Asquith Government Suffers Reverse in Committee

VOTE ON TARIFF Government Will Not Resign -- Many Liberal Dissensions--Snap Verdict Claimed--Will Resubmit Resolution and Demand Vote of Confidence -- Great Unionist Enthusiasm.

London, Nov. 11.--The cabinet was defeated by a vote of 225 against 206 in the committee on the home rule bill.

Some 70 Liberal members have given their support to the bill. The bill was defeated by a vote of 225 against 206 in the committee on the home rule bill.

Unionists Jubilant. When the result of the vote was announced the Unionists present cheered wildly.

Snaps divisions during the meetings of committees of the House of Commons were not unusual, although this is the first experience of the kind of the present government.

The government had then to choose between two alternatives. The cabinet might drop the Home Rule Bill, or it could bring forward a motion to recommend the bill and obtain the opinion of the full house on the vote, which was taken today.

LATER. London, Nov. 11.--While the House of Commons was debating the financial provisions of the Home Rule Bill in committee this afternoon, an unexpected vote on an amendment offered by Sir Frederick Banbury, a Unionist member for the city of London, resulted in an opposition victory by a majority of 22.

The temporary defeat of the government caused a great political sensation, but did not result in its retirement. The cabinet held a meeting to-night and decided to present a resolution in the House tomorrow which will be practically a demand for a vote of confidence, and after some parliamentary red tape, will endeavor to have Sir Frederick Banbury's amendment resubmitted and expunged.

The younger Conservatives, it is claimed by government supporters, are prepared to support the Home Rule Bill and succeeded in getting a vote when many members were in the country and a number of those in town were absent from the house, not expecting that important business would be taken up.

The government's average majority in previous details of the bill have been in the neighborhood of one hundred. But there has been much dissatisfaction among members of all parties at the provision compelling the other sections of the United Kingdom to contribute to the support of Ireland without a voice in the expenditure of the money.

STUCK, KAFFE IN OFFICER

Caruso Identified as the Man Who Stabbed Policeman Benoit--One Officer Drew His Revolver.

Salem, Mass., Nov. 11.--Two surprises, one for the defence and one for the Commonwealth came in the Ettore Giovannitti-Caruso murder trial today.

The surprise caused by Canada's identification of Caruso was no greater than that which followed when in response to a question from the Chief Justice he declared he had seen Officer Marshall immediately after the shooting, with a revolver in his hands.

The police who were at the scene of the riot have declared that they did not draw their revolvers.

Pessimistic Official Announcements at Constantinople Pave Way for Admission of Defeat

Bulgarians May Await Outcome of Possible Intervention Before Pressing on to Constantinople -- Germany Seeking to Prevent Austro-Servian Embroglio -- Powers Awake to Necessity of Working in Unison -- Important Conferences Held.

London, Nov. 11.--Judging by all precedents in the present war, the news from Constantinople tonight in the herald of another Turkish defeat at the Tchaus, where a battle has been proceeding for the past two or three days.

The Turkish admission that so many wounded are arriving at the capital as to show that the Turkish forces are offering fierce resistance, has a great significance in view of the previous admissions of a similar nature.

There are indications that Bulgaria may enter into Constantinople. According to some reports Bulgaria will be content with finding suitable winter quarters for her army while the peace negotiations are going on and subsequent settlements are being arranged.

Mediation Chances. The question of mediation has made another step forward in the announcement from Paris tonight that the Austro-Servian alliance will join with the other powers in transmitting Turkey's request for mediation.

The revelation of the danger to European peace lying in the antagonistic interests of Austria and Servia appears to have awakened a sense of the need of an amicable cooperation to settle the Balkan problems acceptable to all the parties concerned.

A factor making for the speedy cessation of the war is the approach of winter conditions, which would give to the campaign an exceedingly arduous character.

There is still talk in Vienna of an ultimatum to Servia, and other like reports, but it is believed that Germany is exercising an mediating influence in the direction of persuading both Austria and Servia to consent to a postponement of the settlement until the whole matter can be dealt with by the European conference.

