STILL ANOTHER CANADIAN FORCE

May Be Organized for Active Service in South Africa.

Belief at Ottawa That Official Request Has Been Received From Great Britain.

Ottawa, March 24.—The possibility of another Canadian regiment being sent to South Africa on the same terms as the 2nd Mounted Rifles has been suggested here, but inquiries in official quarters for information on the subject failed to elicit any response. Some persons entertain the belief that a communication has been addressed by the imperial authorities to this government concerning the possibility of se-curing a fresh supply of troops, but official corroboration of this belief is not forthcoming. If any such over-tures have been made, the probability of an early restoration of peace, which the dispatches from the scene of war seem to point to, might render the dispatch of another force unnecessary. The only reasons, then, for desiring fresh troops would be to relieve the regiments who need a rest after prolonged campaigning and to provide for a thorough policing of the disturbed districts. Doubtless Canadian troops would perform this duty quite as suc-cessfully as they have invariably done he more dangerous work of fighting a brave and resolute foe in the field. THE CORONATION CONTINGENT.

It will be some days yet before the arrangements for organizing the Canadian contingent for the coronation are completed. It is believed that fully one-half of the contemplated force will be composed of cavalry and artillery units. The remaining half would consist of guards and fusilier regiments, rifle regiments and other corps. The effort will probably be made to incorporate the infantry into three distinctive companies of 100 men each. The minister of militia has apparently given no thought as yet to the selection of the colonel who is to go with the contingent, but the name of Lieut. Col. Pellatt, of the Queen's Own Rifles,

SENATORS ACT LIKE CHILDREN

Conservative Members Bitter Over Senate Turn-Over.

Although in Minority They Would Still Like to Predominate in Committees.

Ottawa, March 24.-Just before the house adjourned tonight Mr. Fielding den, leader of the opposition, respecting the rumor that another contingent rica, said it would obviously be inconvenient for the government to be held responsible for newspaper reports, and declined to discuss the question. The budget debate occupied the greater portion of the day, Mr. Bell (Pictou), Mr. Johnston (Cape Breton), Dr.

Sproule and Mr. Davis (Saskatchewan) participating. Incidentally in the course of discussion upon a private bill, Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick questioned the soundness of the position taken by the Bell Telephone Company, that they were not subject to the control of municipalities so far as work upon the public streets was concerned.

IN THE SENATE. The Conservatives in the senate obtained a snap verdict this afternoon. It was on a motion by Senator Landry, calling for a return showing the min-utes of the meeting of the special committee held on Feb. 21 to strike the standing committees. The motion was an unusual one, as the Conservative leader himself admitted, but Senator Landry wanted to find out how the members of the striking committee voted on the occasion mentioned, and any other information that could be gleaned as to changes in the constitution of the committees. The government leader declined to agree to the motion, and on a division it was carried by a vote of 24 yeas to 20 nays. The total vote was, therefore, 44 out of a house of 81. With 37 senators absent, including many ministerialists, the op-position were able to carry their point. No importance attaches to the division, but it affords another illustration of the resentment felt by the Conservatives at the control of the upper house passing from their hands. It was eminently a proper thing for the government supporters, now that they are in a majority to secure adequate representation on the standing committees. The Conservatives, however, would still like to predominate in the committees, although they are in the minority in the senate, and in a spirit of pique they are asking why Opposition members should have been replaced by Liberals. This conduct is equally as childish as that which lead the Conservative members of the striking committee to stand aloof while their Liberal confreres drew up the standing committees. The Ministerialists have so far behaved with generosity towards their opponents, but they cannot be expected to display magnanimity if the desire is shown to thwart their wishes on every possible occasion. The report of the striking committee was adopted by the senate last week. The time to have raised objection was when the report came up for adoption, and no good or useful purpose was to be served by reverting to the past and endeavoring to ascertain why such and such a thing was done. The division upon Senator Landry's motion seems to have been unexpected by the Ministerialists, several of whom are absent from their places. and Today's division, therefore, carries with it a moral so obvious as not to need pointing out. For the remainder of the session, or until the Liberal majority in the senate grows larger, it would be well to look out for surprises.



white as the proverbial ghost. His head has become as bald as a billiard ball and the iron-gray mustache with which his friends have so long been familiar has disappeared. His eyebrows and eyelashes also have fallen out, and his face and head are as smooth as those of a baby. Smooth pearance but the Rockefeller that Wall street and the Standard Oil circles of millionaires knew.

