Before the Indian Arrived

As a result of thirty years of exploration in the Delawase Valley, searching for evidences of the early man in North America, Ernest Volk, a field archaeologist announces some remarkably interesting finds. He succeeded in tracing three distinct habitations of man in Delaware Valley—the Indian on the surface of black coil; a specimen of prehistoric man termed by the explorer an "argilite man," as he used argilite in the manufacture of his implements, and finally a still older race, the so-called "giscial" or "gravel men," who lived before the days when the yellow loam formed the surface soil. "The traces of man in the gravel, far below the above two named stations of occupation," says the afchaeologists, "were found in the shape of artificially fractured stone, of argulite "and quartz. The bones of Arctic animals, such as temusik ox, and of eik, probably species now extinct, were also found. Most of the specimens mentioned, which prove the three periods of occupation in the Delaware Valley, are on exhibition in the American Museum of Natural History."





This causes the call light in B's house to glow and attracts B's attention. B replies that he is there by pressing the call button on his typewriter and lighting the call lamp. In A's house. Then A sends his message, ticking it out upon his typewriter; and lighting the call lamp. In A's house. Then A sends his message, ticking it out upon his typewriter just as a. would if writing a letter. The touching of each letter by key is followed instantly by the lighting of the corresponding lettered lamp on B's receiver.

The lamps remain lighted only while the key is pressed down; they go out the instant it is released.

It takes a little practice to follow a message that as sent quickly, but after a short time a man can receive as rapidly as one can operate the keys. Of course the opparatus works both ways sending and receiving being done in either direction.

In its present form this deaf mute telephone requires a wire for each of the thirty-six keys, but as there are cables containing that number of insulated wires this is no great obstacle.

Mr. Shaw was born in 1869, and became deaf and dumb as a result of spinal meningitis at the age of five. He has been married twice, and has by his first wife a boy of twelve who hears and talks perfectly. His second wife is also a deaf mute. His father, a sea captain, took him all over the world in a vain effort to have him cured. He is on old friend of Dr. Alexander Graham Bell, the inventor of the telephone.

Instead of sound, light has to be used as the means of communication so "telephone" is scarcely the correct word to apply to this invention. It consists of three essential parts—the sender, the indicator and the receiver, with the electric wires that connect them. The sender is a typewriter. The indicator stands on the table in front of the sender. It consists of a frame about six inches square, in which are mounted thirty-six two-candle power electric lamps, each marked with a letter or figure.

The receiver is a large reproduction of the indicator, being about three feet square and having upon it 35 elight candle-power electric lamps, marked with letters and numbers to correspond with those of the indicator.

The pressing of a key on the type-

Interesting specimens of these long extinct species have been purchased by the authorities of the Geological Survey from Mr. Charles H. Sternberg, a renowned fossil hunter of kansas. The Mosasaur was found by his son, Mr. George F. Sternberg, and the titanotherium by himself. The former comes from the state of Kansas; the latter from Wyoming.

The skeleton of the Mosasaur, which is being put up on a long panel, is that of a reptile 20 and a half feet long with four howerful paddles, and a row of teeth in the roof of its mouth as well as on each side below. Three types of this reptile are found in Kansas. The Mosasaur lived in the deer sea, and the fact that its skeletor was found in Kansas 2,000 feet above sea, and the fact that its skeletor was found in Kansas 2,000 feet above sea level is proof that the western continent reared itself from the ocean In appearance the titanotherium is more interesting. It is nearly 12 feet long and stands 6 12 feet high. It came before either the mastadon or the elephant, and bears more resemblance to the phinoceros, having two long horns on the end of its nose, four toes on the front feet and three on each of the hind ones. It will stand in a glass case, and "ill present much the appearance that it did in actual life.

The third specimen, also found on the plains of the west, is that of Portheous Molosseus, a fish fourteen feet in length, with a skull shaped like that of an English bull dog, powerful fangs, and fins three feet in length. Mr. Sternberg, through whose agency the specimens were found, has given his whole life to the collection of fossils, which he had sold to museums throughout the world.

ALASKA'S BIG BEARS

In a Test of Strength They Would Outclass Jungle Beasts

Outclass Jungle Beasts

Very few persons really know tha largest flesh-eating animals in the world are found in North America People genrally believe that the African lion is the king of beasts, but he is not, nearly as large or as powerful an animal as the large brown bear of sub-arctic America. The bears are not as ferocious or combative as the lions, nor are they nearly as vicious as they are given credit for being; but the largest of them are much larger and more powerful than any of the lions. It is safe to say that the largest of the brown bears of the North wou'd weigh three times as much as the largest specimen of lion, and is beyond all question greatly superior in strength. If brought together in combat, the bear would at first appear very clumsy. It would not be capable of the quick rush or the catilike spring of the lion. It would not attack, but would remain entirely on the defensive, meeting its adversary with blows of such rapidity and teriffic force as at once to illustrate its superiority not only in strength, but in action. There is not an animal in the world that can act more quickly or effectively than the bear. The large brown bears of the world, and there is no part of the world outside of North America in which such large flesh-eating animals are found. The bears are carnivorous, yet there are none of them that depend upon fiesh for food, and with most of them flesh comprises but a very small percentage of their food.

That Indians even yet in passing through the norrows of Lake Manitoba throw pieces of tobacco into the waters to propiliate the spirits of the Great Manitou, was the interesting statement made in Winnipeg by J. J. Wilson, who has resided at the Narrows for a number of years. It is only half a mile ocross the lake at that point and as Manitou Island is situated almost exactly in the centre a number of cross currents are formed. ## **OLD PERUVIAN MINE**

According to C. R. Kehler, a noted

According to C. R. Kehler, a noted mining engineer, who has made a survey of the Andean gold belt throughout Peru, the principal source of the wealth of precious stones of the Incas may have been revealed near the little. Town of Acomayo, in Southern Peru.

A Greek tavernkeeper named Kalafatovich has discovered an emerald mine which bears evidence of having been worked by the ancient Peruvians, about one mile from Lake Pomachanches, and near the river forming the outlet for this lake. Samples of the stones sent to Lima show them to be of the finest quality.

The tavernkeeper discovered the first emerald while watching his Indian workmen digging in the old excavation for material for lime. In three oblong pockets were found many stones, one on which weighen nearly 300 carats in its rough state.

Kalafatovich had given an option to a London syndicate, but the Government has asserted its right to take over the mine by paying an equitable price to the discoverer, and to work the mine itself or lease it to private individuals.

Kehler says the discoverey of the emerald deposit is one of the most important ever made in the world.

# **CONVERT STEAMERS** INTO CRUISERS

Hon. J. D. Hagen Admits Question Was Discussed.

London, July 25 - Hon. Mr. Hazen, the Canadian minister of Marine and Fisheries who accom replying yesterday to a deputation from the Imperial Marine League, declared that he was violating no confidence when he said that the question of converting merchant ships into armed cruisers in time of war was discussed in the last few days between the members of the Canadian Government who are now

here and the admiralty authorities. "In order to make such liners effective" added Mr. Hazen, "guns and ammunition would have to be supplied at the ports on either side of the Atlantic between which the vessels ran, so that in the event of hostilities they would at the earliest possible moment be placed in a position to attack or assist other vessels attacked.