Meanwhile diplomacy is active in all the European capitals. It is understood that after his important mission to Constantinople, Dr. Danell, president of the Bulgarian chamber of deputies, will go to the other European capitals and think it probable that the allies, the Servian premier, M. Pachitch, after an important cabinet meeting, will send Dr. Danell to the Balkans to consult with King Peter on the situation.

Austria Not Mobilizing. The reported mobilization of the Austro-Hungarian forces is denied at Budapest, Roumania, however, is taking certain military measures with a view to being prepared for eventualities. The war minister has issued an order to all the army corps to the effect that half the contingent which was to have been dismissed Nov. 14, is to be retained with the colors until further orders.

No late news of importance has been received from Adrianople, Scutari or other points where the armies of the allies have met the Turkish troops in close quarters.

GRAND TRUNK MAY EMPLOY OTHER LINES

Negotiations Under Way to Secure Running Rights Over New York, New Haven and Hartford.

Explanation of Discontinuation of Work on Southern New England.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 11.--The Grand Trunk Railroad of Canada is negotiating with the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad for the right to carry its business into all the stations of the entire New Haven system, including the Boston and Maine road, according to a statement given out by Vice President Byrnes of the latter road tonight.

The statement is issued to explain the reasons for discontinuing the work on the Southern New England Railroad, the Grand Trunk's subsidiary, as announced yesterday.

Vice President Byrnes said that already an agreement has been reached between the two roads for the joint use of the Central Vermont tracks between Windsor and White River Junction, Vermont. The withdrawal of the petition by the Boston and Maine for a branch road from Claremont to Lebanon, N. H., paralleling the Central Vermont line, was announced Saturday.

While it is stated that the exact reasons for ordering a suspension of work on the Southern New England Railroad to President Mellen, it is admitted that joint negotiations are under way, and have been for some time, looking to a joint use of the New Haven lines by the New Haven and Grand Trunk roads.

The statement of Vice President Byrnes is as follows: "Vice President Byrnes has talked over the telephone this evening with Mr. Mellen at his residence in Stockbridge, and has been assured by Mr. Mellen that there has been no agreement as to the joint use of Central Vermont tracks between Windsor and White River Junction.

That Mr. Mellen has been in various times in communication with Mr. Chamberlain, and that there has been no agreement as to the joint use of the New Haven extension, and if the Grand Trunk has discontinued its work, as stated in the newspapers, it was because the Grand Trunk believed from its own standpoint, and not self and the New Haven road.

Wants Information. Providence, R. I., Nov. 11.--Governor A. J. Folsom called this afternoon to A. W. Smithers, chairman of the Grand Trunk board of directors, at London, demanding official information as to whether the railroad intended to complete its road here before July 1, 1915, the time limit in its charter. Announcement was made by Mayor Fletcher that President Fitzhugh, of the Southern New England road, telegraphed tonight that he would meet the mayor here Friday to discuss the situation.

Legal Standard in Quebec is Eighty Pounds and Elsewhere in Canada It is Ninety Pounds.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Nov. 11.--The department of trade and commerce is grappling with the ancient conundrum, "What is a bag of potatoes?" In Quebec there is a legal standard of 80 pounds of tubers to the bag. Elsewhere in Canada custom has fixed the weight at 90 pounds. The situation is fruitful in uncertainty to the purchaser of potatoes and lends itself to manoeuvres of various kinds.

EXPLOSIVES BY THE QUART

Ortie McManigal Carried Nitro Glycerine in Quantities After He Dispensed With Use of the Dynamite.

Indianapolis, Nov. 11.--From that part of his career when he had discarded dynamite and was resorting to the use of nitro-glycerine, which he carried about on passenger trains, Ortie E. McManigal related at the dynamite conspiracy trial today how he had caused explosions at Cleveland, Ohio, Jersey City, N. J., Pittsburgh, Pa., Omaha, Neb. and Superior, Wis.

