

Two members of the Macdonald Governnent (Messrs. Tupper and Bowell) have recently declared that the Conservatives of Canada are ready to negotiate a treaty on the lines of the treaty of 1854, which provided for reciprocity in raw materials between the United States and Canada. Another member of the Government (Mr. Colby) tells us that this would be simply disastrous to the interests of the Canadian trade, and thereby managed to have a Tory, pledged to that view, elected in Napier ville. A fifth (our own Mr. Carling) says we are all right as we are, and that everybody is well off without reciprocity. With our rulers thus at their wit's end to find common ground upon which to resist the demand for freedom to trade with our neighbors, it is interesting to note how the proposition to establish a jug-handled treaty with the United States is received over the We find many men of eminence in political and business life in favor of unreany move towards embracing the proposition of a section of the Dominion Go ment for what has for years been pool poohed by our neighbors as a one-sided proposition.