Rockefeller's latest affliction came on him suddenly. "Alopecia" it is called, and medical men differ as to the cause. 84 BOYS IN PERIL.

But Cool Heads Saved Life and Limb-Only One Lad Temporarily Overcome by Smoke.

Toronto, March 25.-The lives of 84 boys were endangered last night at 7:15 o'clock by a fire that broke out suddenly close to a large dormitory in the northwest wing of the Boys' Home, 339 George street. Fortunately the blaze was discovered in time to permit of the use of the usual means of exit along the corridor ,and under the guidance of the attendants all were taken out of the building in safety.

One little lad of 4 years, Victor Sinclair, was in some way overlooked, and when Deputy Chief Noble and District Chief Villiers were fighting the flames and smoke they found Victor lying unconscious in a corner of the dormitory. CHANCES FOR PEACE

Importance of Pretoria News Minimized

By Mr. Brodrick-Belief That More Could Be Told.

No Fighting While the Boer Leaders Are Consulting-The Terms Offered Last March.

London, March 25.-Mr. Brodrick minimized the importance of the dispatches which the censor had allowed to pass promptly out or Pretoria, but was not wholly successful. His explanation that Mr. Schalkburger had been armed with a safe conduct for the purpose of consulting ex-President Steyn seemed to imply that Lords Kitchener and Milner had not emerged from the background, and that peace negotiations between the British and Boer camps had not been resumed formally and in earnest. The impression produced on members by the studiously moderate and cautious statement was that he might have said a good deal more, and that the prospect for peace was more hopeful and clearer than the ministerial statement indicated.

REASONS FOR EXPECTING PEACE Three reasons could be assigned for the belief. First, the captured corre-"pondence between the Boer leaders proved several months ago that Mr. Schalkburger was making a strenuous effort to induce ex-President Steyn to consent to a suspension of hostilities. Secondly, Lord Lansdowne, in his correspondence with the Netherlands Government contended that the quickest knowledged king of the half-mile. A DEATH-DEALING AVALANCHE OF SNOW

Overwhelmed a Japanese Oil Works-Two Hundred Persons Perished.

Tacoma, Wash., March 25. - The steamship Duke of Fife, which arrived last night, brings news of a terrible and unprecedented disaster at the Ohiro petroleum works, the big refinery establishment at Katsunosawa, near Niigatta, on the west coast of Japan, which involved the loss of fully 200 lives. The works were located under the brow of a steep hill, and there had been a heavy fall of snow. Suddenly a huge avalanche thundered down from the sheer height of 600 feet, crushing and burying the oil works, buildings, tanks, reservoirs, offices and workpeo-Part of the place was completely

submerged; in another portion the roofs were crushed in and buildings shattered. This caused an outbreak of fire, which reached the oil and spread with awful rapidity through that part of the building less heavily buried. Up to the time of the latest telegrams received at Yokohama 80 bodies had been recovered, and four persons had been dug out terribly injured and barely alive. 

ESPECIALLY DANGEROUS

Sir George Goldie Sizes Up the Situation

In South Africa as It Seems to Impress Him.

The Conditions in Cape Colony He Regards as Especially Dangerous-Rebels Must Be Disfranchised.

London, March 25 .- Sir George Goldie, vice-president of the Royal Geographical Society and founder of Nigeria, who has just returned from a thorough investigation of South Africa. where he conferred with Lord Milner, Lord Kitchener, Cecil Rhodes, Sir Walter Hely-Hutchinson, the governor of the Cape of Good Hope, and numbers of other influential men, brings home

PESSIMISTIC VIEWS of the general situation from a British point of view. The conditions in Cape Colony, he regarded as especially dangerous, and he considers that the most serious British difficulties will be encountered there in the future, as at present. In the course of an interview Sir George Goldie, while recognizing the possible importance of Acting-President Schalkburger's step, said he was convinced that the question of peace or war rests

IN THE HANDS OF PRESIDENT STEYN. and that Mr. Kruger and the other Boers in Europe no longer represent Boer opinion. The real difficulty in the path of peace, he believes, is the question of granting amnesty to the Cape and Natal rebels, and, Sir George says, the vague promises of the British Government have not the slightest

weight, while the fighting burghers are in their present state of mind. Sir George Goldie advocates granting amnesty to the rebels, but he insists that every one must be DISFRANCHISED FOR LIFE.

This, he claims, would go far towards allaying the bitterness of the loyalists. Sir George deprecates any attempt to permit the use of a dual language. He says English alone must be the official language, and adds that the fact that practically the whole of the rising generations of the two republics are now in the concentration camps and are rapidly learning English will be of great aid in this direction.