He named Peter J. Smith (Cleveland); George "Nipper" Anderson (Cleveland); Charles Wachtmeister, Detroit; Herman Cline, Indianapolis; William E. Redden, Milwaukee; Fred Mooney, Duluth, Minn., and Eugene A. Clancy, San Francisco, all labor union officials besides those he previously mentioned, as being among the forty-five defendants whom he knew to be employed by the Iron Workers' Union to blow up work under construction by "open shop" contractors.

Believe Liberal Member Forfeits Right to His Seat

STEAMER ROSEDALE RUNS AROUND AND MAY BE TOTAL LOSS

Little Hope Entertained of Saving Craft on Lighthouse Point, but Crew are Standing By.

Sault Ste Marie, Ont., Nov. 11.--Carrying a crew of 15 and 8,000 tons of package freight, the steamer Rosedale, owned by the Inland Lines and bound up the lakes, is ashore on Lighthouse Point, near De Tour and little hope is entertained of saving her as a heavy sea is running.

KILLED BY MARE'S KICK. Camlachie, Ont., Nov. 11.--Rev. T. E. Shearer, who came to Lambton county a little over two years ago to assume charge of the Presbyterian church of this village, was killed in his own yard this morning by a kick from the head of a fractious mare on which he was endeavoring to place a halter. Members of the family came to his assistance immediately and the mare was slain. The Rev. Shearer is reported to be leaving today but the crew is standing by her.

Report of British Royal Commission

CAUSES FOR WHICH SEPARATION WILL BE GRANTED, SPECIFIED -- JUDGE SHOULD HEAR CASE ALONE AND PUBLICATION OF DETAILS MAY BE FORBIDDEN.

London, Nov. 11.--The royal commission on divorce, which has been investigating this subject for several years, has made public the result of its inquiries. The majority report recommends that the two sexes be placed on an equality before the law with regard to the grounds for divorce, which shall be among others, desertion for three years, incurable insanity after five years confinement, habitual drunkenness, found to be incurable after three years. From the issuance of the first separation order, it is recommended that all divorce cases shall be heard by a judge alone, who is empowered to close the court during the hearings and prohibit the publication of details.

MOTHER KILLS HER TWO CHILDREN AND COMMITS SUICIDE

Father Attempted to Interfere and Woman Cut Her Own Throat--On Eve of European Trip.

Vidden, Man., Nov. 11.--Last night at their home near Scarth Station 10 miles west of here, the wife of Arthur Clark aged 25, killed her two children, aged 2 and 3 years respectively, and then committed suicide.

According to the husband, all four were sleeping in the same room and he was awakened by the noise of one of the children, made while his mother was in the act of cutting his throat. When Clark got up to restrain his wife she ran to the other end of the room and cut her own throat with a razor. It was then about 1 o'clock, and Clark rushed to a neighboring farmer, John Shoemaker, and told his story. Shoemaker accompanied him back to the house where mother and children were found dead.

THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT AND HOME RULE.

The defeat of the Asquith Government in Committee on the financial provisions of the Home Rule Bill is not altogether unexpected. It was well known that serious opposition had developed in the Government ranks to the proposal to give Ireland control of the Customs. The objection to the establishment of a tariff system in different parts of the United Kingdom is self-evident. England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland are a unit of the Empire in exactly the same way that all the Provinces of Canada are a unit as the Dominion. The system is totally at variance with the Imperial Idea of Federation. The announcement that seventy Liberal members voted against the Government's proposals on the ground that the policy of Protection would be introduced into Ireland indicates that they are at one with the Unionists in the view that two tariff systems for the United Kingdom would be absolutely unworkable.

The defeat in Committee does not foreshadow the early resignation of the Government. Two alternatives had to be faced. The Home Rule Bill might have been dropped, but if this course had been adopted, unless by some means the Nationalists had been placated, defeat could not long have been averted. The Liberal party is in a minority in the House and practically dependent upon the Nationalist vote. On the other hand, a vote of the whole House could be taken, after due notice has been given, in the belief that the Government will adopt this latter course and will move for the recommitment of the Bill in view of the fact that the division was unexpected. Considerable interest will attach to the vote given by the 70 recalcitrant Liberals and the followers of Mr. William O'Brien, who are also rebellious on the fiscal issue.

