NO ENLISTMENT UNDER TWENTY FOR DOMINION

Govt. Decides Men Under That Age Are Too Immature For Services Overseas.

OTTAWA. MAY 23.-IT IS OFFICIALLY AN-NOUNCED THAT THE MINIMUM AGE AT WHICH COMPULSION SHALL BE APPLIED IN CANADA IS TO BE 20 YEARS.

THE GOVERNMENT'S REASON FOR THE RAIS-ING OF THE MINIMUM AGE OF CONSCRIPTION FROM 18 TO 20 YEARS IS THAT EXPERIENCE AT THE FRONT HAS SHOWN MEN OF 18 TO BE TOO IMMATURE TO STAND THE RIGORS OF WAR. FOR THIS REASON IT HAS BEEN THE PRACTICE TO HOLD MOST OF THE CANADIAN VOLUNTEERS IN ENGLAND UNTIL THEY REACHED THE AGE OF 19. THE UNITED STATES BILL FIXES THE MINIMUM AT 21. BUT THE CANADIAN AUTHORITIES ON OVERSEAS EXPERIENCE HAVE DEEMED IT WISE TO DRAFT NO MEN UNDER 20 YEARS.

OTHERWISE THERE IS NO CHANGE IN THE SITUATION TODAY. IT IS PROBABLE THAT THE MEASURE MAY NOT COME DOWN IN PARLIAMENT BEFORE MONDAY OR TUESDAY OWING TO THE GREAT CARE BEING TAKEN IN DRAFTING IT.

Son of Detective Egelton Fell in Battle On May 19.

FINE TYPE OF CITIZEN

Washington, May 23.—No nation that respected itself or the rights of humanity could longer have borne the overwhelming wrongs that Germany inflicted upon the United States, President Wilson declared in a letter re-stating the reasons for the nation's entrance into the war written to Representative Heflin of Alabama and made public last night at the White House. Mr. Heflin had written to the president, saying some of his recent utterances on the war apparently had caused conon the war apparently had caused con fusion, over the issue with Germany The president's letter follows:



Hungarian Cabinet Reported To Have Resigned.

London, May 23, 11:10 a.m.—A Cen-al News dispatch from Amsterdam ays that the Hungarian cabinet, of Count Tisza, the "Iron Man" of Austria-Hungary, has been for many years the leader of the pro-German party in the Dual Monarchy, and was the last survivor of the little group of statesmen who surrounded Emperor Francis Joseph when the European war began. On the accession of Emperor Charles, the majority of the officials of the previous regime were either dismissed or resigned. There have been persistent reports from many sources that Emperor Charles keenly resented the dominance of Berlin in Austro-Hungarlan affairs, and that Count Tisza was the great obstacle which prevented him from freeing his empire from the influence of Potsdam.

Paris, May 23 .- Successful attacks were made by the French last night on three parts of the front, the war office announces. The attacks were made on the Aisne front. In the region of the Californie Plateau the French captured observation points dominating the Aillette Valley. Progress was made on the northern slope of the heights east of Chevreux. Three lines of German trenches east of Chevreux were captured during the night. German counter-attacks failed.

PATROLS GET PRISONERS

The party slipped away on the same steamer which brought them over, and convoyed by a French warship.

The French commissioners generally were supposed to be still in Washington and up to yesterday invitations to them to visit various sections of the country were received in great numbers.

It was presumed they were returning here to take up their conference on the conduct of the war, but they really re-

conduct of the war, but they really returned to make a farewell visit to the President. Up to that time there had been not even an intimation that the visitors were to leave so soon. Their special train was held in waiting, and late that afternoon, in accordance with carefully-laid plans, the mission sped away again, doubling back over the route it had covered earlier the same day and reached New York before midnight.

'Iron Hand" Kerensky Good As His Word; Arrests Deserters

War Minister Carries Out His Promises of Stern Discipline.

Petrograd, May 22-Via London, May 23 .- The "Iron Hand" threatened by M. Kerensky, the war minister, for restoring discipline in the army, was first employed last night with success when two companies of a Finland regiment surrounded a large house in Ligovsky street, where thirty armed deserters had secreted themselves.

Previously the temporary Government had never dared arrest deserters and pessimists had predicted a sanguinary collision when the initial attempt was made. But at the first display of the "Iron Hand" all the thirty men surrendered tamely and were marched off to barracks.

DOCKERS STRIKE. Montreal, May 22.—Two hundred and fifty C. P. R. freight handlers and a hundred and fifty in the employ of the Dominion Transport Company, most of them employed on the docks, went on strike today for higher pay. They have been receiving 30 cents an hour for day work and 35 cents at night, and demand an all-round increase of 5 cents perhour.

wage schedule has been arranged between the C. P. R. and its conductors, baggagemen, brakemen and yardmen, whereby all of these east of Fort William will receive a generous increase in pay. More than 200 C. P. R. employees residents of the city will benefit by the advanced schedule, which means about 18 per cent to passenger conductors, brakemen and baggagemen, 25 per cent to yardmen, and 50 cents an hour to freight conductors, with a minimum of \$4 a day.

The new rate of pay will mean that about \$2,500 more each month will be paid to the C. P. R. conductors, brakemen and yardmen who reside in this city. The baggagemen who run over this division all reside in Toronto.

The average monthly amount received by the conductors at present is from \$125 to \$175, the average being \$150. Brakemen average \$75 and baggagemen. \$80 a month, under the present scale.

The new schedule will become effective June 1st next.

Dear Sir.—The railway statistics re-cently issued by the Dominion Govern-ment containing the sworn statements of the different railways as to their financial condition and operating re-sults given for the London and Port sults given for the London and Port Stanley Railway a funded debt in bonds of \$900,000, but include no return of either miscellaneous obligations or outstanding stock. The impression in-tended to be conveyed to the public is that these bonds are the sole debt of the railway, and with no stock sub-scription or Government aid, represent its cost, to the interest and sinking fund on which the net traffic returns

iund on which the net traffic returns are in part applicable.

Covers Last Cost.

As a fact, however, this large item of \$900,000 only covers the cost of electrification of the railway, the new cars and the 19 miles of additional sidings and turnouts, and the return ignored the very large original cost of the permanent way, the entries into the cities, the terminals, docks, etc., previously represented for years in these annual statistical returns as covered by the items \$1,332.854 of bonds and \$537.158 of actual stock subscribed. A nominal rental of \$20,000 is said by you to have been arranged, but this would afford only 11-10th per cent interest on this debt as against the high rates originally paid and now prevailing.
