutessariff who is directly responsible to the Porte. In general throughout the country all important officials are Turks.

The western boundary of Tripoli as far south as Ghadames was settled by France and Turkey in 1392, but the southern limit stil remains unfixed. The entire area under Turkish domination is esti- seems to be with my breath.