How the fiscal relations of Ireland are affected may be judged from the statement issued by the Tariff Commission. It is pointed out that under the Bill the Irish Parliament would have power to vary by way of "addition, reduction, or discontinuance" any customs duty upon an article which is at the time included in the Imperial Tariff. There is no limitation to the amount of the increase of duty which may be imposed by the Irish Parliament, but it is provided that the Irish Exchequer shall not benefit from the increased Irish taxation to the extent of more than ten per cent. of the yield in Ireland of the Imperial portion of the tax. This provision does not apply to beer and spirits upon which the Irish Parliament may benefit to the full extent of any increase it may impose. Further, in regard to excise no limitation is placed upon the taxing powers of the Irish Parliament except that in the case of articles upon which a customs duty is levied the excise duty must correspond to the customs duty.

What must in operation prove to be an elaborate system of drawbacks is applied, with the apparent object of preventing Ireland from taking any steps towards a national system of Protection. The British exporter to Ireland is to be put on the same tariff footing as the Irish market as his Irish competitor, and vice versa. Some of the objections raised against this system are worth noting. As the Bill stands, these provisions will necessitate a great extension and reorganization of the Customs arrangements both at Irish and British ports. Hitherto duty-paid goods have passed freely between the two countries, any varying of the rates of duty by the Irish Parliament would necessarily bring into force an Irish scale of customs and excise duties and drawbacks differing from that prevailing in Great Britain. The varying of the rate on any one article must involve the examination of many other articles in order to safeguard revenue interests. In all these cases of varied duties the goods on leaving the first port would have to be examined for the purpose of drawback and a claim for drawback set on arrival at the second port a similar examination of the goods must be made for the purpose of the new customs duties. If goods have been previously imported there will thus be three examinations of the goods instead of one as at present. No such complicated arrangement is to be found in any country whether under a federal or unitary system. The difficulties of the Government of Ireland Bill would seem to arise from the effort to safeguard the Free Trade system while in fact setting up separate tariff systems in the two parts of the United Kingdom.

Some idea of the interests affected can be obtained when it is understood that the value of the trade between Great Britain and Ireland is about £120,000,000. An Irish Chancellor of the Exchequer could under the Bill immediately operate in any article in the present customs tariff of the United Kingdom. It has also to be remembered that Ireland is included in all the commercial treaties of the United Kingdom. These treaties affect every variety of subject (commerce, fisheries, navigation, etc.) which comes within the sphere of the fiscal system of the country, and since treaties are by the Bill taken from the purview of the Irish Parliament they must limit the freedom of the Irish Parliament in its power to levy customs and excise. It is impossible at this stage to foresee how far the limitation would be operative or what indubitable variation of customs and excise or the introduction of other taxes in Ireland might offer to foreign countries to approach the Irish Executive in the same way as they have approached the executives of Canada and other Dominions, leading to serious inter-imperial and international complications.

In effect there can be no doubt that the Bill does contain more than the beginnings of a national system of Protection. Under the present system of Free Trade it would bring about a serious disturbance of the economic interests of the United Kingdom. The solution of the economic problems of Great Britain and Ireland lies in the maintenance of Free Trade between the two countries, the adoption of one tariff for the United Kingdom with preference to the Overseas possessions throughout the Empire. That much wished for result would follow the return of the Unionist Government to power.

UNITY OF PURPOSE.

