COMING BATTLE TO SETTLE FATE OF THE BALKANS

risis Is Near As Result of Operations Near Kotchana.

Big Armies Are Being Concentrated For Decisive Fight of the Campaign.

London, July 8.—The Times correspondent in the Balkans wires from Sofia as follows:

No bulletins were issued today, but severe fighting continues west of Kot-chana, where the fourth Bulgarian army, under General Kovutcheff, the war minister, is being reinforced by the fifth army, under General Tosheff, which is advancing from Kustendil. The fate of the campaign will probably be decided by the result of the operations in this

Meanwhile, the third army, under General Racho Petroff, is advancing in two columns on Vrania and Pirot, on the

Kutincheff Advancing. the north, General Kutincheff reported to be advancing up the Timok Valley. General Ivanoff is now being reinforced, the weakening of his army having been the initial error of the eampaign. Had General Savoff's plan been adopted at the outset, these reverses by the Greeks might have been avoided, but complete confidence exists

in the final result. Within the last few days Istip has been twice taken by the Servians and twice retaken by the Bulgarians, and hard fighting is still reported around Kotchana. Small Servian detachments have made raids on Bulgarian territory to th north of Kustendil and carried away number of women and children. A Se vian column, advancing on Belogradchi' from the Timok Valley has been route with the loss of five guns.

BULGARIANS GAINING.

New York, July 8 .- A cable to the Tribune from London says: It is stated in Belgrade that the total Servian casualties in a week of fighting have amounted to upwards 15,000 killed and wounded. The Greeks admit they have lost 10, 600 officers and men. From the Bul-

garian side there is no corresponding estimate, but presumably they were in the other hand, information

which has reached London asserts that the whole story of battles, stormings, desperate resistance, and so forth is much exaggerated, and that nothing like a real battle has yet occurred. Between these two highly divergent statements it is no more possible to

udge at the moment than it is feasible to discriminate between the conflicting claim of victory put forward by the parties to the new war. Claim Victory. The Bulgarians maintain that they

have had the best of the struggle. So far it is positively declared in mes sages received in official quarters from Sofia that the Timok division of the Servian army has been routed, with enormous loss around Oviche Polle, but here again the Servians deny they have sustained any such disaster.

Exactly similar discrepancies ar evident between versions given out regarding the fighting of the Greeks and the Bulgars. For example, while telegrams from Athens portray the army of King Constantine pursuing an unchecked career of undiluted vic tory, it is affirmed from Sofia that the same army of the \$0,000 men has been defeated and dispersed.

Under these conditions it is useless to attempt any estimate of the actual cituation, so far as it concerns the eventual outcome of the amazing clash

of rivalries and hatreds. Turkey's Attitude.

The attitude of Turkey is becoming more clearly defined. It is evident that she means to utilize the situation to her own advantage. The Porte has formally demanded that the territory within the Enosmidia line shall be evacuated by the Bulgarians at once, and there are even rumors that an effort will be made to recover Adrianople. Not too much reliance need be placed on this latter report, for it is difficult to see how the Ottoman army can advance over the 100 miles that separates Chatalja from the lost fortess, but it seems certain that mili tary preparations are being made and all officers have been ordered to rejoin

SERVIAN LINES THREATENED. London, July 7. — The most important news from the seat of war today is the report, confirmed, from Sofia of the appearance of a large Bulgarforce at Vrania, threatening the Servian line of retreat.

Still more significant, as tending to confirm the belief that the Servians are suffering defeat, is the announcement from Belgrade that only meagre reports are being received from the Servian army headquarters, and that the Government has decided to publish reports only on alternate days. In addition, a rigid censorship on the newspapers is being enforced and the publication of special war editions has been stopped.

Inhuman Treatment.

The Servian wounded describe the battles as almost inhuman in their ferocity, the men throwing away their firearms and using their bayonets as daggers. This accords with the in- Father Point formation from many sources of the sanguinary character of the fighting and the wholesale slaughter witnessed in the present struggle.

A number of Greeks from this city are, if they have not been killed or wounded, engaged in the battles with the Bulgarians. Among them are John Pernekis, James Kapeas and Nick Kastel.

All Depositors Paid \$50 and Will Be Given Rest Later.

Big Failure Has, So Far, Caused Little Trouble in the

Pittsburg, Pa., July 8. - Financial litsburg showed little outward evidence today of yesterday's crash in banking circles, involving the failure of the First-Second National Bank with \$32,000,000 of deposits, the First National Bank of McKeesport, an allied institution ,and the appointment of receivers for the American Waterworks and Guarantee Company, the largest concern of its kind in the country, and for the banking house of J. S. and W. S. Kuhn, Inc.

Rushes Easily Met. No unusual scenes were observed, with the exception of the run on the Pittsburg Bank for Savings, another from home at the time of the robbery, bank controlled by J. S. and W. S. Kuhn, who controlled the majority of stock in the two banks that suspended yesterday. 
Claim Undertakers Stole From House



The Liberals in the Senate distibiless retain much of their old party feeling; it would be unnatural if they did not. But they are sufficiently independent to vote as they think right, no matter what party leaders or the party caucus may say. Had any of them honestly believed in themselves, if they have the luck to the Government's contribution policy they would have voted for it without the slightest hesitation. As we have said, that is a state of mind which Conservatives with their strong sense of party loyalty cannot understand; but it is the fact nevertheless.



SENT TO JAIL,

[Canadian Press.] London, July 8. — Miss Zelie Emerson, of Jackson, Mich., Miss Mary Richardson, and Harry Golden, a male sympathizer with the woman suffragettes, were arrested last evening while trying to liberate Miss Sylvia Pankhurst from the hands of the poice at Bromley, were all sent to fail by the police magistrate today.

Miss Emerson, who, the police testified, had incited a mob of 500 structionists, by shouting, "What are you going to do?" was given one month's hard labor, and Harry Golden a similar sentence, but Miss Richard son, who had assaulted the police and broken a window at the police station, was senteneed to three months' imprisonment. The prisoner's only comment was, "We shall do just as much as we choose."


