OTTAWA, June 20.—The first session of
the great Liberal convention held this afternoon was a magnificent success in avery sense of the term. The forethought of the committee in securing the rink for of the committee in securing the rink for the great gathering was amply proven, for ne other building in the city of Ottawa would have begun to hold the vast multi-under that assembled in this commedious structure. The building itself, unattractive in its bare state, was made very presentable, if not actually pretty, by the flags and bunting and other decorations that hung from the rafters and walls and posts, while immerous motions setting forth the leading principles of the Reform party loomed out from every convenient point. A platform capable of seating over 100 persons had been erected, and this was surrounded by a mass of ferns and presented a very attractive appearance. In the center of the drapery and over the stage was a portrait of her Majesty the Queen, while opposite the stage, enwreathed in a Union Jack, are the words, "Laurier, Our Leader." The crimetra gallery is lung with bunting, in the center of which is a scroll bearing the names of the honored dead of the party—Papineau, Baldwin, Lafohtaine, Dorion, Brown, Mackenzie. The newspaper men attending the convention met informally last evening and listened to speeches by several of their number, and then by the Liberal leader. Mr. John Cameron, of the London Advertiser, was chairman, and there were about 40 present. Two-minute speeches were made by the chairman; Mr. McCready, Telegraph, St. John; P. O'Brien, Globe, St. John; J. T. Hawke, Transcript, Moncton; A. McNee, Windsor Record, and Mr. Armstrong, St. Andrew's Beacon. When Mr. Laurier entered the room the newspaper men rose to their feet and cheered him again and again, sang that he was a joily good fellow and cheered him once more. Mr. Laurier, in the few remarks which he addressed to his enthusiastic audience, acknowledged the usefulness of the press, saying that he knew that it was notowing to the lack of ability nor devotion on the part of the Liberal press that the party had not been successful; but they had had to fight against other methods than those of argument. If there was one thing more than another, he told them, on which he relied for victory at the approaching election it was the Liberal press and the influence of organized distribution of Liberal literature. They had no other inducement to offer. He could only ask them to put forward a special effort this time, to put forth a special effort from this day, every day, until the next elections are fought out and won. (Cheers.) There was more cheering, and Mr. Laurier left to go to the rink to the evening meeting.

LONDON, June 20 .- In the House of Lords the Earl of Winchelsea moved that the Government build granaries and fill them with breadstuffs sufficient to supply the with breadstuffs sufficient to supply the people for six months in case of blockade by a hostile navy. He said the English people would be condemned to starvation or surrender in case such provision should not be made in advance. Lord Mayfair ridiculed the motion. State granaries, he said, could prove only a failure, and England need not fear to measure her own navy against any other in the world. After an animated debate the motion was withdrawn.

LIZZIE BORDEN FREE.

Lizzie Borden has been acquitted of the evolting charge of having murdered her aged father and stepmother at Fall River, Mass. The trial, which lasted for over two weeks, was one of the most remarkable on record. The police officials seem to have se out on the theory that as Lizzie Borden was the only person who could have committed the murders-the man and woman were killed one hour apart, medical testimony affirms-their duty was to piece out the evidence as best they could, and endeavor to have her proved guilty. This probably accounts for the gravely inconsistent and contradictory evidence which some of the policemen gave, proving premeditated or un intentional perjury was committed in order the more firmly to fasten the charge on the Indeed, evidence was given to show that at least one officer possessed and failed to reveal to the court while testify. ing evidence that went to show that Lizzie Borden told the truth when she said that she spent some time in the barn on the morning of the tragedy. Another over-zealous policeman testified that it was impossible for Lizzie Borden to have gone into the barn, as he visited it an hour after the discovery of the murders, and conclus sively proved to his own satisfaction that she had never been there. The value of this evidence can be gathered from that of half a dozen witnesses who testified that they had walked through the barr half an hour before the policeman arrived on the

THE ROYAL WEDDING

Edmund Yates Outlines the Coming Ceremonies

Signing the Register-Huminations and Becoptions—The Prince of Wales at Ascot—Raiser William at Hiz Old Tricks,

LONDON, June 21.—One advantage of making the royal wedding a semi-state function is that the ceremonial can be arranged just as desired, for precedent may be disregarded and the Queen and Prince of Wales can order everything precisely as they please.