It may be noted as a sign of progressive legislation in the two countries that the Government of the Dominion and the Democratic Party in the United States are both in favor of Federal assistance to improve the highways. The bill introduced at Ottawa last session to grant a sum of money, on the basis of population, to each of the Provinces to build and improve the highways, was killed by the Liberals in the Senate at the bidding of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. It is understood to be the intention of the Government to reintroduce the bill this session. The storm of protest from one end of the country to the other

at the action of the Senate in depriving the Provinces of the Federal grant, it is to be hoped, will lead to a more just and favorable conclusion. In the United States Mr. Woodrow Wilson, the President-elect, in many public addresses, has voiced his belief in the wisdom of national improvement of means of communication and particularly of roads. Advocates of Federal aid to road building in the Republic are looking with satisfaction on Mr. Wilson's election for they believe it carries with it encouragement of Government assistance and insures an administration friendly to the efforts of the American Automobile Association and other bodies who are co-operating with it in the work to re-establish the policy of road building as one of the definite policies of the national Government.

Mr. Wilson's views on this question are of some interest. In an address at the American Road Congress at Atlantic City he specially referred to the importance of national improvement of the highways. The following extract from his speech is worth quoting:

"The question of highways is one of the few great instrumentalities of our public and our communal life with which the Government is of necessity connected. I see that we must do what we have been backward in doing as compared with other nations. I tell you frankly my interest in good roads is not merely an interest in the pleasure of riding in automobiles. It is not merely an interest in the much more important matter of affording farmers of this country and residents in villages a means of ready access to such neighboring markets as they need for economic benefit. It is also the interest in weaving as complicated and elaborate a net of neighborhood and State and national opinion together as it is possible to weave.

"I believe that it is the proper function of the Government to see to it that the extension of all the varied modern knowledge, about characteristics of different soils, ought to be so extended, so carried everywhere to the farmer as to build up by the aid of the Government this thing that feeds us, and ought to continue to feed the world, and whenever you speak of that, whenever you increase what the United States is doing, you must immediately increase the facilities of the United States for handling what it has made after it has made it. You cannot rationally increase the prosperity of this country without increasing the road facilities of this country."

The Dominion Government and the United States Government under Mr. Woodrow Wilson will be of one mind on this question. In both countries the policy of Federal aid to improve the highways will receive unanimous support. In the United States, in view of Mr. Wilson's expressions of opinion, the feeling among Federal aid advocates is that there should be little delay in obtaining from Congress the adoption of a comprehensive and intelligent plan for national participation in the good roads movement on a more extensive scale than has heretofore been contemplated. The beginning of President Wilson's administration will be signalized by the assembling at Washington on March 6 and 7, 1913, of the second Federal Aid Good Roads Convention.

THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION IN FRANCE.

In contrast to the excitement and war of words which prevail in the United States over the election of a president, it is of interest to note the calm and dignified method of procedure which governs the choice of the executive head in the Republic of France. The successor to President Fallieres will be elected next January to hold office for seven years which constitute the term of the French presidency. There will be no preferential primaries, no election of delegates to conventions, no campaign; in short none of the features that constitute the preliminaries to a presidential election in the United States. There will be no going to the polls on election day, no crowds in the streets at night anxiously waiting for returns, no long period of uncertainty about the result.

The procedure in France is remarkably simple. The National Assembly, the legislative body corresponding to the Congress of the United States, will meet, and then the 300 members of the Senate and the 597 members of the Chamber of Deputies will proceed to determine by their votes who shall be the successor of President Fallieres. The Senators are not chosen by popular vote, but the choice will be fairly in accordance with the will of the French people, for the deputies are elected by their votes. The system has distinct advantages, but would hardly appeal to the people of the United States. The Albany Journal in commenting upon the coming French election is non-committal. It points out that the people of France are not in the least excited about the event. Nobody is making speeches to them. Nobody is expounding to them the issues. In fact, there seem to be no issues. "We would not say," adds the Journal, "that this is a better way of choosing a president than that which we have in the United States, but certainly it is an easier one, and in that respect attractive. And it appears to be altogether satisfactory to the inhabitants of France."

We might have been inflicted with a bull moon and Steel Trust "niggers" in the woodpile, as perpetual reminders of a popular political aberration.

LOCAL.

Up to the Estemada.

Child Broke Rib.
Florence Kelly, the nine year old daughter of Mrs. J. Kelly, Magazine street, fell over a log on Sunday last breaking a rib. Dr. C. M. Kelly attended to her injuries.

