Blowing Men from the Mouths of Cannon! FIFTY MEN THUS EXECUTED AT THE WILL OF A The conduct of Government officials in

The conduct of Government officials in India in blowing from the cannon's mouth some fifty natives, has created much excitement in England, and the facts having been ascertained the act is generally condemned. The men who met with death in this terrible form belonged to the Kookas, a tribe or caste of Hindoos, who to the number of three hundred revolted against English rule. They attacked a Government station near Delhi and killed one or two of the soldiers of the garrison but were promptly repulsed with far greater loss to themselves. Of course they were pursued in their retreat, and, as we are now informed, "literally hunted down." Of the captives, fifty were selected for execution on the spot, and sixteen more were put to death at Umballa, the insurrection having been, even before the executions, completely suppressed. Commenting on the executions, the Times observes it is quite conceivable that even this measure of punishment might not have been too great for the exigencies of the occasion. Action as prompt in 1857, the Times believes, would have saved England from the terrible mutiny of the Benglamyand the sanguinary contests which followed. And it adds "That three hundred men should in the immediate neighborhood of the army of exercise attempt an armed insurrection against the Supreme Government is of itself a circumstance tending to perplex our conclusions." The Indian Government is proceeding to investigate the whole circumstances attending these executions, and Deputy Commissioner Cowan, the official in charge, has been suspended pending the enquiry. Instructions were sent to this gentleman by his superior officer that none of the prisoners were to be condemned without a iormal trial, but before the letter came to head Mr. Cowan had had fifty of the rebels summarily executed.—Ex.