At the wedding of the Empress Frederick, which was a full state function, everything was arranged by the Princs Consort and Lord Breadalbane, who was Lord Chamberlain, strictly following precedents. It was necessary to invite the whole of the Queen's household, with their husbands and wives respectively, to the number of 37, in addition to 34 members of it who were in waiting; also the households of the Prince Consort and other members of the royal family, with their husbands and wives, if there were any, to the number of 30. Besides those in waiting then there were 61 members of the diplomatic corps, male and female.

There were also fifteen Cabinet Ministers and their wives, and of these the Duke of Argyle is the only survivor. the only survivor.

SIGNING THE REGISTER.

After the ceremony in the Chapel Royal the royalties will all walk in procession to the presence chamber, following the bride and bridegroom, and from there they will proceed into the throne room, whete they are to be joined by the officiating elergy, and the registry of the marriage will be attested in the naual form.

When the Empress Frederick marriad, no fewer than 44 signatures were attached as attestations to the entry in the registry book of the Chapel Royal. When the Duke and Duchess of Fife were married, the register was signed in the lower frawing room of Buckingham Palace, and the entry was attested by 39 attestations.

Commencement of the Annual Meeting in This City.

When the Bishop of Huron stepped forward to deliver his charge at the first business session of the Synod of the Diocese of Huron this afternoon, the beneficial effects of his recent trip were visible in his demeanor. The flash of renewed vigor was in his cheek, and he spoke with the reanimation of health, and his voice was exceedingly impressive. As he stood before the large audience in the new Synod Hell, the remarks offered were in his usual forceful and elequent vein.

The first clause showed the total collections and free-will offerings to have been \$21,488 83, a slight increase over last year. The paro ial association collections totalled \$5,1 90, a decrease of \$166 21 since last year. The clergy maintenance and mission fund collections amounted to \$3,021 87, as compared with \$3,639 84 collected last year. Other credits were: \$9,766 77 from the interest account, and \$258 45 from the W. A. M. A. The donations amounted to \$80 25. The present difficulty should be met and the fund placed on such a basis as to prevent such a recurrence in the future.



On a vote being taken this view was not approved. CONSOLIDATION OF CANADIAN DIOCESE. This question was discussed long and ardently Mr. Charles Jonkins' resolution broached the matter. This Synod re-sfirms its conviction that the consolidation of the several dioceses of the Anglican Church in the Dominion of Canada and Newfoundland is in accordance with the highest interests of the Church, and that it is expedient that there should be a general Synod consisting of the bishops of the several dioceses and representatives chosen from the clergy and laity by the Diocesan Synods, such Synod to meet periodically for the consideration of matters affecting the Church's weifare and legislating thereon.

2. That with certain amendments in details, which it is hoped may commend themselves to the judgment of the General Synod, theplan of consolidation-fagreed to by the conference held in Winnipeg in August, 1890, affords a just and comprehensive basis for the constitution of the General Synod.

3. The Synod will accordingly proceed to elect four clergymen and four laymen, with as many substitutes of the respective orders, to represent this Synod at the General Synod to be held in Toronto in the month of September next ensuing.

4. That the representatives so elected be requested to present the following amendments to the Winnipeg scheme as being necessary and proper for incorporation in the General Synod. (a) A large numerical representation of the clergy and laity. (b) Meetings of the General Synod at shorter intervals than five years. (c) Provision for the joint deliberation of the two houses whenever demanded by a majority of either house. 5. This Synod prays that the presence of the great head of the church may be felt in all the deliberations of the General Synod, and that under the guidance of the Holy Spirit the Anglican Church in Canada and Newfoundland may, as the result of consolidation, present a closer bond of union among its members, an unbroken front to the entenies of the truth, and a more aggressive attitude in all things appertaining to the extension of the Redeemer's

eral Synod should not be binding upon diocesan synods until it had been ratified by these subordinate bodies. On a division being taken the amendment was sustained by a vote of 58 to 40.

"I am innocent, but I will leave my case in your hands and with my counsel."
Justice Dewy then charged the jury. He told them to disregard previous hearings, and defined the different degrees of murder. He stated the presumption of innocence was increased by defendant's character, and said there must be a real and operative motive.

The jury retired, and then filed into their seats at 4:30. Miss Borden was asked to stand up and the foreman was asked to return the verdict, upon which he announced "Not guilty."

After the verdict had been received the district attorney moved that the other cases against Miss Borden be nolle prossed, and the order of the court was made to that effect.

When the verdict of "Not guilty" was returned a cheer wentup which might have been heard half a mile away through the open windows, and there was no attempt to check it.