St. Vincent De Paul Society.
The St. Vincent De Paul Society held their first meeting of the season on Sunday evening last when the vacancy of the office of president, owing to the death of John Allan last spring, was filled by the election of James N. Slatery to that position. John P. Bain has succeeded the new president as secretary.

Ministers' Meetings.
The Methodist ministers held their regular weekly meeting yesterday morning when after the regular routine business had been disposed of, Rev. H. C. Priest, Canadian secretary of the Missionary Education Movement, delivered an address on the results of the movement. The association decided to send delegates to the Temperance Convention which will be held in Moncton early in December.

Rev. W. H. Wentworth presided at the meeting of the Baptist ministers which was also held yesterday morning. Rev. H. C. Priest attended this meeting and spoke along educational lines.

Bishop Elect LeBlanc.
It is understood that the consecration of the Bishop elect of St. John, will take place in the Cathedral here on Tuesday, December 10. Besides a large number of ecclesiastical dignitaries from several of the provinces, his excellency the Apostolic delegate, Archbishop Staal, will be present and will act as the consecrating prelate.

Police Court.
The case of Thomas Joseph, a Syrian, charged with assaulting Mrs. Mary Lewis in the Syrian colony on Sunday evening last, was brought up for trial in the police court yesterday morning. Both the defendant and complainant are Syrians. Mrs. Lewis charges that Joseph knocked her down and then caught her by the hair and kicked her. After this she said a man named Sullivan took Joseph away, but later while she was walking along the street he ran after her again, and although she took refuge in Michael George's house, he followed her and again struck her. Several witnesses were called, all testifying to the effect that Joseph was guilty. The case was then adjourned, all witnesses being bound over to the fourth Tuesday in November.

Provincial.
A Girl.
Fredericton, Nov. 11.—Bishop and Mrs. Richardson are being congratulated on the arrival of a baby girl John McCollum, the new chief of police, was sworn in this morning by Police Magistrate Marsh, and at once entered upon his duties.

General.
Bryce to Retire.
London, Nov. 11.—It is understood that Ambassador Bryce has informed President Taft that he will soon retire and devote himself to literature. Sir Cecil Arthur Spring Rice, now British minister at Stockholm, will succeed Mr. Bryce.

Thirty Killed.
New Orleans, Nov. 11.—Thirty persons were killed and over fifty injured in a wreck on the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley Railroad early today when a freight train crashed into an excursion passenger train bound from New Orleans to Woodville, Miss. The wreck occurred near Montz La, about twenty-seven miles north of New Orleans.

Strong Man Dead.
Montreal, Nov. 11.—Tragic circumstances accompanied the death of Louis Cyr, ex-champion strong man of the world, who died at noon yesterday. His mother-in-law, Mrs. Evangeliste Comtois, who attended him during his illness died early on Saturday morning. Mrs. Cyr, suffering from the shock of her double bereavement, is confined to bed and in a serious condition today.

Sir Christopher Furness Dead.
London, Nov. 11.—Sir Christopher Furness, first Baron of Grantley, died yesterday. He was head of Furness, Withy and Company, and the Furness line of steamers. Sir Christopher Furness was born in 1852, and served for a number of years as a member of parliament. He was re-elected to the House of Commons as a Liberal to represent Hartlepool in 1910, but was unseated by the court and his election declared void on the ground that the election had been procured through agents, though he was acquitted of any personal wrong. A few months later King George elevated him to the peerage. Sir Christopher was Lord of the Manors of Cundell and Grantley, York, owned over 20,000 acres and was patron of seven livings.


Fire in Canton.

Public Works.

The Commissioner of Public Works recommended that authority be granted to Charles R. Watson to erect an electric sign on Charlotte street, sidewalk on his Main street store.