MOST LIKELY WAS MURDERED

James Quirk, of Brantford, Killed in His Barn.

Lived Only a Few Minutes After He Was Attacked—The Assassin Escaped.

Brantford, March 24 .- The Brantford Courier printed an extra this morning, giving the following particulars of last

night's murder. Mr. Quirk was around the hotel as usual Sunday evening. After 10 o'clock he went out with a friend, David Thomas, and had a dish of oysters at Flemings' restaurant. Returning to the hotel he was seen by his partner, Mr. Toole, who left him down stairs, Mr. Toole going to bed.

Bob Ryan, the cook of the hotel, was also sitting in the public reading room of the hotel at the time.

About midnight, a bell boy named Eddie Kenny, whose room is back of the hotel and near the bar, heard a shout and the groans coming from the barn. Going to his window, and the groans still continuing, he ran down stairs and told Ryan he thought someone in the barn had been kicked by a horse. Ryan rushed out to the barn and found the electric lights turned on, and in the little harness room at the foot of the loft steps was horrified to see the body of Quirk, head downward, in a big pool of blood.

Mr. Toole arrived on the scene shortly afterward, and, raising the body, found that his partner had been terribly injured. Quirk opened his eyes once, but that was the only movement of life that he ever again made. The poor man was dead. A foul murder had been committed during the Sun-

day midnight hour. In the loft over the barn Quirk kept some valuable game cocks and chickens. The supposition is that at twenty minutes to twelve he went out to the barn to see the chickens, or perhaps he had been attracted there by hearing a noise. He put on the electric lights and then ascended the narrow steps. At the top he must have been attacked and struck with some heavy weapon. The top of his head was badly smashed in with two blows, while a deep gash was also made over the right eye. It was apparently a repetition of the Sifton murder.

could have produced such terrible wounds.

The murderer apparently made his escape through the large door leading from the yard to Dalhousie street. This door had been closed and barred by the hostler. The bars were found by the police thrown down and the big gate partly open.

At the top of the loft steps and all about are heavy blotches of blood, while at the bottom of the steps is a large congealed pool of blood. Robbery was not the intention evidently as Mr. Quirk's pockets were untouched.

The murdered man was 43 years of age, and leaves a wife and two bright girls. His father is Conductor Quirk, of Wingham. There is no clue whatever to the murderer or the motive of the foul crime. It looks as though the blows showered upon the dead man had been made with an axe. The axe kept in the yard for chopping was found by the police, but there are no blood stains on it.

THE SMALLPOX

Party in the House the Night Before Small pox Developed on Grant Avenue, Hamilton- Disease on the Victorian.

Hamilton, March 25 .- There are no ew developments in connection with the case on Grant avenue in this city. The patient is now sitting up. None of the other persons in the house show signs of sickness. It is stated that on Wednesday night, before Whiteman's case was pronounced to be smallpox. there was a party in the house, about 20 friends being present. Whiteman was then complaining. The health department has hunted up all of them and has vaccinated them all.

Ottawa, March 25. — A letter from Lieut.-Col. Thomas Evans, stated that upon the arrival of the troopship Victoria at Cape Town there was one case of smallpox on beard of a mild type, and no further spread of the disease was feared. A letter of a later date, however, states that three other cases developed, making four in all.

PADEREWSKI MAKES MONEY. Chicago, March 25 .- At the Paderewski matinee in the Auditorium Chicago Saturday afternoon, hundreds of the pianist's admirers were turned away, unable to gain admittance to the hall. The receipts were \$6,800, the largest amount Paderewski has played to in America.

CHASED HIM 5,500 MILES. Wichita, Kas., March 25.-George Irons, an alleged postoffice robber, has been captured after a chase lasting thirteen months and covering 5,500 miles, and brought back to Kansas, where he is wanted on the specific charge of robbing the postoffice at Salva Feb. 18, 1901. A federal grand jury at Wichita has indicted Irons with Albert Gibbs, Ray Taggert and Albert Taggert on charges of postoffice robbery. The three last-named men have all confessed that they were members of a gang which committed many postoffice robberies in Kansas under the leadership of Irons.

COLLECTION OF BABIES. Buffalo, March 25 .- Martin Mock, of 238 Lemon street, now at work in Pittsburg, got the news on his own birthday, of the addition of three boys to his family. They were born at the family home. No physician attended the mother.