Commissioner Schofield recommended that the Recorder be requested to investigate the title to Nos. 4 and 5, block 6, on the south side of Dock street, and report to the council what action, if any, is necessary in order to assert the City's ownership thereof, and the extent to which the City engineer be instructed to prepare a specification and call for tenders for building a shed on the Quinn wharf; that a rental lease for seven years for the use of the shed, to be held by the City, be granted to Charles R. Watson to erect an electric sign on Charlotte street, sidewalk on his Main street store.

Police Investigation.

Com. McLellan reported that he had examined 54 witnesses, including the Chief of Police, 40 members of the department, 8 ex-members and 15 citizens. He claimed that he found that there was no satisfactory entrance examination to the force, and said in part:

With the apparent ignorance of the force, as to the Rules and Regulations prevailing, it would only be necessary to assume that the members of the force would be derelict in the performance of their duties, and this assumption is confirmed by the evidence, showing the carelessness exhibited by members of the force, in frequenting houses of ill repute, and in the habit of loitering and smoking, when they were supposed to be performing patrol duty.

The nature of the force for the prevention and detection of crime would be governed altogether by the nature of the force, and I believe I am justified at this particular time in refraining from criticism.

The nature of the complaints made against the force was varied, but any, if proven, would justify a dismissal, in many of these cases the chief held an investigation, and exonerated the men, while in others he dismissed and in certain cases he referred to investigate.

It is only fair to state that the chief was never empowered to hold investigations under oath, and this fact may have made it impossible for him to secure proper evidence, as in some cases which he investigated and exonerated the men, while in others he dismissed and in certain cases he referred to investigate.

In some instances during the investigation the charges made against some of the officers were supplemented by charges against the chief, who promptly denied them, but sufficient evidence exists to show that the chief, while holding an investigation, did not display a very great amount of discretion in dealing with the complainants. When given an opportunity to be displayed an evident loss of memory.

Whether there was any intention on the part of the chief to shield any of the members of his department whom complaints were made, is a matter for conjecture, but there is no evidence in the Marshall case to prove that the chief, after hearing all the evidence and confirming the decision of the Criminal Code, and the Police Act, as may be considered necessary for the proper guidance of the men, made up as follows: Stenographers' fees \$204.00 Constables' fees 36.00 Stationery account 26.85 Hire of typewriter 4.25 Total \$270.20

WONDERFUL ARTISTE HEARD IN CENTENARY

Madame Marie Hallock, Pianiste, Delighted Large and Appreciative Audience Last Evening.

Centenary Church hall was filled with wonderful music and a highly attentive and appreciative audience when Madame Marie Hallock of Philadelphia gave a piano recital last evening.



Carter favorable to the technical educational project in St. John, but stating that as the board of education had not met yet, the matter has not been officially considered. The Y. M. C. A. wrote offering to work with the board in promoting technical education. A communication from the janitor of the King Edward school asking that electric lights be installed in the furnace room, and that lumber be provided for a janitor's room in the basement was referred to the visitors of the school with power to act. Miss Martha H. McAuley, of Hillsboro, applied for a position on the teaching staff of the city schools. The application was left with the teachers' committee. The recommendation of Trustee Day that additional valves be supplied for the furnace in Centennial school so as to unify the heating of the building, was adopted by the board. In view of the fact that the estimates for the next year are to be dealt with soon, Trustee Russell suggested that a small committee of the board be named to revise and investigate the matter of salaries of all employes of the board, teachers, janitors and others, and submit a report to the board, and whatever recommendations as to increases, etc. they may decide upon. Trustees Russell, Blinlock, Coll and Supt. Bridges were appointed as a committee.

On the part of the Women's Canadian Club

for the best essays on Canadian themes, the board recorded its willingness to accept the donation provided the prize is given to the girl making the highest marks in the matriculation examination.

Supt. Bridges submitted an encouraging report regarding the penny saving banks in the schools. Yesterday's collections not included the sum now in the banks to the credit of scholars, amounting to over \$700. The results obtained thus far are considered most satisfactory by the board. The collections have been good, and in view of the fact that only four schools are trying out the system, the amount saved is exceptionally gratifying.
